"THE QUARANTINE AND PREVENTION OF DISEASES ORDINANCE, 1897."

THE following regulations defining the conditions under which grain may be stored within the Municipal limits of the town of Colombo have been made by His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, under the provisions of section 4 of the above-named Ordinance, and are published under section 13 of the said Ordinance for general information.

REGULATIONS REFERRED TO

Regulations relating to all kinds of Grain, including Rice.

- 1. No grain in quantities exceeding 25 bags, or 50 bushels, at a time shall be stored in any place which has not been approved by the Chairman, Municipal Council, the Medical Officer of Health, or the Assistant Medical Officer of Health, and any grain stored in any place not so approved shall be forthwith removed to such place as the Chairman, Municipal Council, the Medical Officer of Health, or the Assistant Medical Officer of Health may sanction.
 - 2. No grain store shall be used as a human habitation.
- 3. Should any diseased rat be found in a grain store, it shall be lawful for the Chairman, Municipal Council, the Medical Officer of Health, or the Assistant Medical Officer of Health to order that all the grain therein be removed and disinfected, either by exposure to the direct rays of the sun or otherwise, and to cause the store to be treated with a pulicide. The expenses incurred in carrying out these precautions shall be borne by the occupier of the said store.
- 4. It shall be lawful for the Chairman, Municipal Council, the Medical Officer of Health, or the Assistant Medical Officer of Health at any time to inspect any grain store, and to order any store which appears to him not to be ratproof or to be in an insanitary condition to be closed, and, if he deems it necessary, to order all grain to be removed therefrom, and to give directions as to the proper disinfection, cleansing, or repair of the store at the expense of the occupier.

Regulations relating to Rice only.

- 1. The following specific regulations shall apply to rice stores only, and not to places in which rice in quantities not exceeding 25 bags, or 50 bushels, at a time is stored by boutique keepers or small retail dealers. Provided that in any special case the proper authority may allow any person to store rice in quantities not exceeding 50 bags, or 100 bushels, in a place to which these special regulations shall not apply.
- 2. No building intended for use as a rice store shall be commenced until the plans and specifications have been submitted to and approved by the proper authority. Notice of the commencement of the building shall be given to the proper authority, who will be at liberty at all times to inspect the work, either personally or by a representative, and to give any directions which are in his opinion necessary for the proper carrying out of the work according to the plans and specifications and the rules hereinafter following.
- 3. Any building used or intended to be used for the storage of rice, whether already constructed or to be constructed, shall comply with the following conditions:—
- (1) Site.—The site shall be well above flood level, and be cleared of all vegetation and trees and levelled off. All previously existing drains and channels shall be removed.

A building used or intended to be used as a rice store shall be entirely separated from other buildings by a clear space 15 ft. wide. The portion of this space adjacent to the store shall be paved for a width of 8 ft. with cement concrete not less than 4 in. thick, or with other impervious paving, laid to falls and to drain into open surface water drains.

- (2) Type of Building.—(a) In the case of buildings of one storey, the height of the walls at the eaves shall not exceed 16 ft. above floor level. Rice shall not be stacked to a greater height than the level of the top of walls of the store.
- (b) In the case of buildings of more than one storey, the walls and upper floors shall be constructed of sufficient strength to carry a superimposed load of 7 cwt. per square foot. No trapdoors or staircase openings shall be constructed in the upper floors of the building. Access to the upper floors shall be provided solely by staircases outside the building. Rice shall not be stacked in the upper storey to a greater height than the level of the walls.
- (3) Foundations shall be of cement concrete built into solid ground with footings suitable for the support of the building.
- (4) Walls shall be of reinforced concrete, or brickwork or stone masonry of suitable thickness. A damp proof course of cement mortar half an inch thick shall be laid to all walls at floor level. Cabook walls and half brick walling will not be allowed.

All external walls shall be rendered externally in cement mortar from drain to floor level without horizontal or vertical joints. The 4 in. cement concrete paving surrounding the building shall be bonded into the wall foundations.

No recess, ledge, or projection shall be left on any wall within the building.

- (5) (a) Ground Floors.—The ground floor of the building shall be laid on a bottoming of rubble or other hard material, and shall be of cement concrete at least 6 in. thick worked smooth and level; its upper surface shall be 12 in, above ground level, and 2 ft. above highest recorded flood level.
- (b) Upper Floors.—Upper floors shall be of reinforced concrete, or concrete laid on suitable steel decking supported on steel, or reinforced concrete beams and intermediate supports of similar or other suitable material. The floors shall be capable of carrying a superimposed load of not less than 7 cwt. per foot super.
- (c) Staircases.—Staircases shall be of reinforced concrete, steel, or timber fixed to a reinforced concrete or steel-framed landing projecting outside the building, and the level of the landing shall be not less than 4 in. below the floor level. The entrance doors of the upper storey shall be of sliding pattern hung outside, and "ratproofed" in accordance with the specification of the ground floor doors and doorways.

Any roofing over stairways and landings shall be constructed so as not to prevent doors sliding.

- (6) Roofing shall be of simple design, free from hips and valleys, and shall be of timber or iron framing covered with Calicut tiles or other approved waterproof material with the eaves projecting at least 2 ft. Half-round tiles must not be used. No continuous space shall be left between the underside of the roofing and the top of the wall through which rats might penetrate? Spaces, however, may be left for ventilation, but they must be protected as detailed in paragraph (10).
- (7) Guttering.—No caves, gutters, or down pipes will be allowed externally, nor will any drains, outlets, or pipes be allowed internally.
- (8) Doors.—The doors of the store shall be of sheet iron or wood not less than 2 in. thick, armoured at the edges with metal in such a manner as to be ratproof.

Sliding doors are to be preferred to hinged doors.

Sliding doors shall be hung from the top edge supported on grooved wheels on a metal runner. When the door is closed there shall be no space between the face of the door and the wall.

The lower edge of the door shall be recessed into an iron grooved channel or rail embedded in the sill.

Swing doors shall be so hinged as to open outwards and to swing back flush with the face of the wall. A step to the floor of the rice store shall form the sill to which the closed door must fit closely, and the sides and top shall be made ratproof by a protecting flange of at least 2 in. fitting tight and flush with the face for the wall.

- (9) Lighting.—The buildings shall be amply lighted either by fixed glass windows, the frames of which shall be protected with wire netting and built flush with the outside face of walls, or by glass tiles fixed in the roof. The inside of the window frames shall be sloped down so as to prevent a ledge being formed.
- (10) Ventilation shall be provided by gratings at floor level under wall plates and at gable ends. The ventilators shall be made ratproof by zinc sheeting having perforations not exceeding $\frac{1}{4}$ in. diameter.

SIR,—You are aware that His Majesty's Government have under consideration the commercial and industrial policy to be adopted after the war, and the measures to be taken to avoid any recurrence of the dangers to which the Empire has been exposed by the growth of German trade and influence within it.

2. The measures to be taken during the period of reconstruction and afterwards have recently been discussed by the Allied Governments, and I invite your attention to the "Recommendations of the Economic Conference of the Allies," of which you have already received a copy. A further copy is enclosed herewith for convenience of reference

3. A Committee has been appointed to consider the commercial and industrial policy of the United Kingdom after the war, with special reference to the conclusions of the Conference. I enclose a copy of the terms of reference and a list of the members.

4. This Committee will consider the questions before them primarily from the point of view of the United Kingdom, and, as stated by the Prime Minister in the House of Commons on July 24 last, its appointment is a step preliminary to the convening of a Conference representative of the United Kingdom, the Dominions, and India. At such Conference it will devolve on the Secretary of State for the Colonies to secure consideration of any special circumstances affecting the interests of any particular Colony or Protectorate. I should therefore be glad to receive from you a considered statement of the views of your Government on the recommendations of the Conference and on the questions submitted to the Committee, so far as the circumstances of the Colony or Protectorate under your Government appear to you to call for special attention in connection with them.

5. You will no doubt wish to consult representative persons and bodies before replying to this despatch,

which you are at liberty to make public.

VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Weekly Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended October 28, 1916.

Births.—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 111 (4 Europeans, 7 Burghers, 64 Sinhalese, 15 Tamils, 17 Moors, 3 Malays, and 1 Other). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on July 1, 1916, viz., 259,451) was 22·4, as against 27·0 in the preceding week, 16·8 in the corresponding week of last year, and 22·7 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 139 (1 European, 8 Burghers, 67 Sinhalese, 34 Tamils, 20 Moors, 4 Malays, and 5 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 28·0, as against 28·8 in the previous week, 23·7 in the corresponding week of last year, and 25·8 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 139 total deaths, 22 were of infants under one year of age, as against 27 in the preceding week, 29 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 29 the average for last year.

Stillbirths.—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 13:

Principal Causes of Death.—Twenty-three deaths from Phthisis were registered, as against 14 in the previous week and 15 the weekly average for last year. Of these, 8 were in Maradana (including 3 deaths of non-residents in hospitals), 5 in St. Paul's, 4 in Kotahena, 2 in San Sebastian, 2 in New Bazaar, 1 in Slave Island, and 1 in Kollupitiya.

- 2. Twenty deaths from *Pneumonia* were registered, as against 18 in the previous week and 11 the weekly average for last year. Of these, 5 were in Maradana (including 2 deaths of non-residents in hospitals), 3 in New Bazaar, 3 in Kollupitiya, 2 in San Sebastian, 2 in St. Paul's, 2 in Kotahena, 2 in Wellawatta, and 1 in Slave Island, Two deaths from *Bronchitis* were registered.
- 3. Four deaths from *Enteric Fever* were registered, as against 3 in the previous week and 3 the weekly average for last year. Of these, 2 were in Maradana, 1 in Kotahena, and 1 in Slave Island.
- 4. One death from *Plague* was registered (in San Sebastian), same as in the previous week, against 2 the weekly average for last year. Six cases were reported, as against 3 in the previous week.
- 5. One death from *Measles* was registered (in San Sebastian), same as in the previous week. Twenty-nine cases were reported, as against 30 in the previous week.
- 6. Twelve deaths from Infantile Convulsions were registered, 8 from Worms, 6 from Dysentery, 5 from Diarrhea, 5 from Enteritis, 4 from Debility, 1 from Tetanus, and 47 from Other Causes.
 - 7. There were reported 7 cases of Chickenpox, as against 2 in the previous week.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was $\$0\cdot1^\circ$, against $79\cdot8^\circ$ in the preceding week and $79\cdot2^\circ$ in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was $29\cdot910$ in., against $29\cdot829$ in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was $0\cdot30$ in., against $2\cdot05$ in. in the preceding week and $12\cdot66$ in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.
