### PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Sir John Anderson, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Knight Commander of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Ceylon, with the Dependencies thereof.

JOHN ANDERSON.

HEREAS the Government Agent of the Province of Uva, by virtue of the powers vested in him by section 11 of "The Irrigation Ordinance, 1906," has drawn up the irrigation rules set forth in the schedule hereto for Bintenna division, in Badulla District, Province of Uva:

Now know Ye that We, the Governor, acting with the advice of the Executive Council, in pursuance of the powers vested in Us by section 20, do by this Our Proclamation give notice of Our approval of the said rules set forth in the schedule hereto.

Given at Nuwara Eliya, in the said Island of Ceylon, this Eleventh day of October, in the year of our Lord One thousand Nine hundred and Sixteen.

### Schedule.

VILLAGE IRRIGATION RULES FOR BINTENNA DIVISION FRAMED UNDER SECTION 11 OF ORDINANCE No. 16 OF 1906.

### Appointment and Duty of Irrigation Headmen.

- 1. Each Arachchi or Duraya shall be ex officio local Irrigation Headman in his wasama.
- 2. Guardians and Ela- and Vel-Vidanes shall be appointed by the Government

3. The Ela- and Vel-Vidanes who shall be proprietors in the tract of fields to which they are appointed shall be elected by a majority of the proprietors, as

required by section 14 of Ordinance No. 16 of 1906.

4. All village irrigation works and cultivation shall be under the supervision of the proper Ela- or Vel-Vidane, and they shall strictly enforce all rules and customs and bring breaches of the same before the Gansabhawa. Any tampering or interference by any other not specially appointed shall be considered as a breach of this rule.

5. The Headmen appointed shall be responsible for all irrigation works and

property in their charge.

- 6. The Ela- or Vel-Vidane shall keep a register of all paddy fields under each ela or tank showing the names of owners, the area of fields owned by each, length of section of ela to be repaired and maintained by each owner, length of fence to be erected for each field, and the yield for each harvest. This register is to be amended yearly, and a copy of it to be sent to the Ratemahatmaya before January 10.
- 7. The Ela- or Vel-Vidane shall inspect at least once a week, and during the rainy mont's three times a week, all the elas, water-courses, amunu, and tanks which are in their divisions to distribute water and inspect the maintenance of the works. In the event of any accident to any of the elas or amunu that are in their charge, or theft of water taking place, or any breach of the rules, they shall at once report the same to the Gansabhawa.

8. The Irrigation Headmen of each division shall reside within the limits of such division, and they shall not absent themselves (during the cultivation season

or at other times) without leave from the Government Agent.

9. The Irrigation Headmen shall regulate the karamaru system, keeping a list of all karamaru fields and entering the names of all proprietors thereof according to their proper turn of cultivation, and all proprietors of such fields shall sign this list, which shall be attested by the Korala and the Irrigation Headman.

### Huwandiram.

10. All lands under cultivation shall be liable to the Vel-Vidane for four kurunies per amunam of sowing extent for yala, and maha as huwandiram. If there is an Ela-Vidane, he shall receive one-fourth of the huwandiram paid to the Vel-Vidane.

11. Persons neglecting or refusing to give the share of huwandiram from their fields shall be liable to prosecution and to a fine equal to double the value of the huwandiram due, half the fine to be credited to the Fine Fund and the other half to be paid in satisfaction of the huwandiram.

# Repairing of Ela, Amunu.

12. When the time of cultivation arrives, the Ela- or Vel-Vidane shall give a week's notice to all the cultivators of the date appointed for commencing the work on the ela and amunu or wewa. On receipt of this notice the cultivators shall be bound to assemble together on the date appointed and work for as many days as may be required to complete the portion of work allotted for each person in a proper manner.

13. All the cultivators shall, in proportion to the extent of land cultivated by each, contribute the quota of labour towards the usual and ordinary repair and clearance of the elas, provided that amunu and pota shall be constructed and

repaired as at present by the joint labour of all the cultivators.

14. The proportion due for any Crown field in the tract shall be performed by the cultivators, if it be uncultivated by the joint labour of all the cultivators or proprietors in the tract.

15. The proportion of such work of construction or repair due and to be

rendered by each shall be assigned by the Ela-Vidane.

16. No person shall be exempted from his share of labour under these rules on

the ground that his land is not being cultivated.

- 17. It shall be the duty of the cultivators to clear and repair the ela in proportion to the extent cultivated by each, and they shall keep their portions of ela hewali and imaniyara always in good repair, free from silt, jungle, and weeds, and shall otherwise repair and keep in good condition the bund of the ela.
- 18. The repair of the ela amunu for the yala cultivation shall be commenced on July 1 and completed on July 14 each year.

19. The repairs of the ela amunu tanks for the maha cultivation shall be commenced on November 15 and completed on November 30 each year.

20. The repairs of the ela amunu for the cultivation of malan fields shall be commenced on December 1 and completed on December 14 each year.

### Ploughing.

21. The ploughing of the fields for yala shall be commenced on June 15 and finished on July 30 each year.

22. The ploughing of fields for maha shall be commenced on December 1 and finished on January 31 each year.

The ploughing of malan fields shall be commenced as soon as the rain sets in. 23. The time allowed to each cultivator for ploughing shall be calculated according to the extent of each man's field, and if a cultivator neglects to plough in

proper time he shall lose his turn of water.

### Sowing.

25. The sowing of fields for yala shall be commenced on August 1 and finished on September 30 in each year.

The sowing of fields for maha shall be done in February each year. 26.

The sowing of malan fields shall be done on or before February 28 each year. Before the commencement of any sowing season, the majority of the cultivators shall decide on the kind or kinds of paddy that shall be sown for that season. If the cultivators neglect to decide as above, the Ratemahatmaya or the Korala shall do so for them.

The Ratemahatmaya may grant an extension in special cases in the maha

season only not exceeding fifteen days.

#### ence and Watch Huts.

The fence round the whole tract shall be measured off in proportion to the extent each person cultivates, and shall be erected within six days after notice has been given, without any regard as to whether the fence adjoins the field or not

31. The fence shall be made sufficiently strong to keep out cattle, and all cultivators shall put up fences before sowing has commenced, and each cultivator shall keep his portion of the tence in proper order throughout the cultivation season until the crop is reaped and gathered.

Each cultivator shall erect a proper watch hut adjoining the fence put up by him before sowing has commenced, and shall watch regularly until the crop is

reaped and gathered whether his own paddy is reaped or not.

### Threshing-floors.

33. Threshing-floors shall be cleared and fenced with strong stakes by the joint labour of those stacking crops there, and each cultivator shall keep up his fence and watch the threshing-floor until his own paddy has been threshed and removed.

34. No paddy shall be removed from the threshing-floor at the termination of

the harvest until the huwandiram share has been paid.

35. Should a field in any tract ripen before the rest, the cultivator of that field shall be allowed by the Vel-Vidane to reap and store the crop, but he shall continue to contribute his usual amount of assistance towards the protection of the tracts until all the crop is reaped and stored; but this rule does not prevent any cultivator from removing the paddy out of the limit of the tract and threshing it.

### Distribution of Water

36. The distribution of water from the ela shall be made by the Vel-Vidane, and no person shall issue, distribute, cut off, divert, or use in any manner the water, except with the consent of the Vel-Vidane, and no cultivator under any pretence whatever shall block up the ela, water passage, or open a sluice or dam.

If any person shall wilfully prevent water flowing to the field below his own the Vel-Vidane shall proceed to the spot with witnesses and open the wakkadas himself.

Where water is carried in elas through paddy fields in transit for the purpose of irrigating fields below, no person shall divert the water from such elas to the fields through which it passes or obstruct or otherwise injure the same.

No person shall take water for any other purpose other than paddy cultiva-

tion without the consent of the Vel-Vidane.

Each cultivator shall be allowed water from the elas for his cultivation in proportion to the extent of the field.

41. In distributing water from the ela the water shall be first taken to the agawatha fields, and thence to the daranda fields, and no one shall in any way

interfere to the prejudice of others with the distribution of water

42. Water shall be obtained for the use of each particular field only through its proper wakkadas and at such time as has been fixed by the Vel-Vidane; no enlargement or alteration whatever in size or number of wakkadas shall be made without the consent of the Vel-Vidane. After a sufficient quantity of water has been obtained for the fields it shall be allowed to run into, and be taken for the use

of, the adjoining fields.

- 43. The Vel-Vidane shall in consultation with the Ela-Vidane determine the proportion of water to be allowed to each tract irrigated by the principal ela. Stones on the same level with each other to regulate the supply shall be placed in the presence of the cultivators at the entrance of each wakkada through which water is turned off to the respective tracts, and the quantity of water thus determined upon shall on no account be increased at the will or pleasure of any individual cultivator; provided, however, that, in case of complaint as to the just and proper division of water, the matter of such complaint shall be determined by the Ratemahatmaya or Korala.
- The distribution of water from any amuna shall be regulated by the Ela- or Vel-Vidane upon requisition from the Irrigation Headman.

45. No wakkadas in any permanent dam shall be cut, but wooden pipes inserted where necessary by the Irrigation Headman. The cost to be borne by the proprietors depending on such outlets in proportion to the extents owned by them.

If owing to the drought or any unexpected accident to a dam the quantity of water available be found insufficient for the season, the Ratemahatmaya (or the Korala) shall make a division to the several tracts or fields by allowing the full volume of water to each tract or field for a given time, and such division shall be final, subject to appeal to the Government Agent.

47. If there be several amunu in a river or a stream, the Korala shall determine

what proportion of water shall be allowed to the lower amunu.

48. If owing to the insufficiency of water in the ela or a spring certain tracts of the series or certain fields of a tract only can be cultivated, the Korala shall inspect with Irrigation Headmen, and shall decide which fields are to be cleared and cultivated. This decision, unless set aside or varied by the Government Agent on appeal, shall be binding on all concerned.

49. Any act done which tends to diminish the water supply of any tract or field, or which deprives any cultivator of due share of water, or which causes wanton waste of water, or generally which benefits one to the detriment of the other,

chall be considered as a breach of rules.

- 50. Cattle or goats found upon the bank of the ela shall be liable to be seized and handed over to the Arachchi to be dealt with by the Gansabhawa, which shall have power to impose a fine on the owner, in addition to the sum awarded for the damage done and cost of maintenance.
- 51. No cattle shall be introduced into any paddy field which has been fenced and laid under cultivation until all the fields are reaped and paddy stacked.
- 52. The usual paths shall be preserved for taking cattle and agricultural implements to and from the paddy fields.

53. No person shall take or drive cattle or goats along the bund of the elas.

54. Any animal trespassing upon a cultivated land shall be seized and delivered to the Village Headman, who, after inspection and assessment of damages, shall require the owner to pay the amount forthwith; if he declines to do so, the Headman shall report the circumstance to the President, who shall hold an inquiry regarding the trespass. The animal shall remain in the charge of the Headman pending final settlement, and shall be liable to sale for the recovery of damages and poundage.

#### Miscellaneous.

- 55. If a proprietor or cultivator shall absent himself at the cultivation season or neglect to cultivate his field, the Vel-Vidane may allow such field to be cultivated by any other cultivator free of rent; such person shall be liable to all obligations under these rules in respect of such fields.
- 56. The cultivation, ploughing, sowing, and turning of water shall be commenced from the agawatha to the daranda fields.

57. Fowls, ducks, geese, and pigs damaging paddy shall be shot and the carcases delivered to the owner.

58. It shall be compulsory on every proprietor to construct an ela of sufficient capacity to lead the water from the main ela through his own lands to that of his neighbours adjoining. The course of such elas shall be determined by the Ratemahatmaya or Korala.

59. The proprietors of paddy lands shall give the Vel-Vidane in writing one month before the commencement of work for each harvest a statement showing the names of the cultivators of their fields and the area they wish to cultivate.

60. No one shall throw any rubbish or other matter into the ela whereby passage

of water may be impeded or polluted.
61. No person shall wash clothes, mats, pots, and pans, or bathe or wash cattle

in the elas so as to pollute the water.

62. No limitary ridge or dam of any field shall be effaced, destroyed, altered, nor wilfully damaged, nor shall any other wanton or malicious injury either to a

field, an ela, amuna, or fence be made.

63. Limitary dams separating the fields of different proprietors shall not be cleared, renewed, or repaired except in the presence of the parties concerned, or except in the presence of the Vel-Vidane after due notice to such parties.

64. No proprietor shall be considered entitled to exemption from any agricultural

work under these rules on the excuse of his lands not being cultivated.

65. No person shall open any drain from high land into the ela or paddy field

so as to damage the ela or field.

- 66. The proprietors of paddy lands shall keep all the paths and roads leading through their fields 4 feet wide in proportion to the extent of field owned by each proprietor. No person shall cut any such path or road with the intention of narrowing, defacing, or damaging it.
- 67. The proprietors shall construct and maintain all roads and paths by which access is obtained to the fields and other irrigation works.

68. After sowing the field for any harvest the usual and ordinary repairs to ela and amuna shall be done by the cultivators.

69. In the event of a serious accident on an ela or any other irrigation work requiring immediate repair, the Arachchi and the Ela- or Vel-Vidane shall immediately report the same to the Ratemahatmaya, and by beat of tom-tom, or otherwise as shall appear most effectual, collect all the proprietors or their managers or lessees either by day or night as may be necessary, and shall forthwith perform the needful work and report to the Ratemahatmaya.

70. Every proprietor of a paddy field shall co-operate with the other proprietors of fields in the same tract in the execution of the various agricultural works above described and which require co-operation, and shall defray a share of the expenses of such work either in money or labour proportionate to the extent of land belonging to him. We present shall interfere with the flow of works in the same of such works.

to him. No person shall interfere with the flow of water in any ela or amuna.

71. The Irrigation Headman shall grant receipts in acknowledgment of the huwandiram.

72. Whenever it occurs that there is not sufficient water in any amuna, the Ratemahatmaya or Korala shall decide how much of the tract shall be cultivated, and the cultivators generally shall cultivate such portion or portions without reference to ownership.

73. After the reaping is over the fence sticks shall, if required for second cultivation, be removed by the cultivators and heaped in a place appointed by the Irrigation Headmen. No one shall remove fence sticks without the consent of the Irrigation Headmen.

74. Before commencement of ploughing the askanatu shall be cleared 6 feet

wide, and shall be well weeded and kept in repair till the paddy is reaped.

75. The bunds of elas shall be kept 4 feet wide, and shall be divided in proportion to the extent of the field under them, and each cultivator shall keep the portion assigned to him always free from jungle, brushwood, overgrowth of every description and from white ants' nests.

76. Six feet of jungle on either side of the ela shall be cleared, and all roots, silt, sand, and stones in the bed shall be removed, and the elas shall be kept in good

repair always.

- The cultivators of fields shall clear and repair the imaniyara and hewali adjoining their respective fields, and no person shall in any way after or injure any imanivara or hewali.
- 78. All trees growing on the borders of the elas which impede the free flow of water shall be cut down and such obstruction removed, and no person shall prevent the removal of such trees.
- 79. Owners of cattle and proprietors of paddy fields shall clear and maintain all paths and roads (pitaparawal) outside the paddy fields which have been constructed or hereafter may be constructed to drive in and out cattle.

The amunu shall be constructed properly and sufficiently strong as ordered

by the Ratemahatmaya.

- Trees or jungle likely to occasion damage by giving cover to wild animals or otherwise shall be removed by the cultivators or proprietors of the land whenever they may be growing when ordered by the Irrigation Headmen.
- 82. It shall be the duty of the Irrigation Headmen and Village Headmen strictly to enforce these rules, and any neglect on their part shall render them liable to fine.
- 83. No person shall furtively lead water into his field by cutting or piercing the dam or take water given for another field or fields before his turn comes.
- 84. No new amuna or ela shall be made for the cultivation or irrigation of new lands or for other purposes which may in any way affect the taking of water to the existing fields without the permission of the Government Agent.
- No jungle or trees growing near and protecting an ela or spring shall under any circumstance be cleared or felled, and no one shall plant any kind of trees on the bank of any ela or an amuna.
- The tenants of fields belonging to dewales and vihares shall act according to these rules.
- 87. Where roads and paths are crossed by water-courses, proper pipes or kumbahas must be provided by the parties requiring water.
  - No road shall be fenced across without the leave of the Government Agent. All breaches of rules shall without delay be reported by the Irrigation and
- the Village Headmen to the Ratemahatmaya, who shall take necessary steps in their matter.
- 90. Any person, including Irrigation and Village Headmen, infringing these rules shall be liable to a fine under section 22 of Ordinance No. 16 of 1906.
- The Ela- or Vel-Vidane with the help of the Irrigation Officer shall divide the ela or tank bund among the cultivators. The cultivators will place stout numbered pickets at the commencement of the portion of ela or tank bund allotted to them. Particulars in respect of such allotments are to be noted in the ela or tank register to be kept by the Ela- or Vel-Vidane.

Irrigation Officers in charge of village works shall keep a book in which they must enter quantities of work done by field owners on the various elas or tanks in their charge

93. The Irrigation Officers will fix dates and time allowed for doing the work, and serve written notices on printed forms (copy of form annexed) on the Ela- or Vel-Vidane two weeks previous to the required time calling out the labour, and the Ela- or Vel-Vidane shall communicate the contents of the notice to the parties concerned; on receipt of this notice the cultivators shall be bound to assemble and complete the portion of work allotted to them in the given time. Those persons who failed to attend on the first date to the proportion of work allotted to them should be noticed a second time; should they default, a list of such defaulters should be prepared in presence of Ela- or Vel-Vidane, and their signatures obtained as The Irrigation Officer with the assistance of Ela-Vidane or Vel-Vidane shall then have the default work carried out by hired labour. The Irrigation Officer will then write out the plaint forms and send them to the Gansabhawa President for the prosecution of defaulters.

The fields under village tanks shall be treated as "malan" fields.

No tank water shall be allowed for ploughing, &c., but only for irrigating paddy plants. All other works should be done with rain water. In exceptional cases the Ratemahatmaya may allow tank water for ploughing, &c.

96. All rules enacted previous to this are hereby cancelled, provided that such cancellation shall not affect-

(a) The past operation of such rules.

(b) Any right, obligation of liability acquired, accrued, or incurred thereunder. (c) Any punishment or penalty incurred in respect of any breach of the said rules.

(d) Any investigation or legal proceeding or remedy in respect of such right, obligation, liability, penalty, or punishment, and every such investigation, legal proceeding, and remedy may be carried on as if the above rules had not been published.

WHEREAS in pursuance of the said "The Necessaries of War Exportation Ordinance, No. 19 of 1914," We did by Our Proclamation dated the 3rd day of July, 1916, published in the Government Gazette No. 6,804 of the 4th day of July, 1916, prohibit the exportation from Ceylon of certain articles to the extent therein specified:

Delete—

(A) Bags and sacks made of jute; and

(A) Jute wrappers (Surrat tares).

Insert-

(A) Bags, wrappers, or sacks made of jute, other than any such bags, wrappers, or sacks as constitute the coverings of goods to be shipped for exportation, and are allowed by the Principal Collector of Customs to be shipped as such coverings.

#### SCHEDULE.

At the Council Chamber, Whitehall, the 8th day of September, 1916.

By the Lords of His Hajesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was pleased, in exercise of the power in that behalf conferred on Him by section 1, subsection 1, of the Trading with the Enemy (Extension of Powers) Act, 1915, by a Proclamation dated the 29th day of February, 1916, to prohibit all persons or bodies of persons, incorporated or unincorporated, resident, carrying on business, or being in the United Kingdom, from trading with any of the persons or bodies of persons mentioned in the list contained in the said Proclamation:

And whereas by section 1, sub-section 2, of the said Act, it is provided that any list of persons and bodies of persons, incorporated or unincorporated, with whom such trading is prohibited by a Proclamation under the said Act may be varied or added to by an Order made by the Lords of the Council on the recommendation of a Secretary of State, such list as so varied or added to being in the said Proclamation referred to as the "Statutory List":

And whereas the list contained in the said Proclamation has been varied and added to by subsequent Orders of Council:

And whereas His Majesty was pleased by a Proclamation dated the 26th day of April, 1916, and entitled "The Trading with the Enemy (Statutory List) Proclamation, 1916, No. 2," to amend the said Proclamation dated the 29th day of February, 1916, in certain particulars:

\* Note (1).—Under the Trading with the Enemy Proclamations of 25th June and 10th November, 1915, all Proclamations relating to Trading with the Enemy apply to all persons or bodies of persons of enemy nationality, resident or carrying on business in Liberia, Persia, Morocco, or Portuguese East Africa, and consequently it is an offence to trade with any person or body of persons of enemy nationality, resident or carrying on business in Liberia, Persia, Morocco, or Portuguese East Africa, even though such person or body of persons is not included by name in the above list, and the omission of the name of any such person or body of persons from such list is not an authority or license to trade with such person or body of persons.

NOTE (2).—Where a firm named in the list has more than one branch in the same country, all branches in that country are held to be included in the list, even in cases where no address, or of several addresses one only, is specifically

mentioned.

NOTE (3).—The list for each country is sent by telegraph to His Majesty's Representative in that country, who will notify British Consular Officers, to whom persons abroad should apply for information as to names on the list; but firms in the United Kingdom with branches abroad are advised to furnish such branches with copies of the Statutory List. The lists for all countries in Central and South America are also telegraphed to His Majesty's Ambassador at Washington.

The Foreign Trade Department is prepared on application to inquire of His Majesty's Representatives abroad for the names of substitutes for any firm on the Statutory List. When the applicant wishes this done by telegraph, he must undertake to pay the cost of the telegraphic correspondence. A considerable amount of information is, however, already available at the Foreign Trade Department, and it is hoped that it may be possible in many cases to suggest the names of satisfactory substitutes in response to inquiries, without the necessity of referring the matter abroad. It would greatly facilitate the work of this Department if applicants in making inquiries would specify the particular trade or trades for which substitutes are required.

# The Military Cross.

### REVISED ROYAL WARRANT.

War Office, August 26, 1916.

GEORGE THE FIFTH by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, King, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India.

To all to whom these Presents shall come, Greeting.

WHEREAS We did by Royal Warrant under Our Sign Manual dated 28th December, 1914, institute and create a new Decoration entitled "The Military Cross" to be awarded to Officers of certain ranks in Our Army in recognition of distinguished and meritorious services in time of war:

And whereas We are desirous that certain alterations should be made in the regulations governing the said Decoration, We do hereby ordain that the provisions of Our said Royal Warrant shall be cancelled, and that the

following regulations shall be substituted in lieu thereof:-

Firstly: It is ordained that the Cross shall be designated "The Military Cross."

Secondly: It is ordained that the Military Cross shall consist of a Cross of Silver having on each arm the

Imperial Crown, and bearing in the centre the Royal and Imperial Cipher.

Thirdly: It is ordained that no person shall be eligible for this Decoration nor be nominated thereto unless he be a Captain, a Commissioned Officer of a lower grade, or a Warrant Officer Class I. or Class II. in Our Army, or Our Indian or Colonial Military Forces, and that the Military Cross shall be awarded only to Officers of the above ranks on a recommendation to Us by Our Principal Secretary of State for War.

Fourthly: It is ordained that Foreign Officers of an equivalent rank to those above mentioned, who have been associated in Military operations with Our Army, or Our Indian or Colonial Military Forces, shall be eligible

for the award of the Military Cross.

Fifthly: It is ordained that any one who, after having performed services for which the Military Cross is awarded, subsequently performs an approved act of gallantry which, if he had not received the Cross, would have entitled him to it, shall be awarded a bar to be attached to the riband by which the Cross is suspended, and for every additional such act an additional bar may be added.

Sixthly: It is ordained that the names of those upon whom We may be pleased to confer this Decoration shall be published in the *London Gazette*, and that a Register thereof shall be kept in the Office of Our Principal

Secretary of State for War.

Seventhly: It is ordained that the Military Cross shall be worn immediately after all Orders and before all Decorations and Medals (the Victoria Cross alone excepted), and shall be worn on the left breast pendant from a riband of one inch and three-eighths in width, which shall be in colour white with a purple stripe.

Eighthly: It is ordained that the Military Cross shall not confer any individual precedence, but shall entitle

the recipient to the addition after his name of the letters M. C.

Ninthly: It is ordained that any person whom by an especial Warrant under Our Royal Sign Manual We declare to have forfeited the Military Cross shall return the said Decoration to the Office of Our Principal Secretary of State for War, and that his name shall be erased from the Register of those upon whom the said Decoration shall have been conferred.

Lastly: We reserve to Ourself, 'Our heirs and successors full power of annulling, altering, abrogating, augmenting, interpreting, or dispensing with these Regulations, or any part thereof, by a Notification under Our Royal Sign Manual.

And whereas the recovery from the persons resident and owning property within the said area was ordered of the sum of Rs. 223,082 50, being the amount of all riot damage committed in the said area on or after June 1, 1915 (reduced by a remission made by way of special terms granted by His Excellency the Governor to the administrative divisions of the said area), and of the costs of suppressing within such area the riots or disturbances within such area by which such damage was occasioned, which costs were thereby declared to be 8 per cent. of the amount of the said damage, reduced as aforesaid:

CHARGES AND RULES.

(a) Actual out of pocket expenses on labour, fuel, stores, special shores, and other temporary fittings required for the sole use of the naval vessel being docked will be charged from 24 hours previous to the time when the caisson is placed in position after the vessel has entered the Dock until 12 hours after she has cleared the Dry Dock entrance on leaving (except in the case of a battleship, when the additional time necessary for putting the side docking keel blocks in position and removing same will be charged), the added hours before and after the entrance and departure of the vessel from the Dock being for preparation and restoration of Dock equipment and machinery.

(b) One three-hundred-and-sixty-fifth part (1/365) of the value of all ropes and gear (as defined in the list attached) purchased for use at the Dock in the preceding year to be charged for each day of 24 hours or part thereof in the period of docking

above named during the current year.

(c) Rupees Forty-five (Rs. 45) to be charged for fair wear and tear of machinery for

each day or portion of a day in the period of docking above named.

(d) Vessels moored alongside the Graving Dock guide pier to be charged at the rate of 13 cents per ton for every day of 24 hours or part of 24 hours, the charge to cover the usual privileges hitherto accorded to men-of-war (use of bathrooms, privies, &c.) which may be available, but not to be reduced in case these facilities should be removed owing to the construction of new works or improvements. The charge is to be limited to a minimum of Rs. 15 and a maximum of Rs. 50 for every day of 24 hours or part of 24 hours.

# TIME OF OCCUPATION.

The period of a vessel's occupation shall count from the time the caisson was placed in position after her entering till she has cleared the Dry Dock entrance when leaving. It is to be clearly understood, with reference to the times stated, that within those limits no work, such as pumping, is done and charged to the Admiralty which is clearly in connection with the docking or undocking of some other vessel.

### POVERNMENT WILL NOT UNDERTAKE WORK

3. The Dock Superintendent will not undertake the work of cleaning, painting, or repairing vessels. The Naval Authorities may employ any licensed contractor, or carry out the work with their own artificers if they think fit. Only contractors holding a license from the Government are permitted to undertake work in the Dock.

### PRIORITY TO HIS MAJESTY'S SHIPS.

Vessels of His Mejesty's Navy shall have priority over all other vessels to enter the Dock and make use of the appliances attached thereto, other vessels having been already regulated notwithstanding.

### APPLICATION FOR USE OF THE DOCK.

Applications for the use of the Dock should be made as long as possible before the date of docking, to the Dock Superintendent, on forms which may be obtained at his office for the purpose (Form A). The requirement of a deposit of Rs. 500 (referred to in Form A) does not, however, apply to vessels of His Majesty's Navy.

### REQUIREMENTS BEFORE DOCKING

- 6. Prior to the time regulated for the admission of any vessel into the Dock, the following arrangements must be carried out on board the vessel and order taken with reference thereto, viz. :
  - (a) Suitable hawsers and heaving lines must be in readiness on each side fore and aft, and a gantline rove for masthead pendents.
  - (b) The vessel must be upright and as nearly as possible on an even keel, and the bilges must be perfectly dry fore and aft, and kept so. All side and stern ports should be shut.
  - (c) The ballast tanks must either be pressed full with their dcors properly secured, or pumped quite dry with their doors off ready for inspection.
  - if so required by the Dock Superintendent.

    (d) All the vessel's water-closets and latrines must be thoroughly cleaned and securely fastened up before the vessel enters the Dock, and no use whatever shell be made of them while the vessel is in the Dock.
  - If so required by the Dock Superintendent, the awnings shall be furled.

    If so required under the provisions of the Plague Regulations, the vessel shall be fumigated before being docked.

#### DOCKING PLAN.

7. The Commander of a warship, on making application for the use of the Dock, should forward a docking plan to the Dock Superintendent showing the style and construction of the ship's bottom, and the manner in which it is desired she should be shored

#### VESSELS SAFELY DOCKED.

8. When any vessel shall be declared by the Docking Master to have been properly and safely placed upon the blocks, the Commander or his representative shall forthwith satisfy himself thereof, and if he shall have made no objection thereto at the time in writing to the Docking Master, the vessel shall be considered to have been properly and safely docked.

#### VESSEL'S CREW TO GIVE ASSISTANCE.

- 9. It is understood that the vessel's crew shall render every assistance when docking and undocking.
  - Shores and Blocks to be supplied.

    10. Shores and blocks shall be supplied as required.

#### SHIFTING OF WEIGHTS.

11. No weights, such as guns, ballast, or coal, shall be shifted or taken on board a vessel during the time she is in Dock, and no claim for any damage which may be done owing to the breach of this rule shall lie against the Dock Authorities or the Government.

#### No Work during Docking.

- 12. No outboard work shall be done on a vessel while entering or leaving the Dock.
  - No Rubbish to be thrown into the Dock.
- 13. Rubbish shall not be thrown into the Dock, or deposited on the quays, in the sheds, or in any other part of the Dock enclosure, but shall be removed to such places as are set apart for its reception.
- DOCKING.

  14. It shall be the duty of the Master Attendant to bring vessels up to the Dock into such a position that the docking lines for heaving the vessels into the Dock are fast on board, and when vessels are leaving the Dock to take charge of them as soon as the vessels clear the entrance to the Dock. All further operations connected with the docking and undocking of vessels shall be carried out under the direction of the Docking Master.

### WORKING DAYS.

15. Work may be carried on on a warship in the Dock on every day of the year. Sunday, Christmas Day, and Good Friday are dies non as far as the Dock employés are concerned. If work is done in connection with the docking, undocking, or repair of any warship necessitating the presence of the Dock Staff upon any dies non, the extra allowances so incurred, as well as the time worked, will be included in the docking expenses.

### WORKING HOURS.

16. The working hours for the Covernment Staff at the Dock are from 6.30 to 11 A.M. and from 12 to 4.30 P.M. Any overtime worked by the Dock Staff in connection with a vessel in Dock will be charged against the ship.

### ANCHORS TO BE INBOARD.

- 17. No warship shall come into the Dock with any of her anchors hanging over her bows.
- NO PERSON TO INTERFERE WITH THE SUPERINTENDENT OR HIS SUBORDINATES.
- 18. No person other than those duly authorized by and acting under the orders of the Dock Superintendent shall interfere with the moving of the caisson, or with the opening or shutting of the sluices, capstans, iron gratings, or working of the pumping engines of the Dock.

### NOTICE OF UNDOCKING.

19. The Commanding Officer of a vessel in Dock shall give the Dock Superintendent at least 24 hours' notice in writing, stating the time at which it is desired the vessel shall be undocked.

### HEATING COMBUSTIBLE MATTER.

20. No person shall boil or heat pitch, tar, resin, turpentine, oil, or other combustible matter in the Dock premises, except in places provided for the purpose, for which the special sanction of the Dock Superintendent has been obtained.

### PROPERTY

21. All property whatever within the Graving Dock, and all premises situated within the same curtilage, shall be at the sole risk of the owners thereof.

# DOCK TELEPHONE.

22. The Dock telephone is installed for the use of the Dock officials, and messages may only be sent to or from a vessel using the Dock when the telephone is not required departmentally. In no case is the charge of this instrument to be taken over by a ship's signalman.

SIR,-WITH reference to Mr. Chamberlain's circular despatch of April 28, 1902, I have the honour to inform you that it has been decided to withdraw the British Postal Agencies in China—with the exception of that at Weihaiwei—from the Imperial Penny Postage Scheme, and that October 1, 1916, has been fixed as the date from which international rates of postage will be charged on letters from the United Kingdom for those agencies and on letters from the agencies for the United Kingdom and the British Oversea Dominions, Colonies, and Protectorates, except Hong Kong and Weihaiwei.

"THE LOCAL BOARDS ORDINANCE, 1898."

THE following rules relating to the grant of retiring pensions and gratuities to officers of the Local Board, Trincomalee, prescribed by His Excellency the Governor in Executive Council, under the provisions of section 87 of Ordinance No. 13 of 1898, are published for general information.

### Rules referred to.

- 1. No pension will be granted to any officer of the Local Board, Trincomalee, without the authority of the Governor, in order to obtain which a certificate of service, age, good conduct, and of the ground of retirement must be submitted to the Colonial Secretary.
- 2. Subject to the provisions of rule 1, all officers of the Local Board of Trinco-malee on the fixed establishment drawing a salary of Rs. 250 per annum and upwards shall be entitled to pension as follows:—

An officer who shall have served ten years and upwards and under eleven years shall receive an annual allowance of ten-sixtieths of his annual salary, eleven years and under twelve years an annual allowance of eleven-sixtieths of such salary, and in like manner a further addition to the annual allowance of one-sixtieth in respect of each additional year of such service until the completion of a period of service of thirty-five years, when an annual allowance of thirty-five-sixtieths may be granted, and no addition shall be made in respect of any service beyond thirty-five years.

- 3. No officer of the Local Board will be held to have an absolute right to compensation to past services, or to any pension under these rules; and the Local Board will retain power and authority to dismiss any such officer without compensation.
- 4. No pension shall be granted to any officer of the Local Board who shall be under fifty-five years of age, unless upon a certificate from the Chairman of the Local Board and from two medical practitioners that he is incapable from infirmity of mind or body to discharge the duties of his situation, nor unless he shall have discharged these duties with diligence and fidelity to the satisfaction of the Chairman.
- 5. It shall be competent for the Local Board, with the authority of the Governor, in cases of peculiar and extraordinary merit in respect of duties outside of those for which the officer has received a salary, to grant special and higher rates of pension than those laid down in these rules.
- 6. The above-mentioned rates are only to be granted in case of decidedly faithful and meritorious service, but when the testimony as to fidelity, diligence, and merit is in any respect defective, a deduction will be made from the apportioned rate. Where there has been obvious negligence, irregularity, or misconduct, the grant of an allowance will be altogether withheld.
- 7. The claim of an officer of the Local Board to pension will be considered to have commenced from the date of his first permanent appointment to the fixed establishment of the Local Board.
- 8. Every officer on the provisional and temporary establishment drawing a salary of over Rs. 250 per annum will, in the event of transfer to the fixed establishment, be entitled to reckon his provisional and temporary services when it has been continuous with his subsequent permanent service.
- 9. The services in respect of which superannuated allowances are granted should in all cases be continuous, unless interrupted by abolition of office or other temporary suspension of employment not arising from misconduct or voluntary resignation of the office.
- 10. The pension will be computed upon the salary of the permanent office held by an officer of the Local Board at the time of his retirement, provided he shall have held such appointment for at least three years, otherwise the pension shall be calculated upon the average of salaries attached to the permanent office held by such person during the three years next preceding the commencement of such pension.
- 11. In the case of suspension or reduction or abolition of office, temporary allowances may be assigned according to the specified rates, on condition, however, that the persons receiving the same shall be liable to be recalled into service, and with the understanding that they are to be re-employed, as opportunity may offer, in preference to new applicants for office.
- 12. In the case of officers to whom temporary allowances may be assigned in accordance with rule 11 on the abolition or re-organization of their offices, and who may be afterwards re-employed, one-half of the period during which they have been in receipt of such allowance will be allowed to count towards pension on their final retirement.
- 13. In the case of the abolition of an office, a period of ten years shall be added to the actual service in computing the allowance of persons who have served twenty years and upwards, of seven years where the service is over fifteen and under twenty years, and of five years where the service is over ten and under fifteen years. To persons who shall have served under ten years and not less than five years, the gratuity shall be granted calculated at the rate of one month's pay for each year's service, with an additional allowance of three months' pay. To persons who shall have served less than five years, a gratuity shall be awarded calculated at the rate of one month's pay for each year's service, with one month's pay added. The number of years to be added to actual service on abolition of office should not be

more than that which, if added to the age of the retiring officer, would make that age up to sixty, except that one year may be added in the case of an officer of the actual age of sixty or more, unless the officer was quite disqualified for further service.

- 14. In the case of persons retired through abolition of office who, if they had served the extra time granted by rule 13 for compensation, would at the expiry of that time be over fifty-five, the provisions of rule 13 shall not be binding on the Local Board, but each particular case will be decided after a full consideration of all the circumstances attending it.
- 15. Should the term of office not warrant the assignment of an annual allowance, a gratuity may be granted at the rate of one month's salary for each year of service. For a fractional part of a year's service exceeding six months half a month's salary will be added to the gratuity.
- 16. If any person being in receipt of any pension or superannuation allowance from the Local Board shall be convicted of an offence in any court of justice in the Island for which he shall be sentenced to death, or to any term of imprisonment with hard labour exceeding six months, such pension or superannuation allowance shall forthwith determine and cease to be payable, unless such person shall, within three months after his conviction, receive free pardon, or unless the Local Board shall otherwise order.
- 17. Every person hereafter appointed to any office under the Local Board to which a pension is attached on retirement may be required to retire from the service of the Local Board on or after attaining the age of fifty-five upon the receipt of twelve months' notice to that effect, but they may continue in office till sixty years of age with the consent of the Board.
- 18. As a contribution to the pension fund a deduction of 4 per cent. shall be made from the salary of each officer entitled to pension.
- 19. All sums so deducted shall be deposited monthly in the Government Savings Bank pending permanent igneration or other disposal by the Board.
- 20. Officers receiving promotion or taking up a new appointment shall receive a salary less by 20 per cent. than the maximum salary payable to their predecessors. The initial salary shall be raised annually by 2 per cent. of the maximum salary until the maximum salary shall be attained.
- 21. Should an officer be transferred to a post under Government, or under another Local Board, or any other public authority, with the approval of the Board, he shall retain his claim to ultimate pension for service rendered to the Board, provided he retires from the latter service under circumstances which would entitle him to pension in terms of this Minute.
- 22. Should an officer who retires on pension find after such retirement an employment under Government, or under another semi-official body, on a salary equal to or higher than what he drew from the Board at the time of his retirement, his pension shall be suspended so long as such employment continues. If he draws a less salary, he shall be entitled to only so much of his pension as, when added to the salary of the new appointment, will make his total emolument equal to the salary last drawn by him previous to his retirement.
- 23. When an officer seeking pension under this Minute is found to be already in receipt of a pension from another public body or from Government, his maximum pension under this Minute shall be such as when added to such other pension shall not exceed thirty-five-sixtieths of the highest salary drawn by the officer at any time during the course of his service, be it under Government or under a semi-official body.
- 24. Local Board employes drawing a salary of less than Rs. 250 per annum and retiring on account of age or infirmity after serving continuously for a period of twenty-five years and upwards may, if the Board be satisfied that they are unfit, owing to age or infirmity of body or mind, to discharge efficiently the duties of their offices, be granted such long service allowances not exceeding Rs. 5 per mensem in each case as the Board may award. Persons in receipt of a daily pay, who have completed a period of twenty-five years of continuous service, retiring under similar circumstances may be awarded gratuities calculated at the rate of one month's pay for every three years of service.
- 25. Subject to the approval of His Excellency the Governor, the Board may allow a gratuity to the widow or orphans of an officer in the event of his death, provided that he has not received from the Board any gratuity.
- 26. The above rules shall not apply to officers who, at the time of passing of these rules, have been continuously in the service of the Local Board of Trincomalee for a period exceeding fifteen years. The cases of such officers shall be specially considered, and they may be allowed such pension or gratuity as the Local Board may determine and His Excellency the Governor may approve of.

THE following copy of a notice issued by the Military Administration, Basra, is published for information:

Notice is hereby given that, owing to Military exigencies, no mercantile steamship whatever will be permitted to enter the port of Basra or to load or unload there which, before clearing from the last British port, has not obtained from the Military Administration, Basra, a special permit to enter the port. Such permit will be good for one voyage only. Application for permit should be made to the Military Administration on special forms obtained from the Chief Political Office by the agent of the steamer for which a permit is desired. The grant of a permit will be

telegraphed by the agents to the Captain of the steamer, and will be notified to the Examination Officer at Fao. The above regulations will come into force at once, but will not be enforced in the case of ship due to leave Indian ports before October 15 or European ports before November 1. Military storeships and privately owned ships, the whole of whose cargo consists of Military stores, are exempted from these regulations.

- (2) That Messrs. Hector McDonald Morison and Percy G. D. Bell, carrying on business under the title of "Morison & Bell," are hereby appointed liquidators for the purpose of winding up the business of the said firm.

## VITAL STATISTICS

Registrar-General's Weekly Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended October 14, 1916.

Births.—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 96 (8 Burghers, 44 Sinhalese, 19 Tamils, 18 Moors, 6 Malays, and 1 Other). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on July 1, 1916, viz., 259,451) was 19·3, as against 22·4 in the preceding week, 17·4 in the corresponding week of last year, and 22·7 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 127 (2 Europeans, 12 Burghers, 57 Sinhalese, 21 Tamils, 29 Moors, 3 Malays; and 3 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 25.6, as against 28.6 in the previous week, 25.3 in the corresponding week of last year, and 25.8 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 127 total deaths, 24 were of infants under one year of age, same as in the preceding week, against 26 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 29 the average for last year.

Stillbirths.—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 12.

Principal Causes of Death.—Eleven deaths from Phthisis were registered, as against 18 in the previous week and 15 the weekly average for last year. Of these, 4 were in Maradana (including 2 deaths of non-residents in hospitals), 3 in Kotahena, 1 in San Sebastian, 1 in New Bazaar, 1 in Slave Island, and 1 in Kollupitiya.

- 2. Eleven deaths from *Pneumonia* were registered, as against 13 in the previous week and 11 the weekly average for last year. Of these, 4 were in Kotahena, 4 in Maradana (including 1 death of a non-resident in hospital), 1 in Pettah, 1 in Slave Island, and 1 in Kollupitiya. One death from *Bronchitis* was registered.
- 3. Six deaths from *Enteric Fever* were registered, as against 3 in the previous week and 3 the weekly average for last year. Of these, 2 were in San Sebastian, 2 in Kotahena, and 2 in Maradana (both non-residents in hospitals).
- 4. Six deaths from *Plague* were registered, as against 10 in the previous week and 2 the weekly average for last year. Of these, 2 were in San Sebastian, 2 in St. Paul's, 1 in Maradana, and 1 in Slave Island. Seven cases were reported, as against 9 in the previous week.
- 5. One death from *Measles* was registered (in Kotahena), as against 3 in the previous week. Thirty-two cases were reported, as against 37 in the previous week.
- 6. Ten deaths from Infantile Convulsions were registered, 7 from Worms, 6 from Debility, 4 from Enteritis, 3 from Diarrhæa, 2 from Dysentery, 2 from Tetanus, and 57 from Other Causes.
  - 7. There was reported 1 case of Chickenpox, as against 2 in the previous week.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 80.8°, against 80.2° in the preceding week and 80.0° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29.891 in., against 29.854 in. in the preceding week and 29.829 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 0.54 in., against 0.35 in. in the preceding week and 0.40 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.
