REGULATIONS REFERRED TO.

No person coming from any country except India to this Colony shall land within this Colony, unless he has in his possession a passport issued to him not more than two years previously by the proper authority of the State of which he is a subject or a citizen, to which passport there shall be attached a photograph of the person to whom it relates.

2. Any person who lands or attempts to land in this Colony who

is prohibited from so doing by the previous regulation, and any person who knowingly aids and abets any such person in so landing or attempting to land, shall be guilty of an offence, and shall be liable on summarry conviction to imprisonment, rigorous or simple, not exceeding six months, or to a fine not exceeding one thousand five hundred rupees, or to both.

3. Any person prohibited under section 1 aforesaid landing or attempt-

ing to land in contravention of the said section shall be liable to arrest and detention by any Police officer or Customs officer.

4. Nothing in these regulations shall apply to any person landing under a special permit in writing issued by the Colonial Secretary, the Principal Collector of Customs, or the Inspector-General of Police, and acting in accordance with the conditions of such permit.

THEREAS in pursuance of "The Necessaries of War Exportation Ordinance, No. 19 of 1914," We did by Our Proclamation, published in the Government Gazette Extraordinary of July 4, 1916, prohibit the exportation from Ceylon of articles to the extent therein specified:

And whereas by Our Proclamations, published in the Government Gazettes of August 4, September 1, 15, and 29, October 20 and 27, November 10, and December 8, 1916, and January 12, February 9, March 9 and 16, and June 1, 15, and 22, 1917, We did make certain amendments in and additions to the schedule thereto:

Now know Ye that We, the Governor of Ceylon, in pursuance of the aforesaid Ordinance, do hereby revoke the aforesaid Proclamations, and all other Proclamations not consistent with the directions contained in this Proclamation, and as from this date prohibit the exportation from Ceylon of the articles enumerated in the schedule hereto as follows:

Articles marked (A) to all destinations other than the United Kingdom, British Possessions, and Protectorates.

Articles marked (B) to all destinations other than the United Kingdom, British Possessions, and Protectorates, and France, Italy, and Russia, except through the Baltic ports.

Articles marked (c) to all destinations in foreign countries in Europe and on the Mediterranean and Black Seas, other than France and French Possessions, Russia, Italy and Italian Possessions, Spain and Portugal, and to all ports in any such foreign countries, and to all Russian Baltic ports.

Articles marked (D) to all destinations in foreign countries in Europe and on the Mediterranean and Black Seas, other than France and French Possessions, Russia, Italy and Italian Possessions, Spain and Portugal, and to all ports in any such foreign countries, and to all Russian Baltic ports, and to the United Kingdom, except when articles are consigned to the United Kingdom, in respect of which a license for the exportation thereof shall have been issued by the Principal Collector of Customs.

Note (1).—All persons or firms resident, carrying on business, or being in the United Kingdom are prohibited from having with any person or firm mentioned in this list, or in any list issued under the Trading with the Enemy (Statutory List) Proclamation, 1916, No. 3, any dealings other than such as are expressly authorized by paragraph 5 of the Proclamation. A list consolidating all previous lists was published on April 27, 1917. (The Consolidating List No. 25a), which, together with List No 26 of May 11, 1917, and the list herewith annexed, contains all the names which up to this date are included in the Statutory List.

Additions to and variations in these lists will be published at intervals approximately of two weeks. The lists are published in the London Gazette and reproduced in the Board of Trade Journal, and separate copies of all lists may be obtained at a small cost from the Superintendent of Publications, His Majesty's Stationery Office, Imperial House, Kingsway, W.C.

NOTE (2).—Where a person or firm mentioned in the list has more than one address in the country or group of countries under which the name of the person or firm appears, all dealings in that country or in any country in the group with such person or firm are prohibited, even in cases where one only of the addresses or one only of the countries is specifically mentioned.

NOTE (3).—Trading is prohibited under the Trading with the Enemy Proclamations of June 25 and November 10, 1915, with any person or firm of enemy nationality resident or carrying on business in China, Siam, Persia, Morocco, Liberia, or Portuguese East Africa. Persons or firms in the United Kingdom are therefore prohibited from trading with any person or firm of enemy nationality in any of those countries, even though such person or firm is not mentioned by name in the Statutory List.

NOTE (4).—In order to minimize as far as possible any inconvenience which may be caused to British traders by the dislocation of export trade owing to the inclusion in the Statutory List of a former connection, the Foreign Trade Department is collecting and classifying the names of non-enemy firms who may be able to act as substitutes for firms mentioned in the Statutory List. A considerable amount of information is already available at the Foreign Trade Department, and it is in many cases possible to suggest the names of satisfactory substitutes without the necessity of referring the matter abroad. The Department is, however, prepared on application to inquire of His Majesty's Representatives abroad for the names of suitable substitutes. When the applicant wishes this done by telegraph, he is required to undertake to pay the cost of telegraphic correspondence. It would greatly facilitate the work of the Foreign Trade Department if applicants in making inquiries would specify the particular trade or trades for which substitutes are required.

Note (5).—The Statutory List for each country is telegraphed, on the day of issue, to His Majesty's Representative in that country, who is instructed to notify accordingly British Consular Officers, to whom persons abroad should apply for information as to names on the list. Persons and firms in the United Kingdom with agencies or branches abroad would, however, be well advised to furnish such agencies or branches with issues of the list as they appear. The lists for all countries in Central or South America are also telegraphed to His Majesty's Ambassador at Washington, who transmits them to H. M. Consul-General at New York and to other centres in the United States likely to be interested.

- (2) That Maurice John Harding of Colombo is hereby appointed liquidator for the purpose of winding up the business of the said firm.

Amended Syllabus referred to.

Algebra.—The paper will consist of two parts. Candidates can pass in Algebra, by doing sufficiently well in Part I.

"Part I.—Questions may be set on elementary algebraic operations; simple equations; simple simultaneous equations containing not more than two unknown quantities; easy problems leading to such equations; fractions with numerical denominators; simple questions on fractional and negative indices (formal proofs not being required), and on logarithms to base 10, with the use of four-figure tables. Questions may be set on resolution into factors, quadratic equations containing only one unknown quantity, problems leading to such equations, easy fractions, and simple graphs with applications. Questions will be set on graphs and their applications. Questions of an arithmetical character, capable of solution by algebraical processes, but not necessarily requiring the aid of such processes, may be set.

Part II.—Questions may be set on the solution of two simultaneous equations, one being linear and one being quadratic; variation; the gradient of a graph; arithmetical progression and finite geometrical progression.

Candidates will be provided in the examination room with squared paper and four-figure tables of logarithms. They should bring graduated rulers.

VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Weekly Health Report of the Čity of Colombo for the Week ended July 28, 1917.

Births.—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 73 (1 European, 7 Burghers, 36 Sinhalese, 13 Tamils, 14 Moors, and 2 Malays). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on July 1, 1917, viz., 267,888) was 14.2, as against 18.1 in the preceding week, 20.2 in the corresponding week of last year, and 21.6 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 132 (9 Burghers, 72 Sinhalese, 26 Tamils, 18 Moors, 3 Malays, and 4 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 25 · 7, as against 17 · 1 in the previous week, 33 · 5 in the corresponding week of last year, and 27.1 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 132 total deaths, 19 were of infants under one year of age, as against 31 in the preceding week, 27 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 25 the average for last year.

Stillbirths.—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 3.

Principal Causes of Death.—Fourteen deaths from Phthisis were registered, as against 6 in the previous week and 16 the weekly average for last year. Of these, 5 were in Maradana (including 2 deaths of non-residents in hospitals), 3 in New Bazaar, 3 in Kollupitiya, 2 in Wellawatta, and 1 in Kotahena.

- 2. Eight deaths from Pneumonia were registered, as against 9 in the previous week, and 15 the weekly average for last year. Of these, 2 were in Kotahena, 2 in Maradana (including 1 death of a non-resident in hospital), 1 in St. Paul's, 1 in New Bazaar, 1 in Slave Island, and 1 in Kollupitiya. Four deaths from Bronchitis were registered.
- 3. Four deaths from Enteric Fever were registered, same as in the previous week, against 3 the weekly average for last year. Of these, 2 were in Kollupitiya, 1 in Kotahena, and 1 in Wellawatta.
- 4. Three deaths from *Plague* were registered, as against 2 in the previous week, and 4 the weekly average for last Of these, 1 was in San Sebastian, 1 in Maradana, and 1 in Slave Island. Three cases were reported, as against vear. l in the previous week.
- One death from Measles was registered in Maradana, none were registered in the previous week. There were reported 18 cases of Measles, as against 20 in the previous week, and 2 cases of Chickenpox, as against 12 in the previous week.

6. Nine deaths from Diarrhæa were registered, 9 from Infantile Convulsions, 6 from Debility, 5 from Dysentery, 5 from Worms, 4 from Enteritis, 2 from Tetanus, and 58 from Other Causes.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 80.9°, against 82.7° in the preceding week and 81.0° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29.882 in., against 29.803 in. in the preceding week and 29.808 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 0.43 in., against 1.01 in. in the preceding week and 1.14 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.
