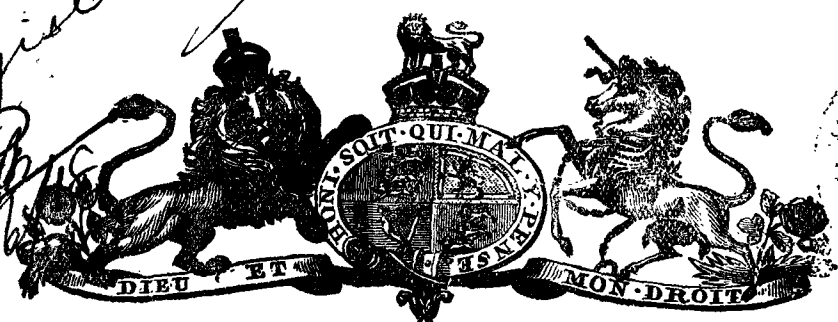

SCHEDULE.

GOVERNMENT NOTIFICATIONS.

“THE PILGRIMAGES ORDINANCE, No. 13 OF 1896.”

Kataragama Pilgrimage.

IN terms of rule No. 11 of regulations framed under Ordinance No. 13 of 1896 for the conduct of the Kataragama pilgrimage, it is hereby notified for general information that any person proceeding to Ruhunu Maha Kataragama Dewale at Kataragama during Ehela and Imaha Kachchi festivals without first obtaining a permit from the Government Agents or Assistant Government Agents of the respective districts will be liable, under section 2 of the aforesaid Ordinance, to a fine not exceeding Rs. 1,000, or to rigorous or simple imprisonment for a term not exceeding one year.

“THE PILGRIMAGES ORDINANCE, No. 13 OF 1896.”

THE following rules and orders made by the Officer Administering the Government, with the advice of the Executive Council, under Ordinance No. 13 of 1896, entitled “An Ordinance relating to Pilgrimages,” for the conduct of the Kataragama pilgrimage and festival, where special precautions have been and are necessary, are published for general information, in lieu of the rules promulgated annually for several years.

Rules.

1. For sanitary reasons the duration of the Kataragama Esala Festival and of the stay of pilgrims at Kataragama shall be and it is hereby limited to 16 days, namely, from July 8 to 23, 1918, inclusive. Pilgrims arriving before the day first named or staying beyond the period here prescribed shall be guilty of an offence.
 2. It shall be lawful for the Police authorities or any Police Magistrate at any place on the line of march to prohibit from proceeding all persons who, by reason of disease, infirmity, weakness, advanced age, youth, want of supplies, or other sufficient cause, are considered unfit to undertake the journey, or who appear likely to fall ill and endanger the health of others; and to require such persons to find security to ensure their obedience to the orders so given. In default of such security being found, it shall be lawful for the said Police authorities or Police Magistrate to detain such persons in custody for a period not exceeding three days.
 3. In the event of an epidemic breaking out at Kataragama during the festival, it shall be lawful for the officers appointed to enforce the observance of orders to declare the festival at an end, and to direct pilgrims at once to leave the village and proceed to their homes, and to prescribe the roads they have to travel.
 4. The officers appointed to enforce the observance of orders shall have power on the line of march to and from Kataragama and at Kataragama—
 - (a) To appoint particular places to be exclusively used by the pilgrims for washing and bathing, for drawing water and drinking, and for natural offices.
 - (b) To appoint places for the occupation of each class of pilgrims.
 - (c) To prescribe routes for the journey of any body of pilgrims.
 - (d) To regulate the distribution of all food given to pilgrims.
 - (e) To fix separate places of abode for pilgrims who fall ill, to prohibit communication with them, and to detain them if unfit to travel.
 5. The Police are empowered and required to seize and destroy all food condemned as unwholesome on the march or in camp by the Medical Officer, or, if there be none, by the Chief Officer of Police; and any persons resisting or obstructing the Police in the discharge of this or of any other duty prescribed by these rules shall be deemed guilty of an offence.
 6. Any person bringing any cattle or cart bulls to the camp shall, immediately after unloading passengers and goods, halt such carts and cattle on the fields at Detagamuwa.
 7. Any person selling meat in camp in any other place than that assigned for the purpose by the officer in charge of the camp, and any other person selling food condemned as unwholesome by the Medical Officer, or in his absence by the Chief Officer of Police, shall be deemed guilty of an offence.
 8. Any person who shall, during the occupation of the camp, use any other place for offices of nature than that provided for the purpose by Government, or shall fail to cover the deposit with earth or sand, and any person who shall during the same period bathe in or enter the river above the spot appointed by the officer in charge of the camp, shall be deemed guilty of an offence.
 9. Any person suffering from an infectious or a contagious disease, and not reporting the same to the Medical Officer, or in his absence to the Chief Officer of Police, and any person abetting or assisting in the concealment of such disease, shall be deemed guilty of an offence.
 10. All persons shall take up the quarters assigned to them by the Chief Officer of Police at the halting places and in the camp, and any person declining or neglecting to do so shall be deemed guilty of an offence.
 11. No person shall proceed on the pilgrimage in the year 1918 without having first obtained a ticket from the Government Agent or Assistant Government Agent of the district in which he resides, or in the case of Indian pilgrims from the Chairman, Plague Committee.
 12. Every person proceeding on the pilgrimage shall show his ticket when required to do so by any officer of Police, or by any officer appointed to enforce the observance of orders under the Ordinance aforesaid.
 13. The transfer of a ticket by the person named in it and the use of it by any other person are forbidden.
- Any person disobeying an order given by the appointed officers shall be guilty of an offence.

Candidates may take up three, and not more than three, of the voluntary subjects, and not more than one from each of the groups (a), (b), (c), and (d). The same subject may not be offered both as a voluntary and as an obligatory subject.

Syllabus of Subjects.

Note.—No text books will be prescribed for any subject. An idea of the standard of the examination may be obtained by reference to the reprint of the papers set at the examination of June, 1914, which may be purchased (price 6d.) from H. M. Stationery Office, Imperial House, Kingsway, London, W.C. 2.

ENGLISH.

English Language and Composition.—The subject will include—

- A subject for an essay to be chosen by each candidate from several subjects set. Those proposed may include some having reference to Geography and History, and some involving an acquaintance with English authors, as well as more abstract subjects, the main object being to test power of expression, thought and arrangement, general reading, and knowledge. (All candidates will be expected to attempt the essay, to which special importance is attached.)
- Questions testing knowledge and command of English. These may include questions on précis writing, paraphrase, and analysis of sentences.
- Questions testing general reading and knowledge of English books.

MATHEMATICS, CLASS I.

Arithmetic.—The ordinary rules, with applications more specially to the mensuration of plane figures and solids. The metric system, and the use of decimals in approximate calculation. The use and theory of recurring decimals are not required, and candidates are at liberty to use algebraic symbols and formulas and tables of logarithms.

Geometry.—Plane geometry, theoretical and practical, not excluding simple problems in three dimensions, Proportion may be treated arithmetically; the special treatment of incommensurables is not required.

Algebra.—Including graphs of the simpler algebraic functions; quadratic equations; use of graphs in solving equations, and in illustrating and solving practical questions; rate of variation of a function and gradient or slope of a graph; graphic interpolation; indices and the simpler properties of surds.

Trigonometry.—Up to and including solution of plane triangles; graphs of trigonometrical functions.

Grasp of elementary principles and readiness in practical application will be looked for, but no great analytical skill will be demanded. Numerical results should be given to a few significant figures, and rough checks on the accuracy of the results should be applied. Neatness and accuracy of working are expected, and sufficient indication of the method of solution to make the work immediately intelligible.

The examination will include laboratory work. Acquaintance is expected with the balance and steel-yard, and with the method of finding volume by weighing in air and in water.

LATIN.

The paper will include (1) questions on grammar; (2) unprepared passages for translation into English, with questions; (3) one or more easy unprepared passages for translation into English, a vocabulary of unfamiliar words being given; (4) one or more unprepared passages of ordinary difficulty for translation into English; (5) easy sentences for translation into Latin; (6) one or more continuous passages for translation into Latin.

BOOKKEEPING AND ACCOUNTING.

Knowledge of the general principles of Bookkeeping and Accounting. Bookkeeping by double entry.

MATHEMATICS, CLASS II.

Includes Mathematics, Class I., together with Mechanics. The principles of the lever and of the inclined plane, the composition of forces and virtual work, their experimental investigation and applications to machines and other simple cases of equilibrium. Centre of gravity, couple or torque, velocity ratio, mechanical advantage or force-ratio, work, efficiency. Application to liquids and gases. Density. Boyle's Law. Pump, siphon, barometer, manometer. Velocity, acceleration, momentum, force, impulse of a force, energy, power or rate of work.

The examination in Mathematics, Class II., will include laboratory work.

CHEMISTRY.

The following outline indicates the range of the examination :—

I.—Written.

The methods which lead to the discovery of the composition of common materials occurring in nature.

The determination of molecular weights, equivalents, and of atomic weights. Valency and structural formulæ.

Classification of the elements, including the Periodic Scheme.

General characters of the chief types of compounds, including acids, bases, and salts and a few prominent carbon compounds, especially as illustrating the relations of properties to composition and structure. No distinction will be admitted between Organic and Inorganic Chemistry.

History, production and properties of the more important and typical elements and their most familiar compounds.

The character of chemical changes, including combustion, thermal dissociation, and electrolysis; the conditions which determine and influence them, and the attendant phenomena.

The whole to be treated in an elementary manner.

Candidates will be required to show that they have seen and practised a great variety of experiments, and are familiar with the appearance of common laboratory materials.

II.—Practical Examination.

Candidates will be required to show that they are familiar with easy quantitative operations, gravimetric and volumetric, with the rudiments of qualitative analysis, and that they have prepared a number of elements or compounds by processes involving the manipulation of gases and the purification of substances by crystallization, distillation, &c. Candidates must bring to the practical examination the notebooks which contain the record of the experimental work they have performed. Specimens made by the candidate, duly attested by the teacher, if any, may also be submitted to the examiners.

PHYSICS.

The following Syllabus indicates the general scope and character of the examination, without being exhaustive of all parts of the subject. Candidates are expected to show a general acquaintance with the apparatus by which the elementary principles of Physics are illustrated and applied :—

General Properties of Solids, Liquids, and Gases.—Relation between Volume and Pressure in Gases. Diffusion in Liquids and Gases.

Heat.—Definition of Temperature. Construction and use of Instruments for the measurement of Temperature.

Expansion of Solids, Liquids, and Gases with rise of Temperature. Convection in Fluids.

Change of State. Latent Heat. Vapour Pressure. Boiling Point.

Dew-point. Formation of Cloud, Fog, and Dew.

Conduction. Definition of Thermal Conductivity.

Radiation: its Emission, Propagation, Reflection, Refraction, and Absorption; its Relation to Light.

The Mechanical Equivalent of Heat and Modes of Determination. The Conservation of Energy.

Sound.—The Production and Propagation of Sound.

Nature of Wave-motion. Amplitudes. Wave-length. Frequency.

Experimental determination of the Velocity of Sound in Air. Echoes. Effect of change of Temperature on the Velocity.

Determination of Frequency by simple methods.

Experimental investigation of the modes of Vibration of Strings by means of the Sonometer.

Experimental investigation of the Vibrations of Air in Pipes by Resonance to Tuning Forks.

Organ Pipes. Position of Nodes and Antinodes.

Optics.—Propagation of Light. Measurement of Velocity. Laws of Reflection and Refraction. Photometry.

Reflection at Plane and Spherical Surfaces, and the formation of Images.

Refraction at Plane Surfaces and by Prisms. Minimum deviation. Chromatic dispersion.

The formation of Images by single Lenses. Long and Short Sight and their correction by Lenses.

The Combination of Two Lenses to form a simple Telescope or Microscope.

Magnetism and Electricity.—Properties of Magnets. Simple Phenomena of Magnetism and of Magnetic Induction (Influence).

The Magnetic Field. Lines of Force. The Law of Magnetic Force.

The Earth as a Magnet.

The Simpler Phenomena of Electrified Bodies. Conduction and Insulation. Electrification by Friction and by Induction (Influence).

Distribution of Electrification on Conductors.

Electric Field. Strength of Field.

The Law of Electric Force.

Potential. Capacity. Energy of Charge.
 Electric Discharge and Electric Current.
 Primary and Secondary Batteries.

GEOGRAPHY AND HISTORY. (*Two Papers.*)

Geography.—Questions on descriptive and general geography, with special reference to the Geography of Ceylon.

History.—The general course of English History from the accession of Henry VII. to the present time; the main lines of development of the British Empire; a knowledge in some detail of the History of Ceylon.

SINHALESE.

Translation of passages from Sinhalese into English and from English into Sinhalese. Questions on Grammar. A fair knowledge of Sinhalese literature will be expected. An oral examination will also be held locally, in which candidates will be tested as to their ability to interpret from Sinhalese into English and *vice versa*.

TAMIL.

Translation of passages from Tamil into English and from English into Tamil. Questions on Grammar. A fair knowledge of Tamil literature will be expected. An oral examination will also be held locally, in which candidates will be tested as to their ability to interpret from Tamil into English and *vice versa*.

GREEK.

The paper will include (1) questions on grammar; (2) unprepared passages for translation into English, with questions; (3) one or more easy unprepared passages for translation into English, a vocabulary of unfamiliar words being given; (4) one or more unprepared passages of ordinary difficulty for translation into English; (5) easy sentences for translation into Greek; (6) one or more continuous passages for translation into Greek.

THE following rules relating to the grant of retiring pensions and gratuities to officers of the Local Board, Kegalla, prescribed by His Excellency the Officer Administering the Government, in Executive Council, under the provisions of section 87 of Ordinance No. 13 of 1898, are published for general information.

Rules relating to Pension to Officers of the Local Board of Kegalla.

1. No pension will be granted to any officer of the Local Board of Kegalla without the authority of the Governor, in order to obtain which certificates of service, viz., good conduct, and of the ground of retirement must be submitted to the Colonial Secretary.
2. Subject to the provisions of rule 1 and of the other rules relating to pensions herein contained, all officers of the Local Board of Kegalla on the fixed establishment drawing a salary of Rs. 250 per annum and upwards may be granted pension as follows:—
Any officer who shall have served ten years and under eleven years shall receive an annual allowance of ten-sixtieths of the annual salary of his office, eleven years and under twelve years an annual allowance of eleven-sixtieths of such salary, and in like manner a further addition to the annual allowance of one-sixtieth in respect of each additional year of such service until the completion of a period of service of thirty-five years, when the annual allowance of thirty-five-sixtieths may be granted, and no addition shall be made in respect of any service beyond thirty-five years. Provided that officers in office at the date of the passing of these rules who do not receive promotion or new appointments shall be entitled to pension at three-fourths of the rates prescribed in this section.
3. No officer of the Local Board shall be deemed to have an absolute right to compensation for past services, or to any pension under these rules; and the Local Board will retain power and authority to dismiss any such officer without compensation or pension.
4. No pension shall be granted to any officer of the Local Board who shall be under fifty-five years of age, unless upon certificate from the Chairman of the Local Board and from two medical practitioners that he is incapable from infirmity of mind or body to discharge the duties of his situation, nor unless he shall have discharged those duties with diligence and fidelity to the satisfaction of the Chairman.
5. It will be competent to the Local Board, with the authority of the Governor, in cases of peculiar and extraordinary merit in respect of duties outside of those for which the officer has received a salary, to grant special and higher rates of pension than those laid down in these rules.
6. Pension at the above-mentioned rate is to be granted only in cases of decidedly faithful and meritorious service, but when the testimony as to fidelity, diligence, and merit is in any respect defective, a deduction will be made from the apportioned rates. Where there has been obvious negligence, irregularity, or misconduct, the grant of allowance will be altogether withheld.
7. The claim of an officer of the Local Board to pension will be considered to have commenced from the date of his first permanent appointment to the fixed establishment of the Local Board.
8. Every officer on the provisional and temporary establishment will, in the event of transfer to the fixed establishment, be entitled to reckon his provisional and temporary service when it has been continuous with his subsequent permanent service.
9. The service in respect of which superannuation allowances are granted must in all cases have been continuous, unless interrupted by abolition of office or other temporary suspension of employment not arising from misconduct or voluntary resignation of the officer.
10. The pension shall be computed upon the salary of the permanent office held by an officer of the Local Board at the time of his retirement, provided he shall have held such appointment for at least three years, otherwise the pension shall be calculated upon the average of the salaries attached to the permanent offices held by such person during the three years next preceding the commencement of such pension.
11. In case of suspension or reduction or abolition of office, temporary allowances may be assigned agreeably to the specified rate on condition, however that the parties receiving the same shall be liable to be recalled into service, power being reserved to the Local Board on resuscitation of any such office to appoint any other person to fill such office if the Board so thinks fit.
12. In the case of officers to whom temporary allowances may be assigned in accordance with rule 11 on the abolition or re-organization of their offices, and who may be afterwards re-employed, one-half of the period during which they have been in the receipt of such allowance will be counted towards pension on their final retirement.
13. In case of abolition of office, (a) persons who shall have served twenty years and upwards shall be entitled to add to their actual service a period of ten years in computing their retiring allowance; (b) persons who shall have served under twenty years and not less than ten years, a period of seven years; (c) persons who shall have served under fifteen years and not less than ten years, a period of five years; (d) in the case of persons who shall have served under ten years and not less than five years, a gratuity shall be granted calculated at the rate of one month's pay for each year's service, with an additional allowance of three months' pay; (e) in the case of persons who shall have served less than five years, a gratuity shall be granted calculated at the rate of one month's pay for each year's service, with one month's pay added; (f) the number of years to be added to actual service on abolition of office should not be more than that which, if added to the age of the retiring officer, would make that age up to sixty, except that one year would be added in the case of an officer of sixty or more, unless the officer was quite disqualified for further service.
14. In the case of persons who, if they served the time granted by rule 13 for compensation, would be over fifty-five years, and who may retire through abolition of office, the provisions in rule 13 will not apply, but each particular case will be decided according to the view that may be taken, after a full consideration of all the circumstances attending it.
15. Should the term of service not warrant the assignment of an annual allowance, a gratuity may be granted at the rate of one month's salary for each year of service. For a fractional part of a year's service exceeding six months, half a month's salary will be added to the gratuity.
16. If any person being in the receipt of any pension or superannuation allowance from the Local Board shall be convicted of an offence in any court of justice in this Island for which he shall be sentenced to death, or to any term of imprisonment with hard labour exceeding six months, such pension or superannuation allowance shall forthwith determine and cease to be payable, unless such person shall, within three months after his conviction, receive free pardon, or unless the Local Board shall otherwise order.
17. Every pensionable officer appointed to any office under the Local Board may be required to retire from the service of the Local Board on or after attaining the age of fifty-five upon the receipt of twelve months' notice to that effect.
18. Every officer of the Local Board of Kegalla on the fixed establishment drawing a salary of Rs. 250 per annum and upwards shall contribute towards the cost of his pension at the rate of 4 per cent. of the salary he is drawing. Such contribution shall be deducted from his salary monthly, and credited to the revenue of the Board, and pensions shall be paid from revenue as part of the ordinary expenditure. No officer shall be entitled to any pension unless he has paid his contribution as provided herein.
19. An officer who resigns his appointment under the Board for employment elsewhere shall forfeit his right to

pension from the Board, unless he shall have served for a period of not less than ten years, when half the ordinary pension rates may be awarded him at the discretion of the Board; such pension to be calculated upon the average of the salaries attaching to his permanent office during the three years preceding his resignation.

20. Should an officer be transferred to a post under Government or under another Local Board or other public authority with the approval of the Kegalla Board, he shall retain his claim to ultimate pension for service rendered to the Kegalla Board, provided that he finally retires under circumstances which would qualify him for pension in terms of these rules.

21. Should an officer who retires on pension find after such retirement an employment under Government, or under another semi-official body, on a salary equal to or higher than that which he drew from the Board at the time of his retirement, his pension shall be suspended so long as such employment continues. If he draws a less salary, he shall be entitled to only so much of his pension as, when added to the salary of the new appointment, will make his total emolument equal to the salary last drawn by him previous to his retirement.

22. When an officer seeking pension under these rules is found to be already in receipt of a pension from another public body or from Government, his maximum pension under these rules shall when added to such other pension not exceed thirty-five-sixtieths of the highest salary drawn by the officer at any time during the course of his service, be it under Government or under a semi-official body.

23. Local Board employes drawing a salary of less than Rs. 250 per annum and retiring on account of age or infirmity after serving continuously for a period of twenty-five years and upwards may, if the Board be satisfied that they are unfit, owing to age or infirmity of mind or body, to discharge efficiently the duties of their office, be granted such long service allowance not exceeding Rs. 5 per mensem in each case as the Board may award. Persons in receipt of a daily pay, who have completed a period of twenty-five years of continuous service, retiring under similar circumstances may be awarded gratuities calculated at the rate of one month's pay for every three years of service.

24. Subject to the approval of His Excellency the Governor, the Board may allow a gratuity to the widow or orphan or an officer in the event of his death, provided that he has not received from the Board any gratuity.

“THE CEYLON RAILWAYS ORDINANCE, 1902.”

IT is hereby notified that His Excellency the Officer Administering the Government, in exercise of the powers vested in him by section 5 of “The Ceylon Railways Ordinance, 1902,” and with the advice of the Executive Council, has been pleased to make the addition set forth in the schedule hereto to rule 26 of the rules and rates for the conveyance of goods traffic dated October 11, 1907, with effect from July 1, 1918.

Addition to Rule 26 of the Goods Regulations referred to.

26 A. Country-grown fruit, vegetables, and paddy for consumption in the Island will, as an experiment, be conveyed at a special rate of 6 cents per ton per mile from stations between Maho, Paranthan, and Murunkan (all inclusive), and at 6th class rates from other stations, under the following conditions:—

(a) The traffic will be conveyed at owner's risk, and the reduced rates will apply only from stations serving the districts where the produce is grown. Consignors must enter and sign the following declaration on the “Owner's Risk” consignment note:—

“I certify that the fruit, vegetables, or paddy herewith consigned by me are country grown, and intended for consumption in Ceylon only.”

Any person submitting a false declaration will be prosecuted in terms of section 22 of the Railways Ordinance, No. 9 of 1902.

(b) The minimum weight accepted per consignment will be 4 tons in the case of paddy, and 28 pounds in the case of fruits and vegetables.

(c) The minimum charge per consignment will be 10 cents.

(d) The packages containing the traffic must be sufficiently strong and sound to prevent damage in transit.

(e) The concession will not apply to coconuts and similar produce, nor to any produce for export or manufacture.

VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Weekly Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended June 8, 1918.

Births.—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 124 (1 European, 9 Burghers, 73 Sinhalese, 16 Tamils, 16 Moors, 7 Malays, and 2 Others). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on January 1, 1918, viz., 272,234) was 23·8, as against 18·4 in the preceding week, 16·0 in the corresponding week of last year, and 22·1 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 89 (4 Burghers, 44 Sinhalese, 20 Tamils, 15 Moors, 3 Malays, and 3 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 17·1, as against 18·6 in the previous week, 19·4 in the corresponding week of last year, and 23·7 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 89 total deaths, 24 were of infants under one year of age, as against 30 in the preceding week, 27 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 28 the average for last year.

Stillbirths.—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 6.

Principal Causes of Death.—Twelve deaths from *Pneumonia* were registered, 4 in Maradana (including 1 death of a non-resident in hospital), 3 in Wellawatta, 2 in New Bazaar, 1 in San Sebastian, 1 in St. Paul's, and 1 in Kotahena, as against 11 in the previous week and 13 the weekly average for last year. Two deaths from *Bronchitis* were registered.

2. Eight deaths from *Phthisis* were registered, 4 in Maradana (including 2 deaths of non-residents in hospitals), 1 in San Sebastian, 1 in Kotahena, 1 in Slave Island, and 1 in Kollupitiya, as against 5 in the previous week and 13 the weekly average for last year.

3. Four deaths from *Enteric Fever* were registered, 3 in Maradana (including 1 death of a non-resident in hospital) and 1 in Slave Island, as against 3 in the previous week and 3 the weekly average for last year.

4. No deaths from *Plague* were registered either this week or the preceding two weeks. One case was reported, as against nil in the previous week.

5. Ten deaths from *Debility* were registered, 10 from *Infantile Convulsions*, 6 from *Enteritis*, 2 from *Diarrhœa*, 2 from *Worms*, and 33 from *Other Causes*.

6. Thirteen cases of *Chickenpox*, 5 of *Measles*, and 2 of *Smallpox* were reported during the week, as against 20, 6, and 1, respectively, during the preceding week.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 82·4°, against 82·2° in the preceding week and 81·6° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29·912 in., against 29·885 in. in the preceding week and 29·822 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 0·30 in., against 0·01 in. in the preceding week and 1·27 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.

"Improvements relating to elastic or resilient tyres for vehicle wheels."

Abstract :—This invention relates to elastic or resilient tyres for vehicle wheels and consists essentially in providing an improved bearing surface or tread for such tyres, the chief objects being to ensure great adhesion between the parts constituting the tyre to prevent oxidation or rusting and to obtain a practically homogeneous mass whereby the structure is rendered strong and durable and not liable to deterioration or dislocation.

The invention comprises a ring or band of metal, such as good flexible steel which constitutes the tread of the tyre and which is formed or provided on the inner face with longitudinal or circumferential grooves of dovetail formation. Holes or perforations are made in the grooves at suitable intervals, the holes penetrating to the outer face of the ring or band. The holes or perforations are countersunk and of tapered form. The inner surface of the ring or band is also roughened preferably by tearing the metal whilst machining the said surface, the latter thereby presenting the appearance of a file. The surfaces of the ring or band are served or plated with an alloy of copper, zinc, and antimony for the purpose of preserving the same from oxidation or rusting. The grooves in the ring or band are furnished with bands or strips of rubber, and the said ring or band so prepared is forced into position on the periphery of the tyre in any suitable manner, and the holes or perforations filled with rubber plugs. The structure is then subjected to vulcanization in a mould, the pressure on the latter being gradually increased while cooling after vulcanization.

The claims are:

1. An elastic or resilient tyre for vehicle wheels provided with a bearing surface or tread comprising a ring or band of metal having on its inner face longitudinal or circumferential dovetail-shaped grooves and holes or perforations, the said grooves and holes being furnished or filled with rubber strips or bands and plugs or keys respectively, substantially as and for the purposes specified.

2. In an elastic or resilient tyre for vehicle wheels provided with a bearing surface or tread as herein referred to coating or plating the metal surfaces with an alloy composed of copper, zinc, and antimony in suitable proportions for the purpose specified.

3. In an elastic or resilient tyre for vehicle wheels having a bearing surface or tread as herein described applied by vulcanization the application of a gradually increased pressure upon the mould while the structure is cooling subsequent to final vulcanization for the purpose specified.

4. An elastic or resilient tyre for vehicle wheels substantially as herein described and illustrated for the purposes specified.

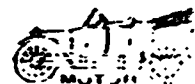

REGULATIONS.

- The Regulations contained in Table C in the schedule annexed to "The Joint Stock Companies Ordinance of 1861" shall not apply to this Company, which shall be governed by the regulations contained in these Articles, but subject to repeal, addition, or alteration by special resolution of this Company.

BUSINESS.

- The Company shall proceed to carry on business as soon after the registration thereof as the Directors shall think fit; and notwithstanding the whole of the shares shall not have been subscribed, or applied for, or allotted, they shall do so as soon as, in the judgment of the Directors, a sufficient number of shares shall have been subscribed, applied for, or allotted.

SHARES.

23. If the requisitions of any such notice are not complied with, any share in respect of which such notice has been given, may, at any time thereafter, be forfeited by a resolution of the Directors to that effect.
24. Any shares so forfeited shall be deemed to be the property of the Company and may be disposed of in such manner as the Company thinks fit.
25. Any Shareholder whose share has been forfeited shall notwithstanding be liable to pay to the Company all moneys owing upon such shares at the time of forfeiture.

CAPITAL.

26. The Directors may, with the sanction of the Company previously given in a General Meeting, increase its capital by the creation of new shares.
27. The capital raised by the creation of new shares shall be considered part of the original capital, and shall be subject to the same provisions in all respects whether with reference to the payment of calls or otherwise, as if it had been part of the original capital.

MEETINGS.

28. The First General Meeting shall be held at such time, not being more than twelve months after the incorporation of the Company, and at such place as the Directors may determine.
29. Subsequent General Meetings may be held at such time and place as may be prescribed by the Company in a General Meeting, and if not so prescribed, then at such place and at such time in the month of July in each year as the Directors shall determine.
30. The above-mentioned General Meetings shall be called Ordinary Meetings. All other General Meetings shall be called Extraordinary.
31. The Directors may, whenever they think fit, and shall upon a requisition made in writing by any number of Shareholders holding in the aggregate not less than one-fifth part of the shares of the Company, convene an Extraordinary General Meeting.
32. Any requisition so made by the Shareholders shall express the object of the meeting proposed to be called, and shall be left at the registered office of the Company.
33. Upon the receipt of such requisition the Directors shall forthwith proceed to convene a General Meeting; if they do not proceed to convene the same within twenty-one days from the date of the requisition, the requisitionists or any other Shareholders holding the required number of shares may themselves convene a meeting.
34. Twenty-one days' notice at least, specifying the place and the hour of meeting, and the purpose for which any General Meeting is to be held, shall be given by advertisement or in such other manner, if any, as may be prescribed by the Company.
35. Any Shareholder may, on giving not less than seven days' previous notice of any resolution, submit the same to the meeting.

36. Such notice shall be given by leaving a copy of the resolution at the registered office of the Company.
37. No business shall be transacted at any meeting, except the declaration of the dividend, unless a quorum of Shareholders is present at the commencement of such business, and such quorum shall be ascertained as follows, that is to say, if the Shareholders belonging to the Company at the time of the meeting do not exceed twenty in number, the quorum shall be ten; if they exceed twenty, there shall be added to the above quorum one for every additional ten Shareholders, with this limitation that no quorum shall in any case exceed forty.
38. If within one hour from the time appointed for the meeting the required number of Shareholders is not present, the meeting, if convened upon the requisition of Shareholders, shall be dissolved. In any other case it shall stand adjourned at the same time and place; and if at such adjourned meeting the required number of Shareholders is not present, it shall be adjourned *sine die*.
39. The Chairman, if any, of the Board of Directors shall preside at every meeting of the Company. If there be no such Chairman, or if at any meeting he is not present, the Shareholders present shall choose one of the members to be the Chairman of the meeting.
40. The Chairman may, with the consent of the meeting, adjourn any meeting from time to time and place to place, but no business shall be transacted at any adjourned meeting other than the business left unfinished at the meeting from which the adjournment took place.
41. At any General Meeting, unless a poll is demanded by at least five Shareholders, a declaration by the Chairman that a resolution has been carried and any entry to that effect in the book of proceedings of the Company, shall be sufficient evidence of the fact without proof of the number or proportion of the votes recorded for or against such resolution.
42. If a poll is demanded in the manner aforesaid, the same shall be taken in such manner as the Chairman directs, and the results of such poll shall be deemed to be the resolution of the Company in General Meeting.
43. Every Shareholder shall have one vote for every share held by him.
44. If any Shareholder is a minor, lunatic, idiot, or a prodigal, he may vote by the person legally appointed to the charge and administration of his property.
45. If two or more persons are jointly entitled to a share or shares, the person whose name stands first in the Register of Shareholders as one of the holders of such share or shares, and no other, shall be entitled to vote in respect of the same.
46. No Shareholder shall be entitled to vote at any meeting, unless all moneys due from him to the Company are paid.
47. Votes may be given either personally or by proxy, and proxy shall be appointed in writing under the hand of the appointer, or if such appointer is a corporation under that seal, and such writing shall be stamped according to the stamp law in force at that time.
48. No person shall be appointed proxy who is not a Shareholder, and the instrument appointing him shall be deposited at the registered office of the Company not less than twenty-four hours before the time of holding the meeting at which he proposes to vote; but no such instrument shall be valid after the expiration of three months from the date of its execution.

DIRECTORS.

49. Until otherwise determined by a General Meeting, the number of Directors shall not be less than seven nor exceed fifteen.
50. The qualification of a Director shall be the holding of ten shares or the obtaining of the votes of a person or persons holding twenty-five shares in the aggregate.
51. The first Directors shall be: (1) K. Kanakasabai, Esq., Proctor, Supreme Court, Jaffna; (2) K. Arulambalam, Esq., Proctor, Jaffna; (3) S. Mittokumarasamychettyar, Merchant, Jaffna; (4) A. Melvegeesam, Merchant, Jaffna; (5) M. Kumarasamy, Merchant, Jaffna; (6) E. Ravalingsam, Planter, Nallore, Jaffna; (7) S. K. Kandiah Pillai, Merchant; and they shall hold office, except in the event of their becoming respectively disqualified, until the First Ordinary General Meeting of the Company.
52. Any casual vacancy in the Board of Directors may be filled up by the Board, but any person so chosen shall hold office only until the next Annual General Meeting.
53. As remuneration for the services the Directors shall be entitled to receive out of the funds of the Company such annual sum as may be voted by the Shareholders in General Meeting. Such remuneration shall be exclusive of any sum paid by way of salary or remuneration to any Managing Director or Directors, and shall be divided among the Directors, as they may determine.
54. The office of a Director shall be vacated—
- (1) If he ceases to hold a number of shares or votes qualifying for the office.
 - (2) If by notice in writing to the Company he resigns.
 - (3) If he becomes insolvent.
 - (4) If he is found lunatic or become of unsound mind.
55. The Company may, by special resolution, remove any Director before the expiration of his term of office and appoint any Shareholder in his stead.
56. At every Ordinary Meeting of the Company the whole of the Directors shall retire from office, but they shall be eligible for re-election.
57. The Directors may from time to time appoint one or more of their body to be Managing Director or Directors of the Company, either for any fixed term or without any limitation as to the period for which he is to hold such office, and may, subject to any contract between him and the Company, from time to time remove or dismiss him from office and appoint another in his place. The remuneration of the Managing Director shall be fixed by the Directors and may be by way of salary, commission, percentage, or participation in profits, or by any or all of these modes. The Directors may from time to time entrust to and confer upon the Managing Director such of the powers exercisable by them as they think fit, subject to such terms and conditions as they may prescribe.
58. The Directors may meet together for dispatch of business, adjourn, and otherwise regulate their meetings as they think fit, and may determine the quorum necessary for the transaction of business; until otherwise determined, seven shall form a quorum.
59. A Director may, and the Secretary at the request of any Director shall, at any time convene a meeting of the Directors. Questions arising at any meeting of the Directors shall be decided by a majority of votes of the Directors present, and in case of equality of votes the Chairman shall have a casting vote.
60. The Directors may elect a Chairman of their meetings and may determine the period for which he shall hold office. If such Chairman has not been appointed or if he is not present at the time appointed for a meeting, the Directors present shall choose some one of those present to be Chairman of such meeting.
61. The Directors shall cause minutes to be made in a book or books provided for and solely used for the purpose—
- (1) Of all appointments of officers made by the Directors.
 - (2) Of the names of Directors present at each meeting of the Directors.
 - (3) Of all orders made by the Directors.
 - (4) Of all resolutions and proceedings of meetings of the Company and of the Directors. And any such minute as aforesaid, if signed by any person purporting to be the Chairman of any meeting of Directors duly called and constituted, shall be receivable in evidence without further proof.

62. A resolution in writing signed by all the Directors shall be as valid and effectual as if it had been passed at a meeting of the Directors duly called and constituted.

63. The Directors may delegate any of their powers to committees consisting of such member or members of their body as they think fit, and may revoke the appointment of any such committee. Any such committee so formed shall, in the exercise of the powers so delegated, conform to any regulations that may from time to time be imposed on it by the Directors.

64. The meetings and proceedings of any such committee consisting of two or more members shall be governed by the provisions herein entered for regulating the meetings of Directors so far as the same are applicable thereto and are not superseded by the express terms of the appointment of the Committee or by any such regulations as aforesaid.

DIVIDEND.

65. The Directors may, with the sanction of the Company in General Meeting, declare a dividend to be paid to the Shareholders in proportion to their shares.

66. No dividend shall be payable except out of the profits arising from the business of the Company and with the sanction of the Directors.

67. The Directors may, before recommending any dividend, set aside out of the profits of the Company such sum as they think fit as a reserve fund to meet contingencies or for equalizing dividends or for repairing or maintaining the works connected with the business of the Company or any part thereof, and the Directors may invest the sums so set apart as a reserve fund upon such security as they may, with the sanction of the Company, select.

68. The Directors may deduct from the dividends payable to any Shareholder all such sums of money as may be due from him to the Company on account of calls or otherwise.

69. No dividend shall bear interest as against the Company.

70. No dividend that may have been declared shall be given to each Shareholder, or sent by post or otherwise to his registered place of abode; and all dividends unclaimed for three years, after having been declared, may be forfeited by the Directors for the benefit of the Company.

71. The Directors shall cause true accounts to be kept of the moneys received and expended by the Company and of all matters in respect of which such receipts and expenditure take place and of the property, assets, credits, and liabilities of the Company. No member shall have any right to insist on the inspection of any account book or document of the Company except as conferred by the Ordinance or authorized by the Directors or by the resolution of the Company in General Meeting.

ACCOUNTS.

72. Once at least in every year the Directors shall lay before the Company in General Meeting a statement of the income and expenditure of the Company for the past year made up to a date not more than three months before such meeting.

73. The statement so made shall show, arranged under the most convenient heads, the amount of gross income distinguishing the several sources from which it has been derived and the amount of gross expenditure distinguishing the expense of the establishment, salaries and other matters.

74. Every item of expenditure fairly chargeable against the year's income shall be brought into account so that a just balance of profit and loss may be laid before the meeting; and in cases where any item of expenditure which may in fairness be distributed over several years has been incurred in any one year, the whole amount of such item may be stated with the addition of the reasons why only a portion of such expenditure is charged against the income of the year.

75. At the Ordinary Meeting in each year the Directors shall lay before the Company a balance sheet containing a summary of the property and liabilities of the Company.

76. A printed copy of the balance sheet shall, twenty-one days previously to such meeting, be delivered or sent by post to the address of every Shareholder.

AUDIT.

77. The accounts of the Company shall be examined and the correctness of the balance sheet ascertained by one or more Auditors to be elected by the Company in General Meeting.

78. The remuneration of the Auditors shall be fixed by the Company at the time of their election.

79. If any casual vacancy occurs in the office of Auditors, the Directors shall forthwith call an Extraordinary General Meeting for the purpose of filling such vacancy.

80. The Directors shall appoint the first Auditors to audit the accounts of the Company until the First Ordinary General Meeting and fix the remuneration payable to them.

81. Every Auditor shall be supplied with a copy of the balance sheet, and it shall be his duty to examine the same with the accounts and vouchers relating thereto.

82. Every Auditor shall have a list delivered to him of all the books kept by the Company, and he shall at all reasonable times have access to the books and accounts of the Company. He may at the expense of the Company employ accountants or other persons to assist him in investigating such accounts and he may in relation to such accounts examine the Directors or any other officers of the Company.

83. The Auditors shall make a report to the Shareholders upon the balance sheet and accounts, and in every such report they shall state, whether in their opinion, the balance sheet is full and fair containing the particulars required by these regulations and properly drawn up so as to exhibit a true and correct view of the state of the Company's affairs; and in case they have called for explanations or information from the Directors, whether such explanations or information have been given by the Directors, and whether they have been satisfactory; and such report shall be read, together with the report of the Directors, at the Ordinary Meeting.

NOTICES.

84. Notices requiring to be served by the Company upon the Shareholders may be served either personally or by leaving the same, or sending the same through the post at their registered places of abode.

85. Every Shareholder shall give an address which shall be deemed his place of abode and shall be registered as such in the books of the Company.

86. Any notice sent by post shall be deemed to have been served at the time when the letter containing the same is posted, and in proving such service, it shall be sufficient to prove that the letter containing the notice was properly addressed and put in a Post Office box or handed at a Post Office.
