RULES REFERRED TO.

- 35. (i) Every deed or instrument which shall be executed or acknowledged before a notary shall be attested by him within 48 hours of execution or acknowledgment, and such attestations shall be signed and sealed within the same space of time. In computing this period, Sundays and public holidays shall be excluded.

(i) In the register of deeds kept under rule 23 of section 29 the particulars of each deed shall be entered immediately after it is executed; in no case shall the entry be delayed beyond the day following the day of execution of the deed, except when such day happens to be a Sunday or public holiday.

SCHEDULE.

Regulations for Boat Traffic at the Port of Hambantota.

Owners and tindals of boats shall give notice at the Master Attendant's Office whenever, for repairs or other causes, their boats are withdrawn from work or from the port, so that their numbers may be taken off the register for the time they are so withdrawn.

- 2. The transfer of a boat by the owner shall also be notified at the Master Attendant's Office.
- 3. The number of passengers the boat is licensed to carry shall be legibly painted on the backboard in the stern, or some other conspicuous place; and the table of fares chargeable for the boat, whether it be licensed for passengers or cargo, or both, must be legibly painted on the stern.

- Complaints against any of the officers of the Master Attendant's Department or against any of the boatmen of this port should be made to the Master Attendant as soon as possible, in order that the complaint may be at once inquired into.
- 5. The following are the rates for cargo and passenger boats plying within the port of Hambantota :-

- 15. The Governor shall appoint a person, in these rules called a "presiding officer," to preside at each polling station. Such presiding officer shall be supplied with a copy of the register of voters containing the voters residing in the district assigned to his polling station.
- 18. The presiding officer shall keep order in his station, and shall regulate the number of electors to be admitted at a time, and shall exclude all other persons, except the clerks, the agents of the candidates, and the constables on duty.
- 21. Immediately before a ballot paper is delivered to a voter it shall be marked on both sides with an official mark, either stamped or perforated; and the number, name, and description of the voter, as stated in the copy of the register of voters, shall be called out, and the number of such elector shall be marked on the counterfoil, and a mark shall be placed in the register against the number of the elector to denote that he has received a ballot paper, but without showing the particular ballot paper which he has received.
- 26. The returning officer shall make arrangements for counting the votes in the presence of the agents of the candidates as soon as practicable after he has received all the ballot boxes relating to any electorate, and for that purpose shall give notice in writing to the agents of the candidates of the time and place at which he will begin to count the votes.

Note I.—The certificate (a) above, when endorsed as being accepted for Matriculation in the Faculties of Arts or Science in any University of Great Britain, must include English with Geography and History, Mathematics, and at least two other subjects named in the following list:—Latin, Greek, Arabic, Persian, French, German, Spanish, Italian, Russian, or any approved modern language, Natural Philosophy or Physics, Chemistry, Biology, Physical Geography, and Geology.

Note II.—When these certificates (o) are not so endorsed, the following subjects must be passed at not more than two periods of examination, namely, English with Geography and History, Mathematics, Latin, and at least one other subject named in the following list:—Greek, Arabic, Persian, French, German, Spanish, Italian, Russian. (Under such circumstances the certificates should be endorsed as fulfilling the requirements of the General Medical Council.)

NOTE III.—The London Matriculation Certificate is accepted under the conditions mentioned in note I. above.

VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Weekly Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended February 24, 1917.

Births.—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 118 (2 Europeans, 8 Burghers, 56 Sinhalese, 19 Tamils, 22 Moors, 10 Malays, and 1 Other). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on January 1, 1917, viz., 263,629) was 23.3, as against 30.1 in the preceding week, 28.9 in the corresponding week of last year, and 21.6 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 143 (5 Burghers, 70 Sinhalese, 40 Tamils, 15 Moors, 7 Malays, and 6 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 28.3, as against 30.5 in the previous week, 24.2 in the corresponding week of last year, and 27.1 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 143 total deaths, 38 were of infants under one year of age, as against 36 in the preceding week, 24 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 25 the average for last year.

Stillbirths.—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 8.

Principal Causes of Death.—Eleven deaths from Pneumonia were registered, same as in the previous week, against 15 the weekly average for last year. Of these, 5 were in Kotahena, 2 in San Sebastian, 2 in Maradana, 1 in St. Paul's, and 1 in Slave Island. Three deaths from Bronchitis were registered.

- 2. Nine deaths from *Plague* were registered, as against 4 in the previous week and 4 the weekly average for last year. Of these, 4 were in Pettah, 2 in Kotahena, 1 in St. Paul's, 1 in New Bazaar, and 1 in Maradana. Eleven cases were reported, as against 14 in the previous week.
- 3. Eight deaths from *Phthisis* were registered, as against 18 in the previous week and 16 the weekly average for last year. Of these, 2 were in Kotahena, 2 in New Bazaar, 2 in Maradana (including 1 death of a non-resident in hospital), 1 in San Sebastian, and 1 in Slave Island.
- 4. Seven deaths from *Enteric Fever* were registered, as against 2 in the previous week and 3 the weekly average for last year. Of these, 5 were in Kotahena and 2 in Maradana.
- 5. One death from Smallpox was registered, in Kollupitiya. None was registered in the previous week. No cases were reported this week, while there was I in the previous week.
- 6. No deaths from Measles were registered; there were 4 in the previous week. There were reported 36 cases of Measles, as against 39 in the previous week; and 37 cases of Chickenpox, as against 81 in the previous week.
- 7. Fourteen deaths from Debility were registered, 12 from Infantile Convulsions, 7 from Enteritis. 5 from Worms, 4 from Diarrhea, 1 from Dysentery, 1 from Tetanus, and 60 from Other Causes.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 79·2°, against 78·1° in the preceding week and 78·9° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29·869 in., against 29·955 in. in the preceding week and 29·840 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 2·37 in., against nil in the preceding week and 0·6 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.
