MUNICIPALITY OF KANDY.

Minutes of Proceedings of a Meeting of the Municipal Council of Kandy held in the Town Hall, Kandy, on Saturday, March 21, 1903, at 8.30 o'clock a.m., in accordance with Notice dated March 17, 1903.

Present:—Hon. Mr. J. P. Lewis, Chairman; E. Beven, Esq.; W. D. Gibbon, Esq.; C. Vanderwall, Esq.; R. W. Jonklass, Esq.; P. T. Habeeboo Lebbe, Esq.; H. F. Tomalin, Esq.

- 1. The Minutes of Proceedings of the Meeting held on February 21, 1903, were read, confirmed, and signed by the Chairman.
- 2. The following documents were submitted:—Statements of Receipts and Expenditure from close of 1902 to February 28, 1903, on account of the Municipal Fund, comprising the (No. 1) General Revenue, (No. 2) Consolidated Rate (Police and Lighting), and (No. 3) Water-rate Accounts; Progress Report of Works done brought up to the same date; Health Officer's Report for, and Statement of Cases instituted by the several Inspectors during, the month of February, 1903.

Besolved—That the several statements, together with the Minutes of Proceedings of this Meeting, as required by section 90 of the Municipal Councils' Ordinance, No. 7 of 1887, and the Health Officer's report, be forwarded to the Colonial Secretary for publication in the Government Gazette.

- 3. The following papers were laid on the table:—Reports by the several Inspectors on laundries inspected during February, 1903.
- 4. Read letter No. 5, dated March 4, 1903, from the Colonial Secretary, intimating the appointment by the Governor in Executive Council of Mr. J. W. Mottau as Auditor.
- 5. Read memorandum dated March 18, 1903, from the Colonial Secretary, forwarding copy of letter of same date to Mr. H. F. Tomalin, intimating his nomination by His Excellency the Governor as a Member of the Municipal Council of Kandy.

1108 It was proposed by Mr. Vanderwall, seconded by Mr. Beven, that a vote of thanks be accorded to Mr. L. Creasy for his services to the Municipal Council while in Kandy. The motion was carried nem. con.

6. Considered the following recommendation of Standing Committee (D) on Municipal Works:-

"The Standing Committee (D) recommend to Council the desirability of asking Government to instruct the Railway Department to provide an illuminated clock outside the Kandy station, in view of the possibility of having it lighted by electricity, and the necessity for such a clock at the station."

It was proposed by Mr. Vanderwall, seconded by Mr. Jonklaas, that the recommendation be adopted .-Carried nem. con.

- In accordance with notice, Mr. Beven brought forward the following motion: -That the five vacant stalls in the public market be set apart exclusively for sale of buffalo meat, and that such stalls be labelled with the words "buffalo beef" in English, Sinhalese, and Tamil, and that the sale of buffalo meat in other stalls be prohibited.
 - The motion was seconded by Mr. Vanderwall and carried.
 - 8. The Council then proceeded to ballot for a Member of Standing Committees:—

(a) On Market and Sanitation in place of Mr. L. Creasy. (b) On Municipal Works

The Chairman declared Mr. H. F. Tomalin, Provincial Engineer, to have been elected as Member of each of the said Standing Committees.

- On proposal of Chairman, a necessary amendment of section 5 of the by-laws for registration of dogs was adopted as follows :-
 - An annual registration fee of Re. 1 shall be charged for each dog. (6) The certificate issued shall be in the form (B) in annexed schedule.

The proposal was unanimously agreed to. The Secretary was instructed to point out to Government the necessity for the amendment.

10. Read report by Health Officer that cesspit on premises No. 3, Brownrigg street, owned by Meya Lebbe,

be closed and a dry-earth closet substituted.

Resolved,—That special authority be granted to the Chairman, in accordance with section 209 of the Municipal Councils' Ordinance, No. 7 of 1887, as amended by section 33 of the Ordinance No. 1 of 1896, to require the owner of premises No. 3, Brownrigg street, to empty, disinfect, and close the cesspit on the said premises, and to substitute a dryearth closet therefor.

11. The following recommendations of the Standing Committee on Municipal Works were brought forward:the Library, be expended in improvement of Castle Hill Park, especially the building of stone steps and improving the approach.

On proposal by Mr. Vanderwall, seconded by Mr. Jonklass, resolved that the recommendation be adopted, and that the Provincial Engineer be requested to be good enough to prepare a plan for the steps, the cost not to exceed

the amount of this vote.

Recommendation B .- That the sum of Rs. 2,000 placed at the disposal of the Council (Colonial Secretary's letter No. 57 of December 6, 1902), by reduction of the payment of annual instalment to Government in reduction of loan obtained for improvement of road round the lake, be expended in rebuilding the portion of drain in Colombo street, from Trincomalee street to Castle Hill street, so far as the funds allow.

On proposal by Mr. Jonkhas, seconded by Mr. Beven, resolved that the recommendation be adopted, and that Government be informed in reply to Colonial Secretary's letter No. 4 of February 7, 1903, how it is proposed to

expend the Rs. 2,000.

Recommendation C.—That the following premises be provided with house service pipes:—No. 25, Brownrigg

street; No. 90, Trincomalee street; No. 34, King street; No. 363, Peradeniya road.

That a water supply to premises 363. Peradeniya road, a garden occupied by Mr. P. D. Siebel, be allowed on payment of Re. 1 per 1,000 gallons consumed, in accordance with the revised by-laws.

Resolved,—That the recommendation be adopted.

Recommendation D.—That one electric lamp be fixed on Haloluwa road at the bend of the road. Proposed by Mr. Vanderwall, seconded by Mr. Jonklass, that the recommendation be adopted. The motion was carried.

12. Read report by Chief Inspector that a case had been instituted against the owner of premises 202, Colombo street, for allowing occupier of premises No. 203 to use the water from house service pipe, and the defendant had been fined Rs. 2.50.

On motion by Mr. Beven, seconded by Mr. Gibbon, that a meter be fixed on premises No. 202, Colombo street.

13. The Chairman stated that, from inquiry made to date of complaints by several traders, he considered that a strong case had been made out against the Chief Inspector, and asked the Council to determine what was to be done. A report would be submitted by the Committee. After some discussion it was proposed by Mr. W.D. Gibbon, seconded by Mr. Jonklaas, that the Chief Inspector (Mr. P. F. Toussaint) be suspended from his duties from this date. On being put to the Meeting the resolution was carried, Mr. Vanderwall dissenting.

Health Officer's Report for the Month of February, 1903.

Scavenging.—The scavenging of the town was fairly satisfactorily carried out during this month. I would ask that the scavenger be told to pay more attention to the gratings in the side drains, which I have frequently found blocked with rubbish from the boutiques.

Drains.—As they have been for years. In spite of my many reports nothing has been done.

Water Supply.—Very good.

Alleys.—Can I say more than I have said in my many reports. Nothing has been done; nothing will be done until we get some epidemic to make us alive to the filthy state that half of our population live in.

MUNICIPALITY OF GALLE.

Minutes of Proceedings of a Meeting of the Municipal Council of Galle held at the Municipal Office on April 4, 1903, at 2 p.m.

Present:—The Chairman; H. A. Grant, Esq.; Dr. W. E. Rudd; C. P. Hayley, Esq.; N. Dias Abeysinha, Esq.; Dr. E. Ludovici; Fred. Abeysundara, Esq.; and Magdon Ismail, Esq.

Read and confirmed Minutes of Meeting held on March 14, 1903.

2. Pursuant to notice, Mr. C. P. Hayley asked—When were the retaining walls on either side of the canal from the railway station upwards constructed? By whom were they constructed? What were expended on them, and what will it cost to renew them?

The Chairman replied that the retaining wall on the west side of the canal was constructed by the Public Works Department about the year 1873; that the wall on the east side was constructed in sections, as follows:-

In 1896, 400 ft. was built by E. A. Babaihamy, contractor, at a cost of Rs. 1,160. In 1897, 487 ft. was built by C. S. Abdul Cader, contractor, at a cost of Rs. 1,307. In 1898, 487 ft. was built by C. S. Abdul Cader, contractor, at a cost of Rs. 1,307. In 1899, 900 ft. was built by E. A. Babaihamy, contractor, at a cost of Rs. 2,610. In 1892, 100 ft. was built by E. A. Babaihamy, contractor, at a cost of Rs. 2,610.

In 1902, 100 ft. was built by K. L. Mendis Dias, contractor, at a cost of Rs. 228.

In 1902, a portion of the wall was repaired at a cost of Rs. 150.

The cost of renewing the wall is estimated to be from Rs. 500 to Rs. 600.

- 3. Pursuant to notice, Dr. E. Ludovici asked :-
 - (1) Whether the plague patient taken to Buona Vista Hospital is now convalescent; if not, what is his present condition?
 - (2) Whether he is suffering from suppuration of the glands or any of the sequels of plague. If so, whether he is under the treatment of a qualified medical man?
 - (3) Whether any blood or discharge has been sent to Colombo for bacteriological examination, and with what result?
 - (4) If anything was sent up for examination, was it sent by special messenger or by ordinary post?
 - (5) Whether it is true that some beef sent to the plague hospital was returned by the officer in charge after being dipped in some lotion, and if so, what was ultimately done with the beef?

The Chairman replied as follows on the authority of the Colonial Surgeon :-

- (1) The plague patient at Buona Vista is in a good state of health, but a gland discharged itself recently and the patient is kept in hospital.
- (2) He has had suppuration of the gland, and continues under the same treatment as he had before the gland burst.
- (3) Blood and discharge have both been sent to Colombo for bacteriological examination, with no definite result so far.
- (4) It was sent by special messenger to Colombo.
- (5) Some beef was left in the hospital grounds after disinfection and buried there. It was not returned or brought away by the contractor.

4. Submitted the following recommendations from the Standing Committee on Finance: That the vote for tools be increased by Rs. 100, and the vote for watering streets by Rs. 150. That Rs. 309:50 be added to votes for conservancy of private latrines.

Resolved—That these additions be made and included in a Supplemental Budget.
