LIGHTING REGULATIONS.

THE orders made by me, published in the *Ceylon Government Gazette Extraordinary* of Wednesday, March 14, 1917, are hereby cancelled, and the following orders substituted:—

Orders of the Inspector-General of Police as to Lights in the Municipal Limits of Colombo and in the Area adjoining the Seashore between Colombo and Mount Lavinia.

In pursuance of the power conferred upon me by regulations 1 and 2 published under Proclamation dated March 21, 1916, and published in the *Government Gazette* No. 6,798 of June 5, 1916, I hereby make the following order:—

- (1) All lights, whether public or private, which if unobscured would be visible from the sea, shall be extinguished, or, in the case of indoor lights, obscured so as to be invisible from outside. Provided that this shall not apply to indispensable railway lights, or to any light which is approved by a competent Naval or Military authority.
- (2) The use of powerful lamps on motor and other vehicles is prohibited. Headlights shall not be lighted on motor vehicles. Side lamps and the tail light only shall be lighted. In the case of a motor vehicle not having side lamps, the head lamps may be lighted, provided the reflector is removed or totally obscured.
- (3) All lights not visible from the sea, whether public or private, in any street or place outside a building in any part of the Municipal limits of Colombo, shall be extinguished or shaded in such a manner that the light is thrown downwards.
- (4) All indoor lights not visible from the sea, whether public or private, in any part of the Municipal limits of Colombo shall be shaded so that a direct light is invisible from outside.
