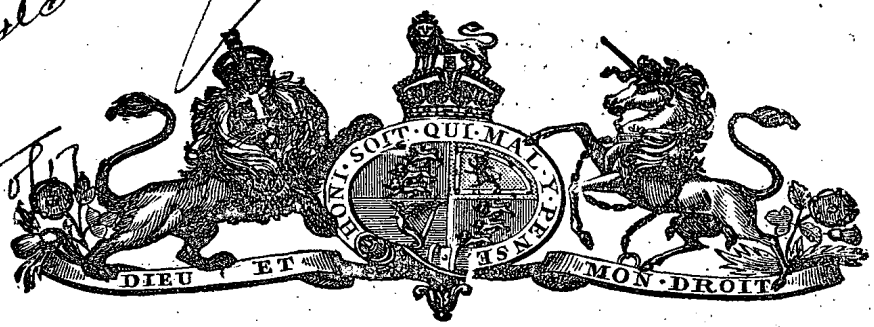

KNOW Ye that We, the Governor of Ceylon, in exercise of the power vested in Us by section 32 of the Pawnbrokers Ordinance, No. 8 of 1893, do by this Our Proclamation appoint that the said Ordinance shall have effect within the Sanitary Board limits of the town of Weligama, in the Matara District, in the Southern Province, set forth in the schedule hereto, as from and after November 1, 1917.

BY-LAWS REFERRED TO.

(a) The public slaughter-house erected at Pairugahawatta in Digarolla, within the limits of the Local Board of Moratuwa, shall be reserved for the slaughter of pigs.

(b) No pig shall be slaughtered within the limits of the Local Board of Moratuwa otherwise than at the

public slaughter-house at Pairugahawatta in Digarolla, or on a special permit from the Chairman.

(c) No pork shall be exposed for sale in a public market otherwise than in such portion of the market or in such stall or stalls as shall be set apart by the Chairman for this purpose,

(d) The following fee shall be recovered for every carcase or portion of a carcase of a pig brought into a public market, *viz.*, 25 cents, except in the case of persons holding pork stalls in the public market on a monthly tenancy, in which case the fee shall be 15 cents.

REGULATIONS REFERRED TO.

- (a) Pigs shall be slaughtered at the public slaughter-house at Pairugahawatta in Digarolla, within the limits of the Local Board of Moratuwa, between 6 and 9 A.M. and 4 and 6 P.M.
- (b) All pigs for slaughter shall be placed by the owners thereof or their agents within the pound provided for the purpose at Pairugahawatta in Digarolla and exposed for observation for at least twelve hours before their slaughter.
- (c) No pig shall be slaughtered unless it shall have been certified by the Medical Officer or by a Sanitary Inspector thereto authorized in writing by the Chairman of the Board as being fit for slaughter in the Register of Permits to Slaughter Pigs.
- (d) Any pig not slaughtered within forty-eight hours must be removed, and if again produced for slaughter, must again undergo the period of exposure aforesaid and be certified by the Medical Officer or aforesaid Sanitary Officer as being fit for slaughter.
- (e) The following fee shall be levied for the use of the slaughter-house:—
For every pig slaughtered, 40 cents.

BY-LAWS REFERRED TO.

1. *Board to keep a Register of all Dairymen and Milk Vendors.*—The Board shall keep a register of the names and addresses of all dairymen and milk vendors selling or supplying milk to any person or persons resident within the limits of the Board, and of all dairy premises, places where milch cows are kept, and milk stores used from time to time by each of them for the production, deposit, or distribution of such milk, hereinafter called "premises."

2. *To strike off the Register all who are disqualified.*—The Board shall strike off such register the names and addresses of all persons who shall have ceased or become disqualified as hereinafter provided to carry on the business of the dairymen or milk vendors.

3. *To cause Premises to be inspected.*—The Board shall cause to be inspected all such premises, and the cattle, appliances, and utensils therein used for the production or distribution of milk.

4. *Dairymen and others to apply for Registration.*—(a) Every dairyman and milk vendor engaged or intending to engage in the sale or supply of milk to any person or persons within the limits of the Board shall apply to the Board to cause to be entered on the register his name and place of residence, and the situation of every premises used or intended to be used by him, and thenceforward to notify from time to time any change of residence or premises, as well as discontinuance of business as dairyman or milk vendor.

(b) Immediately upon such registration, and whilst the same continues in force, every such dairyman and milk vendor shall in some conspicuous place affix to and maintain in legible letters his name and the words "Registered Dairyman" or "Registered Milk Vendor," as the case may be, upon every premises or milk store in respect of which he is so registered, and to and upon every cart or other vehicle used by him for the distribution of milk.

(c) A numbered badge, in such form as the Chairman shall from time to time direct, shall be issued annually to every registered dairyman or milk vendor on his application (at cost price). No dairyman or milk vendor shall sell, hawk, or expose milk for sale unless he has in his possession such numbered badge at time of sale.

(d) Every such registration shall remain in force for three months from the date of registration or until the registration is cancelled. Such registration shall further be subject to such fees as the Local Board shall from time to time determine with the sanction of the Governor in Council.

5. *Unregistered Persons forbidden to sell Milk.*—It shall not be lawful for any person to hawk, offer for sale, or to sell milk to any person or persons within the limits of the Board if his name and place of residence and premises used for the purpose of the production, deposit, or distribution of any such milk are not entered upon the register of the Board.

6. *Dairymen and Milk Vendors to keep their Premises in a Sanitary Condition.*—Every dairyman or milk vendor shall cleanse and maintain in a sanitary condition his premises and any utensils therein used.

7. *Dairymen and Milk Vendors to close Well, &c., if the Water is unwholesome.*—The Chairman, Local Board, shall require any dairyman or milk vendor, by notice in writing, to close any well or other source of water supply in or on his premises or used in connection therewith which is so polluted or unwholesome as to be unfit for human consumption, and to wholly discontinue the use of the water thereof for any purpose whatsoever for such period as the Chairman, Local Board, shall direct, or to fill up the said well or the source of water supply and keep the same so filled up.

8. *Premises, &c., in an Insanitary Condition will not be registered.*—(a) The Chairman, Local Board, shall refuse the registration of any dairyman or milk vendor in respect of any premises which are in an insanitary condition, or in which the provisions for lighting, ventilation, drainage, lavatory, and privy accommodation, or water supply are not such as are necessary for health or for the cleanliness of the appliances and utensils used therein, or for the protection of any milk therein against infection or contamination.

(b) If any person shall have been convicted twice or oftener by any court of the breach of these rules, it shall be lawful for the court recording such second or subsequent conviction to cancel the registration issued to such person under this chapter by the Chairman of the Local Board. Upon such cancellation of the registration by a court, the Chairman of the Local Board is empowered, in his discretion, to refuse to renew such registration.

9. *Infectious Diseases in Premises, &c., to be reported immediately.*—On the appearance of any case of infectious disease in man or beast in any premises, the occupier and also the medical practitioner attending the case shall immediately report in writing such case to the Board.

10. *Dairymen to supply Names and Addresses of Customers.*—Whenever it shall appear to the Chairman, or be certified to the Board by any medical practitioner, that the spread of the

infectious disease is, in his opinion, attributable to the milk supplied by any dairyman or milk vendor, the Chairman may require such dairyman or milk vendor wholly to discontinue such supply, distribution, and sale of milk, and to furnish forthwith upon demand a full and complete list of names and addresses of all his customers, and to give such assistance to discover the residence of all or any of them as the Chairman may deem necessary.

11. *Persons suffering from Infectious Diseases or having been recently exposed to Infection not to take part in Dairy Operations.*—No person following the trade of a dairy farmer, cowkeeper, dairyman, or purveyor of milk, or being the occupier of a milk store or milk shop, shall allow any person suffering from any infectious disease, or having recently been exposed to infection from a person so suffering, to milk cows or to handle vessels used for containing milk, or in any way to take part or to assist in the conduct of the trade or business of the dairy farmer, cowkeeper, dairyman, or purveyor of milk, or occupier of any milk store or milk shop, as far as regards the production, distribution, or storage of milk, until he shall have shown to the satisfaction of the Chairman that all danger of communication of infection to the milk or of its contamination has ceased.

12. *Sale or Supply of unwholesome Milk forbidden.*—It shall not be lawful for any dairyman or milk vendor to possess, store, keep, or deposit any milk in any room used for sleeping or dwelling in, or in any other place or way calculated to render such milk unwholesome or injurious to health, or which has been adulterated with water or any foreign substance whatever, or to sell any milk which shall have been produced from any diseased animal, or which shall have been in any place or way exposed to infection from any person suffering from any infectious disease, or which shall have been upon or in any premises or milk store from which the sale of milk has been directed to be discontinued on account of infectious disease as provided in section 10.

13. *Sale of Milk.*—No dairyman or milk vendor shall hawk or expose for sale milk in open vessels or bottles or contained in other receptacles which are not scrupulously clean.

14. No dairyman or milk vendor shall sell or offer for sale any milk, whether of cow's or buffalo's, from which the cream has been removed, unless he previously informs the person to whom he sells or offers it that the cream has been removed.

15. *Powers of the Chairman, Local Board, to enter Premises.*—The Chairman, Local Board, or any person authorized by him shall be at liberty

to enter any premises for the purpose of making any inspection, and to take away samples of the milk there found and of the water of any well or other source of water supply therein or thereon for the purpose of examination or analysis.

16. The Medical Officer, Secretary, Local Board, or Local Board Inspector may at any time demand and take for the purpose of analysis samples of any milk which is in possession of any registered dairyman or milk vendor found selling, hawking, or exposing milk for sale.

17. When samples of milk are taken by the Secretary or Local Board Inspector, he shall take two samples, and shall at once seal them in the presence of the registered dairyman or milk vendor from whom they are taken, and shall deliver one to such registered dairyman or milk vendor, and send the second to the Medical Officer or to a qualified analyst for report.

18. *Cowshed in which Dairy Cattle are kept.*—The floor to be of some impermeable material, such as concrete, bricks set in cement, or consolidated metal, sloping to an impermeable drain, which shall discharge into a sump in which a receptacle shall be kept or otherwise disposed of as the Chairman may

approve. Two sides at least of the cowshed to be open to the external air.

19. Every dairy must have a milk room for the storing and preparation of milk, and in which all utensils used by the dairyman in his trade are to be stored after cleansing. The floor of the milk room to be cemented with rounded corners at its junction with the walls. The walls to be of cement-plastered masonry, smooth boards, or ironwork; these to be painted or white-washed twice annually, or as ordered by the Chairman. At least two opposing walls of the milk room to abut on the open air. The roof to be ceiled with dovetailed board to prevent the ingress of dust; there should be at least one window and the door, the door to be opposite the window, and at least one-half (upper) to be fitted with fly-proof netting. A table with an impervious covering to be always kept in the milk room; this room to be used for no other purpose than that of storing and preparing milk.

20. No water used by a dairy shall be taken from any well at which bathing or washing of clothes takes place.

21. All dairymen shall see that the cows are washed as to udders and teats before milking, and the milker shall

wear clean clothes, and shall wash his hands thoroughly with soap and water before engaging in milking.

22. All vessels for collecting, storing, and transporting of milk shall be of glazed earthenware, glass, zinc, or block tin, and shall be scalded in boiling water at least once daily and rendered scrupulously clean before using. All such vessels used in the transporting of milk from dairy to consumer shall be as above, and, in addition, provided with a seal or lock. In case of delivery of milk in bulk, the vessel shall be provided with a stop cock.

23. Every dairyman shall keep a report book in his milk room in which the Inspecting Officer will make his report each time he visits the dairy, and this report will serve as a notice to the dairyman in respect of any contravention of these by-laws, which if not remedied within 14 days, or if the offence be repeated, the dairyman will then be liable to prosecution without further notice.

24. The word "milk" shall include all by-products of milk.

25. By-laws 18-23 inclusive shall apply only to premises which the Chairman, by notice addressed to the dairyman, shall have declared to be subject thereto.

"THE LAND SURVEYORS, AUCTIONEERS, AND BROKERS ORDINANCES, 1889 AND 1909."

IT is hereby notified that the Surveyor-General, with the sanction of His Excellency the Governor in Executive Council, has, under section 10 A of "The Land Surveyors, Auctioneers, and Brokers Ordinances, 1889 and 1909," as amended by Ordinance No. 28 of 1916, made the following rules, to come into operation from January 1, 1918.

RULES REFERRED TO.

1. Every person desiring to obtain a certificate authorizing him to practise as a draughtsman under the above-named Ordinance shall make application in writing to the Surveyor-General to be examined as to his qualification, and shall on making his application pay a fee of Rs. 10 in respect of the examination.

2. Examinations will be conducted by Examiners appointed by the Surveyor-General at such places as the Surveyor-General may direct, and

at such hours as the Examiners may determine.

3. Applicants for certificates will be required to satisfy the Surveyor-General that (a) they can accurately plot a plan from field notes, both by protractor and co-ordinates; (b) they can accurately compute the plan thus plotted.

4. Every certificate shall bear a stamp of Re. 1.

5. The Surveyor-General may suspend or cancel a certificate if after

due inquiry he is satisfied that a draughtsman has been guilty of incompetence or carelessness in the discharge of his duties.

Provided that any person aggrieved by the suspension or cancellation of his certificate by the Surveyor-General may appeal to the Governor in Executive Council within thirty days from the date when the Surveyor-General's decision is communicated to him, and the decision of the Governor in Executive Council upon any such appeal shall be final and conclusive.

NOTICES CALLING FOR TENDERS.

TENDERS are hereby invited for the conveyance of cash in a vehicle or carriage drawn by one horse for a period of two years from the date of acceptance of tender as under:—

(a) Carriage required daily at Maradana Station at 9.30 A.M. and to be used for the purpose of conveying cash, the Railway officers travelling with it to the Railway Accountant's Office and to the Bank of Madras and Treasury until 2 P.M.

(b) Carriage required daily at Maradana Station at 7.30 P.M.

(c) On or about the 22nd day of each month and until the 6th day of the following month the carriage will be required, in addition to the above service, to be at the Railway Accountant's Office at 6.30 A.M. to convey wages moneys to Maradana Station, and will also be required for three or four days during each month to make an additional run to the bank to convey moneys to the office and also two journeys from office to Dematagoda.

(d) Carriage required to be in attendance at the Maradana Station daily at 5.15 P.M. to convey the cash brought by the Down Day Express to the Accountant's Office.

The above are the present requirements of the service, but they are subject to alteration and revision as may be decided by Government, and the contractor must provide for this when tendering.

2. That for the purpose above named the General Manager shall provide a vehicle with lamps, which shall be safely housed and kept clean and in good running order and condition by the successful tenderer at his own cost, all heavy repairs being performed at the cost of the General Manager.

3. Payment will be made monthly on the basis of the monthly mileage of the carriage when in use for the conveyance of cash or other sanctioned Railway business, and tenderers should accordingly quote a rate per mile in their tenders. For the purpose of calculating the mileage, the

following will be taken as the mileage between the respective points:—

Accountant's Office to Maradana Railway Station, $\frac{1}{4}$ mile.
Maradana Railway Station to Loco Shed, Dematagoda, $1\frac{1}{2}$ mile.

Accountant's Office to Fort, $1\frac{1}{2}$ mile.

The probable mileage per month will be about 160 miles, but the Government does not bind itself to this mileage.

4. The successful tenderer shall at his own cost provide a sound horse, not less than fourteen hands in height, with suitable harness and whip, together with a capable driver, who shall be clad in clean uniform to be provided by the successful tenderer and be of a pattern approved by the General Manager.

5. The General Manager shall provide an officer to travel in the carriage in charge of the money.

6. All tenders should be in duplicate and sealed under one cover, and should be addressed to the General Manager of the Railway, Colombo.

7. Tenders should either be deposited in the Office of the General Manager of the Railway, or be sent through the post.

VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Weekly Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended October 13, 1917.

Births.—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 116 (3 Europeans, 14 Burghers, 66 Sinhalese, 12 Tamils, 14 Moors, 5 Malays, and 2 Others). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on July 1, 1917, viz., 267,888) was 22.6, as against 23.2 in the preceding week, 19.3 in the corresponding week of last year, and 21.6 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 102 (2 Europeans, 3 Burghers, 62 Sinhalese, 17 Tamils, 12 Moors, 2 Malays, and 4 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 19.9, same as in the previous week, against 25.6 in the corresponding week of last year, and 27.1 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 102 total deaths, 21 were of infants under one year of age, as against 25 in the preceding week, 24 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 25 the average for last year.

Stillbirths.—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 14.

Principal Causes of Death.—Fourteen deaths from *Phthisis* were registered, as against 15 in the previous week and 16 the weekly average for last year. Of these, 5 were in Maradana (including 2 deaths of non-residents in hospitals), 5 in Slave Island, 2 in Kotahena, 1 in St. Paul's, and 1 in New Bazaar.

2. Seven deaths from *Pneumonia* were registered, as against 4 in the previous week and 15 the weekly average for last year. Of these, 4 were in Slave Island and 3 in Maradana (including 1 death of a non-resident in hospital). One death from *Bronchitis* was registered.

3. Three deaths from *Enteric Fever* were registered, same as in the previous week and the weekly average for last year. Of these, 1 was in St. Paul's, 1 in Maradana, and 1 in Wellawatta.

4. No deaths from *Plague* were registered, and no cases were reported during the week. Three cases were reported in the previous week.

5. Ten deaths from *Enteritis* were registered, 6 from *Infantile Convulsions*, 4 from *Debility*, 3 from *Diarrhoea*, 3 from *Dysentery*, 3 from *Worms*, 2 from *Tetanus*, and 46 from *Other Causes*.

6. Six cases of *Measles*, were reported during the week, as against 4 in the previous week; and 3 cases of *Chickenpox*, as against 1 in the previous week.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 80.4°, against 79.7° in the preceding week and 80.8° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29.894 in., against 29.901 in. in the preceding week and 29.891 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 0.26 in., against 1.15 in. in the preceding week and 0.54 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.

Should two or more purchasers desire to re-weigh their timber on the same day, precedence will be given to the buyer whose notification of intention to re-weigh reaches the Assistant Conservator of Forests first.

5. No timber shall be removed before payment of the full price bid, and all timber sold must be removed from the depot within ten days of date of notification of acceptance by the Conservator of Forests of such bid, and will be at the risk of the purchasers until removed.

6. Should any person to whom a lot is knocked down refuse to take it over at the full price bid, or refuse or fail to sign the sale book and pay 25 per cent. of his bid when so required, or refuse or fail to pay the full purchase amount or balance thereof, as the case may be, and to remove the timber within the time specified in clause 5 above, the lot will again be put up for auction, and the original purchaser or bidder will be held liable for any loss to Government owing to a lower price being realized at the re-sale, while if an enhanced price is realized at such re-sale, he shall, however, have no claim to the profit which shall accrue to Government.

7. Agents bidding for others will be required to produce a written authority from the firm or persons for whom they bid, such authority will be retained by the Assistant Conservator of Forests, and will hold good only at the particular sale at which it is produced.

"Improvements in the storage and utilization of energy by means of liquids."

Abstract :—

In devices for storing energy in liquids heretofore employed, especially water, the energy has been accumulated by pumping the water to a higher level against the action of gravity, or in pumping the water in such a way that it raises weights, thus accumulating potential energy in the weights, which can be utilized by allowing the water to flow, and allowing the weights to descend. Liquids have also been used in accumulators in combination with air cushions.

According to the present invention, liquids are used for the storage of energy, making use not of gravity but of the elasticity of the liquids themselves.

The invention consists in storing energy by the change of volume of liquids under pressure.

The invention further consists in the application of energy stored in elastic liquids under pressure, hereinafter called elastic energy, to the actuation of percussive machines by converting the elastic energy into kinetic energy.

The invention also consists in the use of liquids acting as springs in vehicles or for steering gears.

The invention further consists in pumping the liquid into a strong vessel of considerable relative volume, so that it is compressed and undergoes a reduction of volume, and in utilizing the energy of the compressed liquid during its expansion to its initial volume.

The invention further consists in apparatus for utilizing the elasticity of liquids, comprising a pump for compressing the liquid, a vessel into which the liquid is compressed, and one or more utilizers of energy which can be worked independently or together from such vessel.

The invention also consists in the improved means for storing energy in liquids and utilizing such energy hereinafter described.

As it is known that water and other liquids are compressible, it will be obvious that such liquids, if subjected to a pressure, must undergo a decrease in volume, and on removal of the pressure must necessarily expand to their initial volume; and in all devices heretofore employed, in which liquids are subjected to varying pressure, diminution and increase of volume of the liquid itself must necessarily take place.

Heretofore, however, the increase in volume of the liquid during its expansion has not been applied to the performance of useful work.

The storage is done at very high pressures: 1,500 kilogrammes per square centimetre is mentioned as an example in connection with a reciprocating engine and 2,000 atmospheres as an example in connection with buffers for railway vehicles and pile drivers; but pressures of 500 kilogrammes per square centimetre are contemplated for driving motors, hammers, punches, and the like. If a liquid having a high coefficient of elasticity be employed, the volume of the storage vessel will be larger for the same pressure to store a given amount of energy than when the liquid employed has a low coefficient of elasticity. Oils, greases, jellies, paraffin, alcohol, and ether may be used as the liquid when circumstances allow of it to be used over and over again in the generating pump. And water may be used when there is leakage and the driven machines exhaust to waste. Liquid mixtures may be used also.

The motors and machines described are meant to be driven from a system consisting of a generating pump, a vessel having storage capacity, and connecting pipes, so that the energy taken from the storage vessel is made good again immediately. It is stated that the compression and expansion of a liquid can be done isothermally, and that the efficiency of such a plant is much higher accordingly than of an air compressor plant for the same purposes.

The claims are :—

1. The method of and means for applying elastic energy stored in liquids under pressure to the actuation of machines by converting the elastic energy into kinetic energy, substantially as described.

2. Improved methods and apparatus for storing energy in liquids and utilizing such energy, substantially as hereinbefore described with reference to the accompanying drawings.

MUNICIPAL COUNCIL NOTICES.

MUNICIPALITY OF COLOMBO.

Minutes and Proceedings of a General Meeting of the Municipal Council of Colombo held in the Town Hall on Friday, September 7, 1917.

The Council met this day at 3 P.M., pursuant to notice dated August 31, 1917.

Present :—Mr. R. W. Byrde, Chairman ; Mr. C. P. Dias ; Major A. W. de Wilton ; Mr. L. B. Fernando ; the Hon. Mr. N. H. M. Abdul Cader ; Mr. Arthur Alvis ; Mr. H. L. de Mel ; Mr. E. G. Jayewardene, Dr. E. V. Ratnam ; Dr. W. P. Rodrigo ; Mr. J. A. Perera ; Mr. F. R. Senanayake ; Captain P. W. Mathew, R.A.M.C. ; the Hon. Dr. G. J. Rutherford ; Mr. Harold Creasy ; and Mr. J. K. Hormusjee.

1. The Minutes of the General Meeting of August 3, 1917, having been previously printed, and a copy thereof having been sent to each Member of Council, were taken as read.

Resolved that the Minutes of the General Meeting of August 3, 1917, be confirmed.

2. The Chairman read the following :—Since our last meeting only one case of human plague (bubonic), which occurred at No. 57, Bankshall street, and 3 cases of rat plague have been recorded, excluding registered cases Nos. 117 and 142, which were subsequently cancelled ; this makes a total for this year of 181 human and 54 rat cases. Corresponding totals for last year were 195 human and 48 rat cases, while in the preceding year there were 58 cases of human plague.

3. The Chairman explained that the Member for Maradana Ward had sent in some questions to be included in the agenda, after the due date, but that, with the permission of the Council, the questions may be put.

The permission having been given, Mr. E. G. Jayewardene asked :—

- (a) Whether any gangs of coolies and workmen in the Council's employ have been recently disbanded in consequence of the war conditions now prevailing ?
- (b) How many men have so lost work ?
- (c) Is there no possibility of starting some relief work to give employment to these men ?
- (d) Cannot these men be distributed among other gangs of workmen working in other Departments in the Council's service ?

The Chairman replied as follows :—

The services of no men have so far been discontinued. In order to consolidate the work, the Works Department discontinued one roller and broke up two gangs, consisting of 2 kanganies and 30 coolies, distributing them among other working parties. Some of the coolies were dissatisfied and left, as they were free to do.

In all probability the necessity will arise of making reductions. If so, endeavours will be made to find employment for the men whose services are discontinued.

Owing to the impossibility of obtaining materials, it is anticipated that a reduction of the men employed in the Workshop will have to be made, and I am afraid that in their case work for which they are fitted cannot be found for them.

No coolies have been discharged from the other Departments.

The City Sanitation Department has actually increased its labour force.

In the event of men being turned off, the City Sanitation Department and the Waterworks Department may be able to take on some additional men, provided they are suitable for the special work of these Departments.

4. Pursuant to notice, Mr. E. G. Jayewardene presented a petition from S. M. Hadjie Cassim, trustee, and Assena Lebbe Segu Lebbe, chief priest, of the Maradana mosque, praying that the quantity of water now allowed per month, free of charge, for purposes of ablutions in the Maradana mosque be increased to 50,000 gallons, and moved that the prayer of the petitioners be granted. Mr. C. P. Dias seconded. The Hon. Mr. N. H. M. Abdul Cader supported the motion.

Mr. F. R. Senanayake, while in entire sympathy with the motion, suggested that the question of the supply of water to all the mosques in Colombo be considered and dealt with at the same time.

The Chairman suggested that the matter be referred to the Standing Committees on Sanitation and Markets, Municipal Works and Finance.

The mover having assented to this suggestion, it was resolved that the petition be received and referred to the Standing Committees mentioned and be submitted, if possible, with the recommendation of these Committees to the Council at its next meeting.

5. (1) Pursuant to notice, Mr. H. L. de Mel moved that a report on the recent outbreak of rabies, with steps taken by the Council in regard thereto, be furnished to Members of Council. Mr. C. P. Dias seconded.

The Chairman stated that rabies had always been in Colombo, and he saw no prospect of entirely eradicating it from the Island, unless very drastic measures were to be taken by the destruction of the majority of dogs and all the jackals. Every dog is a potential source of danger, and only those persons who are capable of exercising a proper control over a dog should be permitted to own one. In the circumstances, the only practical way of dealing with the question appeared to be to reduce as far as possible the number of dogs, and this should, in his opinion, be adopted as a fixed policy by the Council. He next touched on the registration of dogs and the capture and destruction of stray dogs, and pointed out that under the rules the police were only empowered to destroy all stray dogs, or rather dogs which were not under proper control in public places. The returns showed an increase of seizures since 1913 :—

and he was satisfied that at no time had there been fewer stray dogs about the streets and public places in Colombo.

He read the correspondence (Chairman's letter to the Hon. the Colonial Secretary No. 200 of July 30, 1917, and the Hon. the Colonial Secretary's reply No. 123 of August 21, 1917) which he had with the Government on the subject of examinations held by the Government Bacteriologist, from which it will be seen that no fee is ever charged when the post-mortem examination of a dog is asked for by the health authorities, the police, a medical officer of health, or the Government or Municipal Veterinary Surgeon for public health reasons, and that in all cases where persons have been bitten investigations have been carried out free of charge.

The Superintendent of Police, Colombo, had reported that 67 dogs had been shot since the issue of the guns supplied by the Council. A continuance of this policy would, he stated, lead to a very material diminution of the numbers of stray dogs. He read the following statement supplied by the Financial Assistant:—

In taking steps to ascertain the dogs which had not been registered, an innovation had been introduced, whereby, instead of visits being paid by a solitary inspector of the Finance Department, single districts were selected and visited by a posse of inspectors, the police, and dog seizers. By this means up to date 255 unregistered dogs had been discovered, and also 57 dogs which had no owners.

He considered that an alteration should be made in the law with regard to the maximum fee to be imposed, which was at present Re. 1.50 per annum. The Special Committee re the Municipal Commission in their report had recommended a maximum of Rs. 2.50, but when considering that report later at that meeting he would suggest that the maximum of the annual tax on dog should be raised to Rs. 5.

It was resolved that the reports and papers be circulated for the information of Members.

(2) Pursuant to notice, Mr. H. L. de Mel moved that a report on the prevalence of rinderpest in the city and steps taken to check it be furnished to Members of Council. Dr. W. P. Rodrigo seconded.

The Chairman stated that there had been a very severe outbreak of rinderpest this year. At present it was chiefly in the northern area of Colombo, but there were one or two cases in the southern part. The ordinary precautionary measures usually adopted were carried out by the Municipal Veterinary Surgeon and his staff of three inspectors. As soon as information is obtained of a case the place is visited. The sick cattle are transported to a segregation camp in a specially constructed ambulance cart, which is thoroughly disinfected after each trip. In one or two exceptional cases sick cattle were allowed to remain on the premises where there was no danger of the disease spreading to outside cattle. Isolated cattle were placed under a police guard night and day. This took up a very large number of police. That was the reason why he considered contacts should be placed in a separate camp by themselves. With that object, a camp had already been established in Wellawatta for the segregation of contacts. He was looking out for another suitable site in the northern part of Colombo. These camps would be in addition to the isolation camp for the diseased animals. In a city like Colombo it was impracticable to declare any portion of it as infected and shut up the roads in that area. He had had special notices in red type posted up at the places at which cattle had been segregated. Inoculation of cattle had been carried out in cases where the owners were willing to pay for the anti-rinderpest serum. So far it had not been compulsory. He was submitting a recommendation to the Council through the Committees that in future cases contacts should be inoculated by the Council, and that no charge should be made in such cases. During the year there had been 29 prosecutions entered for infringement of the rules. There was much greater inclination now to report cases than in former years. Concealments had been fewer in number. There were cases, however, where concealment did take place. He was asking therefore that the Committee should make an alteration in the existing by-laws. Further, precautions were being taken by prohibiting the bathing of cattle in certain places and the use of drinking troughs. He stated that the staff had been increased by three additional inspectors and by the employment of a disinfecting gang. He anticipated that with the introduction of compulsory inoculation and separate camps for contacts the disease would be checked. With regard to the Municipal cattle, they had been absolutely free. The cattle used by the contractors in the Scavenging Department were isolated at Maligakanda. Night soil cattle had been free entirely.

The Chairman moved that the papers be circulated. Mr. H. L. de Mel seconded.—Carried.

6. Pursuant to notice, the Chairman moved that the Council do decide, under section 29 of Ordinance No. 6 of 1910, that Mr. T. L. Villiers continue to be a Councillor, although he has failed to attend three consecutive General Meetings. Mr. C. P. Dias seconded.—Carried.

Mr. C. P. Dias moved that the Council do go into Committee to consider items Nos. 7 to 12 (inclusive) on the agenda. Mr. E. G. Jayewardene seconded.—Carried.

7. To consider the further report of the Special Committee appointed on May 4, 1915, to consider the report of the Municipal Commission and letter No. 43 of March 27, 1915, from the Hon. the Colonial Secretary.

Mr. Arthur Alvis moved that this Council is of opinion (1) that the present practice with regard to the fixing of the annual rate should be continued; (2) that the maximum of the amount to be charged under section 5 of Ordinance No. 25 of 1901 for the registration of dogs be raised to a sum not exceeding Rs. 5 instead of Rs. 2.50 as provided for at the end of paragraph 3 of the report; (3) that the report be adopted with the above amendments. Mr. L. B. Fernando seconded. Mr. J. A. Perera supported.

The Chairman put the motion to the meeting and declared it carried.

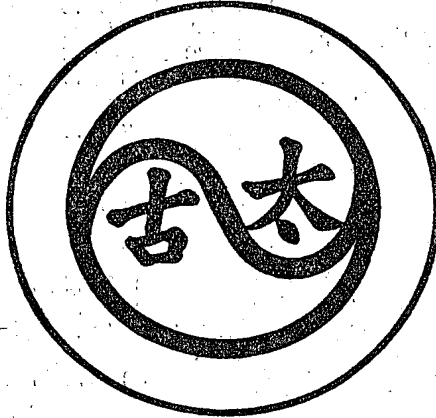
