VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended January 22, 1921.

Births.—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 143 (4 Europeans, 13 Burghers, 75 Sinhalese, 17 Tamils, 27 Moors, 2 Malays, and 5 Others). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on January 1, 1921, viz., 300,171) was 24.8, as against 26.6 in the preceding week, 23.3 in the corresponding week of last year, and 24.5 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 194 (2 Europeans, 7 Burghers, 100 Sinhalese, 41 Tamils, 35 Moors, 4 Malays, and 5 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 33.7, as against 35.3 in the previous week, 33.6 in the corresponding week of last year, and 27.5 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 194 total deaths, 53 were of infants under one year of age, as against 63 in the preceding week, 25 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 33 the average for last year.

Stillbirths.—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 12.

Principal Causes of Death.—1. (a) Twenty-seven deaths from *Pneumonia* were registered, 7 in Slave Island, 6 in Maradana (including 2 deaths of non-residents in hospitals), 4 in Kotahena, 3 each in Kollupitiya and Wellawatta, 2 in New Bazaar, and 1 each in Pettah and St. Paul's, as against 25 in the previous week and 20 the weekly average for last year.

(b) Eleven deaths from *Influenza* were registered, 4 in Maradana (including 1 death of a non-resident in hospital), 2 each in St. Paul's and New Bazaar, and 1 each in San Sebastian, Slave Island, and Wellawatta, as against 7 in the previous week and 6 the weekly average for last year.

(c) Three deaths from *Bronchitis* were registered, 2 in St. Paul's and 1 in Kotahena, as against nil in the previous week.

2. Sixteen deaths from *Plague* were registered, 5 in St. Paul's, 3 in Maradana, 2 each in New Bazaar, Slave Island, and Kollupitiya, and 1 each in Kotahena and Wellawatta, as against 6 in the previous week and 3 the weekly average for last year.

3. (a) Thirteen deaths from *Phthisis* were registered, 4 in New Bazaar, 2 each in Kotahena and Maradana, and 1 each in Fort, St. Sebastian, Slave Island, Kollupitiya, and Wellawatta, as against 20 in the previous week and 14 the weekly average for last year.

(b) Three deaths of residents of Colombo Town occurred at the Ragama hospital from *Phthisis* during the week.

4. Five deaths from *Enteric Fever* were registered, 2 in New Bazaar, and 1 each in St. Paul's, Kotahena, and Maradana, as against 9 in the previous week and 6 the weekly average for last year.

5. Twenty deaths were registered from *Debility*, 18 from *Infantile Convulsions*, 7 from *Enteritis*, 5 from *Dysentery*, 4 from *Worms*, 3 from *Diarrhoea*, and 62 from *Other Causes*.

6. Twenty cases of *Plague*, 12 of *Chickenpox*, 12 of *Enteric Fever*, 7 of *Measles*, and 1 of *Smallpox* were reported during the week, as against 5, 20, 12, 5, and 3, respectively, of the preceding week.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 79.3°, against 78.7° in the preceding week and 78.7° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29.995 in., against 29.942 in. in the preceding week and 29.985 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 4.26 in., against 1.29 in. in the preceding week and nil in the corresponding week of the previous year.

- (5) Tests of educational qualifications corresponding to or not below any of the above, of which proof must be produced.

3. Candidates need only furnish copies of certificates, which will not be returned. No intimation will be given to unsuccessful candidates, nor will letters inviting attention to applications tendered be replied to.

4. ABSTRACTS OF SEASON REPORTS.

SEASON REPORTS FOR THE MONTH OF DECEMBER, 1920.

WESTERN PROVINCE.

COLOMBO DISTRICT.

Maha season : plants are doing well.

Dry grains : chenas have been sown with kurakkan and amu in Siyane korale east and Alutkuru korale north, and in other korales work in this connection has not yet begun.

Other products : prospects of coconuts are fairly good. The estimated crop for the month is 81,237,000 nuts. There is a fairly good supply of fruits and vegetables.

Prices of staple products : (a) the Government control of rice outside Colombo was withdrawn about the middle of the month, and imported rice is now sold at Rs. 6.40 to Rs. 7.50 per bushel ; (b) country rice is sold at Rs. 6 to Rs. 6.50 per bushel ; (c) coconuts are sold at Rs. 85 to Rs. 100 per thousand.

Harvest prospects : fair.

Rainfall : there was sufficient rain during the month.

Health of people : unsatisfactory. There were cases of measles, dysentery, enteric fever, typhoid fever, and a case of plague (at Egoda Kolonnawa in Colombo Mudaliyar's division) during the month.

Health of cattle : good. No cases of rinderpest or hoof-and-mouth disease occurred during the month.

KALUTARA DISTRICT.

Paddy : the maha cultivation is thriving well.

Dry grain : there was only a little dry grain cultivation in the district. Kurakkan sown in Galtude, Aruggoda, and Tantirimulla in the Panadure totamune is forming into ear.

Other products : fruit and vegetables were scarce, except in the totamunes, where the supply was as usual fair. The flowering of coconuts was good, and the month's crop is estimated at 1,937,000 nuts.

Prices of staple products : coast rice was sold at controlled prices for about three weeks, and during the last week of the month it was sold at 20 to 31 cents a measure. Coconuts sold at Rs. 80 to Rs. 100 per 1,000 nuts.

Remarks on harvest prospects generally : prospects of the maha harvest are satisfactory in Pasdun korale west. It is too early to pronounce an opinion with regard to the harvests in the other korales.

Rain : the rainfall during the month was rather heavy in Rayigam korale. There was rain in the totamunes and Pasdun korale west also during the month but not in Pasdun korale east. Total, 11.17 in. ; average, .36 in. per day in Kalutara.

Health of the people : on the whole good. There were a few cases of dysentery, fever, and chickenpox in some villages.

Health of cattle : good.

CENTRAL PROVINCE.

KANDY DISTRICT.

Paddy cultivation—yala : nil. Maha : transplanting being carried out. Some fields are blossoming.

Dry grain cultivation : Kurakkan chenas are earing.

Rainfall : sufficient.

Health of people : good.

Coconut cultivation : crops good.

Prices of staple articles : imported rice sold at controlled rates ; country rice, Rs. 7.50 per bushel ; paddy, Rs. 2.50 to Rs. 5 per bushel ; kurakkan, Rs. 4 per bushel ; coconuts, Rs. 7 to Rs. 10 per 100.

NUWARA ELIYA DISTRICT.

Rainfall : Nuwara Eliya town, 3.16 in.

Paddy : maha cultivation fields in Uda Hewaheta and Walapane are being ploughed. Some fields in Uda Hewaheta are also being harvested and others have young plants.

Dry grains : kurakkan chenas in Uda Hewaheta and Walapane have young plants.

Health of population : good, except for a few cases of chickenpox, measles, and influenza.

Health of cattle : good.

Prices of foodstuffs : paddy, Rs. 3.50 to Rs. 4 per bushel ; kurakkan, Rs. 3.50 to Rs. 5 per bushel ; Indian corn, Rs. 3.50 to Rs. 5 per bushel ; rice (coast), 30 to 38 cents per cut measure ; rice (country), 22 to 40 cents per cut measure ; coconuts, Rs. 10 to Rs. 16 per 100 nuts.

MATALE DISTRICT.

Rainfall : Matale, 2.68 in. ; Dambulla, 2.13 in.

Paddy : in plants.

Dry grain : in plants.

Coconuts : (a) flowering fair ; (b) 152,500 approximate crop.

Tanks in Matale North do not contain sufficient water.

Health of people : good, except for a few cases of dysentery, measles, sore eyes, and chickenpox in some villages.

Health of cattle : good.

Prices : fair.

SOUTHERN PROVINCE.

GALLE DISTRICT.

Maha crop promises to be satisfactory.

Dry grain is not cultivated in the division to any appreciable extent.

Coconuts, rubber, cinnamon, citronella, tea, and vegetables are the principal products. The estimated coconut crop for the month was 9,109,000.

Coast rice, reduced from Rs. 11.52 to Rs. 7.36 per bushel ; country rice, Rs. 11.20 per bushel ; paddy, Rs. 3.25 to Rs. 5.44 per bushel ; dry grain, Re. 1.50 to Rs. 5 per bushel ; coconut, Rs. 60 to Rs. 120 per 1,000 nuts.

The weather was wet during the early part of the month and dry during the latter part.

Harvest prospects are good.

The health of the people was on the whole satisfactory, but a few cases of measles, dysentery, chickenpox, and fever, and two cases smallpox occurred in the district.

Health of cattle was good.

MUNICIPALITY OF COLOMBO.

Minutes of Proceedings of a General Meeting of the Municipal Council of Colombo held in the Town Hall on Friday, December 3, 1920.

THE Council met this day at 3 P.M., pursuant to notice dated November 26, 1920.

Present :—Mr. B. G. de Glanville, Chairman; Mr. C. P. Dias; Mr. L. B. Fernando; the Hon. Mr. N. H. M. Abdul Cader; Mr. Arthur Alvis; Mr. H. L. de Mel, C.B.E.; Dr. E. V. Ratnam; Dr. W. P. Rodrigo; Mr. T. L. Villiers; Mr. F. R. Senanayake; the Hon. Dr. G. J. Rutherford; Mr. W. Philips; Mr. B. F. Khan; Mr. A. E. de Silva; Mr. A. E. Caldicott; Major W. H. Robinson; Mr. M. J. Cary; and Mr. E. W. Jayewardene.

1. The Minutes of the General Meeting of November 5, 1920, having been previously printed and copies thereof having been sent to each Member of Council, were taken as read.

Resolved that the Minutes of the General Meeting of November 5, 1920, be confirmed.

2. (a) The Chairman read the following :—*Human Plague* : Since the last meeting of Council, 35 cases of human plague have been recorded, of which 11 were septicaemic and 24 were bubonic in character. The unusually high proportion of bubonic cases is noteworthy. The grand total up-to-date this year is 160 cases, as against 65 cases during the corresponding period of last year.

Rat plague : Twenty-two further cases of rat plague have been detected, making total for the year up-to-date of 122 cases, as against a total of 57 during the corresponding period of last year. Most of the recent rat plague cases have occurred in the Dean's road, Rudd's lane area, which is evidently heavily infected, and, as was to be expected, a number of human cases has occurred in this same area.

(b) The Chairman read the following :—Since the last meeting of Council, 13 cases of smallpox have been recorded, making a total for this outbreak of 68 cases. Nine cases in all have so far been reported as fatal. In addition to the outbreak in the Kochchikade area, 2 small groups of cases occurred at Modera and Pettah respectively. Only 2 cases have occurred during the last 3 weeks, both in Slave Island, the last case being reported on November 27, 1920.

3. Pursuant to notice, the Chairman moved that this Council desire to place on record its regret at the death of Mr. P. D. Khan, a former Member of the Municipal Council, and to convey to his family an expression of its sympathy in their bereavement. Mr. C. P. Dias seconded.

The motion was put to the meeting and unanimously adopted, in silence, all Members standing.

4. The Chairman moved for permission of Council to move the motion No. 4 on the agenda.

The permission having been granted, the Chairman moved that a Special Committee of the Council be appointed to deal with the question of motor bus services in Colombo.

Members :—Mr. C. P. Dias; Mr. Arthur Alvis; Dr. E. V. Ratnam; Dr. W. P. Rodrigo; Mr. W. C. S. Ingles; Mr. A. E. de Silva; and Mr. A. E. Caldicott. The Hon. Mr. N. H. M. Abdul Cader seconded.—Carried.

Mr. C. P. Dias moved that the Council do go into Committee to consider items Nos. 5 to 9 (inclusive) on the agenda. Mr. L. B. Fernando seconded.—Carried.

The following extracts from the Minutes of the Special and the Standing Committees, named, were then laid before the Council in Committee :—

Extracts from the Minutes of the Four Standing Committees (Law, Sanitation, Finance and Works) of November 19, 1920.

(2) To consider a memorandum from Mr. J. A. Maybin, Acting Financial Assistant, with regard to the present arrangements for carrying on the work of the Finance Department and the steps to be taken to meet the situation.—Recommended that the Chairman be authorized to secure the best assistance obtainable up to the available salary, such arrangements to continue till the assumption of duties by the permanent Financial Assistant.

(3) To consider the reply from Mr. F. G. Morley, the Acting Colonial Auditor, with regard to the request that he should hold an examination for the selection of an accountant for the Finance Department.—Recommended :—(1) That an examination be held in accounting and that another examination be held in general knowledge; (2) That only the 33 original applicants who have already applied be allowed to take up the examination on payment of a fee of Rs. 10 per head; (3) That a fee of Rs. 10 per candidate, with a minimum of Rs. 200 be paid for the examination in accounting; (4) That Mr. Watkins be asked to conduct the examination in accounting and that Mr. Maybin be asked to conduct the examination in general knowledge.

(5) To consider the question of motor bus services and the necessity for the alteration of the regulations affecting motor buses with a view to the service being established in Colombo.—Recommended that, as it is estimated that the additional expenditure which would be thrown upon the Council to upkeep the roads comprised in the proposed routes for motor bus services will be in the neighbourhood of Rs. 90,000, further fees will be required in addition to the fees now recoverable, to meet this expenditure either in whole or in part.

It is further recommended that the Inspector-General of Police be asked to depute an officer to draft, together with the Works Engineer of the Council, rules and regulations for motor buses, and to submit such draft for the consideration of the Committees.

(7) To consider two reports dated August 5 and September 8, 1920, from the Financial Assistant with regard to the system of paying commission to collectors.—Recommended that the scheme and scale of commissions recommended by the Financial Assistant, as follows, be sanctioned to come into force from January 1, 1921, with the exception of Kotahena A, where the present system should continue :—

Scheme and scale of commissions recommended by the Financial Assistant :—

One month's grace should be given after the end of a quarter before the warrant is issued. The warrant should then be issued for one month "for demand." At the end of that month it should be renewed and re-issued for two weeks for seizure. One month after seizure the properties still in default should be sold and the warrant should be accordingly re-issued for that month. After sale the warrant should be closed and recalled and all further collections should be made through the office thus :—March 31–April 30, a month of grace; May 1–May 31, Warrant issued for demand; June 1–June 15, Warrant re-issued for seizure; June 16–July 16, Warrant re-issued for sale; July 17, Warrant recalled and closed.

By August 1 the Collectors will have the next quarter's warrants in their hands and, meanwhile, their accounts can be gone into and commission paid. When this scheme is in working order, the following scheme *re* Commission is recommended :—(a) Demand month, 1 per cent. more than the present commission; (b) Seizure fortnight, present commission; (c) Sale month, 1 per cent. less than the present commission. After sale no commission.

Resolved further that the Financial Assistant be asked to report as to the advisability of confining commission to money collected by the collector himself.

Resolutions.

With regard to item No. 5, it was resolved that the consideration of the matter be deferred and be referred to the Special Committee appointed to consider the question.

With regard to item No. 7, Mr. C. P. Dias moved that the matter be deferred and be referred back to the Four Standing Committees, the papers being circulated meanwhile with the petition from the collectors. The Hon. Mr. N. H. M. Abdul Cader seconded.

Mr. E. W. Jayewardene spoke on the subject. The motion was put to the meeting and carried.

It was resolved that the recommendations of the Four Standing Committees with regard to the remaining items be adopted.

Extracts from the Minutes of the Special Committee on Drainage Works of November 22, 1920.

(2) To consider the correspondence with regard to Colombo Drainage Works Finances.—Recommended as in paragraphs 8 and 9 of the Chairman's Minute, dated November 22, 1920, viz.:—(a) The Council should accept the grant of Rs. 1,000,000 upon the conditions suggested by the Treasurer, with the exception that Government should remain liable for the expenditure in connection with the relaying of the sewers in the Fort area; (b) Subject to this exception, the Council may, upon receipt of the grant of Rs. 1,000,000, reasonably accept responsibility for financing any further expenditure upon the present modified Drainage Works Scheme.

(5) To consider a site plan and an estimate of Rs. 7,100 from the City Sanitation Engineer, for the acquisition of site and the erection of a night soil tipping depôt and storeroom at Temple road, Dematagoda.—Recommended.

(7) To consider the proposed alternative site for the Wolfendahl street latrine, as per plan No. 364, dated October 28, 1920, and signed by Mr. C. L. Cox, City Sanitation Engineer.—Recommended that the alternative site be approved.

Resolutions.

With regard to item No. 2 (corresponding to item No. 6 of the extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Finance of November 24, 1920), a discussion ensued in which Dr. W. P. Rodrigo, Mr. F. R. Senanayake, Mr. T. L. Villiers, and Mr. A. E. Caldicott took part.

Mr. T. L. Villiers moved the addition of the following as a proviso to part (b) of the recommendation of the Drainage Committee:—"and without prejudice to any claim that the Council may put forward for a revision of the whole basis of the contribution to the drainage scheme by Government and the Municipal Council." Mr. Arthur Alvis seconded.—Carried unanimously.

Resolved that the recommendations of the Special Committee with regard to the remaining items be adopted.

Extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Municipal Works of November 24, 1920.

(3) To consider the motion of Dr. W. P. Rodrigo, M.M.C., in Council on October 8, 1920, "That in future Municipal building works be open to public tender or that schedule prices be obtained from job contractors and work carried out on agreements, as is done by the Public Works Department, instead of by the Municipal staff."—Recommended that no hard and fast rule can be laid down, but that the Chairman should in each case consider the advisability of carrying out the work departmentally or otherwise on the advice of the engineer in charge.

(5) To recommend street lines for Wellawatta lane, as indicated in plan No. 1,766, dated October 26, 1920, and signed by Mr. C. H. Kilmister, Acting Works Engineer.—Recommended.

Resolutions.

With regard to item No. 3, Dr. W. P. Rodrigo and Mr. M. J. Cary spoke on the subject.

Resolved that the recommendation of the Standing Committee be amended by the substitution of the words "Standing Committee on Municipal Works" for the word "Chairman" and be adopted.

Resolved that the recommendation of the Standing Committee with regard to the remaining item be adopted.

(15) To recommend the purchase of one steam lorry for the transport of road metal.—Recommended.

Resolution of Council of November 5, 1920.

With regard to item No. 15, it was resolved that the consideration of the matter be deferred, and that the papers be circulated.

Resolution.

With regard to item No. 15, the Chairman stated that provision is made in the Draft Budget for 1921 for the purchase of two steam lorries, and the matter should, therefore, be considered at the Special Budget Meeting fixed for December 10, 1920.

It was resolved that the matter be deferred for consideration at the Special Meeting re Budget fixed for December 10, 1920.

Extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committees on Municipal Works and Finance (met together) of November 24, 1920.

(5) To consider a site plan and an estimate of Rs. 7,100 from the City Sanitation Engineer for the acquisition of site and the erection of a night soil tipping depôt and storeroom at Temple road, Dematagoda.—Recommended.

(6) To recommend the grant of a pension of Rs. 360 per annum to Mr. N. Ramalingam, Overseer, Works Department, on his retirement on February 28, 1921.—Recommended.

(8) To consider the proposed alternative site for the Wolfendahl street latrine as per plan No. 364, dated October 28, 1920, and signed by Mr. C. L. Cox, City Sanitation Engineer.—Recommended that the alternative site be approved.

(9) To consider a suggestion of the Acting Works Engineer, that the Museum road, which is in a state of very bad repair at present, in spite of an annual expenditure of Rs. 1,300 for its upkeep, be closed for all other traffic, except rickshaw, cycle, and pedestrian, providing for this purpose a roadway of 6 feet wide. The width saved from the road is to be thrown into the park and playing fields adjacent.—Recommended that, for the present, this road be closed to bullock carts and lorries.

(11) To consider:—(a) An application from the Chairman, Sanitary Board, Colombo District, inquiring whether, in view of the widening of a portion of the approach road to the Kalubovila Municipal Quarry by the Sanitary Board, the Council would agree to hand over free of charge, a piece of Municipal Council land in extent 13 perches to the Sanitary Board and also whether the Council would undertake the task of widening the existing road; (b) Report of the Acting Works Engineer on the application. Recommended that the land be handed over, and that metal for the construction of the road be given free on the understanding that, after the road is constructed, no further claim for maintenance or other works on this road be made upon the Council.

(12) To re-consider an application from Mr. J. M. Blizard, Acting Chief Assistant Engineer, Colombo Drainage Works, for the grant to him of the temporary increases in accordance with the new Government scheme, which has been granted to the Drainage Works Staff, as from June 29, 1920.—Recommended that Mr. J. M. Blizard is entitled to no further increase.

(13) To recommend the transfer of a sum of Rs. 12,000 to Vote I. 27, "Metalling roads" (Works Department), from the following votes:—Vote I. 30, "Repairs to Bridges, Culverts, Drains, &c.," Rs. 3,000; Vote I. 36, "Miscellaneous," Rs. 3,000; Vote I. 37/1, "Scavenging," Rs. 5,000; Vote I. 40, "Playgrounds," Rs. 1,000; Total, Rs. 12,000.—Recommended on the understanding that the other works will not be prejudiced.

(14) To consider an application from the Directors of the Minneriya Development Company for the services of Mr. W. M. Thyne, Waterworks Engineer, to report on a proposed cistern of filtration for the settlement on Minneriya Farm.—Recommended, provided the Chairman is able to make such arrangements as will not interfere unduly with Mr. W. M. Thyne's work for the Council.

Resolutions.

With regard to item No. 12, Mr. A. E. Caldicott moved that the matter be referred back to the Standing Committees on Works and Finance to further consider the question, and to ascertain whether Mr. Blizard is the only member of the Drainage Department who has not received the increase. Mr. C. P. Dias seconded.—Carried.

Resolved that the recommendations of the Standing Committees with regard to the remaining items be adopted.

(4) To recommend sanction for the payment of Rs. 450, being rent for the use of a portion of "Turret House" premises as a Rice Dépôt.—Recommended.

(14) To consider the proposed new system of sale of articles not required by the Council, by fixing the price in keeping with the fair value of an article and by advertising the fact of the article being available at that price, instead of by public auction, which tends to keep the prices low.—Recommended that the new system be adopted in any case in which the Chairman considers such course advisable.

(15) To recommend transfer of Rs. 350 from Vote H. (c) 21, Extras, Enteric Hospital, to Vote H. (c) 20, Diet, Enteric Hospital.—Recommended.

(16) To recommend the sale outright by public auction of premises No. 1,305/74, Alutmawata road, vested in Council under certificate of title No. 403 of April 16, 1920, as there is no prospect of the owner paying the arrears.—Recommended.

(17) To recommend reconveyance of premises Nos. 1,095, 1098/537, and 537B, Colombo-Galle road, vested in Council, to Edmund Francis Dissanayake, Administrator of the estate of Edwin Owen Wijayasinghe, on payment of all rates and costs which would have been due up to the end of the quarter in which the reconveyance may be signed, had the property not been vested in the Council. (A sum of Rs. 1,869.79 has been paid up to and including the 3rd quarter, 1920.)—Recommended.

(18) To consider the recommendations of the Acting Financial Assistant for extra remuneration to the following officers for overtime work in connection with the collection of assessment rates up to September 30, 1920:—Mr. G. (19) To recommend transfer of Rs. 600 from Vote L. 9, Rent of Office, to Vote L. 12 (Library) to meet cost of books ordered by Mr. A. T. Bennett, Municipal Assessor, with the sanction of Mr. Byrde.—Recommended.

(20) To consider the Colonial Auditor's report for the financial year ending December 31, 1919, and the Financial Assistant's observations thereon. Considered. To be submitted to Council.

(22) To recommend reconveyance of premises No. 1,382/179, Daniel's road, vested in Council, to A. D. Julina Hamine, and A. Dona Cecilina Hamine, on payment of all rates and costs which would have been due up to the end of the quarter in which the reconveyance may be signed had the property not been vested in the Council. (A sum of Rs. 411.30 has been paid up to and including the 3rd quarter, 1920.)—Recommended.

Mr. C. P. Dias moved that the Council do resume and that the resolutions of Council in Committee be adopted as amended. Mr. L. B. Fernando seconded.—Carried.

The Chairman formally moved in Council that the recommendations of the various committees, subject to any amendments of such recommendations by the Council in Committee, be adopted. Mr. L. B. Fernando seconded.—Carried.

10. The Draft Budget for 1921 containing (a) An estimate of available Municipal income; (b) Details of proposed expenditure as printed and published in the *Government Gazette* and circulated among the Members, according to the provisions of section 97 of Ordinance No. 6 of 1910, was submitted to the Council.

It was deferred for consideration by the Special Meeting of the Council called for December 10, 1920.

Mr. H. L. de Mel moved that the leave referred to in the following items, namely, Nos. 11 to 14 (inclusive), on the agenda be sanctioned. Mr. L. B. Fernando seconded.—Carried.

11. To sanction excess leave of 43 days over 42 days granted to Mr. F. E. Abeysekera, Sanitary Inspector, Public Health Department, owing to ill-health.

12. To sanction excess leave of 1 day over 42 days granted to Mrs. A. Cruse, Health Visitor, Public Health Department, owing to ill-health.

13. To sanction excess leave of 27 days over 42 days granted to Mr. S. C. Forbes, Sanitary Inspector, Public Health Department, owing to ill-health.

14. To sanction excess leave of 42 days over 42 days granted to Mrs. F. E. M. Harris, Health Visitor, Public Health Department, owing to ill-health.

"An hinged blade holder for rubber tapping knives."

Abstract :—

This invention consists of a swivel or hinge in the shank of a tapping knife so contrived that the upper portion of the shank which constitutes or holds the blade can be turned back on the lower part of the shank in such a manner as to enable the knife to be used for a pull cut instead of a push cut, or *vice versa*.

The swivel or hinge is suitably milled or grooved or otherwise arranged for the purpose of holding in any desired position the upper portion of the shank above described with the minimum amount of pressure from the screw or nut, the head of which is triangular in shape.

The claims are :—

1. An hinged blade holder contrived substantially as described and illustrated so that any tapping knife to which it is fitted can be used as a push or pull cutting knife as required.
2. An hinged blade holder of which the hinge can be secured in any desired position by means of a triangular headed nut or screw.

"Improvements in aerial systems employed in wireless signalling."

Abstract :—

This invention relates to the aerial systems employed in wireless signalling, and its object is to provide an improved system in which the well known heart-shaped polar diagram can be readily obtained for ascertaining the bearing of a station, or for eliminating, jamming, or for other purposes.

According to this invention a differential transformer, the secondary of which is shunted by a variable condenser by means of which the system can be tuned, is employed. One primary is connected either to a pair of frame aerials through a tightly coupled radiogoniometer or to a rotating frame aerial, and the other primary is connected to earth and to middle points of the bases of the two frames or to the middle point of the base of the rotating frame. The necessary phase and amplitude adjustment is provided by the insertion of a resistance in series with one of the primary windings.

The only tuning required is effected by means of the condenser, and in practice the phases remain unaltered over wide ranges of wave length.

The claim is :—

In a wireless aerial system, the combination of a frame aerial a differential transformer, one primary of which is connected to the frame, the other primary being connected to earth and to the frame in such a manner as to form an aerial with uniform radiation, and a resistance in series with one of the primaries, substantially as described.

"A method of selecting the proper grades of lubricant for use in any given internal combustion engine or motor."

Abstract :—

The nature of the invention is indicated in the claims which are as follows :—

The method of determining suitable grades of lubricant for machines which consists in providing an arbitrary scale representing grades of oil, grouping the characteristics of machine construction and conditions of use which affect lubrication, assigning values to the factors affecting each group, selecting appropriate factors, one from each group, and adding said factors, the values of said factors being such with relation to said scale that the sum of the factors selected equals a scale designation corresponding to the required grade of oil.

A protector for the heels of boots and shoes as claimed by claims 1, 2, and 3, characterized in that the pad member consists of a rubber backing provided with a pad formed in one therewith, and that the reinforcing member consists of a grid or leather, leather compo or other suitable material of a shape to conform to that of the heel and provided with cut-away or recessed portions for the reception of the rubber pad, as herein described.

7. A modification of the preceding claim, characterized in that the grid is formed of separate pieces to suit various sizes and shapes of heels, as herein described.

Abstract :—

The nature of the invention is indicated in the claims which are as follows :—

A new industrial and complete process for rapidly preparing raw rubber of high grade, and of substantially uniform quality, directly from rubber latex, which process can be operated either at the rubber estates, or after the latex has been transported to America, Europe, or elsewhere, and which consists in the combination of several consecutive and,

when so employed, conjointly operative treatments, the first of which is treating the latex, as soon as practicable after being tapped from the rubber trees, with a dilute aqueous solution of alkalised phenol (whether said phenol be of the creosote, carbolic, or cresylic series) which preserves the latex in a fluid and sound condition for any required length of time prior to coagulation, which constitutes the second treatment of the latex, and consists in adding thereto, a dilute solution of a suitable acid or an acidified aqueous solution of a soluble salt of magnesia in sufficient quantity to neutralize the alkalinity of said preservative treatment and acidify the latex, whereby energetic coagulation of the contained rubber in the latex takes place, while the bulk of the impurities originally contained in the latex remains in solution in the mother liquor, then subjecting the coagulum of rubber thus obtained to a suitable form of mechanical dehydrating treatment, and rolling it into sheet or crepe, which may thereafter be rolled up on itself and kneaded into solid round bars, or pressed into blocks, or other preferred form, whereby a continuous output of high grade raw rubber of approximately uniform quality is rapidly obtained in a marketable condition, while the hitherto ordinarily employed and tedious operations of evaporative drying and/or smoking are entirely eliminated, all substantially as hereinbefore described.

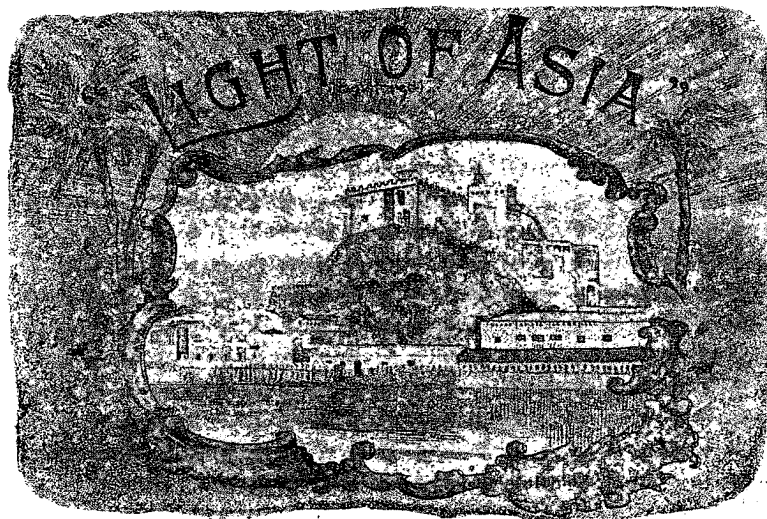

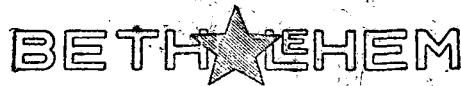
