

THE KING'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by section 91 of the Patents and Designs Act, 1907 (7 Edw. 7, c. 29), as amended by the Patents and Designs Act, 1914 (4 & 5 Geo. 5, c. 18), and the Patents and Designs Act, 1919 (9 & 10 Geo. 5, c. 80), it is enacted as follows :-

- "91. (1) If His Majesty is pleased to make any arrangement with the Government of any Foreign State for mutual protection of inventions, or designs, or trade marks, then any person who has applied for protection for any invention, design, or trade mark in that State, or his legal representative or assignee, shall be entitled to a patent for his invention or to registration of his design or trade mark under this Act or the Trade Marks Act, 1905, in priority to other applicants; and the patent or registration shall have the same date as the date of the application in the Foreign State:
 - " Provided that-
 - " (a) The application is made in the case of a patent within 12 months, and in the case of a design or trade mark within 4 months, from the application for protection in the Foreign State; and

- " (b) Nothing in this section shall entitle the patentee or proprietor of the design or trade mark to recover damages for infringements happening prior to the actual date on which his complete specification is accepted, or his design or trade mark is registered, in this country.
- "(2) The patent granted for the invention or the registration of a design or trade mark shall not be invalidated—
 - " (a) In the case of a patent, by reason only of the publication of a description of, or use of, the invention; or
 - "(b) In the case of a design, by reason only of the exhibition or use of, or the publication of a description or representation of, the design; or
 - "(c) In the case of a trade mark, by reason only of the use of the trade mark,
- in the United Kingdom or the Isle of Man during the period specified in this section as that within which the application may be made.
- "(3) The application for the grant of a patent, or the registration of a design, or the registration of a trade mark under this section, must be made in the same manner as an ordinary application under this Act or the Trade Marks Act, 1905:
 - " Provided that-
 - "(a) In the case of patents the application shall be accompanied by a complete specification, which, if it is not accepted within the 12 months from the application for protection in the Foreign State, shall with the drawings (if any) be open to public inspection at the expiration of that period; and
 - " (b) In the case of trade marks, any trade mark the registration of which has been duly applied for in the country of origin may be registered under the Trade Marks Act, 1905.
- "(4) The provisions of this section shall apply only in the case of those Foreign States with respect to which His Majesty by Order in Council declares them to be applicable, and so long only in the case of each State as the Order in Council continues in force with respect to that State.
- "(5) Where it is made to appear to His Majesty that the Legislature of any British Possession has made satisfactory provision for the protection of inventions, designs, or trade marks, patented or registered in this country, it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by Order in Council, to apply the provisions of this section to that Possession, with such variations or additions, if any, as may be stated in the Order":

And whereas by section 103 of the Patents, Designs, and Trade Marks Act, 1883, as amended by section 6 of the Patents, Designs, and Trade Marks Act (Amendment) Act, 1885, and by section 1 of the Patents Act, 1901, and since repealed by section 98 of the said Patents and Designs Act, 1907, provisions were made to the same or like effect as those above set forth as contained in section 91 of the last-mentioned Act, and by the said section 98 it was provided that "this repeal shall not affect any Convention, Order in Council, Rule, or Table of Fees having effect under any enactment so repealed, but any such Convention, Order in Council, Rule, or Table of Fees in force at the commencement of this Act shall continue in force, and may be repealed, altered, or amended, as if it had been made under this Act ":

And whereas it pleased Her late Majesty Queen Victoria to make an arrangement of the nature contemplated by the said section 103, by and in virtue of a Declaration signed and sealed by Her Majesty's Ambassador at Paris on the 17th March, 1884, duly conveying the accession of Great Britain and Ireland to the International Convention and Protocol for the protection of Industrial Property, signed by Representatives of certain Powers on the 20th March, 1883, and duly ratified on the 6th June, 1884, power being reserved to Her Majesty to accede thereafter to the provisions of the said Convention and Protocol on behalf of the Isle of Man, the Channel Islands, and any of Her Majesty's Possessions, which Declaration of Accession was duly accepted by the French Government on behalf of the Signatory Powers by and in virtue of a Declaration dated the 2nd April, 1884:

And whereas on the 14th December, 1900, at Brussels, an Additional Act was agreed upon between Her late Majesty Queen Victoria and the Heads of the Foreign Countries parties thereto for the purpose of modifying certain of the provisions of the said International Convention and the Protocol annexed thereto, the ratification of which Additional Act was duly effected:

And whereas by a Convention signed at Washington on the 2nd June, 1911, His Majesty and the Heads of the Foreign States named therein agreed to make certain modifications in and additions to the said Convention dated 20th March, 1883, as revised at Brussels on the 14th December, 1900, the ratification of which Convention was duly effected by Great Britain and certain other States:

And whereas by various Orders in Council Her late Majesty Queen Victoria and His late Majesty King Edward VII. and His present Majesty have been pleased to declare that the hereinbefore mentioned provisions of the said Patents, Designs, and Trade Marks Act, 1883 (as amended), should apply to the several Foreign Countries named in the said Orders parties to the said Convention and Protocols:

And whereas Roumania has acceded to the said International Convention Protocol and Additional Act as revised at Washington on 2nd June, 1911:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, in pursuance of the powers in Him vested by the above-recited provisions, and by and with the advice of His Privy Council, doth declare, and it is hereby declared, as follows:—

- 1. The provisions of section 91 of the Patents and Designs Act, 1907, as amended by the Patents and Designs Act, 1914, and the Patents and Designs Act, 1919, shall apply to Roumania.
 - 2. This Order shall take effect from the 6th October, 1920.

Rules referred to.

Under Section 5 (2) (a).

1. All persons appointed as enumerators under section 7 of the Census Ordinance, No. 9 of 1900, shall be bound to attend for instructions or inspection at such places, on such dates, and at such hours, as may be specified by the Supervisors, by the Commissioners of Census, or by the Superintendent of Census.

2. Census Officers are prohibited from disclosing to any unauthorized person information collected for the purpose

of filling up the Census Schedules or entered therein.

Under Section 5(2)(b).

1. The particulars regarding which information shall be obtained for the purposes of the Census fixed, by Proclamation, to be taken on March 18, 1921, are the following: Name, religion, sex, civil condition, age, race, birthplace, occupation, literacy, infirmity.

2. The necessary information shall be obtained from any person with regard to himself or herself, or with regard

to any of the members of his or her family.

3. In general, the necessary information shall be obtained by the Census Enumerators putting questions to the necessary persons. In particular cases it may be obtained by the particulars being recorded by householders and others. Under Section 5 (2) (c).

The schedule, to be prepared by the Superintendent of Census for the purpose of being filled in with the necessary particulars, shall be in the following form:—

Under Section 10.

Every Census Officer may ask any questions which may be necessary to enable him, from the answers thereto, to enter the required particulars in the prescribed form of schedule in accordance with the following instructions:-

How to fill up the Heading and Columns.

Heading (Schedule Number).—This is the serial number of the schedule in the Enumeration Book. The first schedule in the book will be numbered 1 against this heading, the second 2, and so on to the end of the book. This heading must be filled in immediately the schedules are bound into the book.

Column 1 (Census Number of Building).—This is the number marked, for the Census, on the building or group of buildings. It also appears in column 1 of the Block List. The number of the building must be repeated for each inmate.

Column 2 (Name).—Enter first the chief resident member of the family, whether male or female; then the other members of the family in order of age; next the resident servants, if any; lastly, visitors, if any. If a child has not been named, enter "Not named." Ge names need not be entered. If the building is empty, write "empty" in this column. Empty buildings will, therefore, have the number entered in column 1, "empty" in column 2, and a blank line above and below. Similarly, in the case of "institutions," except that the word "institution "will be entered in column 2.

"institutions," except that the word "institution" will be entered in column 2.

Column 3 (Religion).—Enter the religion, as Buddhist, Hindu, Parsi, Muhammadan, &c. In the case of Christians, enter the sect, thus: Church of England, Roman Catholic, Wesleyan, Baptist, Independent Catholic, Dutch Presbyterian, Scotch Presbyterian, Salvationist, &c. "Protestant" is not sufficiently exact, and should not be used. If the person has no religion, enter None, or Freethinker, or Agnostic, &c., according to the person's statement. (Note that "Hindu" means a worshipper of Siva, Vishnu, or other Indian deity. In the case of Tamils stating that they are Buddhists, or Sinhalese stating that they are Hindus, ascertain carefully whether they mean that they go to a kovil or to a pansala, and enter Hindu or Buddhist accordingly.)

Columns 4 (a) and 4 (b) (Sex).—For males enter M in column 4 (a). For females enter F in column 4 (b).

Column 5 (U-married, &c.).—Enter each person, whether infant, child, or grown up, as either unmarried, married, widowed, or divorced. Divorced persons who have married again should be entered as "married" and not as "divorced." As to whether a man and woman are married or not, accept the statements made by them. The entry "divorced" should only be made if a legal divorce has been obtained.

has been obtained.

Column 6 (Age last Birthday).—Enter the number of years completed, thus, a person aged 25 years and 10 months would be entered as 25. For infants less than one year old enter "Infant." Absurd replies about age should not be accepted. The Enumerator should enter what appears to him to be the real age of each individual. Every effort should be made to find out the correct age of

ator should enter what appears to him to be the real age of each individual. Every effort should be made to find out the correct age of each person, e.g., by comparing ages of members of a family whose relative ages may be known.

Column 7 (Race).—Enter the race of each person, as Sinhalese, Tamil, Moor, Burgher, English, French, &c. General terms, such as British, Ceylonese, &c., should not be used. Enter English, Scotch, Irish, Sinhalese, Tamil, Burgher, &c. In the ease of a Sinhalese, state whether Kandyan or Low-country. In the case of a Tamil or Moor, state whether Ceylon Tamil or Moor, or Indian Tamil or Moor. Ceylon Tamils and Moors are Tamils and Moors permanently settled in Ceylon, e.g., the Tamils of the Northern and Eastern Provinces; Puttalam, Batticaloa, and Hambantota Moors, &c. Indian Tamils and Moors are Tamils and Moors who are only working or trading in Ceylon away from their coast, and whose homes are in India. In general, the decision as to whether a person is a Ceylon or Indian Tamil or Moor will depend on the person's statement as to which country he himself regards as his home. But labourers and coolies must be entered as Indian Tamils or Moors, unless they can trace their origin to a Tamil or Moor district in Ceylon. The offspring of parents of different races will follow the father's race. In the case of a Vedda, enter "Vedda."

Columns 9 (a) (Principal Occupation or Means of Subsistence of Earner); 9 (b) (Subsidiary Occupation or Means of Subsistence of Earner); 10 (If not Earner, Principal Occupation or Means of Subsistence of Persons on whom dependent) are the most difficult columns in the schedule to fill up, and the following points should be carefully studied and borne in mind:—

of Earner); 10 (1) not Earner, Principal Occupation or Means of Subsistence of Persons on whom teependent) are the most difficult columns in the schedule to fill up, and the following points should be carefully studied and borne in mind:—

(1) The first distinction is between "Earner" and "Non-Earner," 'Earners' include both workers and persons of independent means, derived, say, from shares, pensions, rents, the work of others, &c. "Non-Earners" include children, women, old and infirm persons, who do not earn money or means of subsistence, and have no means of their own.

But women and children who help to augment the family income are "earners." A woman who makes lace, baskets, hoppers, &c., or is engaged as telephone operator, typist, &c., and earns money by her work, or who regularly assists her husband in his work, is augmenting the family income, and is an "earner." But a woman who looks after her house and cooks the food does not augment the family income, and is a "non-earner." Boys at school or college are non-earners. Domestic servants are "earners." Persons temporarily out of employ should be shown as following their last occupation. Begging should be regarded as an occupation or means of subsistence, and persons making a livelihood out of begging should be entered in column 9 (a) as "earners." For "earners" column 9 (a) and possibly 9 (b) will show the occupation or means of subsistence. For "non-earners" the principal occupation or means of subsistence of the persons on whom they are dependent will be shown in column 10, and columns 9 (a) and 9 (b) will be left blank. Thus, if a man lives by cultivating his own land, say, with tobacco or paddy and his wife and children assist him in that cultivation, they will be allentered incolumn 9 (a). he as "tobacco (or paddy) cultivators and proprietor," and they as "tobacco (or paddy) cultivators." Again, if the head of a family is a lawyer, and his wife and children have no independent means of subsistence, enter opposite the name of such wife or child in c

livelihood.* Column 9 (a) and 9 (b) will always be blank for "non-earners."

(3) The exact occupation or means of subsistence must be entered. Vague terms like "merchant," "trader," "planter," "cooly," &c., must be made definite-by adding the kind of merchandise, trade, labour, &c., thus: "rice merchant," piece goods merchant," general merchant," &c., "cloth trader," "cocoa dealer," "general trader," "tea planter," &c., "tea estate plucking cooly," "rubber estate tapping cooly," "Local Board conservancy cooly," "odd job cooly," &c. Similarly, "clerk" will not be used, the correct entry being "Kachcheri Gansabhawa clerk," "District Court translator," "Municipal Accounts clerk," "proctor's accountant," &c. Persons cultivating their own land will be entered as "paddy owner and cultivator," "coconut planter and proprietor," &c. If a person makes the articles he sells, he will be entered as "maker and seller of combs," "maker and seller of baskets," &c.

(4) In the case of non-correct dependent or matter."

(4) In the case of non-earners depending on several earners with different occupations or means of subsistence, column 10

(4) In the case of non-earners depending on several earners with different occupations or means of subsistence, column 10 should show the occupation or means of subsistence of the person who contributes most to the maintenance of the dependents.

(5) It must be carefully noted that columns 9 (a) and 10 cannot be filled up for the same person; also that if there is an entry in column 9 (b), there must be one in column 9 (a); also that if column 10 is entered, columns 9 (a) and 9 (b) will be blank.

Column 11 (Mother Tongue or other Language which can be read and written).—Enter in this column his mother tongue against each person who can read and write it. If he cannot read and write his native language, but can read and write another language, insert the name of that language. Enter "None" in case of inability to read and write any language.

Column 12 (a) (Whether able to read and write English).—Enter in this column against each person the word "Yes" if he can both read and write English; and if he cannot, "No" should be entered.

Column 12 (b) (Whether able to speak English).—Enter in this column against each person the word "Yes" if he can speak English. Able to speak English means able to conduct a short conversation, or understand and answer questions put, in English.

Column 13 (Deaf-mute from Birth, Insane, Totally Blind).—If any person be deaf and dumb from birth, or of unsound mind, or deaf and dumb after birth. deaf and dumb after birth.

Column 14 (Serial Number of Persons in the Enumeration Book).—This column is not to be filled in till after the Final Census.

Then, the first person in the book will be numbered 1, the second 2, and so on right through to the end of the book without any break for the different schedules. Thus, if the last entry in column 14 of schedule number 8 is 81, the first entry in column 14 of schedule for the different schedules.

NHE following regulations regarding the examinations for Eastern Cadetships are hereby published for general information.

Colonial Secretary's Office, Colombo, February 16, 1921. By His Excellency's command, GRAEME THOMSON, Colonial Secretary.

Examinations for Eastern Cadetships, viz., for Cadetships in the Civil Services of Ceylon, Hong Kong, and Malaya.

An open competitive examination will be held in London, commencing on August 1, 1921, under the following regulations. Intending candidates should apply to the Secretary, Civil Service Commission, London, W. 1, about Easter, 1921, for the prescribed form of application.

Regulations.

1. The Cadets are selected by open competitive examination held by the Civil Service Commissioners, to whom all inquiries on the subject should be addressed.

Any such examination is open under such general restrictions as may be laid down, to all natural-born, but not

naturalized, British subjects, being of the requisite age, health, and character.

2. Candidates for Ceylon Cadetships must be natural-born British subjects either of pure European or Ceylonese descent on both sides. Candidates for Hong Kong or Malayan Cadetships must be natural-born British subjects of pure European descent on both sides.

2 A. No person will be eligible for assignment to any of these Cadetships who has made before any Tribunal established under the Military Service Acts, 1916, an application for the issue to him of a certificate of exemption from

the provisions of those Acts on the ground of a conscientious objection to the undertaking of combatant service. 3. Candidates successful in the competition who may be assigned to any of these Cadetships may be called upon to satisfy the Secretary of State for the Colonies that they fulfil the above requirements as regards descent. To avoid delay candidates claiming to be of Ceylonese descent would do well to provide themselves in advance with a form of certificate by application to the Colonial Secretary's Office, Colombo.

4. The examinations for these appointments will, as a rule, be held in the month of August of those years in which vacancies have occurred in any of the above Services; and the successful Candidates will be allotted, as and when opportunity of the successful Candidates will be allotted, as and when opportunity of the successful Candidates will be allotted. tunity offers, to the various Colonies or States in which vacancies may exist upon a consideration of all the circumstances, including their own wishes; but the requirements of the Public Service will rank before every other consideration, and

A candidate desiring to offer any of the subjects 48-60 or subject 65 must produce evidence satisfactory to the Commissioners of Laboratory training in an institution of University rank. For (46) Astronomy, (47) Statistics, (61) Geography, (62) Physical Athropology, &c., and (64) Agriculture, other equivalent training will be required. There will be no laboratory test as a part of the examination.

Extra Numerum Subject.—Candidates may take, in addition to the above, one of the translation papers of section A, in a language not already taken by them in either section, not more than one of the Scandinavian languages, nor more than one of the three, Spanish, Italian, Portuguese, being offered by the same candidate either in section A or extra numerum; for this 100 marks will be awarded not included in the 800 of section A of the 1,000 of section B. Instead of a translation paper candidates may also take as extra numerum subject either of the subjects 62 and 63.

In addition to taking one of the subjects 62 and 63 as extra numerum, candidates whose mother tongue is a Ceylonese

language may take the other of these subjects in place of subject 5.

7. From the marks assigned to candidates in each subject such deduction will be made as the Civil Service Commissioners may deem necessary in order to secure that no credit be allowed for merely superficial knowledge.

Moreover, if a candidate's handwriting is not easily ligible, a further deduction will, on that account, be made from the total marks otherwise accruing to him.*

8. Application for permission to attend one of these examinations must be made in the writing of the candidate, at such times and in such manner as may be fixed by the Commissioners.

9. A fee of 6l. will be required from every candidate attending an examination.

TENDERS are hereby invited for the supply of sleepers and scantlings, to be completed as specified in the note under the schedule annexed below. The area to be exploited for the supplies and further details are given in the schedule.

2. All tenders should be in duplicate and sealed under one cover, and should be addressed to the Chairman of the Tender Board, Office of the Controller of Revenue, Colombo.

3. Tenders should either be deposited in the tender box in the Office of Controller of Revenue, or be sent through the post.

4. Tenders should be marked "Tender for Sleeper and Scantling Supply, Sabaragamuwa Division," in the left hand top corner of the envelope, and should reach the Office of the Controller of Revenue not later than midday on Tuesday, March 15, 1921.

5. The tenders are to be made upon forms which will be supplied upon application at the Forest Office, Ratnapura. No tender will be considered unless it is on the recognized form. Alterations must be initialled, otherwise the tenders

may be treated as informal and rejected.

- 6. A deposit of Rs. 20 will be required to be made either at the Treasury or Kachcheri, and a receipt produced for same before any form of tender is issued. Should any person decline or fail to enter into the contract and bond after he has tendered, or to furnish approved security, within ten days of receiving notice in writing from the Head of the Department, or his duly authorized representative, that his tender has been accepted, such deposit will be forfeited to the Crown, and the defaulter will render himself liable to be included in the list of defaulting contractors precluded from having any concern in a Government contract.
- 7. Each tender must be accompanied by a letter signed by two responsible persons, whose addresses must be given, engaging to become security for the due fulfilment of the contract.

General Conditions.

(1) Trees are to be felled within 6 inches from the ground by saw or axe and saw combined.

(2) Only such trees as are stamped and marked by the Forest Ranger are to be felled, and no sound trees below 4 ft. 6 in. in girth will be marked or should be felled.

(3) All suitable dead and hollow trees and branchwood within the forest such as are marked by the forest office, though below 4 ft. 6 in. girth, should, in addition to all matured sound trees marked by him, be utilized for conversion into sleepers and scantlings or scantlings alone, as may be directed. Contractors should understand that only such portions of trees as cannot be converted into sleepers may be sawn into scantlings.

(4) Parts of logs attacked by fungus or defective parts of logs are not to be sawn into sleepers or scantlings. The sleepers and scantlings should be sawn from sound matured wood free from shakes, cracks, sapwood, and large or woose

knots.

- (6) Sleepers and scantlings should be rectangular in form and sawn perfectly parallel on all sides. On no account will squaring of logs, sleepers, or scantlings with an adge or axe be allowed.
- (7) Sleepers and scantlings should be covered with sawdust or immersed in water, and be invariably placed under shade immediately they are sawn, until they can be transported to delivery depôts, where they should be stacked and kept under shade in the manner to be pointed out by the Forest Ranger.
- (8) Rejected sleepers or scantlings will not be paid for, and they will lapse to Government, as well as all refuse wood in the sleeper operations. The contractor shall have no claim in respect of any material sold as rejections.

VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended February 12, 1921.

Births.—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 131 (1 European, 7 Burghers, 75 Sinhalese, 20 Tamils, 19 Moors, 7 Malays, and 2 Others). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on January 1, 1921, viz., 300,171) was 22.8, as against 26.2 in the preceding week, 22.3 in the corresponding week of last year, and 24.5 the weekly average for last year.

-The total deaths registered were 195 (9 Burghers, 92 Sinhalese, 39 Tamils, 40 Moors, 7 Malays, and 8 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 33.9, as against 26.2 in the previous week, 31.2 in the corresponding week of last year, and 27.5 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 195 total deaths, 49 were of infants under one year of age, as against 27 in the preceding week, 32 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 33 the average for last year.

-The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 10.

Principal Causes of Death.—1. (a) Twenty deaths from Phithisis were registered, 6 in Maradana (including 3 deaths of non-residents in hospitals), 4 in Wellawatta, 3 in Kotahena, 2 each in St. Paul's and Kollupitiya, and 1 each in Pettah, New Bazaar, and Slave Island, as against 12 in the previous week and 14 the weekly average for last year.

- (b) One death of a resident of Colombo Town occurred at the Ragama hospital from Phithisis during the week.
- 2. (a) Sixteen deaths from Pneumonia were registered, 7 in Maradana (including 2 deaths of non-residents in hospitals), 4 in Kotahena, 3 in New Bazaar, 1 each in St. Paul's and Wellawatta, as against 21 in the previous week and 20 the weekly average for last year.
- (b) Six deaths from Influenza were registered, 2 in St. Paul's and 1 each in San Sebastian, New Bazaar, Maradana, and Kollupitiya, as against 4 in the previous week and 6 the weekly average for last year.
- (c) Four dea(*) a from Bronchitis were registered, 1 each in St. Paul's, Kotahena, New Bazaar, and Slave Island, as against 6 in the previous week.
- Ten deaths from Plague were registered, 4 in St. Paul's, 2 each in Maradana and Slave Island, and 1 each in Pettah and Wellawatta, as against 8 in the previous week and 3 the weekly average for last year.
- Five deaths from Enteric Fever were registered, 3 in Maradana (including 2 deaths of non-residents in hospitals) and I each in San Sebastian and Wellawatta, same as in the previous week. was 6.
 - One death from Smallpox of a resident of Slave Island occurred at the Infectious Diseases Hospital. 5.
- Twenty-three deaths were registered from Infantile Convulsions, 20 from Debility, 9 from Enteritis, 7 from Dysentery, 5 from Diarrhoea, 2 from Worms, 1 from Tetanus, and 66 from Other Causes.
- 7. Sixteen cases of Plague, 13 of Enteric Fever, 10 of Chickenpox, and 1 of Measles were reported during the week, as against 9, 8, 14, and 5, respectively, of the preceding week.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 79.6°, against 78.4° in the preceding week and 79.3° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29 964 in., against 29 981 in. in the preceding week and 30 038 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 0 19 in., against 0.75 in. in the preceding week and 0.56 in the corresponding week of the previous year.

ARTICLES OF ASSOCIATION OF FENTONS, LIMITED.

Table C not to be apply; Company to be governed by these Articles.—The regulations contained in the Table C in the schedule annexed to "The Joint Stock Companies Ordinance, 1861," shall not apply to this Company, which shall be governed by the regulations contained in these Articles, but subject to repeal, addition, or alteration by special resolution.

Power to alter Regulation.—The Company may, by special resolution, alter and make provisions instead of, or in

addition to, any of the regulations of the Company, whether contained and comprised in these Articles or not. None of the funds of the Company shall be employed in the purchase of, or be lent on, the shares of the Company.

Interpretation Clause.

Renewal of Certificates.—If any certificate be worn out or defaced, then, upon production thereof to the Directors, they may order the same to be cancelled and may issue a new certificate in lieu thereof; and if any certificate be lost or destroyed, then, upon proof thereof to the satisfaction of the Directors, and on such indemnity as the Directors deem adequate being given, a new certificate in lieu thereof shall be given to the person entitled to such lost or destroyed certificate. A sum of fifty cents shall be payable for such new certificate.

22. Certificate to be delivered to first-named of joint-holders.—The certificate of shares registered in the name of two or more persons not a firm shall be delivered to the person first-named on the register.

23. Directors may make calls.—The Directors may from time to time make such calls as they think fit upon the Shareholders in respect of all moneys unpaid on their shares, and not by the conditions of allotment made payable at fixed times; provided that two months' notice at least shall be given to the Shareholders of the time and place appointed for payment of each call; and each Shareholder shall pay the amount of every call so made to the person and at the time and place appointed by the Director.

24. Interest on unpaid calls.—If any Shareholder fails to pay the amount of any call due by him on or before the day appionted for payment thereof, he shall be liable to pay interest for the same at the rate of 9 per centum per annum

from the day appointed for the payment thereof to the time of actual payment.

When call deemed to have been made. -- A call shall be deemed to have been made at the time when the

resolution of the Directors authorizing the call was passed.

26. Directors may give time for payment.—The Directors shall have power in their absolute discretion to give time to any one or more Shareholder or Shareholders, exclusive of the others, for payment of any call or part thereof on such terms as the Directors may determine. But no Shareholder shall be entitled to any such extension, except as a matter of grace or favour.

27. Payment: in antic pation of call:.—The Directors may at their discretion receive from any of the Shareholders willing to advance the same, and upon such terms as they think fit, all or any part of the moneys due upon their respective shares beyond the sums actually called for; and upon the moneys so paid in advance, or upon so much thereof as from time to time and at any time thereafter exceeds the amount of the calls then made upon, and due in respect of the shares which such advances have been made, the Board may pay or allow interest at such rate as the Shareholders paying such sums in advance, and the Directors may agree upon, not exceeding, however, six per centum per annum.

TRANSFER OF SHARES.

28. Transfer of Shares.—Subject to the restriction of these Articles any Shareholder may transfer all or any of his shares by instrument in writing.

29. Infants and Persons of unsound mind.—No transfer of shares shall be made to an infant or person of unsound

mind.

Register of Transfers.—The Company shall keep a book or books to be called "The Register of Transfers" in

which shall be entered the particulars of every transfer or transmission of any share.

31. Board may decline to register transfers.—The Board may, at their own absolute and uncontrolled discretion, decline to register any transfer of shares by a Shareholder who is indebted to the Company, or upon whose shares the Company have a lien or otherwise; or in case of shares not fully paid up to any person not approved by them; and in no case shall a Shareholder or proposed transferee be entitled to require the Directors to state the reason of their refusal to register, but their declinature shall be absolute.

32. Registration of transfer.—Every instrument of transfer must be left at the office of the Company to be registered, accompanied by such evidence as the Directors may reasonably require to prove the title of the transferor, and a fee of Rupees Two and fifty cents or such other sum; as the Directors shall from time to time determine, must be paid to the Company for the registration of every such transfer; upon payment whereof the Directors, subject to the powers vested in them by Article 31, shall register the transferee as a Shareholder, and retain the instrument of transfer.

33. Board Meeting not necessary for registration of transfers.—The Directors may, by such means as they shall deem expedient, authorize the registration of transferees as Shareholders, without the necessity of any meeting of the

Directors for that purpose.

34. Directors not bound to inquire as to validity of transfer.—In no case shall the Directors be bound to inquire into the validity, legal effect, or genuineness of any instrument of transfer produced by a person claiming a transfer of any share in accordance with these articles; and whether they abstain from so inquiring or do so inquire and are misled, the transferor shall have no claim whatsoever upon the Company in respect of the share, except for the dividends previously declared in respect thereof, but only, if at all, upon the transferee.

35. Closing of Transfer Register.—The Register of Transfers may be closed during the 14 days immediately preceding each Ordinary General Meeting; and when a dividend is declared, for the three days ensuing after the meeting, also at such other times (if any) and for such periods as the Directors may from time to time determine, provided always

that it shall not be closed for more than twenty-one days in any year.

(a) No shares shall be transferable by any holder thereof to any person within or without the Company until and unless the Directors of the Company have first exercised their rights of refusal and have signified their consent in writing to such transfer, and in the event of the Directors desiring to take over such share or shares themselves, the value thereof shall be fixed by arbitration under the arbitration rules of the Ceylon Chamber of Commerce.

TRANSMISSION OF SHARES.

36. Titles to Shares of deceased holder.—The executors or administrators or the heirs of a deceased Shareholder

shall be the only person recognized by the Company as having any title to the shares of such Shareholder.

37. Registration of Persons entitled otherwise than by transfer.—Any guardian of any infant Shareholder, or any committee of a unatic Shareholder, or any person becoming entitled to shares in consequence of the death, bankruptcy, or liquidation of any Shareholder, or the marriage of any female Shareholder, or in any other way than by transfer shall, upon producing such evidence that he sustains the character in respect of which he proposes to act under this Article, or of his title, as the Directors think sufficient, be forthwith entitled, subject to the provisions herein contained, to be registered as a Shareholder in respect of such shares; or may, subject to the regulations as to transfer hereinbefore contained, transfer the same to some other person.

38. Failing registration, Shares may be sold.—If any person who shall become entitled to be registered under Article 37 in respect of any share on which the Company has any lien shall not, from any cause whatever, within twelve calendar months after the event on the happening of which his title shall accrue, be registered in respect of such share, or if in the case of the death of any Shareholder no person shall, within twelve calendar months after such death be registered as a Shareholder in respect of the shares of such deceased Shareholder, the Company may sell such shares, either by public auction or private contract, and give a receipt for the purchase money, and the purchaser shall be entitled to be

registered in respect of such share, and shall not be bound to inquire whether the events have happened which entitled the Company to sell the same, and the neth proceeds of such sale, after deducting all expenses and all money in respect of which the Company is entitled to a lien on the shares so sold, shall be paid to the person entitled thereto.

SURRENDER AND FORFEITURE OF SHARES.

39. Surrender of Shares.—The Directors may accept in the name and for the benefit of the Company, and upon such terms and conditions as may be agreed, a surrender of all or any of the shares of a Shareholder.

40. If call; not paid notice to be given to Shareholder.—If any Shareholder fails to pay any call or instalment on or before the day appointed for the payment of the same, the Directors may at any time thereafter, during such time as the call or instalment remains unpaid, serve a notice on such Shareholder requiring him to pay the same, together with any interest that may have accrued, and all expenses that may have been incurred by the Company by reason of such

non-payment.

Requisite of such notice.—The notice shall name a day (not being less than one month from the date of the notice) on, and a place or places at, which such call or instalment and such interest and expenses as aforesaid are to be paid. The notice also shall state that in the event of non-payment at or before the time and at the place appointed, the shares in

respect of which the call was made or instalment is payable will be liable to be forfeited.

In default of payment Share, may be forfeited.—If the requisition of such notice as aforesaid be not complied with, every or any share or shares in respect of which such notice has been given may at any time thereafter, before payment of calls or instalments, with interest and expenses due in respect thereof, be declared forfeited by a resolution of the Board

to that effect.

- 41. Liability of Shareholder notwithstanding forfeiture.—Any Shareholder whose shares have been so declared forfeited shall, notwithstanding, be liable to pay, and shall forthwith pay to the Company, all calls, instalments, interest, and expense owing upon or in respect of such shares at the time of the forfeiture, together with interest thereon from the time of forfeiture until payment at 9 per centum per annum, and the Directors may enforce the payment thereof if they think fit.
- 42. Surrendered or forfeited Share: the property of the Company.—Every shares rendered or so declared forfeited shall be deemed to be the property of the Company, and may be sold, re-allotted, or otherwise disposed of upon such terms and in such manner as the Board shall think fit.

 43. Effect of surrender or forfeiture.—The surrender or forfeiture of a share shall involve the extinction of all

43. Effect of surrender or forfeiture.—The surrender or forfeiture of a share shall involve the extinction of all interest in and also of all claims and demands against the Company in respect of the share, and the proceeds thereo' and all other rights incident to the share, except only such of those rights (if any) as by these presents are expressly saved.

- 44. Certificate of surrender or forfeiture.—A certificate in writing under the hands of one of the Directors and of the Secretary or Secretaries that a share had been duly surrendered or forfeited, stating the time it was surrendered or forfeited, shall be conclusive evidence of the facts therein stated as against all persons who would have been entitled to the share but for such surrender or forfeiture, and such certificate and the receipt of the Company for the price of such share shall constitute a good title to such share, and a certificate of proprietorship shall be delivered to any person who may purchase the same from the Company and thereupon such purchaser shall be deemed the holder of such share, discharged from all calls due prior to such purchase; and he shall not be bound to see to the application of the purchase money; nor shall his title to such share be affected by any irregularity in the proceedings in reference to such forfeiture or sale.
- nor shall his title to such share be affected by any irregularity in the proceedings in reference to such forfeiture or sale.

 45. Annulment of forfeiture.—The Directors may in their discretion remit or annul the forfeiture of any share within six months from the date thereof upon the payment of all moneys due to the Company from the late holder or holders of such share of shares, and all expenses incurred in relation to such forfeiture, together with such further sum of money by way of redemption money for the deficit as they shall think fit, not being less than 9 per centum per annum on the amount of the sums wherein default in payment had been made, but no share bona fide sold or re-allotted or otherwise

disposed of under Article 42 hereof shall be redeemable after sale or disposal.

46. Company's lien on Shar s.—The Company shall have a first charge or paramount lien upon all the shares of any holder or joint-holders for all moneys for the time being due to the Company by such holder or by all or any of such joint-holders respectively, either in respect of such shares or of other shares held by such holder or joint-holders or in respect of any other debt or claim, whether due from any such holder individually or jointy with others, including all the calls which the Directors shall have resolved to make, although the times appointed for the payment thereof shall not have arrived, and where any share is held by more persons than one, the Company shall be entitled to the said charge or lien in respect of any money due to the Company from any of such persons, and the Directors may decline to register any transfer of shares subject to such charge or lien.

47. Enforcement of lien by sale.—Such charge or lien may be made available by a sale of all or any of the shares subject to it, provided that no such sale shall be made except under a resolution of the Directors, and until notice in writing shall have been given to the indebted Shareholder or his executors or administrators, or the assignee or trustee in his bankruptcy, requiring him or them to pay the amount for the time being due to the Company, and default shall have been made for twenty-eight days from such notice in paying the sum thereby required to be paid. Should the Shareholder

been made for twenty-eight days from such notice in paying the sum thereby required to be paid. Should the over whose share the lien exists be in England or elsewhere abroad, sixty days' notice shall be allowed him.

48. Proceeds of sale how applied.—The nets proceeds of any such sale shall be applied in or towards satisfaction of such debts, liabilities, or engagements, and the residue (if any) paid to such Shareholder or his representatives.

49. Certificate of sale.—A certificate in writing under the hands of one of the Directors and of the Secretary or

49. Certificate of cale.—A certificate in writing under the hands of one of the Directors and of the Secretary or Secretaries that the power of sale given by Article 47 has arisen, and is exercisable by the Company under these presents, shall be conclusive evidence of the facts therein stated.

50. Execution of transfer.—Upon any such sale two of the Directors may execute a transfer of such share to the purchaser thereof, and such transfer, with the certificate last aforesaid, shall confer on the purchaser a complete title to such shares.

PREFERENCE SHARES.

51. Power to issue preference or deferred shares.—Any shares from time to time to be issued or created may from time to time be issued with any such right or preference, whicher in respect of dividend or of payment of capital, or both, or any such other special privilege or advantage over any shares previously issued, or then about to be issued (other than shares issued with a preference or at such a premium, or with such deferred rights as compared with any shares previously issued, or then about to be issued, or subject to any such conditions or provisions, and with any such right, or without any right of voting, and generally on such terms as the Company may from time to time by special resolution determine.

52. Mettings of holders of particular class of Shares.—If at any time, by the issue of preference shares or otherwise,

52. Mettings of holders of particular class of Shares.—If at any time, by the issue of preference shares or otherwise, the capital is divided into shares of different classes, then the holders of any class of shares may, by a special resolution passed at a meeting of such holders, consent, on behalf of all the holders of shares of the class, to the issue or creation of any shares ranking equally therewith, or having any priority thereto, or to the abandonment of any preference or priority, or of any accrued dividend, or the reduction for any time or permanently of the dividends payable thereon, or to any scheme for the reduction of the Company's capital affecting the class shares, and such resolution shall be binding upon all the holders of shares of the class, provided that this Article shall not be read as implying the necessity for such consent in any case, in which, but for this Article, the object of the resolutions could have been effected without it.

53. Conduct of such Meetings.—Any meeting for the purpose of the last preceding clause shall be convened and conducted in all respects as nearly as possible in the same way as an Extraordinary General Meeting of the Company, provided that no member, not being a Lirector, shall be entitled to notice thereof or to attend thereat, unless he be a holder of shares of the class intended to be affected by the resolution, and that no vote shall be given except in respect of a share of that class, and that at any such meeting a poll may be demanded in writing by any members personally present and entitled to vote at the meeting.

Borrowing Powers.

54. Borrowing powers of Directors.—The Directors shall have power from time to time at their discretion to borrow or raise such sum or sums of money for the purposes of the Company as the Directors shall deem expedient, provided that the money so borrowed or raised and owing at any time shall not, without the sanction of a General Meeting, exceed Rs. 50,000, and holders of preference shares shall be entitled to attend and vote at such meeting. A certificate under the hands of one Director and the Secretary, or under the hands of two Directors, to the effect that on taking any loan the Directors are not exceeding their borrowing power shall be sufficient and binding on the Company.

55. Power to create debentures, mortgages, and other Securities.—For the purpose of securing the repayment of any such money so borrowed or raised, or for any other purposes, the Directors may grant, create, execute, and issue any mortgages, cash credits, debentures, debenture stock, bonds, or obligations of the Company charged upon all or any part of the undertaking, revenue, lands, property, rights, and assets of the Company, both present and future, including uncelled capital or unpaid calls, or may make account or endorse on behalf of the Company and property are billed. uncalled capital or unpaid calls, or may make, accept, or endorse on behalf of the Company any promissory notes or bills

of exchange.

56. Conditions of issue of Securities.—Any such securities may be issued, either at par or at a premium or discount, and may from time to time be cancelled or discharged, varied or exchanged, as the Directors may think fit, and may

contain special privileges as to redemption, surrender, drawings, allotments of shares, or otherwise.

57. Debentures, &c., may be issued free of equities.—Every debenture or other instrument issued by the Company for securing the payment of money can be so framed that the moneys thereby secured shall be assignable free from any equities between the Company and the person to whom the same may be issued.

GENERAL MEETINGS.

58. First General Meeting.—The First General Meeting shall be held at such time, not being more than twelve

months after the incorporation of the Company, and at such place as the Directors may determine.

59. Subsequent General Meetings.—Subsequent General Meetings shall be held once in every year at such time and place as may be prescribed by the Company in General Meeting, and if no time or place is so prescribed, then at such place and at such time as may be determined by the Directors.

60. Ordinary and Extraordinary General Meetings.—The General Meetings mentioned in the last preceding clause shall be called Ordinary General Meetings, all other Meetings of the Company shall be called Extraordinary General

Meetings.

Extraordinary General Meetings, when to be called .- The Directors may, whenever they think fit, call an Extraordinary General Meeting of the Company, and the Directors shall do so upon a requisition made in writing by not less than one-eighth of the number of Shareholders of the Company for the time being, or by any Shareholder or Shareholders holding in the aggregate one-eighth part of the shares of the Company for the time being subscribed for.

62. Terms of requisition.—Any requisition so made shall express the object of the meeting proposed to be called, shall be addressed to the Driectors, and shall be sent to the registered office of the Company.

Meeting to be convened.—Upon the receipt of such requisition the Directors shall forthwith proceed to convene an Extraordinary General Meeting to be held at such time and place as they shall determine. If they do not proceed to convene the same within twety-one days from the delivery of the requisition, the requisitionists may themselves convene an Extraordinary General Meeting to be held at such place and at such time as the Shareholders convening the meeting may themselves fix.

63. Notice of resolution to be given.—Any Shareholder may, on giving not less than ten days previous notice of

any resolution, submit the same to a meeting.

64. How notice to be given.—Such notice shall be given by leaving a copy of the resolution at the registered office

of the Company.

65. Notice of General Meetings. - Seven days' notice at least of every General Meeting, Ordinary or Extraordinary, and by whosever convened, specifying the place, date, hour of meeting, and the objects and business of the meeting, shall be given by advertisement in the Ceylon Government Gazette, or by notice sent by post or otherwise served as hereinafter provided, but an accidental omission to give such notice to any Shareholder shall not invalidate the proceedings at any General Meeting. Where it is proposed to pass a special resolution, the two meetings may be convened by one and the same notice, and it shall be no objection to such notice that it only convenes the second meeting contingently. on the resolution being passed by the requisite majority at the first meeting.

66. Business not requiring notification.—Every Ordinary General Meeting shall be competent without special notice having been given for the purposes for which it is convened, or of the business to be transacted thereat, to receive and discuss any report and any accounts presented thereto by the Directors, and to pass resolutions in approval or disapproval thereof, and to declare dividends, and to elect Directors and Auditors in the place of those retiring by rotation, and to fix the remuneration of the Auditors, and shall also be competent to enter upon, discuss, and transact any business

whatsoever of which special mention shall have been given in the notice or notices upon which the meeting was convened.

67. Notice of other business to be given.—With the exceptions mentioned in the foregoing Article as to the business. which may be transacted at Ordinary General Meetings without notice, no General Meeting, Ordinary or Extraordinary, shall be competent to enter upon, discuss, or transact any business which has not been specially mentioned in the notice or notices upon which it was convened.

Quorum.—No business shall be transacted at any General Meeting, except the declaration of a dividend recommended by a report of the Directors or election of a Chairman, unless there shall be present or represented at the

commencement of the business three or more Shareholders entitled to vote.

69. Procedure if no quorum present.—If at the expiration of half an hour from the time appointed for the meeting the required number of Shareholders shall not be present at the meeting, the meeting, if convened by or upon the requisition of Shareholders, shall be dissolved, but in any other case it shall stand adjourned to the same day in the next week at the same time and place, and if at such adjourned meeting a quorum is not present those Shareholders who are present shall be a quorum, and may transact the business for which the meeting was called.

70. Chairman.—The Chairman (if any) of the Directors shall be entitled to take the Chair at every General Meeting, whether Ordinary or Extraordinary, of if there be no Chairman, or if at any meeting he shall not be present at the time appointed for holding such meeting, or if he shall refuse to take the Chair, the Shareholders shall choose another Director or Chairman; and if no Directors be present, or if all the Directors present decline to take the Chair, then the Shareholders

present shall choose one of their number to be Chairman.

71. No business to be discussed whilst Chair vacant.—No business shall be discussed at any General Meeting. except the election of a Chairman, whilst the Chair is vacant.

72. Adjournment of Meeting.—The Chairman may, with the consent of the meeting, adjourn any meeting from time to time and from place to place, but no business shall be transacted at any adjourned meeting other than the business

left unfinished at the meeting from which the adjournment took place, unless due notice thereof shall be given.

73. Minutes.—Minutes of the proceedings of every General Meeting, whether Ordinary or Extraordinary, shall be entered in a book to be kept for that purpose, and shall, when so entered, be signed as soon as practicable by the Chairman of the same meeting, or by the Chairman of the same when so entered and signed shall be evidence of all such proceedings and of the proper election of the Chairman.

VOTING AT MEETINGS.

Voting at Meetings.—At any meeting every resolution shall be decided in the first instance by a show of hands, and in case there shall be an equality of votes, the Chairman at such meeting shall be entitled to give a casting vote in addition to the vote which he may be entitled as a Shareholder; and unless a poll be immediately demanded by some member or his attorney present and entitled to vote a declaration by the Chairman that a resolution has been carried, and an entry to that effect in the Minute Book of the Company, shall be sufficient evidence of the fact without proof of

the number or proportion of votes recorded in favour of or against such resolution.

75. Poll.—If at any meeting a poll be demanded by some Shareholder or his attorney present at the meeting and entitled to vote the meeting shall, if necessary, be adjourned, and the poll shall be taken at such time and place and in such manner as the Chairman shall direct, and in such case every Shareholder shall have the number of votes to which he is entitled as hereinafter provided; and in case at any such poll there shall be an equality of votes, the Chairman of the Meeting at which such poll shall have been demanded shall be entitled to a casting vote in addition to any votes to which he may be entitled as a Shareholder or proxy or attorney, and the result of such poll shall be deemed to be the resolution of the Company in such meeting.

76. Meeting may continue notwithstanding poll.—The demand of a poll shall not prevent the continuance of a meeting for the transaction of business other than the question on which a poll has been demanded.

77. When poll cannot be demanded.—No poll shall be demanded on the election of a Chairman of the meeting

or on any question of adjournment.

- 78. Number of votes to which a Shareholder entitled.—On a show of hands every Shareholder present in person shall have one vote only. Where a Shareholder is present by an attorney who is not a Shareholder such attorney shall be entitled to vote for such Shareholder on a show of hands. In case of a poll every Shareholder present in person or by proxy or attorney (except as provided for in the Article immediately following) have one vote for every share held by him. When voting on a resolution involving the sale of the Company's business or the winding up of the Company, a majority of three-fourths of the Shareholders present or represented by proxy or attorney shall be necessary to carry
- 79. Persons not entitled to vote. The parent or guardian of an infant Shareholder, the committee or other legal guardian of any lunatic Shareholder, the husband of any female Shareholder, not entitled to her shares as separate estate, and the executor or administrator of any deceased Shareholder, or any one of such persons as aforesaid, if more than one, shall not be entitled to vote in the place of such infant, lunatic, female, or deceased person, unless such person shall have been registered as a Shareholder.

80. How votes may be given.—Votes may be given either personally or by proxy or by attorney.
81. Shareholder in arrear not to vote.—No Shareholder shall be entitled to vote or speak at an Shareholder in arrear not to vote.—No Shareholder shall be entitled to vote or speak at any meeting unless all calls due from him on his shares have been paid.

82. Non-Shareholders not to be appointed proxy.—No person shall be entitled to hold a proxy who is not a Shareholder of the Company, but this rule shall not apply to a power of attorney.

83. How proxy to be given.—The instrument appointing a proxy shall be printed or written and shall be signed by the appointor, or if such appointor be a company or corporation, it shall be under the common seal of such company or corporation.

84. Form of proxy and when same to be deposited.—The instrument appointing a proxy shall be deposited at the registered office of the company not less than twenty-four hours before the time appointed for holding the meeting at which the person named in such instrument proposes to vote.

85. Objections to validity of vote. - No objection shall be made to the validity of any vote (whether given personally or by proxy or by attorney) except at the meeting or poll at which such vote shall be tendered, and every vote (whether given personally or by proxy or by attorney) to which no objection shall be made at such meeting or poll shall be deemed valid for all purposes of such meeting or poll whatsoever.

86. Shareholders personally interested entitled to vote.—No Shareholder shall be prevented from voting by reason

of his being personally interested in the result of the voting.

DIRECTORS.

87. Number of Directors.—The number of Directors shall never be fewer than two or more than five, but this clause shall be construed as being directory only, and the continuing Directors may act notwithstanding any number of

Qualification of Directors. The qualifications of a Director shall be his holding in his own right shares in the Company of the nominal value of at least Five hundred Rupees (Rs. 500), upon which all calls for the time being have been paid, and this

qualification shall apply as well to the first Directors as to all future Directors.

Remuneration of Directors.—As a remuneration for their services, the Directors shall be entitled to appropriate a sum not exceeding Five thousand Rupees (Rs. 5,000) annually, or such less sum as by decision of the Board shall be assigned for the purpose, to be divided between them in such manner as they may determine, but the Company in General Meeting may at any time alter the amount of such remuneration for the future, and such remuneration shall not be considered as including any remuneration granted for special extra services hereinafter referred to nor any extra remuneration to the

Managing Director of the Company.

88. Original Directors.—The first Directors shall be Horace James Hoare and Herbert Fenton, who shall hold office till the First Ordinary General Meeting of the Company, when they shall all retire, but shall be eligible for re-election.

89. Managing Directors.—One or more of the Directors may be appointed by the Directors to act as Secretary Managing Director, or Managing Directors, for such time and on such terms as the Directors may determine or may fix by agreement with the person or persons appointed to the office, and they may from time to time revoke such appointment and appoint another or other Secretary, Managing Director, or Managing Directors.

Powers of Managing Directors.—The Directors may confer on the Managing Director or Managing Directors all or

any duties and powers that might be conferred on any Manager of the Company.

Special remuneration to Directors.—If any Director shall be called upon to perform any extra services, the Directors of the Company. may arrange with such Director for such special remuneration for such services, either by way of salary, commission, or the payment of a lump sum of money as they shall think fit.

90. Any Director leaving Ceylon temporarily shall have power, with the approval of the other Directors, to nominate and substitute some person (who need not hold the necessary qualification) to act for him as Director during

such absence.

Nomination of Director ex officio.—It shall be competent for any member of the company holding not less than one-third the total number of subscribed shares, providing none of them is in arrears as regards the payment of calls, to nominate to the Board one Director who shall specially represent his interests on the Board, and such nomination may be in respect of himself or of anyone duly accredited as his agent and attorney.

ROTATION OF DIRECTORS.

91. The Directors to retire annually.—At the first Ordinary General Meeting of the Company all the Directors shall retire from office and at the next Ordinary General Meeting in every subsequent year two of the Directors for the

time being shall retire from office as provided in clause 92.

92. Directors to retire.—The Directors to retire from office at the second and third Ordinary General Meetings shall, unless the Directors otherwise arrange among themselves, be determined by ballot. In every subsequent year the Directors to retire shall be those who have been longest in office. In case any question shall arise as to which of the Directors who have been the same time in office shall retire, the same shall be decided by the Directors by ballot.

93. Retiring Directors eligible for re-election.—Retiring Directors shall be eligible for re-election.

How successors appointed.—The Ordinary General Meeting at which Directors retire or ought to retire by rotation shall appoint successors to them, and in default thereof such successors may be appointed at a subsequent Ordinary General Meeting.

95. Casual vacancies how filled.—Any casual vacancy occurring in the number of Directors or provisional Directors arising from death, resignation, or otherwise, may be filled up by the Directors, but any person appointed to fill such vacancy shall retain his office as long only as the vacating Director would have retained the same if no vacancy had occurred.

- 96. Number of Directors, how increased or reduced.—The Directors, subject to the approval of a General Meeting, may, from time to time at any time subsequent to the second Ordinary General Meeting, increase or reduce the number of Directors, and may also, subject to the like approval determine in what rotation such increased or reduced number is
- 97. If election not made retiring Directors to continue.—If at any meeting at which an election of a Director ought to take place, the place of a retiring Director is not filled up, the retiring Director may continue in office until the first Ordinary General Meeting in the next year, and so on from meeting to meeting until his place is filled up, unless it shall be determined at such meeting to reduce the number of Directors.
- 98. Resignation of Directors.—A Director may at any time give notice in writing of his intention to resign by delivering such notice to the Secretary, or by leaving the same at the registered office of the Company or by tendering his written resignation at a meeting of the Directors, and on the acceptance of his resignation by the Directors, but not before, his office shall become vacant.
- 99. Removal of Directors.—The Company may, by a special resolution, remove any Director before the expiration of his period of office, and may, by an ordinary resolution appoint another person in his stead. The Director so appointed shall hold office only during such time as the Director in whose place he is appointed would have held the same if he had not been removed.
- 100. Indemnity to Directors and officers.—Every Director or officer of the Company, and his heirs, executors, and administrators shall be indemnified by the Company from all losses and expenses incurred by him in or about the discharge of his duties, except such as happen from his respective wilful acts or defaults; and no Director or officer shall, nor shall the heirs, executors, or administrators of any Director or officer, be liable for the acts or defaults of any other nor shall the heirs, executors, or administrators of any Director or officer, he habit for the acts or defaults of any other Director or officer, or for any loss of expense happening to the Company by the insufficiency or deficiency of title to any property acquired for or on behalf of the Company, or for the insufficiency or deficiency of any security in or upon which any of the moneys of the Company shall be invested, or for any loss or damage arising from the bankruptcy, insolvency, or tortuous act of any person with whom any moneys, securities, or effects shall be deposited, or for any other loss, damage, or misfortune whatsoever which shall happen in the execution of the duties of his office or in relation thereto, unless the same happen in the execution of the duties of his office or in relation thereto, unless the same happen through his own wilful
- 101. No contribution required from Directors.—No contribution shall be required from any present or past Director or Manager exceeding the amount, if any, unpaid on the shares in respect of which he is liable as a present or past Shareholder.

DISQUALIFICATION OF DIRECTORS.

- 102. When office of Director vacated. The office of the Director shall be vacated :--
- (a) If he become bankrupt or insolvent, or suspends payment, or files a petition for the liquidation of his affairs, or compounds with his creditors.

If by reason of mental or bodily infirmity he becomes incapable of acting.

(c) If he ceases to hold the required number of shares to qualify him for the office.

Exceptions.—Provided that no Director shall vacate his office by reason of his being a member of any corporation, company, or firm which has entered into any contract with, or done any work for the Company of which he is a Director, or by his being Agent, or Secretary, or Solicitor, or by his being a member of a firm who are Agents, or Secretaries, or Solicitors of the Company; nevertheless, he shall not vote ir respect of any contract work or business ir which he may be personally interested.

Powers of Directors.

103. Power to acquire property.—The Directors shall have power to carry into effect the lease, purchase, or acquisi-

tion of any lands, business, or property they may think fit, or any share or shares thereof.

104. Business to be managed by Directors.—The business of the Company shall be managed by the Directors either by themselves or through a Managing Director, or with the assistance of an agents, and secretaries of the Company to be appointed by the Directors for such a period, and on such terms as they shall determine, and the Directors shall pay

out of the funds of the Company all costs and expenses, as well preliminary as otherwise, paid or incurred, in and about the formation and the registration of the Company, and in connection with the placing of the shares of the Company, and in and about the valuation, purchase, lease, or acquisition of the properties and business of the Company, and otherwise

in or about the working and business of the Company.

105. Power to make rules, dc.—The Directors shall have power to make, and may make such rules or regulations for the management of the business and property of the Company as they may from time to time think proper, and shall carry on the business of the Company in such manner as they may think most expedient and, in addition to the powers and authorities by any Ordinance or by these presents expressly conferred on them, they may exercise all such powers, give all such consents, make all such arrangements, appoint all such agents, managers, secretaries, treasurers, accountants, and other officers, superintendents, assistants, clerks, artizans, labourers, and other servants for such period or periods, and with such remuneration, and at such salaries, and upon such terms and conditions as they may consider advisable, and may pay the expense occasioned thereby out of the funds of the Company, and may from time to time remove or suspend all or any of the manager, agents, treasurers, accountant, and other officers, clerks, or servants of the Company for such reason as they may think proper and advisable and without assigning any cause for doing so.

106. Directors to exercise all powers of the Company not required to be exercised in General Meeting.—The Directors shall exercise, in the name and on behalf of the Company, all such powers of the Company as are not expressly required to be exercised by the Company in General Meeting, and shall generally do all such acts and things as are or shall be by any Ordinance and by these presents directed and authorized to be exercised, given, made, or done by the Company, and are not by any Ordinance or by these presents required to be exercised or done by the Company in General Meeting, subject, nevertheless, to the provisions of any such Ordinance and of these presents, and to such regulations and provisions (if any) as may from time to time be prescribed by the Company in General Meeting; but no regulations made by the Company in General Meeting in Gene in General Meeting shall invalidate any prior act of the Board which would have been valid if such regulations had not

The generality of the powers conferred by any clause in these presents on the Directors shall not be taken to be

limited by any clause conferring any special or expressed power.

107. Power to appoint Proctors, &c.—The Directors shall have power to appoint a proctor or proctors, solicitor or solicitors, attorney or attorneys to assist in carrying on or protecting the business of the Company on such terms as they

may consider proper, and from time to time to revoke such appointment.

108. Power to open bank accounts and authorize persons to sign documents on behalf of the Company.—The Directors shall have power to open from time to time on behalf of the Company any account or accounts with such bank or banks as they may select or appoint, and also by such signatures as they may appoint to draw, accept, make, endorse, sign, and execute cheques, bills of exchan e and promissory notes, bills of lading, receipts, contracts, agreements, bonds, mortgages, proxies to any proctor or proctors, and other documents on behalf of and to further the interests of the Company.

109. Use of the Seal.—The seal of the Company shall not be used or affixed to any deed or instrument except in the presence of two or more of the Directors, or of one Director and the Secretary or Secretaries of the Company who shall attest the sealing thereof; such attestation on the part of Secretaries, in the event of a firm or corporation being the Secretaries, being signified by a partner or duly authorized manager, attorney, or agent of the said firm or corporation

signing for and on behalf of the said firm or corporation as such Secretaries.

110. Power to arra ge sale or amalgamation.—It shall be lawful for the Directors, if authorized so to do by the Shareholders in General Meeting, to arrange terms for the amalgamation of the Company with any other company or companies or individual or individuals, or for the sale or disposal of the business, property, and effects of the Company or any part or parts, share or shares thereof, respectively, to any company or companies or persons or persons, upon such terms and in such manner as the Directors shall think fit, and the Directors shall have power to do all such things as may be necessary for carrying such amalgamation, sale, or other disposition into effect so far as a resolution or special resolution of the Company is not by law necessary for such purposes, and in case any terms so arranged by the Directors include

or make necessary the dissolution of the Company, the Company shall be dissolved to that end.

111. Special powers.—In furtherance and not in limitation of, and without prejudice to, the general powers conferred or implied in the last preceding clause, and of the other powers conferred by these presents, it is hereby expressly declared that the Directors shall have the powers following (that is to say):—

(a) To institute, conduct, defend, compromise, settle, or abandon any action, suit, prosecution, or other legal proceedings on behalf of the Company, and also to compound and allow time for payment or satisfaction of any debts due to or from the Company, and of any claims or demands made by or against the Company.

To refer any claims or demands by or against the Company to arbitration, and observe and perform or enforce

the award.

(c) To make and give receipts, releases, and other discharges for money payable to the Company, and for claims and demands by the Company.

To act on behalf of the Company in all matters relating to bankrupts and insolvents, with power to accept

the office of trustee, assigns, liquidator, or inspector, or any similar office.

(e) To invest any of the moneys of the Company which the Directors may consider not to be immediately required for the purposes thereof upon such securities.

PROCEEDINGS OF DIRECTORS.

112. Meetings of Directors.—The Directors may meet for the despatch of business, adjourn, and otherwise regulate their meetings at such places and times and in such manner as they may think fit and determine the quorum necessary for the transaction of business. Until otherwise determined two Directors shall be a quorum. The Directors for the time being in Ceylon shall be competent to exercise all the powers by the Articles conferred upon the Board without communicating with any Director absent from Ceylon.

113. Director may summon meeting.—A Director may at any time summon a meeting of Directors.

114. Chairman.—The Board may elect a Chairman of their meetings and determine the period for which he is to hold office, and all meetings of the Directors shall be presided over by the Chairman, if one has been elected and is present, but if there is a vacancy in the office of Chairman, or if at any meeting of Directors the Chairman be not present at the time appointed for holding the same, then in that case the Directors present shall choose one of their number to be Chairman of such meeting.

115. Questions at meetings how decided.—Any questions which shall arise at any meeting of the Directors shall be decided by a majority of votes, and in case of an equality of votes the Chairman thereat shall have a casting vote in addition

to his vote as a Director.

116. Board may appoint Committee: .- The Board may delegate any of their powers to committees consisting of such member or members of their body as the Board think fit, and they may from time to time revoke and discharge any such committee, either wholly or in part, and either as to persons or purposes, but every committee so formed shall in exercise of the powers delegated to it conform to all such regulations as may be prescribed by the Board. All acts done by any such committee, in conformity with such regulations and in the fulfilment of the purposes of their appointment but not otherwise, shall have the like force and eff cts as if done by the Board.

117. Proceedings of Committee: .- The meetings and proceedings of such committees shall be governed by the provisions herein contained for regulating the meetings and proceedings of Directors, so far as the same are applicable thereto, and are not superseded by the express terms of the appointment of such committee respectively, or any regulation

imposed by the Board.

118. Acts of Board or committees valid notwithstanding informed appointment.—The acts of the Board and of any committees appointed by the Board shall, notwithstanding any vacancy in the Board or committee, or defect in the appointment or qualification of any Director or of any member of the committee, be as valid as if no vacancy or defect had existed, and as if such person had been duly appointed or qualified, provided the same be done before the discovery of the vacancy or defect.

119. Resolution in writing by all Directors as val d as if passed at Board Meeting. A resolution in writing signed by all the Directors for the time being in Ceylon, shall be as valid and effectual as if it had been passed at a meeting of the

Directors duly called and constituted.

Minutes.—The Directors shall cause minutes to be made in a book or books to be provided for the purpose:—

(1) Of all appointments of (a) officers and (b) committees made by the Directors.

(2) Of the names of the Directors present at each meeting of the Directors.

(3) Of the names of the members of the committee appointed by the Board present at each meeting of the committee.

(4) Of all orders made by the Directors.

(5) Of all resolutions and proceedings of all General Meetings of the Company.

(6) Of all resolutions and proceedings of all meetings of the Directors.

(7) Of all resolutions and proceedings of all meetings of committees appointed by the Board.

121. Signature of minutes and effects thereof.—All such minutes shall be signed by the person who shall have presided as Chairman at the General Meeting, the Board Meeting, or Committee Meeting at which the business minuted shall have been transacted, or by the person who shall preside as Chairman at the next ensuing General Meeting, or Board Meeting, or Committee Meeting, or Board Meeting, or Committee Meeting, as the case may be, and all minutes purporting to have been signed by any Chairman of any General Meeting, Board Meeting, or Committee Meeting, respectively, shall, for all purposes whatsoever, be prima facie evidence of the actual and regular passing of the resolution, and the actual and regular transaction or occurrence of the proceedings and other matters purporting to be so recorded, and of the regularity of the meeting at which the same shall appear to have taken place, and of the Chairmanship and signature of the person appearing to have signed as Chairman and of the date on which such meeting was held.

ACCOUNTS.

122. Accounts to be kept.—The Agent or Secretary or the Agents or Secretaries for the time being, or if there be no Agent or Secretary or Agents or Secretaries the Directors shall cause true accounts to be kept of the paid-up capital for the time being of the Company, and of all sums of money received and expended by the Company and of the matters in respect of which such sums were received and expended, and of the assets, credits, and liabilities of the Company are generally of all its commercial, financial, and other affairs, transactions, and engagements, and of all other matters necessary for showing the true financial state and condition of the Company. The accounts shall be kept in such books and in such a manner at the registered office of the Company as the Directors think fit.

123. Accounts how and when open to inspection.—The Directors shall from time to time determine whether and to what extent, and at what times and places, and under what conditions or regulations, the accounts and books of the Company or any of them shall be open to the inspection of the Shareholders, and no Shareholder shall have any right of inspecting any account or book or document of the Company, except as conferred by statute or authorized by the Directors or by

a resolution of the Company in General Meeting.

124. Statement of accounts and balance sheet.—At the Ordinary General Meeting in every year the Directors shall lay before the Company a statement of the moment and expenditure of the Company for the previous financial year, and

a balance sheet containing a summary of the property and liabilities of the Company made up to the end of the same period.

125. 126. Report of Directors to accompany statement.—Every such statement shall be accompanied by a report as to the state and condition of the Company, and as to the amount which the Directors recommend should be paid out of the profits by way of dividend or bonus to the Shareholders, and the statement, report, and balance sheet shall be signed by

127. Copy of balance sheet to be sent to Shareholders .- A printed copy of such balance sheet shall, at least seven

days previous to such meeting, be delivered at or posted to the registered address of every Shareholder.

AUDIT.

128. Accounts to be audited.—The accounts of the Company shall from time to time be examined, and the correctness of the balance sheet ascertained by one or more Auditor or Auditors.

129. Qualification of Auditors.—No person shall be eligible as an Auditor who is interested otherwise than as a Shareholder in any transaction of the Company, but it shall not be a necessary qualification for an Auditor that he be a Shareholder of the Company, and no Director or officer of the Company shall, during his continuance in office, be eligible as an Auditor.

130. Appointment of Auditors.—The Director shall appoint the first Auditor of the Company and fix his remuneration. He shall hold office till the First General Meeting of the Company. All subsequent appointments shall, except as is hereinafter mentioned, be made at the First Ordinary General Meeting of the Company in each year by the Shareholders present thereat, and the Auditor or Auditors appointed at such meeting shall hold only until the First Ordinary General Meeting after his or their appointments or until otherwise ordered by a General Meeting.

131. Remuneration of Auditors.—The remuneration of the Auditors other than the first shall be fixed by the

Company in General Meeting, and this remuneration may from time to time be varied by a General Meeting. 132. Retiring Auditors eligible for re-election.—Retiring Auditors shall be eligible for re-election.

133. Filling casual vacancy in office of Auditors.—If any vacancy that may occur in the office of Auditor is not supplied at the next Ordinary General Meeting, or if any casual vacancy shall occur in the office of Auditor, the Directors shall fill up the vacancy by the appointment of a person who shall hold office until the next Ordinary General Meeting after his appointment.

134. Duties of Auditors.—Every Auditor shall be supplied with a copy of the balance sheet intended to be laid before the next Ordinary General Meeting after his appointment, and it shall be his duty to examine the same with the

accounts and vouchers relating thereto and to report thereon to the meeting, generally or specially, as he may think fit.

135. Accounts to be open to Auditors.—The Auditor or Auditors for the time being shall have a list delivered to him or them of all books kept by the Company, and he or they shall at all reasonable hours in the day time have access to all accounts, books, and documents whatsoever of the Company for the purpose of audit.

DIVIDENDS, BONUS, AND RESERVE FUND.

136. Declaration of dividend.—The Directors may, with the sanction of the Company in General Meeting, from time to time declare a dividend to be paid and (or) pay a bonus to the Shareholders in proportion to the amount paid on their shares, but no dividend shall be payable except out of nett profits.

137. Interim Dividend.—The Directors may, if they think fit, determine on and declare an interim dividend to be paid, or pay a bonus to the Shareholders on account and in anticipation of the dividend for the then current year.

138. Reserve Fund.—The Directors may, before recommending any dividend or bonus, set aside out of the profits of the Company such sums as they think proper as a reserve fund to meet contingencies, or for special dividends, or for equalizing dividends, or for repairing, improving, and maintaining any of the property of the Company, or for repayment of mortgages, or for other pruposes as the Directors shall, in their absolute discretion, think conducive to the interests of *the Company, and may invest the several sums so set aside upon such investments as they may think fit, and from time to time deal with and vary such investments and dispose of all or any part thereof for the benefit of the Company, and to divide the reserve fund into such special funds as they may think fit, and to employ the reserve fund or any part thereof

in the business of the Company, and that without being bo nd to keep the same separate from their other assets.

139. Application of Reserve Fund.—The Directors may from time to time apply such portions as they think fit of the reserve fund to meet contingencies, or for equalizing dividends, or for working the business of the Company, or for repairing, improving, maintaining, or extending any of the property or plant of the Company or any part thereof, or for the redemption of mortgages, or for any other purposes connected with the interest of the Company that they may from

time to time deem expedient.

140. Unpaid dividend not to bear interest.—No unpaid dividends or bonus shall ever year interest against the

Company.

- 141. No Shareholder entitled to receive dividend whilst indebted to Company.—No Shareholder shall be entitled to receive payment of any dividend or bonus in respect of his share or shares whilst any moneys may be due or owing from him (whether alone or jointly with any other person) to the Company in respect of such share or shares or otherwise
- 142. Directors may deduct debt from dividend.—The Directors may deduct from the dividend or bonus payable to any Shareholder all such sums of money as may be due from him (whether alone or jointly with any other person) to the Company, and notwithstanding the fact that such sums or any of them are not payable until after the date when such dividend or bonus is payable.

 143. Notice of dividend.—Notice of any dividend that has been declared or of any bonus to be paid shall be given

to each Shareholder entitled thereto.

- Dividend on Shares held by firm.—Every dividend or bonus payable in respect of any share held by a firm 144. may be paid to, and an effectual receipt given by, any partner of such firm or agent duly authorized to sign the name of Dividend on Shares held jointly.—Every dividend or bonus payable in respect of shares held by several persons.
- jointly, other than a firm, may be paid to, and an effectual receipt given by, any one of such persons.

 146. Dividends how paid.—Any General Meeting declaring a dividend may direct payment of any 146. Dividends how paid.—Any General Meeting declaring a dividend may allow payment and declared at such meeting or of any interim dividends which may subsequently be declared by the Directors, wholly or in part by means of drafts or cheques on London.

Notices.

Notices how authenticated.—Notices from the Company may be authenticated by the signature (printed or . 147. written) of the Agent or Secretary, Agents or Secretaries, or persons appointed by the Board to authenticate the same.

148. Shareholder to register address.—Every Shareholder shall give an address in Ceylon or in the United Kingdom

which shall be deemed to be his place of abode, and shall be registered as such in the books of the Company

149. Service of Notices.—A notice may be served by the Company upon any Shareholder, either personally or by
being sent through the post in a perpaid letter addressed to such Shareholder at his registered address or addresses or
place of abode, and any notice so served shall be deemed to be well served notwithstanding that the Shareholder to whom such notice is addressed be dead, unless his executors or administrators shall have given to the Directors, or to the Agent or Secretary or Agents or Secretaries of the Company their own or some other address to which notices may be addressed.

150. Notices to Joint Shareholderr.—All hotices directed to be given to Shareholders shall, with respect to any share to which persons are jointly entitled other than a firm, be given to whichever of such persons is named first in the

Register of Shareholders, and notice so given shall be sufficient notice to all the holders of such shares.

151. Service by post.—Any notice if served by post shall be deemed to have been served on the day next after the day on which the letter containing the same is posted, and in proving such service it shall be sufficient to prove that the letter containing the notice was properly addressed and put into a post office or post box, and the entry in the Company's books of the leaving or sending by post of any notice at or to such address shall be sufficient evidence thereof, and no further evidence shall be necessary.

152. Addre's for ervice of notice.—Any Shareholder residing out of Ceylon may name and register in the books of the Company any address within Ceylon at which all notices shall be served upon him, and all notices served at such

address shall be deemed to be well served.

Notice by edvertisement.—Notices required to be given by advertisement shall be published in the Ceylon Government Gazette. ARBITRATION.

153. Directors may refer disputes to Arbitration. Whenever any question or other matter arises in dispute between the Company and any other company or person, the same may be referred by the Directors to arbitration.

EVIDENCE.

154. Evidence in action by Company against Shdreholder.—On the trial of any action or suit brought or instituted by the Company against any Shareholder or his representatives to recover any debt or money claimed to be due to the Company in respect of his shares, it shall be sufficient to prove that the name of the defendant is or was, when the claim arose, on the Register of Shareholders of the Company as a holder of the number of shares in respect of which such claims is made, and that the amount claimed is not entered as paid in the books of the Company; and it shall not be necessary to prove the registration of the Company, nor the appointment of the Directors who made any call, nor that a quorum of Directors was present at the Board at which any call was made, nor that the meeting at which any call was made was duly convened or constituted, nor any other matter whatsoever, but the proof aforesaid shall be conclusive evidence of

PROVISIONS RELATIVE TO WINDING UP OR DISSOLVING OF THE COMPANY.

155. WESTERN PROVINCE.

COLOMBO DISTRICT.

Maha season: in some korales the crop is being reaped and in others the crop is ripening.

Minutes of Proceedings of a General Meeting of the Municipal Council of Colombo held in the Town Hall on Friday, January 14, 1921, at 3 p.m.

THE Council met this day at 3 P.M., pursuant to notice dated January 8, 1921.

Present:—Mr. B. G. de Glanville, Chairman; Mr. C. P. Dias; the Hon. Mr. N. H. M. Abdul Cader; Mr. Arthur Alvis; Dr. E. V. Ratnam; Dr. W. P. Rodrigo; the Hon. Dr. G. J. Rutherford; Mr. W. C. S. Ingles; Mr. Harold Creasy; Mr. W. Philps; Mr. B. F. Khan; Mr. A. E. de Silva; Lieut.-Col. S. Boylan Smith, D.S.O., O.B.E.; Major W. H. Robinson; Mr. M. J. Cary; Mr. E. W. Jayewardene; Mr. R. L. Pereira; Mr. C. H. Z. Fernando; and Mr. T. H. Tatham.

The Minutes of the General Meeting of 3rd and of the Special Meeting of December 10, 1920, having been

previously printed and copies thereof having been sent to each Member of Council, were taken as read.

Dr. W. P. Rodrigo rose to a point of order with regard to Meeting, and stated that he had not received his notice of Meeting till Monday, the 10th instant, at 2.30 r.m., and, therefore, he considered that the notice, as required by the Ordinance, namely, four days, had not been given of the Meeting. After some discussion, the Chairman held that if the notice was served before 3 r.m. on Monday it was in time, and the Meeting, therefore, in order.

Resolved that the Minutes of the General Meeting of 3rd and of the Special Meeting of December 10, 1920, be

confirmed.

(a) The Chairman read the following:—Since the last Meeting of Council 74 further cases of human plague were recorded up to the end of the year making a total for the year 1920 of 234 cases, as compared with 87 cases during 1919. Forty-five, i.e., 64 per cent. of cases were bubonice which is an exceptionally large proportion. Twenty-four cases of plague have been recorded up to date this year, 8 of which were septic and 16 bubonic in character. Nine of these cases developed during December, but were not recorded until after the holidays. Most of the cases occurred in the Sea street and 2nd Division, Maradana, areas.

Rat Plague.—Fifteen cases of rat plague were discovered, making a total of 137 for the year 1920, as against 66 during Seven plague infected rats have been found up to date during the current year, of which 4 were killed by the Clayton The Medical Officer of Health reports that the recent increase of plague began during the week ended September 25, and reached a maximum during the week ended December 11, since when there has been a decided decrease. addition to the Sea street area, which, as usual, showed most cases, there were four other active centres of infection. One was in the Mosque lane area in Colpetty, the second in the De Mel street area of Slave Island, the third Rudd's lane, and the fourth at Dean's road. The Colpetty centre has had only one case (on December 24) since December 14, while the last case in De Mel street centre occurred on January 2. No case has occurred at Rudd's lane since December 10. The outdoor staff were kept at work throughout the Christmas holidays, with the single exception of New Year's day. Special measures were adopted to deal with this outbreak, which at one time was very threatening. A detailed report on this will be submitted later.

- 2. (b) The Chairman read the following:—Since the last Meeting of Council, 7 further cases of smallpox were discovered up to December 31, 1920, making a total of 75 cases during the year. Fourteen of these cases were concealed, and penalties were inflicted by the Court, ranging from a fine of Rs. 5 to a fine of Rs. 1,000. The accused in one case was sentenced to one month's rigorous imprisonment. Vaccination is being carried on vigorously in the infected areas. cases have been recorded up to 12th instant, 4 in Slave Island, and 1 vagrant who appears to have been infected in Slave Island. Two of these cases were concealed, and the parties responsible will be prosecuted.
- Pursuant to notice, Mr. C. P. Dias moved that this Council request the Chairman to take steps to prevent the inconvenience and danger caused to pedestrians and vehicle traffic by race horses being exercised in the public roads in Dr. E. V. Ratnam seconded. Colombo.

Mr. R. L. Pereira and Dr. W. P. Rodrigo spoke on the subject.

The Chairman stated what had been done in connection with the previous motion in Council on July 9, 1920, on the same subject, and undertook to write to the Superintendent of Police on the subject.

With the consent of the seconder, Mr. C. P. Dias wished to withdraw the motion. The motion was accordingly

withdrawn.

Mr. C. P. Dias moved that the Council do go into Committee to consider items Nos. 4 and 5 on the Agenda. Mr. Arthur Alvis seconded.—Carried.

The following extract from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Finance of November 24, 1920, and the report of the Special Committee re plague were laid before the Council in Committee:—
