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PASSED ORDINANCES.

Ordinance enacted by the Lieutenant-Governor of Ceylon,
with the advice and consent of the Legislative
Council thereof.

No. 7 of 1903.

An Ordinance to Incorporate the Committee of the Institution
known as the Victoria Home for Incurables.

EVERARD IM THURN.

Preamble.

WHEREAS the committee of the institution known as
the Victoria Home for Incurables has applied to be
incorporated for the purpose of effectually transacting the
affairs of the said institution, and of controlling, managing,
and dealing with the property and funds thereof, and it is
expedient that the said application be granted: Be it there-
fore enacted by the Governor of Ceylon, by and with the
advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as
follows:

Short title.

1 This Ordinance may be cited as "The Victoria Home
for Incurables Incorporation Ordinance, 1903," and shall
come into operation on the date of the passing thereof.

Incorporation.

2 The Colonial Secretary, Henry Lorenz Wendt, the Colonial Treasurer, Colin Alexander Murray, the Principal Civil Medical Officer, John Ferguson, Sir William Wilson Mitchell, the Mayor of Colombo, the Rev. Arthur Edwin Dibben, the Rev. Osmund Beven, Keith William Bruce Macleod, Jacob de Mel, Alexander de Alwis Seneviratne, the Rev. William Arthur Stone, Lewis Walker, and Frederick Morgan de Saram, being the present members of the committee of the Victoria Home for Incurables, and their respective successors appointed in manner hereinafter provided are hereby associated together, and shall for ever hereafter be and be called a body corporate in deed and in law by the name and style of "The Incorporated Victoria Home for Incurables," under which name the corporation hereby constituted may sue and be sued.

Power to use common seal.

3 The Incorporated Victoria Home for Incurables (which is hereinafter referred to as "The Victoria Home") shall have an official seal which shall be officially and judicially noticed, and that seal shall be authenticated by the signature of the secretary or some person authorized by rule passed under this Ordinance to act on behalf of the secretary.

Property to be vested in corporation.

4 All moneys, goods, chattels, and effects whatsoever, and all securities for money or obligatory instruments, and evidences or muniments of title and all other effects, and all rights and claims whether belonging to the said committee at the date of the passing of this Ordinance, or acquired by the Victoria Home after the passing of this Ordinance, shall be vested in the Victoria Home.

To have perpetual succession.

5 The Victoria Home shall have perpetual succession, and shall at all times hereafter be able and capable in law to purchase, acquire, hold, and enjoy in perpetuity, or for any lesser term, any property movable or immovable of what nature or kind soever, and to invest the funds of the Victoria Home in securities of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, or of the Government of India, or of the Government of this island or of any of His Majesty's colonies, or in any mortgage of movable or immovable property in Ceylon, and also in the purchase or acquisition of such goods, chattels, and things as may be proper or requisite for the purposes of the Victoria Home.

May erect buildings.

6 The Victoria Home may erect or cause to be erected any buildings on any lands so purchased or acquired or held or enjoyed by them, and may also from time to time sell, grant, convey, demise, assign, exchange, and dispose of or mortgage any property for the time being vested in the Home.

Transfer of mortgages and securities.

7 (1) All mortgages and other securities for money, lands, and tenements held in the island and elsewhere in the name of any person as treasurer of the Victoria Home for Incurables shall be transferred to and vested in the Victoria Home, which may assign, transfer, and dispose of all mortgages and other securities to which the Victoria Home shall be entitled as may appear proper.

(2) Where any action or proceeding is pending at any time in any court in the island when this Ordinance comes into force, in which any person as secretary or treasurer of the Victoria Home for Incurables is a plaintiff, petitioner, defendant, or respondent, such action may be continued by or against the Victoria Home.

Constitution of Victoria Home.

8 (1) The Victoria Home shall consist of sixteen members, of whom four members, namely, the persons for the time being lawfully discharging the duties of the Colonial Secretary, the Colonial Treasurer, the Principal Civil Medical Officer, and the Mayor of Colombo shall be *ex officio* members, four members (hereinafter referred to as "nominated members") shall be from time to time nominated by the Governor, and the remaining eight members (hereinafter referred to as "elected members") shall be elected by the members of the Victoria Home.

(2) For the purposes of appointing successors to the said Henry Lorenz Wendt, Colin Alexander Murray, Keith William Bruce Macleod, and Lewis Walker, and of appointing persons to act in their places in the event of their, or any of them, being temporarily disabled from discharging their duties as members of the Victoria Home, the four persons aforesaid shall be deemed to be nominated members of the Victoria Home.

Vacancies in number of nominated members.

9 The Governor may from time to time nominate persons to fill vacancies whether occasioned by death, resignation, or otherwise in the number of nominated members, and may appoint persons to act in the place of nominated members temporarily disabled from discharging their duty by sickness, absence from Colombo, or any other cause, and may revoke any nomination or appointment so made, and may make such new nomination or appointment in lieu thereof as to the Governor may seem fit.

Vacancies in number of elected members.

10 The members of the Victoria Home may from time to time, in accordance with any rule made under this Ordinance, elect persons to fill vacancies occasioned as aforesaid in the number of the elected members, and may also elect persons to act in the places of elected members temporarily disabled as aforesaid.

Appointment of secretary and treasurer.

11 The Victoria Home may appoint from among their number a secretary and a treasurer, or may appoint one of their number to hold both such offices, and may revoke any appointment so made.

Power to make rules.

12 It shall be lawful for the Victoria Home at any meeting convened for that purpose to make, and from time to time to revoke, vary, or amend such rules as to them or the major part of the members present shall seem necessary for any of the following purposes:

- (a) For convening the ordinary or any special meetings of the corporation and fixing the number of ordinary meetings to be held each year, and the dates on which such meetings shall be held, and the means and manner of holding such meetings, and the number of members which shall constitute a quorum.
- (b) For prescribing the manner in which the seal of the corporation shall be affixed.
- (c) For regulating the election of a secretary and treasurer, and prescribing the period during which the secretary and treasurer shall hold office, and the respective duties of such officers.
- (d) For regulating the conduct and management of the Victoria Home.
- (e) For the keeping and auditing of proper accounts, and for prescribing the times when the same shall be submitted to the members of the Victoria Home.
- (f) For the appointment of the matron and staff of the Victoria Home and fixing the salaries to be paid to the matron and staff respectively.
- (g) For prescribing the manner in which the election of the elected members of the Victoria Home shall be conducted.
- (h) And generally for carrying out the objects for which the Victoria Home for Incurables was originally constituted.

No. 8 of 1903.

An Ordinance to regulate the use of Wireless Telegraphy
in Ceylon.

EVERARD IM THURN.

Preamble

WHEREAS it is expedient to regulate the use of wireless telegraphy in Ceylon: Be it therefore enacted by the Governor of Ceylon, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:

Short title.

1 This Ordinance may be cited as "The Wireless Telegraphy Ordinance, 1903."

Prohibition of use, &c., of wireless telegraphy without license of Governor.

2 From and after the passing of this Ordinance it shall be unlawful for any person to establish or use in Ceylon any apparatus or installation for transmitting or receiving messages by means of wireless telegraphy, unless a license in that behalf has been first granted to him by the Governor.

Power of Governor to grant licenses.

3 It shall be lawful for the Governor to grant licenses upon such terms and conditions as the Governor shall from time to time prescribe to establish, maintain, and use any such apparatus or installation as aforesaid, and every such license shall be revocable by the Governor on breach of any of the terms and conditions upon which it was granted.

Penalty.

4 Any person who establishes or uses any apparatus or installation for the purpose of transmitting or receiving messages by means of wireless telegraphy without the license of the Governor, or in contravention of the terms and conditions of such license, shall be guilty of an offence, and shall be liable on conviction thereof to a fine which may extend to seven hundred and fifty rupees, and the apparatus or installation in respect of which any such offence is committed shall be liable to confiscation.

No. 9 of 1903.

An Ordinance to amend "The Public Officers' Security Ordinance, 1890."

Preamble.

WHEREAS it is expedient to amend "The Public Officers' Security Ordinance, 1890," hereinafter referred to as "the principal Ordinance": Be it therefore enacted by the Governor of Ceylon, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:

Short title.

1 This Ordinance may be cited as "The Public Officers' Security Ordinance, 1903," and this Ordinance and the principal Ordinance and Ordinance No. 12 of 1897 shall be read and construed as one Ordinance, and may be cited together as "The Public Officers' Security Ordinances, 1890, 1897, and 1903."

Security to be given by shroffs.

2 After section 2 of the principal Ordinance the following section shall be added and numbered 2 A :

2 A (1) Provided that any person in the employment of the Government of Ceylon as a shroff may give security for the due discharge of any duties to be performed by him in the course of such employment either in the manner provided by section 2 or in one or other of the following ways as the Governor may in each case determine, namely :—

- (a) By personal bond and deposit with the Colonial Treasurer of moneys to the required amount ; or
- (b) By hypothecation of immovable property to the satisfaction of the Governor.

(2) The Colonial Treasurer shall pay to any shroff who deposits moneys with him under this section at such times as the Governor may direct interest at the rate of seven per centum per annum.

(3) The provisions of section 5 relating to moneys lodged in a bank under section 2 and to securities deposited with the Colonial Treasurer under the said section shall respectively apply to moneys deposited with the Colonial Treasurer under this section, and to mortgage bonds or other securities entered into under this section which have been so deposited.

No. 10 of 1903.

An Ordinance to amend the Ceylon Penal Code.

Preamble.

WHEREAS it is expedient to amend the Ceylon Penal Code : Be it therefore enacted by the Governor of Ceylon, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows :

Short title.

1 This Ordinance may be cited as "The Penal Code Amendment Ordinance, 1903," and shall be read and construed as one with the Ceylon Penal Code.

Falsification of accounts.

2 After section 466 of the Ceylon Penal Code the following section shall be added and shall be numbered 466 A :

466 A (1) Whoever, being a clerk, officer, or servant, or being employed or acting in the capacity of a clerk, officer, or servant, wilfully, and with intent to defraud, destroys, alters, mutilates, or falsifies any book, paper, writing, valuable security, or account which belongs to, or is in the possession of, his employer, or has been received by him for or on behalf of his employer, or wilfully, and with intent to defraud, makes or abets the making of any false entry in, or omits or alters or abets the omission or alteration of any material particular from or in, any such book, paper, writing, valuable security, or account, shall be punished with imprisonment of either description for a term which may extend to seven years, or with fine, or with both.

Explanation.—It shall be sufficient in any charge under this section to allege a general intent to defraud without naming any particular person intended to be defrauded, or specifying any particular sum of money intended to be the subject of the fraud, or any particular day on which the offence was committed.

(2) The entries in the several columns of schedule II. to "The Criminal Procedure Code, 1898," with reference to offences under article 466 of the Ceylon Penal Code, shall be deemed to apply to offences under this section as well as to offences under the said section.

No. 11 of 1903.

An Ordinance to provide for the Surrender of Fugitive Criminals
from the Federated Malay States.

EVERARD IM THURN.

Preamble.

WHEREAS persons who have committed certain crimes or offences within the Federated Malay States may escape to this Island, and it is expedient to provide for the apprehension of such fugitive criminals from justice, and for their surrender to the Government of the Federated Malay States in order that they may be dealt with according to law: Be it therefore enacted by the Governor of Ceylon, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:

Short title.

1 This Ordinance may be cited as "The Federated Malay States (Fugitive Criminals) Ordinance, 1903."

Interpretation.

2 In the interpretation of this Ordinance and the schedules thereto the following expressions shall, unless repugnant to or inconsistent with the context, have the meaning hereinafter assigned to them, viz.:

"British Resident" means any person for the time being, lawfully discharging the duties of the office of British Resident in Perak, or Selangor, or Pahang, or Negri Sembilan.

"Federated Malay States" means the States of Perak, Selangor, Pahang, and Negri Sembilan.

"Surrender offence" means any offence which, if committed in Ceylon, would be one of the offences mentioned in the first schedule hereto.

"Fugitive criminal" means any person accused or convicted of a surrender offence committed within the jurisdiction of the Federated Malay States, who is or is suspected of being in Ceylon.

The surrender offences mentioned in the first schedule to this Ordinance shall be construed according to the law in force in Ceylon at the date of the alleged surrender offence.

Power to add or expunge from the schedule of offences.

Provided always that the Governor in Council may from time to time, by order to be published in the *Government Gazette*, declare that any offence specified in such order and not included in the first schedule hereto shall form part thereof, and from and after the date of the publication of such order the offence specified therein shall come within the operation of this Ordinance as if the same had been

originally included in the said schedule; and further that the Governor in Council may at any time, by order to be published in the *Government Gazette*, declare that any offence specified in the first schedule hereto, or which may hereafter be added to the said schedule as hereinbefore provided, shall no longer form part thereof, and from and after the date of the publication of such order such offence shall cease to come within the operation of this Ordinance.

Restrictions on
surrender.

3 The following restrictions shall be observed with respect to the surrender of fugitive criminals:

(1) A fugitive criminal shall not be surrendered if the offence in respect of which his surrender is demanded is one of a political character, or if he prove to the satisfaction of the police magistrate or of a judge of the Supreme Court, if brought before the court on a writ of *habeas corpus*, or of the Governor, that the requisition for his surrender has in fact been made with a view to try or punish him for a crime or offence of a political character, or for a crime or offence which is not a surrender offence.

(2) A fugitive criminal who has been accused of a crime or offence in Ceylon not being the surrender offence for which his surrender is demanded, or who is undergoing sentence under any conviction in the island, shall not be surrendered until after he has been discharged whether by acquittal or on expiration of his sentence or otherwise.

Liability to be
surrendered.

4 Every fugitive criminal shall be liable to be apprehended and surrendered in manner provided by this Ordinance, whether the surrender offence in respect of which the surrender is demanded was committed before or after the passing of this Ordinance, and whether there is or is not any concurrent jurisdiction in any court in Ceylon over that crime.

Requisition to
the Governor
may be followed
by the order to
magistrate for
warrant of
apprehension.

5 Whenever the requisition for the surrender of a fugitive criminal is made to the Governor by a British Resident, the Governor may, by order under his hand and seal, signify to a police magistrate that such requisition has been made, and require him to issue his warrant for the apprehension of the fugitive criminal.

Duties of a
magistrate upon
receipt of such
order.

6 A police magistrate, on receipt of the said order, shall issue his warrant for the apprehension of the fugitive criminal, or, if the fugitive criminal be already in custody, shall issue his order to all necessary persons to bring the fugitive criminal before him to be dealt with according to this Ordinance.

Magistrate may
also issue
warrant as in
ordinary cases.

7 A police magistrate may also issue his warrant for the apprehension of a fugitive criminal on such information or complaint as would, in his opinion, justify the issue of a warrant if the alleged surrender offence had been committed in Ceylon.

A fugitive criminal apprehended on a warrant so issued shall be discharged by the police magistrate, unless the police magistrate, within such time as, with reference to the circumstances of the case, he shall think reasonable, receives from the Governor an order signifying that a requisition has been made for the surrender of such fugitive criminal.

Hearing of the
case and evidence
of offence being
political.

8 When a fugitive criminal is brought before a police magistrate, he shall hear the case in the same manner, and have the same jurisdiction and powers, as nearly as may be, as if the prisoner were brought before him charged with an indictable offence committed in Ceylon.

Provided always that—

Evidence in case
of person
accused.

(1) Copies of depositions signed or taken before any judge or other competent magistrate having authority in the Federated Malay States to take cognizance of the crime charged, and authenticated in manner hereinafter provided, may be received in evidence of criminality of such fugitive criminal.

Evidence in case of a person convicted.

(2) In the case of a person convicted in any of the Federated Malay States of a surrender offence a copy of the conviction, authenticated in manner hereinafter provided, may be received in evidence, and shall, where the police magistrate is satisfied that such person is according to the law of that State unlawfully at large, justify such police magistrate in committing such person to prison to await the further order of the Governor without re-opening the case.

Proof of identity.

(3) In every case proof of the identity of the fugitive criminal must be given to the satisfaction of the police magistrate.

Authentication of documents.

(4) Warrants of arrest and copies of depositions, signed or taken before any such judge or other competent magistrate as aforesaid, and copies of convictions shall be received in evidence, if the warrant of arrest purports to be signed by such judge or magistrate, and if the copies of depositions purport to be certified under the hand of such judge or magistrate to be true copies of the original depositions, and if the copy of the conviction purport to be certified under the hand and official seal of a British Resident to be a true copy of the original conviction. The signature of every such judge or magistrate and his authority to take cognizance of the crime or offence charged shall be sufficiently proved if the document purport to be sealed with the official seal of a British Resident, and all courts of justice in this Colony shall for the purpose of this Ordinance take judicial notice of such seal, and shall admit the documents so authenticated by it to be received in evidence without further proof.

Documents to be read to the fugitive, who must be asked to show cause.

(5) The warrant of arrest and the copy of the depositions, or, as the case may be, the copy of the conviction, shall be read to the fugitive criminal, if he so desires, and he shall be asked if he has any valid cause to show why he should not be committed to prison to await the order of the Governor.

Evidence of offence being political.

The police magistrate shall receive any evidence which may be tendered to show that the offence of which the fugitive criminal is accused is an offence of a political character or is not a surrender offence.

Committal to prison.

9 If at the hearing before a police magistrate such evidence is produced as would, subject to the provisions of this Ordinance, justify the committal of the fugitive criminal for trial at the district or the Supreme Court if the surrender offence of which he is accused had been committed in Ceylon, and in cases of conviction provided for by section 8, subsection (2), of this Ordinance the police magistrate shall commit him to prison to await the further order of the Governor, but otherwise shall order him to be discharged.

If the police magistrate commits the fugitive criminal to prison, he shall thereupon inform the fugitive criminal that he will not be surrendered until after the expiration of fifteen days from the date of such committal, and that he has a right to apply to the Supreme Court for a writ of *habeas corpus*, and such police magistrate shall forthwith send to the Governor the depositions and other evidence in the case, together with a report thereon.

Notice to Attorney-General before discharge.

10 Before ordering a fugitive criminal to be discharged the police magistrate shall cause notice of his intention to make such order to be served on the Attorney-General.

Non-application of provisions of Criminal Procedure Code relating to appeals from police magistrates.

11 The provisions of "The Criminal Procedure Code 1898," so far as they relate to appeals from the decisions of police magistrates, shall not apply to proceedings under this Ordinance.

Warrant of
surrender when
to be signed.

12 (1) Upon the expiration of fifteen days from the date of the police magistrate's order of committal or if a writ of *habeas corpus* has been issued, and if upon the return to the writ the Supreme Court has not discharged the fugitive criminal, immediately after the decision of the court, or after such further period in either case as the Governor may allow, the Governor may, by warrant under his hand and seal, order the fugitive criminal to be surrendered to such person as the Governor considers to be authorized to receive him on behalf of the Government of the State requiring his surrender, and the fugitive criminal shall be surrendered accordingly.

(2) If the fugitive criminal while in Ceylon escapes out of any custody into which he has been delivered in pursuance of a police magistrate's warrant as aforesaid, it shall be lawful for any police officer or constable to take him without warrant and to restore him to the custody from which he has escaped, and for the person from whose custody the fugitive criminal has escaped to re-take him or receive him from such police officer or constable and to hold him at all times as upon the original warrant.

Discharge of
fugitive
criminal.

13 Except where any proceedings are actually pending upon a writ of *habeas corpus* before the Supreme Court, and in such case with the concurrence in writing of the judge having cognizance thereof, the Governor may at any time, by order under his hand and seal, discharge a fugitive criminal from custody.

Discharge if not
surrendered
within two
months, or on
application after
decision upon
habeas corpus
to a judge upon
notice to the

14 If a fugitive criminal who has been committed to prison under this Ordinance to await the order of the Governor is not surrendered and conveyed out of the Colony within two months after such committal, or within two months after the determination of any proceedings upon a writ of *habeas corpus*, as the case may be, any judge of the Supreme Court may, upon application made to him by or on behalf of the fugitive criminal, and upon proof that reasonable notice of the intention to make such application has been given to the Attorney-General, order the fugitive criminal to be discharged out of custody, unless sufficient cause is shown to the contrary.

Aiders and
abettors in
surrender
offences.

15 Every person who is accused or convicted of having counselled, procured, commanded, aided, or abetted the commission of any surrender offence, or of being accessory before the fact to any surrender offence, shall be deemed for the purposes of this Ordinance to be accused or convicted of having committed such offence, and shall be liable to be apprehended and surrendered accordingly.

Protection of
magistrate and
others acting
under warrant.

16 If any suit or action be brought against a police magistrate, jailer, police officer, constable, or any other person for anything done under or in obedience to any warrant or order issued under the provisions of this Ordinance, the proof of such warrant or order shall be a sufficient answer to such suit or action, and the defendant on such proof as aforesaid shall be entitled to a verdict or judgment accordingly, and shall also be entitled to all costs of suit.

Forms.

17 The forms in the second schedule hereto, or forms to the like effect with such variations and additions as circumstances require, may be used for the purposes therein indicated and according to the directions therein contained, and instruments in these forms shall (as regards the form thereof) be valid and sufficient.

Any offence under sections 147, 148, and 149 of Ordinance No. 7 of 1853, intituled: "An Ordinance for regulating the due Collection, Administration, and Distribution of Insolvent Estates."

Rape or any offence under section 345 of the Ceylon Penal Code.

Abduction.

Kidnapping.

Any offence under sections 334, 335, 336, 337, 338, and 339 of the said Code.

House-breaking.

House-breaking by night.

Any offence under sections 418, 419, and 421 of the said Code.

Any offence under sections 380, 381, 382, 383, and 384 of the said Code.

Any offence under sections 374, 375, 376, 377, and 378 of the said Code.

Piracy by law of nations.

Sinking or destroying any vessel at sea or attempting to do so.

Assaults on board a ship on the high seas with intent to destroy life or to do grievous bodily harm.

Revolt or conspiracy to revolt by two or more persons on board a ship on the high seas against the authority of the master.

Any offence under sections 190, 191, and 192 of the Ceylon Penal Code or the abetment of any such offence.

Any indictable offence under sections 412, 413, 414, 415, 416, and 420 of the said Code.

Any offence under sections 303, 304, 305, 306, 307, 308, and 309 of the said Code.

Ordinance enacted by the Governor of Ceylon, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof.

No. 12 of 1903.

An Ordinance to give effect to an Order of His Majesty in Council known as "The Foreign Marriages Order in Council, 1903."

HENRY A. BLAKE.

Preamble:

WHEREAS it is expedient, in order that effect may be given to an Order of His Majesty in Council known as "The Foreign Marriages Order in Council, 1903," that provision should be made with regard to the notice to be given of marriages intended to be solemnized under the provisions of "The Foreign Marriage Act, 1892," where one of the parties is resident in Ceylon: Be it therefore enacted by the Governor of Ceylon, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:

Short title:

1 This Ordinance may be cited as "The Foreign Marriages Ordinance, 1903."

Definitions.

2 In this Ordinance, unless the contrary intention appears, the expression "Registrar-General" means the Registrar-General of Marriages appointed under the provisions of "The Marriage Registration Ordinance, 1895," and includes the assistant to the Registrar-General and any person for the time being lawfully discharging the duties of the Registrar-General or of the assistant to the Registrar-General.

Notice of marriages under the Foreign Marriage Act.

3 Notice of a marriage intended to be solemnized under the Foreign Marriage Act may be given to the Registrar-General by one of the parties intending such marriage who has had his or her usual place of abode for three consecutive weeks immediately preceding in some place in Ceylon as is hereinafter provided.

Form of notice.

4 (1) Every such notice shall be substantially in the form A in the schedule hereto, and shall state the name in full, the profession, condition, and residence of each of the parties intending marriage, the place where the marriage is intended to be solemnized, and whether each of the parties is or is not a minor, and shall also state that the party giving notice has had his or her usual place of abode for not less than three consecutive weeks then next preceding in some place in Ceylon.

(2) Every such notice shall be signed by the party giving or making the same in the presence of the Registrar-General or a justice of the peace or a notary and of two credible witnesses, who shall attest the same by adding each his name, description, and place of abode, and of whom the Registrar-General, justice of the peace, notary, or both the witnesses shall be personally acquainted with the party giving notice.

(3) Every such notice shall bear a stamp of ten rupees, which shall be supplied by the party giving the notice.

Publication of notice.

5 (1) The Registrar-General, when notice of an intended marriage is duly given under this Ordinance, shall forthwith enter in the notice the date of its receipt and file and keep it with the records of his office, and shall forthwith enter particulars of the notice in a book to be called "The Foreign Marriage Notice Book," which shall be kept substantially in the form B in the schedule hereto.

(2) The Registrar-General shall cause a true copy under his hand of the notice of marriage or of the particulars thereof as entered in the Foreign Marriage Notice Book to be posted up in some conspicuous place in his office, and shall keep the same so posted up during fourteen successive days after the entry of such marriage.

(3) The Foreign Marriage Notice Book and every copy of a notice of marriage so posted up shall be open at all reasonable times, without fee, to the inspection of any person.

Issue of certificate by Registrar-General.

6 At any time not less than fourteen days, nor more than three months, from the entry of the notice, the Registrar-General, unless he is aware of any impediment or objection which would obstruct the solemnization of the marriage, shall, upon the application of the party giving notice, issue a certificate substantially in the form C in the schedule hereto that the said notice has been so given and published as aforesaid.

Applicability of provisions of "The Marriage Registration Ordinance, 1895," with regard to certified copies and extracts.

7 The provisions of "The Marriage Registration Ordinance, 1895," with regard to the issue of certified copies and extracts of and from books and documents kept under the said Ordinance, and with regard to the admissibility in evidence of the same, shall be applicable with regard to the issue of certified copies and extracts of and from books and documents kept under this Ordinance, and with regard to their admissibility in evidence.

An Ordinance for making provision for the Contingent Services for the Year 1904.

HENRY A. BLAKE.

Preamble.

WHEREAS the Contingent Expenditure required for the service of the Government of this Island for the year One thousand Nine hundred and Four, and not otherwise provided for, has been estimated at the sum of Twenty-one million Five hundred and Seventy-four thousand Five hundred and Fifty-two rupees: It is enacted by the Governor of Ceylon, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:

Rs. 21,574,552 to be charged upon the revenue of this Island for the Contingent Services for the year 1904.

1 A sum not exceeding Twenty-one million Five hundred and Seventy-four thousand Five hundred and Fifty-two rupees shall be and the same is hereby charged upon the revenue and other funds of this Island for the Contingent Services for the year One thousand Nine hundred and Four, and the said expenditure shall be in conformity with the details of the estimates specified in the schedule hereunto annexed whereof the following is an abstract:

Amount of labour to be supplied under the Ordinance No. 31 of 1884.

2 And whereas by the 31st section of the Ordinance No. 31 of the year 1884, intituled "An Ordinance to amend Ordinance No. 10 of 1861, entitled 'An Ordinance to consolidate and amend the Laws relating to Public Thoroughfares in this Colony,'" it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor to propose the estimates prepared in pursuance thereof, or such of them as to him may appear expedient, in the Ordinance for making provision for the contingent expenditure of the colony for the ensuing year, to be dealt with in like manner as any other estimate to be so proposed: And it is thereby also provided that the amount of labour to be supplied under the provisions of the said Ordinance No. 31 of 1884, for the performance of any work or works for which an estimate or estimates may have been so proposed by the Governor, and approved of by the Legislative Council, shall be distinctly stated in the Ordinance enacted for the same, and that the same shall not exceed two-thirds of the whole amount of labour due from the district or districts within which it may be required to be performed: It is enacted that the amount of labour to be supplied under the provisions of the said Ordinance shall be in conformity with the estimates specified in the schedule hereunto annexed.

3 The Treasurer of the said island shall issue and pay the said several sums to such persons, for the purposes hereinbefore-mentioned, upon such days and in such proportions as the Governor for the time being, by any warrant or order in writing, to be signed by him, shall from time to time order and direct; and the payments so to be made shall be charged upon and payable out of the revenues of the said island.

4 The said Treasurer shall in his accounts from time to time be allowed credit for any sum or sums of money paid by him in pursuance of such warrant or order in writing as aforesaid; and the receipt or receipts of the respective persons to whom the same shall be so paid shall be a full and valid discharge to the said Treasurer in passing his said accounts for any such sum or sums as shall be therein mentioned, and he shall and may receive credit for the same accordingly.

Treasurer to pay the above at such times as the Governor by warrant shall order.

And to receive credit in his accounts for the payments made in pursuance thereof.

DRAFT ORDINANCE.**MINUTE.**

The following Draft of a proposed Ordinance is published for general information :—

An Ordinance to facilitate the carrying out of a Mineralogical Survey of the Island of Ceylon.

Preamble.

WHEREAS it is expedient to facilitate the carrying out of a mineralogical survey of the Island: Be it therefore enacted by the Governor of Ceylon, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows :

Short title.

1 This Ordinance may be cited as "The Mineralogical Survey Ordinance, 1903," and shall come into operation on passing.

Definition.

2 The expression "surveyor" in this Ordinance means any person appointed by the Governor to carry out a mineralogical survey of the Island or of any part thereof, and any person acting under the orders of such surveyor.

Powers of surveyor to enter lands, &c.

3 It shall be lawful for any surveyor, from time to time after notice in writing of the intention of entering shall have been given to the owner or occupier, as the case may be, to enter into and upon the land or premises of any owner or person whomsoever for the purpose of making and carrying on a mineralogical survey or for any purpose incident thereto.

Power of surveyor to break up surface of land

4 It shall be lawful for any surveyor to break up the surface of any part of such land for the purpose of examining the rocks, strata, or minerals within or under the same, and to take and carry away specimens of the rocks, strata, or minerals found therein, and to fix any post, stone, mark, or object to be used in the survey in any such land or premises, and to dig up any ground for the purpose of fixing any such post, stone, or mark. Provided that it shall not be lawful for any surveyor to fix any object, post, stone, or mark within any enclosed garden without the consent of the owner or occupier thereof.

Power to pass through lands, &c.

5 It shall be lawful for any surveyor to enter into or upon any land or premises through which he may find it necessary to pass for the purposes of such survey at any reasonable time in the day, until the survey shall be completed.

Compensation for damage.

6 Every surveyor shall do as little damage as may be in the execution of the several powers granted to him by this Ordinance, and shall make reasonable satisfaction to the owner or occupier, as the case may require, of such land or premises, or the owner of any trees which shall be in any way injured, for all damage which may be caused in the execution of any of the powers conferred by this Ordinance, in case the same shall be demanded.

Reference of disputes to court of requests.

7 In the event of there being any dispute between such surveyor and the owner or occupier, as the case may be, as to the amount of damage sustained, the same shall be summarily ascertained by the commissioner of requests within whose jurisdiction the land in question shall be situate, and such decision shall be final and not subject to an appeal to the Supreme Court.

Obstruction to surveyor.

8 If any person shall resist or wilfully obstruct or hinder any surveyor in the execution of any survey under the provisions of this Ordinance, or shall take away or displace or wilfully deface or destroy any stone, post, mark, or object which shall be set up and placed for the purposes of any such survey, he shall be guilty of an offence, and liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding rupees—

No. 14 of 1903.

An Ordinance to amend "The Opium Ordinance, 1899."

HENRY A. BLAKE.

Preamble.

WHEREAS it is expedient to amend "The Opium Ordinance, 1899," in certain particulars: Be it therefore enacted by the Governor of Ceylon, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:

Short title.

1 This Ordinance may be cited as "The Opium (Amendment) Ordinance, 1903," and shall be read and construed as one with "The Opium Ordinance, 1899," hereinafter referred to as "the principal Ordinance," and the principal Ordinance and this Ordinance may be cited together as "The Opium Ordinances, 1899 and 1903."

Amendment of sections 9, 10, 11, and 12.

2 For sections 9, 10, 11, and 12 of the principal Ordinance there shall be respectively substituted the following sections, namely:

9. By the notice so to be published as aforesaid the proper authority shall fix a date and place at which such licenses shall be offered for sale, and shall notify the conditions under which such licenses shall be issued.

10. (1) Such licenses may be offered for sale, at the discretion of the proper authority, either by public auction or by tender.

(2) The proper authority may, subject to the approval of the Governor in Council, from time to time prescribe the conditions under which licenses will be sold, and shall give public notice of the same, either by means of the notice mentioned in section 8 or otherwise as may appear convenient to the proper authority.

(3) If at any sale the amount of the highest bid or tender is, in the opinion of the proper authority, inadequate, the proper authority shall be at liberty to postpone the sale, and to offer the license for sale again by auction or by tender or by private contract.

11. After any person has been declared to be the purchaser of any such license, the proper authority may issue a license in the form hereinafter mentioned to the purchaser. But it shall be lawful for the proper authority in his discretion to refuse to issue any such license; and in case of such refusal, the proper authority shall refund to the purchaser the purchase money or any part thereof which he may have paid, and the license may be re-sold either at once or at such future time as the proper authority shall appoint.

12. Whenever any person who has been declared the purchaser has made default in paying the purchase money at the appointed time or in complying with any of the conditions under which the sale was held, and the proper authority has offered the license for re-sale, then, in the event of such re-sale realizing a smaller amount than that realized at the previous sale, such person shall be liable for the difference, which shall be recoverable by action in the court of requests having in other respects jurisdiction in that behalf, notwithstanding that such difference exceeds the sum of three hundred rupees.

Amendment of sections 5, 7, and 17 of principal Ordinance.

3 In sections 5, 7, and 17 of the principal Ordinance the figures and word "180 grains" shall be substituted for the words "one pound."
