NOW Ye that We, the Governor of Ceylon, in pursuance of the powers in Us vested by "The Necessaries of War Exportation Ordinance, No. 19 of 1914," do hereby revoke Our Proclamations from time to time published in the Government Gazette on the subject of the exportation of articles from Ceylon, and in pursuance of the aforesaid Ordinance do publish in the schedules hereto lists of articles the exportation of which from Ceylon is hereby prohibited to the extent therein specified.

Provided, however, that the aforesaid prohibition shall not apply to-

- (a) Articles, not otherwise prohibited, consigned to persons or bodies of persons for the time being included in the "White Lists " for Siam and China ; and
- (b) Articles for the exportation of which from Ceylon to Siam or China a special permit has been issued by the Principal Collector of Customs.

And We do hereby declare that for the purpose of this Proclamation the expression "White Lists " shall mean the lists from time to time published in the Government Gazette of persons or bodies of persons to whom articles to be exported to Siam and China may be consigned.

To each sample must be firmly attached a label on which is stated the name of the tenderer, the Gazette number of the notice calling for the tender, and the description of the article adopted in his tender.

Tenders must be on forms which may be obtained at the Office of the Provincial Engineer, Central Province South, Nuwara-Eliya, and no tender will be considered unless it is furnished on the recognized form thus obtained. Any alterations made in the tenders should bear the initials of the tenderer, and all tenders containing alterations not so initialled will be treated as informal and rejected.

A deposit of Rs. 50 will be required to be made either 8. at the Treasury or Kachcheri, and a receipt produced for the same before any form of tender is issued. Should any person decline to enter into the contract and bond, or fail to furnish approved security, within ten days of receiving notice in writing from the Provincial Engineer, Central Province South, Nuwara Eliya, that his tender has been accepted, such deposit will be forfeited to the Crown, and the defaulter will render himself liable to be included in the list of defaulting contractors precluded from having any concern in a Government contract. All other deposits will be returned upon signature of a contract.

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Registrar-General's Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended April 12, 1919.

Births.—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 122 (7 Burghers, 71 Sinhalese, 17 Tamils, 19 Moors, 6 Malays, and 2 Others). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on January 1, 1919, viz., 281,169) was 22 °6, as against 22 °3 in the preceding week, 23 °0 in the corresponding week of last year, and 21 °5 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 129(1 European, 5 Burghers, 73 Sinhalese, 21 Tamils, 23 Moors, 3 Malays, and 3 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 23.9, as against 26.5 in the previous week, 17.0 in the corresponding week of last year, and 26.7 the weekly average for last year. Infantile Deaths.—Of the 129 total deaths, 30 were of infants under one year of age, as against 34 in the preceding

week, 47 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 30 the average for last year.

Stillbirths.-The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 6.

Principal Causes of Death.-Twenty-three deaths were registered from Pneumonia, 8 in Maradana (including 4 deaths of non-residents in hospitals), 4 in Kotahena, 3 in Kollupitiya, 2 in Pettah, 2 in New Bazaar, 2 in Slave Island, 1 in San Sebastian, and 1 in St. Paul's, as against 27, 26, 17, and 22, respectively, for the four preceding weeks. The weekly average for last year was 27. Eight deaths were registered from *Influenza*, 2 in St. Paul's, 2 in New Bazaar, 2 in Slave Island, 1 in San

Sebastian, and 1 in Kotahena, as against 11, 18, 7, and 7, respectively, for the four preceding weeks. One death was registered from Bronchitis, as against 2 in the preceding week.

2. Six deaths were registered from Phthisis, 2 in Kotahena, 2 in Maradana, 1 in St. Paul's, and 1 in Slave

Island, as against 7 in the previous week and 13 the weekly average for last year.
3. Four deaths were registered from *Enteric Fever*, 2 in Maradana (including a death of a non-resident in hospital), 1 in St. Paul's, and 1 in Kollupitiya, as against 12 in the previous week and 4 the weekly average for last year.

Fourteen deaths were registered from Debility, 8 from Infantile Convulsions, 8 from Worms, 6 from Enteritis, 3 from Dysentery, 2 from Diarrhæa, 2 from Tetanus, and 44 from Other Causes.
 Twenty cases of Chickenpox and 1 case of Measles were reported during the week, as against 19 and nil

respectively in the preceding week. State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 83.4°, against 83.3° in the preceding week and 82.1° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29.864 in., against 29.914 in. in the preceding week and 29.883 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 1.71 in., against 1.72 in. in the preceding week and 0.61 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.

LONDON.-INTERMEDIATE EXAMINATIONS IN ARTS AND SCIENCE, 1919-20. UNIVERSITY OF

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Pass Examinations.* (These examinations commence on the first Monday in July.)

N^O candidate shall be admitted to them unless he have passed, or been admitted under Statute 116 (see Appendix) as exempt from, a Matriculation Examination not later than that of the preceding January.

Application should be made to the Director of Education not Later than the last day of January on the prescribed form, which can be obtained from the Education Office.

The subjects for which a candidate desires to enter, the date of his matriculation, his name in full (initials not sufficient), should be stated. Candidates for Scholarship should also forward a certificate of birth.

The admission fee of Rs. 100 should be credited to the account of the Director of Education in the Mercantile Bank of India, Limited, Colombo, and the receipt of the Bank and a certificate

of good conduct should be sent with the form of application. No cash or Bank draft or Money Order or Cheque will be accepted. Candidates from outside the Colony may, however, remit the fee by Money Order or Bank draft in favour of the Director of Education.

N.B.—The University fee should not under any circumstances be remitted direct to the University of London or to the Education Office.

If a candidate withdraws his name, or fails to present himself at the examination, the fee shall not be returned to him. He should pay the usual fee for every subsequent entry for the examination.

The examination shall be conducted by means of printed papers ; but the Examiners shall not be preluded from putting, for the purpose of ascertaining the competence of the candidates to pass, will voce questions to any candidate in the subjects in which they are appointed to examine.

SUBJECTS FOR THE INTERMEDIATE EXAMINATION IN ARTS.

Candidates for a pass shall be examined in the following subjects.† They shall not be approved by the Examiners unless they have shown a competent knowledge in each of the subjects selected by them :-

(1) Latin with Roman History, or Greek with Greek History. (2) One of the following subjects :—Latin with Roman History, if not already taken under (1); Greek with Greek History, if not already taken under (1); French; German; Sanskrit.

Note.—Candidates taking Sanskrit will be required to give seven calendar months, notice, and to pay a special fee of Rs. 90 in addition to the ordinary fee.

Intermediate Arts candidates who failed in English only in any year from 1907 to 1914 inclusive, but not in preceding or subsequent

Chemistry (Two Papers and a Practical Examination).

The following outline is given for the general guidance of candidates as indicating the range of the Written Part (I.) and Experimental Part (II.) of the Examination in Chemistry :---

I. The methods which lead to the discovery of the composition of common materials occurring in nature.

The determination of molecular weights, equivalents, and of atomic weights. Valency and structural formulæ. Classification of the elements, including the Periodic Scheme. General characters of the chief types of compounds, including acids, bases, and salts.

History, production, and properties of the more important and typical elements and their most familiar compounds. The character of chemical changes, including combustion, thermal dissociation, and electrolysis the conditions which determine and influence them, and the attendant phenomena.

The whole of the above to be treated in an elementary manner. Candidates will be required to show that they have seen and practised a great variety of experiments, and are familiar with the appearance of common laboratory materials.

II.-Practical Examination.

(Candidates will be allowed to bring into the examination laboratory any one book on quantitative analysis, provided it do not

ratory any one book on quantitative analysis, provided it do not contain any reference to qualitative analysis.) Candidates will be required to show that they are familiar with easy quantitative operations, gravimetric and volumetric, with the rudiments of qualitative analysis, and that they have prepared a number of elements or compounds by processes involving the manipulation of gases and the purification of substances by crystallization, distillation, &c. Candidates are required to

bring to the Practical Examination their original laboratory notebooks for inspection, should the Examiners so desire. These These notebooks must be taken away by the candidates at the close of the examination. Specimens made by the candidate, duly attested by the teacher, if any, may be submitted to the Examiners.

Botany (Two Papers and a Practical Examination).

Morphology.—The structure and properties of the cell and of the various kinds of tissues; cell formation and the develop-ment of the tissues. The plant body; its structure, development, and various modifications.

Special Morphology, Reproduction, and Taxonomy.

The morphological and physiological characteristics of Angiosperms, as exemplified by plants belonging to the following natural orders: —Dilleniaceæ, Malvaceæ, Portulacaceæ, Myr-taceæ, Leguminosæ, Cucurbitaceæ, Compositæ, Convolvulaceæ, Acanthaceæ, Scrophulariaceæ, Euphorbiaceæ, Palmaceæ or

Commelinaceæ, Scrophurariaceæ, Euphornaceæ, Faimaceæ or Commelinaceæ, Orchidaceæ, Gramineæ. The morphological and physiological characteristics of Gymnosperms, as exemplified by Cycas. The morphological and physiological characteristics of Pteri-dophyta, as exemplified by Selaginella, Aspidium, Aspelénium,

or Adiantum. The morphological and physiological characteristics of Bryophyta, as exemplified by Polytrichum (or Funaria) and by Marchantia (or Lunularia).

The morphological and physiological characteristics of Algæ, exemplified by Fucus, Ophiocytium, Coleochate, and ค่อ and Spirogyra.

(3) Drawings of Greek and Roman Orders done during the session to be submitted and marked.

Two Imperial size sheets of drawings will be required, giving examples—one on each sheet—of either the Doric, Ionic, or Corinthian Orders; one must be Greek, the other Roman. Each sheet must contain at least two columns of one order with entablature complete drawn to scale, the columns being not less than ten inches high on the paper,

together with details drawn to at least three times the scale of the columns. These drawings are to be sent to the University one week before the date of the examina-tion. Candidates who submit these drawings will be

required to sit for the paper in section (1) only, viz., Greek and Roman Architecture.

Candidates must take section (1) and either section (2) or (3).

History (Two Papers).

English History treated generally so as to include the growth of the British Empire, with a special study of a standard work to

be prescribed two years previously.* Due attention to be paid to changes in society, Government, and customs, and to the development of the material and intellectual life of the nation.

Candidates will be expected to have some acquaintance with

the chief events in the development of British political institutions since 1832.

The above will be treated with special reference to the Government of Colonies and Dependencies.

SUBJECTS FOR THE INTERMEDIATE EXAMINATION IN SCIENCE.

Candidates shall be examined for a pass in any four subjects selected by themselves out of the following seven subjects of examination, viz., (1) Pure Mathematics, (2) Applied Mathe-matics, (3) Experimental Physics, (4) Chemistry, (5) Botany, (6) Zoology, and (7) Geology (one at least of the four subjects selected from the foregoing list must be taken from amongst the first three).

SPECIAL REGULATIONS FOR THE UNIVERSITY SCHOLARSHIPS.

Two scholarships of the annual value of £250 tenable for three years, together with an outfit allowance of £50, second class passage money not exceeding Rs. 500 to proceed to the British Isles, and first class passage not exceeding £50 for return to Ceylon after completion of a course of study in the British Isles, will be awarded annually, one on the results of the Intermediate Examination in Arts of the University of London, and the other on the results of the Intermediate Examination in Science of the University of London, to the candidates recommended by the authorities of the University of London, provided they are physically fit.

Candidates who enter for or have passed the Intermediate Examination in Engineering as External Students may in order to obtain exemption from the whole of the Intermediate Examination in Science, complete that examination by taking an additional subject at the Intermediate Examination in Engineer-ing. Such additional subject may be taken either at an entry for the Inter-mediate Examination in Engineering or at any Intermediate Examination in Engineering subsequent to that at which the candidate has passed ; and a fee of Rs. 50 will be payable in respect of each entry in such additional subject.

Candidates who enter for or have passed the Intermediate Examination in Engineering will be allowed to complete the Intermediate Examination in Science as above, and also, should they so desire, to enter for the B.Sc. Exami-nation in the same year in which they do so complete, provided that they have passed the Intermediate Examination in Engineering not less than one year previously.

Candidates who have passed the Intermediate Examination in Agriculture may claim exemption at the Intermediate Examination in Science from subjects which could have been taken at the Intermediate Examination in Science.

No candidate will be eligible for one of these Scholarships who has not been resident in the Island for the five years next before the examination, or who has completed his twentieth year before the first day of the month fixed for the examination, or who has not been registered as a matriculated student of the University of London.

A scholar will be permitted to postpone his return for three years after the expiration of the Scholarship without special permission to do so, and with permission of His Excellency the Governor or the Right Hon. the Secretary of State for the Colonies to remain in Europe for a further period not exceeding four years, on the distinct understanding that such period not exceeding four years, only to enable the scholar to pursue a course of study or to acquire professional qualifications likely to be of benefit to the Colony on his eventual return.

The duration of the Government University Scholarship may be extended to four years in cases where a Scholarshipholder engages in a course of study which lasts more than three years, provided that he has shown marked promise and ability during the first three years that he has held the Scholarship.

The return passage of University scholars will not be paid by the Government unless they have notified the Crown Agents that they are returning to Ceylon in order to enter the Public Service, to practise a profession, or in some other way to confer on the community the benefit of their training.

Note .--- The medical attendance of University scholars will be

Note.—The medical attendance of University scholars will be paid by Government in cases recommended by the Secretary of State; but the total sum which will be paid for any one scholar on this account is limited to £50, and if the student is placed in a nursing institution, not more than three guineas a week will be paid by Government towards the charges of the institution. The parent or guardian of every University scholar will be required to execute a bond for an amount of not less than Rs. 1,000, to be utilized to meet medical expenses in excess of £50 which are considered to be necessary by the Secretary of State. The Secretary of State may at any time order the return to Cavlon of any University scholar on the return

to Ceylon of any University scholar on the recommendation of the medical advisers to the Colonial Office. No candidate will be eligible for the Scholarship awarded on the Intermediate Arts Examination who does not take up the two subjects, Latin and Greek.

Candidates for the University Scholarship in Arts will be allowed to take, in addition to their other papers, either two higher Classical papers, or two higher Mathematical papers. The aggregate maximum of marks allowed for these papers will be the same in each case as the maximum allowed for each of the sections of the Intermediate Examination in Arts. But a candidate's marks for any of these higher papers will only be counted if he obtain at least one-third of the maximum of marks assigned to it.

Candidates for the University Scholarship in Science will be allowed to take, in addition to their other papers, the paper on Analytical Geometry, which is set as a higher paper for the candidates in Arts, under similar conditions with regard to marking. The marks assigned to this paper in the Science marking. The marks assigned to this paper in the science Examination will bear the same proportion to the aggregate maximum of marks as in the Arts Examination.

Candidates for the University Scholarship in Science will, in addition to the papers prescribed for the Intermediate Examina-tion in Science, be required to take English Literature and Essay, which form the last section of the Intermediate Examination in Arts.

APPENDIX.

"A sewing machine (motor driven)."

Abstract:

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The invention consists in adapting the goose neck frame and the treadle and hand-driving mechanism of a sewing machine so that a motor, preferably an electric motor, can be added to drive the machine interchangeably with the treadle or hand-driving gear, and so that the machine may be driven by hand, by foot treadle, or by motor without making any structural change or any change in the mechanism beyond throwing out of gear any pair of the other provided modes of driving.

The motor is simply pushed into a recess provided in the goose neck frame, its driving shaft thereby being made to engage with the same driving shaft as is driven by the treadle or hand gear.

The claims are :—

1. In a sewing machine, a frame formed with an aperture, stitch-forming mechanism comprising a reciprocatory needle and complemental loop-taking means incorporated in said frame, operating mechanism interconnecting said needle and loop-taking means, a motor unit comprising a stator detachably supported by said frame, and a rotor journalled in said stator, and including a power shaft entering said aperture and operatively connected with said operating mechanism.

2. In a sewing machine, a frame having an opening therein, stitch-forming mechanism sustained by said frame, means for actuating said mechanism, and a readily removable actuating unit constructed separately from said frame and entering said opening, said unit having a driving connection operatively connectible with the stitch-forming mechanism by insertion in said opening.

3. In a sewing machine, a frame, stitch-forming devices, and operating mechanism therefor, including a shaft, a motor, including a stator detachably sustained as a unit by said frame and a rotor having a power shaft disposed transversely of said first-named shaft, and an operative connection between said shafts.

4. A motor driven sewing machine having a frame formed with a recessed goose neck, sewing mechanism incorporated in said frame, a driving motor received at least partially within the recess of said goose neck and detachable therefrom as a unit, and a driving connection between said motor and sewing mechanism.

5. A sewing machine adapted to be driven electrically and equipped with stitch-forming devices and with operating mechanism therefor, including a shaft, on which is mounted a spiral gear adjacent to an opening in the machine frame and engageable by a spiral gear fixed to the power shaft of an electric motor on insertion of the latter in said opening.

6. A sewing machine the frame of which includes a portion formed with an opening adapted for reception of a readily removable motor unit to operate the stitch-forming mechanism and adapted to be closed by a cover plate when the motor unit is removed from the machine, the machine being equipped with additional means for operating the stitch-forming mechanism independently of its operation by the motor.

7. In a sewing machine, stitch-forming mechanism, a detachable motor, automatically disconnectible means for connecting the stitch-forming mechanism and motor, and means for manually disconnecting the stitch-forming mechanism from the motor.

8. In a sewing machine, a plurality of main-shaft sections, stitch-forming means actuated by one of said sections, a plurality of independently disconnectible actuating means connected to another of said sections, and means for connecting and disconnecting said sections at will.

9. In a sowing machine, stitch-forming mechanism, an actuating shaft therefor, a plurality of driving devices, including a motor and a belt pulley, and means for transmitting power to said shaft from either of said devices, including a driving element common to both.

In a sewing machine, a reciprocatory needle and complemental loop-taking means, interconnecting mechanism for actuating the needle and loop-taking means in properly timed relation to one another, a belt wheel mounted for rotation independently of said mechanism, an electric motor for driving said belt wheel, means for establishing and interrupting driving relation between said belt wheel and mechanism, and a one-way acting clutch between said motor and belt wheel.
 In a sewing machine, a main shaft, a plurality of driving devices comprising a motor drive, a belt drive, and

a hand drive independent of each other, and means for actuating said shaft from any one of said devices. 12. In combination, a sewing machine frame, stitch-forming devices, and operating means therefor, including

a rotary shaft extending lengthwise of said machine frame, and a motor mounted upon said machine frame and comprisin a frame constructed with aligned shaft bearings extending crosswise of said machine frame and having an intermediate open-topped gear cavity and an oil pocket extending from the same lengthwise of one of said bearings to catch lubricant overflowing from said cavity when said machine frame is canted laterally, and a power shaft journalled in said bearings and carrying a gear entering said cavity, and operatively connected with said rotary shaft.

13. In a sewing machine, in combination, stitch-forming mechanism, operating means therefor, including a rotary shaft formed in separate driving and driven sections the adjacent ends of which are formed with slots, said driving section being tubular, an operative connection between the driven section and the stitch-forming mechanism, driving means connected with the driving section, a coupling rod passing through the bore of the driving section and formed with a slot at the end adjacent to the driven section, and a key plate secured in the slot in said coupling rod and entering the slots in the driving and driven sections.

14. In a sewing machine, in combination, a frame formed with a hollow member having an aperture, stitch-forming mechanism, and operating means therefor, including a shaft extending within the hollow frame member, a gear mounted on said shaft adjacent to said aperture, said gear having a one-way clutch connection with said shaft, and a closure for said aperture.

"A sewing machine (frame construction)."

Abstract :--

It is said that in the usual flat bed type of sewing machine the loop taker and feeding mechanisms project downwardly from the open underside of the bed plate, and so that oil can drip from, and dust collect on, those working parts. Access is obtained to those parts by tilting the machine.

The object of this invention is to provide a casing for those working parts of the machine so that they are enclosed and kept dust free and so that oil cannot escape.

The object is attained by casting a trough-shaped base along with the goose neck arm carrying the rest of the mechanism. That trough-shaped base is open only on the top side, and that is closed when the machine is working by a sliding plate. When the sliding plate is removed, access is obtained to the working parts below the surface of the table from the top, and the usual tilting of the machine for that purpose is unnecessary.

1. A sewing machine frame comprising an open-topped trough-shaped supporting bed, a standard fixed directly to and carried by one end portion of said bed, and a bracket arm carried by said standard and overhanging said bed.

2. A sowing machine frame comprising a trough-shaped supporting bed, a standard fixed directly to and carried by one end portion of said bed, a bracket arm carried by said standard and overhanging said bed, and a detachable cleth plate serving to close substantially the entire upper side of said bed.

3. A sewing machine frame substantially as claimed in claims 1 and 2, characterized in that the bed is formed with outwardly extending projections disposed above its bottom and affording supports, and that the cloth plate is formed with marginal portions extending beyond and adapted to conceal said projections.

4. A sewing machine frame substantially as claimed in claims 1 and 2, characterized in that the cloth plate has a bent over peripheral portion, and is cut away at one end to fit about the base of the standard.

5. A sewing machine frame comprising an open-topped trough-shaped supporting bed, standard, and bracket arm, all cast in one piece, and a cover plate wider than said bed and serving to close the open upper side of the latter.

6. A sewing machine comprising a frame formed with a trough shaped supporting bed, a standard carried by one end of said bed, a bracket arm carried by said standard, and stitch-forming and work-feeding mechanisms incorporated in said frame, and including moving elements supported directly by and within said trough-shaped bed.

7. A sewing machine substantially as claimed in claim 6, characterized in that the bed is formed with inwardly projecting bearing lugs, in which are journalled moving parts of the stitch-forming and feeding mechanisms, one of said lugs being formed with oil holes for reception of oil-delivery tubes.

8. A sewing machine comprising a frame, formed with a trough-shaped supporting bed, stitch-forming and workfeeding mechanisms incorporated in said frame and including moving parts housed within said bed, and a removable oiling device supported within said bed, said oiling device, including an oil reservoir and delivery tubes carried thereby, said delivery tubes being adapted to conduct oil to various of the moving parts requiring lubrication.

"Machine for drying liquids."

Abstract :---

This invention relates to a liquid drying machine of the kind in which the liquid, such as milk, is dried on the surface of a rotating body, the interior of which is heated by means of steam, hot air, or by similar means.

In accordance with the invention, the drying takes place on the plane upper surface of a hollow annular body rotating on a vertical axle, and the upper side of which is encased in an annular hood, which, together with the plane drying surface, forms a closed channel through which warm dry air is drawn. The liquid to be dried is fed on to the surface in the usual manner by means of a stationary hopper, the open lower end of which is adjusted at such distance from the surface that a suitable layer of liquid is transferred to the said surface as it passes under the hopper. Immediately in front of the hopper a stationary scraper for removing the dried product is placed.

The claims are :-

A machine for drying liquids in which the drying is effected in an annular closed channel, the bottom of which is formed by the top of a rotating annular hollow body, which is heated internally by means of some suitable heating medium.

A machine as specified in claim 1, in which the heated annular hollow body is entirely encased in a closed vessel, 2. the upper part of which forms the stationary part of the channel in which the liquid is dried.

A machine as specified in claim 1, in which the drying channel is opened at a certain point to give place for 3. a device for feeding the liquid to be dried and for a scraper for removing the dried product.

4. A machine as specified in claims 1, 2, and 3, in which one end of the drying channel (the end at which the liquid to be dried enters) is connected with a ventilator or suction pump, while the other end of the channel is connected with the interior of the vessel, which encases the heated hollow body so that the warm air from this body is sucked through the channel against the direction of rotation.

A machine as specified in claim 1, in which the hopper, through which the liquid to be dried is fed on to the 5 drying surface, is so arranged as to act as a vacuum evaporator furnished with a suitable stirring device. One sheet of drawings.

MUNICIPALITY OF KANDY.

Minutes of Proceedings of a Meeting of the Municipal Council of Kandy, held in the Town Hall, Kandy, on March 15, 1919, at 8.30 o'clock a.m., in accordance with notice dated March 11, 1919.

Present :---Mr. W. L. Kindersley, Chairman ; Mr. E. Beven ; Mr. C. Á. LaBrooy ; Dr. Allan de Saram ; Mr. H. F. Tomalin ; Mr. J. C. Ratwatte ; Mr. L. H. S. Pieris ; Dr. J. W. S. Attygalle ; and Mr. F. L. Goonewardena.

1. The Minutes of Proceedings of the Meeting held on February 15, having been previously submitted to the Chairman for his approval and a copy thereof furnished to each Member, were taken as read and confirmed by the Chairman. 2. The following documents were submitted :-

- (a) Statement of receipts and disbursements from close of 1918 to February 28, 1919, on account of the Municipal fund.
- (b) Progress resport of works brought up to the same date.
- (c) Health Officer's report for February.
- (d) Statement of cases instituted by the several Inspectors and of work done by the Municipal Magistrate during the month of February.

(e) The reservoir readings for February.

Resolved that the statement (a), together with the Minutes of Proceedings of this Meeting, as required by section 83 of the Municipal Councils Ordinance, No. 6 of 1910, be forwarded to the Colonial Secretary for publication in the Government Gazette.

3. The following papers were laid on the table :---Reports by the several Inspectors on laundries, bakeries, dairies,

standpipes, and house service taps inspected during February. 4. Correspondence :---(1) Letter No. 6 of February 15, 1919, from the Hon. the Colonial Secretary intimating that a copy of the resolution passed by the Municipal Council of Kandy on the occasion of the conclusion of an armistice with Germany was duly submitted to His Majesty the King, who has commanded that an expression of his appreciation of the loyal message of congratulation be conveyed to the Council.-Read.

(2) Letter No. 7 of February 7, 1919, from the Hon. the Colonial Secretary re employment for men discharged from the Ceylon Sanitary Company .- Read.

(3) Letter No. 42 of March 4, 1919, from the Hon. the Government Agent, Central Province, requesting that an Unofficial Member be nominated by the Council as a representative of the Excise Advisory Committee for the Kandy Municipal area in place of Mr. E. L. Wijegoonewardene, deceased.

Dr. Attygalle proposed that Mr. C. A. LaBrooy be nominated. Mr. Beven seconded. -- Carried.

(4) Letter of February 14, 1919, from the Honorary Secretary, Kandy Club, re Ward street improvements.— Resolved that the Honarary Secretary be informed that the Council agrees to paragraphs 1 and 2 of his letter, and that as regards paragraph 3 of his letter, though this Council has no objection to the Club building on the strip of land referred to, on the terms mentioned with a proviso that the lease may be terminated at six months' notice, this Council is precluded by the terms of the Government letter vesting the land in the Council from allowing any building.

(5) Letter of March 11, 1919, from the Sanitary Superintendent asking for sanction for the following excesses on -(a) Street scavenging, Rs. 62.22; (b) opening and refilling pits, Rs. 292.65; (c) destruction of rats and snails, votes :-Rs. 559.36.-Resolved that the excesses be sanctioned.

(6) Letter of March 13 from Mr. A. Vallipuram re drain behind premises Nos. 226 to 230, Trincomalee street. The letter was presented by Dr. Attygalle, and it was agreed to refer the matter to the Works Committee.
5. Pursuant to notice Dr. Attygalle asked—(1) Whether the fish on their receipt in Kandy are examined and passed by the Medical Officer of Health or any other responsible officer of the Sanitary Department as fit for consumption ? (2) (a) Whether the fish when hawked about are at all examined by any responsible officer?

(b) Whether there were any prosecution for sale of putrid fish by the Municipal authorities, and, if so, how many during 1917 and 1918 ?

A 4

The Chairman replied as follows :----

(1) Yes-by the Inspector on duty and the Market-keeper.

(2) (a) Yes—by the Inspectors; (b) No prosecutions.
6. The following question which was in the name of Dr. Attygalle was, with the leave of the Council, withdrawn by

Sanitary Officers who were said to be 'rude and nasty ' to the relief workers, and table papers.

Recommendations of Standing Committees :-

Law and General Subjects.

(1) That a motor be affixed to the water service pipe to premises No. 28, Castle Hill street.

Finance and Assessment.

(2) That a vote of Rs. 500 be obtained for a typewriter.
(3) That a second assistant Sinhalese teacher be appointed on a salary of Rs. 15 per mensem.

(4) That the assessment rate paid in respect of premises 28, Brownrigg street, be refunded from January, 1918, in view of the premises having been used as a school from that month.

(5) That the Assistant Supervisor of Conservancy be given a bicycle allowance of Rs. 5 per mensem. (6) That sanction for excesses on votes for 1918, applied for by the Accountant in his letter of January 16, 1919,

be-allowed. (7) That a fee of Rs. 10 be fixed for cremation in the General Cemetery at Mahaiyawa.

Municipal Works.

(8) That the estimate of Rs. 600 for converting the land lying to the south-east of the Military Hospital building into a recreation ground be sanctioned.

(9) That water service pipes be allowed on usual terms to No. 69, Peradeniya road, Messrs. M. Ismail & Co.

Resolved that the recommendations be adopted, except in regard to (2) which has to be deferred for six months;

and (4) which was to be amended by the substitution of 1917 for 1918.
