And whereas by Notifications dated July 9, 1872, May 3, 1873, January 26, 1874, September 30, 1874, September 14, 1875, May 3, 1877, August 21, 1877, November 21, 1877; January 15, 1886, and September 29, 1905, the Chief Headmen’s divisions of Weligam korale, Morawak korale, Wellaboda pattu, and Gangaboda pattu were subdivided under the aforesaid Ordinance, and the Chief Headman’s division of Four Gravets (comprising the subdivisions of Godagama and Madiha, and excluding the area included within the Local Board limits of Matara) was subdivided under the Ordinance No. 24 of 1889 and proclaimed on September 29, 1905 :

And whereas it is now expedient to cancel the above-named Proclamations and Notifications and all other Proclamations and Notifications which may have been published from time to time, under the aforesaid Ordinances, in respect of the above-named Chief Headmen’s divisions, and to proclaim anew the said Ordinance No. 24 of 1889 within the said Chief Headmen’s divisions and to accurately subdivide the said divisions :

Now know Ye that We, the Governor of Ceylon, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby cancel the said Proclamations and Notifications, and in exercise of the powers vested in Us by section 4 of the Village Communities Ordinance, No. 24 of 1889, do hereby bring the Chief Headmen’s divisions of Wellaboda pattu, Gangaboda pattu, Kandaboda pattu, Weligam korale, Morawak korale, and Four Gravets (excluding the area included within the Local Board limits of Matara town) within the operation of the aforesaid Village Communities Ordinance, No. 24 of 1889.

And in exercise of the powers vested in Us by section 5 of the aforesaid Village Communities Ordinance, No. 24 of 1889, and with the advice of the Executive Council, We, the Governor of the Island of Ceylon, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby subdivide the Chief Headmen's divisions of Weligam korale, Morawak korale, Gangaboda pattu, Wellaboda pattu, Kandaboda pattu, and Four Gravets (excluding the area included within the Local Board limits of Matara town) into the subdivisions given in annexed schedule :

And whereas it is expedient to establish Village Tribunals in the aforesaid Chief Headmen's divisions of Weligam korale, Morawak korale, Gangaboda pattu, Wellaboda pattu, Kandaboda pattu, and Four Gravets (excluding the area included within the Local Board limits of Matara town) :

Now know Ye that We, the said Governor, in exercise of the powers vested in Us by section 26 of the aforesaid Village Communities Ordinance, No. 24 of 1889, and with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby establish Village Tribunals in the Chief Headmen's divisions of Weligam korale, Morawak korale, Gangaboda pattu, Wellaboda pattu, Kandaboda pattu, and Four Gravets (excluding the area included within the Local Board limits of Matara town), in the Matara District of the Southern Province, as from and after March 1, 1920.

REGULATION REFERRED TO.

That the following be added to the definition of the term diseased locality in regulation 1:—

"Provided that in a case of emergency, where in his opinion any delay would prevent the taking of steps necessary to check the spread of disease, a Government Agent or an Assistant Government Agent may, after consultation with the Principal Civil Medical Officer or the Provincial Surgeon, when such consultation is possible, declare a locality to be a diseased locality for such time as to him may appear necessary.

"Provided also that such declaration shall be forthwith

reported by the Government Agent or Assistant Government Agent to the Governor in Executive Council, who may confirm, revoke, alter, or amend any such declaration, but without prejudice to anything done or suffered previously to such confirmation, revocation, alteration, or amendment.

"Provided further (but without affecting the validity of such declaration) that such declaration shall be notified within the area of such locality by beat of tom-tom, and that copies thereof shall be affixed to prominent places in the Province or District in which the diseased locality is situated."

3. The top and branchwood of good size (i.e., 6 feet and above in length and 3½ feet and above in girth), straight and sound are also to be delivered at the Batticaloa Bar.

4. 6. Work is to commence on or before April 15, 1920, and the delivery at the shipping depôt should be completed before July 1, 1920.

7. A rate per cubic foot of accepted timber and scantling, and also per broad gauge sleeper, narrow gauge sleeper, and outside slab, should be quoted, both in words and figures.

N.B.—The attention of contractors is drawn to by-law No. 9 (a) under section 18 of "The Vehicles Ordinance, No. 4 of 1916," which runs as follows:—

VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended February 28, 1920.

Births.—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 127 (3 Europeans, 4 Burghers, 70 Sinhalese, 20 Tamils, 21 Moors, 6 Malays, and 3 Others). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on January 1, 1920, viz., 290,480) was 22·8, as against 25·8 in the preceding week, 30·0 in the corresponding week of last year, and 21·0 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 137 (3 Europeans, 6 Burghers, 80 Sinhalese, 26 Tamils, 12 Moors, 4 Malays, and 6 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 24·6, as against 31·6 in the previous week, 27·8 in the corresponding week of last year, and 27·7 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 137 total deaths, 22 were of infants under one year of age, as against 32 in the preceding week, 27 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 31 the average for last year.

Stillbirths.—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 5.

Principal Causes of Death.—1. (a) Twenty-two deaths from *Pneumonia* were registered, 8 in Kotahena, 7 in Maradana (including 1 death of a non-resident in hospital), 2 in Kollupitiya, and 1 each in San Sebastian, St. Paul's, New Bazaar, Slave Island, and Wellawatta, as against 24 in the previous week and 21 the weekly average for last year.

(b) Four deaths from *Bronchitis* were registered, 3 in Slave Island and 1 in Maradana (of a non-resident in hospital), as against 3 in the previous week.

(c) Two deaths from *Influenza* were registered, 1 each in St. Paul's and Kotahena, as against 9 in the previous week and 11 the weekly average for last year.

2. Fifteen deaths from *Phthisis* were registered, 7 in Maradana (including 6 deaths of non-residents in hospitals), 3 each in New Bazaar and Kotahena, and 1 each in Slave Island and Kollupitiya, as against 13 in the previous week and 14 the weekly average for last year.

3. Eleven deaths from *Enteric Fever* were registered, 4 in Maradana (including 2 deaths of non-residents in hospitals), 3 in St. Paul's, 2 in Slave Island, and 1 each in Kotahena and Kollupitiya, as against 8 in the previous week and 5 the weekly average for last year.

4. Two deaths from *Plague* were registered, 1 each in Pettah and St. Paul's, as against 3, 6, 6, and 3, respectively, in the four preceding weeks. The weekly average for last year was 2.

5. Ten deaths were registered from *Debility*, 9 from *Infantile Convulsions*, 3 each from *Diarrhoea* and *Enteritis*, 2 from *Dysentery*, 1 each from *Worms* and *Tetanus*, and 52 from *Other Causes*.

6. Sixty-three cases of *Measles*, 21 of *Chickenpox*, and 3 of *Plague* were reported during the week, as against 57, 25, and 1, respectively, during the preceding week.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 79·7°, against 79·1° in the preceding week, and 82·5° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 30·016 in., against 30·036 in. in the preceding week and 30·647 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 0·21 in., against 0·28 in. in the preceding week and 0·19 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.

MISCELLANEOUS DEPARTMENTAL NOTICES.

REGULATIONS AFFECTING TRADE.

THE following notice extracted from the Board of Trade Journal of January 15, 1920, is published for general information. Attention is invited to the notes which explain in the local modifications necessary for the application of the notice to trade between Ceylon and the countries in question. The Notification of November 18, 1919, appearing in "Gazette" of November 28, 1919, is hereby superseded.

Condition under which Trading is permissible with certain Countries.

The Board of Trade have issued the following instructions (Cmd. 512, price 1d), dealing with trade conditions with certain countries as a result of the ratification of the Peace Treaty :—

The following notes on trading conditions as affected by the raising of the blockade, the authorization of the resumption of trade with Germany and other countries, and the removal of United Kingdom import restrictions, are published for the information of British traders. These notes supersede those published in July and September last as Parliamentary Returns "Cmd. 274" and "Cmd. 350."

During the war it was necessary to prohibit all trading with the enemy, but the necessity for this provision has now ceased. It is no part of the policy of His Majesty's Government to discourage British traders from competing in the markets of the late enemy countries, and it is desirable that British traders should make every effort to secure a proper footing in Central Europe.

I.—GERMANY.

Exports.—Any goods may be sent to Germany without license, except goods on Lists "A" and "B" of prohibited exports. Applications for export licenses in respect of goods included in those lists should be addressed to the Imports and Exports Licensing Section, 22, Carlisle Place, Westminster, S.W., 1.

NOTE.—As regards exports from Ceylon the corresponding Lists A and B of prohibited exports will be found in the Proclamation in the "Gazette" of January 9, 1920. These lists are subject to amendment from time to time by similar Proclamations. Exporters desiring to export prohibited articles from Ceylon under license should arrange with their London Agents and their consignees to obtain the necessary sanction from the Secretary of State for the Colonies.

Imports.—Any goods may be imported from Germany, and paid for, without license, except goods whose importation from all foreign countries is prohibited.

NOTE.—Import restrictions from Germany, &c., are at present confined to the list of articles prohibited from import in the Customs Tariff, with the following additions :—Certain dye stuffs, *vide* Proclamation in "Gazette" of November 28, 1919. Further restrictions may be made by Proclamations in the "Gazette."

Other Transactions.—Other transactions of a commercial or financial nature with firms in Germany are permissible without further license, provided they do not involve any of the following matters, namely :—

- (a) The payment of receipt of money arising out of pre-war transactions ;
- (b) The delivery of or dealing with property held in this country for persons in Germany since before the outbreak of war ;
- (c) The transfer of securities by or on behalf of a person in Germany ;
- (d) The allotment of transfer of securities issued by a company to or for the benefit of a German subject ;
- (e) The transfer of any debt or other obligation due to a person in Germany, arising out of pre-war transactions.

It should, of course, be understood that, as regards the financing of transactions, traders must make the best arrangements they can, and, in the case of uncertainty as to the best mode of procedure, they should consult their bankers.

Money due or property acquired by German nationals as a result of transactions entered into since the resumption of trade with Germany was authorized are not liable to sequestration in this country.

II.—TURKEY, BULGARIA, AND THE TERRITORIES PREVIOUSLY INCLUDED IN THE AUSTRO-HUNGARIAN DOMINIONS.

The British regulations are the same as those set out above in the case of Germany, except that the collection of debts owed by persons or firms in these territories is allowed.

III.—NORWAY, SWEDEN, DENMARK, HOLLAND, AND SWITZERLAND.

It is no longer necessary to obtain certificates from Importing Associations in these countries, or to procure other forms of guarantee, or to consign goods to such Associations. Export licenses, for which application should be made to the Imports and Exports Licensing Section at the address given above, are required only for goods on Lists "A" and "B" of prohibited exports.

IV.—POLAND, FINLAND, ESTHONIA, LETTLAND, LITHUANIA.

So far as British regulations are concerned, there are no special restrictions on trade with these countries, but, as in the case of other foreign countries, export licenses are required for goods on Lists "A" and "B," and general prohibitions of import apply to these as to other countries.

Consular Certificates of Origin and Interest.—These certificates are no longer required for goods imported into this country.

Declarations of Ultimate Destination and Disclosure of Names of Consignees.—These declarations will no longer be required to be made in respect of exports from the United Kingdom, and disclosure of the name of the consignee on Bills of Lading or Shipping Manifests is unnecessary, except in a limited number of cases where the Imports and Exports Licensing Section may continue to specify on an export license the name of the consignee.

NOTE.—The above statements deal only with such regulations as are in force in the United Kingdom. Traders should also have regard to the restrictions on imports and exports in operation in foreign countries. Information on this subject may be obtained from the Department of Overseas Trade, 35, Old Queen street, London, E.C., 2, and is published from time to time as received in the "Board of Trade Journal."

5. No timber shall be removed before payment of the full price bid, and all timber sold must be removed from the depôt within ten days of date of notification of acceptance by the Conservator of Forests of such bid, and will be at the risk of the purchasers until removed.
6. Should any person to whom a lot is knocked down refuse to take it over at the full price bid, or refuse or fail to sign the sale book and pay 25 per cent. of his bid when so required, or refuse or fail to pay the full purchase amount or balance thereof, as the case may be, and to remove the timber within the time specified in clause 5 above, the lot will again be put up for auction, and the original purchaser or bidder will be held liable for any loss to Government owing to a lower price being realized at the re-sale, while if an enhanced price is realized at such re-sale, he shall, however, have no claim to the profit which shall accrue to Government.
7. Agents bidding for others will be required to produce a written authority from the firm or persons for whom they bid, such authority will be retained by the Assistant Conservator of Forests, and will hold good only at the particular sale at which it is produced.

Sale of Satinwood.

AN auction sale of the under-mentioned satinwood will be held at the Central Timber Depôt, Kew road, Slave Island, Colombo, on Saturday, March 27, 1920, at 11 A.M., subject to the following conditions:—

1. The timber will be put up in lots to suit buyers at a rate per cubic foot, and no advance of less than 25 cents per cubic foot will be accepted.
2. The highest bid will be accepted, subject to the approval or disapproval of the Conservator of Forests. The highest bidder will be required by the officer conducting the sale to sign the sale book kept for the purpose directly a lot has been knocked down to him.
3. Payment of 25 per cent. of the successful bid to be made at time of sale if so required.
4. Depôt measurements must be accepted, but previous to date of auction any prospective bidder is at liberty to check the measurements recorded in the notice and to represent any differences promptly.
5. No timber shall be removed before payment of the full price bid, and all timber sold must be removed from the depôt within ten days of date of notification of acceptance by the Conservator of Forests of such bid, and will be at the risk of the purchasers until removed.
6. Should any person to whom a lot is knocked down refuse to take it over at the full price bid, or refuse or fail to sign the sale book and pay 25 per cent. of his bid when so required, or refuse or fail to pay the full purchase amount or balance thereof, as the case may be, and to remove the timber within the time specified in clause 5 above, the lot will again be put up for auction, and the original purchaser or bidder will be held liable for any loss to Government owing to a lower price being realized at the re-sale, while if an enhanced price is realized at such re-sale, he shall, however, have no claim to the profit which shall accrue to Government.
7. Flowered logs, if not so advertised, shall be excluded from the lots advertised in the list, and shall be put up separately, at the discretion of the Assistant Conservator of Forests, after consulting the wishes of prospective purchasers.
8. Agents bidding for others will be required to produce a written authority from the firm or person for whom they bid, such authority will be retained by the Assistant Conservator of Forests, and will hold good only at the particular sale at which it is produced.

Coconut, tea, rubber, cinnamon, citronella, and vegetables are the principal products. The estimated coconut crop for the month was 9,000,000 nuts.

Coast rice, varied from Rs. 7.68 to Rs. 12.80 per bushel; paddy, Rs. 4 per bushel; dry grain, Rs. 2 to Rs. 7 per bushel; coconuts, Rs. 80 to Rs. 100 per 1,000 nuts.

The weather was generally dry during the month.

The harvest prospects are good.

The health of the people was, on the whole, satisfactory.

EASTERN PROVINCE.

BATTICALOA DISTRICT.

Paddy: munmari plants are in blossom and in ear. Prospects, on the whole, satisfactory, though a little rain is badly required in places. In Akkarai and Panawa pattus only reduced areas were taken up for cultivation owing to want of early rains. Kalavellamai sowing progressing.

Dry grain and chena crops: prospects satisfactory.

Coconuts: prospects satisfactory, as the trees are gradually recovering from the effects of past drought.

Prices of staple products: paddy, from Rs. 1.80 to Rs. 2 per bushel; Indian corn, Re. 1.44 to Rs. 2 per bushel; kurakkan, Re. 1.50 to Rs. 3 per bushel.

Rainfall: 8.08 in. in 1919; 5.93 in. in 1920.

Health of cattle: satisfactory.

Health of inhabitants: satisfactory, excepting in Akkarai and Panawa pattus where there was an outbreak of cholera, which has practically been stamped out now.

Minutes of Proceedings of a General Meeting of the Municipal Council of Colombo held in the Town Hall on Friday, January 16, 1920.

The Council met this day at 3 P.M., pursuant to notice dated January 9, 1920.

Present:—Mr. T. Reid, Acting Chairman; Mr. C. P. Dias; Major A. W. de Wilton; Mr. Arthur Alvis; Dr. E. V. Ratnam; Dr. W. P. Rodrigo; Mr. F. R. Senanayake; Mr. Harold Creasy; Mr. B. F. Khan; Mr. B. W. Leefe; Lieut.-Col. S. Boylan Smith, D.S.O. O.B.E.; and Mr. A. J. Wickwar.

1. The Minutes of the General Meeting of December 5, and the Special Meeting of December 12, 1919, having been previously printed and copies thereof having been sent to each Member of Council, were taken as read.

Resolved that the Minutes of the General Meeting of December 5 and the Special Meeting of December 12, 1919, be confirmed.

2. The Chairman read the following:—Since the last Meeting of Council 36 further cases of human plague have been recorded. The total number of cases for 1919 was 87, as compared with 70 in 1918, 207 in 1917, 291 in 1916, 139 in 1915, and 413 in 1914. Fifty of the cases during last year were septicæmic in character, all of which, as usual, proved fatal; while 37 were bubonic, of which 32, or 86.5 per cent., proved fatal, as against a bubonic case mortality of 96.6 per cent. in 1918. Twenty-six of the cases were in Pettah; 27 in St. Paul's, mostly in Kochchikadde; and 21 in Kotahena, mostly at Pickering's road; 4 in San Sebastian; 3 in Maradana; 2 in New Bazaar; and 1 in Slave Island. Three deaths occurred in the hospital, the addresses of whom were unknown. The total number of cases up to date this year was 14. Five of which were septicæmic and 9 were bubonic in character. Thirteen of the cases have so far proved fatal, the last reported case being alive at the Infectious Diseases Hospital. Seven of the cases were in Ferry street, 3 of them in a range of insanitary tenements. The last case here died on January 11. Two cases occurred at Wolfendahl, 1 at Akbar's lane, 1 at Jampettah street, and 1 homeless coal cooly. With regard to rat plague, 10 cases have been recorded up to date this year. Five of them from the range of insanitary tenements at Ferry street, where, in addition, a number of mummified rats, which had died of plague were found in a vacant room in the centre of the range.

With the permission of Council the Chairman read the following letter received from the Hon. the Colonial Secretary:—"I am directed to inform you that a despatch has been received from the Secretary of State for the Colonies in which Lord Milner requests that an expression of the thanks of His Majesty the King be conveyed to the Members of the Municipal Council, Colombo, for the address presented by them, in the Legislative Council Chamber, on July 19, 1919, on the occasion of the local celebrations in connection with the conclusion of peace with Germany."

3. The Council proceeded to elect Members for the four Standing Committees for 1920, voting by ballot. The results of the ballot were declared by the Chairman, as follows:—

Mr. C. P. Dias in supporting the motion referred to rinderpest in rural districts, and urged that unless the Government came to the assistance of Council the efforts made by the Council would be unavailing.

The Chairman agreed with Mr. C. P. Dias, and pointed out that paragraph 25 of the report meets this.

The motion was put to the Meeting and carried unanimously.

Mr. C. P. Dias moved that the leave referred to in items Nos. 6 to 11 (inclusive) on the agenda be sanctioned. Mr. Arthur Alvis seconded.—Carried.

Report on Rinderpest.

Quarantine.—Nearly all cattle imported into Ceylon are landed at Colombo and the burden of quarantining them is placed on the Municipal Council. In our opinion it should be borne by Government mainly, the Council looking after its own area.

2. The present system is as follows :—At Tuticorin, animals are detained in bamboo pens for ten days and are supposed to be inoculated and certain fees are charged. In our opinion there is no real quarantine at Tuticorin.

3. Cattle are landed at the Colombo Wharf where they are inspected by a Stock Inspector. Healthy animals are driven by road to the Quarantine Station at Dematagoda, and the sick are taken to the cattle hospitals there in covered carts.

4. At Dematagoda there are seventeen cattle sheds and five goat sheds inside a high wall, two walled-in hospitals outside it, and also four walled-in sheds for contacts at another side of the Quarantine Station. Each shed takes 30 head of cattle. These buildings have cemented floors, are scientifically laid out, have water laid on, and are models of perfection structurally. The premises are invariably kept in a state of spotless cleanliness. There is an adequate staff, and by a system of branding and registers and passes, malpractices cannot easily escape detection. In the station animals are quarantined for ten days, but are not always removed thereafter. They pass on to the Cattle Mart in many cases, and the Mart is also inside the wall referred to.

5. The temperatures of all animals inside the station are taken and recorded daily, and the moment illness appears the affected animal is at once taken to one of the hospitals. Animals are not infectious when a temperature appears, even if they are about to develop rinderpest. They are infectious when discharges begin a few days after fever appears.

6. The defects in the system are : If zeal and efficiency prevail amongst the staff, this method of quarantining might suffice. But if temperatures are carelessly taken at the station, disease may escape detection and infection may be spread. Then the hospitals are near the station and it is most difficult to prevent cattle attendants at the hospitals mixing with those in the station, or to secure absolute isolation in the matter of clothing, fodder, &c. And when cases occur in the Quarantine Station or Mart, as the whole place cannot be turned into a contact camp, resort is had to the device of treating as contacts only those animals which were stalled in the shed in which the diseased animal was stalled. This is not a very scientific method.

7. The Mart cannot be abolished if the City's supply of beef and mutton is to be assured.

8. The stalling of animals which have passed quarantine with those which have not in the same camp is inadvisable. The present station should be a Cattle Mart only, and is in fact barely large enough to serve that purpose. A new Quarantine Station should be built by Government at a site other than that on which the Mart stands. As practically all imported cattle come to Ceylon from Tuticorin, it seems best that the new Quarantine Station should be erected at Tuticorin if a site and a proper water supply can be secured. The Municipality could deal with the few importations from other places.

9. At present cattle, sheep, and goats can be imported into Ceylon through the ports of Colombo and Kayts. It will not suffice to effect proper quarantine at Colombo only; importation through Kayts should be equally well supervised or legally abolished.

10. In our opinion it is necessary to protect Ceylon from infection from India by a proper quarantine system carried out by the Ceylon Government. Until this is done, only an extremely optimistic person can hope to deal adequately with infectious cattle disease in Ceylon.

11. *Cattle Disease in Colombo.*—For dealing with cattle disease in Ceylon, the Council, as a rule, does not rely on the Quarantine Station, hospitals, or contact camp referred to above. They are used for imported cattle, sheep, and goats. On the whole this seems to be a good plan, space and other things being taken into consideration.

12. For local cattle the buildings used are a contact camp of sixteen sheds at Madampitiya. The site, buildings, fences, strength of staff, and other arrangements are a model of perfection, and the place is kept spotlessly clean.

All contacts are sent to this camp, but in addition a Contact Camp of a temporary kind, consisting of a stout wooden stockade, has been erected at Wellawatta. This is merely an emergency camp to serve the southern part of the City and to facilitate the seizure and detention of contacts until they can conveniently be moved to Madampitiya in the north of the City. It is quite adequate for its purpose at present.

13. For diseased animals there is a temporary camp at Borella, covering a few acres, enclosed by a barbed wire fence on iron standards. It is protected on one side by a swamp and on others by a proclaimed zone within which cattle

cannot legally stray, a constable armed with a carbine and a watcher guard this zone. The site is central and excellent in every way. It is adequately staffed and well managed, but it is not satisfactory. Temporary huts with earthen floors and without cement drains and catchpits cannot be considered adequate. There should be buildings of a permanent kind, properly walled in, in which diseased animals should be stalled. Water service should be laid on. It is understood that the Committee appointed by Government, of which the Mayor is a Member, has drawn up plans and estimates for a new scientifically planned hospital at Borella.

14. As regards the organization for dealing with disease and contacts, there is an adequate staff always capable of the expansion needed when epidemics occur. At present the Veterinary Surgeon has under him six inspectors for the three areas of Colombo—North, Central, and South—and a disinfecting staff. All the appliances needed for an epidemic—covered-in ambulance and tip carts, sprayers, incinerator, &c., are available.

15. The staff is supplemented by Police, who are employed to guard all infected premises till disinfected, to shoot animals straying on the protective zone at the Borella Camp, to shoot diseased animals, to accompany contacts when being driven to Camp, &c.

16. The actual measures taken on the outbreak of disease are to remove the diseased animals and contacts to their respective camps, the former in carts, and to disinfect, proclaim, and close infected premises. The Chairman has authorized inspectors to have animals supposed to be suffering from rinderpest shot, if the owners consent. But the general rule is that they be taken in carts to Borella, where the Veterinary Surgeon on his daily visit has diseased animals shot as soon as he certifies that they are incurable. It is a question whether all animals suffering from rinderpest should not be shot at once; but we consider it undesirable to allow any officer, other than the Veterinary Surgeon, to sanction shooting, and the quickest and best method, as a rule, is to concentrate all diseased animals at Borella for the daily visit of the Veterinary Surgeon.

17. One objection to killing off diseased animals is that 20 per cent. recover, and some animals are very valuable. A greater objection is that it may turn out to do more harm than good, because cattle owners will conceal diseased animals if they know they are taken away to be killed. On the whole the arrangement made by the Mayor seems to be the best.

18. Carcasses are incinerated; but if carts cannot be procured speedily the Inspectors are authorized to bury them at places where they die, if this is feasible. Up to date all carcasses have been incinerated.

19. City drinking troughs are cleaned out and disinfected every day by the Waterworks Engineer. All animals in camp are washed in disinfectants before release.

20. The system of printed notices at all infected places is efficient, and so are the printed instructions.

21. There are ample legal powers in the Ordinance and by-laws.

22. All contacts are inoculated free of charge; but recently no serum could be procured. The Mayor has moved for the preparation of serum at the local Bacteriological Institute.

23. The apathy and indifference of most cattle owners is astonishing. Worse still is the habit of concealing contacts. Recently, a series of prosecutions for concealing diseased cattle has removed that evil almost completely. It might be well to offer a reward of Rs. 10 to any person, other than the owner or caretaker, who gives correct information to the Veterinary Surgeon of the existence of a diseased animal or contacts.

24. The system of dealing with rinderpest in Colombo, with the exception of the defects above referred to, is scientific and effective. There is, of course, the usual administrative difficulty of securing absolutely efficient work. Pay and punishment are adequate.

25. As thousands of cattle visit Colombo every week from rural districts, it is obvious that adequate measures must also be taken outside Colombo. When one considers that Colombo covers less than 9,000 acres, mostly built on and laid out, and when the expenses of the staff needed in the City, the buildings, equipment, &c., are considered, one can realize the task of the authorities in charge of rural areas enormous in extent and without elaborate Municipal organization. The list of reported cases of rinderpest for all parts of Ceylon during the last five years shows the extent of the problem. If permanent buildings with cement floors, catchpits, walls for fences, water supply, ambulance carts, tip carts, incinerator, sprayers, thermometers, &c., and the large paid staff referred to above are needed in Colombo to eradicate cattle disease, the problem of the rural districts can well be imagined; and yet Colombo cannot be freed from rinderpest unless the surrounding districts are at the same time freed from it.

26. As regards the existing epidemic in Colombo, it started in January, 1919, and there were 790 cases of rinderpest during the year, the epidemic being most virulent in March and again at the end of the year. The figures for previous years were:—

27. The disease in 1919 did not originate from the Quarantine Station, and its origin is not known. As regards the vitality of the rinderpest virus, there are only divergent theories to guide one; and to try to locate the origin of the disease is mere speculation.

28. At present the epidemic is virulent; there are about three deaths a day. This is not very serious in a City where about sixty head of cattle are slaughtered each day. But the dislocation of traffic caused by segregation and the like is serious, and the epidemic may become more virulent at any time.

29. We, therefore, recommend the adoption of the measures indicated above by the Council and by Government.

MUNICIPALITY OF KANDY.

Minutes of Proceedings of a Meeting of the Municipal Council of Kandy held in the Town Hall, Kandy, on January 17, 1920, at 8 a.m., in accordance with notice dated January 13, 1920.

(1) Letter No. 1 of January 6, 1920, from the Hon. the Colonial Secretary intimating that a Despatch has been received from the Secretary of State for the Colonies requesting that an expression of the thanks of His Majesty the King be conveyed to the Members of the Municipal Council, Kandy, for their congratulatory message on the occasion of the conclusion of Peace with Germany.—Read.

(2) Letter of January 14, 1920, from the Colombo Gas and Water Co., intimating that they are unable to undertake at present the lighting of the dials of the clock in the Planters' Commemoration Buildings.—Read.

5. Petition of June 8, 1920, from the Market Stall-holders praying that the rents of the stalls be reduced to what they were last year.

Dr. Attygalle proposed.—“That the rents of the sundry goods stalls be raised by only Rs. 5 per mensem over the figures of 1919, so long as the present system of rice control exists, and that the rents of all the other stalls remain as revised for 1920.”—Mr. LaBrooy seconded. Carried by 8 to 1, Mr. de Silva dissenting.

6. Pursuant to notice, Mr. de Silva moved.—“That the Council do remove the latrines that are by the side of the Bogambara tennis court to another site, as the said latrines are causing a public nuisance and are injurious to the health of the public.”—Mr. Goonewardene seconded.

It was agreed that the matter stand over pending the preparation of plans and estimates for a new latrine on another site.

7. 8. To sanction leave in excess of 30 days taken by Municipal Officers as per list of January 12, 1920, submitted by the Chief Clerk.—Resolved that the leave be sanctioned.

(3) That the sum of Rs. 21.27 expended by the Head Teacher in purchasing articles for the Kindergarten class be paid to him.

(ii.) Special Committee appointed to deal with the vagrant nuisance: (Dr. Attygalle, Mr. Pieris, and the Chairman.) It was agreed to re-appoint only the latter Special Committee.

Minutes of Proceedings of a Special Meeting of the Municipal Council of Kandy held in the Town Hall, Kandy, on Tuesday, February 3, 1920, at 8 a.m., in accordance with Notice dated January 28, 1920, to consider the question of the Council taking over the management of Rice Control within the Municipal Area.

Present: The Hon. Mr. C. S. Vaughan, Chairman; Mr. C. A. LaBrooy; Dr. Allan de Saram; Mr. J. C. Ratwatte; Mr. L. H. S. Pieris; Dr. J. W. S. Attygalle; Mr. P. M. Bingham; Mr. F. L. Goonewardene; and Mr. G. E. de Silva.

On the Chairman's motion the Council went into Committee. A letter from the Chairman, Kandy Social Service League, was read, stating that they were prepared to continue the work of preparing and distributing coupons in the event of the Council taking over the management of the Rice Control, if it could be shown that the Council would be able to serve the community in Kandy at cheaper rates than according to the present arrangements under the Food Control Committee.

The matter was discussed in Committee, and the following resolution was agreed to:—

"The Council having gone into figures is of opinion that the cost of working the rice control in the town would be the same under the management of the Council as under that of the Food Control Committee without any margin of profit.

The Council is also of opinion that the present cost of management by the Food Control Committee should be capable of reduction."

"The Council resumed, and the resolution passed in Committee was carried unanimously.

It was agreed to forward a copy of the resolution to the Deputy Food Controller and the Kandy Social Service League.

Order No. 56 made by the Food Controller under Regulation 1 of "The Defence of the Colony Regulations, 1919."

1. From and after the date of commencement of this order, no wholesale trader in the Jaffna District, Northern Province, shall dispose of, sell, or offer for sale, any imported paddy or rice, except on an issue order from the Government Agent, Northern Province, or other officer authorized by him in writing.

2. Every wholesale dealer shall enter all sales or disposals in a book to be kept by him for the purpose, and shall produce the book for inspection whenever required by the Government Agent, Northern Province, or by any person authorized by the Government Agent in writing to inspect it.

3. Every wholesale trader shall file the issue orders referred to in paragraph 1 above with respect to all sales and disposals, and shall produce them for inspection whenever so required by the Government Agent, Northern Province, or by any person authorized by the Government Agent in writing to inspect them.

4. Every wholesale trader shall permit the Government Agent, Northern Province, or any officer deputed thereto by him in writing, to enter any store, godown, or other premises occupied by him with a view to verifying the said trader's stock of rice and paddy.

5. All wholesale dealers shall transfer rice or paddy from one store to another under their control as and in such quantities as the Government Agent, Northern Province, may direct. No wholesale dealer shall transfer rice or paddy from one store to another without a permit from the Government Agent.

6. This order shall commence and come into operation on March 5, 1920.
