In the Name of His Majesty GEORGE THE FIFTH, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, King, Defender of the Faith.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Sir John Anderson, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Knight Commander of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Ceylon, with the Dependencies thereof.

OW know Ye that We, the Governor of Ceylon, by virtue of the powers in Us vested by clause III. 1 (A) of the Order in Council dated October 26, 1896, issued by Her Majesty the Queen, as amended by the Order in Council dated March 21, 1916, and published in the Government Gazette dated June 5, 1916, have been pleased to make the following regulation, and call upon His Majesty's subjects and all other persons being in the said Colony to govern themselves accordingly.

Given at Colombo, in the said Island of Ceylon, this Twenty-seventh day of March, in the year of our Lord One thousand Nine hundred and Seventeen.

GOD SAVE THE KING.

REGULATION REFERRED TO.

No person shall leave the Colony for any destination, except India, unless such person, if he is a British subject, is the bearer of a passport issued to him for the purpose by the Governor, or, if he is not a British subject, is the bearer of a passport duly issued to him within the previous two years by or on behalf of the Government of which he is a subject duly vise by the British Ambassador or British Consultin that country, and further visé in the Colony by the Colonial Secretary or an Assistant Colonial Secretary.

Any person who acts in contravention of this regulation, or is reasonably suspected of having so acted or being about so to act, may be taken into custody by a police

or customs officer without a warrant, and shall be liable to be detained.

Any person acting contrary to this regulation or attempting so to do shall be guilty of an offence punishable on summary conviction with imprisonment, rigorous or simple, for a period not exceeding six months, or a fine not exceeding one thousand five hundred rupees, or both.

Provided, however, that nothing contained in the regulation aforesaid shall

apply to-

(a) Any member of His Majesty's Naval or Military Forces, or of the Indian

Marine Service, entering or leaving the Colony on duty

(b) Any passenger on board any vessel and any member of the crew of such essel who has been lawfully engaged as such in any country outside the Colony and who leaves the Colony in continuation of the same voyage

(c) Any member of the crew of any vessel who has been lawfully engaged in the Colony for an over-sea voyage, and who satisfies the shipping officer

that he is by occupation a seafaring man.

TENDERS are hereby invited for the supply of sleepers and scantlings during 1917-18. to be completed as and scantlings during 1917-18, to be completed as specified in the note under the schedule annexed below. The areas to be exploited for the supplies and further details are given in the schedule below.

All tenders should be in duplicate and sealed under one cover, and should be addressed to the Chairman of the Tender Board, Office of the Controller of Revenue, Colombo.

Tenders should either be deposited in the tender box in the Office of the Controller of Revenue, or be sent through the post.

Tenders should be marked "Tender for Sleeper and Scantlings Supply, 1917–18," in the left hand top corner of the envelope, and should reach the Office of the Controller of Revenue not later than midday on Tuesday, May 1, 1917.

The tenders are to be made upon forms which will be supplied upon application at the Forest Office of the Kurunegala Division. No tender will be considered unless it is on the recognized form. Alterations must be initialled, otherwise the tenders may be treated as informal and rejected.

6. A deposit of Rs. 20 will be required to be made either at the Treasury or Kachcheri, and a receipt produced for the same before any form of tender is issued. Should any person decline or fail to enter into the contract and bond after he has tendered, or to furnish approved security, within ten days of receiving notice in writing from the Head of the Department, or his duly authorized representative, that his tender has been accepted, such deposit will be forfeited to the Crown, and the defaulter will render himself liable to be included in the list of defaulting contractors precluded from having any concern in a Government contract. All other deposits will be returned upon signature of a contract.

7. Each tender must be accompanied by a letter signed by two responsible persons, whose addresses must be given, engaging to become securities for the due fulfilment of the

contract.

Sufficient sureties will be required to join in a bond for the due fulfilment of the contract. The amount of the bond, and all other necessary information, can be ascertained upon application at the office referred to in section 5. GENERAL CONDITIONS.

1. Trees are to be felled within 6 inches from the ground by saw or axe and saw combined.

2. Only such trees as are stamped and marked by the Forest Ranger are to be felled, and no sound trees below 4 ft. 6 in. in girth will be marked or should be felled.

3. All suitable dead and hollow trees and branchwood within the forest such as are marked by the Forest Officer, though below 4 ft. 6 in. in girth, should, in addition to all matured sound trees marked by him, be utilized for conver-

sion into sleepers and scantlings or scantlings alone, as may be directed. Contractors should understand that only such portions of trees as cannot be converted into sleepers may be sawn into scantlings.

4. Part of logs attacked by fungus or defective parts of logs are not to be sawn into sleepers or scantlings. sleepers and scantlings should be sawn from sound matured wood, free from shakes, cracks, sapwood, and large or loose

Broad gauge sleepers are to be 9 ft. by 10 in. by 5 in., and narrow gauge sleepers 5 ft. by 9 in. by 41 in., and scantlings may be ordered from 3 in. by $2\frac{1}{2}$ in. upwards.

6. Sleepers and scantlings should be rectangular in form, and sawn perfectly parallel on all sides. On no account will squaring of logs, sleepers, or scantlings with an adze or axe be allowed.

7. Sleepers and scantlings should be covered with sawdust or immersed in water, and be invariably placed under shade immediately they are sawn until they can be transported to delivery depôts, where they should be stacked and kept under shade in the manner to be pointed out by the Forest Ranger.

8. Only such sleepers as are practically certain to be accepted by the Railway authorities will be allowed to be stacked at delivery derôts; payment may be made for sleepers and scantlings accepted by the Assistant Conser-

vator of Forests at delivery depots.

Rejected sleepers or scantlings will not be paid for, and they will lapse to Government, as well as all refuse wood in the sleeper operations. The contractor shall have no claim in respect of any material sold as rejections.

10. The contractor may be paid a proportionate rate up to September, 1917, for sleepers and scantlings sawn but not removed to delivery depôts owing to the difficulty of transport.

11. Further information as to quantities and lengths of scantlings to be sawn can be obtained from the Assistant Conservator, Kurunegala.

SCHEDULE.

Small firm knots not exceeding 2 in. in diameter may be allowed, provided none such occur within 6 in. of either rail seat.

(d) A certain amount of wane may be allowed on each corner of the upper side of sleepers, provided it does not occur within 6 in. of either rail seat, and that it does not measure more than $1\frac{1}{2}$ in. on any face, or reduce the normal

sectional area by more than one-eighth.

(e) Sufficient allowance for shrinkage shall be made to insure that the sleepers are fully up to the specified dimensions at port of loading and generally at Colombo; not more than 5 per cent. of any lot may consist of sleepers of short width up to 1 in., or short length up to 1 in.

3. The total consignment must be delivered at Colombo as early as possible, and tenderers must specify in their tenders the dates on which deliveries will be begun and completed. Registrar-General's Weekly Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended March 24, 1917.

Births.—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 144 (2 Europeans, 9 Burghers, 81 Sinhalese, 20 Tamils, 26 Moors, 5 Malays, and 1 Other). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on January 1, 1917, viz., 263,629) was 28.5, as against 23.9 in the preceding week, 21.3 in the corresponding week of last year, and 21.6 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 163 (11 Burghers, 76 Sinhalese, 41 Tamils, 21 Moors, 2 Malays, and 12 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 32.2, same as in the previous week, against 26.8 in the corresponding week of last year and 27.1 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 163 total deaths, 25 were of infants under one year of age, as against 43 in the preceding week, 21 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 25 the average for last year.

Stillbirths.—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 8.

Principal Causes of Death.—Nineteen deaths from Pneumonia were registered, as against 9 in the previous week and 15 the weekly average for last year. Of these, 5 were in Maradana (including 2 deaths of non-residents in hospitals), 3 in Kotahena, 3 in New Bazaar, 2 in San Sebastian, 2 in Slave Island, 1 in Pettah, 1 in St. Paul's, 1 in Kollupitiya, and 1 in Wellawatta. Four deaths from Bronchitis were registered.

- 2. Sixteen deaths from *Phthisis* were registered, as against 18 in the previous week and 16 the weekly average for last year. Of these, 6 were in St. Paul's, 6 in Maradana (including 2 deaths of non-residents in hospitals), 2 in Slave Island, 1 in New Bazaar, and 1 in Kollupitiya.
- 3. Eleven deaths from Plague were registered, as against 14 in the previous week and 4 the weekly average for last year. Of these, 5 were in St. Paul's, 2 in Pettah, 2 in New Bazaar, 1 in Kotahena, and 1 in Kollupitiya. Nineteen cases were reported, as against 16 in the previous week.
- 4. Five deaths from Enteric Fever were registered, as against 6 in the previous week and 3 the weekly average for last year. Of these, 3 were in Maradana, 1 in Pettah, and 1 in Kotahena.
- 5. One death from Measles was registered in Slave Island. None were registered in the previous week. Forty-six eases were reported, as against 44 in the previous week.
- 6. Ten deaths from Enteritis were registered, 9 from Infantile Convulsions, 5 from Dysentery, 3 from Diarrhea, 3 from Worms, 3 from Debility, 2 from Tetanus, and 72 from Other Causes,
- 7. No deaths from Smallpox were registered. One death was registered in the previous week. No cases were reported either in this or in the previous week. There were reported 117 cases of Chickenpox, as against 66 in the previous week.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 80·1°, against 79·9° in the preceding week and 82·3° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29·898 in., against 29·886 in. in the preceding week and 29.840 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 0.06 in., against 2.16 in. in the preceding week and 0.14 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.
