In the Name of His Majesty GEORGE THE FIFTH, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, King, Defender of the Faith.

### PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Sir John Anderson, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Knight Commander of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Ceylon, with the Dependencies thereof.

### JOHN ANDERSON.

HEREAS in pursuance of "The Necessaries of War Exportation Ordinance, No. 19 of 1914," We did by Our Proclamation, published in the Government Gazette of July 4, 1916, prohibit the exportation from Ceylon of articles to the extent therein specified:

And whereas by Our Proclamations, published in the Government Gazettes of August 4, September 1, 15, and 29, October 20 and 27, November 10, and December 8, 1916, and January 12, February 9, and March 9 and 16, 1917, We did make certain amendments in and additions to the schedule thereto:

Now know Ye that We, the Governor of Ceylon, in pursuance of the aforesaid Ordinance, do hereby make the following further amendments in and additions to the said schedule:-

(c) One-tenth in number of the above premia or prizes will be distributed among the holders of 298 bonds out of 30,000 of the bonds drawn annually in manner herein provided, on the day of each year, commencing from the day of , 1918.

Method of drawing.

- 11. The following shall be the method of drawing bonds annually for redemption and for participation in the premia or prizes:—
- (a) There shall be provided two revolving boxes marked A and B respectively (hereinafter referred to as box A and box B) well secured and completely closed, save for an opening covered by a door and lock, and sufficient in size to permit a man's arm being inserted through it into the box.

Shortly after the issue of all the bonds, a Committee, to be appointed by the Governor for that purpose by notification in the Government Gazette, shall meet at a place appointed by the Governor, and shall place or cause to be placed in their presence—

- (1) In the box A the numbers of all the bonds issued, each number being distinctly written or printed on a separate piece or disc of metal, bone, or paper (hereinafter called disc) of the same size, shape, colour, and appearance.
- (2) In the box B 298 discs similar as regards material, size, shape, colour, and appearance, but inscribed as follows:—

1 disc with the words "Rs. 15,000." " Rs. 7,500." do. 1 do. "Rs. 3,000." 20 discs, each with the words "Rs. 1,000." "Rs. 500." 50 do. " Rs. 75 300." đο. " Rs. 200." 150 do.

When all the discs shall have been so placed, still in the presence of the Committee, the doors of the boxes A and B shall be locked, and two or more seals produced by any member of the Committee shall be placed in such manner as to prevent their being opened without breaking or injuring the seals; the keys, together with specimen impressions of the seals affixed, shall be enclosed in an envelope, which shall be sealed in the same manner. The boxes A and B and the envelope shall then be delivered to the Treasurer, who shall deposit the said boxes and envelope in the vault of the Treasury.

- (b) In the following and subsequent years, on a day, and in the presence of a Committee, and at a place to be appointed by the Governor by notification in the Government Gazette, the Treasurer shall cause the said boxes and the said envelope to be produced, and the Committee, by examination, shall satisfy themselves as to the state of the locks and seals on the boxes and on the envelope. they have been in any manner tampered with, the Committee shall make a report of the facts to the Governor, leaving the boxes, envelope, and keys in the custody of the Treasurer. If they have not been tampered with, the said boxes shall be revolved so as to mix thoroughly the discs therein, the seals shall be broken, and the doors of both boxes opened. One member of the Committee shall then draw from the box A a disc, while another member shall simultaneously draw a disc from the box B. Similarly, 297 other discs shall be drawn from each of the boxes. As each disc is drawn a record shall be made of the number on the disc drawn from the box A, and against it in a parallel column the figures on the disc drawn from the box B. When the record of the 298 discs drawn from each of the boxes is completed, it shall be certified by the Committee by their signatures. Then the Committee shall draw haphazard 29,702 discs from the box A. A record shall be made of the numbers so drawn, and at the conclusion of this drawing such record shall be certified by the Committee in the same manner as the other record referred to above.
- (c) The registered holder of the bond bearing the number appearing on each of the discs drawn from the box A shall be entitled to the premium appearing on each of the corresponding discs drawn from the box B.
- (d) After the 30,000 discs mentioned above shall have been drawn from the box A, and when the 298 discs drawn from the box B shall have been replaced in it, the boxes shall be locked, and the doors and envelope containing the keys and specimen seals shall be sealed in manner directed in sub-paragraph (a) hereof, and the said boxes and the envelope shall be delivered to the Treasurer for deposit in the Treasury vault.
- (e) The Committee shall deliver to the Treasurer the records containing the numbers and figures of the 29,702 and 298 discs drawn as aforesaid. The Treasurer shall preserve the said records.

(f) The contents of the box A shall be so drawn out annually until they are exhausted.

2. Candidates must not be less than 18 or more than 25 years of age, and must furnish the certificates enumerated below, and also state their height and chest measurements in their applications:

(a) A certificate of age.

(b) A health certificate testifying to the candidate's sound constitution, good vision and hearing, and physical fitness for duty in any part of the Island.

(c) A certificate of respectability and good moral character from two or more persons whose social or official position can be accepted as a guarantee of reliability.

(d) A certificate that the candidate has passed one of the following tests :-

(1) The Entrance Examination or the First Examination

in Arts (Calcutta);
(2) The London College of Preceptors Examination, 1st Division;

(3) The Local Cambridge Junior or Senior, but a pass in English and Mathematics compulsory;

(4) The Matriculation Examination of the London University. A knowledge of mensuration is also indispensable; or

(5) Tests of educational qualifications corresponding to any of the above, of which proof must be produced.

Candidates need only furnish attested copies of certificates, which will not be returned. No intimation will be given to unsuccessful candidates, nor will letters inviting attention to applications tendered be replied to.

4. Candidates must submit their applications in person through the Assistant Conservator of Forests within whose

division they reside, and post copy of same direct to the Conservator of Forests. Any candidates already in the service of Government must submit their applications similarly through the Head of their Department and the Assistant Conservator of Forests.

5. Successful candidates will be on probation for two years, and are liable to removal from the service at any time within that period without a reason being assigned for the

6. Dismissed employés of Government need not apply. Any candidate who is a dismissed employe, in the event of his appointment, will be deemed to have secured entry under false pretences, and on detection will be summarily dismissed.

### VITAL STATISTICS.

### Registrar-General's Weekly Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended May 19, 1917.

Births.—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 95 (6 Burghers, 60 Sinhalese, 11 Tamils, 11 Moors, 6 Malays, and 1 Other). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on January 1, 1917, viz., 263,629) was 18.8, as against 22.4 in the preceding week, 15.4 in the corresponding week of last year, and 21.6 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 107 (1 European, 3 Burghers, 50 Sinhalese, 28 Tamils, 18 Moors, 4 Malays, and 3 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 21 2, as against 24 9 in the previous week, 26 0 in the corresponding week of last year, and 27.1 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 107 total deaths, 23 were of infants under one year of age, as against 38 in the preceding. week, 17 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 25 the average for last year.

Stillbirths.—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 5.

Principal Causes of Death.—Eleven deaths from Pneumonia were registered, as against 16 in the previous week and 15 the weekly average for last yeer. Of these, 4 were in Maradana (including 2 deaths of non-residents in hospitals), 2 in New Bazaar, 2 in Slave Island, 1 in St. Paul's, 1 in Kotahena, and 1 in Wellawatta. One death from Bronchitis was registered.

2. Nine deaths from Phthisis were registered, as against 15 in the previous week and 16 the weekly average for last year. Of these, 4 were in St. Paul's, 2 in Maradana (including 1 death of a non-resident in hospital), 1 in Kotahena, 1 in Slave Island, and 1 in Kollupitiya.

3. Four deaths from Enteric Fever were registered, as against 2 in the previous week and 3 the weekly average for last year. Of these, 2 were in Kotahena, 1 in Maradana, and 1 in Wellawatta.

4. Two deaths from *Plague* were registered. Of these, 1 was in St. Paul's and the other in New Bazaar. No deaths were registered in the previous week. There was 1 case reported, as against 4 in the previous week.

5. Eleven deaths from Debility were registered, 8 from Infantile Convulsions, 7 from Enteritis, 5 from Worms, 1 from Tetanus, and 48 from Other Causes. 6. There were reported 30 cases of Chickenpox and 15 cases of Measles, as against 12 and 21 respectively in

the previous week. State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 81.8°, as in the preceding week, against 79.1° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29.888 in., against 29.892 in. in the preceding week and 29.768 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 0.01 in., against 0.24 in. in the preceding week and 19.87 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.
