**VITAL STATISTICS OF TOWNS IN CEYLON IN THE
MONTH OF MARCH, 1917.**

REPORT OF THE REGISTRAR-GENERAL.

THIS report deals with the Vital Statistics of the 33 principal towns in the Island proclaimed under sections 31-36 of the Ordinance No. 1 of 1895.

Births.

2. The births numbered 1,584 (783 males and 801 females), and were equal to an annual rate of 30·16 per 1,000, against 32·51 in the preceding month, 29·58 in the corresponding month of last year, and 31·07 the average of the corresponding months since 1908. The rate ranged from 14·85 in Nuwara Eliya to 57·74 in Hambantota.

3. In the city of Colombo the births numbered 572 (285 males and 287 females), and were equal to an annual rate* of 25·14 per 1,000, against 26·03 in the preceding month, 22·25 in the corresponding month of last year, and 26·12 the average of the corresponding months since 1908. The rate ranged from 9·21 in Kollupitiya to 38·84 in Wellawatta.

Deaths.

4. The total deaths registered during the month numbered 1,630 (888 males and 742 females). There were 1,352 deaths of residents, equivalent to an annual rate of 28·06 per 1,000, against 29·02 in the preceding month, 26·42 in the corresponding month of last year, and 29·35 the average for the month of March in each year since 1908. The rate ranged from 52·14 in Badulla to 3·57 in Nuwara Eliya.

5. In the city of Colombo the deaths numbered 625 (355 males and 270 females). There were 565 deaths of residents, equivalent to an annual rate* of 28·81 per 1,000, against 29·07 in the preceding month, 27·61 in the corresponding month of last year, and 28·08 the average for the month of March in each year since 1908. The rate was lowest in Kollupitiya (6·58), and was highest in Wellawatta (39·54).

6. Stillbirths numbered 120 (60 males and 60 females), against 92 in the preceding month.

Infantile Mortality.

7. The infantile mortality was equal to a rate of 258 per 1,000 births registered during the year ended the last day of March, 1917. Reckoned on the births registered during the month only the rate was 238, against 229 in the preceding month, 197 in the corresponding month of last year, and 222 the average of the corresponding months since 1908.

8. In the city of Colombo the infantile mortality was equal to a rate of 294 per 1,000 births registered during the year ended the last day of March, 1917. Reckoned on the births registered during the month only the rate was 253, against 249 in the preceding month, 207 in the corresponding month of last year, and 243 the average of the corresponding months since 1908.

Causes of Death.

9. The highest mortality was from *Pneumonia*, to which 10 per cent. of the total deaths was due, 9 per cent. were due to *Debility*, 8 per cent. to *Convulsions*, 6 per cent. each to *Phthisis* and *Diarrhœa*, 5 per cent. to *Anchylostomiasis*, 4 per cent. to *Enteritis*, 3 per cent. each to *Dysentery* and *Malaria* and *Malarial Cachexia*, 2 per cent. each to *Prematurity*, *Puerperal Septicæmia*, *Enteric Fever*, *Bright's Disease* and *Nephritis*, and *Bronchitis*, and 1 per cent. to *Tetanus*.

10. In the city of Colombo the highest mortality was from *Pneumonia*, which accounted for 9 per cent. of the total deaths, *Phthisis* caused 8 per cent., *Debility* and *Convulsions* 7 per cent. each, *Enteritis* 6 per cent., *Enteric Fever* 3 per cent., *Diarrhœa*, *Bright's Disease* and *Nephritis*, and *Prematurity* 2 per cent. each, and *Anchylostomiasis*, *Bronchitis*, and *Puerperal Septicæmia* 1 per cent. each. Fifty-four deaths from *Plague* were registered, against 36 in the preceding month and 18 in the corresponding month of last year. This number is the second highest registered since the outbreak of *Plague* in January, 1914, the highest being 71 registered in March, 1914. There were, besides, 4 deaths registered in Moratuwa and 1 death in Kandy.

11. *Infectious Diseases reported*.—The most prevalent infectious disease during the month was *Chickenpox*, of which 539 cases were reported (373 in Colombo, 50 in Kandy, 33 in Gampola, 15 in Galle), followed by *Measles* 312 (208 in Colombo, 28 in Badulla, 24 in Kandy, 12 in Moratuwa, 10 each in Negombo and Anuradhapura), *Enteric Fever* 68 (48 in Colombo, 12 in Galle), *Plague* 67 (62 in Colombo, 4 in Moratuwa, and 1 in Kandy), *Phthisis* 63 (58 in Colombo and 5 in Galle), *Continued Fever* 27 (13 in Colombo, 7 in Galle, 6 in Moratuwa), *Mumps* 24 (14 in Kandy, 5 in Colombo), *Smallpox* 19 (17 in Jaffna and 2 in Colombo), *Diarrhœa* 2 (in Colombo), *Dysentery* 1 (in Moratuwa), *Diphtheria* 1 (in Colombo), and *Whooping Cough* 1 (in Kandy).

Meteorology.

12. *Rainfall*.—Ratnapura recorded the highest rainfall (11·77 inches), followed by Badulla (11·16 inches). In the other towns the rainfall ranged from 10·73 inches in Matara to 0·63 inch in Jaffna. Colombo recorded 10·03 inches.

13. *Temperature*.—The mean temperature varied from 60·0° in Nuwara Eliya to 82·5° in Mannar, and was 79·9° in Colombo.
