KNOW Ye that We, the Governor of Ceylon, in Executive Council, in pursuance of the powers vested in Us by section 1 of Ordinance No. 4 of 1891, intituled "An Ordinance to empower Police Magistrates to inflict Whipping for theft of Prædial Products," do by this Our Proclamation appoint that the said Ordinance shall come into operation within the Revenue District of Kalutara, Western Province, as from and after February 1, 1917.

#### SCHEDULE REFERRED TO.

North.—A lire drawn parallel to the Jaela-Minuwangoda road and 2 chains to the north thereof terminated eastwards at the point where such line meets the eastern boundary, and running westwards till it reaches the Colombo-Negombo road, the northern boundary of the land of Anthony Perera Gunetileke continued westwards as far as the grass field.

South.—The southern boundary of the land of the said Gomez as far as the north-western corner of the land of Hettiarachchige Marthelis Pieris, from this corner the western and southern boundary of the land of the said Pieris until it touches the boundary of the land of Batapolage Juan Perera, the western boundary of the land of the said Juan Perera, and the southern boundary of the same land belonging to the said Juan Perera and others, the southern boundary of the land of Warnakula Romanis Daberera and two others and straight on to the north-west corner of the pokuna, the western and southern boundary of the pokuna, thence along the southern boundary of the land of Panamborage Marcelinu Fonseka and another as far as the north-west corner of the land of Liyandurage Elaris Pieris, the western boundary of the said land of Elaris Pieris, the western boundary of the land of Liyanduruage Agida Pieris, the southern boundary of the same land, the southern boundary of the land of Wadduwage Justina Dias and others, the southern boundary of the land of Kodikara-arachehige Charles Perera, the southern boundary of the land of Kodikara-arachchige Rakel Perera, the southern boundary of the land of Kodikara-arachchige Elaris Perera Ranasinghe, the southern boundary of the land of Kodikara-arachchige Migel Perera, the southern boundary of the land of Kekulawalage Jusey Fernando as far as the Colombo-Negombo road, the Colombo-Negombo road southwards as far as a point 2 chains to the south of the approach road to the cinnamon estate of Hendappu Mudalali and others, a line drawn eastwards to meet the south-western corner of the cinnamon estate of Hendappu Mudalali and others, and the southern boundary of the said estate.

East.—The eastern boundary of the said cinnamon estate as far as Delgahamulla, near the old well. # BY THE KING.

A PROCLAMATION for Prohibiting the Importation of Cocaine and Opium into the United Kingdom. GEORGE R.I.

Whereas by section forty-three of the Customs Consolidation Act, 1876, it is provided that the importation of arms, ammunition, gunpowder, or any other goods may be prohibited by Proclamation:

And whereas it is expedient that the importation into the United Kingdom of cocaine or of opium should be prohibited, except as hereinafter provided:

Now, therefore, We, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, in pursuance of the said Act, and of all other powers enabling Us in that behalf, do hereby proclaim, direct, and ordain as follows:—

As from and after this date, subject as hereinafter provided, all cocaine and all opium shall be prohibited to be imported into the United Kingdom.

Provided always, and it is hereby declared, that nothing in this Proclamation shall apply to cocaine or opium imported under the license of one of Our Principal Secretaries of State, and in accordance with the provisions of such license.

The word "cocaine" includes all preparations, salts, derivatives, or admixtures prepared therefrom or therewith and containing 0·1 per cent. (one part in a thousand) or more of the drug, or any solid or liquid extract of the coca leaf containing 0·1 per cent, or more of the drug.

The word "opium" means raw opium, powdered or granulated opium, or opium prepared for smoking, and includes any solid or semi-solid mixture containing opium.

The Cocaine and Opium (Prohibition of Import) Proclamation, 1916, is hereby revoked.

This Proclamation may be cited as The Cocaine and Opium (Prohibition of Import) No. 2 Proclamation, 1916.

Given at Our Court at Buckingham Palace, this Eleventh day of December, in the year of our Lord One thousand Nine hundred and Sixteen, and in the Seventh year of Our Reign.

# "THE VILLAGE COMMUNITIES ORDINANCE, No. 24 of 1889."

THE following rules framed by the several Village Committees in the Kalutara District of the Western Province under the provisions of section 6 of the Village Communities Ordinance, No. 24 of 1889, and approved by His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, are published for general information.

## Rules referred to. Sub-section (3).—Fisheries.

Kraals.—No kraal or stockade or enclosure of any kind whether intended to be used for catching fish or for any other purpose shall be erected, nor shall any existing kraals be continued, in any river, lake, or canal, or other piece of water, without the previous permission of the Committee, and payment of such fees as the Committee may determine. Provided that this rule shall not apply to enclosures for soaking ecconut husks, except those attached to mills. Provided further, that the Chairman shall have the power to order the removal or prohibit the erection of any such enclosures.

#### Sub-section (8).—Nuisances.

- 1. Cleaning up of land near dwelling houses.—It shall be the duty of the owner or occupier of any land in the neighbourhood of dwelling houses to keep the same clear of all weeds and brushwood within 20 yards' distance of any human dwelling, and to remove and bury or burn all refuse or rubbish, as well as old tins, bottles, coconut husks, or shells, or other matter or receptacles which are likely to form breeding places for mosquitoes.
- 2. It shall also be the duty of every householder to fill in all hollows, holes, or other low places in his compound where water can collect and stagnate within 20 yards of his own or of his neighbours' houses on the receipt of a written notice from the Chairman of the Village Committee within 14 days of the receipt of such notice. Provided that he shall have the right of appeal to the Government Agent against the order contained in such notice. In the event of any householder failing to comply with such notice or to lodge an appeal within the said 14 days, it shall be lawful for the Chairman of the Village Committee to cause the work of filling to be done by the labourers employed by the Village Headmen, and to recover the cost of the work, together with reasonable cost of supervision, from such householder, in addition to such fine as may be lawfully imposed for breach of this rule.
- 3. Removal of dangerous trees along public roads.—The owner or owners of any tree or trees overhanging any Village Committee road shall cause such tree or trees or the branches of such tree or trees to be cut down when ordered to do so by the Chairman of the Village Committee. In default, the Chairman shall cause the work to be done, and the cost thereof shall be recovered from the owner or owners by way of penalty as for breaches of the rule.
- 4. Removal of dangerous trees overhanging houses.—If upon complaint the Chairman, Village Committee, is satisfied that any tree is likely to fall upon any house or other building, or is in a condition dangerous to the occupants of any such house or other building or other property, the Chairman, Village Committee, shall give notice in writing to the owner of such tree to cut it down within such reasonable time as the Chairman may allow. In case such owner shall neglect or delay to obey such order, the Chairman shall cause the work to be done at his expense, and may recover the amount by way of penalty as for breach of the rules.
- 5. Burial of corpses.—No dead body shall be buried within a radius of 100 yards from a dwelling house, or from any source of water supply such as those referred to in rule 1 under this sub-section, published in the Government Gazette No. 6,470 of November 10, 1911, or within a distance of 15 yards from any public thoroughfare, provided that this rule does not apply to public burial grounds or cemeteries. Where a public burial ground or cemetery has been provided, no human body shall be buried in any place other than the public burial ground or cemetery within a radius of 2 miles.
- 6. Behaviour within the precincts of courts.—No person shall clear his throat or expectorate within the precincts of any Village Tribunal or Village Committee Court-house.

# Sub-section (22).—Miscellaneous.

Houses to be whitewashed.—The villagers shall whitewash their houses either with makulu, lime, or any other suitable substance whenever they receive orders from the Chairman of the Committee.

# "THE BUTCHERS ORDINANCE, 1893."

IT is hereby notified that His Excellency the Governor, in exercise of the powers vested in him by section 23: of "The Butchers Ordinance, 1893," and with the advice of the Executive Council, has been pleased to confirm the following rules made by the Local Board of Health of Matara under the said section of the said Ordinance, and they are hereby published for general information.

Rules for the Regulation of the Slaughter of Cattle and Sheep and the Sanitation of the Slaughter-house.

- 1. No person licensed to carry on the trade of a butcher within the Local Board limits of Matara shall slaughter cattle and sheep at any place other than the public slaughter-house adjoining the seabeach and near the Kotuwegoda fish market.
- 2. The cattle pound at Kotuwegoda adjoining the slaughter-house is hereby appointed as the spot in which the licensed butchers of the Local Board of Matara shall, as required by section 12, sub-section (1), of Ordinance No. 9 of 1893, expose for public view all cattle intended for slaughter for a period of not less than 24 hours immediately preceding the time of slaughter.
- 3. The public slaughter-house shall be in charge of the Inspector, Local Board, who shall be responsible for its discipline and sanitary condition.
- 4. No cattle or sheep shall be slaughtered at the said slaughter-house except between such hours as may be determined by the Chairman of the Local Board of Matara, notice of which shall be posted at the said slaughter-house, nor until after they have been inspected and approved of by the Senior Medical Officer, Matara, or some person appointed for the purpose by the Chairman of the Local Board of Matara, as fit to be slaughtered for human food.
  - 5. Cattle rejected as unfit for slaughter shall be immediately removed.
- 6. The said Medical Officer or some one appointed by the Chairman, Local Board, may prohibit the slaughter of any animal, notwithstanding it has been approved as aforesaid, if it should before slaughter be found to be diseased or unfit to be slaughtered for human food.
- 7. If on any animal which has been approved as aforesaid being slaughtered the carcase shall appear diseased or unfit for human food, the said Medical Officer or some person appointed by the Chairman, Local Board, shall cause the meat to be immediately destroyed or so disposed of as to prevent it being exposed for sale or used for human food.
- 8. The officer in charge of the slaughter-house shall not permit the slaughter of any cattle which have not been approved as aforesaid as fit to be slaughtered for human food, or the slaughter of which the said Medical Officer or some one appointed by the Chairman, Local Board, has prohibited as provided in rule 5.
- 9. No person shall remove from the slaughter-house, except under the direction of the said Medical Officer or some one appointed by the Chairman, Local Board, any meat which the latter has declared unfit for human food.
- 10. A fee of 50 cents shall be charged for every head of cattle and a fee of 25 cents for every other animal slaughtered at the public slaughter-house. Such fee to be paid before the animal is slaughtered to the Secretary of the Local Board, who shall give a printed receipt for the same, and such receipt shall be the warrant for the slaughter of the animal to the Inspector, Local Board, or the keeper of the slaughter-house.
- 11. All butchers making use of the said slaughter-house are required to clean it out daily after use.
- 12. The person in charge of the slaughter-house shall keep a register in the form annexed of all cattle brought to the slaughter-house.
- 13. No animal shall be slaughtered in the presence of other animals, or until the carcase of any animal previously slaughtered has been removed or screened off and the premises cleansed.

Sir.-With reference to Mr. Bonar Law's circular despatch of August 30 on the subject of the Imperial Institute, I have the honour to transmit to you the accompanying copy of three resolutions adopted by an Inter-Departmental Committee which was appointed to define the spheres of work of the Imperial Institute and the Commercial Intelligence Branch of the Board of Trade.

- 2. I have to explain that, in view of the increased attention which has been paid, especially since the outbreak of war, to the importance of obtaining the fullest possible information as to the resources of the Empire in raw materials, with the object of the utilization of those resources for purposes of commercial development, it was felt that some danger existed lest the work in this direction, which was being carried on by the Department and the Institute, might lead to an overlapping of their functions and to consequent waste of energy.
- It was accordingly decided to appoint an Inter-Departmental Committee, over which the Right Honourable Lewis Harcourt, M.P., then First Commissioner of Works, was good enough to preside, and it is hoped that the decision embodied in the enclosed resolutions, which have been unanimously agreed to by the Committee, will ensure a satisfactory delimitation of the spheres of work of the two departments, as well as close and cordial co-operation between them.
- 4. I shall be glad if you will take steps, by publishing this despatch in the official Gazette or in such other manner as you may deem suitable, to give publicity to the new arrangement.

RESOLUTIONS OF INTER-DEPARTMENTAL COMMITTEE ON CO-OPERATION BETWEEN THE BOARD OF TRADE AND THE IMPERIAL INSTITUTE.

- (1) The Imperial Institute should deal with inquiries as to the sources of supply of raw materials produced within the Empire in connection with their industrial and commercial utilization. Either the Board of Trade or the Imperial Institute may deal with inquiries as to supplies immediately available, but the Board of Trade should, as a rule, deal with inquiries for ordinary supplies of well-recognized raw material through the usual trade channels.
- (2) The Imperial Institute should undertake all necessary investigations of the value and uses of raw materials produced within the Empire.
- (3) The Imperial Institute and the Board of Trade should co-operate in cases in which the questions concerned involve special statistical and trade information as well as technical treatment.

# Rules and Orders under "The Enemy Property Ordinance, No. 23 of 1916."

The following rules, entitled "The Trading with the Enemy (Vesting and Application of Property) Rules, 1917," and dated November I, 1916, have been made by the Judges of the Supreme Court under "The Enemy Property Ordinance, No. 23 of 1916."

- 1. In these rules the expression "property" means any immovable or movable property, including any rights, whether legal or equitable, in or arising out of property immovable or movable. References to sections and sub-sections are references to sections and sub-sections of the Ordinance.
- 2. (1) Applications under section 7 shall be by way of motion and shall be made to the Supreme Court or a Judge thereof, and such applications shall, in general and except so far as is hereby otherwise provided, be made and dealt with, mutatis mutandis, in accordance with the practice of the Supreme Court with regard to similar matters under the Civil Procedure Code.

(2) In all cases where the motion is not made by the Custodian, he shall be named as a respondent thereto,

and it shall be served on him, unless the Court shall in any case or class of cases otherwise order.

(3) In general and except so far as the Court or Judge may otherwise order, the enemy to whom any property may be alleged to belong shall be named as a respondent to any motion under section 7, and any person or corporation holding or managing any property alleged to belong to the enemy may also be named as a respondent to the motion.

(4) Motions under section 7 shall be intituled in the matter of the Ordinance and in the matter of the enemy

or alleged enemy in question.

- (5) Any powers of selling, managing, or otherwise dealing with property which may be given to the Custodian by any order made under section 7 may from time to time be revoked, suspended, varied, increased, added to, or otherwise dealt with as the Court or Judge shall, from time to time, think fit on application made either under liberty reserved by the original order or otherwise.
- 3. On any application under section 7 the applicant must file an affidavit or affidavits for the purpose of showing (a) that the enemy, whose property is proposed to be dealt with, is an enemy; (b) the nature and extent of the property in which the enemy is alleged to be interested; (c) any special ground on which it is expedient that the property should be vested in the Custodian; and (d) in cases where the applicant is not the Custodian or the Attorney-General, the facts showing that the applicant is a creditor of the enemy or otherwise entitled to apply under section 7.
- 4. (1) Any subsequent application with regard to any property comprised in the motion under section 7 or vested in the Custodian may be made by motion intituled in the same matters as the original motion.

(2) In cases where any party has already appeared by a proctor, any such motion may be served on that

proctor, or in ease of a change of proctor, on the proctor last appearing for that party.

- (3) Every subsequent application not made by the Custodian or the Attorney-General shall be served on the Custodian, unless the Court shall in any case or class of cases otherwise order.
- 5. The Court or Judge may, on the hearing of any application under section 8 (2), direct all such accounts and inquiries as to debts or particular classes of debts as may seem to be requisite, and, if thought fit, the property available for payment of any debts or claims, and may for that purpose direct the Custodian or any party to issue such advertisements and require such proof by affidavit, or otherwise, as to the Court or Judge may seem expedient; but the Court or Judge shall not in any case be bound to inquire into or take into account, or require the Custodian to inquire into or take into account, debts and claims against the enemy to any greater extent than provided for by the proviso to section 8 (2), and the Custodian may, if he think fit, carry out the duties imposed on him by such proviso under the direction of the Court or Judge.
- 6. Any application under the Ordinance, whether original, subsequent, or other, may be proceeded with, heard and dealt with by the Court or a Judge if thought fit in the absence of an enemy or any other party who may be or appear to be abroad, or whose whereabouts may not be known, or whose presence may otherwise be difficult to secure, and without the service of any motion on any such party or any intimation to such party other than such, if any, as the Court or Judge shall think fit.
- 7. The Court or Judge may, at any stage of the proceedings on any application under section 7 or section 8, order that the case shall thenceforward be heard in private.
- 8. Any order made under section 7 or section 8 of these rules may, should subsequent circumstances render it just so to do, be suspended, discharged, or otherwise varied or altered by the Court or Judge which made such order.
- 9. (1) The proceedings on any application under the Ordinance shall, so far as not otherwise provided for by these rules, be conducted in accordance with the ordinary practice of the Supreme Court. And the costs of all, and incidental to all, such proceedings shall be in the discretion of the Court or Judge.

(2) The Court or Judge may remit or excuse either in whole or part any Court fees paid or payable in respect

of any such application.

# VITAL STATISTICS.

### Registrar-General's Weekly Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended January 27, 1917.

Births.—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 138 (3 Europeans, 9 Burghers, 84 Sinhalese, 16 Tamils, 22 Moors, 1 Malay, and 3 Others). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on January 1, 1917, viz., 263,629) was 27.3, as against 34.6 in the preceding week, 29.5 in the corresponding week of last year, and 21.6 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 114 (3 Burghers, 72 Sinhalese, 17 Tamils, 15 Moors, 2 Malays, and 5 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 22·5, as against 24·5 in the previous week, 25·0 in the corresponding week of last year, and 27·1 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 114 total deaths, 34 were of infants under one year of age, as against 25 in the preceding week, 22 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 25 the average for last year.

Stillbirths.—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 7.

Principal Causes of Death.—Eighteen deaths from Pneumonia were registered, as against 20 in the previous week and 15 the weekly average for last year. Of these, 9 were in Kotahena, 6 in Maradana (including 3 deaths of non-residents in hospitals), and 3 in Wellawatta. Two deaths from Bronchitis were registered.

- 2. Fourteen deaths from *Phihisis* were registered, as against 20 in the previous week and 16 the weekly average for last year. Of these, 5 were in Maradana (including 4 deaths of non-residents in hospitals), 3 in New Bazaar, 2 in San Sebastian, 2 in Kotahena, 1 in Pettah, and 1 in St. Paul's.
- 3. Three deaths from Enteric Fever were registered, as against 2 in the previous week and 3 the weekly average for last year. Of these, 2 were in Kotahena and 1 in New Bazaar.
- 4. One death from Plague was registered (in New Bazaar), as against 3 in the previous week and 4 the weekly a verage for last year. Five cases were reported, as against 4 in the previous week.
- 5. Twelve deaths from Infantile Convulsions were registered, 9 from Debility, 5 from Enteritis, 4 from Worms, 3 from Diarrhea, 2 from Dysentery, and 41 from Other Causes.
- 6. There were reported 32 cases of Measles, as against 36 in the previous week; and 71 cases of Chickenpox, as against 45 in the previous week.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 76.6°, against 78.8° in the preceding week and 78.8° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29.931 in., against 29.916 in. in the preceding week and 29.865 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was nil, against 3.14 in. in the preceding week and nil in the corresponding week of the previous year.
