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MUNICIPAL COUNCIL NOTICES.

MUNICIPALITY OF COLOMBO.

Minutes of Proceedings of a General Meeting of the Municipal Council of Colombo held in the Town Hall on Friday, April 7, 1916.

The Council met this day at 3 P.M., pursuant to notice dated March 31, 1916.

Present:—Mr. R. W. Byrde, Chairman; Mr. L. B. Fernando; Mr. N. H. M. Abdul Cader; Mr. H. L. de Mel; Mr. E. G. Jayewardene, Dr. D. P. Banajee; Dr. E. V. Ratnam; Dr. W. P. Rodrigo; Mr. J. A. Perera; Mr. T. L. Villiers; Mr. F. R. Senanayake; Mr. C. H. Wellard; and the Hon. Dr. G. J. Rutherford.

1. The Minutes of the General Meeting of March 3, 1916, having been previously printed and a copy thereof having been sent to each Member of Council, were taken as read.

Mr. F. R. Senanayake raised a point of order, under section 25, chapter II., of the by-laws, with regard to the dissent attached to the Minutes, and urged (1) that it purports to be a dissent from a resolution of this Council, but it actually deals with a motion that was never accepted by the Council; (2) that it was sent in by a Councillor who, there is nothing to prove, was in the minority; (3) that the document does not deal with the reasons of his dissent from the opinion of the majority; and he moved that the dissent be not recorded.

The Chairman asked Mr. J. A. Perera whether there was anything he had to state with regard to the point of order raised.

Dr. W. P. Rodrigo thereupon rose to a point of order, and stated a point of order had been raised and it was only for the Chairman to decide upon that point of order in accordance with the provisions of section 2, chapter II., of the by-laws, and that the matter admitted of no discussion.

The Chairman held that the Chairman should rule on a point of order without admitting any discussion.

Mr. J. A. Perera inquired whether a Member is not entitled to direct the Chairman's attention to any rule or by-law relevant to the point of order under discussion.

The Chairman ruled that it is open to any Member to direct the Chairman's attention to any rule or by-law relating to the point of order raised, but without entering into any discussion on it.

Mr. J. A. Perera thereupon directed the Chairman's attention to by-law No. 25, chapter II.

The Chairman ruled as follows:—

The dissent was sent in by the Member for New Bazaar Ward. It is within the knowledge of the Chairman and the Secretary that he was in the minority. As such he was entitled, under rule 25 of chapter II., to record the reasons of his dissent from the opinion of the majority. The dissent was sent in in proper time. The question raised is whether the dissent is out of order as it purports to be a dissent from a resolution of the Council, but it actually deals with a motion

that was never accepted by the Council. The dissent was from the resolution passed at the General Meeting of the Council held on March 3, 1916 :—

“ That the report be referred back to the Special Committee for further consideration.”

The dissent deals with the reason for the Member's dissent. I do not consider that it can be ruled out of order on the ground that it touches on the original motion, the discussion on which gave rise to the amendment. Argument and discussion which deal with an original motion must necessarily have a bearing upon the minds of the Councillors when deciding the question of an amendment.

I cannot hold that a principle can be admitted that a dissent is out of order because, while being a dissent to a resolution founded on an amendment to an original motion, it touches upon matters which were dealt with under discussion of the original motion. The subject-matter is one and is, to my mind, inseparable.

I accordingly decide that as far as objections No. 1 and No. 2 are concerned that the dissent is not out of order.

The Chairman then called upon Mr. Senanayake to proceed with regard to point No. 3, which has been raised by him.

Mr. F. R. Senanayake read the first portion of the dissent, and pointed out that the dissent did not disclose the reasons of the Member dissenting from the opinion of the majority, and stated that some portions of the dissent were irrelevant and other portions objectionable.

Mr. J. A. Perera invited the attention of the Chairman to Minutes of the Council Meeting dated March 18, 1904, which dealt with a case in which exception had been taken to a portion of a dissent by a Member of a Special Committee to the report of the Special Committee.

The Chairman ruled as follows :—

I decide that the main body of the dissent is in order. It is a recapitulation of the events which led up to the report of the Special Committee placed before the Council and to the motion and amendment.

Certain portions of it which relate to the views of a Member are not, I consider, relevant. Annexure A is also, I consider, not relevant. The dissent I hold is in order with the exception of the paragraphs marked A and B by me, which are, I consider, irrelevant as they relate solely to the opinions and attitude of a particular Member which would not have influenced the decision of the Council on the subject. A dissent should be a dissent from the resolution of the Council and not a dissent from the attitude of any particular Member.

Paragraphs A and B may be deleted and also annexure A.

The Council then resolved that the Minutes of the General Meeting of March 3, 1916, be confirmed as amended.

2. The Chairman read the following statement *re* plague :—

There have been 17 further cases of human plague and 3 cases of rat plague bringing the total for the year up to 52 human and 14 rat cases, the corresponding total for last year was 27 human and 29 rat cases, while the preceding year there were 117 human cases.

Of the 17 human cases, 13 were bubonic and 4 septecæmic in character, and all proved fatal.

3. Pursuant to notice, Dr. W. P. Rodrigo asked the Chairman whether the statement made by Mr. Beling in giving evidence in the case with regard to the loss of the Rs. 7,500 cheque, viz., that he, Messrs. R. W. Byrde, J. A. Perera, Emanuel Jayewardene, A. I. Sherringham, and A. S. Eliyatambi went to the bank, and Mr. Byrde questioned the paying shroff, is true? If so, did those two Members of Council go there at the Chairman's invitation and in the interests of the Council, or otherwise? If at the invitation of the Chairman, will he be so good as to let this Council know in what capacity they were invited to accompany him, and whether any other Members of the Council, either belonging to the legal profession or to any Standing Committee or not, were invited? If the Chairman did invite those Members, and not others of the two Committees concerned, does he think that such practice is not detrimental to the interests of the Council and dignity of the Members?

The Chairman replied as follows :—

The statement is substantially correct. The two Members of Council went at the invitation of the Chairman and in the interests of the Council; the Member for the Maradana Ward as the Member for the Ward to which the case belonged, the Member for New Bazaar as a Member of the Law Committee. I did not ask any other Members as I considered that these two would be quite sufficient. What there was to be done had to be done quickly. I am quite satisfied that the action which was taken was not detrimental either to the interests of the Council or the dignity of Members.

4. Pursuant to notice, Dr. W. P. Rodrigo asked the Chairman under what circumstances a portion of the goods seized on his warrant against the Ceylon Water Boat Co. was released before the money was paid; and in consideration of the fact that such seizure was on the recommendations of the Standing Committees on Law and Finance, whether the Chairman consulted these Committees or the Council's lawyers before he ordered the release?

The Chairman replied as follows :—

The goods were released on my orders as stated in my letter No. 94s of the 5th instant to you. I did not consult the Standing Committees on Law and Finance nor the Council's lawyers. There was no necessity for me to defer the matter in order to call a formal meeting of the two Committees or to consult the Council's lawyers.

Dr. W. P. Rodrigo asked for the Chairman's permission to ask a question which was dependent on his answer.

The Chairman ruled that as the matter which formed the subject of the original question was likely to become *sub judice*, no further questions could be put.

5. Pursuant to notice, Dr. W. P. Rodrigo asked the Chairman whether the cheque for Rs. 7,500, reported to have been lost was crossed, and, if not, why not, and whether the Chairman has given orders not to issue any cheques for such considerable sums without crossing them.

The Chairman replied as follows :—

The cheque for Rs. 7,500 was not crossed. It was not crossed as it had never been the custom in the Office of the Financial Assistant to cross cheques. The reason for this was that as a rule the payees have no banking accounts. I have given an order that all cheques should be crossed and also marked “not negotiable,” except in cases where special circumstances may exist why this should not be done.

6. Pursuant to notice, Mr. T. L. Villiers asked the Chairman what arrangements there are for supplying drinking water at or near the jetty for passengers and others landing at the port.

The Chairman replied that no special arrangements have been made by this Council beyond the provision of the ordinary standpipes.

7. Pursuant to notice, Mr. E. G. Jayewardene moved that the lighting of the city of Colombo as in normal times be resumed, and that provision be made for an extra vote of Rs. 8,640 for the resumption and continuance of the lighting during the current year. Mr. J. A. Perera seconded.

The Chairman quoted figures showing the reduction in the number of lamps lighted, and stated that the Financial Assistant had informed him that the money was now available to resume the normal lighting of the city.

Dr. W. P. Rodrigo moved as an amendment that the matter be referred to the Works and Finance Committees. Mr. H. L. de Mel seconded.

Mr. F. R. Senanayake spoke in favour of the amendment.

The amendment was put to the meeting and declared carried.

8. Pursuant to notice, Dr. W. P. Rodrigo moved that the dissent of the Member for New Bazaar Ward attached to the Minutes of Proceedings of the last Meeting of Council being irrelevant, irregular, and offensive be expunged from such Minutes of Proceedings.

Before the motion was seconded, Mr. J. A. Perera rose to a point of order. He directed the Chairman's attention to section 2, chapter II., of the by-laws and to the Chairman's ruling on this point as recorded in the Minutes of the Meeting of the Council of October 29, 1915, and asked the Chairman to rule that the motion was out of order.

The Chairman ruled that the motion was out of order under section 2, chapter II., of the by-laws.

9. Pursuant to notice, Dr. W. P. Rodrigo moved that the practice of Members taking wholesale copies of documents in files that come to them in the ordinary course of a Member's business is highly irregular and detrimental to the interests of the Council, and, where such are taken without the special permission of the Chairman, should be considered a breach of honour. Dr. E. V. Ratnam seconded.

The Hon. Dr. G. J. Rutherford and Mr. J. A. Perera spoke against the motion.

The Chairman explained that there was nothing in the rules or by-laws of the Council prohibiting Members taking notes of papers sent to them in the routine of business. The mere taking of copies is not irregular, except in the case of confidential documents, as long as the privilege is not abused.

The motion was put to the meeting and declared lost, 2 voting for it and 11 against.

10. Pursuant to notice, Mr. T. L. Villiers moved—(a) That Government be asked to provide a drinking fountain on their premises at the jetty for the use of passengers and others; (b) That three temporary standpipes be erected in Victoria park at the cost of the Council; (c) That when troops are passing through Colombo a portable standpipe with 1-inch pipe should be fixed to the hydrant at the jetty end of York street to supply drinking water. The Hon. Dr. G. J. Rutherford seconded.

Mr. T. L. Villiers moved, with leave of Council, that the words "and that a sum of Rs. 200 be placed at the disposal of the Chairman to meet any costs that may be incurred in connection therewith" be added to paragraph (c) of his motion. Mr. L. B. Fernando seconded.

The motion, with the addition, was then put to meeting and declared carried.

Mr. L. B. Fernando moved that the Council do go into Committee to consider items 11 to 14 on the Agenda. Mr. E. G. Jayewardene seconded.—Carried.

The following extract from the Minutes of the Special Committee on Drainage Works, an extract from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Law and General Subjects, and extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Municipal Works and Finance, having been previously printed and circulated, were laid before the Council in Committee.

Extract from the Minutes of the Special Committee on Drainage Works of March 17, 1916.

- (3) To consider whether the estimated cost, Rs. 4,500, of sewer H 23 should be added to the modified Drainage programme.—Recommended that the sum of Rs. 4,500 for sewer H 23 be added to the total cost of the modified scheme, Rs. 17,087,730.

Resolved—That the above recommendation be adopted.

Extract from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Law and General Subjects of March 29, 1916.

- (12) To consider an application from the General Manager, Ceylon Government Railway, re the approach road to the Hindu temple at Captain's Garden.—Recommended that the remaining portion of the old road to Captain's Garden be discontinued and stopped up under section 149 (1) of Ordinance No. 6 of 1910.

Resolved—That the above recommendation be adopted.

Extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Municipal Works of March 31, 1916.

- (4) To recommend that a sum of Rs. 70,000 be reserved under the head "Colombo Waterworks Extensions, 1912," in the event of the estimate being exceeded.—Recommended that the estimate be increased by Rs. 70,000.
- (5) To recommend the street lines for Jawatta road.—Recommended that the street lines be adopted.
- (9) To consider a suggestion by the Works Engineer: (a) That the nine remaining Supervisors of the Conservancy Department should each draw an extra sum of Rs. 4.33 a month in lieu of the use of a bicycle, in view of the saving on the vote, up to the end of March, 1916; (b) That from April 1, 1916, an allowance of Rs. 25 a month be paid to each Supervisor as a commuted allowance.—Recommended that (a) be sanctioned and that (b) be sanctioned, subject to the condition that either a bicycle or a rickshaw be kept.
- (11) To recommend the application of the Waterworks Engineer to purchase 800 barrels of Japanese cement.—Recommended.
- (13) To consider an application from the Works Engineer for permission to purchase 150 barrels White Bros. cement from Messrs E. B. Creasy & Co. at Rs. 15 per barrel; 75 barrels Booth cement from Messrs. Walker, Sons & Co. at Rs. 15 per barrel; 75 barrels Green Island Hong Kong cement from Messrs. Aitken, Spence & Co. at Rs. 13 per barrel (small).—Recommended.

Resolved—That the above recommendations be adopted.

The motion was put to the meeting and declared carried.

Mr. L. B. Fernando moved that the Council do resume, and that the resolutions of Council in Committee be adopted.

Mr. E. G. Jayewardene seconded.—Carried.

The Chairman formally moved in Council that the resolutions of Council in Committee be adopted. Mr. L. B. Fernando seconded.—Carried.

MUNICIPALITY OF GALLE.

Minutes of Proceedings of a General Meeting of the Municipal Council of Galle held in the Municipal Office on Monday, April 17, 1916.

THE Council met this day at 4.45 P.M., pursuant to notice dated April 10, 1916.

Present :—The Hon. Mr. R. B. Hellings, Chairman ; Mr. D. G. Goonewardena ; Mr. D. W. Subesingha ; Dr. C. B. Lourensz ; Mr. C. E. de Vos ; Mr. G. E. Abeywardena ; and Mr. J. E. Perera.

1. The Minutes of the General Meeting of Council held on March 11, 1916, a copy of which was sent to each Councillor, were taken as read.

Resolved—That the Minutes of the General Meeting of Council of March 11, 1916, be confirmed.

2. The dissent referred to in item 3 of the Minutes of the Meeting of Council held on March 11, 1916, not having been duly submitted as required by rule 26, chapter II., of the by-laws, the motions of which Messrs Abeyawardena and Subesingha had given due notice fell through.

3. Letter No. 1,202 dated March 21, 1916, from the Superintendent of Police, Galle, *re* Police beats, &c., within Municipal limits. Laid on the table.

4. Letter No. 4 dated April 4, 1916, from the Hon. the Colonial Secretary *re* charges for the suppression of the riots.

Resolved—That the draft reply submitted by the Chairman be approved.

5. Extract from the Minutes of the Meeting of the Special Committee appointed on January 8, 1916, to inquire into and report on the demand made by Government for Police engaged on Municipal duties.

Extract referred to.

With reference to the Hon. the Colonial Secretary's letter No. 3 of March 14, 1916, inquiring whether it is the desire of the Council that the Police force should be reduced so as to decrease the cost of same to the Council, it was resolved that the following reply be forwarded to Government, *viz.* :—That if Government is not prepared to assist the Council, then the Council desires the reduction of the Police force to a strength that would cost Rs. 23,089, which is the amount realized by the Police tax.

That the Council realizes that there will be considerable risk in the town being thus under-policed. The criminal classes of the country naturally gravitate to the large towns, and Council hopes that Government will adopt the view that the adequate policing of such places is a matter of Colonial as well as Municipal concern, and that Government will decide to maintain such a force in Galle as the Inspector-General of Police considers necessary, and to fix the Council's contribution at the amount of the Police tax (Rs. 23,089).

Mr. G. E. Abeywardena moved that the recommendations be approved. Mr. J. E. Perera seconded.—Carried unanimously.

The Chairman moved that the apportionment of the 7 per cent. rate recovered on premises situated outside the Police limits, but within the Municipal limits, be fixed as follows :—2½ per cent. as Police rate, 1¼ per cent. as lighting rate, 3¼ per cent. as water-rate. Dr. C. B. Lourensz seconded.—Carried unanimously.

6. Letter No. 604 dated April 7, 1916, from the Colonial and the Municipal Auditor forwarding the annual report on the accounts of the Municipality of Galle for the year 1915. Laid on the table.

Mr. C. E. de Vos left the Meeting at this stage of the proceedings.

THE following Specifications have been accepted:—

No. 1,409 of April 1, 1914.

Churton Harrison Walker.

"An improved rubber smoking and curing machine."

Abstract.—The machine consists of:—(1) A stove in which heated smoke and air is produced from suitable fuel and which is said to be hermetically sealed, except for an adjustable valve which regulates the supply of air to the return duct which leads the remainder of the smoke and air after it has circulated through the machine back to the stove. (2) A blower which forces the smoke and air from the stove through a duct with two branches; one branch leading the heated smoke and air to an enclosed revolving drum at one end of the machine, on which the latex is made to adhere by reason of the drum being made to dip while it revolves in a pan or trough of latex, and so smoking one surface of the adhering film on that drum; the other branch leading the heated smoke and air to an enclosed revolving roller at the other end of the machine on which the partly smoked film cut from the drum by a knife set and operated for the purpose and conveyed by a moving belt to said roller, is rolled up with the previously smoked surface inwards and so that the outer and previously unsmoked surface of the film is smoked as it is rolled up on that roller. (3) The smooth revolvable drum previously referred to dipping into a trough of latex from which it picks up a film of latex. (4) A closed storage tank for supplying latex through trough, the supply being regulated by an air cock set to admit air to the closed tank at a rate which will allow the flow of latex by gravitation to occur at the desired rate to feed the film formed on the drum. (5) A small vessel specified to be cylindrical in shape, of brass or other suitable material, containing ammonia crystals and set in communication with the inlet side of the air regulating cock so that the air admitted to the latex storage tank through that cylinder and the cock takes with it ammonia fumes to the latex. (6) A knife, movable to and fro across the face of the drum by means of a projection at one end of it being made to engage in a zigzag groove in the pulley driving the drum, for the purpose of cutting the cylindrical film of partly smoked latex formed and smoked on the drum. (7) An endless band or belt, acting as a conveyor, to convey through heated smoke and air the previously partly smoked film, after it has been cut and unrolled from the drum, to the roller at the other end of the machine which rolls up the film and exposes the previously unsmoked surface of it to heated smoke and air as before described. (8) A return duct, which leads the heated smoke and air back to the stove after it has acted on the film while it is being formed on the drum and while it is on the endless belt conveyed and while it is being rolled up on the roller, and provided with a valve to regulate the admission of air as before described.

The claims are:—

1. In improved rubber smoking and curing machines, a machine by which an uniform thin film of rubber is smoked on both surfaces, substantially as hereinbefore described and as illustrated in the drawings accompanying the Provisional Specification herein No. 1,409 of April 1, 1914.

2. In improved rubber smoking and curing machines, a knife used in connection with above-mentioned machine in removing from the roller the film of rubber when it has obtained a suitable consistency, substantially as hereinbefore described and as illustrated in the drawings accompanying the Provisional Specification herein of April 1, 1914.

3. In improved rubber smoking and curing machines, the use of a cylinder of brass or other suitable material containing ammonia crystals whereby the air in the storage tank of the machine is impregnated with ammonia fumes and surface coagulation of latex in the tank is thereby prevented, substantially as hereinbefore described and as illustrated in the drawings accompanying the Provisional Specification herein No. 1,409 of April 1, 1914.

"Improvements in elevators, more especially intended for use with machines, or apparatus, for sifting and classifying tea leaf and other produce."

Abstract.—This invention of the said William Jackson, deceased, has for its object to provide very efficient elevators, which are more especially intended for use with machines, or apparatus, for sifting and classifying tea leaf, or other produce, such as the sieving and classifying apparatus which is the subject of the application for Letters Patent No. 1,404 of March 28, 1914, and also the invention of the said William Jackson, deceased.

The elevator made in accordance with this present invention consists of a wheel with the elevating device in its internal periphery, which elevating device consists of an internal peripheral trough in which are secured angular scoop-shaped buckets which carry up the tea leaf, or other produce (fed in by a suitable spout, or the like), and discharge it, for instance, into a shoot, or the like, by which it is guided to the required place.

The claims are:—

1. An elevator, consisting of a wheel having an elevating device in its internal periphery, substantially as hereinbefore explained.

2. An elevator, consisting of a wheel having angular scoop-shaped buckets arranged in its internal periphery, substantially as hereinbefore described.

3. An elevator, consisting of a wheel having in its rim a trough-shaped internal periphery carrying angular scoop-shaped buckets, to operate, substantially as hereinbefore explained.

4. An elevator in accordance with the preceding claiming clauses, arranged in combination with a sieving and classifying apparatus, substantially as hereinbefore explained.

Abstract.—The invention is coagulating rubber latex by refrigerating the latex by any known mechanical, chemical, or physical refrigerating agent or agents. It is said that the residue or mother liquor left after coagulation by this means will be found to contain resinous and other insoluble matter but that the coagulated rubber so produced is pure and uniform.

The claims are:—

1. In the preparation and coagulation of latex, the coagulation thereof by the absorption of heat from and the cooling of the latex to a suitable temperature, substantially as above described.

2. In the preparation and coagulation of latex, the elimination therefrom of resins and impurities by cooling and lowering the temperature of the latex, substantially as above described.

"Paving composition and the like."

Abstract :—

The inventor states :—

The invention relates to pavement composition and construction, and in particular to a new and improved pavement. The various forms of bituminous pavements which are in use and well known at the present time are inefficient and imperfect because of the high percentage of voids in the road metal. The percentage of voids in tar and asphalt macadam wearing surfaces varies from 30 to 45 per cent., whereas the voids in a sheet asphalt pavement will average from 27 to 30 per cent. Due to the high percentage of voids prevalent in these types of pavement a very large amount of asphaltum is required, because of the fact that all particles must be thoroughly coated, and all voids completely filled, in order to produce a pavement which is waterproof throughout its entire thickness. To fill these voids is impossible in practice, with the result that a pavement is produced which is not thoroughly waterproof. All bituminous materials are more or less acted upon by pure water, and water containing small percentages of carbonic acid, urine from animals, and other impurities; hence the advantage of having a surface that is waterproof throughout its entire thickness thereby allowing these active substances to come into contact with the surface only, and not with the entire bituminous material of the road, which is the case with bituminous pavements containing voids.

It is for this reason that a bituminous paving mixture containing a mineral aggregate in which the voids are not reduced to a minimum cannot be used in the construction of gutters, tunnels, and in the damp-proofing of cellars, or other flat surfaces upon which water is apt to accumulate.

In pavements in which the road metal contains a high percentage of voids the tendency of traffic is to force each individual stone into these voids, thereby producing a raveling of the surface. If enough bitumen is used to cement these individual particles together, and to fill the voids, the tendency of the pavement is to become soft in hot weather, and the cost of construction is excessive, due to the large amount of bitumen used.

It is thus the purpose of my invention to provide a pavement wherein the voids are reduced to a minimum so that the heaviest traffic will be supported effectively without the assistance of any bitumen, this material being added merely to cement the individual stones together and to waterproof the road.

My further object is to increase the softening point of the bitumen used so that it will not become unduly soft in the hottest weather.

The claims are :—

1. A pavement composition, consisting of a mineral aggregate, impalpable powder and bitumen incorporated, substantially in the proportions specified.

2. A pavement composition, consisting of a mineral aggregate, impalpable powder and bitumen incorporated in the proportions of 40 to 79 per cent. of mineral aggregate, passing a 3-inch sieve, but retained on a $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch sieve; 42 to 9 per cent. of mineral aggregate passing a $\frac{1}{8}$ -inch sieve, but retained on a 100-mesh sieve; 14 to 0 per cent. of impalpable powder passing a 200-mesh sieve and 4 to 12 per cent. of bitumen.

3. A pavement composition, consisting of a mineral aggregate, impalpable powder and bitumen incorporated in the proportions of 22 to 64 per cent. of mineral aggregate, passing a 1-inch sieve, but retained on a $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch sieve; 57 to 19 per cent. of mineral aggregate passing a $\frac{1}{8}$ -inch sieve, but retained on a 200-mesh sieve; 17 to 0 per cent. of impalpable powder passing a 200-mesh sieve, and 4 to 17 per cent. of bitumen.

4. A pavement composition, consisting of mineral aggregate, impalpable powder and bitumen incorporated in the proportions of 10 to 50 per cent. of mineral aggregate, passing a $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch sieve, but retained on a $\frac{1}{8}$ -inch sieve; 68 to 33 per cent. of mineral aggregate passing a $\frac{1}{8}$ -inch sieve, but retained on a 200-mesh sieve; 18 to 0 per cent. impalpable powder passing a 200-mesh sieve, and 4 to 17 per cent. bitumen.

"Improvements in or relating to machinery for massaging or kneading rubber and the like."

Abstract :—

The inventor states :—

This invention relates to the manufacture of rubber and the like and has for its object to provide an improved process or method and apparatus for manufacturing and treating rubber, particularly rubber which has been recently coagulated from the fluid latex and is also applicable to the treatment of other plastic substances having similar or like characteristics to those of rubber.

The improved apparatus is more particularly applicable for treating rubber recently coagulated from the fluid latex and is also applicable for softening raw rubber into a dough-like consistency prior to vulcanization, and to the treatment of other plastic substances having similar or like characteristics to those of rubber.

According to this invention I employ a process which consists in subjecting the mass of recently coagulated rubber to the action of moving surfaces which are adapted to rotate said mass as a solid sausage-like body, and act thereon with a massaging or kneading effect. By the application of heat during this massaging process, a drying action on recently coagulated rubber is simultaneously effected and when a sufficient temperature is employed, the apparatus may be utilized for kneading raw rubber into a plastic condition preparatory to vulcanizing. Said rolling movement of the rubber may be either in the nature of a continuous rotation in one direction or a to and fro movement.

When the rubber to be manipulated has been freshly coagulated from the rubber latex it may at once be subjected to the massaging treatment, or it may firstly be immersed for a time in boiling water, or other washing fluid, or boiled before being thus dealt with.

Those parts of the invention which manipulate the rubber may be heated to a suitable temperature by steam or in any other suitable way.

According to one modification for carrying this invention into effect a mass of the said rubber is massaged with a rolling motion in a cavity formed between three or more rollers revolving with an equal, or substantially equal, periphery speed, whether or not the rollers are of equal or unequal diameter, all the rollers being arranged to revolve in the same direction, which will cause the rubber to remain in said cavity whilst being operated upon.

At least one of the rollers should be movable to and from its actively operating position, to permit of the introduction of the rubber into the cavity, and to apply the required pressure thereon. The movable roller is preferably the top one of the combination.

When the apparatus is employed for massaging and drying recently coagulated rubber or for softening down raw rubber into a plastic condition the rollers are preferably heated internally by steam, but other suitable means can when desired be employed.

The rollers in cross section may be circular, or polygonal, and one or more of them may have longitudinal or transverse ribs, corrugations, or projections, or the surface may be undulatory or have a suitable pattern.

When using a combination of three rollers, the two lower ones forming the cavity for the rubber may rotate in fixed bearings, and the upper roller be arranged to move up from or down into the cavity. When using four or more rollers, the lower ones which form the cavity rotate in fixed bearings while the upper one is movable as already described, or the upper rollers may be fixed and the lower ones movable so as to provide a sufficient space for freely introducing the rubber.

The apparatus may also be used for both massaging and washing the rubber, in which case the rollers may operate in a bath of hot or cold water, or other washing liquid, in which they may be partially or wholly submerged, or the water may be caused to flow or trickle over the rollers.

The claims are :—

1. In the manufacture of rubber, the process which consists in subjecting a mass of recently coagulated rubber or the like to the action of moving surfaces which are adapted to rotate said mass as a solid sausage-like body and to act thereon with a massaging or kneading effect, substantially as set forth.

2. In the manufacture of rubber, an apparatus consisting of a plurality of rollers so assembled as to form a cavity in which the rubber is placed and operated upon with a massaging or kneading effect, substantially as and for the purposes set forth.

3. In the manufacture of rubber, an apparatus consisting of a plurality of rollers assembled to form a cavity between them for receiving a mass of rubber, one of the rollers being movable into and out of the cavity for the purpose of applying pressure to the rubber whilst the same is being rolled over and over and subjected to a massaging treatment in the said cavity between the rollers.

4. An apparatus as claimed in the preceding claims provided with means for driving the rollers in the same direction and at the same periphery speed.

5. The combination with apparatus as claimed in the preceding claims of means for heating said rollers or some of them.

6. An apparatus for massaging or kneading rubber consisting of the combination of a plurality of rollers assembled to form a cavity between them, a movable roller adapted to be moved into and out of said cavity, means for applying pressure to said movable roller, means for rotating the rollers in the same direction and at the same periphery speed, means for closing the ends of the gaps between the rollers, and for maintaining said closure whatever the position of the movable roller.

7. An apparatus as claimed in the preceding claims wherein the movable roller carries or is adapted to move with a slide so arranged as to keep the ends of the cavity between the rollers closed whatever the position of the movable roller relatively thereto.

8. An improved apparatus for massaging or kneading rubber consisting of a plurality of rollers substantially as described with reference to the accompanying drawings with or without the particular means illustrated for closing the end of the cavity and with or without the particular means for driving the rollers and for exerting pressure on the mass of rubber under treatment, substantially as and for the purpose set forth.

9. The improved apparatus and several modifications thereof, substantially as described with reference to the accompanying drawings.
