#### SCHEDULE.

#### Chapter VII.—Hours of Opening and Closing.

- 1. Taverns other than Arrack Taverns.—From the date hereof taverns other than arrack taverns shall remain open between the hours of 6 a.m. and 8 r.m., and shall be kept closed at all other hours. The Government Agent may, with the approval of the Excise Commissioner, extend the hour of closing to suit local conditions, and shall enter such hour of closing in the license. No sale shall take place between the time at which the tavern is required to be closed at night and 6 a.m. next morning.
- 2. Arrack Taverns.—Anything in condition No. 6 of the general conditions applicable to all excise licenses published in the Government Gazette No. 6,615 of March 13, 1914, to the contrary notwithstanding, arrack taverns shall on and after October 1, 1917, remain open between the hours of 8 a.m. and 6.30 r.m., and shall be kept closed at all other hours. The Government Agent may, after consulting the Advisory Committee, extend the hour of closing any such taverns in towns, and for special reasons outside towns, to such hour as he may fix, not being later than the closing hour of such taverns in April, 1917, and in no case later than 9 r.m., and shall enter the hour of closing in the license. No sale shall take place between the time at which the tavern is required to be closed at night and 8 a.m. next morning.

- 4. Separate tenders must be made for the several rents as shown above, both the name and number of the rent being inserted in the tender.

2. All tenders should be in duplicate and sealed under cover, and should be addressed to the Chairman of the Tender Board, Office of the Controller of Revenue, Colombo.

Tenders should either be deposited in the tender box in the Office of the Controller of Revenue, or be sent through

the post.

- Tenders should be marked "Tender for Supply of Petrol to the Railway Department" in the left hand corner of the envelope, and should reach the Office of the Controller of Revenue not later than midday on Tuesday, June 5, 1917.
- The tenders are to be made upon forms which will be supplied upon application at the Office of the General Manager of the Railway, and no tender will be considered unless it is on the recognized form.
- 6. A deposit of Rs. 25 will be required to be made either at the Treasury or Kachcheri, and a receipt produced for the same before any form of tender is issued. Should any person decline to enter into the contract and bond, or fail to furnish approved security, within ten days of receiving notice in writing from the Head of the Department, or his duly authorized representative, that his tender has been accepted, such deposit will be forfeited to the Crown, and the defaulter will render himself liable to be included in the list of defaulting contractors precluded from having any concern in a Government contract. All other deposits will be returned upon signature of a contract.

7. Each tender must be accompanied by a letter signed by two responsible persons, whose addresses must be given, engaging to become security for the due fulfilment of the contract. The successful tenderer must lodge a cash

security of Rs. 1,000.

All alterations or erasures in tenders should bear the initials of the tenderers, otherwise the tenders may be

treated as informal and rejected.

No tender will be considered unless in respect of it all the conditions herein laid down have been strictly fulfilled. Any offers received containing conditions oustide the specification will be rejected without question.

accepting any portion of a tender.

11. Before tender forms are supplied to persons wishing to tender, they will have to satisfy the General Manager or person delegated by him that they are in a position to execute the contract in a satisfactory manner, and for this purpose they must be prepared to produce documentary or other evidence if called for.

- 12. The quantity of petrol to be supplied during the above-mentioned year shall be in accordance with one of the following conditions, viz.:-
  - (a) Not less than 40,000 gallons or more than 70,000 gallons, at the discretion of the General Manager of the Railway.
  - (b) 40,000 gallons, 15 per cent. more or less, at the discretion of the General Manager. The contractor to undertake to increase this quantity on not less than four months' notice in writing from the General Manager of the Railway.
- Tenderers must specify the commercial name of the petrol tendered for, and must deposit with the General Manager of the Railway a sample consisting of not less than four gallons in a securely sealed receptacle. Should any tender be accepted, the afore-mentioned sample in connection therewith shall be submitted to the Government Analyst for the purpose of analysis, and the balance remaining shall be re-sealed and retained by the General Manager of the Railway as the standard sample for the purposes of the contract.

14. Tenderers should state in the tender forms the price per gallon, in Ceylon currency, for delivery to the General Manager of the Railway over ship's side in Colombo harbour, and also the additional amount to be paid per gallon for delivery at the Railway Stores, as defined in paragraph 15 below.

15. The successful tenderer (hereinafter called "the contractors") shall undertake to provide at least six shipments of petrol during the continuance of the contract, whereby sufficient petrol may be delivered to the General Manager of the Railway over ship's side in Colombo harbour to enable the Railway petrol store to be kept properly stocked; and should the contractors fail to carry out this undertaking, they shall supply sufficient petrol from their own store as will enable the Railway petrol store to be kept properly stocked.

16. The petrol shall be delivered either in substantially constructed steel drums, or in hermetically sealed tins securely packed in strongly constructed wooden cases. In either case the receptacles must be so constructed and secured as to prevent any possibility of leakage or damage during transport by train, and the contractors must satisfy the General Manager of the Railway that they are so constructed and secured. The tenderers shall specify on the tender form whether they require the empty receptacles

to be returned.

17. The General Manager of the Railway shall be at liberty to issue petrol to other Government Departments from stocks supplied by the contractors under the conditions of the contract.

18. The contractor shall not assign or transfer the contract or any interest therein without the permission in

writing of the General Manager of the Railway.

The price per gallon paid by the General Manager of the Railway shall include cost, insurance, and freight, and all other expenses up to delivery either over ship's side or at the Railway Stores, as the case may be, as defined in clause 15 above, and it shall also include the use of the receptacles in which the petrol is delivered. Should the contractors specify that the empty receptacles are to be returned to them, the General Manager of the Railway will undertake that they shall not be used for any other purpose; and that they will be returned as promptly as possible to the contractor.

20. Payments for the petrol will be made within 14 days of delivery, and the General Manager of the Railway or his representative will certify that the petrol is for Government service to enable the contractors to obtain remission of

import duty.

21. If any of the petrol supplied is objected to by the Locomotive, Carriage, and Wagon Superintendent or the Railway Storekeeper as not being of the quality contracted for, or as being inferior in quality to the standard sample, and if such objection be confirmed by the Government Analyst at the expense of the contractors, the General Manager of the Railway shall be at liberty to deduct from the price of such petrol such sums as he may consider justifiable by reason of the inferior quality of the petrol, or he may reject such petrol. Whenever any petrol is so rejected, the contractors shall, at their own cost and expense, forthwith remove such rejected petrol, and pending

such removal the petrol shall remain and be at the risk of the contractors, and the contractors shall, in addition to any other penalty, be liable to refund to the General Manager of the Railway the cost incurred in the handling of such rejected petrol, and the amount of the cost so incurred, when certified under the hand of the General Manager of the Railway, shall be deemed final and conclusive for the

purpose of such refund.

22. Subject to the provisions of clause 25 below, if the contractors shall at any time fail to supply the petrol ordered, or should any petrol supplied be rejected as provided for in clause 21 and be not promptly replaced by the contractors with petrol of an acceptable quality, the General Manager of the Railway shall be at liberty to purchase elsewhere, at whatever price he may deem fit, such quantity of petrol as the contractors may have failed to supply; and should the petrol so purchased by the General Manager of the Railway cost more than the price agreed upon in the contract, the contractors shall be liable to pay to the General Manager of the Railway the full amount of such excess cost, together with all expenses attending the purchase and procuring of the same.

23. Any payments for which the contractors may be liable under the conditions of clauses 21 and 22 shall be deducted by the General Manager of the Railway from any moneys which may be due to the contractors under the contract, provided that nothing in the contract shall affect the General Manager of the Railway's right to recover such

payments by action at law.

24. Subject to the provisions of clause 25 below, if the contractors fail to supply petrol on the conditions laid down in this notice or in the contract, or shall supply petrol inferior in quality to the standard sample, or shall commit a breach of any of the covenants on the contractors' part to be observed and performed, then and in any of the said cases the General Manager of the Railway shall be at liberty, by notice in writing, to forthwith determine the contract, and thereupon the contractors shall be liable to pay to the General Manager of the Railway all cost and expenses incurred by reason of such failure to supply petrol or by the supplying of petrol of inferior quality or by such breach of covenant, and shall in addition be liable to forfeit the sum of Rs. 1,000, which must be deposited by the contractors as security for the due performance of the terms of the contract.

### VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Weekly Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended May 5, 1917.

Births.—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 128 (1 European, 10 Burghers, 72 Sinhalese, 18 Tamils, 16 Moors, 4 Malays, and 7 Others). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on January 1, 1917, viz., 263,629) was 25·3, as against 24·5 in the preceding week, 16·4 in the corresponding week of last year, and 21·6 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 123 (2 Europeans, 4 Burghers, 57 Sinhalese, 28 Tamils, 23 Moors, 4 Malays, and 5 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 24·3, as against 24·7 in the previous week, 26·0 in the corresponding week of last year, and 27·1 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 123 total deaths, 32 were of infants under one year of age, as against 30 in the preceding week, 18 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 25 the average for last year.

Stillbirths.—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 8.

Principal Causes of Death.—Twenty-one deaths from Pneumonia were registered, as against 18 in the previous week and 15 the weekly average for last yeer. Of these, 4 were in Pettah, 4 in Maradana, 3 in St. Paul's, 3 in Kotahena, 3 in Wellawatta, 2 in Slave Island, 1 in New Bazaar, and 1 in Kollupitiya. Two deaths from Bronchitis were registered.

- 2. Fifteen deaths from *Phthisis* were registered, as against 10 in the previous week and 16 the weekly average for last year. Of these, 4 were in Maradana (including 1 death of a non-resident in hóspital), 3 in New Bazaar, 2 in St. Paul's, 2 in Kotahena, 2 in Slave Island, 1 in San Sebastian, and 1 in Kollupitiya.
- 3. Three deaths from *Plague* were registered, as against 5 in the previous week and 4 the weekly average for last year. Of these, 1 was in Pettah, 1 in Slave Island, and 1 in Wellawatta. Four cases were reported, as against 5 in the previous week.
- 4. One death from *Enteric Fever* was registered (in Slave Island), as against 11 in the previous week and 3 the weekly average for last year.
- 5. Thirteen deaths from Infantile Convulsions were registered, 10 from Debility, 7 from Enteritis, 1 from Dysentery, and 50 from Other Causes.
- 6. There were reported 41 cases of *Measles*, as against 37 in the previous week; and 33 cases of *Chickenpox*, as against 56 in the previous week.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 79.8°, against 82.3° in the preceding week and 81.4° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29.838 in., against 29.849 in. in the preceding week and 29.809 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 4.77 in., against 0.62 in. in the preceding week and 6.30 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.
