

WHEREAS by section 1 of the Marriage of British Subjects (Facilities) Act, 1915, it is (amongst other things) enacted as follows :---

"Where His Majesty is satisfied that the law in force in any part of His Majesty's Dominions outside the United Kingdom makes due provision for the publication of banns, or for the giving of notice in respect of marriages, between British subjects intended to be solemnized or contracted in the United Kingdom, and for the recognition of certificates for marriage issued by Superintendent Registrars in England, and of certificates for marriage issued by Registrars, and certificates of proclamation of banns in Scotland, and of certificates for marriage issued by Registrars in Ireland, as sufficient notice in respect of marriages between British subjects intended to be solemnized or contracted in that part of His Majesty's Dominions, His Majesty may, by Order in Council, declare that this section shall apply to that part of His Dominions, and in such case—

- " (a) Where a marriage is intended to be solemnized or contracted in the United Kingdom between a British subject resident in England, Scotland, or Ireland, and a British subject resident in that part of His Majesty's Dominions, a certificate of notice of marriage issued in accordance with such law shall in England have the same effect as a certificate for marriage issued by a Superintendent Registrar, and in Scotland and Ireland have the same effect as a certificate for marriage issued by a Registrar in Scotland and Ireland respectively; and
- "(b) Where a marriage is intended to be solemnized or contracted in that part of His Majesty's Dominions between a British subject resident in that part and a British subject resident in England, Scotland, or Ireland, a certificate for marriage may be issued in England by a Superintendent Registrar, or in Scotland or Ireland by a Registrar, in the like manner as if the marriage was to be solemnized or contracted under circumstances requiring the issue of such a certificate, and as if both such British subjects were resident in England, Scotland, or Ireland, as the case may be : "

And whereas His Majesty is satisfied that due provision is made in respect of all the matters referred to in the hereinbefore recited section of the said Act by the law in force in the part of His Majesty's Dominions outside the United Kingdom hereinafter mentioned :

Section 1 of the Marriage of British Subjects (Facilities) Act, 1915, shall apply to the part of His Majesty's Dominions outside the United Kingdom hereunder mentioned :---

The Island of Ceylon and its Dependencies.

And the Right Honourable Walter Hume Long, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

No person shall within the limits of the Local Board keep any bakery, eating house, tea or coffee boutique, butcher's stall, fish stall, cattle gala, dairy, laundry, or common lodging house without an annual license from the Chairman of the Local Board, which license the Chairman is hereby empowered to refuse to any person failing to comply with any of the following rules or any existing Local Board rule providing for the regulation and control of the places aforesaid. Every such license shall remain in force until December 31 of the year in respect of which such license is issued or until such license is cancelled.

Such license shall further be subject to such fees as the Local Board shall from time to time determine with the sanction of the Governor in Council.

2. If any person shall have been convicted twice or oftener by any court of the breach of any of the following rules or any existing Local Board rule providing for the control of the places aforesaid, it shall be lawful for the court recording such second or subsequent conviction to cancel the license issued to such person under this chapter by the Chairman of the Local Board. Upon such cancellation of a license by a court the Chairman of the Local Board is empowered in his discretion to refuse to issue any fresh license to such person.

Provided that these rules shall not apply to stalls in markets established by or vested in any public body.

#### B.—Bakeries.

3. Bakery shall mean any premises on which bread, biscuits, or confectionery are baked for sale as food for man, and also includes any premises on which such food is prepared for taking or on which the materials for the preparation of such food are stored.

4. The room in which kneading takes place shall have a minimum superficial area of 12 feet by 15 feet. There shall be a free external air space on at least two sides not less than 7 feet wide to permit of through ventilation. The door of the oven shall not open directly into the kneading room. Every kneading room shall be provided with a ceiling.

5. Every bakery shall be well ventilated and well lighted, and the walls in every part shall not be less than 7 feet in height and be built of brick, stone, or cabook, the inside thereof to be limeplastered and whitewashed every six months. The roof shall be of some permanent material. The ceiling shall be plastered and limewashed four times yearly, or may be made of closely fitting boards varnished or painted. The floor shall be cemented throughout and adequate drainage provided. Every room shall be provided with windows capable of being opened and having a superficial area of not less than one-sixteenth of the superficial floor space.

6. The troughs and all the utensils used in the making of bread and pastry shall be kept scrupulously clean, and must be capable of being moved about for the purpose of cleaning the floor.

7. The floor shall be carefully scraped and swept at least once every twenty-four hours, and the sweepings shall be immediately placed in an impervious, covered receptacle and removed from the bakery daily.

8. Every bakery shall be kept in a cleanly state and free from effluvia arising from any drain, privy, cesspit, or other nuisance.

9. No bakery shall be within 50 feet of any cesspit, manure heap, open sewer, or privy.

10. No furniture or other articles are to be stored in the bakery other than those used in the manufacture of bread and pastry. 11. The tops of the tables are to be made of well seasoned closely fitting planks, or some non-harmful impervious material, and are to be scraped and cleaned daily.

12. No animal shall be kept in the bakery on any pretence whatever.

13. No person suffering, or who to the knowledge of any person in charge of the bakery has recently suffered, from any contagious or infectious disease, or has been recently in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, shall be permitted by any such person in charge of the bakery to enter the bakery or take part in the manufacture or sale of bread, biscuits, or confectionery.

14. All persons employed in the preparation and baking of bread shall wash their hands before engaging in the process of breadmaking, and shall wear clean white aprons covering the chest and body, and also a white cap or turban.

15. Clean water and soap shall be provided for the use of those engaged in the manufacture of bread, biscuits, and confectionery.

16. All bread, biscuits, confectionery, and sweetmeats exposed for sale shall be kept in properly constructed glass cases free from flies. The cases shall be kept scrupulously clean.

17. The flour, water, and other materials used in the manufacture of bread shall be good and wholesome, and the flour shall be kept on a platform raised 3 feet above the ground.

18. All refuse around the premises of a bakery shall be removed daily and drains well flushed.

19. No place on the same level with the bakery and forming part of the same building shall be used as a sleeping place, unless it is effectually separated from the bakery by a partition extending from the floor to the ceiling; no watercloset, earth-closet, privy, or ashpit shall be within, or communicate directly with, the bakery.

20. It shall be lawful for the Local Board Secretary, Inspector, or other person authorized in writing by the Chairman at all reasonable times and at any time when the process of baking is being carried on to enter and inspect any bakery or place used for the sale of bread.

21. A copy of these by-laws shall be framed and hung up in a prominent place in every bakery.

C.-Eating Houses and Tea and Coffee Boutiques.

22. All eating houses and tea and coffee boutiques shall be

kept clean and sanitary to the satisfaction of the Chairman. 23. All utensils, furniture, and other requisites used in or belonging to any eating house or tea or coffee boutique shall always be kept clean.

24. The walls of all eating houses and tea and coffee boutiques shall be plastered and at least twice a year limewashed and the rooms shall be well ventilated and lighted.

25. All refuse and dirt in or about the premises of any eating house or tea or coffee boutique shall be removed twice daily.

26. No person suffering, or who to the knowledge of any person in charge of an eating house or tea or coffee boutique has recently suffered, from any contagious or infectious disease, or has been recently in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, shall be permitted by any such person in charge of the eating house or tea or coffee boutique to be employed in or about any such eating house or tea or coffee boutique.

27. The sugar used in such place shall be kept in glassstoppered wide-mouthed bottles.

28. All cakes, sweetmeats, &c., exposed for sale shall be kept in properly constructed glass cases free from flies. No foodstuffs shall be exposed to the contamination of flies. The glass cases used shall be kept scrupulously clean.

By His Excellency's command, GRAEME THOMSON, Colonial Secretary. 29. No waste tea, coffee, or milk, or remnants of food or cocking waste, shall be thrown on the ground, but shall be collected in a proper receptacle and removed daily.

30. No adulterated milk shall be sold or offered or exposed for sale or kept on the premises of any eating house or tea or coffee boutique.

For the purposes of this rule adulterated milk shall mean milk to which water or any other foreign liquid or substance has been added for the purpose of augmenting its quantity or enhancing its apparent quality and not for the purpose of preparing tea or coffee or any other beverage for the immediate consumption of customers.

31. These by-laws shall be framed and hung up in a prominent place in every such eating house or tea or coffee boutique.

#### D.—Butchers' Stalls.

32. Every butchers' stall shall be well ventilated and well lighted, the walls thereof shall be plastered and whitewashed at least four times a year, and the floor cemented and sufficient drainage provided.

33. Every room in which meat is kept shall be scrupulously clean.

34. Every table used in a butcher's stall shall be covered with zinc or other impermeable substance approved by the Chairman. Such tables and the chopping block and all implements shall be kept scrupulously clean. They shall be washed with water and scrubbed with a hard clean brush immediately after use. All hooks for hanging meat shall be polished and free from rust.

35. Refuse and unsaleable material, offal, &c., if not immediately removed, shall be kept in a zinc lined box, with a perforated zinc cover, the perforation to be of such size as to prevent flies entering.

36. All refuse and dirt in and about the premises of a butcher's stall shall be removed at least once a day and the drains well flushed.

. 37. No person suffering, or who to the knowledge of any person in charge of a butcher's stall has recently suffered, from any contagious or infectious disease, or has been recently in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, shall be permitted by any such person in charge of the butcher's stall to be employed in such butcher's stall.

38. Every butcher shall provide himself with a movable bin or receptable of metal for waste material.

39. Every butcher's stall and the management and conduct of the business shall be at all times open and subject to inspection by the Chairman of the Local Board or by any person duly authorized by the Chairman. 40. These by-laws shall be framed and hung up in a

40. These by-laws shall be framed and hung up in a prominent place in every butcher's stall.

### E.-Fish Stalls.

41. Every fish stall shall be well ventilated and well lighted; and the walls thereof shall be plastered and at least twice a year limewashed. The floor shall be of smooth cement, having a proper fall leading to a mansonry drain built in cement and cement plastered, emptying into a bucket. The drain and bucket shall be washed with disinfectants at least twice a day, and the bucket shall not be allowed to overflow. The stall shall always be kept clean and free from stains of blood and dust, and the walls and floor kept in a state of repair.

42. Instead of the drain referred to in the last preceding rule, a fishmonger may use a large zinc sheet or concrete counter having a fall towards its centre and so arranged that the washing shall fall into the bucket.

43. Every table used in a fish stall shall be covered with zinc or other impermeable substance approved by the Chairman. Such tables and the chopping block and all implements shall be kept scrupulously clean. They shall be washed with water and scrubbed with a hard clean brush immediately after use. All hooks for hanging fish shall be polished and free from rust.

44. Fish baskets shall be washed daily and kept exposed to sun and air on a shelf and not to be kept inside the fish shop.

45. Every fish stall holder shall provide himself with a movable receptacle of metal for waste material.

46. All refuse and dirt in or about the premises of a fish stall shall be removed at least once a day and the drains well flushed.

47. No person suffering, or who to the knowledge of any person in charge of a fish stall has recently suffered, from

any contagious or infectious disease, or has been recently in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, shall be permitted by any such person in charge of the fish stall to be employed in such fish stall.

48. Every fish stall and the management and conduct of business shall at all reasonable times be open and subject to the inspection by the Chairman or by any person duly authorized by the Chairman.

49. These by-laws shall be framed and hung up in a prominent place in every fish stall.

#### F.-Galas.

50. Every licensed gala shall be registered by the Chairman, and a notice board shall be hung up by the licensee at the entrance to every such gala with the words "Registered Gala No.——" and the name of the owner painted thereon.

51. Every gala or halting place for carts or cattle shall be properly levelled and drained to the satisfaction of the Chairman, and the ground shall either be paved or properly consolidated with broken metal, so that it keeps a hard and level surface. All buildings in such gala or halting place used for keeping the bulls or other animals must be so constructed and kept as to comply with rule 52. Such gala or halting place shall be kept in a clean and sanitary state, being thoroughly cleansed daily, and all dung and refuse removed daily to such place at a distance from any dwelling houses as the Chairman shall approve. No goods, materials, or substance of any kind shall be deposited upon such gala or halting place in such a manner as to obstruct such daily cleansing.

The owner, tenant, or occupier of every building or 52. shed used as a stable, cattle stall, or cattle halting place shall provide the same to the satisfaction of the Chairman with suitable cemented drains to carry off washings, urine, or rain water. Provided that the Chairman, if he considers it necessary, may require such drains to be so constructed as to convey the urine or washings into one or more covered receptacles constructed in such a manner as the Chairman shall direct, the contents of which shall be daily removed at the expense of such owner, tenant, or occupier and disposed of so that no nuisance is caused thereby. The floor of such of so that no nuisance is caused thereby. The floor of such building or shed shall be paved with brick rendered in cement, stone, cement concrete, asphalt, or other hard material which can readily be kept clean, and shall be kept even and in good repair. If such building or shed is so constructed that it can be whitewashed, this shall be done at least once in six months or oftener if the Chairman shall so direct. (Provided that the Chairman may relax any of the above regulations if, owing to the distance of the building or shed from human dwellings or for any other reason, he shall consider the same unecessary.) Provided also that the Chairman may, if he considers it necessary, require any building to be used as a stable, cattle stall, or cattle halting place to be constructed of stone, brick, or other permanent materials, and to have a tiled or iron roof.

53. Every stable, cattle stall, or cattle halting place shall be kept in a clean and sanitary state, being thoroughly cleansed daily, and dung and refuse removed daily to such a place at a distance from any dwelling houses as the Chairman shall approve.

54. Every gala shall be open for inspection at all reasonable times by the officers of the Board or by any other person thereto authorized in writing by the Chairman. All orders which the Chairman is empowered to make under these by-laws shall be in writing.

#### G.-Dairies.

55. For the purpose of rules under section 56(5) a "dairy" shall mean and include any farm, farmhouse, cow shed, milk store, milk shop, or other place from which milk is supplied or in which milk is stored or kept for the purposes of sale.

of sale. "Dairyman" shall include any cow keeper, purveyor of milk, or occupier of a dairy, and in cases where a dairy is owned by more than one person, the manager or other person actually managing such dairy.

56. No dairy shall be located in any compound within 100 feet of an open cesspit or surface latrine or in a position where bad odours will reach it, and no open cessipt or surface latrine shall be erected within 100 feet of any dairy.

57. Every dairy compound shall be sufficiently provided with proper drainage to the satisfaction of the Chairman, and the drains shall be kept flushed. No foul water shall be allowed to stagnate in any dairy compound.

58. All refuse and dirt in and around the dairy premises shall be removed without delay. Cowdung shall be removed daily.

59. A pure and protected supply of water must be provided at convenient distance for the use of every dairy. No bathing or washing of clothes shall take place at or near this water supply.

60. The milch cows and buffaloes shall be free from disease, and no person suffering from, or who to the know-ledge of any person in charge of a dairy has recently suffered from, any contagious or infectious disease, or has been recently in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, shall be permitted by any such person in charge of the dairy to be employed in such dairy.

61. All dairymen shall see that their cattle are washed as to udders and teats before milking, and the milker is to wash his hands thoroughly with soap and water before milking. Every precaution shall be taken to prevent contamination of milk by dung or urine.

62. No dairyman or owner of a dairy shall adulterate milk by the addition of any water or any other foreign liquid or substance thereto, nor shall he sell or offer or expose for sale milk so adulterated.

63. All utensils, furniture, and other requisites used in or belonging to a dairy shall be kept clean.

64. All vessels sent out containing milk shall be scrupulously clean, and shall be properly covered, stoppered, or corked with clean materials, and shall not be carried under the armpit, nor shall the mouths of the bottles be fingered.

65. The sheds and yards where cattle are kept shall be subject to and satisfy the requirements of the rule 52 of the Local Board regulations regarding galas.

Every licensee of a dairy shall have a milk room, erected in such a position and at such a distance from the cowsheds as the Chairman of the Local Board shall approve, for the storing and preparation of milk, and in which all vessels used in his trade are to be stored after cleansing. The floor shall be cemented with rounded corners at its junction with the walls, the walls shall be of plastered mansonry, smooth boards, or iron work, to be limewashed or painted periodically as directed by the Chairman or the Senior Sanitary Officer. At least two opposite walls of the milk room shall abut on the open air. The roof shall be ceiled with grooved boards to prevent the ingress of dust. There shall be at least one window and one door. The window shall be 3 ft. by 2 ft. without glass or shutters and be The door shall be opposite the fitted with flyproof netting. window, be close fitting and fitted with flyproof netting, and shall be kept closed. A table with a covering of marble, slate, or zinc or other approved impermeable substance shall be placed in the milk room. This room shall be used for no other purpose than that of storing and preparing milk, and the storing after cleansing of all vessels used in the trade.

67. Every licensee of a dairy shall keep a list of his customers, which shall be open at all reasonable times for inspection by the Chairman of the Local Board, the Senior Sanitary Officer, or his assistants.

68. The number of cows for which each dairy is licensed shall be stated in such license.

69. No licensee of a dairy shall change the location of his dairy without having first obtained the permission of the Chairman, nor shall milking take place at any place other than at the licensed premises.

70. Every mains of a dairy shall keep a report book in his milk room, in which Inspecting Officers may make their report each time they visit the dairy.

their report each time they visit the dairy.
71. Every dairy situated within the limits of the Local Board shall be registered by the Chairman, who shall issue to such applicant a card of registration bearing his name and number. These cards are to be shown to authorized officers of the Board when required by them to do so.
72. The Chairman of the Local Board, the Senior

72. The Chairman of the Local Board, the Senior Sanitary Officer or his assistant, the Chief Headman of the district, or any Sanitary Inspector appointed by the Chairman of the Local Board, or the Senior Sanitary Officer to do sanitary inspection in the Local Board town, shall be at all times empowered to take a sample of milk for analysis from any licensed dairy or from any person selling milk or exposing milk for sale within Local Board limits.

73. A copy of these by-laws shall be hung in the milk room of every dairy.

#### H.-Laundries.

74. For the purpose of rules under section 56 (5) "laundry" means any building, shed, land, place, well, or other source from which water is obtained, used for the purpose of carrying on the business or trade of washing or drying of clothes for any person or persons for hire, or any building shed or place used by any laundryman for the purpose of ironing, depositing, or storing clothes; and "laundryman" means the occupier of any laundry premises as hereinbefore defined, or any person engaged in the washing, drying, ironing, depositing, or storing of clothes for hire.

75. Every laundryman shall, when so required by the Chairman, provide a separate room for soiled linen, which must be well ventilated and clean at all times and whitewashed twice annually.

76. A laundryman shall not store soiled linen in any room used as a living apartment.

77. The Chairman shall when he considers it necessary in the interests and for the good of the public health allocate special sites for the washing of clothes; such sites will be indicated by a notice board.

78. When any laundryman or any member of his family or household shall contract any infectious or contagious disease, he shall within twenty-four hours report the same to the Chairman of the Local Board either through the Inspector or the Police Headman.

79. When any laundryman or any member of his family or household shall contract any infectious or contagious disease, all work in the laundry shall immediately cease, nor shall any clothes be taken into the laundry or sent out of it after the outbreak and during the prevalence of such disease, save by special permission of the Chairman.

80. No laundryman shall, without the permission of the Chairman of the Local Board or the Senior Sanitary Officer, receive soiled linen from any house in which there is reason to believe that a member thereof is suffering from any infectious disease.

81. Every laundryman shall when called upon by the Chairman of the Local Board or the Senior Sanitary Officer or his assistant give a list of the persons for whom he washes.

#### I.—Common Lodging Houses.

82. For the purpose of rules under section 56 (5) "common lodging houses "shall mean any house or any part of a house in which four or more persons not being members of the same family are housed for hire.

83. A common lodging house shall be substantially built and kept in a good state of repair, and the sleeping rooms shall be well ventilated and lighted to the satisfaction of the Chairman, and the walls thereof whitewashed thrice annually.

84. The keeper of a common lodging house shall at all times keep the place clean and in a sanitary condition. He shall cause all filth and offensive matter to be removed from the premises.

85. When any person in a common lodging house becomes ill with any infectious or contagious disease, the keeper shall immediately inform the proper authority either through the Local Board Inspector or the Police Headman, and shall obey the directions of the proper authority with regard to the vacation of the lodging house, disinfection or destruction of bedding, clothing, and other articles, and fumigation, disinfection, and limewashing of the house.

86. The keeper of a common lodging house shall be responsible for the provision of sufficient latrine accommodation for the inmates and for the keeping of the same in a sanitary condition.

87. The Chairman of the Local Board is hereby empowered to decide the maximum number of persons that may be accommodated in any common lodging house, and such number shall be endorsed upon the license. Any common lodging house-keeper allowing the number to be exceeded shall be guilty of an offence. For the purposes of this rule two children under twelve years of age shall count as one person.

88. The premises of any common lodging house shall at all reasonable times be open for inspection by the Chairman of the Local Board, the Senior Sanitary Officer or his assistant, the Chief Headman of the District, and any Inspector appointed by the Chairman of the Local Board or the Senior Sanitary Officer to do sanitary inspection in the Local Board town in which such common lodging house is situated. Depôt weights must be accepted, but buyers can have the 4. Depôt weights must be accepted, but buyers can have the right of giving notice, before the expiration of the date of payment, of having the actual weight ascertained. Should the difference between the depôt weight and the weight ascertained after re-weighing be more than  $1\frac{1}{2}$  per cent., the cost of re-weighing is to be borne by the Forest Department, and if within  $1\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. by the purchaser; any difference between the depôt weight and the weight ascertained after re-weighing is to be paid or allowed for set the asse may be should two or more purchasers or allowed for, as the case may be. Should two or more purchasers desire to re-weigh their timber on the same day, precedence will be given to the buyer whose notification of intention to re-weigh reaches the Assistant Conservator of Forests first.

No timber shall be removed before payment of the full price bid, and all timber sold must be removed from the depôt within ten days of date of notification of acceptance by the Conservator of Forests of such bid, and will be at the risk of the purchasors until removed.

6. Should any person to whom a lot is knocked down refuse to take it over at the full price bid, or refuse or fail to sign the sale book and pay 25 per cent. of his bid when so required, or refuse or fail to pay the full purchase amount or balance thereof, as the case may be, and to remove the timber within the time specified in clause 5 above, the lot will again be put up for auction, and the original purchaser or bidder will be held liable for any loss to Government owing to a lower price being realized at the re-sale, while, if an enhanced price is realized at such re-sale, he shall, however, have no claim to the profit which shall accrue to Government.

Agents bidding for others will be required to produce a written authority from the firm or persons for whom they bid, such authority will be retained by the Assistant Conservator of Forests, and will hold good only at the particular sale at which it is produced.

### Minutes of Proceedings of a General Meeting of the Municipal Council of Colombo held in the Town Hall on Friday, March 4, 1921, at 3 p.m.

THE Council met this day at 3 P.M., pursuant to notice dated February 25, 1921.

Present :---Mr. B. G. de Glanville, Chairman; Mr. C. P. Dias; the Hon. Mr. N. H. M. Abdul Cader; Mr. Arthur Alvis; Dr. E. V. Ratnam; Dr. W. P. Rodrigo; the Hon. Dr. G. J. Rutherford; Mr. W. C. S. Ingles; Mr. Harold Creasy; Mr. W. Philps; Mr. B. F. Khan; Mr. A. E. de Silva; Major W. H. Robinson; Mr. M. J. Cary; Mr. E. W. Jayewardene; Mr. R. L. Pereira; Mr. C. H. Z. Fernando; and Mr. T. H. Tatham.
1. The Minutes of the General Meeting of February 4, 1921, having been previously printed and copies thereof

having been sent to each Member of Council, were taken as read.

Resolved that the Minutes of the General Meeting of February 4, 1921, be confirmed.

(a) The Chairman read the following :-Since the last Meeting of Council 52 cases of human plague have been recorded, making a total of 118 up to date this year, as against a total of 45 for the corresponding period of last year. Forty-three of the cases have proved fatal. Eighteen of the cases were septizemic and 33 were bubonic in character. The character of one case which was reported from outside the town was not stated. The distribution of the cases was as follows :--Pettah 9, Wolfendhal 5, Kochchikade 2, Ferry street 3, Maradana 4, Jampettah street 2, whilst in 7 cases there was no fixed residence. The rest were widely scattered throughout the town.

Rat Plague.-Twelve infected rats were found, all being confirmed by backeriological examination, making a total up to date this year of 31 as against a corresponding total of 56 last year. In addition to these, a number of mummified rats, which had apparently died of plague, were found in the infected areas.

2. (b) The Chairman stated that there had been no case of smallpox since January 28, and that the Medical Officer has declared that the town may now be regarded as free from that infection.

3. Pursuant to notice, Mr. C. P. Dias moved that this Council request the Chairman to invite the attention of the Tramway Company to the great inconvenience caused to the Churches, dwelling houses, and public offices along the tram routes by the rattle and overloud noise of the rickety old cars. Dr. E. V. Ratnam seconded.—Carried.

4. Pursuant to notice, Mr. C. H. Z. Fernando moved that this Council condemns any further acquisition of land by Government within the city for residential purposes for Government servants, since such acquisition by the Government tends to limit the residential area available to the public, artificially enhances the price of land, and promotes an increase of rents in respect of the remaining area. Mr. C. P. Dias seconded.

Mr. M. J. Cary opposed the motion, and moved as an amendment that, with a view to dealing with the housing problem, a Committee be appointed to inquire into and report to this Council what land is or could be made available for building purposes in the different wards with its approximate value, and what class of buildings it is desirable should be Mr. T. H. Tatham seconded. built thereon.

Mr. W. C. S. Ingles supported the amendment.

The Chairman stated that he had had a plan prepared by the Works Engineer showing definitely and as accurately as possible the land available at present. The estimated totals were as follows :- Government land suitable and available as possible the land available at present. The estimated totals were as follows :--Government land suitable and available for building, 128 acres; private land suitable and available for building, 511 acres; land liable to be flooded, 2,190 acres; private land suitable for building but not available at present, 200 acres. He then put the amendment to the meeting and declared it carried. Mr. M. J. Cary next proposed that the Committee should consist of the following :--Dr. W. P. Rodrigo, Messrs. H. T. Creasy, C. H. Z. Fernando, T. H. Tatham, and the Chairman; the member for each ward to be an *ex-officio* member in considering the land available in his respective ward. Mr. T.H. Tathan seconded. Mr. A. E. de Silva, Dr. W. P. Rodrigo, and Mr. E. W. Jayewardene spoke against the constitution of the

Committee.

After some discussion, it was agreed that the Comn ittee should consist of all the Ward Members, together with Mr. W. C. S. Ingles and Mr. Harold Creasy. 5. Pursuant to notice, Mr. C. H. Z. Fernando moved that this Council is of opinion that, with a view to relieving

congestion in the city and adding to the residential area, steps should be taken in conjunction with Government for the removal beyond the gravets, of the racecourse and the Ladies' Golf Links, and the conversion of the land into building blocks; the proceeds of the sale of which should be devoted to the improvement of the City of Colombo after the payment of compensation, if any, to the Turf and Golf Clubs. Mr. A. E. de Silva seconded. The Chairman suggested that, in view of the Committee appointed in connection with the previous motion to con-

sider the various areas in the town which should be made available for building purposes, the consideration of the matter of these two areas should await the deliberations of that Committee. Mr. C. H. Z. Fernando thought it desirable that there should be an expression of opinion by Council on the matter. Dr. W. P. Rodrigo, Messrs. M. J. Cary, R. L. Pereira, and C. P. Dias opposed the motion. Mr. E. W. Jayewardene endorsed the suggestion of the Chairman that the matter should be referred to the Committee already appointed. Mr. C. H. Z. Fernando consented to witdraw the motion. The Chairman stated that as the matter had been fully discussed, as desired by the mover, the motion should be put to the meeting. Dr. W. P. Rodrigo moved as an amendment that this question should be deferred for consideration by the Committee appointed in regard to the previous motion. Dr. E. V. Ratnam seconded.—Carried.

6, Pursuant to notice, Mr. C. H. Z. Fernando moved that a Committee be appointed to inquire into the working of the various Departments of the Council's service and report on the feasibility of their re-organization, with a view to retrenchment and increased efficiency. Dr. W. P. Rodrigo seconded.

The Chairman stated that he considered that the question of the revision of salaries should await the report of the Salaries Commission appointed by Government. The motion was put to the meeting and it was declared carried. Mr. C. H. Z. Fernando moved that the Committee should consist of the Chairman and the Four Standing Committees. Mr. C. P. Dias seconded.

Mr. R. L. Pereira moved as an amendment, that the Committee consist of :---

The Chairman, Mr. Harold Creasy, Mr. A. E. de Silva, and Mr. C. H. Z. Fernando. Mr. M. J. Cary seconded. Dr. W. P. Rodrigo suggested the addition of the names of Mr. Arthur Alvis and Dr. E. V. Ratnam. This having

been accepted by the mover and the seconder of the amendment, the following Committee was unanimously appointed : The Chairman, Mr. Arthur Alvis, Dr. E. V. Ratnam, Mr. Harold Creasy, Mr. A. E. de Silva, and Mr. C. H. Z. Fernando.

7. Pursuant to notice, the Chairman moved that the resignation of Mr. C. L. Cox of his appointment as City Sanitation Engineer be accepted, and that his transfer to employment under the Government of Nigeria be approved by the Council-Mr. Cox to retain a claim to ultimate pension for his service under the Municipality under the provisions of Rule 18A of the Council's Pension Minute.

The Chairman stated that if Rule 18A was not thought to be applicable, then Rule 33 would apply. Mr. E. W. Jayewardene, Dr. W. P. Rodrigo, and Dr. E. V.\*Ratnam were against the n otion. Mr. M. J. Cary seconded

8. To consider the report of the Special Committee re plague. (Vide Annexure A at the end of these Minutes.)

#### Resolution.

(a) The words "there is" in second line should be deleted.
(b) The word "Committee" in third line should be substituted by the word "Council."

(c) The words "no objection to the Medical Officer of Health considering the possibility of allowing" should be

substituted by the words "the proper authority may allow." The paragraph to read : In pneumonic cases immediate removal of the patient to the Infectious Diseases Hospita is considered necessary. In cases other than pneumonic, in the opinion of this Council, the proper authority may allow any particular case to be treated elsewhere under conditions and precautions which he considers satisfactory. Mr. C. P. Dias seconded.-Carried.

9. To consider the report of the Special Committee re Motor Bus services in Colombo. (Vide annexure B at the end of these Minutes.)

#### Resolution.

Tatham urged that the Council should aim at the arterial (trunk) roads being wide enough to carry any traffic which may be put on them, and particularly urged that the widening of the Bambalapitiya road should receive the carly consideration of the Council. acquisition, Rs. 1,848.—Total, Rs. 8,607.—Recommended.
5. To consider an application from Dr. E. R. Loos, 2nd Assistant Medical Officer of Health, with regard to his position and prospects in the Council's service. This officer according to the present scheme receives only one increment between 1911 and 1926, viz., in 1918.—Recommended increments of Rs. 250 per annum, from January 1, 1921, till a maximum Rs. 6,000 per annum is reached. ANNEXURE A.

### Report of the Special Committee re Plague.

(As amended and adopted by Council.)

We are of opinion that the chief means of preventing plague in Colombo is the reduction of rats. This, however, is very difficult to effect, in view of the existence of many breeding places; there are many old untrapped drains whose exact location is not known. In addition, rat holes abound in the poorer quarters, the earthen material of walls and floors being such as to promote the existence of homes for rats.

The absence of rat-proof stores for grain and other food promotes the breeding of rats, while the aversion to taking life or the apathy of householders places almost the whole burden of rat destruction on the Municipality. About 100,000 rats are killed per annum by the sanitary staff, but experience proves that rats will not be exterminated or appreciably reduced in numbers by the above method so long as breeding places, non-rat proof food stores, and food abound.

3. We recommend that a survey be made of untrapped old drains with a view to making them rat-proof where these drains are located. We suggest that the Government granaries be made absolutely rat-proof, and that steps be taken to make most food stores rat-proof. We recognize that it is beyond the means of all sellers of food to undergo the expense of rat-proofing their stores, and still more so of all the poor to rat-proof their houses; but we are of opinion that until food stores and breeding places are dealt with, the rat-flea and his host, the rat, will continue to spread plague.

The demolition of slums and the substitution of sanitary dwellings are thus the chief means of preventing plague. With this must go the abolition of overcrowding. This task is largely one for the Board of Improvement, as the expenditure needed will be too great for an already over-burdened Municipality.

5. Educative and propaganda work should be started by popular lectures to children and adults about the cause of and the means of preventing plague, so as to try to induce the public to co-operate in the work of reducing the rat population.

6. It is suggested that printed leaflets be issued explaining to the public what should be done and the regulations as regards diseased persons and contacts, so that every one may know what is required of him and what is not.

7. Plague is a most deadly disease, and every measure necessary to prevent its spread should be adopted.

In pneumonic cases immediate removal of the patient to the Infectious Diseases Hospital is considered necessary. 8. In cases other than pneumonic, in the opinion of this Council, the proper authority may allow any particular case to be treated elsewhere under conditions and precautions which he considers satisfactory.

In the Infectious Disease, Hospital, patients' own medical advisers should be allowed to visit the patients in consultation with the Medical Officer-in-charge.

10. Where contacts are persons of standing who can be trusted to report themselves to the authorities, and who can furnish security to the satisfaction of the Medical Officer of Health, they might be allowed to carry on their business and report themselves twice a day, instead of being sent to the Segregation Camp, provided they move into a suitable house and do not carry thereto any infected articles from the infected house.

11. In the case of contacts who cannot be trusted, identified, traced, or the like, they should be sent to the Camp, unless they secure a suitable house instead and pay the cost of a Police Guard on the house. This control over the move ments of contacts is, in the opinion of this Committee, necessary to enable plague to be detected at once in the case of contacts, the persons most likely to contract it from the same house or the patient.

12. The Committee recommended that it should be brought to the notice of all medical practitioners in Colombo that the Medical Officer of Health is prepared to consider any case as indicated in paragraph 8 above.

#### ANNEXURE B.

### Report of the Special Committee re Motor Bus Services in Colombo.

(As adopted by Council.)

The Committee have, so far as was possible, considered the question of the proposed introduction of motor bus services in Colombo in all its bearings. The Superintendent of Police, Colombo, and the Acting Municipal Works Engineer, were present, and were consulted throughout their deliberations.

2. The majority of the Committee are doubtful whether motor bus services would provide a cheaper or more satisfactory means of passenger transport than those already in existence. It is recognized, however, that this opinion may possibly prove to be incorrect, and the Committee are unanimously agreed that, subject to due protection of the interests of the rate payers as a whole, everything possible should be done to render the introduction and trial of such services possible.

3. The Committee is of opinion that in the interests of public health and of the proprietors or occupiers of properties fronting on motor bus routes, it is essential that no bus service should be allowed on a gravel road or on a macadam road not treated with tar or other adequate dust palliative.

4. The routes at present proposed by the Companies who contemplate running motor bus services are shown in the plan annexed \* to this report and are as follows :-

(1) From the Fort to Wellawatta via Queen street, Galle Face road, Kollupitiya road, and Galle road.

(2) From the Fort to Cotta via Parson's road, Short's road, Union Place, and Ward Place.

(3) From the Fort to Mutwal via Main street, Reclamation road, Alutmawata road, Fisher's street, and Modera street with a branch route from Korteboam street down Skinner's road north to Grandpass road. (4) From Grandpass to the 5th mile on the Kandy road via Victoria Bridge and Kandy road.

The Committee are of opinion that in the present state of the Kollupitiya road, no motor bus service can or should be allowed over this road.

They are of opinion that though some of the roads comprised in the other proposed routes leave much to be desired in the matter of width, they may be sanctioned so far as they lie within Municipal limits, except that on the proposed route to Mutwal, no service should at present be allowed further north than the Docklands Hotel, Modera street.

· 7. The Committee are further of opinion that it is not feasible, without an unworkable congestion of traffic to allow motor buses to come further into the Fort than as follows :-

Main street.—The junction with Leyden Bastion road or the Customs entrance in Leyden Bastion road.

Parsons' road.-The four-way junction on the Fort side of Parsons' road bridge.

The question of an alternative route to serve Bambalapitiya and Wellawatta was considered. The Committee 8. are of opinion that the following alternative route may be sanctioned if and when the narrow portion of the Bambalapitiya road immediately south of Buller's road junction is widened, viz., Union place, Alexandra place, Serpentine road, and Bambalapitiya road as far as the Kirillapone canal bridge.

9. The Committee are further of opinion that the widening of the narrow portion of Bambalapitiya road above referred to is a necessary and urgent measure which should be taken in hand as soon as funds permit, irrespective of the question of motor buses.

10. There can be no question but that the running of ten or fifteen minutes' motor hus services, such as those proposed, will cause very considerable extra wear of the roads over which they are run. The Works Engineer is of opinion that in the case of roads which already have a good foundation and a good thick covering of metal, such extra wear can be met by increasing the number of applications of tar or other preservative. In the case, however, of roads where the present coating of metal is thinner, it will be necessary to re-metal the roads more frequently. At present tar is applied to the roads on which it is used either once or in most cases twice a year. It is estimated that on roads over which the proposed services are to run, it will be necessary to apply tar or other preservative three times per annum. The total cost of such extra treatment and of the extra metalling which will be required on a comparatively small portion of the routes recommended to be sanctioned is estimated to be in the neighbourehood of Rs. 60,000 per annum.

11. The Council is not in a position to meet this considerable extra expenditure ; were it to do so, it would be expending a considerable item from the Municipal fund, partly for the benefit of a comparatively small portion of the rate payers, but mainly for the benefit of the proprietors of the proposed services.

If the proposed services were allowed to run without some provision to meet this extra expenditure, it would necessarily follow either that the main roads over which they would run would have to be allowed to deteriorate rapidly and become a source of inconvenience and danger to the whole city, or that money at present expended on the upkeep of other roads would have to be diverted to the upkeep of the motor kus routes—an obviously inequitable procedure.

13. The Committee are of opinion, that the greater part at least of the extra expenditure upon upkeep of roads brought about by the introduction of motor bus services must, therefore, in the interests of the rate-payers as a whole, be borne by such services.

Where tar or other dust palliative is used upon roads not previously so treated, there will be some advantage 14. to the city as a whole. The Committee are, therefore, unanimously of opinion that such services should contribute in the form of tax or fee such sum as will be sufficient to meet :-

1) The cost of extra metalling required.

(2) 75 per cent. of the cost of additional treatment with dust palliative, or, in other words, as regards the routes proposed, an approximate sum of Rs. 45,000 per annum. This will leave approximately Rs. 15,000 to be provided from Municipal Funds.

On a very liberal estimate of the number of buses required for the proposed services, the minimum fee per bus 15. by which this revenue would be in any way assured is Rs. 2,000 and the Committee unanimously recommend that Government should be asked to amend the schedule attached to Ordinance No. 4 of 1916 (Vehicles Ordinance), so as to pvrovide in the case of motor buses for a maximum annual tax of Rs. 1,000 on each bus with an annual stamp duty of the like amount in the case of motor buses used for hire.

1.

16. The Committee also recommend that the schedule should be further amended by doubling the present tax on motor lorries, as it was unanimously considered that the tax at present payable on these vehicles is inadequate. . 17. Some of the roads comprised in the proposed routes are trunk roads. These roads are maintained by the

Council, but a bill is rendered annually to Government for the actual expenditure incurred for their maintenance, and this bill on being certified by the Director of Public Works is paid by Government. Government has, however always refused to pay for any of the cost of treatment with tar or other preservative, on the ground that such treatment is not essential to the maintenance of the roads. The following is an extract from the Chairman's letter of November 7, 1916, to the Colonial Secretary on the subject.

'Further, since the increase of fast motor traffic the tarring of the roads has become a necessity in order to preserve the life of the road surface. Apart from preventing the inconvenience which would arise from the dust, the tarring of roads materially saves the road from rapid deterioration. If there were no tarring there would inevitably be an increased cost on metalling."

This is clearly and strongly brought out by the fact that the Works Engineer proposes to meet the increased wear on the (runk roads caused by the running of motor buses, not by additional metalling, but by more frequent treatment of tar.

The Committee are of opinion that under present day conditions of traffic, the grounds upon which Government have in the past declined to consider cost of tarring as part of the cost of upkeep of trunk roads are no longer tenable, and they, therefore, recommend that, in view of the considerations put forward in this report, Council should ask Government to reconsider their decision made in 1916, and that in future the cost of treatment with tar or other preservative and dust palliative should be included in the cost of upkeep.

18. Draft by-laws *re* motor buses have been prepared by the Superintendent of Police, Colombo, and the Acting Municipal Works Engineer. These by-laws have been drafted after careful considerations of the rules and regulations obtaining in other large cities, both in India and in Europe. The Committee consider that these by-laws contain the necessary provisions as regards motor buses, and recommend that they should be adopted by Council after reference to the Standing Committee on Law, and after such alterations and additions as that body consider advisable. 19.

To sum up the recommendations of the Committee are :-

(1) That no motor bus service should be allowed on any gravel road or on any macadam road not treated with tar or other adequate dust palliative.

(2) That in the present state of the Kollupitiya road no motor bus service can or should be allowed over this road. (3) That the other routes at present proposed should be sanctioned, except that on the proposed Mutwal route no service should at present be allowed further north than the Docklands Hotel in Modera street.

Main street.—The junction with Leyden Bastion road, or the Customs entrance in Leyden Bastion road. Parsons' road.—The four-way junction of the Fort side of Parsons' road bridge.

(5) That, if and when the narrow portion of the Bambalapitiya road immediately south of the Buller's road junction is widened, the following alternative route to serve Bambalapitiya and Wellawatta might be sanctioned viz., Union place, Alexandra place, Serpentine road, and Bambalapitiya road as far as the Kirillapone Canal bridge.

(6) That the widening referred to in preceding recommendation (5) is a necessary and urgent work which should be carried out as soon as funds permit, irrespective of the question of motor buses.

(7) That as a condition precedent of the running of the proposed motor bus services, Government be asked to amend the schedule to Ordinance No. 4 of 1916, (Vehicles Ordinance) so as to provide in the case of motor buses for a maximum annual tax of Rs. 1,000 on each bus with an annual stamp duty of the like amount in the case of motor buses used for hire, and to provide that in the case of motor lorries the present tax shall be doubled.

(8) That the grounds on which Government in 1916 declined to consider cost of treatment of roads with tar or other preservative as included in cost of upkeep of trunk roads, are no longer tenable, and that Government should therefore now be asked to re-consider their decision in this matter.

(9) That the draft by-laws annexed to this report contain the necessary provisions with regard to motor buses, and should be adopted by the Council after consideration and, if necessary, revision by the Standing Committee on Law.






