Delmege, Forsyth & Co., of Colombo, a license to store 400,000 gallons of "Shell" motor spirit in the premises described in the schedule hereto, upon the said Messrs. Delmege, Forsyth & Co. executing a bond to indemnify the Government of Ceylon and the local authority against all actions, proceedings, and suits which may be brought against them or any of them by any person whatsoever, in consequence of any damage or injury arising from the storage of the said spirit within the said premises, and also to indemnify all persons against any loss or injury which they may sustain in consequence of the storage of

SCHEDULE

Description of the Premises above referred to.

An open allotment of land 190 feet long and 100 feet wide within the premises called and known as Kelani-ganga Mills. This allotment is bounded on the north by the boundary wall of the Kelani-ganga Mills plemists, and on the east by a line drawn at right argles to the northern boundary at a distance of 100 feet from the nearest building, and on the south by a line drawn plra left to the northern boundary, and it is to be surrounded on its eastern, southern, and western boundaries by an open trench.

2. The Government is prepared to provide unmarried men desirous of availing themselves of these terms with free passages to England, provided that they are recommended by the under-mentioned Committee of Selection which has been appointed by His Excellency to examine applicants:—

Lieutenant-Colonel V. van Langenberg, C. L. I. Major D. Rockwood, C. M. C. Captain W. P. D. van der Straaten, C. T. G. Captain W. A. Dep, C. L. 1. Lieutenant M. T. Akbar, C. T. G. Mr. Leslie de Saram.

Applicants should present themselves for examination by the Committee which will sit at times and a place which will shortly be notified.

- 3. Persons in outstations should apply, in the first instance, to the Government Agent of the Province or the Assistant Government Agent of the district, and in towns in which there is no Kachcheri, to the District Judge or the Police Magistrate for railway warrants to enable them to proceed to Colombo and present themselves before the Selection Committee.
- 4. The dependants of persons proceeding to England and enlisting in the Army under this scheme will be paid separation allowances, if eligible for the same, from Army funds at the rates laid down by the Military Authorities (see particulars appended). Application for separation allowance must be made by the soldier, on enlistment, to the proper authority in England.

Rates of Separation Allowance.

Separation allowances are payable to dependents of unmarried soldiers under certain conditions. The person on whose behalf the claim is made must have been bona fide dependent on the soldier for the whole or part of his or her maintenance for a reasonable period prior to enlistment, and the amount of the allowance is governed by a consideration of the degree of dependence and the amount contributed by the soldier prior to enlistment towards the support of the dependent, but in no case will the following maxim rates for a single dependent be exceeded:—

Where more persons than one are dependent on a soldier, an additional allowance may be granted.

It should be clearly understood that the above rates are maximum rates for a single dependant, and that no more than the amount actually contributed by the soldier will be paid, e.g., if a man contributed Rs. 10 a month to his mother's support before enlistment, the separation allowance due to her would be Rs. 10 a month and not Rs. 37.50.

STATUTES OF THE ORDER OF THE COMPANIONS OF HONOUR.

GEORGE R.I.

GEORGE THE FIFTH, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, King, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India. To all to whom these Presents shall come, Greeting!

WHEREAS by Letters Patent under the Great Seal of the said United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland bearing date June 4, 1917, in the Eighth year of Our Reign, We have thought fit and been pleased to institute, erect, constitute, and create an Order to be called and known for ever hereafter by the name, style, and designation of "The Order of the Companions of Honour" whereof We, Our heirs and successors for ever shall be Sovereigns:

And whereas in the said Letters Patent We have appointed a Seal of the said Order to be engraven, having thereon as follows: -Upon a white field, a representation of the Badge of the Order, as hereinafter described, impaled

with Our Royal Arms, with this circumscription "The Seal of the Order of the Companions of Honour":

And whereas by Our aforesaid Letters Patent We did ordain that the said Order should be governed by Statutes and Ordinances, and that the Statutes to be observed within the said Order should be established by Us sealed by and with the said Seal, which Statutes so given, and in future to be given by Us, Our heirs and successors, to which the said Seal shall be affixed, shall be of the same validity, and taken and read as if the same and every, Article of them had been verbatim recited in the said Letters Patent and passed under the Great Seal of Our said United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland:

Now know ye that, in pursuance of the said Letters Patent, We have made, ordained, and established, and by these Presents sealed with the Seal of the said Order, do make, ordain, and establish the following Statutes and

Ordinances, which shall from henceforth be inviolably observed and kept within the said Order:—

1. It is ordained and enjoined that this Order shall be styled and designated in all Acts, proceedings, and pleadings "The Order of the Companions of Honour" as in Our said Letters directed, and by no other designation.

2. It is ordained that the said Order shall consist of the Sovereign and one class of Members, as in Our said

Letters Patent is provided.

3. It is ordained that We, Our heirs and successors, Kings or Queens Regnant of Our said United Kingdom are, and for ever shall be, Sovereigns of this Order, to whom doth and shall belong all power of annulling, interpreting, explaining, or augmenting these and every part of these Statutes.

4. It is ordained that not more than fifty Members shall be admitted to this Order.

5. It is ordained that the persons to be admitted as Members of this Order shall be such persons, male or female, being subjects of Our Crown, as may have rendered conspicuous service of National importance.

6. It is ordained that this Order shall rank next to and immediately after the First Class of the Most Excellent

Order of the British Empire.

7. It is ordained that when We, Our heirs and successors shall be pleased to nominate and appoint any person to be a Member of this Order, such appointment shall be made by Warrant under Our Royal Sign Manual, and sealed with the Seal of the Order.

8. It is ordained that the Insignia of the Sovereign of the said Order shall be of the same material and fashion as are hereinafter appointed for the Members of the Order, save only with those alterations which distinguish Our

Royal Dignity.

- 9. It is ordained that the Members of this Order shall, upon all great and solemn occasions, wear the oval-shaped badge of the Order which shall consist of a gold medallion with a representation of an oak tree and pendant from a branch a shield of the Royal Arms on the dexter a representation of a Knight armed and in armour mounted on a horse, the whole within a circle azure inscribed with the motto, "In action faithful and in honour clear" in letters of gold ensigned with the Imperial Crown proper, the badge in the case of men suspended from a carmine riband of the breadth of one inch and a half with a bordure interlaced gold around their necks, and in the case of women attached to a similar riband tied in a bow and worn on the left shoulder.
- 10. It is ordained that upon the nomination of any person to be a Member of this Order, he shall be invested with the Insignia of his dignity in the Order by Us, Our heirs and successors, and that on the day of the investiture the person to be invested shall be introduced into the presence of the Sovereign by the Officer of the Order in attendance bearing the proper Insignia of the Order, when the Sovereign shall proceed to invest him with the Ensigns

of the said Order with the Riband and Badge.

11. It is further ordained that it shall be competent for Us, Our heirs and successors, by a Warrant or Warrants under Our Sign Manual, countersigned by one of Our Principal Secretaries of State, and sealed with the Seal of this Order, in any case to authorize some distinguished persons to perform in Our name, and on Our behalf, the ceremony of investing Members with the Insignia of their dignity, or to permit the ceremony of investiture to be dispensed with. And we reserve to Ourselves, Our heirs and successors, by Our or their Warrant or Warrants, as aforesaid, to permit and authorize the person or persons not invested by Us to wear the Insignia and enjoy the privileges appertaining to their dignity.

12. It is ordained that for the greater honour and dignity of the Members of this Order, it shall be lawful for the Members of this Order to suspend a representation of their riband and badge from the bottom of the escocheon

containing their armorial bearings.

13. It is ordained that the Seal of this Order shall have engraved thereon as follows, that is to say, upon a white field, a representation of the Badge of the Order proper, impaled with Our Royal Arms, with the following circumscription, "The Seal of the Order of the Companions of Honour," and that the Statutes of the said Order shall be sealed by and with the same.

14. It is ordained that the following Officer shall be appointed to this Order, that is to say, a Secretary and

Registrar.

15. It is ordained that the Secretary and Registrar of the said Order shall be appointed from time to time by a Warrant under the Sign Manual of Us or Our heirs and successors and shall hold the said Office during the pleasure of Us, Our heirs and successors, and that he shall wear around his neck pendant to a riband as previously described a like Badge to that appointed for Members of the Order, with the addition of two silver pens saltirewise between the angles of the Cross. To his custody shall be confided the Seal of the said Order, which he shall affix, or cause to be affixed, to all Statutes and other documents or instruments connected therewith. He shall, moreover, perform such duties as may be directed by the Sovereign or by these Statutes. He shall write all letters connected with the service of the Order; he shall keep full lists of the Members of the Order. He shall carefully record all proceedings relative to the said Order that may take place, and he shall faithfully enter such proceedings in the Register of the Order, as well as all documents which may be transmitted to him for that purpose. We are further pleased to ordain that the Chancery of the said Order, wherein a record of all proceedings connected therewith shall be deposited and preserved, shall be in the Office of the Central Chancery of the Orders of Knighthood.

Lastly.—We reserve to Ourself, Our heirs and successors, full power of annulling, altering, abrogating, augmenting, interpreting, or dispensing with these Statutes and Regulations, or any part thereof, by a Notification

under the Sign Manual of the Sovereign of the Order.

STATISTICS. VITAL

Registrar-General's Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended July 13, 1918.

Births.—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 87 (1 European 7 Burghers, 50 Sinhalese, 14 Tamils, 8 Moors, 4 Malays, and 3 Others). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on July 1, 1918, viz., 276,665) was 16.4, as against 18.9 in the preceding week, 18.7 in the corresponding week of last year, and 22.1 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 131 (1 European, 3 Burghers, 76 Sinhalese, 22 Tamils, 21 Moors, 5 Malays, and 3 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 24.7, as against 22.8 in the previous week, 21.4 in the corresponding week of last year, and 23.7 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 131 total deaths, 36 were of infants under one year of age, as against 29 in the preceding wook, 34 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 28 the average for last year.

Stillbirths, -The number of stillbirths registered during the week was !!.

Principal Causes of Death.—Nineteen deaths from Pneumonia were registered, 6 in Maradana (including 2 deaths of non-residents in hospitals), 5 in Wellawatta, 3 in Kotahena, 2 in San Sebastian, 2 in Slave Island and 1 in New Bazaar, as against 14 the previous week and 13 the weekly average for last year. Five deaths from Bronchitis were registered.

2. Twelve deaths from Phthisis were registered, 3 in Kotahena. 3 in New Bazaar, 3 in Ma adama (including

1 death of a non-resident in hospital), 2 in Kollupitiya, and 1 in Slave Island, as against 22 in the previous week and 13 the weekly average for last year.
3. Three deaths from Plague were registered, 1 in St. Paul's, 1 in Kotahena, and 1 in Maradana, as against 1 in the

previous week and 3 the weekly average for last year.

One d ath from Enteric Fever was registered in Maradana (hospital), as against 3 in the previous week and 3 the weekly average for last year. 5. Twelve deaths from Enteritis were registered, 11 from Debility. 6 from Infantile Convulsions, 4 from Diarrhea,

3 from Dysentery, 3 from Tetanus, 2 from Worms, and 50 from Other Causes.

One case of Smillpox, 14 cases of Chickenpox, and 3 of Measles were reported during the week, as against

4, 33, and 1, respectively, during the preceding week.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 83.2°, against 81.9° in the preceding week and 82.8° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29.922 in., against 29.896 in. in the preceding week and 29.822 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 0.01 in., against 0.33 in. in the preceding week and 0.02 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.

MUNICIPAL COUNCIL NOTICES.

MUNICIPALITY OF COLOMBO.

Minutes of Proceedings of a General Meeting of the Municipal Council of Colombo held in the Town Hall on Friday, June 14, 1918.

The Council met this day at 3 P.M., pursuant to notice dated June 7, 1918.

Present:—Mr. R. W. Byrde, Chairman; Mr C. P. Dias; the Hon. Mr. N. H. M. Abdul Cader; Mr. Arthur Alvis; Mr. H. L. de Mel; Mr. E. G. Jayewardene; Dr. W. P. Rodrigo; Mr. T. L. Villiers; Mr. F. R. Senanayake; Mr. W. C. S. Ingles; Mr. Harold Creasy; Mr. J. K. Hormusjee; Mr. M. Cassim Ismail; and Mr. W. Philps.

1. The Minutes of the General Meeting of May 10, 1918, having been previously printed, and copies thereof having

been sent to each Member of Council, were taken as read.

Resolved that the Minutes of the General Meeting of May 10, 1918, be confirmed.

2. The Chairman read the following:—Since our last meeting only 6 further cases of human plague and 6 cases of rat plague have been recorded, making a total for the year up to date of 59 human and 42 rat cases, as against 175 human and 48 rat cases in 1917, while in the preceding year there were 81 human and 16 rat cases for the corresponding period. Of the 6 human cases, 3 were septicaemic and 3 bubonic in character, and all proved fatal.

3. Mr. Arthur Alvis, with the leave of Council, asked the Chairman whether he could give the Council some

information with regard to the present epidemic of smallpox.

The Chairman replied that he had not the papers with him, but there had been an outbreak in the northern part of Colombo. The first case had occurred about the end of March, and there were one or two others in Silversmith street, but the Medical Authorities thought they had got it in hand. There were no cases for some time after, but later another case occurred at Galkapanawatta and another case outside Colombo near Peliyagoda. Some cases were found to have been concealed, and were among Muhammadans. In one case a boy was found hiding under a bed. By the end of May there had been 12 cases. Since then there had been further cases during the past few days, and the number that was actually registered up to the present date was 24 in all.

The Chairman stated that Dr. E. V. Ratnam, who had given notice of questions, had been unavoidably detained in India, and had so telegraphed to him, and had asked that Dr. W. P. Rodrigo may be permitted to put the questions on his behalf. The Chairman was willing, however, with the leave of Council, and if Dr. Rodrigo also agree, to read out the

questions and the answers seriatim.

The leave of Council having been granted, and Dr. W. P. Rodrigo having assented to the suggestion, the Chairman read the following:

Question 4. Under what special circumstances a special license to establish a fish stall at No. 112, Second Division,

Maradana, near the important junction of Regent street, Jail road, and Second Division, Maradana, came to be issued?

Answer 4. No special license has been granted, but only an ordinary license by the Chairman. An application was made by Mr. Gauder, who already held a license for the sale of beef, mutton, and pork on the premises at No. 112, Second Division, Maradana, for permission to use the stall, which had been licensed for the sale of pork, for the sale of fish. He urged in support of this application that he had deferred opening the pork stall, as the Hindus, Muhammadans, and Malay customers had objections to the sale of pork and he had been advised to open a fish stall in place of the pork stall. He pointed out the advantage such a stall would be to the public and also that the premises which were already licensed were well ventilated, cemented, and fitted with water service. The form which I have recently had introduced for reporting on such applications was used. In the reports which were submitted to me for my consideration, the Financial Assistant, looking at the question from the financial aspect of Dean's road market, raised the point that in his opinion the stall was The Medical Officer of Health reported that there was no special objection on sanitary grounds. not required there. referred the application to the Ward Member on February 5, for him to state whether there was any objection to the

grant of a license. On April 15 he sent me the following letter (read letter from the Ward Member).

He forwarded with his letter a letter from Dr. E. V. Ratnam in answer to one of his (both letters were read). It will be noted that in this letter from Dr. E. V. Ratnam no objection is raised, but there is only a simple statement that he did not think that there was any necessity for a fish stall at this junction. As there was no valid reason for my refusing a grant

of the license, I decided that it might issue.

Question 5. Whether he (the Chairman) was not aware that an application for a similar license for the identical place was refused by resolution of Standing Committee on Sanitation and Markets of September 22, 1916, adopted by the

Municipal Council at its meeting in October of that year?

Answer 5. It was not in my mind at the time that an application for a similar license for the same place had been refused in 1916. This fact had not been entered on the form in the place provided for such notes. As a matter of fact, although it was not recollected by me at the time, an application had been made in 1916 for a similar license, and it had been refused. The suggestion that it was refused by a resolution of the Council is incorrect. It was not refused by a resolution of the Council, but by me after a reference to the Markets Committee. The reference to the Committee in 1916 was made by me at the time under the impression that the site was within the prescribed distance from the public market, whereas it is actually outside it. The reference to the Committee, in view of the actual distance of the stall from a public market, was not really necessary. I may mention that the prescribed distance in the case of meat stalls is one mile, but in the case of fish stalls half a mile.

Question 6. If he was a ware of the existence of such a resolution, whether he considered it not binding on him

and can be contravened as has been in this case without reference to this Council?

As stated in the preceding answer, the former refusal was not in my mind at the time. Even if it had been it would not have been in any way binding on me in dealing with the present application, as the case was, in view of the distance of the stall from the nearest public market, one for the sole decision of the Chairman, and was not one which was required by law to be referred to the Council or to a Committee.

Question 7. Why, having submitted the first application for the consideration of the Standing Committee on Sanitation and Markets, he failed to or thought it unnecessary to bring up the present application for the consideration of

the same Committee?

This has been explained in the preceding answers. In any case the question was one for decision by Answer 7.

the Chairman and not by any Committee.

Whether the Chairman was unaware at the time he authorized the issue of the license that in the Question 8. memorandum which the Member for Maradana Ward forwarded in support of the application, there was not the signature of a single resident of Regent street, and at best only of two of Second Division, Maradana?

I did not specially notice the absence of the signatures of persons residing in Regent street. The point was immaterial. The question to be decided in each case is whether the applicant is entitled to the grant of the license. not whether certain residents are in support of the application. As a matter of fact, persons residing in Regent street may not stand in need of this fish stall, as they are in fairly close proximity to the Dean's road public market, but on the other

hand persons who live at a greater distance from the market, for instance, persons residing at Mount Mary, do stand in need No actual objections were raised to the grant of the license. Where an application has been made for a license, the argument that there is no need or necessity for the stall is not a valid argument against the grant of a license where the premises are otherwise in order.

Question 9. Whether the by-laws relating to the regulation of eating-houses passed by this Council at its meeting held in January, 1918, had been confirmed by the Governor in Executive Council, and, if not, why or what reasons have

been assigned for refusing to confirm them,?

Answer 9. The by-laws in question were not submitted to His Excellency the Governor for sanction, as the opinion

of the Law Officers of the Crown was that they could not be passed quite in the form in which they stood.

Question 10. Whether the Chairman is in a position to add anything to his reply to my question of May 25, 1917, re regulating and preserving the character of special areas and if he would be pleased to take immediate or urgent action in the matter, so as to prevent purely residential areas being speedily converted into commercial or manufacturing areas?

Answer 10. I have prepared a minute on the subject which I have had printed. It is my intention at some future

meeting of this Council to move for the appointment of a Special Committee to consider the subject which is a complex one.

Question 11. Whether the recommendation of the Standing Committees on Sanitation and Markets and Finance of November 17, 1916, made on the initiation of the Member for Wellawatta Ward to offer rewards not exceeding Rs. 25, to persons other than those legally bound, giving information leading to the discovery of concealed cases of smallpox has been made known to the public and, if so, how far and by what means?

Answer 11. The plan of giving rewards in such cases has not been proclaimed, but in view of the present outbreak

of smallpox, I am having it made known by beat of tom-tom.

Question 12. Are all cases of infectious diseases reported examined by the Medical Officer of Health or his Assistants as promptly as they are required to be reported by section 205 of the Councils' Ordinance No. 6 of 1910, which enacts that

Medical Practitioners shall report cases within three hours of attendances and householders forthwith?

Answer 12. All cases of dangerous infectious diseases, such as smallpox, cholera, plague, are visited by one of the Medical Officers immediately they are reported. In the case, however, of the less dangerous infectious diseases, such as measles and chickenpox, a visit is not necessarily paid by a Medical Officer of Health in the event of their being reported by a qualified Medical Practitioner. In such cases a Sub-Inspector visits the house in order to verify the address, advise the inmates with regard to isolation, and to see to the carrying out of the disinfection of the house. Such cases are not as a rule sent to the Infectious Diseases Hospital. Where such cases, i.e., cases of the less dangerous infectious diseases, have not been reported by a qualified Medical Practitioner, the standing order is for the Inspector to obtain at once the opinion

of one of the Medical Staff upon the case.

Question 13. Why was not the case of smallpox, reported on April 9, 1918, as chickenpox by the inmates of a house in Silversmith lane examined by the Medical Officer of Health or his Assistant till the 15th of that month, viz., six days

later?

The failure of the Medical Staff to examine the cases at Silversmith street before April 16 was due to neglect on the part of Sub-Inspector de Zoysa to report that there were cases of what he thought were chickenpox in the house. As a matter of fact, there was chickenpox in the district and in the house, but two of the cases in the house were undoubtedly smallpox. The cases had been reported verbally to the Sub-Inspector, who, after seeing them, took them to be chickenpox. He failed to report all three of the cases. When he became doubtful as to whether they were chickenpox or not on a subsequent visit, he telephoned to Dr. Loos, who at once examined them and formed the opinion that one was a

case of modified smallpox and the other a case of discrete smallpox.

Question 14. Mr. E. G. Jayewardene, with the leave of Council, asked the Chairman "after the recent resumption of the normal lighting of this city, under what circumstance has there again been a reduction made of the number of street lamps lit throughout the city; since when has the reduction been made and whether some arrangement cannot be made

to improve the lighting?"

The Chairman replied as follows :-

Certain reductions were made in the street lighting towards the close of 1914. No substantial alteration was, however, made till 1917, when, to meet the requirements of the Naval Authorities, the lighting was considerably restricted. In January, 1918, these restrictions were removed, but at the same time, the Gas Company intimated that it had extreme difficulty in getting supplies of coal, consequently the Council authorized me to make arrangements for reduced lighting. In March the Gas Company found that their arrangements for the supply of coal had failed, and a further reduction of the lighting was rendered absolutely necessary. The Company subsequently received a further supply of coal, and the lighting was resumed to a certain extent. Since then the question of obtaining a future supply has again arisen, and on the 3rd instant I sanctioned a further reduction in the street lighting. Unless the Company can make sure of obtaining a fresh supply of coal it will be necessary to limit the lighting still further by only lighting those lamps which are placed at road junctions and in the actual carriage way. The present position is not peculiar to Ceylon. The Coal Controller in India, from where our supplies are obtained, has called for considerable reductions in the public lighting throughout India, and has also issued a warning to all private consumers that they must curtail their consumption of gas, as otherwise he will enforce still more drastic reductions. Every possible endeavour is being made by the Gas Company to meet the situation, and they have despatched a representative to India to interview the authorities. It will be necessary to satisfy the Coal Controller that only the requisite minimum is being asked for, and the fact that we have reduced our street lighting will be important evidence as showing that Colombo is doing her best to conserve the coal supply so as to meet the needs of the Empire. So far this city has suffered little from the war, and I must ask all residents to bear the slight inconvenience with cheerfulness.

Pursuant to notice, Mr. M. Cassim Ismail moved that (a) the by-laws of this Council be revised and consolidated, and (b) a Special Committee, composed as follows, be appointed for the said purpose :- Mr. L. B. Fernando, the Hon. Mr. N. H. M. Abdul Cader, Mr. Arthur Alvis, Mr. E. G. Jayewardene, Dr. W. P. Rodrigo, Mr. M. Cassim Ismail. Mr. F. R. Senanayake seconded.

The Chairman having mentioned the steps taken previously to revise and consolidate the by-laws, put the motion

to the meeting, and it was declared carried.

Mr. C. P. Dias moved that the Council do go into Committee to consider items Nos. 15 to 20 (inclusive) on the agenda and re-numbered 16 to 21 in the Minutes. Mr. Arthus Alvis seconded.—Carried.

Extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Sanitation and Markets of May 27, 1918.

"Improvements in Packing or Baling Presses."

Abstract :-

The invention consists in constructing the chamber of a baling press with a pair of opposite sides hinged at the bottom, and providing for those sides to lie flat when they are lowered on their hinges. Those sides and the bottom of the chamber are provided with sunk rails, on which a wheeled trolley carrying the bale, or other object to be pressed, can be run into the chamber or run out again. The trolley thus forms a temporary floor of the press, and is made strong enough to withstand the total pressure of the press. During the process of pressing, the hinged sides are raised and fastened, and take the lateral pressure in the direction of those sides. Grooves are provided in the sides for the bale fastenings to lie in or they may be at the side of the sunk rails. Grooves for plain-tyred wheels of the trolley, instead of sunk rails for flanged wheels, are specified as a modification.

The claims are :-

1. In packing or baling presses a chamber under the screw head or ram having one side movable and hinged to the base of the chamber and provided on the inside with rails for a trolley set flush with its surface as and for the purpose described, and with grooves to accommodate the steel-hooping bands, substantially as described and illustrated.

2. In packing or baling presses a chamber under the screw head or ram having a movable and hinged side with

the rails and grooves as claimed in 1 and a similar side opposite.

3. In packing and baling presses the chamber with the movable hinged side provided with rails and grooves claimed in 1 and having its base furnished with trolley rails set to run in a line with the rails on the movable side when the side is opened.

4. In packing and baling presses the chamber with the two opposite movable hinged sides provided with rails and grooves claimed in 2 and having its base furnished with trolley rails set to run in a line with the rails on the movable sides when the sides are opened.

ARTICLES OF ASSOCIATION OF THE SMALL INVESTMENTS COMPANY, LIMITED.

SHARES.

1. Every person taking shares in the Company shall testify his acceptance thereof by writing under his hand in such form as the Company from time to time directs.

2. Every application for allotment of shares in the Company shall be accompanied by a payment at the rate of Rs. 10 for each share applied for, and in case the shares are allotted, the Shareholder shall thereafter pay at the rate of Rs. 10 per month for each share allotted during the succeeding eleven months, before the 10th day of every such succeeding month. Any possual vacancy in the Board of Directors may be filled up by the Directors, and the persons who are appointed shall hold office so long as the vacating Director would have held office if no vacancy had occurred.

41. The Company in General Meeting may by special resolution remove any Director and appoint another in his

DIVIDENDS.

The Directors may, with the sanction of the Company in General Meeting, declare a dividend to be paid out of the profits earned by the Company to the Shareholders in proportion to the number of instalments paid by them.

ACCOUNTS.

43. Once at least in every year the Directors shall lay before the Company in General Meeting a full and complete statement of the income and expenditure, as well as a complete balance sheet for the past year made up to a date not more than three months before such meeting.

44. A copy of such balance sheet shall be sent to all the Shareholders at least seven days previously to the meeting

at which such balance sheet is to be submitted.

AUDIT.

45. The accounts of the Company shall be audited annually, and the report of the Auditors on the accounts of the Company shall be read at the ordinary meeting, together with a report from the Directors with regard to the working

of the Company.

46. The Auditors shall be appointed by the Company at one of its meetings and such Auditors may or may not

be Shareholders of the Company.
