WHEREAS certain by-laws were made by the District School Committee of Hambantota, in pursuance of section 19 of "The Rural Schools Ordinance, 1907," and having been duly confirmed under section 20 (2) of the said Ordinance, were published in the *Government Gazette* dated February 7, 1913, by Proclamation dated January 30, 1913; and whereas the said District School Committee has, in view of section 3 of "The Rural Schools (Amendment) Ordinance, No. 34 of 1917," amended in manner hereinafter appearing by-law No. 2 of Schedule I. of the said by-laws:

Now know Ye that We, the said Governor, in exercise of the powers vested in Us by sub-section (2) of section 20 of the said Ordinance, and with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby confirm the amendment of the said by-law as set forth in the schedule hereto.

Given at Colombo, in the said Island of Ceylon, this Fourth day of June, in the year of our Lord One thousand Nine hundred and Nineteen.

SCHEDULE.

2. Children to attend School.—The parent of every child of not less than six nor more than fourteen years of age, or in the case of girls between the ages of six years and twelve years old, or in the case of Muhammadan and Tamil girls of not less than six nor more than ten years of age, shall cause such child to attend one of the schools specified in the

Schedule II. hereto, unless he has made other adequate and suitable provision for the education of such child, or unless there is a reasonable excuse for non-attendance. Provided that no girl shall be required to attend school from a distance exceeding two miles, or at a school at which a female teacher is not employed.

(6) Sleepers and scantlings should be rectangular in form, and sawn perfectly parallel, on all sides. On no account will squaring of logs, sleepers, or scantlings with an adze or axe be allowed.

(7) Sleepers and scantlings should be covered with sawdust or immersed in water, and be invariably placed under shade immediately they are sawn, until they can be transported to delivery depôts, where they should be stacked and kept under shade in the manner to be pointed out by the Forest Ranger.

DESCRIPTION OF WORK, &C., ON SERVICES A AND B.

Firewood.

(a) Trees must be cut 6 in. from the ground.

(b) The firewood shall be in lengths of 3 ft. and not less than 2 in in diameter. Billets over 9 in in diameter shall. be spilt. Wood over 12 in. in girth to be billeted in 3 ft. lengths by hand saw or cross-cut saw only.

•(c) Stacks must be in rows convenient for loading the firewood into Railway trucks. To economize ground space and to allow of space between the stacks for inspection, stacks shall be either 3 ft. or 41 or 6 ft. in height as the Forest Officer in charge may from time to time direct.

(d) Any tree pointed by a Forest Officer as not to be felled shall not be felled or injured.

(e) The contractor will be responsible for the safety of firewood stacked on the Railway line.

(f) The contractor may be required at times to increase supplies should the Railway requirements necessitate, and at times also to decrease supplies, but the average output will be as described in the schedule.

(g) It must be clearly understood that for failure to have full weekly supplies ready as required a penalty of Rs. 10, plus 25 cents for every yard short will be levied.

- Sleepers, Scanlings, and Logs, &c.

(a) All trees must be felled with saw or axe and saw combined, 6 in. from the ground, and are to be logged by the saw into logs of the longest available lengths, and both ends squared by the saw with the least amount of wastage. Satinwood logs should be barked.

(e) Sleepers and scantlings should be perfectly rectangular in form, and sawn perfectly parallel on all sides. On no account will squaring of logs, sleepers, or scantlings with an adze or axe be allowed.

(f) Sleepers and scantlings should be covered with saw dust or immersed in water, and be invariably placed under shade immediately they are sawn until they can be transported to delivery depôts, where they should be stacked and kept under shade in the manner to be pointed out by a Forest Ranger.

(g) No ebony trees of small size which are not likely to have any black heart wood, in the opinion of the Forest Officer and are not marked by a Forest Officer, are to be felled.

SCHEDULE.

Service A, near Irambaikulam.

(a) To fell every tree above 6 in. in girth (excepting halmilla, ranai, margosa, and other trees marked for the purpose) standing in a block of forest near Irambaikulam, which will be demarcated by 3 ft. lines, to a maximum depth of 14 miles, commencing from the boundary of a 5-chain reservation to the west of the Northern Railway on a frontage of not more than 20 chains along the railway line side. The work will be required to commence at the further end from the Railway line, the near reserved for supplies in the vet season.

(c) To supply all satinwood logs found to be flowered at the Vavuniya Railway Station from the same area.

(d) To supply cleaned ebony at Vavuniya Station from the same area.

(e) If required to supply the outside slabs resulting from the conversion of sleepers and scantlings at Vavuniya Station from that forest, and to weigh and deliver the same.

(f) Supplies of sleepers, scantlings, logs, and outside slabs to be completed by July 15, 1920. Distance of transport from the working area to the Vavuniya Railway Station is not exceeding 12 miles.

(g) All straight, sound palai, milla, and satinwood trees below 3 ft. 6 in. in girth and marked by a Forest Officer shall not be felled.

Servicé B, near Vavuniya.

(a) To clear fell all trees (excepting ebony or other species marked by a Forest Officer) standing in the block of the forest, 175 acres in extent more or less, situated in Tonigala reserve. Area selected is situated within $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles from the Northern Railway line.

To cut and split into firewood every tree so felled (excepting the enumerated trees) and every other fallen tree whatsoever in the area, so as to yield 12,000 cubic yards of firewood with the least amount of wastage. All firewood immediately after conversion to be delivered stacked along Northern Railway line at the minimum rate of 1,200 cubic yards of firewood per month. Final delivery to be made

on or before July 15, 1920, when the balance remaining. out of the total quantity should be delivered stacked. felling and splitting of logs should be completed by June 10, 1920.

To cut all thorns and undergrowth in the area, to heap the. same together with all wood refuse in the centre of the area separated from the reservation on either sides by properly cleared lines half a chain in breadth. This work to be completed by July 15, 1920.

To complete the burning of the refuse thus heaped by August 15, 1920. To root out and completely clear of green growth all patches not burnt over, and to leave the whole area in a state of complete fitness throughout for planting by August 15, 1920.

(b) To supply sleepers and scantlings from palai, milla, satinwood, and other suitable species at Vavuniya Railway Station from the same area.

(c) To supply all satinwood logs found to be flowered at Vavuniya Railway Station from the same area.

(d) To supply cleaned ebony at Vavuniya Station from the same area.

(e) If required to supply the outside slabs resulting from the conversion of sleepers and scantlings at Vavuniya Station from the same area, and weigh and deliver the same

(f) To supply all satinwood logs over 2 ft. in girth and below the sleeper size at Vavuniya Station from the same area.

VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended May 81, 1919.

Births.—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 78 (2 Europeans, 6 Burghers, 47 Sinhalese, 8 Tamils, 13 Moors, and 2 Malays). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on January 1, 1919, viz., 281,169) was 14.5, as against 20.0 in the preceding week, 18.4 in the corresponding week of last year, and 21.5 the weekly average for last year.

week of last year, and 21 b the weekly average for last year.
Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 211 (4 Burghers, 135 Sinhalese, 37 Tamils, 28 Moors, 3 Malays, and 4 Others). The death rate per 1,000 per annum was 39 1, as against 27 4 in the previous week, 18 6 in the corresponding week of last year, and 26 7 the weekly average for last year.
Infantile Deaths.—The 11 total deaths, 38 were of infants under one year of age, as against 31 in the preceding week, 30 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 30 the average for last year.

Stillbirths.-The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 2.-

Principal Causes of Death .- Fifty-two deaths from Pneumonia were registered, 29 in Maradana (including 13 deaths of non-residents in hospitals), 7 in Kotahena, 4 in St. Paul's, 3 in New Bazaar, 3 in Kollupitiya, 3 in Wellawatta, 2 in Slave Island, and 1 in Pettah, as against 29, 24, 31, and 19, respectively, for the four preceding weeks. The weekly average for last year was 27. Thirty deaths from *Influenza* were registered, 7 in St. Paul's, 5 in Kotahena, 5 in Mara-dana, 4 in New Bazaar, 3 in San Sebastian, 3 in Wellawatta, 2 in Slave Island, and 1 in Pettah, as against 22, 21, 8, and 12, respectively, for the four preceding weeks.

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Seventeen deaths from Phthisis were registered, 5 in Kotahena, 4 in Maradana, 3 in New Bazaar, 2 in Slave Island, 1 in St. Paul's, 1 in Kollupitiya, and 1 in Wellawatta. as against 9 in the preceding week and 13 the weekly average for last year.

Two deaths from Enteric Fever were registered, 1 in Kotahena and 1 in Slave Island, as against 3 in the 8. previous week and 4 the weekly average for last year. 4. Fifteen deaths were registered from Debility, 9 from Enteritis, 9 from Infantile Convulsions, 6 from Worms,

3 from Diarrhaea, 3 from Dysentery, and 65 from Other Causes.

Six cases of *Chickenpox* and 4 of *Measles* were reported during the week, as against 11 and 3, respectively, in 5. the preceding week. One case of Smallpox was reported, same as in the preceding week.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 82.4°, against 82.7° in the preceding week and 82.2° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29.867 in., against 29.885 in. in the preceding week and 29.885 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 4.07 in., against 1.06 in. in the preceding week and 0.01 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.

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
