THE KING'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS His Majesty has power to make laws for the peace, order, and good government of the Colony of Ceylon (in this Order referred to as "the Colony"):

And whereas by virtue of the Coinage (Ceylon) Amendment Order in Council, 1901 (in this Order referred to as "the Order of 1901"), the sovereign is legal tender in the Colony :

And whereas it is expedient that the sovereign should no longer be legal tender in the Colony:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue of all powers vested in him in that behalf, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :---

The sovereign shall cease to be current or legal tender in the Colony.

(1) This Order may be cited as the Ceylon (Coinage) Order, 1920.

(2) This Order shall be deemed to have had effect as from the 7th day of August, 1920.

And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Right Hon. Viscount Milner, G.C.B., G.C.M.G. one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, are to give the requisite directions herein accordingly.

GEORGE THE FIFTH, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, King, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India, Sovereign of the Imperial Service Order, to all to whom these Presents shall come, Greeting !

WHEREAS by Warrants under His late Majesty's Royal Sign Manual, dated the Eighth day of August, in the year of our Lord One thousand Nine hundred and Two, and the Second year of His Reign, the Twenty-ninth day of November, in the year of our Lord One thousand Nine hundred and Six, and the Sixth year of His Reign, the Twenty-seventh day of May, One thousand Nine hundred and Eighth, and the Eight year of His Reign, and the Seventeenth day of June, One thousand Nine hundred and Nine, in the Ninth year of His Reign, His late Majesty, being desirous of recognizing more fully than had theretofore been possible the faithful and meritorious services rendered to Him by Members of the Civil Services of the various parts of His Empire, did, for Himself, His heirs and successors institute and create a new Civil Order of Distinction—to be designated the Imperial Service Order and a Medal—to be designated the Imperial Service Medal—and He was graciously pleased to make, ordain, and establish Statutes and Ordinances for the Government of the same, reserving to Himself, His heirs and successors, full power of annulling, altering, abrogating and augmenting, interpreting, and dispensing with those Statutes by a Notification under the Sign Manual of the Sovereign of the Order :

And whereas We are minded to make certain amendments and additions to the Statutes of the Order:

Now We do by these Presents for Us, Our heirs and successors, abrogate the sixteenth clause of the said Warrant of the Ninth day of March, One thousand Nine hundred and Twelve, and in lieu thereof, We ordain that the Imperial Service Medal for men and women respectively shall be a Circular Medal of Silver bearing Our Effigy on the obverse and on the reverse an appropriate design and the words "For Faithful Service," and on the rim of the Medal the name of the recipient, and it is ordained that the Imperial Service Medal shall be worn in a similar manner to that prescribed for the Imperial Service Order, and it is Our will and pleasure that this Special Statute shall be taken and received as part and parcel of the Statutes of the said Order.

# Order No. 72 made by the Food Controller under Regulation 1 of "The Defence of the Colony Regulations, 1919."

Order No. 53 made by the Food Controller, published in Government Gazette No. 7,089 of March 5, 1920, is hereby cancelled as from the date of commencement of this order.

2. From and after the date of commencement of this order, it is forbidden to remove or transport by any means paddy, rice, kurakkan, or Indian corn from the Eastern Province, or within the Eastern Province west of a line passing through the villages of Lahugala on the Pottuvil-Muppane road and Pullumalai on the Batticaloa-Badulla road along any road or path leading in the direction of the North-Central Province, the Central Province, or the Province of Uva, except on permits issued by the Government Agent, Eastern Province, or Assistant Government Agent, Trincomalee, according to the locality from which removal or transport is desired.

3. It is further prohibited without such permits as aforesaid to load such paddy, rice, kurakkan, or Indian corn into any steamer, schooner, cargo boat, dhony, or vessel of any kind upon the seashore of the Eastern Province, or upon the sea within three miles of that shore, or to convey such paddy, rice, kurakkan, or Indian corn upon such sea in any such steamer, schooner, cargo boat, dhony, or vessel of any kind in any direction whatever.

## VITAL STATISTICS.

#### Registrar-General's Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended September 4, 1920.

Births.—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 136 (2 Europeans, 15 Burghers, 72 Sinhalese, 17 Tamils, 17 Moors, 10 Malays, and 3 Others). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on July 1, 1920, viz., 295,292) was 24.1, as against 22.5 in the preceding week, 14.6 in the corresponding week of last year, and 21.0 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 148 (1 European, 9 Burghers, 77 Sinhalese, 30 Tamils, 19 Moors, 5 Malays, and 7 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was  $26 \cdot 2$ , as against  $29 \cdot 4$  in the previous week,  $30 \cdot 7$  in the corresponding week of last year, and  $27 \cdot 7$  the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 148 total deaths, 33 were of infants under one year of age, as against 40 in the preceding week, 25 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 31 the average for last year.

Stillbirths.-The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 11.

1. Principal Causes of Death.—(a) Seventeen deaths from Pneumonia were registered, 9 in Maradana (including 3 deaths of non-residents in hospitals), 3 in Slave Island, 2 in Wellawatta, and 1 each in Pettah, Kotahena, and New Bazaar, as against 23 in the previous week, and 21 the weekly average for last year.

(b) Three deaths from *Influenza* were registered, 1 each in San Sebastian, Slave Island, and Kollupitiya, as against 8 in the previous week, and 11 the weekly average for last year.

(c) Three deaths from Bronchitis were registered, I each in St. Paul's, Maradana, and Kollupitiya.

2. Fourteen deaths from *Phthisis* were registered, 6 in Maradana (including 3 deaths of non-residents in hospitals), 2 each in Pettah and Slave Island, and 1 each in San Sebastian, St. Paul's, New Bazaar, and Wellawatta, as against 15 in the previous week, and 14 the weekly average for last year.

(b) Three deaths of residents of Colombo town occurred at the Ragama hospital from Phthisis during the week.

3. Five deaths from *Enteric Fever* were registered, 2 in Slave Island and 1 each in San Sebastian, New Bazaar, and Maradana, as against 8 in the previous week, and 5 the weekly average for last year.

4. One death from *Plague* was registered in San Sebastian, same as in the preceding week, and against 2 the weekly average for last year.

5. Fifteen deaths were registered from *Enteritis*, 11 each from *Infantile Convulsions* and *Debility*, 7 from *Dysentery* 6 from *Diarrhea*, 1 from *Worms*, and 54 from *Other Causes*.

6. Six cases of *Measles*, 5 of *Chickenpox*, and 5 of *Plague* were reported during the week, as against 5, 5, and 3, respectively, during the previous week. There were also reported 8 cases of *Smallpox*.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was  $80.9^{\circ}$ , against  $81.3^{\circ}$  in the preceding week and  $80.8^{\circ}$  in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29.958 in., against 29.948 in. in the preceding week and 29.899 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 0.30 in., against 0.24 in. in the preceding week and 0.66 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.

- (2) To hold, use, clear, open, plant, cultivate, work, manage, improve, carry on, and develop the undertaking, lands, and real and personal, immovable and movable estate or property and assets of any kind of the Company, or any part thereof.
- (3) To plant, grow, and produce rubber, tea, coconuts, coffee, cinchona, cacao, cardamoms, rhea, ramie, and other natural products or produce of any kind in the Island of Ceylon, the Federated Malay States, India, or elsewhere.
- (4) To treat, cure, prepare, manipulate, submit to any process of manufacture, and render marketable (whether on account of the Company or others) rubber, tea, coconuts, coffee, or any other such products or produce as aforesaid, or any articles or things whatsoever; to buy, sell, export, import, trade and deal in rubber, tea, coconut produce, coconuts, coffee, and other products, wares, merchandise, articles and things of any kind whatsoever, either in a prepared, manufactured, or raw state, and either by wholesale or retail.
- (5) To carry on in the Island of Ceylon, the Federated Malay States, India, or elsewhere, all or any of the following businesses, that is to say : planters of rubber, tea, coconuts, coffee or any other such products or produce as aforesaid, in all its branches; carriers of passengers and goods by land or by water; forwarding agents, merchants, exporters, importers, traders, engineers, tug owners, and wharfingers ; proprietors of docks, wharves, jetties, piers, warehouses, and boats; and any other business which can or may conveniently be carried on in connection with any of them.
- (6) To acquire or establish and carry on any other business, manufacturing, shipping, or otherwise, which can be conveniently carried on in connection with any of the Company's general business; to apply for, purchase. or otherwise acquire, any patents, brevets d'invention, concessions and the like conferring an exclusive or non-exclusive or limited right to use, or any information as to any invention which may seem capable of being used for any of the purposes of the Company, or the acquisition of which may seem calculated directly or indirectly to benefit the Company; and to use, exercise, develop, grant licenses in respect of or otherwise turn to account the property, rights, and information so acquired.
- (7) To purchase rubber, tea leaf, coconuts, coffee, and (or) other raw products or produce for manufactures, manipulation, and (or) sale.
- (8) To work mines or quarries, and to find, win, get, work, crush, smelt, manufacture, or otherwise deal with ores, metals, minerals, oils, precious and other stones, deposits or products, and generally to carry on the business of mining in all its branches.
- (9) To purchase, take in exchange, hire, or otherwise acquire and hold boats, barges, tugs, launches, and vessels of any description whatsoever; to purchase, take in exchange, hire, or otherwise acquire and hold vans, omnibuses, carriages, carts, and other vehicles of any description whatsoever ; and to purchase, take in exchange, hire, or otherwise acquire and hold all live and dead stock, chattels, and effects required for the maintenance and working of the business of carriers by land or by water ; of proprietors of docks, wharves, jetties, piers, warehouses, and boats ; of tug owners and wharfingers or of any other business which can or may conveniently be carried on in connection with the above respectively.
- (10) To build, make, construct, equip, maintain, improve, alter, and work rubber and tea factories, coconut and coffee curing mills, manufactories, buildings, erections, roads, water-courses, docks, wharves, jetties, and other works, and conveniences which may be necessary or convenient for the purpose of the Company, or may seem calculated directly or indirectly to advance the Company's interests; and to contribute to, subsidize, or otherwise assist or take part in the construction, improvement, maintenance, working, management, carrying out, or control thereof.
- (11) To cultivate, manage, and superintend estates and properties in the Island of Ceylon, the Federated Malay States, India, and elsewhere, and generally to undertake the business of estate agents in the Island of Ceylon, the Federated Malay States, India, and elsewhere; to act as agents for the investment, loan, payment, transmission, and collection of money, and for the purchase, sale, improvement, development, and management of property, including concerns and undertakings ; and to transact any other agency business of any kind.
- (12) To engage, employ, maintain, and dismiss managers, superintendents, assistants, clerks, coolies, and other servants and labourers; and to remunerate any such at such rate as shall be thought fit, and to grant pensions or gratuities to any such or the widow or children of any such.
- (13) To enter into any arrangements with any authorities, Government, Municipal, local, or otherwise that may seem conducive to the Company's objects or any of them, and to obtain from any such authority any rights, privileges, rebates, and concessions which the Company may think it desirable to obtain, and to carry out, exercise, and comply with such arrangements, rights, privileges, and concessions.
- (14) To enter into partnership or into any arrangement for sharing profits, union of interest, reciprocal concession, amalgamation or co-operation with any person, corporation, or company carrying on or about to carry on or engage in any business or transaction which this Company is authorized to carry on or engage in, or any business or transaction capable of being conducted so as directly or indirectly to benefit this Company ; to take or otherwise acquire and hold shares or stock in or securities of and to subsidize or otherwise assist any such company, and to sell, hold, re-issue with or without guarantee, or otherwise deal with such shares or securities; and to form, constitute, or promote any other company or companies for the purpose of acquiring all or any of the property, rights, and liabilities of this Company, or for any other purpose which may seem directly or indirectly calculated to benefit this Company.
- (15) To procure the Company to be registered or established or authorized to do business in the Island of Ceylon, the Federated Malay States, India, or elsewhere.
- To lend money on any terms and in any manner and on any security, and in particular on the security of (16)plantations, factories, growing crops, produce, bills of exchange, promissory notes, bonds, bills of lading, warrants, stocks, shares, debentures or book debts, or without any security at all, and generally to transact financial business of any kind.

- (17) To borrow or raise money for the purposes of the Company or receive money on deposit at interest or otherwise, and for the purpose of raising or securing money for the performance or discharge of any obligation or liability of the Company or for any other purpose to create, execute, grant, or issue any mortgages, mortgage debentures, debentures, debenture stock, bonds, or obligations of the Company either at par, premium, or discount, and either redeemable, irredeemable, or perpetual, secured upon all or any part of the undertaking, revenue, rights, and property of the Company, present and future, including uncalled capital or the unpaid calls of the Company.
- (18) Generally to purchase, take on lease or in exchange, hire, or otherwise acquire any real or personal property, and any rights, privileges, licenses, or easements which the Company may think necessary or convenient with reference to any of these objects and capable of being profitably dealt with in connection with any of the Company's property or rights for the time being.
- (19) To cause or permit any debentures, debenture stock, bonds, mortgages, charges, incumbrances, liens, or securities of or belonging to or made or issued by the Company or affecting its property or rights or any of the terms thereof to be renewed, extended, varied, redeemed, exchanged, transferred, or satisfied, as shall be thought fit; also to pay off and re-borrow the moneys secured thereby or any part or parts thereof.
- (20) To sell the undertaking of the Company or any part thereof for such consideration as the Company may think fit, and in particular for shares, debentures, or securities of any other company having objects altogether or in part similar to those of this Company.
- (21) To invest and deal with the moneys of the Company not immediately required upon such securities and in such manner as may from time to time be determined.
- (22) To make, accept, endorse, and execute promissory notes, bills of exchange, bills of lading, and other negotiable and transferable instruments.
- (23) To remunerate any parties for services rendered or to be rendered in placing or assisting to place any shares in the Company's capital, or any debentures, debenture stock, or other securities of the Company, or in or about the formation or promotion of the Company or the conduct of its business.
- (24) To do all or any of the above things in any part of the world as principals, agents, contractors, or otherwise, or alone or in conjunction with others, or by or through agents, sub-contractors, trustees, or otherwise, and generally to carry on any business or effectuate any object of the Company.
- (25) To sell, let, lease, underlease, exchange, surrender, transfer, deliver, charge, mortgage, dispose of, turn to account, or otherwise deal with all or any part of the property and rights of the Company, whether in consideration of rents, moneys, or securities for money, shares, debentures, or securities in any other company, or for any other consideration.
- (26) To pay for any lands and real or personal, immovable or movable, estate, property or assets of any kind acquired or to be acquired by the Company, or for any services rendered or to be rendered to the Company, and generally to pay or discharge any consideration to be paid or given by the Company in money or in shares (whether fully paid up or partly paid up), or in debentures, debenture stock or obligations of the Company, or partly in one way and partly in another, or otherwise howsoever, with power to issue any shares either as fully paid up or partly paid up for such purpose.
- (27) To accept as consideration for the sale or disposal of any lands and real or personal, immovable and movable, estate, property or assets of the Company or in discharge of any other consideration to be received by the Company, money or shares (whether fully paid up or partly paid up) of any company, or debentures or debenture stock, or obligations of any company or person or partly one and partly any other.
- (28) To distribute among the shareholders in specie any property of the Company, whether by way of dividend or upon a return of capital, but so that no distribution amounting to a reduction of capital be made, except with the sanction for the time being required by law.
- (29) To do all such other things as may be necessary, incidental, conducive, or convenient to the attainment of the above objects or any of them.

It being hereby declared that in the foregoing clauses (unless a contrary intention appears) the word "person" includes any number of persons, and a corporation, and that the other "objects" specified in any one paragraph are not to be limited or restricted by reference to or inference from any other paragraph.

4. The liability of the Shareholders is limited.

5. The nominal capital of the Company is Two million Rupees (Rs. 2,000,000), divided into Two hundred thousand (200,000) shares of Ten rupees (Rs. 10) each, with power to increase or reduce the capital. The shares forming the capital (original, increased, or reduced) of the Company may be subdivided, consolidated or divided into such classes, with any preferential, deferred, qualified, special, or other rights, privileges, or conditions attached thereto and be held upon such terms as may be prescribed by the Articles of Association and regulations of the Company for the time being or otherwise.

#### ARTICLES OF ASSOCIATION OF THE "L. L. P." ESTATES, LIMITED.

IT is agreed as follows :-

1. Table C not to apply, Company to be governed by these Articles.—The regulations contained in Table C in the schedule annexed to "The Joint Stock Companies Ordinance, 1861," shall not apply to this Company, which shall be governed by the regulations contained in these Articles, but subject to repeal, addition, or alteration by special resolution. Power to alter the regulations .- The Company may, by special resolution, alter and make provisions instead of,

or in addition to, any of the regulations of the Company, whether contained and comprised in these Articles or not. 3. None of the funds of the Company shall be employed in the purchase of or be lent on shares of the Company.

#### INTERPRETATION.

4. Interpretation Clause.—In the interpretation of these presents the following words and expressions shall have he following meanings, unless such meanings be inconsistent with, or repugnant to, the subject or context :—

Company .-- The word "Company" means "The "L. L. P." Estates, Limited," incorporated or established by

or under the Memorandum of Association to which these Articles are attached. *The Ordinance.*—"The Ordinance" means and includes "The Joint Stock Companies Ordinances, 1861 to 1909," and every other Ordinance from time to time in force concerning Joint Stock Companies which may apply to the Company. Special resolution.—" Special resolution " has the meaning essigned thereto by the Ordinance. Extraordinary resolution.—" Extraordinary resolution " means a resolution passed by three fourths in number and

value of such Shareholders of the Company for the time being entitled to vote as may be present at any meeting of the Company of which notice specifying an intention to propose such resolution as an extraordinary resolution has been duly given.

These presents.---- "These presents " means and includes the Memorandum of Association and the Articles of Association of the Company from time to time in force. Capital.—"Capital " means the capital for the time being raised or authorized to be raised for the purposes of the

Company. Shares.-

-" Shares " means the shares from time to time into which the capital of the Company may be divided. Shares.—"Shares " means the shares non time to the the means the shares of the Company. Shareholder.—"Shareholder " means a Shareholder of the Company. Presence or present.—With regard to a Shareholder " presence or present " at a meeting means presence or present

personally or by proxy or by attorney duly authorized. Directors.—"Directors" means the Directors for the time being of the Company or (as the case may be) the Directors

assembled at a Board.

Board.---" Board " means a meeting of the Directors or (as the context may require) the Directors assembled at a Board meeting, acting through at least a quorum of their body in the exercise of authority duly given to them. Persons.—" Persons " means partnerships, associations, corporations, companies unincorporated or incorporated

by Ordinance and registration, as well as individuals. *Office.*—" Office " means the registered office for the time being of the Company. *Seal*—" Seal " means the common seal for the time being of the Company.

Month.—"Month" means a calendar month. Writing.—"Writing" means printed matter or print as well as writing. Singular and plural number.—Words importing the singular number only include the plural, and vice versa.

Masculine and feminine gender.-Words importing the masculine gender only include the feminine, and vice versa.

#### BUSINESS.

5. Commencement of Business.—The Company may proceed to carry out the objects for which it is established, and to employ and apply its capital as soon after the registration of the Company as the Directors in their discretion shall think fit ; and notwithstanding that the whole of the shares shall not have been subscribed, applied for, or allotted, they shall do so as soon as, in the judgment of the Directors, a sufficient number of shares shall have been subscribed or applied for.

6. Business to be carried on by Directors.—The business of the Company shall be carried on by or under the manage-ment or direction of the Directors, and subject only to the control of General Meetings, in accordance with these presents

#### CAPITAL.

7. Nominal Capital.—The nominal capital of the Company is Two million Rupees (Rs. 2,000,000) divided into Two hundred thousand (200,000) shares of Ten Rupees (Rs. 10) each.

#### SHARES.

8. Allotment and Issue.-The shares, except where otherwise provided, shall be allotted at the discretion of and by the Directors, who may from time to time issue any unissued shares and may add to such shares such an amount of premium as they may consider proper; provided that such unissued shares shall be first offered by the Directors to the registered Shareholders for the time being of the Company as nearly as possible in proportion to the shares already held by them, and such shares as shall not be accepted by the Shareholder or Shareholders to whom the shares shall have been offered within the time specified in that behalf by the Directors may be disposed of by the Directors in such manner as they think most beneficial to the Company; provided also that the Directors may at their discretion allot any unissued shares in pay-ment for any estates or lands or other property purchased or acquired by the Company without first offering such shares to the registered Shareholders for the time being of the Company, and may make arrangements on an issue of shares for a difference between the holders of such shares in the amount of calls to be paid and the time of payment of such calls.

9. Payment of amount of shares by instalments.—If by the conditions of allotment of any share the whole or part of the amount thereof shall be payable by instalments, every such instalment shall, when due, be paid to the Company by the holder of the share.

10. Acceptance.-Every person taking any share in the Company shall testify his acceptance thereof by writing under his hand in such form as the Company from time to time directs. 11. Payment.—Payment for shares shall be made in such manner as the Directors shall from time to time determine

and direct.

12. Shares held by a firm.-Shares may be registered in the name of a firm, and any partner of the firm or agent duly authorized to sign the name of the firm shall be entitled to vote and to give proxies, but not more than one partner may vote at a time.

13. Shares held by two or more persons not in partnership.-Shares may be registered in the names of two or more persons not in partnership.

14. One of joint-holders other than a firm may give receipts; only one of joint-holders resident in Ceylon entitled to vote.—Any one of the joint-holders of a share, other than a firm, may give effectual receipts for any dividends payable in respect of such share; but only one of such joint-Shareholders shall be entitled to the right of voting and of giving proxies and exercising the other rights and powers conferred on a sole Shareholder, and if the joint-holders cannot arrange amongst themselves as to who shall vote or give proxies and exercise such other rights and powers conferred on a sole Shareholder, the Shareholder whose name stands first on the register of shares shall vote or give proxies and exercise those rights and powers; provided, however, that in the event of such first registered Shareholder being absent from the Island, the first registered Shareholder then resident in Ceylon shall vote or give proxies and exercise all such rights and powers as aforesaid.

15. Survivor of joint-holders, other than a firm, only recognized.—In case of the death of any one or more of the jointholders, other than a firm, of any shares, the survivor or survivors shall be the only person or persons recognized by the Company as having any title to, or interest in, such shares.

16. Liability of joint-holders.—The joint-holders of a share shall be severally as well as jointly liable for the payment of all instalments and calls due in respect of such share.

17. Trusts or any interest in share other than that of registered holder or of any person under clause 38 not recognized.— The Company shall not be bound to recognize (even though having notice of) any contingent, future, partial, or equitable interest in the nature of a trust or otherwise in any share, or any other right in respect of any share, except any absolute right thereto in the person from time to time registered as the holder thereof, and except also the right of any person under clause 38 to become a Shareholder in respect of any share.

#### INCREASE OF CAPITAL.

18. Increase of capital by creation of new shares.—The Company in General Meeting may, by special resolution from time to time, increase the capital by creation of new shares of such amount per share and in the aggregate, and with such special, preferential, deferred, qualified, or other rights, privileges, or conditions attached thereto as such resolution shall direct.

19. Issue of new shares.—The new shares shall be issued upon such terms and conditions and with such preferential, deferred, qualified, special, or other rights, privileges, or conditions attached thereto as the General Meeting resolving on the creation thereof or any other General Meeting of the Company shall direct; and in particular such shares may be issued with a preferential or qualified right to the dividends and in the distribution of assets of the Company, and with a special or without any right of voting. The Directors shall have power to add to such new shares such an amount of premium as they may consider proper.

20. How carried into effect.—Subject to any direction to the contrary that may be given by the meeting that sanctions the increase of capital, all new shares shall be offered to the Shareholders in proportion to the existing shares held by them. Such offer shall be made by notice specifying the number of shares to which the Shareholder is entitled, and limiting a time within which the offer if not accepted will be deemed to be declined, and after the expiration of such time, or on the receipt of an intimation from the Shareholder to whom such notice is given that he declines to accept the shares offered, the same shall be disposed of in such manner as the Directors may determine. Provided that the Directors may, at their discretion, allot such new shares or any portion of them in payment for any estates or lands or other property purchased or acquired by the Company, without first offering such shares to the registered Shareholders for the time being of the Company.

21. Same as original capital.—Except so far as otherwise provided by the conditions of issue or by these presents, any capital raised by the creation of new shares shall be considered part of the original capital, and shall be subject to the provisions herein contained with reference to the payments of calls and instalments, transfer, transmission, forfeiture, lien, surrender, and otherwise.

### REDUCTION OF CAPITAL AND SUBDIVISION OR CONSOLIDATION OF SHARES.

22. Reduction of capital and subdivision or consolidation of shares.—The Company in General Meeting may by special resolution reduce the capital in such manner as such special resolution shall direct, and may by special resolution subdivide or consolidate the shares of the Company or any of them.

#### SHARE CERTIFICATES.

23. Certificates how issued.—Every Shareholder shall be entitled to one certificate for all the shares registered in his name, or to several certificates, each for one or more of such shares. Every certificate shall specify the number of the share in respect of which it is issued.

24. Certificate to be under seal of company.—The certificates of shares shall be issued under the seal of the Company.

25. Renewal of certificate.—If any certificate be worn out or defaced, then upon production thereof to the Directors they may order the same to be cancelled and may issue a new certificate in lieu thereof; and if any certificate be lost or destroyed, then, upon proof thereof to the satisfaction of the Directors, and on such indemnity as the Directors deem adequate being given, a new certificate in lieu thereof shall be given to the person entitled to such lost or destroyed certificate. A sum of fifty cents shall be payable for such new certificate.

26. Certificate to be delivered to the first named of joint-holders not a firm.—The certificate of shares registered in the names of two or more persons not a firm shall be delivered to the person first named on the register.

### TRANSFER OF SHARES.

27. Exercise of rights.—No person shall exercise anyright of a Shareholder until his name shall have been entered in the register of Shareholders and he shall have paid all calls and other moneys for the time being payable on every share in the Company held by him.

28. Transfer of shares.—Subject to the restriction of the Articles, any Shareholder may transfer all or any of his shares by instrument in writing.

29. No transfer to minor or person of unsound mind.—No transfer of shares shall be made to a minor or person of unsound mind.

30. Register of transfers.—The Company shall keep a book or books, to be called "The Register of Transfers, in which shall be entered the particulars of every transfer or transmission of any share.

31. Instrument of transfer.—The instrument of transfer of any share shall be signed both by the transferor and transferee, and the transferor shall be deemed to remain the holder of such share until the name of the transferee is entered in the register in respect thereof.

32. Board may decline to register transfers.—The Board may, at their own absolute and uncontrolled discretion, decline to register any transfer of shares by a Shareholder who is indebted to the Company, or upon whose shares the Company have a lien or otherwise; or to any person not approved by them.

33. Not bound to state reason.—In no case shall a Shareholder or proposed transferee be entitled to require the Directors to state the reason of their refusal to register, but their declinature shall be absolute.

34. Registration of transfer.—Every instrument of transfer must be left at the office of the Company to be registered, accompanied by such evidence as the Directors may reasonably require to prove the title of the transferor, and a fee of Rs. 2 50, or such other sum as the Directors shall from time to time determine, must be paid; and thereupon the Directors, subject to the powers vested in them by Articles 32, 33, and 35, shall register the transferee as Shareholder and retain the instrument of transfer.

35. Directors may authorize registration of transferees.—The Directors may, by such means as they shall deem. expedient, authorize the registration of transferees as Shareholders without the necessity of any meeting of the Directors for that purpose.

36. Directors not bound to inquire as to validity of transfer.—In no case shall the Directors be bound to inquire into the validity, legal effect, or genuineness of any instrument of transfer produced by a person claiming a transfer of any share in accordance with these Articles; and whether they abstain from so inquiring or do so inquire and are misled, the transferor shall have no claim whatsoever upon the Company in respect of the share, except for the dividends previously declared in respect thereof, but, if at all, upon the transferee only.

37. Transfer books when to be closed.—The Transfer Books may be closed during the fourteen days immediately preceding each Ordinary General Meeting, including the First General Meeting; also when a dividend is declared, for the three days next ensuing the meeting; also at such other times as the Directors may decide, not exceeding in the whole twenty-one days in any one year.

#### TRANSMISSION OF SHARES.

38. Title to shares of deceased holder.—The executors or administrators or the heirs of a deceased Shareholder shall be the only persons recognized by the Company as having any title to shares of such Shareholder.
39. Registration of persons entitled to shares otherwise than by transfer.—Any curator of any minor Shareholder,

39 Registration of persons entitled to shares otherwise than by transfer.—Any curator of any minor Shareholder, any committee of a lunatic Shareholder, or any person becoming entitled to shares in consequence of the death, bankruptcy, or liquidation of any Shareholder, or the marriage of any female Shareholder, or in any other way than by transfer, shall, upon producing such evidence that he sustains the character in respect of which he proposes to act under this clause, or of his title, as the Company think sufficient, be forthwith entitled, subject to the provisions herein contained, to be registered as a Shareholder in respect of such shares on payment of a fee of Rs. 2.50; or may, subject to the regulations as to transfers hereinbefore contained, transfer the same to some other person.

40. Failing such registration shares may be sold by the Company.—If any person who shall become entitled to be registered in respect of any share under clause 39, shall not, from any cause whatever within twelve calendar months after the event on the happening of which his title shall accrue, be registered in respect of such share, or if in the case of the death of any Shareholder no person shall, within twelve calendar months after such death, be registered as a Shareholder in respect of the shares of such deceased Shareholder, the Company may sell such shares, either by public auction or private contract, and give a receipt for the purchase money; and the purchaser shall be entitled to be registered in respect of such share, and shall not be bound to inquire whether the events have happened which entitled the Company to sell the same; the nett proceeds of such sale, after deducting all expenses and all moneys in respect of which the Company is entitled to a lien on the shares so sold, shall be paid to the person entitled thereto.

#### SURRENDER AND FORFEITURE OF SHARES.

41. The Directors may accept surrender of shares.—The Directors may accept, in the name and for the benefit of the Company, and upon such terms and conditions as may be agreed upon, a surrender of the shares of Shareholders who may be desirous of retiring from the Company.

42. (a) If call or instalment be not paid, notice to be given to Shareholder.—If any Shareholder fails to pay any call or instalment on or before the day appointed for the payment of the same, the Directors may at any time thereafter, during such time as the call or instalment remains unpaid, serve a notice on such Shareholder or his executors or administrators, or the trustee or assignee in his bankruptcy, requiring him to pay the same, together with any interest that may have accrued, at the rate of 9 per cent. per annum, and all expenses that may have been incurred by the Company by reason of such non-payment.

(b) Terms of notice.—The notice shall name a day (not being less than one month from the date of the notice) on and a place or places at which such call or instalment and such interest and expenses as aforesaid are to be paid; the notice shall also state that, in the event of non-payment at or before the time and at the place appointed the shares in respect of which the call was made or instalment is payable will be liable to be forfeited.
(c) In default of payment, shares to be forfeited.—If the requisition of such notice as aforesaid be not complied with

(c) In default of payment, shares to be forfeited.—If the requisition of such notice as aforesaid be not complied with every or any share or shares in respect of which such notice has been given may at any time thereafter, before payment of calls or instalments, with interest and expenses due in respect thereof, be declared forfeited by a resolution of the Board to that effect.

(d) Shareholder still liable to pay money owing at time of forfeiture.—Any Shareholder whose shares have been so declared forfeited shall notwithstanding be liable to pay and shall forthwith pay to the Company all calls, instalments, interest, and expenses owing upon or in respect of such shares at the time of the forfeiture, together with interest thereon from the time of forfeiture until payment at 9 per cent. per annum, and the Directors may enforce the payment thereof if they think fit.

43. Surrendered or forfeited shares to be the property of the Company, and may be sold, &c.—Every share surrendered or so declared forfeited shall be deemed to be the property of the Company, and may be sold, re-allotted, or otherwise disposed of upon such terms and in such manner as the Board shall think fit.

44. Effect of surrender or forfeiture.—The surrender or forfeiture of a share shall involve the extinction of all interest in, and also of all claims and demands against, the Company in respect of the share and the proceeds thereof, and all other rights incident to the share, except only such of those rights (if any) as by these presents are expressly saved.

45. (a) Certificates of surrender or forfeiture.—A certificate in writing under the hands of two of the Directors and of the Agent or Secretary or Agents or Secretaries that a share has been duly surrendered or forfeited, stating the time when it was surrendered or forfeited, shall be conclusive evidence of the facts therein stated as against all persons who would have been entitled to the share but for such surrender or forfeiture; and such certificate and the rec. ipt of the Company for the price of such share shall constitute a good title to such share, and a certificate of proprietorship shall be delivered to any person who may purchase the same from the Company; such purchaser thereupon shall be deemed application of the purchase money, nor shall his title to such share be affected by any irregularity in the proceedings in reference to such forfeiture or sale.

(b) Forfeiture may be remitted.—The Directors may in their discretion remit or annul the forfeiture of any share within six months from the date thereof upon the payment of all moneys due to the Company from the late holder or holders of such share or shares, and all expenses incurred in relation to such forfeiture, together with such further sum of money by way of redemption money for the deficit, as they shall think fit, not being less than 9 per cent. per annum on the amount of the sums wherein default in payment had been made, but no share bona fide sold, re-allotted, or otherwise disposed of under Article 43 hereof shall be redeemable after sale or disposal.

The Directors may decline to register any transfer of shares subject to such charge or lien.

Lien how made available .-- Such charge or lien may be made available by a sale of all or any of the shares 47. subject to it, provided that no such sale shall be made except under a resolution of the Directors, and until notice in writing shall have been given to the indebted Shareholder or his executors or administrators, or the assignee or trustee in his bankruptcy, requiring him or them to pay the amount for the time being due to the Company, and default shall have been made for twenty-eight days from such notice in paying the sum thereby required to be paid. Should the Shareholder over whose share the lien exists be in England or elsewhere abroad, sixty days' notice shall be allowed him.

48. Proceeds how applied.-The nett proceeds of any such sale as aforesaid under the provisions of Articles 43 and 47 hereof shall be applied in or towards the satisfaction of such debts, liabilities, or engagements, and the residue (if any) shall be paid to such Shareholder or his representatives.

49. Certificate of sale .--- A certificate in writing under the hands of two of the Directors and of the Agent or Secretary or Agents or Secretaries that the power of sale given by clause 47 has arisen, and is exercisable by the Company under

these presents, shall be conclusive evidence of the facts therein stated. 50. Transfer on sale how executed.—Upon any such sale two of the Directors may execute a transfer of such share to the purchaser thereof, and such transfer, with the certificate last aforesaid, shall confer on the purchaser a complete title to such shares.

#### PREFERENCE SHARES.

Preference and deferred shares .-- Any shares from time to time to be issued or created may from time to time be issued with any such right or preference, whether in respect of dividend or of payment of capital, or both, or any such other special privilege or advantage over any shares previously issued or then about to be issued (other than shares issued with a preference), or with such deferred rights as compared with any shares previously issued or then about to be issued, or subject to any such conditions or provisions, and with any such right or without any right of voting, and generally on such terms as the Company may, from time to time by special resolution, determine. 52. Modification of rights and consent thereto.—If at any time by the issue of preference shares or otherwise the

capital is divided into shares of different classes

- (1) The holders of any class of shares by an extraordinary resolution passed at a meeting of such holders may consent, on behalf of all the holders of shares of the class, to the issue or creation of any shares ranking equally therewith, or having any priority thereto, or the abandonment of any preference or priority, or of any accrued dividend, or the reduction for any time or permanently of the dividends payable thereon, or to any scheme for the reduction of the Company's capital affecting the class of shares;
- (2) All or any of the rights, privileges, and conditions attached to each class may be commuted, abrogated, abandoned, added to, or otherwise modified by a special resolution of the Company in General Meeting, provided the holders of any class of shares affected by any such commutation, abrogation, abandonment, addition, or other modification of such rights, privileges, and conditions consent thereto, on behalf of all the holders of shares of the class, by an extraordinary resolution passed at a meeting of such holders.

Any extraordinary resolution passed under the provisions of this Article shall be binding upon all the holders of shares of the class, provided that this Article shall not be read as implying the necessity for such consent as aforesaid in any case in which but for this Article the object of the resolution could have been effected without it.

53. Meeting affecting a particular class of shares.—Any meeting for the purpose of the last preceding clause shall be convened and conducted in all respects as nearly as possible in the same way as an Extraordinary General Meeting of the Company, provided that no Shareholder, not being a Director, shall be entitled to notice thereof or to attend thereat, unless he be a holder of shares of the class intended to be affected by the resolution, and that no vote shall be given except in respect of a share of that class, and that at any such meeting a poll may be demanded in writing by any Shareholder personally present and entitled to vote at the meeting.

#### CALLS.

(a) Directors may make calls.-The Directors may from time to time make such calls as they think fit upon the registered holders of shares, in respect of moneys unpaid thereon, and not by the conditions of allotment made payable at fixed times ; and each Shareholder shall pay the amount of every call so made on him to the persons and at the times and places appointed by the Directors, provided that two months' notice at least shall be given to the Shareholders of the time and place appointed for payment of each call.

(b) Calls, time when made.—A call shall be deemed to have been made at the time when the resolution authorizing the call was passed at a Board Meeting of the Directors or by resolution in writing in terms of Article 120.

(c) Extension of time for payment of call.—The Directors shall have power in their absolute discretion to give time to any one or more Shareholder or Shareholders, exclusive of the others, for payment of any call or part thereof on such terms as the Directors may determine. But no Shareholder shall be entitled to any such extension except as a matter of grace or favour.

55. #### BORROWING POWERS.

(a) Power to borrow.—The Directors shall have power to procure from time to time, in the usual course of business, such temporary advances on the produce in hand, or in the future to be obtained from the Company's estates, as they may find necessary or expedient for the purpose of defraying the expenses of working the Company's estates, or of erecting, maintaining, improving, or extending buildings, machinery, or plantations, or otherwise. The Directors may, for the purpose of securing the repayment of any such sum or sums of money so

borrowed or raised, create and issue any mortgages, debentures, mortgage debentures, debenture stock, bonds, or obligations of the Company, charged upon all or any part of the undertaking, revenue, property, and rights, or assets of the Company (both present and future), including uncalled capital or unpaid calls, or give, accept, or endorse on behalf of the Company any promissory notes or bills of exchange. Provided also that before the Directors execute any mortgage, issue any debentures, or create any debenture stock they shall obtain the sanction there to of the Companyin General Meeting, whether Ordinary or Extraordinary, notice of the intention to obtain such sanction at such meeting having been duly given. Any such securities may be issued either at par or at a premium or discount, and may from time to time be cancelled, or discharged, varied, or exchanged as the Directors may think fit, and may contain any special privileges as to redemption, surrender, drawings, allotment of shares, or otherwise. Every debenture or other instrument issued by the Company for securing the payment of money may be so framed that the moneys thereby secured shall be assignable free from any equities between the Company and the person to whom the same may be issued. A declaration under the Company's seal contained in or endorsed upon any of the documents mentioned in this Article and subscribed by two or more of the Directors, or by one Director and the Agent or Secretary or Agents or Secretaries, to the effect that the Directors have power to borrow the amount which such document may represent, shall be conclusive evidence thereof in all questions between the Company and its creditors, and no such document containing such declaration shall, as regards the creditor, be void on the ground of its being granted in excess of the aforesaid borrowing power, unless it shall be proved that such creditor was aware that it was so granted.

(b) Immediate debenture issue — Without prejudice to any of the powers and provisions of Article 57 (a) hereof, and without the necessity of obtaining the sanction of the Company in General Meeting therefor, the Directors shall have power to raise and borrow immediately a sum not exceeding Three hundred thousand Rupees (Rs 300,000) by the creation and issue of Three thousand (3 000) redeemable debentures of One hundr d rupees (Rs. 100), each carrying interest at eight (8) per centum per annum and to secure the same by a primary mortgage over the Company's estates.

61. Extraordinary General Meetings.-The Directors may, whenever they think fit, call an Extraordinary General Meeting, and the Directors shall do so upon a requisition made in writing by not less than one-seventh of the number of Shareholders holding not less than one-seventh of the issued capital and entitled to vote.

62. Requisition of Shareholders to state object of meeting; on receipt of requisition, Directors to call meeting, and in default Shareholders may do so.—Any requisition so made shall express the object of the meeting proposed to be called, shall be addressed to the Directors, and shall be sent to the registered office of the Company. Upon the receipt of such requisition the Directors shall forthwith proceed to convene an Extraordinary General Meeting, to be held at such time and place as they shall determine. If they do not proceed to convene the same within seven days from the delivery of the requisition, the requisitionists may themselves convene an Extraordinary General Meeting, to be held at such place

and at such time as the Shareholders convening the meeting may themselves fix. 63. Notice of resolution.—Any Shareholder may, on giving not less than ten days' previous notice of any resolution, submit the same to a meeting. Such notice shall be given by leaving a copy of the resolution at the registered office of the Company.

64. Seven days' notice of meeting to be given.-Seven days' notice at least of every General Meeting, Ordinary or Extraordinary, and by whomsoever convened, specifying the place, date, hour of meeting, and the objects and business of the meeting, shall be given either by advertisement in the Ceylon Government Gazette, or by notice sent by post, or of the meeting, shall be given either by advertisement in the *Degion overmann outer*, or by note to be body by post, or otherwise served as hereinafter provided, but an accidental omission to give such notice to any Shareholder shall not invalidate the proceedings at any General Meeting. 65. Business requiring and not requiring notification.—Every Ordinary General Meeting shall be competent, without special notice having been given of the purposes for which it is convened, or of the business to be transacted thereat, to

receive and discuss any report and any accounts presented thereto by the Directors, and to pass resolutions in approval or disapproval thereof, and to declare dividends, and to elect Directors and Auditors retiring in rotation, and to fix the remuneration of the Auditors; and shall also be competent to enter upon, discuss, and transact any business whatever of which special mention shall have been made in the notice or notices upon which the meeting was convened.

66. Notice of other business to be given .-- With the exceptions mentioned in the foregoing Articles as to the business which may be transacted at Ordinary General Meetings without notice, no General Meeting, Ordinary or Extraordinary, shall be competent to enter upon, discuss, or transact any business which has not been specially mentioned in the notice or notices upon which it was convened.

Quorum to be present.-- No business shall be transacted at any General Meeting, except the declaration of a 67. dividend recommended by a report of the Directors or the election of a Chairman, unless there shall be present in person at the commencement of the business three or more persons being Shareholders entitled to vote or persons holding proxies or powers of attorney from Shareholders entitled to vote.

If a quorum not present, meeting to be dissolved or adjourned; adjourned meeting to transact business.--If at the 68. expiration of half an hour from the time appointed for the meeting the required number of persons shall not be present at the meeting, the meeting, if convened by or upon the requisition of Shareholders, shall be dissolved, but in any other case it shall stand adjourned to the same day in the next week at the same time and place; and if at such adjourned meeting a quorum is not present, those Shareholders who are present shall be a quorum, and may transact the business for which the meeting was called the meeting was called.

69. Chairman of Directors or a Director to be Chairman of General Meeting; in case of their absence or refusal, a. 72. Minutes of General Meetings .- Minutes of the proceedings or every General Meeting, whether Ordinary or 1. J. 1 Extraordinary, shall be entered in a book to be kept for that purpose, and shall when so entered be signed as soon as practicable by the Chairman of the same meeting, or by the Chairman of the same when so entered and signed shall be evidence of all such proceedings and of the proper election of the Chairman.

#### VOTING AT MEETINGS.

73. Votes.—At any meeting every resolution shall be decided by the votes of the Shareholders present. 74. Poll.—If a poll be duly demanded, the same shall be taken in such manner and at such time and place as the Chairman shall direct, and the result of the poll shall be deemed to be the resolution of the meeting at which the poll was demanded. The demand of a poll shall not prevent the continuance of a meeting for the transaction of any business other than the question on which a poll has been demanded.

75. 78. Curator of minor, &c., when not entitled to vote.—The parent or curator of a minor Shareholder, the committee or other legal guardian of any lunatic Shareholder, the husband of any female Shareholder not entitled to her shares as separate estate, and the executor or administrator of any deceased Shareholder, or any one of such persons as aforesaid, if more than one, shall not be entitled to vote in the place of such minor. lunatic, female, or deceased person, unless such person shall have been registered as a Shareholder.

79. Voting in person or by proxy or attorney.--Votes may be given either personally or by proxy or by attorney duly authorized.

80. Non-shareholder not to be appointed proxy; but attorney though not Shareholder may vote.-No person shall be appointed a proxy who is not a Shareholder of the Company, but the attorney of a Shareholder, even though not himself a Shareholder of the Company, may represent and vote for his principal at any meeting of the Company.

81. Shareholder in arrear or not registered at least three months previous to the meeting not to vote.—No Shareholder shall be entitled to vote or speak at any General Meeting unless all calls due from him on his shares, or any of them, shall have been paid; and no Shareholder other than the trustee or assignes of a bankrupt or representative of a deceased Shareholder, or person acquiring by marriage, shall be entitled to vote or speak at any meeting held after the expiration of three months from the registration of the Company, in respect of or as the holder of any share which he has acquired by transfer, unless he has been at least three months previously to the time of holding the meeting at which he proposes to vote or speak duly registered as the holder of the share in respect of which he claims to vote or speak.

82. Proxy to be printed or in writing.—The instrument appointing a proxy shall be printed or written, and shall be signed by the appointor, or if such appointor be a corporation, it shall be under the common seal of such corporation. 82.

83. When proxy to be deposited.—The instrument appointing a proxy shall be deposited at the registered office of the Company not less than twenty-four hours before the time appointed for holding the meeting at which the per-on named in such instrument proposes to vote. 84. Appointment of successors to Directors .- The General Meeting at which Directors retire or ought to retire by 91. rotation shall appoint successors to them, and in default thereof such successors may be appointed at a subsequent General No person, not being a retiring Director, shall, unless recommended by the Directors for election, be eligible for Meeting. election to the office of Director at any General Meeting, unless he or some other Shareholder intending to propose him has, at least seven clear days before the meeting, left, at the office, a notice in writing under his hand signifying his candidature for the appointment or the intention of such Shareholder to propose him.

Board may fill up racancies.-The Board shall have power at any time and from time to time before the First 92.

92. Dotat may juit up inconcises. — The board shall have power at any find and in the time of the bard of the interview.
 Ordinary General Meeting to supply any vacancies in their number arising from death, resignation, or otherwise.
 93. Duration of office of Director appointed to vacancy.—Any cashal vacancy occurring in the number of the Directors subsequently to the First Ordinary General Meeting may be filled up by the Directors, but any person so chosen shall retain his office so long only as the vacating Director would have retained the same if no vacancy had occurred.

To retire annually.-At the Second Ordinary General Meeting and at the Ordinary General Meeting in every 94. subsequent year one of the Directors for the time being shall retire from office as provided in clause 95.

95. Retiring Directors how determined.—The Directors to retire from office at the Second, Third, and Fourth General Meetings shall, unless the Directors otherwise arrange among themselves, be determined by ballot; in every subsequent year the Directors to retire shall be those who have been longest in office.

96. Retiring Directors eligible for re-election. —Retiring Directors shall be eligible for re-election.
97. Decision of question as to retirement.—In case any question shall arise as to which of the Directors who have been the same in office shall retire, the same shall be decided by the Directors by ballot.
98. Mumber of Directors have included in the same shall be decided by the Directors by ballot.

Number of Directors how increased or reduced .- The Directors, subject to the approval of a General Meeting, 98. may from time to time at any time subsequent to the Second Ordinary General Meeting increase or reduce the number of Directors, and may also, subject to the like approval, determine in what rotation such increased or reduced number is to go out of office.

99. If election not made, retiring Directors to continue until next meeting.—If at any meeting at which an election of a Director ought to take place the place of a retiring Director is not filled up, the retiring Director may continue in office until the first Ordinary General Meeting in the next year, and so on from meeting to meeting until his place is filled up, unless it shall be determined at such meeting to reduce the number of Directors.

100. Resignation of Directors.—A Director may at any time give notice in writing of his intention to resign by delivering such notice to the Secretary, or by leaving the same at the office or by tendering his written resignation at a meeting of the Directors.

No contract, arrangement, or transaction entered into by or on behalf of the Company with any Director, 101. or with any company or co-partnership of which a Director is a partner, or of which he is a Director, Managing Director, or Manager, shall be void or voidable, nor shall such Director be liable to account to the Company for any profit realized by such contract, arrangement, or transaction by reason only of such Director holding that office, or of the fiduciary relation thereby established, provided that the fact of his interest or connection therewith be fully disclosed to the Company or its Directors.

When office of Directors to be vacated .- The office of Director shall be vacated --102.

- (a) If he accepts or holds any office or place of profit other than Managing Director, Visiting Agent, Superintendent, or Secretary under the Company.
- If he becomes bankrupt or insolvent, or suspends payment, or files a petition for the liquidation of his affairs, (b) or compounds with his creditors.
- (c)If by reason of mental or bodily infirmity he becomes incapable of acting.
- (d) If he ceases to hold the required number of shares to qualify him for the office.

(e) If he is concerned or participates in the profits of any contract with, or work done for, the Company.

Exceptions .-- But the above rule shall be subject to the following exceptions :-- That no Director shall vacate his office by reason of his being a member of any corporation, company, or firm which has entered into any contract with, or done any work for, the Company of which he is a Director, or by his being Agent, or Secretary, or proctor, or by his being a member of a firm who are Agents, or Secretaries, or proctors of the Company; nevertheless, he shall not vote in respect of any contract work or business in which he may be personally interested.

How Directors removed and successors appointed.—The Company may, by an extraordinary resolution, 103. remove any Director before the expiration of his period of office, and may, by an ordinary resolution, eppoint another person in his stead. The Director so appointed shall hold office only during such time as the Director in whose place he is appointed would have held the same if he had not been removed.

104. Indemnity to Directors and others for their own acts and for the acts of others .- Every Director or officer and his heirs, executors, and administrators shall be indemnified by the Company from all losses and expenses incurred by him respectively in or about the discharge of his respective duties, except such as happen from his respective wilful acts or defaults; and no Director or officer nor the heirs, executors, or administrators of any Director or officer, shall be liable for any other Director or officer or for joining in any receipt or other acts of conformity, or for any loss or expense happening to the Company by the insufficiency or deficiency of title to any property acquired for or on behalf of the Company, or for any impufficiency or deficiency of any security in or upon which any of the more of the company of for any insufficiency or deficiency of any security in or upon which any of the moneys of the Company shall be invested, or for any loss or damage arising from the bankruptcy, insolvency, or tortious act of any person with whom any moneys, securities, or effects shall be deposited, or for any other loss, damage, or misfortune whatsoever which shall happen in the execution of the duties of his office or in relation thereto, unless the same happen through his own wilful act or default.

No contribution to be required from Directors, beyond amount, if any, unpaid, on their shares.-No contribution 105. shall be required from any present or past Director or Manager exceeding the amount if any, unpaid on the shares in respect of which he is liable as a present or past Shareholder.

#### Powers of Directors.

106. To manage business of Company and pay preliminary expenses, &c.—The business of the Company shall be managed by the Directors either by themselves or through a Managing Director or with the assistance of an agent or agents and secretary or secretaries of the Company to be appointed by the Directors for such a period and on such terms as they shall determine, and the Directors may pay out of the funds of the Company all costs and expenses, as well preliminary as otherwise, paid or incurred in and about the formation and the registration of the Company, and in connection with the placing of the stares of the Company and in and about the valuation, purchase, lease, sub-lease, or acquisition of any lands, estates or property, and opening, clearing, planting, and cultivation thereof, and in or about the working and business of the Company.

107. To acquire property, to appoint officers, and pay expenses.—The Directors shall have power to purchase, take on lease, or in exchange, or otherwise acquire for the Company any estate or estates, land or lands, property, rights, op ions, or privileges which the Company is authorized to acquire at such price and for such consideration and upon such title and generally on such terms and conditions as they may think fit; and to make and they may make such regulations for the management of the business and property of the Company as they may from time to time think proper, and for that purpose may appoint such managers, agents, secretaries, treasurers, accountants, and other officers, visiting agents, inspectors, superintendents, clerks, artizans, labourers, and other servants for such period or periods, and with such remuneration and at such salaries and upon such terms and conditions as they may cons der advisable, and may pay expenses occasioned thereby out of the funds of the Company, and may from time to time remove or suspend all or any of the managers, agents, secretaries, treasurers, accountants, and other officers, visiting agents, clerks, artizans, labourers, and other servants, for such reasons as they may think proper and advisable and without assigning any cause.

108. To appoint proctors and attorneys.—The Directors shall have power to appoint a proctor or proctors, solicitor or solicitors, attorney or attorneys to assist in carrying on or protecting the business of the Company on such terms as they may consider proper, and from time o time to revoke such appointment.

109. To open banking accounts and operate thereon, &c.—The Directors shall have power to open on behalf of the Company any account or accounts with such bank or banks as they may select or appoint, and also by such signatures as they may appoint to draw, accept, make, endorse, sign, and execute cheques, bills of exchange, and promissory notes, bills of lading, receipts, contracts, and agreements, bonds, mortgages, proxies to any proctor or proctors and other documents on behalf of and to further the interests of the Company. 110. To sell and dispose of Company's property, &c.—It shall be lawful for the Directors, if authorized so to do by a special resolution of the Shareholders in General Meeting, to arrange terms for the amalgamation of the Company with any other company or companies, or individual or individuals, or for the sale or disposal of the business, estates, lands, and other company or any part or parts cherry there or cherry the approximate of the subset of the analysis.

110. To sell and dispose of Company's property, &c.—It shall be lawful for the Directors, if authorized so to do by a special resolution of the Shareholders in General Meeting, to arrange terms for the amalgamation of the Company with any other company or companies, or individual or individuals, or for the sale or disposal of the business, estates, lands, and effects of the company or any part or parts, share or shares thereof, respectively, or the assignment of the whole or any part or parts of its leasehold interests in any estate or estates, land or lands or the sub-lease of the whole or any part or parts thereof to any company or companies, or person or persons, upon such terms and n such manner as the Directors shall think fit, and the Directors shall have power to do all such things as may be necessary for carrying such amalgamation, sale, or other disposition into effect so far as a resolution or special resolution of the Company is not by law necessary for such purpose; and in case any terms so arranged by the Directors include or make necessary the dissolution of the Company, the Company shall be dissolved to that end. 111. General powers.—The Directors shall carry on the business of the Company in such manner as they may think

111. General powers.—The Directors shall carry on the business of the Company in such manner as they may think most expedient; and in addition to the powers and authorities by the Ordinance or by these presents expressly conferred on them, they may exercise all such powers, give all such consents, make all such arrangements, appoint all such managers, agents, secretaries, treasurers, accountants, and other officers, clerks, assistants, artizans, and workers, and generally do all such acts and things as are or shall be by the Ordinance or by these presents directed and authorized to be exercised, given, made, or done by the Company and are not by the Ordinance or by these presents required to be exercised or done by the Company in General Meeting, subject, nevertheless, to the provisions of the Ordinance and of these presents and to such regulations and provisions (if any) as may, from time to time, be prescribed by the Company in General Meeting; but no regulation made by the Company in General Meeting shall invalidate any prior act of the Board which would have been valid if such regulation had not been made. The generality of the powers conferred by any clause in these presents on the Directors shall not be taken to be limited by any clause conferring any special or expressed power.

112. Special powers.—In furthera ce and not in limitation of, and without prejudice to, the general powers conferred or implied in the last preceding clause, and of the other powers conferred by these presents, it is hereby expressly declared that the Directors shall have the powers following (that is to say) :—

- (1) To institute, conduct, defend, compound or abandon any action, suit, prosecution, or legal proceedings by and against the Company, or its officers or otherwise concerning the affairs of the Company, and also to compound and allow time for payment or satisfaction of any debts due and of any claims and demands by and against the Company.
- To refer any claims or demands by or against the Company to arbitration, and observe and perform the awards.
   To make and give receipts, releases, and other discharges for money payable to the Company, and for claims and demands of the Company.
- (4) To act on behalf of the Company in all matters relating to bankrupts and insolvents, with power to accept the office of trustee, assignee, liquidator, inspector, or any similar office.
- (5) To invest any of the moneys of the Company which the Directors may consider not immediately required for the purposes thereof, upon such securities and in such manner as they may think fit, and so that they shall not be restricted to such securities as are permissible to trustees, without special powers, and from time to time to vary or release such investments.
- (6) From time to time to provide for the management of the affairs of the Company abroad in such manner as they think fit, and to establish any local boards or agencies for managing any of the affairs of the Company abroad, and to appoint any persons to be members of such local board or any managers or agents, and to fix their rumuneration.
- (7) From time to time and at any time to delegate to any one or more of the Directors of the Company for the time being or any other person or company for the time being, residing or carrying on business in Ceylon or elsewhere, all or any of the powers hereby made exercisable by the Directors, except those relating to shares and any others as to which special provisions inconsistent with such delegation are herein contained; and they shall have power to fix the remuneration of and at any time to remove such Director or other person or company. Any other or vary any such delegation. They shall not however be entitled to delegate any powers of instrument in writing, which shall specifically state the extent to which such powers may be used by the person or persons to whom they are so delegated, and compliance therewith shall be a condition precedent to the overcise of these powers.

### PROCEEDINGS OF DIRECTORS.

113. Meetings of Directors.—The Directors may meet for the despatch of business, adjourn, and otherwise regulate their meetings as they may think fit, and determine the quorum necessary for the transaction of business; until otherwise determined, two Directors shall be a quorum.

A Director may summon meetings of Directors.--- A Director may at any time summon a meeting of Directors. 114.

115. Who is to preside at meetings of Board.—The Board may elect a Chairman of their meetings and determine the period for which he is to hold office, and all meetings of the Directors shall be presided over by the Chairman, if one has been elected and if present, but if there be a vacancy in the office of Chairman, or if at any meeting of Directors the Chairman be not present at the time appointed for holding the same, then, and in that case, the Directors present shall choose one of their number to be Chairman of such meeting.

116. Questions at meetings how decided.—Any question which shall arise at any meeting of the Directors shall be decided by a majority of votes, and in case of an equality of votes the Chairman thereat shall have a casting vote in addition to his vote as a Director.

117. Board may appoint committees .--- The Board may delegate any of their powers to committees consisting of such member or members of their body as the Board think fit, and they may from time to time revoke and discharge any such committee, either wholly or in part, and either as to persons or purposes, but every committee so formed shall, in exercise of the powers delegated to it, conform to all such regulations as may be prescribed by the Board. All acts done by any such committee, in conformity with such regulations and in the fulfilment of the purposes of their appointment, but not otherwise, shall have the like force and effects as if done by the Board.

118. Acts of Board or committee valid notwithstanding informal appoinment.—The acts of the Board or of any committee appointed by the Board shall, notwithstanding any vacancy in the Board or committee, or defect in the appointment of any Director or of any member of the committee, be as valid as if no such vacancy or defect had existed, and as if every person had been duly appointed, provided the same be done before the discovery of the defect.

by the provision herein contained for regulating the meetings and proceedings of Directors, so far as the same are applicable thereto, and are not superseded by the express terms of the appointment of such committee respectively, or any regulation imposed by the Board.

Resolution in writing by all the Directors as valid as if passed at a meeting of Directors. —A resolution in writing 120. signed by all the Directors for the time being resident in Ceylon shall be as valid and effectual as if it had been passed at a meeting of the Directors duly called and constituted, provided that not fewer than two Directors shall sign it.

121. Minutes of proceedings of the Company and the Directors to be recorded. -The Directors shall cause minutes to be made in books to be provided for the purpose of the following matters, videlicet :-

- (a) Of all appointments of officers and committees made by the Directors.
- (b) Of the names of the Directors present at each meeting of the Directors and of the members of the committee appointed by the Board present at each meeting of the committee.
- (c) Of the resolutions and proceedings of all General Meetings.
- (d) Of the resolutions and proceedings of all meetings of the Directors and of the committees appointed by the Board.
- (e) Of all orders made by the Directors.
- (f) Of the use of the Company's seal.

122. Signature of minutes of proceedings and effect thereof.—All such minutes shall be signed by the person or one of the persons who shall have presided as Chairman at the General Meeting, the Board Meeting, or Committee Meeting at which the business minuted shall have been transacted, or by the person or one of the persons who shall preside as Chairman at the next ensuing General Meeting, Board Meeting, or Committee Meeting, respectively; and all minutes purporting to have been signed by any Chairman of any General Meeting, or Board Meeting, or Committee Meeting, respectively, shall, for all purposes whatsoever, be *primd facie* evidence of the actual and regular passing of the resolutions, and the actual and regular transaction or occurrence of the proceedings and other matters purporting to be so recorded, and of the regularity of the meeting at which the same shall appear to have taken place, and of the Chairmanship and signature of the person appearing to have signed as Chairman, and of the date on which such meeting was held.

#### COMPANY'S SEAL.

123. The use of the seal.-The seal of the Company shall not be used or affixed to any deed, certificate of shares, or other instrument, except in the presence of two or more of the Directors or of one Director and the Agents and Secretaries of the Company, who shall attest the sealing thereof ; such attestation on the part of the Agents and Secretaries, in the event of a firm being the Agents and Secretaries, being signified by a partner or duly authorized manager, attorney, or agent of the said firm signing the firm name or the firm name per procurationem or signing for and on behalf of the said firm as such Agents and Secretaries, and in the event of a company registered under the Ordinance being the Agents and Secretaries, being signified by a Director or the Secretary or the duly authorized attorney of such company signing for and on behalf of such company as Agents and Secretaries. The sealing shall not be attested by one person in the dual capacity of Director of such company as Agents and Secretaries. and representative of the Agents and Secretaries.

#### ACCOUNTS.

124. What accounts to be kept. -The Agent or Secretary or the Agents or Secretaries for the time being, or, if there be no Agent or Secretary or Agents or Secretaries, the Directors shall cause true accounts to be kept of the paid-up capital for the time being of the Company, and of all sums of money received and expended by the Company, and of the matters in respect of which such receipts and expenditure take place, and of the assets, credits, and liabilities of the Company, and generally of all its commercial, financial, and other affairs, transactions, and engagements, and of all other matters necessary for shov ing the true financial state and condition of the Company ; and the accounts shall be kept in such books and in such a manner at the registered office of the Company as the Directors think fit.

such a manner at the registered office of the Company as the Directors think fit.
125. Accounts how and when open to inspection.—The Directors shall from time to time determine whether, and to what extent, and at what times and places, and under what conditions or regulations the accounts and books of the Company or of any of them shall be open to the inspection of the Shareholders; and no Shareholder shall have any right of inspecting any account or book or document of the Company, except as conferred by the Ordinance or authorized by 126. Statement of accounts and balance sheet to be furnished to General Meeting.—At the Ordinary General Meeting in every year the Directors shall lay before the Company a statement of the profit and loss account for the preceding financial

in every year the Directors shall lay before the Company a statement of the profit and loss account for the preceding financial year, and a balance sheet containing a summary of the property and liabilities of the Company made up as at the end of

Report to accompany statement.--Every such statement shall be accompanied by a report as to the state and 127. condition of the Company, and as to the amount which they recommend to be paid out of the profits by way of dividend or bonus to the Shareholders, and the statement, report, and balance sheet shall be signed by the Directors.

Copy of balance sheet to be sent to the Shareholders .- A printed copy of such balance sheet shall, at least seven 128. days previous to such meeting, be delivered at, or posted to, the registered address of every Shareholder.

### DIVIDENDS, BONUS, AND RESERVE FUND.

129. Declaration of dividend.-The Directors may, with the sanction of the Company in General Meeting, from time to time, declare a dividend to be paid, and (or) pay a bonus to the Shareholders in proportion to the amount paid on their shares, but no dividend or bonus shall be payable except outt of nett profits. (a) Any General Meeting may direct payment of any dividend declared at such meeting or of any interim dividends

which may subsequently be declared by the Directors, wholly or in part in sterling by means of drafts or cheques on London or by the distribution of specific assets and in particular of paid up shares, debentures, or debenture stock of the Company, or of any other company, or in any other form of specie, or in any one or more of such ways, and the Directors shall give effect to such direction; and where any difficulty arises in regard to the distribution, they may settle the same as they think expedient, and in particular may issue fractional certificates, and may fix the value for distribution of such specific assets, or any part thereof, and may determine that cash payments shall be made to any Shareholder upon the footing of the value so fixed, in order to adjust the rights of all parties. 130. Interim dividend.—The Directors may also if they think fit, from time to time and at any time, without

the sanction of a General Meeting, determine on and declare an interim dividend to be paid, and (or) pay a bonus to the Shareholders on account and in anticipation of the dividend for the then current year.

131. Reserve fund.-Previously to the Directors paying or recommending any dividend on preference or ordinary shares, they may set aside out of the profits of the Company such a sum as they think proper as a reserve fund, and may invest the same in such securities as they shall think fit, or place the same on fixed deposit in any bank or banks.

132. Application thereof.—The Directors may from time to time apply such portions as they think fit of the reserve fund to meet contingencies, or for the payment of accumulated dividends due on preference shares or for equalizing dividends, or for working the business of the Company, or for repairing, or maintaining, or extending the buildings and premises, or for the repair or renewal or extension of the property or plant connected with the business of the Company or

any part thereof, or for any other purpose of the Company which they may from time to time deem expedient. 133. Unpaid interest or dividend not to bear interest.—No unpaid interest or dividend or bonus shall ever bear interest against the Company.

134. No Shareholder to receive dividend while debt due to Company.-No Shareholder shall be entitled to receive payment of any dividend or bonus in respect of his share or shares whilst any moneys may be due or owing from him (whether alone or jointly with any other person) to the Company in respect of such share or shares or otherwise howsoever.

135. Directors may deduct debt from the dividends.—The Directors may deduct from the dividend or bonus payable to any Shareholder all sums of money due from him (whether alone or jointly with any other person) to the Company, and notwithstanding such sums shall not be payable until after the date when such dividend is payable.

Dividends may be paid by cheque or warrant and sent through the post.-Unless otherwise directed any dividend 136. may be paid by cheque or warrant sent through the post to the registered address of the Shareholder entitled, or, in the case of joint-holders, to the registered address of that one whose name stands first on the register in respect of the jointholding; but the Company shall not be liable or responsible for the loss of any such cheque or dividend warrant sent through the post.

137. Notice of dividend : forfeiture of unclaimed dividend.—Notice of all dividends or bonuses to become payable shall be given to each Shareholder entitled thereto; and all dividends or bonuses unclaimed by any Shareholder for three years after notice thereof is given may be forfeited by a resolution of the Board of Directors for the benefit of the Company, and, if the Directors think fit, may be applied in augmentation of the reserve fund. For the purposes of this clause any cheques or warrants which may be issued for dividends or bonuses and may not be presented at the Company's Bankers for payment within three years shall rank as unclaimed dividends.

138. Shares held by a firm.-Every dividend or bonus payable in respect of any share held by a firm may be paid to, and an effectual receipt given by, any partner of such firm or agent duly authorized to sign the name of the firm,

139. Joint-holders other than a firm.—Every dividend or bonus payable in respect of any share held by several persons jointly, other than a firm, may be paid to, and an effectual receipt given by, any one of such persons.

#### AUDIT.

Accounts to be audited.-The accounts of the Company shall from time to time be examined, and the correctness 140. of the balance sheet and profit and loss account ascertained by one or more Auditor or Auditors.

141. Qualification of Auditors .- No person shall be eligible as an Auditor who is interested otherwise than as a Shareholder in any transaction of the Company, but an Auditor shall not be debarred from acting as a professional accountant in doing any special work for the Company which the Directors may deem necessary. It shall not be a necessary qualification for an Auditor that he be a Shareholder of the Company, and no Director or officer of the Company shall, during his continuance in office, be eligible as an Auditor.

142. Appointment and retirement of Auditors.—The Directors shall appoint the first Auditor or Auditors of the Company and fix his or their remuneration; all future Auditors, except as is hereinafter mentioned, shall be appointed at the First Ordinary General Meeting of the Company in each year by the Shareholders present thereat, and shall hold their office only until the First Ordinary General Meeting after their respective appointments, or until otherwise ordered by a General Meeting.

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143. Retiring Auditors eligible for re-election.—Retiring Auditors shall be eligible for re-election. 144. Remuneration of Auditors.—The remuneration of the Auditors other than the first shall be fixed by the Company in General Meeting, and this remuneration may from time to time be varied by a General Meeting.

145. Casual vacancy in number of Auditors how filled up.—If any vacancy that may occur in the office of Auditor shall not be supplied at any Ordinary General Meeting, or if any casual vacancy shall occur, the Directors shall (subject to the approval of the next Ordinary General Meeting) fill up the vacancy by the appointment of a person who shall hold the office until such meeting.

146. Duty of Auditor.—Every Auditor shall be supplied with a copy of the balance sheet and profit and loss account intended to be laid before the next Ordinary General Meeting, and it shall be his duty to examine the same with the accounts

and vouchers relating thereto and to report thereon to the meeting generally or specially as he may think fit. 147. Company's accounts to be open to Auditors for audit.—All accetifits, books, and documents whatsoever of the Company shall at all times be open to the Auditors for the purpose callidit.

#### NOTICES.

Notice how authenticated .-- Notices from the Company may be authenticated by the signature (printed or 148. written) of the Agent or Secretary, Agents or Secretaries, or other persons appointed by the Board to do so.

Shareholders to register address.—Every Shareholder shall furnish the Company with an address in Ceylon, 149.

which shall be deemed to be his place of abode, and shall be registered as such in the books of the Company. 150. Service of notices.—A notice may be served by the Company upon any Shareholder, either personally or by sending it through the post in a prepaid letter addressed to such Shareholder at his registered address or place of abode; and any notice so served shall be deemed to be well served for all purposes, notwithstanding that the Shareholder to whom . such notice is addressed be dead, unless his executor or administrators shall have given to the Directors, or to the Agent or Secretary, or Agents or Secretaries of the Company, their own or some other address in Ceylon. 151. Notice to joint-holders of shares other than a firm.—All notices directed to be given to Shareholders shall, with

respect to any share to which persons other than a firm are jointly entitled, be sufficient if given to any one of such persons, and notice so given shall be sufficient notice to all the holders of such shares.

152. Date and proof of service.—Any notice if served by post shall be deemed to have been served on the day on which the letter containing the same would in ordinary course of post have been delivered at his address, and in proving such service it shall be sufficient to prove that the letter containing the notice was properly addressed and put into a post box or posted at a post office and the entry in the Company's books of the leaving or sending by post of any notice at or to such address shall be sufficient evidence thereof, and no further evidence shall be necessary.

153. Non-resident Shareholders"must register addresses in Ceylon.-Every Shareholder resident out of Ceylon shall name and register in the books of the Company an address within Ceylon at which all notices shall be served upon him, and all notices served at such address shall be deemed to be well served. If he shall not have named and registered such an address, he shall not be entitled to any notice.

All notices required to be given by advertisement shall be published in the Ceylon Government Gazette.

ARBITRATION.

154. Directors may refer disputes to arbitration.—Whenever any question or other matter whatsoever arises in dispute between the Company and any other Company or person, the same may be referred by the Directors to arbitration.

#### EVIDENCE.

Evidence in a tion by Company against Shareholders.—On the trial or hearing of any action or suit brought or 155. instituted by the Company against any Shareholder or his representatives to recover any debt or money claimed to be due to the Company in respect of his shares, it shall be sufficient to prove that the name of the defendant is or was, when the claim arose, on the register of Shareholders of the Company as a holder of the number of shares in respect of which such claim is made, and that the amount claimed is not entered as paid in the books of the Company; and it shall not be necessary to prove the registration of the Company, nor the appointment of the Directors who made any call, nor that a quorum of Directors was present at the Board at which any call was made, nor that the meeting at which any call was made was duly convened or constituted, nor any other matter whatsoever, but the proof aforesaid shall be conclusive evidence of the debt,

### PROVISIONS RELATIVE TO WINDING UP OR DISSOLUTION OF THE COMPANY.

156. Purchase of Company's property by Shareholders .- Any Shareholder, whether a Director of not, or whether alone or jointly with any other Shareholder or Director, and any person not a Shareholder, may become the purchaser of the property of the Company or any part thereof, in the event of a winding up or a dissolution, or at any other time when a sale of the Company's property or effects or any part thereof shall be made by the Directors under the powers hereby or under the Ordinance conferred upon them.

157. Distribution.—If the Company shall be wound up and there shall be any surplus assets after payment of all debts and satisfaction of all liabilities of the Company, such surplus assets shall be applied, first, in repaying to the holders of the preference shares (if any) the amounts that may be due to them, whether by way of capital only or by way of capital and dividend or arrears of dividend or otherwise in accordance with the rights, privileges, and conditions attached thereto, and the balance in repaying to the holders of the ordinary shares the amounts paid up or reckoned as paid up on such ordinary shares. If after such payments there shall remain any surplus assets, such surplus assets shall be divided among the ordinary Shareholders in proportion to the capital paid up, or reckoned as paid up, on the shares which are held by them respectively at the commencement of the winding up, unless the conditions attached to the preference shares expressly entitle such shares to participate in such surplus assets.

158. Payment in specie, and vesting in trustees.-If the Company shall be wound up, the liquidator, whether voluntarily or official, may, with the sanction of an extraordinary resolution, divide among the contributories in specie any part of the assets of the Company, and may, with their sanction, vest any part of the assets of the Company in trustees upon such trusts for the benefit of the contributories as the liquidator, with like sanction, shall think fit.







## **NOTIFICATIONS UNDER "THE PATENTS ORDINANCE, 1906."**

THE following Specification has been accepted :--

"A method of and apparatus for mixing and kneading."

Abstract :----

The nature of the invention is indicated in the claims which are as follows :-----

1. A method of mixing and kneading materials, which consists in causing such materials to flow continuously and successively from end to end simultaneously and circumferentially about the periphery of a container, for the purpose specified.

2. A machine for mixing materials, comprising a container which is equipped with a conveying device in the form of blades or the like constructed and arranged to cause the materials to flow continuously and successively from end to end and simultaneously and circumferentially about the periphery of the said container, for the purpose specified.

3. A machine for mixing and kneading materials, such as claimed in claim 2, in which the blades are provided with peripheral smearing surfaces which produce a smearing action on the material between said surfaces and the inner surface of the container, for the purpose specified.

4. A machine for mixing and kneading materials, in which the mixing device comprises a relatively rotary member comprising an axial body portion provided with one or more right-hand helical flanges and one or more left-hand helical flanges, said flanges beginning at opposite ends of the chamber and extending substantially to the end opposite that of beginning and extending also throughout their length uninterruptedly from said body portion substantially to the inner cylindrical surface of the chamber, whereby said material is conveyed successively and continuously from end to end of the chamber, for the purpose specified.

5. A machine for mixing and kneading material, such as claimed in claim 3, in which said flanges terminate in spirally arranged scrapers for the end walls of the chamber.

6. In a machine for mixing and kneading materials, a door for the mixing chamber on which is mounted a rotary feeding device which is arranged to feed its contents into the mixing chamber which contains the rotary mixing and kneading member, for the purpose specified.

7. In a machine for mixing and kneading materials, the provision of a rotary cylindrical member adjacent the mixing chamber and a device such as manually operable members for manually moving the end piece or pieces of said cylindrical member longitudinally with respect to the cylinder to provide an outlet for the material contained therein, for the purpose specified.

8. In a machine for mixing and kneading materials, the provision of a hollow member which can be driven or rotated to cause its contents to flow out into the mixing chamber of the machine and having a device for opening said hollow member to permit of egress of its contents, said device being operable independently of the driving of said member, for the purpose specified.

9. The improved method of mixing and kneading, and the apparatus substantially as described and as illustrated in the accompanying drawings, for the purpose specified.

#### Further employment of Ceylonese in the Public Service-Assistant Superintendents of Surveys Training Class Entrance Examination.

N examination for admission to the above Training Class will be held by the Education Department at Colombo on November 4, 5, and 6, 1920. The examination, vide syllabus below, will be competitive for not more than 5 appointments to the Assistant Superintendents' Grade in accordance with the recommendations contained in Sessional Paper I., 1919, paragraph 20, which are as follows :-

"Candidates should be selected by a special competitive examination, after which they would be admitted to the Survey Department Training School. On passing out of the School after one year's training, they should be appointed to be Probationers in the Survey Department, receiving the same rate of pay as Third Gade Surveyors. On his passing the Junior Examination, a Probationer's salary should be raised to the level of that of a Second Grade Surveyor, and he should be eligible to take up the Senior Examination, on passing which he should be entitled to the next vacancy in the Assistant Superintendents' Class, provided that his conduct has been satisfactory.

Candidates will be paid Rs. 45 per mensem during their term of one year's instruction in the Training School

The place where the examination will be held will be notified to the candidates at a later date, together with a time table.

Applications for admission to the examination must 2. be forwarded to the Surveyor-General not later than September 30, 1920, and every applicant must furnish satisfactory proof-

(a). That he is a natural born British subject, and the son of Sinhalese, Tamil, Moor, Malay, or Burgher parents, who were themselves born in Ceylon.

(b) That he is not less than 19 years of age and not more than 25 on December 31, 1920.

(c) That he is of good health and moral character.

Applicants should attach to their applications-3.

(a) Certificate of birth. Certificate of baptism will also be accepted, provided the baptism took place within four months of the date of birth. Certificate of baptism must be a copy of entry in the Baptismal Register, and must be certified as such by the Incumbent of the Church in which the register is kept.(b) Their name in full and present address.

Geometry.-The geometry of the Matriculation Examination together with the geometry of similar rectilineal figures. Mensuration of plane rectilineal figures and of the circle, the elementary properties of the plane, including those of the angles made by planes with straight lines and with one another, the elementary properties of the sphere and plane sections thereof, mensuration of simple solid figures, including the cylinder, cone, and sphere. Trigonometry.—The meaning of and elementary exercises

3. The highest bidder will be declared the purchaser, subject to the approval of the Conservator of Forests, and shall immediately on his being so declared deposit the necessary amounts as hereunder and sign his name in the Register of Sale in admission of such purchase :-

#### Bids up to Rs. 100.

The amount of the bid in full and security Rs. 20 to be deposited immediately on conclusion of the sale pending the approval of the Conservator of Forests.

#### Bids over Rs. 100 and up to Rs. 500.

50 per cent. of the bid and security Rs. 50 to be deposited immediately on conclusion of the sale pending the approval of the Conservator of Forests. Balance to be paid within 14 days of the approval of sale by the Conservator of Forests.

#### Bids over Rs. 500 and up to Rs. 1.000.

50 per cent. of the bid and security of Rs. 75 to be deposited immediately on conclusion of the sale pending the approval of the Conservator of Forests. Balance to be paid regularly in two monthly instalments within two months of the date of approval of the sale by the Conservator of Forests.

MUNICIPALITY OF KANDY.

Minutes of Proceedings of a Meeting of the Municipal Council of Kandy, held in the Town Hall, Kandy, on July 17, 1920, at 8.30 a.m., in accordance with Notice dated July 13, 1920.

Present .— The Hon. Mr. W. L. Kindersley, Chairman ; Mr. C. A. LaBrooy ; Mr. J. C. Ratwatte ; Mr. L. H. S. Pieris ; Dr. J. W. S. Attygalle ; Mr. F. L. Goonewardene ; Mr. G. E. de Silva ; and Dr. C. de Vos.

1. The Minutes of Proceedings of the Meeting held on June 19, 1920, having been previously submitted to the Ohairman for his approval and a copy thereof furnished to each Member, were taken as read and confirmed by the Chairman.

#### 2. The following documents were submitted :--

(a) Statement of receipts and disbursements from close of 1919 to June 30, 1920, on account of the Municipal fund.

(b) Progress report of works brought up to the same date.

(c) Health Officer's report for June.

(d) Statement of cases instituted by the several Inspectors and of work done by the Municipal Magistrate during the month of June.

(e) The reservoir readings for June.

Resolved that the statement (a), together with the Minutes of Proceedings of this Meeting, as required by section 83 of the Municipal Councils Ordinance, No. 6 of 1910, be forwarded to the Colonial Secretary for publication in the *Government Gazette*.

3. The following papers were laid on the table :--Reports by the several Inspectors on laundries, bakeries, dairies, standpipes, and house service taps inspected during June.

4. Correspondence: (1) Letter No. 20 of June 17, 1920, from the Hon. the Colonial Secretary forwarding copy of a letter addressed to the Deputy Assistant Adjutant-General, together with a copy of his reply in which he agrees to the lending of the Barracks at Kandy to accommodate the persons removed from plague infected areas.—Resolved that the Military Authorities be asked if they could spare further Barracks.

(2) Letter No. 21 of June 21, 1920, from the Hon. the Colonial Secretary *re* amendment to the "Butchers Ordinance, No. 9 of 1893," so as to limit the slaughter of buffaloes to only such animals as are fit for slaughter and not fit for agricultural purposes.—Read.
(3) Letter No. 22 of June 21, 1920, from the Hon. the Colonial Secretary intimating that Government has no

(3) Letter No. 22 of June 21, 1920, from the Hon. the Colonial Secretary intimating that Government has no objection to the strip of Municipal land situated at Mahaiyawa being leased to Trinity College, Kandy, on a rental of Rs. 5 per annum.—Resolved that the Principal, Trinity College, Kandy be informed that the Council is not authorized to grant more than a yearly lease, but that he need have no apprehension of being disturbed.

(4) Letter No. 23 of June 23, 1920, from the Hon, the Colonial Secretary intimating that Government is not prepared to alter the existing arrangements in regard to the distribution of tavern areas within the limits of the Municipality.—Read.
 (5) Letter No. 24 of July 6, 1920, from the Hon, the Colonial Secretary intimating that authority has been issued for the survey of the land to be acquired for preventing the contamination of the water supply.—Read.

(6) Letter of July 10, 1920, from the Superintendent of Works recommending the purchase of two tar boilers at a cost of Rs. 900 required for treating the streets with tar composition.—Resolved that the matter be referred to the Standing Committee on Municipal Works.

(7) Application from the two Government Sanitary Inspectors for the supply of raincoats.—Resolved that the application be refused.

(8) Application from the Assistant to the Medical Officer of Health for sanction to employ six more temporary Inspectors on Rs. 2 each per day for plague work and twenty-five more coolies.—Resolved that the sanction applied for be granted and that the permanent Inspectors be ordered to return to their ordinary duties as far as possible.

(9). Application from the Assistant to the Medical Officer of Health for lights for the Plague Office.—Resolved that the estimate submitted by the Colombo Gas & Water Company be passed and that they may be asked if they will reduce the charge if they got back the fittings at the end of occupation.

5. Pursuant to notice, Mr. de Silva asked-" Will the Chairman table for the information of Members the various sums expended during 1918, 1919, and 1920, on repairs and their upkeep of Lady MacCarthy's road, Lady Torrington's road, Lady Anderson's road, Lewella road, Lady Longden's Drive, and Lady Horton's road." The Chairman tabled the following information :-

Pursuant to notice, Dr. Attygalle asked- From what quarter will the rates be waived on premises within the 6. evacuated areas ?'

The Chairman replied that taxes in respect of houses vacated on the orders of the Council before June 30 would be remitted from the beginning of the 3rd quarter, and in respect of those vacated subsequently from the beginning of the 4th quarter.

Pursuant to notice, Mr. de Silva moved-(1) That the Superintendent of Works be instructed to erect a standpipe on the Malabar street beyond 1st milepost as early as possible ; (2) that immediate steps be taken to improve the road called Davie road at Watapuluwa; (3) that some lamps be placed in approved spots along the road at Watapuluwa. Mr. Pieris seconded.

It was agreed that the proposals be referred to the Works Committee and that the Superintendent of Works be asked to submit estimates for the same.

8. Pursuant to notice, Dr. Attygalle moved-" That this Council do accept the offer made by the Committee and Members of the Central Town Library to give over the Library to this Council to be conducted as a free library for the benefit of the public of Kandy, and that this Council do vote a sum not exceeding Rs. 150 per mensem for its upkeep under section 45 (1) of the Muncipal Councils Ordinance, No. 6 of 1910." Mr. Pieris seconded. The Chairman moved as an amendment—That a Special Committee be appointed to report on the age and condition

of the books and to go into the question of expenditure before the offer was accepted. Mr. LaBrooy seconded. The amendment was put to the Meeting and lost by 2 to 6.

Ayes .- The Chairman : Mr. LaBrooy. Noes .- Dr. Attygalle, Mr. Pieris, Mr. de Silva, Mr. Goonewardene, Mr. Ratwatte, and Dr. de Vos.

The original motion was then put to the Meeting and carried by 6 to 2.

Ayes .-- Dr. Attygalle, Mr. Pieris, Mr. de Silva, Mr. Goonewardene, Mr. Ratwatte, and Dr. de Vos. Noes .-- The Chairman and Mr. LaBrooy.

9. Papers re the proposed Infectious Diseases Hospital.—Resolved that the papers be circulated and that the question of incurring the expenditure of Rs. 50,000 for the buildings be considered at the next Meeting.

10. Papers re the proposed removal of the equestrian statue from its present position to a site in the gardens between the Victoria Commemoration Buildings and the Kandy Club.-Resolved that the Council is prepared to allow the proposed removal.

11. Papers re the proposal to lease the land adjoining the Mosque on Katugastota road to the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals on a ticket of occupancy.

Dr. Attygalle moved that the prior application for the lease on a nominal rent of Re. 1 per annum from the trustees

of the mosque be entertained. Mr. Ratwatte seconded—Carried. 12. To provide a sum of Rs. 301 · 12, temporary increases of pensions in accordance with the revised Government Scheme.-Resolved that the sum be provided.

13. Recommendations of Standing Committees :-

#### Finance and Assessment.

(1) That the payment of Rs. 15 to Mr. W. Mathiesz, substitute employed by the Superintendent of Works during the absence of his clerk on military duty be sanctioned.

(2) That W. Baron Perera, the man in charge of the people from the infected area lodged at the Barracks, be paid Rs. 15 per mensem.

(3) That Dr. V. L. Anthoniesz, who was acting as Assistant to the Medical Officer of Health from June 14 to 25, inclusive, be given the same scale of pay and allowances as his successor.

(4) That the bill for Rs. 26 · 60 for printing notices in connection with the "Clear up" day be paid.
(5) That the right to gather the produce of Roseneath and Amalgamated Estates be sold to A. Hamidu of No. 9, Nittawela, for the six months, July 1 to December 31, at Rs. 212 · 50, to be paid in advance with option of renewal for 1921 at Rs. 425 to be paid in advance.

#### Municipal Works.

(6) That water service be allowed on usual terms to :—(i)  $54\frac{1}{2}$ , Deyannewela, M. P. Bastian ; (ii) 23c, Colombo street, P. V. M. Madar Saibo.—Resolved that the recommendations be adopted.

Mr. Pieris seconded. The motion was put to the Meeting and lost by 3 to 5. Ayes.—Mr. de Silva, Mr. Pieris, and Mr. Ratwatte. Noes.—The Chairman, Mr. LaBrooy, Dr. Attygalle, Mr. Goonewardene, and Dr. de Vos.
 It was agreed on Mr. Pieris' suggestion to ask the Principal Civil Medical Officer to provide a proper nursing staff for the Laboration Discourse Hermital

for the Infectious Diseases Hospital. 15.

Pursuant to notice, Mr. Ratwatte moved-That the Council consider the desirability of constructing at an early date the Katugastota-Galagedera road as shown on plan dated August 15, 1920, prepared by the Superintendent of Works. Mr. LaBrooy seconded.

It was agreed to refer the matter to the Works Committee.

16. Present :--- The Hon. Mr. W. L. Kindersley, Chairman; Mr. C. A. LaBrooy; Mr. J. C. Ratwatte; Mr. L. H. S. Pieris; Dr. J. W. S. Attygalle; Mr. F. L. Goonewardene; Mr. G. E. de Silva; Mr. H. F. Tomalin; and Dr. C. de Vos. 1. Mr. Ratwatte moved-" That all recommendations of the Advisory Committee involving expenditure in

connection with plague should have the sanction of Council before being carried into effect. Mr. Goonewardene seconded.-Carried.

Mr. Pieris moved—" That in view of complaints made to the elected Members adequate steps be taken to ensure the comfort and well being of the contacts removed to the Segregation Camp, and that consideration be given to the isolation of such contacts in private residences approved by the Medical Officer of Health. Mr. Goonewardene seconded and handed in a letter from Mr. C. S. Rajaratnam on behalf of a Committee appointed by the residents of Kandy to consider matters

in a letter from wit. O. S. Augustanian on benaff of a Committee appointed by the residents of Nandy to consider matters relating to the outbreak of plague. The resolution was carried and it was agreed to sanction estimates for Rs. 1,400, submitted by the Superintendent of Works, for improvements to the Segregation Camp and for the construction of latrines at the Military Barracks, where the people from the evacuated areas were accommodated. 3. Dr. Attygalle proposed—"That the Sanitary Superintendent and four permanent Inspectors do revert to their

ordinary duties in their respective wards and the sanitation of the unaffected areas be more carefully looked after by them, the special plague staff looking after the infected areas." Mr. de Silva seconded.

Mr. Goonewardene spoke in support of the resolution. After some discussion, on the explanation of the Medical Officer of Health, who was also present at the Meeting, that the permanent Inspectors were attending to their ordinary duties as far as possible, the motion was withdrawn.

4. It was agreed to write to Government and inquire whether the Public Works Department would be able to spare for temporary employment under this Municipality a competent engineer who is acquainted with town-planning, and if so at what salary and for how long.

5. Infectious Diseases Hospital be appropriated for the immediate sanitary improvements of the town. Mr. de Silva seconded. -Carried by 5 to 4.

-Dr. Attygalle, Mr. de Silva, Mr. J. C. Ratwatte, Mr. L. H. S. Pieris, and Mr. F. L. Goonewordene. Ayes.--The Chairman, Mr. LaBrooy, Mr. Tomalin, and Dr. de Vos.

The successful tenderer will be required to deposit forthwith one-tenth of the purchase amount for twelve months in cash, and should the offer be accepted by His Excellency the Governor, to furnish approved security for one-half of the purchase amount for twelve months, or in cash for one-third of such amount, within thirty days of the date of the receipt by him of the notification of the Governor's acceptance of his offer.

He will also be required to deposit money to pay the fees of the Crown Proctors for examining and giving their opinion of the title deeds of properties tendered by him as security and for examining and settling the security bond, and the fees charged by the Crown Proctors for examining documents and drawing the security bond, the expenses of appraising the properties and of registering the security bond, and the stamp duty on the bonds under the Ordinance No. 22 of 1909.

All title deeds tendered as security should be accompanied by a certificate obtained from the Registrar of Lands that the lands to which they relate are unencumbered. This certificate must be obtained at the cost of the party offering the security.
