NOW Ye that We, the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, in exercise of the powers vested in Us by section 25 of "The Co-operative Credit Societies Ordinance, 1911," do hereby remit—

- (a) The stamp duty with which, under any law for the time being in force, instruments executed by or on behalf of "The Siduwa Co-operative Credit Society" and "The Haltota Co-operative Credit Society," or of any officer or member, and relating to the business of such Societies, or any class of such instruments, are respectively chargeable;
- (b) Any fee payable by such Societies under the law of registration for the time being in force.

By His Excellency Sir John Anderson, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Knight Commander of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Ceylon, with the Dependencies thereof.

WHEREAS in pursuance of the said 'The Trading with the Enemy (Amendment No. 2) Ordinance, No. 13 of 1916," We did, by Our Proclamation bearing date the 5th day of June, 1916 (published in the Government Gazette No. 6,806 of the 10th instant), publish a Royal Proclamation and an Order of the Lords in Council issued under the Trading with the Enemy (Extension of Powers) Act, 1915:

And whereas by Our Proclamation dated the 17th day of July, 1916 (published in the Government Gazette No. 6,809 of the 21st day of July, 1916), We did publish for general information a further Order of the Lords in Council dated the 2nd day of June, 1916:

And whereas a further Order of the Lords in Council has been issued bearing date the 15th day of June, 1916:

Know Ye that We, the Governor of Ceylon, in pursuance of "The Trading with the Enemy (Amendment No. 2) Ordinance, No. 13 of 1916," aforesaid, do hereby publish for general information the Order of the Lords in Council dated the 15th day of June, 1916, aforesaid appearing in the schedule hereto.

SCHEDULE.

Trading with the Enemy (Neutral Countries) Order in Council (No. 11).

At the Council Chamber, Whitehall, the 15th day of June, 1916.

By the Lords of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

Whereas His Majesty was pleased, in exercise of the power in that behalf conferred on Him by section 1, subsection 1, of the Trading with the Enemy (Extension of Powers) Act, 1915, by a Proclamation dated the 29th day of February, 1916, to prohibit all persons or bodies of persons, incorporated or unincorporated, resident, carrying on business, or being in the United Kingdom, from trading with any of the persons or bodies of persons mentioned in the list contained in the said Proclamation:

And whereas by section 1, sub-section 2, of the said Act, it is provided that any list of persons and bodies of persons, incorporated or unincorporated, with whom such trading is prohibited by a Proclamation under the said Act may be varied or added to by an Order made by the Lords of the Council on the recommendation of a Secretary of State, such list as so varied or added to being in the said Proclamation referred to as the "Statutory List":

And whereas the list contained in the said Proclamation has been varied and added to by subsequent Orders of Council:

And whereas His Majesty was pleased by a Proclamation dated the 26th day of April, 1916, and entitled "The Trading with the Enemy (Statutory List) Proclamation, 1916, No. 2," to amend the said Proclamation dated the 29th day of February, 1916, in certain particulars:

And whereas His Majesty was pleased by a Proclamation dated the 23rd day of May, 1916, and entitled "The Trading with the Enemy (Statutory List) Proclamation, 1916, No. 3," to revoke the said Proclamation dated the 29th day of February, 1916, with the variations and additions made to the list therein contained by subsequent Orders of Council, and also the said Proclamation dated the 26th day of April, 1916, and to order that the Proclamation now in recital should be substituted therefor:

And whereas by an Order of Council dated the 2nd day of June, 1916, the list contained in the aforesaid Proclamation dated the 23rd day of May, 1916, was varied and added to:

And whereas there was this day read at the Board a recommendation from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs to the following effect:—

That the "Statutory List" of persons and bodies of persons, incorporated or unincorporated, with whom trading is prohibited should be further amended by the variation and addition of the names set forth in the schedule hereto:

Now, therefore, Their Lordships, having taken the said recommendation into consideration, are pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the same be approved.

Whereof the Right Honourable Sir Edward Grey, Bart., K.G., one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, the Controller of the Foreign Trade Department, and all other persons whom it may concern, are to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

* Note (1).—Under the Trading with the Enemy Proclamations of 25th June, and 10th November, 1915, all Proclamations relating to Trading with the Enemy apply to all persons or bodies of persons of enemy nationality, resident or carrying on business in Persia, Morocco, or Portuguese East Africa, and consequently it is an offence to trade with any person or body of persons of enemy nationality, resident or carrying on business in Persia, Morocco, or Portuguese East Africa, even though such person or body of persons is not included by name in the above list, and the omission of the name of any such person or body of persons from such list is not an authority or license to trade with such person or body

Note (2).—Where a firm named in the list has more than one branch in the same country, all branches in that country are held to be included in the list, even in cases where no address, or of several addresses, one only is specifically mentioned.

NOTE (3).—The list for each country is sent by telegraph to His Majesty's Representative in that country, who will notify British Consular Officers, to whom persons abroad should apply for information as to names on the list; but firms in the United Kingdom with branches abroad are advised to furnish such branches with copies of the Statutory List.

The Foreign Trade Department is prepared on application to inquire of His Majesty's Representatives abroad for the names of substitutes for any firm on the Statutory List. When the applicant wishes this done by telegraph, he must undertake to pay the cost of the telegraphic correspondence.

By-LAW REFERRED TO.

All householders shall deposit or cause to be deposited the dust, ashes, sweepings, rubbish, and other refuse from their premises in cylindrical galvanized wrought iron bins to be supplied by them, and to be constructed in such a manner and of such weight that the whole receptacle with its contents can easily be lifted and emptied into the scavenging cart. The bins shall be provided with covers and convenient handles, and shall have the owner's name or tenement number painted outside, and shall be kept clean by the owners. The bins shall be placed daily on the edge of the road outside the householders' dwellings or shops between the hours of 6 a.m. and 6.30 a.m., and it shall not be lawful for any person to place or cause to be placed such dust, ashes, sweepings, rubbish, or refuse in any street, unless the same shall be contained in bins as aforesaid, nor after the hour specified; and every householder shall remove such bins or cause them to be removed within the space of half an hour after the same shall have been emptied by the scavengers.

Provided that where the Chairman is satisfied that, owing to poverty, the immediate provision of such a bin would press harshly upon any householder, he may give him a permit for such period as to the Chairman may seem fit to use instead a wooden box provided with a loose lid, such box to be approved by the Chairman.

Provided further, that it shall be lawful for the Chairman, with the consent of any such householder, instead of issuing such permit, to supply him at once with the required galvanized iron bin, the cost thereof to be recovered thereafter by easy instalments.

CARGOES OF ENEMY VESSELS IN PORTUGUESE HARBOURS.

His Majesty's Minister at Lisbon reports by telegraph that the Portuguese Government have issued a Decree, dated the 21st instant, providing that allied and neutral cargoes of, or discharged from, German vessels will be delivered up by the Procurator of the Republic in the respective districts, to whom application should be made for the purpose within a period of thirty days. This period may be extended in certain cases.

It is added that a security will be required from cargo owners whose papers are not in order, and that the Portuguese Government retain the right to requisition cargoes on payment of an indemnity. The Portuguese Prize Court will decide all questions which may arise relative to cargoes.

CARGOES ON GERMAN AND AUSTRIAN VESSELS IN PORTUGUESE HARBOURS, PORTUGUESE PRIZE COURTS.

Foreign Office, May 27, 1916.

With reference to the notification which was published in the London Gazette of the 25th ultimo, a translation is now appended of the Articles of the Portuguese Decree of April 20th, 1916, relating to the release of allied and neutral cargoes on German vessels seized by the Portuguese Government.

His Majesty's Minister at Lisbon reports that cargoes on Austrian vessels will be released in the same manner as these on German vessels; and that delivery orders formerly issued by the enemy shipowners to cargo owners, with a view to the latter taking possession of their goods, will be accepted by the Portuguese authorities as evidence of title.

Translation.

Regulations with regard to Enemy Vessels and their Cargoes.

Art. 32.—Merchandise belonging to allies or to neutrals found on board these ships or discharged from them shall be delivered, with or without a guarantee, by the Procurator of the Republic of the respective judicial district, provided always that the Government have the right to requisition it on payment of an indemnity. Delivery shall be requested from that officer within a period of thirty days, without prejudice of postponement authorized by the Ministry of Finance in special cases.

(1) The guarantee shall always be demanded when the owner is unable to present shipping documents in proper form, there being applicable to such a case the provisions of the second paragraph of Art. 478 of the Decree

of the 31st January, 1889.

(2) The decision of the Procurator of the Republic shall be communicated to the Ministry of Finance, and the order for delivery, should there be one, will be given to the interested party, and for all purposes shall take the place of the ordinary bill of lading as regards the Custom-house or other authorities.

Art. 33.—Should the neutral or friendly character of goods on board an enemy vessel or discharged therefrom not be clearly established, or should the owner not be known, the goods shall be presumed to be enemy property.

Art. 34.—The Prize Court shall decide, in accordance with established procedure, all difficulties which may arise regarding the nationality, or regarding the storage, care, or delivery of merchandise referred to in the previous articles.

Art. 35.—The Tribunals of Commerce shall be competent to try and judge prize cases in accordance with Art. 179 of the Commercial Code.

(1) The judgment shall always be delivered by the Tribunal of Commerce of Lisbon, even though the case may have been tried by Colonial Tribunals of Commerce.

(2) The proceedings shall be in summary form, in accordance with the terms of Decree No. 3 of the 29th May, 1907, and the judge, should he not be in Lisbon, should conclude the case within the 24 hours stipulated in Art. 10 of the same decree.

(3) There shall be neither costs nor stamps in these proceedings.

Art. 36.—The State shall be represented before the Prize Courts by the Public Ministry, and the interested party, should he be an enemy or an assignee of one, by the agent appointed to take charge of the cargo when the case relates to merchandise, or by a lawyer appointed by the judge when the case relates to a ship.

All suitable dead and hollow trees and branchwood within the forest such as are marked by the Forest Officer, though below 4 ft. 6 in. in girth, should, in addition to all matured sound trees marked by him, be utilized for conversion into sleepers and scantlings or scantlings alone, as may be directed. Contractors should understand that only such portions of trees as cannot be converted into sleepers may be sawn into scantlings.

4. Part of logs attacked by fungus or defective parts of logs are not to be sawn into sleepers or scantlings. The sleepers and scantling; should be sawn from sound matured wood, free from shakes, cracks, sapwood, and large or loose knots.

5. Broad gauge sleepers are to be 9 ft. by 10 in. by 5 in. and narrow gauge sleepers 5 ft. by 9 in. by 4½ in., and scantlings may be ordered from 3 in. by 2½ in. upwards.

6. Sleepers and scantlings should be rectangular in form, and sawn perfectly parallel on all sides. On no account will squaring of logs, sleepers, or scantlings with an adze or axe be allowed.

7. Sleepers and scantlings should be covered with sawdust or immersed in water and be invariably placed under shade immediately they are sawn until they can be transported to delivery degots, where they should be stacked and kept under shade in the manner to be pointed out by the Forest Runger.

8. Only such sleepers as are practically certain to be accepted by the Railway authorities will be allowed to be stacked at delivery derô's; payment may be made for not more than 75 per cent. of such stacked sleepers on the responsibility of the Assistant Conservator of Forests, the balance sleepers will be paid for on the Railway authorities accepting them finally. Scantlings will be paid for after selection by an officer of the Forest Department at delivery depôts.

Rejected sleepers or scantlings will not be paid for, and they will lapse to Government, as well as all refuse wood in the sleeper operations. The contractor shall have no claim in respect of any material sold as rejections.

The contractor may be paid a proportionate rate up to December 31, 1916, for sleepers and scantlings sawn but not removed to delivery depôts owing to the difficulty of transport in the north-east monsoon.

Firther information as to quantities and lengths of scantling; to be sawn can be obtained from the Assistant Conservators of the respective divisions.

To fell a sufficient number of palu trees standing in the forest known as Amanamukalana, in Kalagam korale, Kalagam palata, bounded on the north by Ulagalle-Turuvile road, east by footpath from Machenegama to Ittikattiya, south by Talawa-Kekirawa minor road, and west by Turuvile-Andiyagala minor road; to convert the trees felled into 3,000 broad gauge and 1,000 narrow gauge sleepers (more or less) and as many scantlings as possible; to transport the sleepers and scantlings; and to deliver them stacked at the Anuradhapura derôt, near the railway station, the distance of transport being 22 miles, 17 of which are along main road.

Service (d).

To fell a sufficient number of palu trees in Horiwilamukalana, in Matombuwa korale, Hurulu palata, bounded on the north by Maradankadawala-Habarana road, east by Habarana-Matale road, south by Kekirawa-Dambulla road, and west by Kekirawa-Ganewalpola road; to convert the trees felled into 2,000 broad gauge and 600 narrow gauge sleepers (more or less) and as many scantlings as possible; to transport the sleepers and scantlings; and to deliver them stacked at Anuradhapura derôt, near the railway station, the distance of transport being about 35 miles, 30 of which are along main road.

Service (e).

To fell a sufficient number of trees in forest known as Kalaoyamukalana, in Willachchiya korale, Nuwaragam palata, bounded on the north by minor road from Moregawa to Mettikawa, on the east by footpath from Mettikawa to Kala-oya, on the south by Kala-oya, and on the west by Puttalam-Anuradhapura road; to convert the trees felled into 3,000 broad gauge and 1,000 narrow gauge sleepers (more or less) and as many scantlings as possible; to transport the sleepers and scantlings; and to deliver them stacked at Tamuttegama depôt, near the railway line, the distance of transport being 12 miles by minor road.

Service (f).

VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Weekly Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended July 22, 1916.

Births.—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 99 (1 European, 7 Burghers, 47 Sinhalese, 17 Tamils, 17 Moors, 6 Malays, and 4 Others). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on July 1, 1916; viz., 259,451) was 20.0, as against 17.9 in the preceding week, 19.9 in the corresponding week of last year, and 22.7 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 162 (6 Burghers, 93 Sinhalese, 25 Tamils, 28 Moors, 8 Malays, and 2 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 32.6; as against 25.0 in the previous week, 24.5 in the corresponding week of last year, and 25.8 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 162 total deaths, 43 were of infants under one year of age, as against 29 in the preceding week, 28 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 29 the average for last year.

Stillbirths.—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 5.

Principal Causes of Death.—Twenty deaths from Phthieis were registered, as against 18 in the previous week and 15 the weekly average for last year. Of these, 9 were in Maradana (including 3 deaths of non-residents in hospitals), 3 in San Sebastian, 3 in St. Paul's, 3 in Kotahena, and 2 in New Bazaar.

Eight deaths from Enteric Fever were registered, as against 4 in the previous week and 3 the weekly average for last year. Of these, 3 were in Maradana (including a death of a non-resident in hospital), 2 in St. Paul's, 2 in

Slave Island, and 1 in Kotahena.

3. Seven deaths from Pneumonia were registered, as against 13 in the previous week and 11 the weekly average for last year. Of these, 3 were in New Bazaar, 2 in Maradana, 1 in Kotahena, and 1 in Kollupitiya. Four deaths from *Bronchitis* were registered.

4. Five deaths from Plague were registered, as in the previous week, against 2 the weekly average for last year. Of these, 3 were in San Sebnstian and 2 in Pettah. Eleven cases were reported, as against 5 in the previous week.

5. Twenty deaths from Infantile Convulsions were registered, 11 from Enteritis, 8 from Debility, 6 from Diarrhæa, 6 from Worms, 4 from Dysentery, 1 from Tetanus, and 62 from Other Causes.
6. There were reported 27 cases of Measles, as against 36 in the previous week; and 26 of Chickenpox, as against

18 in the previous week.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 79.6°, against 81.0° in the preceding week and 78.6° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29.794 in., against 29.830 in. in the preceding week and 29.822 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 1.55 in., against 2.16 in. in the preceding week and 2.64 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.
