WHEREAS by Schedule II. of "The Courts Ordinance, 1889," it is provided that the Police Court and Court of Requests established within and for the divisions of Gampola and Nuwara Eliya-Hatton shall be holden at Gampola and Pussellawa and at Nuwara Eliya, Hatton, and Nawalapitiya, respectively:

Now know Ye that We, the Governor, in exercise of the powers in Us vested by section 55 of the said Ordinance, do by this Our Proclamation appoint, in substitution for the places mentioned as aforesaid, Gampola, Pussellawa, and Nawalapitiya within the said division of Gampola and Nuwara Eliya and Hatton within the said division of Nuwara Eliya-Hatton as convenient places at which the Police Court and Court of Requests established within and for those divisions respectively shall be held.

Those parts of Ambagamuwa and Pasbage korales of the revenue division of Uda Bulatgama and Pallepone korale of Kotmale which are contained within the following boundaries:— <i>North.</i> —From Helboda trigonometrical station, commonly known as Helbodakanda, along the boundary between Udapalata and Kotmale and the northern boundary of Nugawela estate to Kotmale-ganga up to where it falls into Mahaweli-ganga, thence along the Mahaweli-ganga to the 19th milepost, Nawalapitiya-Kandy road, thence from Getahadeniya to Polgolla trigonometrical station, the boundary between Udapalata and Uda Bulatgama divisions. <i>West.</i> —From Polgolla trigonometrical station to Stenshall's trigonometrical station (boundary between Udapalata and Uda Bulatgama), along the northern boundary of Galamuduna estate to Palanpitiya-ela, thence along the eastern boundary of Sembawatta and Ingoya estates to Unugala trigonometrical station (boundary between Uda Bulatgama and Pata Bulatgama), thence in a straight line to Kalugala trigonometrical station, and from thence to Mudamanahena trigonometrical station, and thence to Kiripanagala trigonometrical station. <i>South.</i> —From Kiripanagala trigonometrical station in a straight line to Kelweherakanda trigonometrical station.

East.—The road from Laxapana to Ginigathena to its crossing near Mahaweli-ganga, thence along the Mahaweli-ganga to the 7th milepost near Kenilworth, thence in a straight line to the northern boundary of Penrhos, thence to Dahanayaka trigonometrical station, and from thence to Kuruwaka-oya, and along the Kuruwaka-oya to the southern boundary of Queensberry estate, from thence along the southern boundary of Queensberry estate to Dimbula Gap, from Dimbula Gap along the estate boundary of Queensberry, Gongala, Kolapatana, and Hunukotuwa estates to the eastern boundary of Dombagastalawa where it meets the boundary between the Udapone and Pallepone korales, from thence along the boundary between Udapone and Pallepone korales to Kotmale-ganga, from Kotmale-ganga along Katukitule-ela to Helboda trigonometrical station.

WHEREAS in pursuance of the said "The Trading with the Enemy (Amendment No. 2) Ordinance, No. 13 of 1916," We did by Our Proclamation, published in the *Government Gazette* of August 25, 1916, publish the Royal Proclamations and Orders of the Lords in Council with the Statutory List of persons and bodies of persons with whom trading was prohibited issued under "The Trading with the Enemy (Extension of Powers) Act, 1915" :

And whereas by Our Proclamations, published in the *Government Gazette* of September 8, 15, and 29, October 20, November 10, and December 8, 1916, and January 12 and 26, February 16, March 16 and 23, April 20, and May 4, 1917, We did publish subsequent Orders of the Lords in Council with Statutory Lists, and by Our Proclamation, published in the *Government Gazette* of May 4, 1917, We did amend the aforesaid Statutory Lists :

And whereas the Lords in Council have issued a further Order dated March 16, 1917 :

Now know Ye that We, the Governor of Ceylon, in pursuance of "The Trading with the Enemy (Amendment No. 2) Ordinance, No. 13 of 1916," aforesaid, do hereby publish for general information the aforesaid Order in Council dated March 16, 1917, appearing in the schedule hereto.

SCHEDULE.

Trading with the Enemy (Neutral Countries) Order (No. 28), 1916.

At the Council Chamber, Whitehall, March 16, 1917.

By the Lords of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty has been pleased, in exercise of the power in that behalf conferred on Him by section 1, sub-section 1, of the Trading with the Enemy (Extension of Powers) Act, 1915, by divers Proclamations, and in particular by a Proclamation dated May 23, 1916, entitled "The Trading with the Enemy (Statutory List) Proclamation, 1916, No. 3," to prohibit all persons or bodies of persons, incorporated or unincorporated, resident, carrying on business, or being in the United Kingdom, from trading with any of the persons or bodies of persons mentioned in the list contained in the last mentioned Proclamation :

And whereas by section 1, sub-section 2, of the said Act, it is provided that any list of persons and bodies of persons, incorporated or unincorporated, with whom such trading is prohibited by a Proclamation under the said Act may be varied or added to by an Order made by the Lords of the Council on the recommendation of a Secretary of State, such list as so varied or added to being in the last mentioned Proclamation referred to as the "Statutory List" :

And whereas the list contained in the last mentioned Proclamation has been varied and added to by subsequent Orders of Council :

And whereas there was this day read at the Board a recommendation from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs to the following effect :—

That the "Statutory List" of persons and bodies of persons, incorporated or unincorporated, with whom trading is prohibited, should be further amended by the variation and addition of the names set forth in the schedule hereto :

Now, therefore, Their Lordships, having taken the said recommendation into consideration, are pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the same be approved.

Whereof the Right Honourable Arthur James Balfour, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, the Controller of the Foreign Trade Department, and all other persons whom it may concern, are to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

NOTE (1).—All persons or firms resident, carrying on business, or being in the United Kingdom are prohibited from having any dealings with any of the persons or firms mentioned in this list, or in any list issued under the Trading with the Enemy (Statutory List) Proclamation, 1916, No. 3. A list consolidating all previous lists was published on February 16, 1917 (the Consolidating List No. 19a), which together with List No. 20 of March 2, 1917, and the list herewith annexed, contains all the names which up to this date are included in the Statutory List.

Additions to and variations in these lists will be published at intervals approximately of two weeks.

The lists are published in the *London Gazette* and reproduced in the Board of Trade Journal, and separate copies of all lists may be obtained at a small cost from the Superintendent of Publications, His Majesty's Stationery Office, Imperial House, Kingsway, W.C.

NOTE (2).—Where a person or firm mentioned in the list has more than one address in the same country, all dealings in that country with such person or firm are prohibited, even in cases where one only of the addresses is specifically mentioned.

NOTE (3).—Trading is prohibited under the Trading with the Enemy Proclamations of June 25 and November 10, 1915, with any person or firm of enemy nationality resident or carrying on business in China, Siam, Persia, Morocco, Liberia or Portuguese East Africa. Persons or firms in the United Kingdom are therefore prohibited from trading with any person or firm of enemy nationality in any of those countries, even though such person or firm is not mentioned by name in the Statutory List.

NOTE (4).—In order to minimize as far as possible any inconvenience which may be caused to British traders by the dislocation of export trade owing to the inclusion in the Statutory List of a former connection, the Foreign Trade Department is collecting and classifying the names of non-enemy firms who may be able to act as substitutes for firms mentioned in the Statutory List. A considerable amount of information is already available at the Foreign Trade Department, and it is in many cases possible to suggest the names of satisfactory substitutes without the necessity of referring the matter abroad. The Department is, however, prepared on application to inquire of His Majesty's Representatives abroad for the names of suitable substitutes. When the applicant wishes this done by telegraph, he is required to undertake to pay the cost of telegraphic correspondence. It would greatly facilitate the work of the Foreign Trade Department if applicants in making inquiries would specify the particular trade or trades for which substitutes are required.

NOTE (5).—The Statutory List for each country is telegraphed, on the day of issue, to His Majesty's Representative in that country, who is instructed to notify accordingly British Consular Officers, to whom persons abroad should apply for information as to names on the list. Persons and firms in the United Kingdom with agencies or branches abroad would, however, be well advised to furnish such agencies or branches with issues of the list as they appear. The lists for all countries in Central or South America are also telegraphed to His Majesty's Ambassador at Washington, who transmits them to H. M. Consul-General at New York and to other centres in the United States likely to be interested.

Dieting Students at the Government Training College, Colombo.

A.—For supplying food (uncooked).

B.—For supplying food and preparing (*i.e.*, cooked).

Under B the contractor would supply the necessary cooks, &c., and servants to serve the meal. That is 2 cooks (1 man and 1 woman), 10 servants (6 men and 4 women).

Men Students.

The meals are four in number:—

(a) Early tea	..	6.30 A.M.
(b) Breakfast	..	9.45 A.M.
(c) Tiffin	..	1.30 P.M.
(d) Dinner	..	7 P.M.

(a) Early tea comprises 1 cup of tea (1/16 oz.), milk and sugar (3/4 oz.), with plantains (2) and hoppers (2), large. 1-lb. tin of Milkmaid milk for all the tea.

(b) Breakfast, curry and rice: 3 curries and sambal. The curries are two kinds of vegetables (4 oz.), and either egg (1) or fish (dry or fresh) (2 1/2 oz.), coconut (1/2). (Parawa fish should be usually provided, or seer or mullet, not the common kinds of fish, *e.g.*, kelawalla.)

(c) Tiffin: 1 cup of tea (1/16 oz.), milk and sugar (3/4 oz.), 2 slices of bread (1 oz.) each, with jam 1 oz. or butter 1/2 oz. or cutlets (beef, 3 oz.). 1-lb. tin of Milkmaid milk for all the tea.

(d) Dinner, curry and rice: 3 curries and sambal. The curries are two kinds of vegetables (4 oz.)—not the same as those in the morning—and mutton (2 oz.) twice a week, beef (2 oz.) on the other occasions. There should be no bones or sinews in the meat; nor should buffalo beef be provided.

Ghee should not be used for coconut.

Rice should be *No. 1 muttusamba*, not *kallunda*.

Fish should not include head, tail, fins, or entrails.

Ash plantains should be provided, not green plantains; also the following vegetables and curry stuffs:—Drumsticks, potatoes, mellun, laffas, tomato, red dhall, snake gourd, long beans; sududuru, goraka, mahaduru, ginger, tamarind, cinnamon.

Women Students (English Class).

The meals are five in number:—

(a) Early tea	..	6.30 A.M.
(b) Breakfast	..	9.45 A.M.
(c) Tiffin	..	1.30 P.M.
(d) Tea	..	4.15 P.M.
(e) Dinner	..	7 P.M.

(a) Early tea comprises 1 cup of tea (1/16 oz.), milk and sugar (3/4 oz.), with plantains (2) and hoppers (2), large.

(b) Breakfast, curry and rice: 2 vegetables, fish or egg, and a sambal.

(c) Tiffin: 1 cup of tea, 2 slices of bread, with jam, butter, or cutlets.

(d) Evening tea: 1 cup of tea.

(e) Dinner: Same as for men students (English), save always mutton.

Women Students (Vernacular).

(a) Early tea: Same as for English students.

(b) Breakfast: No eggs. When eggs are supplied to English students, these get 3 vegetables.

(c) Tiffin: Same as for English students, except that these do not get cutlets, but get 2 plantains instead.

(d) Dinner: Same as for English students.

Sinhalese Tutors (Men).

Same as for students, except that at dinner the tutors get an extra 3 oz. of mutton or beef, slice of bread, and potato.

Servants (Men).

Curry and rice the same as the men students.

Servants (Women).

Curry and rice the same as Sinhalese women, also hoppers in the morning and other meals the same.

Re quantities, the scale drawn up for the men students may be taken to suit all cases.

VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Weekly Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended May 12, 1917.

Births.—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 113 (1 European, 11 Burghers, 62 Sinhalese, 20 Tamils, 16 Moors, 1 Malay, and 2 Others). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on January 1, 1917, viz., 263,629) was 22.4, as against 25.3 in the preceding week, 16.6 in the corresponding week of last year, and 21.6 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 126 (1 European, 6 Burghers, 57 Sinhalese, 31 Tamils, 21 Moors, 2 Malays, and 8 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 24.9, as against 24.3 in the previous week, 24.2 in the corresponding week of last year, and 27.1 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 126 total deaths, 38 were of infants under one year of age, as against 32 in the preceding week, 21 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 25 the average for last year.

Stillbirths.—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 10.

Principal Causes of Death.—Sixteen deaths from *Pneumonia* were registered, as against 21 in the previous week and 15 the weekly average for last year. Of these, 6 were in Maradana (including 4 deaths of non-residents in hospitals), 3 in Kotahena, 2 in New Bazaar, 2 in Wellawatta, 1 in Pettah, 1 in San Sebastian, and 1 in Kollupitiya. Two deaths from *Bronchitis* were registered.

2. Fifteen deaths from *Phthisis* were registered, same as in the previous week, against 16 the weekly average for last year. Of these, 5 were in Maradana (including 4 deaths of non-residents in hospitals), 3 in Kotahena, 3 in Slave Island, 2 in New Bazaar, 1 in San Sebastian, and 1 in St. Paul's.

3. Two deaths from *Enteric Fever* were registered, as against 1 in the previous week and 3 the weekly average for last year. Of these, 1 was in St. Paul's and the other in Maradana (of a non-resident in hospital).

4. One death from *Measles* was registered in Kollupitiya. None were registered in the previous week. Twenty-one cases were reported, as against 41 in the previous week.

5. No deaths from *Plague* were registered. Three were registered in the previous week, and the weekly average for last year was 4. Four cases were reported, same as in the previous week.

6. Fourteen deaths from *Debility* were registered, 13 from *Infantile Convulsions*, 11 from *Enteritis*, 3 from *Worms*, 2 from *Diarrhoea*, and 47 from *Other Causes*.

7. There were reported 12 cases of *Chickenpox*, as against 33 in the previous week. One case of *Smallpox* was reported from the Harbour.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 81.8°, against 79.8° in the preceding week and 81.8° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29.892 in., against 29.838 in. in the preceding week and 29.812 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 0.24 in., against 4.77 in. in the preceding week and 0.51 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.
