Bay of Bengal-Malacca Strait-Singapore-The New Light at Port Canning.

The Master Attendant, Straits Settlements, has given notice that the New Light at Port Canning, Singapore will be lit on October 12, 1903.

Description of Light.

A dioptric occulting light of the first order.

One occultation of three seconds duration at periods of twenty seconds (i.e., seventeen seconds light and three seconds dark).

The apparatus illuminates 92½° of sea surface, 67½° of white light, a sector of 10° of red light covering the Johore shoal on one side and one of 15° covering the dangers near Peak island on the other side.

Visible from S. E. b S. 1 S. through E. to E. 1 N Distance 18 nantical miles. Elevation 202 ft. above H. W. A steel lighthouse painted white.

Pacific Ocean (North)-Mariana Islands-Guam Island-Shouls to the South-Westward.

With reference to Notice to Mariners No. 287, dated August 29 last, issued by this office, the British Admiralty has given further notice (No. 712 of 1903) that the result of an examination by Lieutenant F. H. Schofield, U.S.S. Supply, shows that in the area embraced between the parallels of 12° 43′ N. and 13° 6′ N., and meridians of 144° 16′ E. and 144° 38′ E., south-westward of Guam island, the bottom is uneven and irregular, and that there are many dangerous shoal heads within this area.

Korea, West Coast—Chemulpho Approach—Lights established and intended.

With reference to Notice to Mariners No. 22, dated January 9, 1903, issued by this office, the British Admiralty has given further notice (No. 729 of 1903) that the under mentioned lights were established in the approaches to Chemulpho on June 1, 1903, viz.:-
