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VITAL STATISTICS OF TOWNS IN CEYLON IN THE MONTH OF JULY, 1919.

REPORT OF THE REGISTRAR-GENERAL.

This report deals with the Vital Statistics of the 33 principal towns in the Island proclaimed under sections 31–36 of the Ordinance No. 1 of 1895.

Births.

2. The number of births registered was 977 (502 males and 475 females), and was equivalent to an annual rate of 17·71 per 1,000, against 22·03 in the preceding month, 25·19 in the corresponding month of last year, and 25·07 the average for the corresponding months since 1909. The rate ranged from 5·54 in Kalunai to 43·80 in Batticaloa.

3. In the city of Colombo the births registered numbered 329 (168 males and 161 females), and were equivalent to an annual rate* of 13·55 per 1,000, against 18·65 in the preceding month, 17·03 in the corresponding month of last year, and 20·19 the average for the corresponding months since 1909. The rate ranged from 6·50 in Kollupitiya to 15·89 in Kotahena.

Deaths.

4. The total deaths registered during the month numbered 2,062 (1,133 males and 929 females). There were 1,673 deaths of residents in towns, equivalent to an annual rate of 33·06 per 1,000, against 31·98 in the preceding month, 24·60 in the corresponding month of last year, and 29·28 the average for the month of July in each year since 1909. The rate ranged from 738·05 in Hambantota to 15·79 in Matara, the abnormal high rate in Hambantota being due to the Cholera epidemic (*vide* paragraph 11).

5. In the city of Colombo the deaths numbered 592 (321 males and 271 females). There were 524 deaths of residents, equivalent to an annual rate* of 25·04 per 1,000, against 31·26 in the preceding month, 24·69 in the corresponding month of last year, and 29·18 the average for the month of July in each year since 1909. The rate ranged from 30·12 in Wellawatta to 6·79 in Kollupitiya.

6. The stillbirths registered numbered 57 (31 males and 26 females), against 48 in the preceding month.

Infant Mortality.

7. The mortality of infants under one year of age was equal to a rate of 240 per 1,000 births registered during the twelve months ended July 31, 1919. Reckoned on the births registered during the month only the rate was 353, against 270 in the preceding month, 256 in the corresponding month of last year, and 269 the average for the corresponding months since 1909.

8. In the city of Colombo the mortality of infants was equal to a rate of 267 per 1,000 births registered during the twelve months ended July 31, 1919. Reckoned on the births registered during the month only the rate was 413, against 274 in the preceding month, 358 in the corresponding month of last year, and 334 the average for the corresponding months since 1909.

Causes of Death.

9. The highest mortality was attributed to *Pneumonia*, to which 15 per cent. of the total deaths was due, 9 per cent. was due to *Cholera*, 8 per cent. to *Debility*, 6 per cent. to *Influenza*, 5 per cent. each to *Convulsions*, *Diarrhoea*, *Anchylostomiasis*, *Enteritis*, and *Phthisis*, 4 per cent. to *Dysentery*, 3 per cent. each to *Malaria* and *Malarial Cachexia*, and *Bright's Disease* and *Nephritis*, 2 per cent. to *Enteric Fever*, and 1 per cent. to *Bronchitis*.

10. In the city of Colombo too the highest mortality was attributed to *Pneumonia*, to which 14 per cent. of the total deaths was due, 10 per cent. was due to *Phthisis*, 8 per cent. to *Debility*, 7 per cent. to *Enteritis*, 6 per cent. to *Influenza*, 5 per cent. to *Convulsions*, 4 per cent. each to *Enteric Fever* and *Dysentery*, 3 per cent. each to *Diarrhoea* and *Bright's Disease* and *Nephritis*, 2 per cent. to *Anchylostomiasis*, and 1 per cent. to *Bronchitis*. One death from *Smallpox* and 1 from *Measles* were registered in Colombo.

11. *Cholera*.—195 deaths were registered as due to *Cholera*, 171 of which occurred at Hambantota, 21 at Tangalla, 2 at Nuwara Eliya, and 1 at Matara. The first case was of a resident of Hambantota town on July 6, 1919. The origin of the epidemic has not yet been traced, but it is believed to be due to infection from some Indian pilgrims.

12. *Infectious Diseases reported*.—The infectious disease most prevalent during the month was *Cholera*, of which 321 cases were reported (295 in Hambantota, 21 in Tangalla, 2 in Nuwara Eliya, and 1 each in Galle, Matara, and Weligama), followed by *Phthisis* 112 (97 in Colombo, 5 in Galle), *Enteric Fever* 60 (45 in Colombo), *Chickenpox* 47 (35 in Colombo, 4 in Nuwara Eliya), *Measles* 28 (25 in Colombo), *Continued Fever* 23 (11 in Moratuwa, 8 in Colombo, 4 in Kandy), *Mumps* 23 (12 in Kandy and 11 in Colombo), *Dysentery* 8 (4 in Moratuwa, 3 in Kurunegala), *Acute Diarrhoea* 2 (1 in Colombo, 1 in Negombo), and *Smallpox* 2 (in Colombo).

Meteorology.

13. *Rainfall*.—Nawalapitiya recorded the highest rainfall (32·92 inches), followed by Hatton (26·64 inches). In the other towns the rainfall ranged from 18·85 inches in Ratnapura to 0·10 of an inch in Kalpitiya. Colombo recorded 4·26 inches.

14. *Temperature*.—The mean temperature varied from 60·5° in Nuwara Eliya to 85·2° in Trincomalee, and was 81·0° in Colombo.
