WEST RIDGEWAY.

WHEREAS by section 28 of "The Courts Ordinance, 1889," it is, amongst other things, enacted that Criminal Sessions of the Supreme Court shall be holden by one of the Judges thereof, or by a Commissioner of Assize duly appointed under the provisions of the said Ordinance, for each of the Circuits into which the Island is divided for the hearing, trying, and determining all prosecutions which shall be commenced against any person for or in respect of any crime or offence or alleged crime or offence—

For the Northern Circuit twice at least at Jaffna, and such other places in such Circuit as the Governor, after previous consultation with the Judges of the Supreme Court, shall appoint; such sessions commencing at Jaffna in the month of February and the month of July every year:

WHEREAS by section 6 of "The Masters Attendant's Ordinance, 1865," it is enacted that the Governor may from time to time, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, frame and establish such port rules, not inconsistent with the said Ordinance, as he may think necessary for any of the purposes in the several sub-sections of the said section specified, provided that such port rules shall be promulgated by Proclamation in the Government Gazette at least one month before the same shall take effect:

And whereas the port of Colombo was brought within the operation of the said Ordinance by a Proclamation dated the Sixth day of January, One thousand Eight hundred and Sixty-six, and certain port rules were duly framed, established, and formulated for the said port of Colombo, for the purposes of the said Ordinance, by Proclamations dated June 15, 1900, April 27, 1901, June 13, 1902, and October 22, 1902:

And whereas it is expedient to frame and establish an additional port rule for the said port of Colombo:

Now know Ye that We, the said Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, have framed and established the additional port rule set forth in the schedule hereto for the said port of Colombo, and We do hereby promulgate the said additional port rule to take effect as from and after the Fifteenth day of August, 1903.

SCHEDULE.

Section II.

- 6. The master of every vessel bound to any port in Ceylon and infected with cholera, yellow fever, or plague, shall, when the vessel is within 3 miles of the coast of any part of Ceylon, or is within the limits of the port of Colombo, cause to be hoisted:—
 - (1) At the masthead or where it can be best seen, during the whole of the time between sunrise and sunset, a day signal consisting of a large flag of yellow and black borne quarterly; and
 - (2) At the peak or other conspicuous place where it can be best seen, and at a height of not less than 20 ft. above the hull of the ship, during the whole of the time between sunset and sunrise, a night signal consisting of three lights, which shall be arranged, at a distance of not less than 6 ft. apart, in the form of an equilateral triangle, and of which the light at the apex of the triangle shall be white, and the other lights at the ends of the base of the triangle shall be red in colour.

No person shall leave, and no person except a Government pilot shall go on board of, any such vessel until permission to do so is granted by the "proper authority" appointed under the provisions of Ordinance No. 3 of 1897, or any officer acting on his behalf.

WEST RIDGEWAY.

WHEREAS by the 19th section of "The Forest Ordinance, 1885," as amended by the 6th section of Ordinance No. 1 of 1892, it is enacted that whenever the following events have occurred, viz.:-

- (a) The period fixed under section 7 of the said "Forest Ordinance, 1885," for preferring claims has elapsed, and all claims (if any) made within such period have been disposed of by the Forest Settlement Officer; and
- (b) If such claims have been made, the period fixed for appealing from the orders passed on such claims have elapsed, and all appeals (if any) presented within such period have been disposed of by the Supreme Court; and
- (c) All lands (if any) to be included in the proposed forest which may be acquired under section 13 of the last-mentioned Ordinance have become vested in the Crown—

the Governor shall, by Proclamation to be publised in the Government Gazette, specify the limits of the forest which it is intended to reserve, and declare the same to be reserved from a date fixed by such Proclamation:

And whereas all things necessary for declaring the forest hereunder mentioned to be a reserved forest have been fulfilled, and all times hereinbefore recited have elapsed, and it is expedient to specify the limits of such forest:

Now know all Men that We, the said Governor, do by this Our Proclamation proclaim the forest, the limits of which are set forth in the schedule hereto subjoined, to be a reserved forest as from and after the First day of August, 1903.

And We do hereby further specify the limits of the said reserved forest to be those set forth in the said schedule.

A certificate of the registration of the candidate's birth showing him to be on the 1st September, 1903, between the ages of 18 and 21, and a certificate of good character signed by a responsible person,* to the satisfaction of the Director of Public Instruction, must be attached to the form of application. If a certificate of birth for a previous examination was sent in, reference may be made to it by mentioning name and date of examination. Affidavits will in no circumstances be accepted.

^{*}The Candidate's Teacher or Schoolmaster by preference, or a Member of the Public Service, a Justice of the Peace, Minister of Religion, Advocate, Proctor, or Notary, or generally speaking, some person whose name is known and to whom reference can readily be made.

3. Clerks belonging to the Fourth Class of the Clerical Branch of the Public Service, who have completed three years' satisfactory service, and those employed by Provincial and District Road Committees, whose appointments date prior to July 1, 1875, are eligible for examination irrespective of age and without fee. Their applications (in the same form, Schedule A) for admission to the examination should be forwarded to the Director of Public Instruction through the Heads of their Departments.

4. Applications are to reach the Director of Public Instruction not later than 12 noon on Monday, September 7, 1903; any applications received after that hour, by whatever cause delayed, will

be absolutely rejected.

5. The Director of Public Instruction will return to the candidate his application, approved or disapproved as the case may be, after taking, if necessary, the orders of Government thereon. The approved application shall constitute the candidate's ticket of admission to the examination. Candidates presenting themselves for examination must produce to the officer appointed to supervise the examination at the station at which they present themselves their forms of application, approved by the Director of Public Instruction. A candidate not producing such form, whatever may be the reason for his not so doing, will be refused admittance to the examination.

6. Examinations will be held at Colombo and Jaffna only, in the places and under the super-

vision of the officers specified in Schedule B. Heads of Departments are required to grant to officers of their Departments, whose applications to present themselves for examination have been returned to them approved by the Director of Public Instruction, leave to present themselves at the most

conveniently situated station at which the examination is to be held.

7. The examination will be competitive. The number of places assigned for competition

shall be thirty.

8. The subjects for examination are those set out in Schedule C to this notice. nation shall be held in two parts: the first part, a qualifying examination in Handwriting, Spelling, and Arithmetic. Any candidate failing to obtain two-thirds of the marks allotted for Handwriting and half those allowed for Spelling and Arithmetic respectively shall be excluded from the remainder of the examination. The second part of the examination shall be in the remaining subjects in Schedule C. Should a candidate obtain less than one-fourth marks in any of the subjects other than Handwriting, Spelling, and Arithmetic, or, if he be a Sinhalese or Tamil, less than two-thirds marks in his native language, such marks shall not be counted in his favour. In all the written papers marks will be deducted for bad writing and mistakes in spelling.

9. Officers who have served continuously in the Fourth Class of the Clerical Service for over six years will be allowed to compete amongst themselves and be eligible if they obtain a minimum of 33 per cent. in the compulsory subjects for seven of the appointments offered for competition. Three of the appointments will be reserved as prizes for deserving officers of the Fourth Class of not less than ten years' service to be selected irrespective of examination. No service under the age of

sixteen years will be reckoned for this purpose.

SIR,—I HAVE the honour to inform you that a fund has been started in this country for the purpose of promoting investigations into all matters connected with, or bearing on, the causes, prevention, and treatment of cancer and malignant disease, and that the scheme, of which copies are enclosed, has been approved by the Royal College of Physicians of London and the Royal College of Surgeons of England, who have undertaken control of the inquiry.

2. I also enclose copies of a memorandum prepared by the Honorary Treasurer of the Fund, giving further information as to the origin of the scheme and the progress which has been made

with it.

3. I need scarcely emphasize the importance of this inquiry, and I request that you will further its objects as far as possible by giving publicity to the information contained in this despatch and by any other means which may appear to you to be suitable.

CANCER RESEARCH.

SCHEME.

I .- Objects of the Fund.

In order to promote investigations into all matters connected with, or bearing on, the causes, prevention, and treatment of cancer and malignant disease, steps shall be taken—

(1) To provide, extend, equip, and maintain laboratories to be devoted to cancer research.
(2) To encourage researches on the subject of cancer within the United Kingdom or in the British dominions beyond the seas.

(3) To assist in the development of cancer research in various hospitals and institutions approved by the Executive Committee.

(4) And generally to provide means for systematic investigation into the causes, prevention, and

treatment of cancer.

Should the objects of the fund be attained by the discovery of the cause and nature of cancer and of an effective method of treatment, the Royal Colleges, with the consent of the Trustees, shall be empowered to utilize the fund either (a) for equipping with the necessities for such treatment such hospitals as they may select, or (b) for forwarding research into other diseases.

There shall be a President, Vice-Presidents, Trustees, Honorary Treasurer, General Committee,

and Executive Committee of the Fund.

The office of the fund shall (with the consent of the Royal Colleges) be at the Examination Hall, Victoria Embankment.

II.—The President, Vice-Presidents, Trustees, and Treasurer.

- -, and future Presidents shall be appointed by the General 1. The first President shall be -Committee.
- -, and future Vice-Presidents shall be appointed by 2. The first Vice-Presidents shall bethe General Committee.
 - 3. There shall be five trustees of the fund.
- 4. Of the first trustees, three may be nominated by the donors of sums of £1,000 and upwards and one each by the Royal Colleges of Physicians and of Surgeons.
- 5. In the event of vacancies occurring by death, resignation, or other cause, the General . Committee may nominate new trustees, and shall be called upon to do so in case the number shall fall below three.
- 6. All moneys other than annual grants or subscriptions, or sums specially given for definite objects, or under special conditions, shall be invested as capital in the names of the trustees.
- 7. The trustees shall pay over to the account of the Executive Committee all dividends on the invested trust funds as they fall due.
- 8. If in any year the income derived from the invested capital is insufficient to defrav the expenses authorized by the Executive Committee, the trustees shall, at the request of the Executive Committee, realize sufficient funds to raise such sum as may be requisite to cover such deficiency.
 - 9. The first Honorary Treasurer shall be -
- 10. In the event of a vacancy in the post of Honorary Treasurer, the General Committee shall appoint some person to that office.
 - 11. The Honorary Treasurer may be one of the trustees.
- 12. The Honorary Treasurer shall be responsible for the receipt of all moneys on behalf of the fund.
- 13. The Honorary Treasurer shall pay over to the trustees all sums received by him other than annual grants and subscriptions, and other than any sums specially given for definite objects or under special conditions, which sums he shall pay to the account of the Executive Committee.

III.-General Committee.

- 1. The General Committee shall consist of :-
 - (a) The President.
 - (b) The Vice-Presidents.
 - (c) The five Trustees.
 - (d) The Honorary Treasurer. (e) The Executive Committee.

 - (f) One Member to be nominated by the Local Government Board.

(g) One Member to be nominated by the Colonial Office.
(h) One Member to be nominated by the Royal Society.

- (i) One Member each nominated by the Royal College of Physicians of Edinburgh, the Royal College of Surgeons of Edinburgh, the Faculty of Physicians and Surgeons of Glasgow, the Royal College of Physicians of Ireland, and the Royal College of Surgeons in Ireland.
- (1) One Member each nominated by the Royal Veterinary College, London; the Royal Veterinary College, Edinburgh; and the Royal Veterinary College of Ireland.
 (k) Donors of sums of £1,000 and upwards, whether given in one sum or more.

With power to add to their number.

- 2. The General Committee shall nominate two Members of the Executive Committee, who shall hold office for three years, and shall be eligible for re-election.
- 3. The General Committee shall meet at least once a year to receive reports from the Executive Committee on the general progress of the research, an account of expenditure, and the audited financial statement, and at such times as they may be summoned by the Executive Committee.
- 4. The President shall summon a special meeting of the General Committee on receiving a requisition so to do signed by five members of the General Committee.

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The Members of the Executive Committee shall hold office for three years and shall be eligible for re-election.

- 2. The Executive Committee shall have control of the income of the Fund, which shallbe expended in furthering the objects stated in section I, including the assignment of funds.
 - (a) For the erection or extension of laboratories, or for the equipment of any existing laboratory in which investigations are, or shall be, pursued;
 - (b) For grants to individual workers in laboratories or elsewhere;
 - (c) For investigations other than those in laboratories;
 - (d) For the collection of statistical, dietetic, topographical, and other information;
 - (e) For the salaries of any officials who may be appointed.
- 3. The Executive Committee shall be charged with the general supervision and management of the arrangements to carry out the objects of the Fund, and particularly:—
 - (a) They shall appoint the Working and Consultative Staff under such conditions as they may think desirable.
 - (b) They may appoint a General Superintendent of the investigations, who may be Director of the Central Laboratory, and such Assistants as may be considered necessary.
 - (c) They shall draw up the regulations under which the work of the staff shall be conducted in such rooms as may be placed at their disposal by the Royal Colleges, or elsewhere.
 - (d) They may seek the advice of the Members of the Working and Consultative Staff on any questions relating to the objects of the Fund, and may appoint Committees to conduct investigations, or to collect statistics and information, and may assign funds for the expenses of these investigations and for the remuneration of the members of these committees.
 - (e) They may appoint a Secretary or other official to conduct the correspondence, summon and attend the meetings, keep the accounts, write the minutes, &c.
 - (f) They may make arrangements for investigating methods of treatment in cases of cancer and malignant disease.
 - (g) They may make arrangements to establish a system of correspondence with foreign and colonial laboratories and workers.
 - (h) And generally they shall make such other arrangements as may seem to them best for the thorough investigation of this disease in all its aspects.
- 4. The Executive Committee shall be required to report their proceedings from time to time to the General Committee.

V .- Working and Consultative Staff.

- 1. The Working staff may consist of :-
 - (a) A General Superintendent of the investigation who may be the Director of the Central Laboratory.
 - (b) Assistants to the General Superintendent and Director.
 - (c) Any other persons who may be appointed to make special investigations.
- 2. The Consultative Staff shall consist of persons skilled in scientific investigations, representatives of various Home and Colonial Government Departments, Physicians and Surgeons attached to Hospitals, Statistical Experts, and others appointed by the Executive Committee.
- 3. The Consultative Staff may receive fees for attendance at meetings and may be remunerated for any services performed in connection with the objects of the Fund, on such conditions as the Executive Committee may determine.

Cancer Research Fund.

The idea of forming a Cancer Research Fund in England with the object of investigating the cause, nature, and treatment of Cancer originated in October, 1901, in some conversations between a private gentleman and a member of the Council of the Royal College of Surgeons of England.

It was confidently anticipated by this gentleman that through his own influence, in the City of London and elsewhere, he would be able to obtain, within a very short period, £100,000 or £150,000 for the establishment of such a Fund.

It was then, as it still is, thought that £100,000 at least is necessary, because of the great complexity and difficulty of the undertaking, and because of the great length of time all such scientific investigations require for their prosecution and verification. It was intended, therefore, to raise a sum of money, the interest on which would suffice, or nearly suffice, for the annual working expenses, that the capital should be invested in the names of five Trustees, and that in the happy event of the investigation proving successful, the Fund should subsequently be employed either in furthering the prevention of Cancer, and for the continuance of the treatment of poor persons afflicted with the disease, or for the scientific investigation of other diseases and their treatment.

The two Royal Colleges were requested to take control of the investigation, and they consented to do so on condition that the money was forthcoming in the manner stated, and without any appeal for funds being made either by, or in the names of, the Royal Colleges.

Unfortunately the gentleman referred to was taken seriously ill almost immediately after this understanding with the Royal Colleges; and his death followed in the early part of the Spring of 1902, without his having been able to bring the matter under the notice of his official and private friends

It was not, however, allowed to drop, and promises of donations of £5,000 each from the Goldsmith's Company, Mr. Bischoffsheim, and Messrs. Wernher, Beit and Company were shortly obtained. Further, an appeal letter was published in "The Times" of April 18th, signed by Adeline, Duchess of Bedford, and seventeen other influential ladies and gentlemen, and the cause was warmly advocated by "The Times" in "Leading" and "Special" articles.

As soon as £30,000 were in hand, the two Royal Colleges consented to make a start in the investigation, though recognizing the fact that with so small a fund, it would be imperative to spend the capital itself, and that thus the period over which the research could be maintained, as well as the scope of the research itself, would have to be limited.

The Scheme was set going by the Royal Colleges in July last (1902). The Executive Committee appointed to carry out the administration of the Fund consists of the Presidents of the Royal College of Physicians and of the Royal College of Surgeons, the Director of the Royal Veterinary College, the Professor of Pathology of the University of Cambridge, and representatives of the Royal Society, and of other important bodies.

The General Committee consists of donors of £1,000 and upwards, of representatives of the Colonial Office, of the Local Government Board, and of various other Public Bodies.

His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales consented to become President of the Fund, and His Majesty the King has graciously allowed his name to be added as Patron.

The important position of Superintendent of Cancer Research was filled in October last, by the appointment of Dr. E. F. Bashford. Dr. Bashford has made a thorough investigation of the work done on the Continent, and is now in communication with scientific workers in the Colonies, and in the United States.

The investigation has already become active in several directions. A Statistical Committee, consisting of well-known experts and of representatives from the Colonial Office, is fully engaged in considering the best methods of statistical investigation, both in this country and abroad. A Pathological Committee is also engaged in studying the subject of Cancer in animals—a field of enquiry which up to the present has not been cultivated. An endeavour is being made to collect animals suffering from Cancer, and to keep them on a farm to be provided for the purpose, with a view to the investigation as to heredity, diet, and treatment. This part of the research must necessarily be an expensive and an extensive one; but it is believed that the knowledge to be obtained from this study will be of such a character as to fully justify the outlay.

Another branch of the investigation is the careful examination of the records of malignant disease in the large hospitals. From this investigation, reliable Pathological data of considerable importance will, it is hoped, be obtained, indicating the lines to follow, in more extended enquiries, into the incidence of the disease as it occurs in this country, in India, and throughout the Colonies. It is the wish of the Committee to avail itself of all sources of information, and of the services of all who are willing to aid the research, whether in this country, in India, in the Colonies, or in foreign countries.

It has been calculated that in order to thoroughly carry on the research in its various branches, without break or loss of continuity, £3,000 a year at least is required. At the present time only a little over £50,000 has been received, but it is hoped that public-spirited men in India and in the British Colonies will assist the efforts made in the United Kingdom to raise the necessary capital.

It is the desire of the Executive Committee to make the objects of the Fund widely known to all British subjects, whether in India or in the Colonies, with a view to enlisting their interest in the scientific objects, as well as in the pecuniary position, of the Fund.

RULES REFERRED TO.

VILLAGE WORKS Section 6, Sub-section 1).

1. Paths and Roads.—The Village Committee shall decide what village paths and roads are to be constructed and maintained within its jurisdiction, and shall fix the breadth, not exceeding 12 ft., to which each path or road is to be cut and the course it is to take.

2. Encroachment on Roads.—No person shall block up, obstruct, or interfere with or encroach upon, any village path or road, either constructed or in course of construction.

3. Injury to Village Property.-No person shall destroy, damage, or deface in any way

any village path, bridge, edanda, ambalama, or any village property whatsoever.

4. Wells for Drinking Water.—The Village Committee may, after giving due notice thereof, set apart certain wells and spouts to be used for obtaining water for drinking purposes only, and no one shall bathe or wash clothes at wells so set apart.

5. Protection of Wells.—The owners of land in which wells are situated shall surround such wells with a fence or wall to such height as may be ordered by the chief headman of the district.

6. Ferries.—The Village Committee shall prepare a list of village ferries constructed, regulated, or protected under this Ordinance, and may lease out the right to work such ferries. The hire for the conveyance of passengers, animals, and goods shall be in accordance with the following rates at such ferries:-

Places for the Slaughter of Cattle, Goats, &c .- No licensed butcher shall slaughter cattle, goat, sheep, or swine, except in places assigned or approved of by the Village Committee.

Schools (Section 6, Sub-section 2)

8. Establishment of Schools.—At the request (by petition to the Assistant Government Agent) of the parents or guardians of twenty-five or more children for the establishment of a school, or if the Committee report to the Assistant Government Agent that a site has been fixed upon for a school and there is likely to be a good attendance, the Assistant Government Agent shall, if he thinks fit, make application to the Director of Public Instruction for a schoolmaster, and the necessary furniture free of charge to the villagers.

Instruction for a schoolmaster, and the necessary furniture free of charge to the villagers.

9. Attendance.—All parents or guardians who live within 3 miles of a village school established under the Village Communities' Ordinances, or of any village school to which the Village Committee shall extend this rule, shall send such of their male children as are between the ages of seven and fourteen to such school at least four days in each week, or until they have passed the 5th standard.

10. List of Children.—It shall be the duty of the headman of any village included within the limits mouthing of the prepare and forward appropriate on the force.

within the limits mentioned in rule 9 to prepare and forward annually on or before January 15 to the proper schoolmaster, through the Village Committee, a list of all children living in that village who are between seven and fourteen years of age, giving the names of their parents or guardians.

Absentees and Irregular Attendance.—It shall be the duty of the schoolmaster to forward to the Committee the names of the parents or guardians of any children described in this list who have been improperly absent from school or who have been unpunctual in attendance.

FISHERIES (Section 6, Sub-section 3).

12. Killing Fish by Poison.—No person shall put poison or dynamite into water for

the purpose of killing fish.

13. Fishing near Vihares.—No person shall fish in pools or waters near vihares, pansalas, or other places in which it has hitherto not been the custom to fish.

CATTLE (Section 6, Sub-section 6).

14. Stray Cattle, &c.—All cattle found straying in public paths or places may be seized by the village headman and brought before the Village Committee.

15. Disposal of Cattle seized.—Notice of such seizure shall be given to any known claimant of such animals. If not claimed within ten days, the animal may be sold by the Gansabhawa.

16. Tying Cattle in Thoroughfares.-No person shall tie his cattle so as to obstruct a public thoroughfare.

CATTLE DISEASE (Section 6, Sub-section 6).

17. Segregation of Diseased Cuttle.—The owner or person in charge of any animal attacked with any contagious or infectious disease shall segregate it, and give immediate

notice to the headman of the village in which the animal may then be.

18. Removal of affected Animals to Hospital Sheds.—The owner or person in charge of cattle, if directed so to do by the village headman, shall at once have an animal affected with any contagious disease removed to a well-ventilated hospital shed and leave it in charge of a person appointed by the headman to tend, feed, and treat it.

19. Disinfectants.—The headman shall forthwith apply to the Chairman of the Committee for a supply of disinfectants and medicines.

20. Cattle in infected Areas to be kept tethered .- In every village in which cattle disease exists or has within ten days previous existed, and in every village within a radius of 3 miles, all cattle owners and persons in charge of cattle shall keep their animals tethered or securely pen them so that they cannot stray. No one shall, however, tether any animal near a road or near any public place.

21. Removal of Animals from infected Areas.—No animals shall be brought into or

removed from any villages mentioned in rule 20.

22. Burial of Carcases.—It shall be the duty of every owner or person in charge of deceased cattle to burn or bury at a depth of 6 ft the carcase, dung, litter, &c., of any diseased animal, and also to disinfect the spot with disinfectants provided by the headman,

and to thoroughly disinfect himself before he approaches healthy cattle.

23. Disposal of Carcases found unburied.— Every person who, within an infected area. finds the carcases of any cattle lying dead and unburied shall report the same to the

nearest headman, who shall forthwith cause it to be buried in manner aforesaid.

24. Disinterring Carcases.—No person shall disinter the carcase of any animal which died from infectious or contagious disease, or remove the flesh or hide or other parts of the carcase of such animal.

25. Inoculation.—Owners of cattle in an infected herd or village shall, subject to the advice of the Government Veterinary Surgeon, or on the orders of the Chairman of the Village Committee, have their cattle inoculated or subjected to approved treatment at any spot selected by the Government Veterinary Surgeon or his subordinates.

26. Segregation after Recovery. - Cattle that have recovered from an infectious or contagious disease shall not be allowed to mix with the healthy herd until fourteen days

have elapsed after complete recovery.

BOUNDARIES (Section 6, Sub-section 7).

27. Boundaries of Private Lands.-The boundaries of private lands shall be marked by fences, ditches, stones, or posts.

Destruction of Boundary Marks .- No person shall wilfully destroy or injure any boundary mark.

Nuisances (Section 6, Sub-section 8).

Scavenging.-The occupier of every house or land, or if unoccupied, the owner,

shall keep such premises clean.

30. Disposal of Rubbish. -No person shall put filth, rubbish, timber, mats, or anything else on the road or into the road drains, nor keep carts thereon, except during the time of loading or unloading, nor allow children who are too young to take care of themselves to

31. Obscene Drawings and Writings .- No person shall publish any obscene writing or make any obscene drawing likely to cause annoyance to others or to the public. No person

shall sing or recite in or near any public place any obscene song or ballad.

32. Throwing Stones and Filth. - No person shall throw stones or filth at another's house or into another's compound.

33. Committing Nuisance.—No person shall go for any call of nature in any public place where there are no public latrines provided, or by the side of any road or in any place visible to the public.

34. Removal of Overhanging Trees, &c. - The owners of any trees overhanging any public road or path shall cause such trees or the branches of such trees to be cut off when directed to do so by the Chairman of the Village Committee. In default the Arachchi shall cause the work to be done.

35. Burial of Dead Animals. - No owner or tenant, not within an infected area, shall

fail to bury the carcase of any dead animals which may be found on his premises.

36. Unwholesome Food Stuff.—No person shall expose for sale any articles of food which are unfit for human consumption.

37. Prohibition of Burial near Dwelling-houses.—No dead body shall be buried within 50 fathoms of a dwelling-house, or in any place where annoyance may be caused to persons living in the neighbourhood.

38. Duty of Burial by nearest Relative.—In the case of the death of any person, the occupier of the premises where the death took place or, in his absence, the nearest adult male relative of the deceased shall be responsible for the proper burial of the corpse.

39. Or by Village Headman.-In the absence or default of such occupier or nearest relative, the village headman shall cause such body to be buried.

40. Defilement, &c., of Wells. -No person shall defile a well, ela, or any public bathingplace, or obstruct the supply of water from a well, spout, or any other water-course.

Obscene Language (Section 6, Sub-section 9).

41. Obscene Language.—No person shall use obscene or abusive language calculated to provoke a breach of the peace.

SPRING GUNS, &c. (Section 6, Sub-section 11).

42. Spring Guns. -- No person shall set spring guns or make pitfalls, except by permission of the village headman.

AMBLING AND COCK-FIGHTING (Section 6, Sub-section 12).

43. Cock-fighting.—No person shall train cocks for fighting, nor go about with fighting

cocks, nor take part in cock-fighting in any place whatsoever.

44. Instruments for Gaming.—No person shall have about his person or in his possession at any place to which the public have access with or without payment any instrument or appliance for gambling

45. Presence at a Gaining Place.—No person shall be present at a place where unlawful

gaming is carried on.
46. Raids on Gambling Dens.—The Chairman of the Village Committee or the President of the Village Tribunal, on receiving information that gambling is carried on in any place, shall issue a search warrant to any person he may deem fit to enter such place and search for and seize any article used for any game of chance, and produce any such articles before the Village Committee or Village Tribunal.

VILLAGE LABOUR (Section 6, Sub-section 17 a, b, c).

47. Village Labour.—All males, not being Europeans or Burghers, who are liable to perform labour under the Thoroughfares Ordinauce shall be bound to perform three days' labour in each year for the construction, maintenance, and improvement of works referred to in sub-sections 1, 2, 13, 16, and 17 of section 6 of Ordinance No. 24 of 1889. Such labour may be commuted by a money payment of 50 cents before July 31 of each year, or by a payment of Re. 1 after such date.

48. List of Persons liable to Labour.—A list of persons liable under rule 47 shall be prepared by the Arachchies of the different wasamas and sent to the Ratemahatmaya of

the division before April 1 of each year.

Notice to Labour.—The Arachchies of the respective wasamas shall give eight days' notice to the persons who are liable to perform labour in their wasamas, specifying date, time, and place. Any person so noticed to perform labour shall be compelled to work at any place within 6 miles of his residence. A list of persons who fail to work shall be prepared by the headmen who supervise the work and forwarded at once to the Korala of the division.

50. Commutation of Labour.—All persons who commute in lieu of labour shall pay 50 cents or Re. 1, as the case may be, to the Arachchi, who will give them receipts bearing his signature. The moneys thus recovered shall be deposited in the Kachcheri to the credit of the Village Committee Fund.

Lottering (Section 6, Sub-section 18).

51. No person shall loiter in a thoroughfare or public place after 9 o'clock at night without a light and without sufficient cause.

CULTIVATION (Section 6, Sub-section 21).

52. Repairs of Dams and Water-courses.—At the cultivation season the Vel-vidane shall issue notice to the proprietors of paddy lands to begin the usual works for the repair of dams and water-courses and for the construction of fences for the joint cultivation of their range of fields, and such proprietor shall, without unnecessary delay,

proceed to perform the several works aforesaid.

53. Distribution of Water. — The Vel-vidane shall see to the just and equitable distribution of water to the different fields, and no person shall furtively lead water into

his field by cutting or piercing the dam above it.

54. Cutting Amunas.—No person shall cut an amuna under any pretence whatever without the permission of the Village Committee.

55. Limitary Dums.—Limitary dams separating the fields of different proprietors shall

not be cleared, renewed, or repaired, except in the presence of the parties concerned, or except in the presence of the Vel-vidane after due notice to such parties.

except in the presence of the ver-vidane after due notice to such parties.

56. Fencing.—The work of fencing a range of fields shall be carried on simultaneously on notice given by the Vel vidane by the joint labour of all the proprietors to the extent each person holds or cultivates, and shall be completed within six days after notice as aforesaid has been given.

57. Repair of Fences.—Every fence shall be repaired and maintained in good order by the proper person, and shall not be removed, except on the order of the Vel-vidane and

except until the work of harvesting has been completed.

58. Sowing.—On a range of fields being fully prepared for sowing the Vel-vidane shall issue notice to the proprietors to sow, and each proprietor shall sow his portion within one week from the date of such notice, unless the weather or peculiar position of his field renders it impossible for him to sow within the prescribed time.

59. Aqueducts.-Aqueducts shall be cleared and maintained by joint labour of all the proprietors of the fields irrigated in proportion to the extent of land owned by each.

60. Driving in Cattle after Reaping.—No owner of a paddy field situated in a range shall drive in cattle to his land after reaping until all the fields in the range have been reaped and crops removed.

61. Neglect of Cultivation.—If the cultivation of any field be neglected or abandoned by its owner, or unreasonably delayed after notice under rule 58 shall have been given by the Vel-vidane, the Village Committee may select any person to cultivate the field, and such person shall give the ground share to the owner.

62. Construction of Dams.—All dams or other works required for preventing overflow

of streams shall be executed by the joint labour of all the proprietors interested in the proportion to the extent of land held by each after due notice by the Vel-vidane.

63. Water for New Asweddumas.—No person shall divert water to asweddumize new land without the consent of the owners of the fields.

64. Threshing-floors.—Before the crops of a range of fields are about to be reaped, the threshing-floor of the range is to be put into proper order by the joint labour of the landowners concerned after due notice from the Vel-vidane.

65. Suwandiram.—The Vel-vidane shall be entitled to suwandiram or commission of 1 per cent, on the produce of all the paddy lands, except those sown with el-wi, within his subdivision. Such commission is to be paid at the threshing-floors before any grain is removed.

66. Power of Gan-arachchies.—In villages where no Vel-vidane is appointed, the Ganarachchi shall have the powers and privileges of a Vel-vidane under rules 52 to 65.
