**K**NOW Ye that We, the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, under and by virtue of the powers in Us vested by section 51 of “The Patents Ordinance, 1906,” being satisfied that the Legislature of British India has made satisfactory provision for the protection in such possession of inventions patented in Ceylon, do hereby order that all the provisions of section 50 of the said Ordinance relating to the protection of inventions patented in England shall apply to inventions patented in British India, and shall take effect as from September 2, 1920.

## "THE CENSUS ORDINANCE, 1900."

**R**ULES made by His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, under sections 5, 10, 12, 13, 14 of "The Census Ordinance, 1900."

## Rules referred to.

## Under Section 5 (2) (a).

1. All persons appointed as enumerators under section 7 of the Census Ordinance, No. 9 of 1900, shall be bound to attend for instructions or inspection at such places, on such dates, and at such hours, as may be specified by the Supervisors, by the Commissioners of Census, or by the Superintendent of Census.

2. Census Officers are prohibited from disclosing to any unauthorized person information collected for the purpose of filling up the Census Schedules or entered therein.

## Under Section 5 (2) (b).

1. The particulars regarding which information shall be obtained for the purposes of the Census fixed, by Proclamation, to be taken on March 18, 1921, are the following: Name, religion, sex, civil condition, age, race, birthplace, occupation, literacy, infirmity.

2. The necessary information shall be obtained from any person with regard to himself or herself, or with regard to any of the members of his or her family.

3. In general, the necessary information shall be obtained by the Census Enumerators putting questions to the necessary persons. In particular cases it may be obtained by the particulars being recorded by householders and others.

## Under Section 5 (2) (c).

The schedule, to be prepared by the Superintendent of Census for the purpose of being filled in with the necessary particulars, shall be in the following form:—

## Under Section 10.

1. Every Census Officer may ask any questions which may be necessary to enable him, from the answers thereto, to enter the required particulars in the prescribed form of schedule in accordance with the following instructions:—

## How to fill up the Heading and Columns.

**Heading (Schedule Number).**—This is the serial number of the schedule in the Enumeration Book. The first schedule in the book will be numbered 1 against this heading, the second 2, and so on to the end of the book. This heading must be filled in immediately the schedules are bound into the book.

**Column 1 (Census Number of Building).**—This is the number marked, for the Census, on the building or group of buildings. It also appears in column 1 of the Block List. The number of the building must be repeated for each inmate.

**Column 2 (Name).**—Enter first the chief resident member of the family, whether male or female; then the other members of the family in order of age; next the resident servants, if any; lastly, visitors, if any. If a child has not been named, enter "Not named." Ge names need not be entered. If the building is empty, write "empty" in this column. Empty buildings will, therefore, have the number entered in column 1, "empty" in column 2, and a blank line above and below. Similarly, in the case of "institutions," except that the word "institution" will be entered in column 2.

**Column 3 (Religion).**—Enter the religion, as Buddhist, Hindu, Parsi, Muhammadan, &c. In the case of Christians, enter the sect, thus: Church of England, Roman Catholic, Wesleyan, Baptist, Independent Catholic, Dutch Presbyterian, Scotch Presbyterian, Salvationist, &c. "Protestant" is not sufficiently exact, and should not be used. If the person has no religion, enter None, or Freethinker, or Agnostic, &c., according to the person's statement. (Note that "Hindu" means a worshipper of Siva, Vishnu, or other Indian deity. In the case of Tamils stating that they are Buddhists, or Sinhalese stating that they are Hindus, ascertain carefully whether they mean that they go to a kovil or to a pansala, and enter Hindu or Buddhist accordingly.)

**Columns 4 (a) and 4 (b) (Sex).**—For males enter M in column 4 (a). For females enter F in column 4 (b).

**Column 5 (Unmarried, &c.).**—Enter each person, whether infant, child, or grown up, as either unmarried, married, widowed, or divorced. Divorced persons who have married again should be entered as "married" and not as "divorced." As to whether a man and woman are married or not, accept the statements made by them. The entry "divorced" should only be made if a legal divorce has been obtained.

**Column 6 (Age last Birthday).**—Enter the number of years completed, thus, a person aged 25 years and 10 months would be entered as 25. For infants less than one year old enter "Infant." Absurd replies about age should not be accepted. The Enumerator should enter what appears to him to be the real age of each individual. Every effort should be made to find out the correct age of each person, e.g., by comparing ages of members of a family whose relative ages may be known.

**Column 7 (Race).**—Enter the race of each person, as Sinhalese, Tamil, Moor, Burgher, English, French, &c. General terms, such as British, Ceylonese, &c., should not be used. Enter English, Scotch, Irish, Sinhalese, Tamil, Burgher, &c. In the case of a Sinhalese, state whether Kandyan or Low-country. In the case of a Tamil or Moor, state whether Ceylon Tamil or Moor, or Indian Tamil or Moor. Ceylon Tamils and Moors are Tamils and Moors permanently settled in Ceylon, e.g., the Tamils of the Northern and Eastern Provinces; Puttalam, Batticaloa, and Hambantota Moors, &c. Indian Tamils and Moors are Tamils and Moors who are only working or trading in Ceylon away from their coast, and whose homes are in India. In general, the decision as to whether a person is a Ceylon or Indian Tamil or Moor will depend on the person's statement as to which country he himself regards as his home. But labourers and coolies must be entered as Indian Tamils or Moors, unless they can trace their origin to a Tamil or Moor district in Ceylon. The offspring of parents of different races will follow the father's race. In the case of a Vedda, enter "Vedda."

**Column 8 (Birth District or Town).**—In the case of persons born in Ceylon outside a town, enter the name of the district, e.g., Colombo, Negombo, Kandy, Nuwara Eliya, Galle, Matara, Jaffna, Mannar, Ratnapura, Kegalla, Chilaw, Puttalam, &c., and not the name of the village in which the person was born. In the case of persons born in towns, enter Colombo Town, Gampola Town, Moratuwa Town, &c., taking care to differentiate between the town and district by adding the word "Town" in the case of persons born

in towns. In the case of persons born in India, enter the district as far as can be ascertained, thus: India, Tinnevely; India, Cochin. Persons born in India should be asked the name of the Taluk (தாலுக) or District in which they were born; if they cannot say, they should be asked the name of the Zilla (ஜில்லா) or Province. If this information cannot be obtained, the name of the town or village, or such other place name they can give, should be obtained. The province can always be traced if the name of the nearest Post Office to the place where they were born can be given. In the case of persons born out of Ceylon or India, enter the country, thus: China, England, France, &c.

Columns 9 (a) (Principal Occupation or Means of Subsistence of Earner); 9 (b) (Subsidiary Occupation or Means of Subsistence of Earner); 10 (If not Earner, Principal Occupation or Means of Subsistence of Persons on whom dependent) are the most difficult columns in the schedule to fill up, and the following points should be carefully studied and borne in mind:—

(1) The first distinction is between "Earner" and "Non-Earner." "Earners" include both workers and persons of independent means, derived, say, from shares, pensions, rents, the work of others, &c. "Non-Earners" include children, women, old and infirm persons, who do not earn money or means of subsistence, and have no means of their own. But women and children who help to augment the family income are "earners." A woman who makes lace, baskets, hoppers, &c., or is engaged as telephone operator, typist, &c., and earns money by her work, or who regularly assists her husband in his work, is augmenting the family income, and is an "earner." But a woman who looks after her house and cooks the food does not augment the family income, and is a "non-earner." Boys at school or college are non-earners. Domestic servants are "earners." Persons temporarily out of employ should be shown as following their last occupation. Begging should be regarded as an occupation or means of subsistence, and persons making a livelihood out of begging should be entered in column 9 (a) as "earners." For "earners" column 9 (a) and possibly 9 (b) will show the occupation or means of subsistence. For "non-earners" the principal occupation or means of subsistence of the persons on whom they are dependent will be shown in column 10, and columns 9 (a) and 9 (b) will be left blank. Thus, if a man lives by cultivating his own land, say, with tobacco or paddy, and his wife and children assist him in that cultivation, they will be all entered in column 9 (a), he as "tobacco (or paddy) cultivator and proprietor," and they as "tobacco (or paddy) cultivators." Again, if the head of a family is a lawyer, and his wife and children have no independent means of subsistence, enter opposite the name of such wife or child in column 10 "advocate" or "proctor," as the case may be, and leave column 9 (a) and 9 (b) blank.

(2) The second distinction is between "principal" and "subsidiary" occupation or means of subsistence (columns 9 (a) and 9 (b)). The "principal" occupation or means of subsistence is that which brings in the largest income, or that on which the earner depends most for a livelihood. The "subsidiary" occupation or means of subsistence is the means of livelihood on which the earner depends, in addition to the previous. Only one—the most important—"subsidiary occupation or means of subsistence" may be entered in column 9 (b). If the earner has no subsidiary occupation, enter "None" in column 9 (b). It should be noted that the relative importance of occupations or means of subsistence is to be judged from their importance as sources of income or means of livelihood.\* Column 9 (a) and 9 (b) will always be blank for "non-earners."

(3) The exact occupation or means of subsistence must be entered. Vague terms like "merchant," "trader," "planter," "coolly," &c., must be made definite by adding the kind of merchandise, trade, labour, &c., thus: "rice merchant," "piece goods merchant," "general merchant," &c., "cloth trader," "cocoa dealer," "general trader," "tea planter," &c., "tea estate plucking cooly," "rubber estate tapping cooly," "Local Board conservancy cooly," "odd job cooly," &c. Similarly, "clerk" will not be used, the correct entry being "Kacheheri Gansabhawa clerk," "District Court translator," "Municipal Accounts clerk," "proctor's accountant," &c. Persons cultivating their own land will be entered as "paddy owner and cultivator," "coconut planter and proprietor," &c. If a person makes the articles he sells, he will be entered as "maker and seller of combs," "maker and seller of baskets," &c.

(4) In the case of non-earners depending on several earners with different occupations or means of subsistence, column 10 should show the occupation or means of subsistence of the person who contributes most to the maintenance of the dependents.

(5) It must be carefully noted that columns 9 (a) and 10 cannot be filled up for the same person; also that if there is an entry in column 9 (b), there must be one in column 9 (a); also that if column 10 is entered, columns 9 (a) and 9 (b) will be blank.

Column 11 (Mother Tongue or other Language which can be read and written).—Enter in this column his mother tongue against each person who can read and write it. If he cannot read and write his native language, but can read and write another language, insert the name of that language. Enter "None" in case of inability to read and write any language.

Column 12 (a) (Whether able to read and write English).—Enter in this column against each person the word "Yes" if he can both read and write English; and if he cannot, "No" should be entered.

Column 12 (b) (Whether able to speak English).—Enter in this column against each person the word "Yes" if he can speak English. Able to speak English means able to conduct a short conversation, or understand and answer questions put, in English.

Column 13 (Deaf-mute from Birth, Insane, Totally Blind).—If any person be deaf and dumb from birth, or of unsound mind, or totally blind, enter the name of the infirmity in this column. Do not enter those who are blind of one eye only or who have become deaf and dumb after birth.

Column 14 (Serial Number of Persons in the Enumeration Book).—This column is not to be filled in till after the Final Census. Then, the first person in the book will be numbered 1, the second 2, and so on right through to the end of the book without any break for the different schedules. Thus, if the last entry in column 14 of schedule number 8 is 81, the first entry in column 14 of schedule number 9 will be 82.

2. He may, for example, ask the following questions, but if the answers do not contain the information required by the preceding rule, additional questions may be asked till it is obtained:—

#### Questions for the Preliminary Census.

(Note.—The questions need not be put to any person who is certain not to be residing in the building or taking his meals from it on March 18, 1921.)

Col. 2.—What is your name?

Col. 3.—What is your religion? (In case of Christians) To what sect of Christians do you belong?

Col. 5.—Have you ever been married? If you have, have you a wife (or husband) now alive? (To persons who say they are divorced) Have you obtained a legal divorce?

Col. 6.—How old are you; that is, how many years have you completed?

Col. 7.—What is your race? If Sinhalese, are you Kandyan or Low-country? If Tamil or Moor, are you a Ceylon or Indian Tamil or Moor? Is your home on the Coast in India?

Col. 8.—Were you born in this Town or District (as the case may be)? If not, in what Town or District? If not in Ceylon, in what country? If in India, in what District of India?

Cols. 9 (a), 9 (b), 10.—Do you earn your livelihood by working? Or have you independent means? Do you augment the family income by your work? [If any of the answers is Yes, an entry must be made in column 9 (a). If all the answers are No, 9 (a) will be blank, but column 10 will have an entry. If any answer be Yes] What is your principal occupation or means of subsistence, that is, the employment which brings you in the greatest income? [for column 9 (a)]. Have you any other occupation or means of subsistence? [for column 9 (b)]. What is your exact employment? If merchant, in what merchandise do you deal? If trader, what is your trade? If landowner, what is the principal cultivation on the land? Do you both own it and cultivate it? Do you let out any land? Do you make more out of that than from the land you cultivate yourself? [If the answers to all the questions at the beginning are No] What is the principal occupation or means of subsistence of the person on whom you are dependent? [for entry in column 10]. In the case of infants and children, the information will be got from their parents or the persons in charge of them.

Col. 11.—Can you read and write your own language? Can you read and write any language? (Insert the native or other language of your informant if the answer is Yes; if No, write None.)

Col. 12 (a).—Can you both read and write English?

Col. 12 (b).—Can you talk in English? Can you understand a question put to you in English and reply in English?

Col. 13.—Inquire from whoever in the building can give you this information whether any inmate is deaf and dumb and has been so from birth. In case of blind, whether they are totally blind. Ask if any one in the building is insane.

3. Every Census Officer may ask such questions as may be necessary to enable him to ascertain whether any person has been already included in the Census returns.

\* But unpaid headmen must show their employment under Government in column 9 (b).

## NOTICES CALLING FOR TENDERS.

TENDERS are hereby invited for the under-mentioned supply of firewood to the Railway Department from the North-Central Division for one, two, or three years. The work is to commence not later than April 1, 1921. Details of the work and area to be exploited are given in the schedule below.

2. All tenders should be in duplicate and sealed under one cover, and should be addressed to the Chairman of the Tender Board, Office of the Controller of Revenue, Colombo.

3. Tenders should either be deposited in the tender box in the Office of the Controller of Revenue, or be sent through the post.

4. Tenders should be marked "Tender for Railway Firewood Supply, North-Central Division," in the left hand top corner of the envelope, and should reach the Office of the Controller of Revenue not later than midday on Tuesday, March 8, 1921.

5. The tenders are to be made upon forms which will be supplied upon application at the Forest Office, Anuradhapura. No tender will be considered unless it is on the recognized form. Alterations must be initialled, otherwise the tenders may be treated as informal and rejected.

6. A deposit of Rs. 20 will be required to be made either at the Treasury or Kachcheri, and a receipt produced for the same before any form of tender is issued. Should any

person decline or fail to enter into the contract and bond after he has tendered, or to furnish approved security within ten days of receiving notice in writing from the Head of the Department, or his duly authorized representative, that his tender has been accepted, such deposit will be forfeited to the Crown, and the defaulter will render himself liable to be included in the list of defaulting contractors precluded from having any concern in a Government contract. All other deposits will be returned upon signature of a contract.

7. Contract may not be assigned or sublet without the authority of the Tender Board previously obtained.

8. The contractor must not issue a power of attorney to a person whose name is on the list of defaulting contractors authorizing him to carry on the contract.

9. Further, the contractor shall not employ any person whose name is in the list of defaulting contractors, nor any person whom the Assistant Conservator of Forests, for reasons which appear to him sufficient, objects to after giving due notice in writing.

10. Each tender must be accompanied by a letter signed by two responsible persons, whose addresses must be given, engaging to become security for the due fulfilment of the contract.

11. Sufficient sureties will be required to join in a bond for the due fulfilment of the contract. The amount of the

bond, and all other necessary information can be obtained upon application at the office referred to in section 5. A further security in cash of 5 per cent. of the value of contract will be required of the contractor when entering into the bond.

12. Tenderers should read and note a draft contract which is available in the Forest Office, Anuradhapura, before they obtain tender forms. Also certify that they have inspected the demarcated blocks and the enumerated trees.

13. A penalty of 25 cents for every cubic yard of firewood not felled or stacked or delivered at the monthly rates specified in the schedule below will be exacted from the contractor.

14. No tender will be considered unless in respect of it all the conditions above laid down have been strictly fulfilled.

15. The Government reserves to itself the right, without question, of rejecting any or all tenders, and of accepting any portion of a tender.

16. Alternative rates per cubic yard of firewood delivered must be quoted written, both in words and figures for one, two, or three years.

17. Each piece of wood to be 3 feet in length and of 2 inches minimum diameter. Billets over 9 inches diameter should be split. All wood over 12 inches girth to be billeted into 3 feet lengths by hand saw or crosscut saw only.

18. All felling and splitting of logs to be completed by August 31, of the first, second, or third year.

19. All firewood immediately after conversion is to be transported and stacked at the delivery depot at the minimum rate of 1,650 cubic yards per month. This work to be completed by September 30 of the first, second, or third year.

20. For any further information application should be made to the Assistant Conservator of Forests, North-Central Division, Anuradhapura.

#### SCHEDULE.

##### *Madawachchi Proposed Reserve.*

To fell, transport, and deliver stacked along the Northern Railway Line at Madawachchi (according to special conditions) 10,000 cubic yards of firewood more or less annually for one, two, or three years from the Madawachchi proposed reserve. Extent to be worked annually is 50 acres.

Distance of transport about 1 mile.

##### *Special Conditions.*

The blocks enumerated in the schedule have all been demarcated.

2. Felling is to be done in each block commencing from one end and continuing to the other, taking 50 acres annually for first, second, or third year, including also the removal of the existing wind belts.

3. Excepting enumerated trees, all felled trees together with every other fallen tree whatsoever to be split and converted into firewood.

4. All grass, shrubs, undergrowth, and refuse remaining over in annual blocks after the fuel has been removed is to

be heaped together and burnt off by September 15 of the first, second, or third year.

5. The entire areas must be in a complete state of fitness throughout for planting, and must contain no stumps of green growth of any nature by September 30, 1921, 1922, or 1923.

## VITAL STATISTICS.

### Registrar-General's Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended February 5, 1921.

**Births.**—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 151 (5 Burghers, 93 Sinhalese, 14 Tamils, 26 Moors, 10 Malays, and 3 Others). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on January 1, 1921, viz., 300,171) was 26·2, as against 23·6 in the preceding week, 22·3 in the corresponding week of last year, and 24·5 the weekly average for last year.

**Deaths.**—The total deaths registered were 151 (4 Burghers, 69 Sinhalese, 28 Tamils, 33 Moors, 12 Malays, and 5 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 26·2, as against 33·2 in the previous week, 30·3 in the corresponding week of last year, and 27·5 the weekly average for last year.

**Infantile Deaths.**—Of the 151 total deaths, 27 were of infants under one year of age, as against 38 in the preceding week, 27 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 33 the average for last year.

**Stillbirths.**—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 18.

**Principal Causes of Death.**—1. (a) Twenty-one deaths from *Pneumonia* were registered, 5 in Maradana (including 1 death of a non-resident in hospital), 4 each in Slave Island and Kollupitiya, 3 in Kotahena, 2 in Wellawatta, and 1 each in Fort, Pettah, and St. Paul's, same as in the previous week. The weekly average for last year was 20.

(b) Six deaths from *Bronchitis* were registered, 2 each in New Bazaar and Maradana (including 1 death of a non-resident in hospital), and 1 each in Kotahena and Wellawatta, as against 3 in the previous week.

(c) Four deaths from *Influenza* were registered, 1 each in St. Paul's, New Bazaar, Maradana, and Slave Island, against 6 in the previous week and 6 the weekly average for last year.

2. Twelve deaths from *Phthisis* were registered, 3 each in Kotahena and Slave Island, 2 each in New Bazaar and Kollupitiya, and 1 each in Pettah and Maradana (of a non-resident in hospital), as against 17 in the previous week and 14 the weekly average for last year.

3. Eight deaths from *Plague* were registered, 3 in Maradana, 2 each in Pettah and St. Paul's, and 1 in New Bazaar, as against 14 in the previous week and 3 the weekly average for last year.

4. Five deaths from *Enteric Fever* were registered, 2 in St. Paul's, and 1 each in New Bazaar, Slave Island, and Kollupitiya, same as in the previous week. The weekly average for last year was 6.

5. Fourteen deaths were registered from *Debility*, 13 from *Enteritis*, 8 from *Infantile Convulsions*, 7 from *Worms*, 5 from *Dysentery*, 1 from *Diarrhoea*, and 47 from *Other Causes*.

6. Fourteen cases of *Chickenpox*, 9 of *Plague*, 8 of *Enteric Fever*, 5 of *Measles*, and 1 of *Smallpox* were reported during the week, as against 17, 15, 8, 9, and 3, respectively, of the preceding week.

**State of the Weather.**—The mean temperature of air was 78·4°; against 81·1° in the preceding week and 80·1° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29·981 in., against 29·983 in. in the preceding week and 30·008 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was, 0·75 in., against 0·40 in. in the preceding week and nil in the corresponding week of the previous year.

#### Samples.

Samples exported under this license may be used only for genuine sample purposes, *i.e.*, for obtaining orders from foreign buyers, and may not be sold except with the written consent of the Import and Export Licensing Section ; but such consent may be dispensed with when it is desired to sell the articles in the country of destination after they have fulfilled their purpose as samples. Exporters will be required to satisfy the Customs Authorities that the goods presented for export under this license are *bona fide* samples, and to make a declaration to that effect on the relative shipping documents.

This notice only applies to samples of goods which require licenses for export to the particular destination concerned.

In addition, the consent of the Import and Export Licensing Section is not required for the sale of samples which, though within this scheme at the actual time they were exported, could be exported outside the scheme at the actual time of the proposed sale.

#### Open General License for the Export of Smooth-bore Guns and Munitions for use therewith.

In accordance with Article 6, Chapter 2, of the "Convention for the Control of the Trade in Arms and Ammunition," all consignments of arms and ammunition proceeding into or through any of the prohibited areas set out below will require a Specific Export License.

The prohibited areas are :—

(1) The whole of the Continent of Africa, with the exception of Algeria, Libya, and the Union of South Africa. (Within this area are included all islands situated within a hundred nautical miles of the coast, together with Prince's Island, St. Thomas Island, and the Islands of Annobon and Socotra.)

(2) Transcaucasia, Persia, Gwadar, the Arabian Peninsula, and such continental parts of Asia as were included in the Turkish Empire on August 4, 1914.

(3) A maritime zone including the Red Sea, the Gulf of Aden, the Persian Gulf, and the Sea of Oman and bounded by a line drawn from Cape Guardafui, following the latitude of that cape to its intersection with longitude 57° east of Greenwich, and proceeding thence direct to the eastern frontier of Persia on the Gulf of Oman.

#### Open General License for the Export of Aircraft, &c.

An Open General License has been issued for the export of the under-mentioned goods to all destinations except Russia, Germany, Hungary, Austria, Turkey, and Bulgaria. Applications are no longer to be made to the Import and Export Licensing Section of the Board of Trade in respect of the export of these goods to countries other than those mentioned: "Aeroplane engines and their component parts. Aircraft other than balloons of all kinds, and their component parts, together with accessories and articles suitable for use in connection with aircraft."

#### Open General License for the Export of Parcels containing Miscellaneous Foodstuffs.

An Open General License has been issued for the export by parcel post of parcels containing one or more varieties of foodstuffs (for the personal use of the addressee and *not* for trading purposes) to all destinations with which trading is allowed, provided that any such parcel may not contain more than two pounds of sugar or more than one pound of butter. Applications need, therefore, no longer be submitted to the Import and Export Licensing Section in respect of the export of such parcels by parcel post.

#### Export of Coal, Coke, Briquettes, &c.

The export of coal, &c., is regulated by the Mines Department, Victoria street, London, S.W. 1. All communications respecting coal, &c., should be addressed to that Department.

#### Notes regarding Export to certain Countries.

Exporters are warned that there are import prohibitions in some foreign countries, information regarding which can be obtained from the Department of Overseas Trade, 35, Old Queen street, Westminster, S.W. 1., and 73, Basinghall street, E.C. 2. The issue of an export license implies no guarantee that the goods will be admitted into the country of destination.

There is no parcel post to *Estonia, Jugo-Slavia* (except *Dalmatia*), *Letland (Latvia)*, *Lithuania*, *Poland*.

*Germany*.—Gift parcels sent by parcel post may enter Germany without import license and also free from duty and taxes, provided they do not contain more than 2 kilos (70 oz.) of tobacco.

*Russia (European)*.—Conditions under which trading with European Russia will be permissible are at present under consideration.

*Syria*.—A parcel post service is in operation north of Acre to Alexandretta and west of Aleppo, including—

Beyrouf, Damascus, Hamah, Homs, Latakia, Rayak, and Tripoli.

*Turkey*.—Parcels for civilians in Turkey and Smyrna will only be accepted if they are fully addressed "c/o Poste Restante, British Army Post Office, Constantinople" (or Smyrna), and parcels must be called for at the British Post Offices.

**Urgent Orders.**

The Import and Export Licensing Section, Board of Trade, announces that firms receiving orders which require immediate acceptance may telegraph details of any such order to ascertain whether a license will be granted for the export of the goods if the order is accepted.

In the event of an applicant being promised a license he will be enabled to deal with the order straightaway with the knowledge that upon application being made in the proper form to the Import and Export Licensing Section (Board of Trade) the license will be granted.

The telegrams should be addressed to "De-estim, London." They should give in each case in addition to the name and postal or telegraphic address of the applicant the quantity and description of the goods comprised in the order and the country of destination. A reply of 24 words must be prepaid.

Applicants are requested in their own interest to confine their inquiries to orders needing a very urgent decision, since the fewer the inquiries the more promptly can answers be given.

**Entrance Examination for Excise Learners.**

NOTICE is hereby given that a competitive examination for Excise Learners will be held at Colombo on Friday and Saturday, March 4 and 5, 1921.

The time table is as follows:—

March 4, 1921—

9 A.M. to 9.30 A.M.: Tots.

9.30 A.M. to 11 A.M.: Arithmetic.

11 A.M. to 11.30 A.M.: Dictation.

12.30 P.M. to 2.30 P.M.: General English.

2.30 P.M. to 4 P.M.: Chemistry or Physics (oral English for those not taking up these subjects).

March 5, 1921, 9 A.M.: Oral English (continued).

Applications for admission to the examination will be received by the Excise Commissioner not later than February 6, 1921 (they should be sent in as early as possible).

The number of places open for competition cannot now be definitely stated, some men can be taken on promptly and others later on.

*Conditions.*

1. The entrance examination for Excise Learners is for candidates wishing to enter the Excise Department as Learners with a view to appointment as Excise Inspectors.

2. Applications for admission to the examination must be addressed to the Excise Commissioner, and must be made in the proper form. Forms are to be obtained from the Excise Commissioner on application.

3. (a) An application from any person in the Public Service of the Colony must be made in the proper form, and must be forwarded through the Head of the Department under whom he is serving. Such an application should contain a certificate from the Head of the Department that he is willing to spare the services of the applicant.

(b) Permanent Government employees who are appointed as Excise Learners may be regarded as being seconded from their permanent employment, until such time as they receive appointments as Excise Inspectors. If, however, they are eventually rejected as unsuitable for Inspectorships, they will be allowed to revert to their former positions in their departments, provided they have conducted themselves satisfactorily during the period of their attachment to the Excise Department.

4. (a) A certificate of the registration of a candidate's birth showing him to be on the first day of the examination between the ages of 20 and 25 (unless the Excise Commissioner decides to make a special exception), and one or more certificates of good character signed by a responsible person or persons\* to the satisfaction of the Excise Commissioner, must be attached to the application.

(b) An extract from a Baptismal Register will also be accepted, if the baptism took place within four months of the date of birth.

(c) Affidavits and horoscopes in support of the date of birth will not be accepted.

5. The Excise Commissioner will return to the candidate his application, approved or disapproved, as the case may be. The approved application will constitute the ticket of admission to the examination. Each candidate presenting himself for examination must affix to his application undefaced Ceylon stamps to the value of Rs. 5, and produce it, on the first day of the examination and when called upon to do so, to the officer appointed to supervise the examination. Stamps cut, torn, or in any way defaced will not be accepted. Any candidate failing to produce the form duly stamped, whatever may be the reason for doing so, will not be admitted to the examination.

6. All certificates sent in by a candidate will be returned to him together with his application.

7. Clerks of the Excise Department who have had two years' satisfactory service may be nominated irrespective of age by the Excise Commissioner, subject to the approval of Government, for direct entry into the class of Learners. Formal applications on the proper form should, however, be sent to the Excise Commissioner through their immediate superiors before the first day of the examination. Clerks so nominated must secure a pass in the examination prescribed by Condition 15, and are then eligible (subject to the

medical examination prescribed in Condition 9) for one out of every four vacancies.

8. The examination will be competitive, and will be held under the supervision of the Director of Education in the place or places which will be notified to the candidates allowed to take up the examination.

9. The candidates who obtain the highest aggregate marks in the examination will, subject to their other qualifications being considered satisfactory, be selected up to the number required for admission as Learners. Before any candidate is so selected, he must undergo and pass a medical examination as to his fitness for service in any part of the Island. The medical examination will be held by the Principal Civil Medical Officer, and a fee of Rs. 10 for such examination will be charged.

11. Any candidate failing to obtain half the marks allotted for Writing, Spelling, and Arithmetic, respectively, will be excluded from the remainder of the examination. Should any other candidate obtain less than one-third of the marks allotted for any of the subjects, General English, Physics, or Chemistry and English (oral), such marks will not be counted in his favour. A minimum of 50 per cent. of the total is required.

12. Selected candidates will be required to undergo a course of training as Learners for a probationary period, which will usually be about six months, part of which will be spent in office, and part in outdoor work under Superintendents or Assistant Superintendents of Excise or experienced Excise Inspectors.

13. Learners will receive a subsistence allowance of Rs. 35 per mensem while attached to an office, and, in addition, a commuted travelling allowance of Rs. 35 per mensem while employed in outdoor work.

14. The payment of the allowance is contingent on the satisfactory behaviour of the Learner. A Learner who does not satisfy the Excise Commissioner as regards progress in the study of Excise work and good behaviour is liable to lose part or the whole of any allowance payable to him or to summary rejection and forfeiture of his allowance at any time during the period of training.

15. At the close of the period of training or at such other time as the Excise Commissioner may direct the Learners will be required to take up the subsequent examination in the following subjects:—

- (a) General Excise Work (Part II. of the Excise Manual regarding existing Departmental Orders and a knowledge of the Departmental Circulars issued by the Excise Commissioner will be required).
- (b) (i.) Excise Law. (A knowledge of the Excise Ordinance and of the notifications issued thereunder will be required.)
- (ii.) Criminal Procedure Code (Sections 3, 11–12, 23–26, 33–37, 52–53, 70, 74–78, 133, 148–149, 167–168, 170–179, 187–199, 406–407, and 413 (i.)).
- (iii.) Ceylon Penal Code (Sections 19, 24–25, 75–76, 89–92, 101–109, 112, 138–139, 158–160, 181–186, 198–200, 214, 265, 340–342, and 344).

\* The candidate's teacher or school master by preference, or a member of the Public Service, a Justice of the Peace, Minister of Religion, or, generally speaking, some person whose name is known and to whom reference can readily be made.

(iv.) Evidence Ordinance (Sections 1-32, 53-54, 91-92, 101-106, 133, 137-138, 159-161).

(c) Colloquial Sinhalese or Tamil.

16. Learners who in the examination referred to in Condition 15 above have acquitted themselves to the satisfaction of the Excise Commissioner will be appointed to be Excise Inspectors as vacancies occur, on probation for three years, on a commencing salary of Rs. 50 per mensem, and commuted travelling allowance at sanctioned rate. During the period of waiting for appointment as Inspectors, Learners will continue to draw the allowance specified in Condition 13 above. Scale of salaries according to schedule.

17. Any Learner who has not done satisfactorily in the examination referred to in Condition 15 may be rejected, and will not be entitled to any allowance as from the day following that on which the decision of the Excise Commissioner as to his rejection has been officially notified to him in writing.

18. The Excise Commissioner may, if he thinks fit, extend the period of training of any Learner who has not been successful in the examination referred to in Condition 15.

15. At the end of such extended period the Learner will

be re-examined in the subjects specified in Condition 15 and will, if successful, be treated in accordance with Condition 16; if still unsuccessful, he will be finally rejected. The question of payment of any allowance during the extended period of training will be decided by the Excise Commissioner.

19. Learners who are rejected in terms of Conditions 14, 17, or 18 will not be eligible for admission to the Excise Department.

20. Leave to Excise Learners during the period of training will not be granted as a matter of course. The Excise Commissioner has the discretion of stopping either partly or wholly the payment of any allowance for the days during which the Learner has been on leave. Sick leave, if applied for, should always be supported by a medical certificate from a Government Medical Officer.

21. All persons passing into the Excise Department will be bound by such rules and regulations as have been, or may hereafter be, made for the Department.

## MUNICIPALITY OF KANDY.

Minutes of Proceedings of a Meeting of the Municipal Council of Kandy held in the Town Hall, Kandy, on December 22, 1920, at 4.30 p.m. in accordance with Notice dated December 17, 1920.

Present:—The Hon. Mr. W. L. Kindersley, Chairman; Mr. J. C. Ratwatte; Mr. L. H. S. Peiris; Dr. J. W. S. Attygalle; Mr. G. E. de Silva; and Dr. C. de Vos.

Before proceeding to the business of the day, the Chairman referred to the death of Mr. J. H. de Saram, C.M.G., who had been a member of this Council from September, 1911, to April, 1912, and moved—

“That the Council place on record an expression of their grief on the occasion of the death of Mr. J. H. de Saram, C.M.G., and convey their sympathy to the relatives.” Mr. Ratwatte seconded. The vote of condolence was passed in silence, all standing.

- The Minutes of Proceedings of the Meeting held on November 20, having been previously submitted to the Chairman for his approval, and a copy thereof furnished to each Member, were taken as read and confirmed by the Chairman.
- The following documents were submitted:—
  - Statement of receipts and disbursements from close of 1919 to November 30, 1920, on account of the Municipal Fund.
  - Progress report of works brought up to the same date.
  - Health Officer's report for November.
  - Statements of cases instituted by the several Inspectors and of Work done by the Municipal Magistrate during the month of November.
  - The reservoir readings for November.

Resolved that the statement (a), together with the Minutes of Proceedings of this Meeting, as required by section 83 of the Municipal Council Ordinance, No. 6 to 1910, be forwarded to the Colonial Secretary for publication in the Government Gazette.

- The following papers were laid on the table:—

Reports by the several Inspectors on laundries, bakeries, diaries, standpipes and house service taps inspected during November.

- (a) Mr. de Silva presented petitions from (1) A. Deldeniya and D. M. Abeygoonsekera re the occupation of premises Nos. 151 to 155, Trincomalee street; (2) R. M. Ukku Banda, toll renter of L. wella, re the condition of the boats at the ferry.—Resolved that (1) be referred to the Sanitary Inspector for report, and (2) to the Superintendent of Works for attention.

- (b) Dr. Attygalle presented a petition from L. E. Perera complaining of the blocking of a path in Mulgampola by the Mahandiram Nilame.—Resolved that the petition be referred to the Superintendent of Works for report.

- Correspondence: (1) Letter No. 42 of November 22, 1920, from the Hon. the Colonial Secretary, regretting that the decision that compensation to Municipalities should not be paid beyond the third year after the abolition of the old renting system cannot be reconsidered.—Read.

- (2) Letter No. 43 of December 10, 1920, from the Hon. the Colonial Secretary, intimating that in the event of the present sources of water supply proving to be insufficient to meet the requirements of Government at Peradeniya without prejudicing the supply to the area now served, the Government will agree to contribute a sum of Rs. 17,364.50 to the Municipal Council for the purpose of increasing the sources of supply.—Resolved that the Government terms be accepted.

- (3) Letter No. 44 of December 10, 1920, from the Hon. the Colonial Secretary, re enhanced temporary increase to pensioners of the Municipal Council of Kandy.—Resolved that the temporary increase be paid for twelve months from December 10, 1920.

- (4) Letter No. 46 of December 15, 1920, from the Hon. the Colonial Secretary, nominating the following gentlemen to be Councillors of the Municipal Council of Kandy for a period of three years from January 1, 1921:—Mr. H. F. Tomalin, Dr. C. de Vos, and Dr. G. P. Hay.

The Chairman referred to the valuable services rendered by the outgoing Members, Messrs. LaBroooy and Goonewardene, and moved—“That this Council do place on record their sense of the value of the services rendered to the Council

by Messrs. LaBrooy and Goonewardene." Mr. de Silva seconded, and Dr. Attygalle spoke in support of the resolution, which was carried unanimously.

(5) Endorsement No. 17 of December 9, 1920, from the Hon. the Colonial Secretary, *re* proposed loan of Rs. 500,000 to the Municipal Council for the construction of model dwellings for the poorer classes.—Resolved that application be made to the Local Loans and Development Commissioners for a loan of Rs. 500,000 to be spread over five years at the rate of Rs. 100,000 a year.

5. To sanction the rent per cubic foot of space for the Municipal grain shed.—Resolved that the three sections be leased at Rs. 75 per month for the two end spaces and Rs. 150 per mensem for the centre one, and that the right to the lease at those rates be auctioned on condition that no one person shall purchase more than one space. The Chairman to have the option of rejecting any bid.

6. Draft by-laws recommended by the Standing Committee on Law for adoption relating to (1) The Storage of grain; (2) insanitary premises.—Resolved that the by-laws as amended be passed.

7. Recommendations of Standing Committees:—

*Law and General Subjects.*

(1) That the tenant of the Municipal land bearing assessment No. 10, Market street, be given immediate notice to give up possession of the land.

(2) That the proposed draft by-laws requiring that the hoofs of licensed horses be branded be approved.

*Finance and Assessment.*

(3) That the Superintendent of Works be granted a bonus of Rs. 400 in consideration of his having worked overtime in connection with the outbreak of plague.

(4) That the salary of the Assessment Clerk be fixed at Rs. 2,000 per annum merging his allowance of Rs. 500 in his salary, with effect from December 1, 1920.

(5) That a Recordroom boy on Rs. 12 a month be employed till return of Recordkeeper.

(6) That the salary of the Recordroom binder be raised from Rs. 270 to Rs. 300 per annum.

(7) That a gratuity of Rs. 15.92 be paid to the mother and child of the disinfecting cooly, Pieris, who died of plague.

(8) That a rent of Rs. 200 per mensem be paid for the use of the Grand Hotel buildings as plague office.

(9) That a fee of Rs. 10 per annum be fixed for a bakery license.

(10) That Upanis, the market watcher, be paid Rs. 21, the amount paid by him when on sick leave to his substitute.

*Municipal Works.*

(11) That the following estimates be passed:—(i.) Side drains along Peradeniya road, Rs. 1,520; (ii.) Six cement concrete seats, Rs. 100; (iii.) extending water main along Malabar street, Rs. 655.

(12) That the following applications for water services be allowed on usual terms:—(i.) 164, Trincomalee street, H. D. Jayasinghe; (ii.) 94A, Hospital road, G. Daniel.

(13) That the recommendations of the Superintendent of Works with regard to the settlement of lands acquired for the Kandy water supply be adopted.—Resolved that the recommendations be adopted.

8. Pursuant to notice, Mr. Ratwatte moved—"That this Council do place on record its appreciation of the services of Dr. G. P. Hay as Medical Officer of Health, Kandy, for a period of over 12 years, and especially in view of the success of his work in dealing with the recent outbreak of plague in Kandy grant him a bonus of Rs. 1,500."

Mr. Pieris, with the consent of the mover, increased the sum to Rs. 3,000 and seconded the resolution.

Dr. Attygalle, Mr. Silva, and the Chairman supported the resolution, which was carried unanimously as amended.

It was also resolved that this Council place on record their appreciation of the work of Dr. Simon.

9. With the leave of the Council Mr. de Silva moved—"That this Council do place on record their appreciation of the good work done by Mr. A. W. Metzling and his staff in connection with the supply of rice within the Municipal area. Dr. Attygalle seconded.—Carried unanimously.

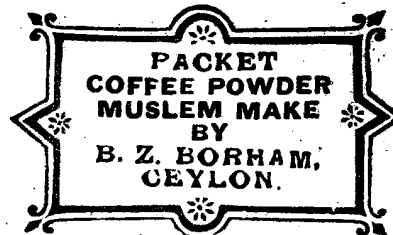

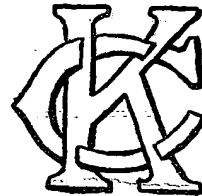
