"THE SMALL TOWNS SANITARY ORDINANCE, 1892."

T is hereby notified that the Sanitary Board of Mannar has, under section 32 (1) of "The Small Towns Sanitary Ordinance, 1892," imposed and will enforce an annual tax payable in six days' labour or in money, equivalent to a sum of Re. 1 50, in commutation of such labour, on every male between the ages of eighteen and fifty-five, residing within the limits of Talaimannar, a town under the operation of "The Small Towns Sanitary Ordinance, 1892."

THE following by-laws made by the Sanitary Board of the Mannar District, under sub-section (2) of section 32 of Ordinance No. 18 of 1892, and confirmed by His Excellency the Governor in Executive Council, are hereby published in lieu of the by-laws published in Government Gazette No. 6,442 of May 19, 1911.

By-LAWS REFERRED TO

- 1. All notices required to be given by these regulations shall be in the English, Sinhalese, or Tamil language, in the discretion of the Sanitary Board; and every notice addressed to any person may be served either personally upon such party, or by leaving it with some member of his household, or by affixing it to some conspicuous part of his residence.
- 2. The Sanitary Board shall appoint as many division officers as shall be necessary, and award to them such salary or remuneration as it deems fit, and may remove any division officer from his office and appoint another to succeed him.
- 3. Every person appointed a division officer shall, within ten days from the time of such appointment, give security to His Majesty, his heirs and successors, for the due and faithful execution of his office, in such amount as shall be determined by the Sanitary Board; and such security shall be given by way of mortgage of immovable property within this Island, or by deposit of money, in such manner as the said Sanitary Board shall appoint, and such mortgage bond shall be free of stamp duty.
- 4. Every householder shall, whenever thereunto required by the division officer of the town or village in which such householder resides, or by any person acting on behalf of such division officer, fill up a list containing the number of inmates, and the name, age, and occupation of every male person (including such householder himself, if a male), who usually resides in his house, so far as the same shall be known to him, and if any householder is unable to write, he shall furnish the required information to the division officer, or person acting on his behalf, who shall enter the same in such list; and any householder refusing or neglecting to comply with such requisition, or wilfully giving false information as to any matter or thing required to be inserted in such list, shall be liable to a fine not exceeding Rs. 50
- 5. Every division officer shall carefully preserve and deal with the lists mentioned in the last preceding regulation as the Sanitary Board may from time to time direct, and such lists shall at all reasonable times be open to the inspection of any inhabitant of his town or village liable to perform labour.
- 6. Every division officer shall prepare every year, from the information contained in the lists before-mentioned, as well as from such other information as he may possess, a list of all persons resident within the limits of the town or village of which he is division officer and liable to perform labour, and shall send a copy of such list signed by him to the office of the Sanitary Board on or before December 21 in each year, and such list shall be published in the town or village to which it relates on or before January 31 in the following year by affixing a copy thereof to such conspicuous place in the town or village as the Chairman of the Sanitary Board shall appoint. Such publication shall constitute notice to every person named therein of his liability to perform labour.
- 7. Any division officer who shall commit any of the following offences shall be liable to the punishment hereinafter specified in each case:—
- (a) If he shall make default in the paying of, or accounting for, any money received by him within the time and according to the directions appointed by the Sanitary Board, he shall be liable for every such offence to a fine not exceeding treble the amount of the money so due, in addition to any civil liability he may have incurred.
- (b) If he shall by any wilful act, either of commission or omission, commit or attempt to commit any fraud in the execution of his office, or shall fraudulently alter, deface, destroy, or make away with any book, list, account, or document in his charge or custody, or which he was bound

- to preserve, he shall be liable for every such offence to such punishment as the court before which he shall be convicted may in its discretion award.
- 8. The Sanitary Board shall appoint such officers as it may deem necessary to have charge of the work on which labour is to be performed, and the officer in charge of any work shall give to the persons who have duly attended to perform, and have properly performed, the labour required of them for the year in which they have been so employed a certificate of the due performance of such labour, and any officer who shall wilfully neglect or delay to grant such certificate to any person justly entitled to the same shall be guilty of an offence, and be liable to a fine not exceeding Rs. 50; and if any person shall deliver any such certificate to any other person, in order that such last-mentioned person may make use of the same in proof of his having performed the labour due by him, or for any other fraudulent purpose, both the person delivering such certificate to another for any such purpose, as well as the person deceitfully making use of the same as a certificate granted to him, shall be guilty of an offence, and be liable to such punishment as the court before which he is tried shall have power to impose.
- 9. Every officer in charge of any work shall inform the proper division officer in such manner as the Sanitary Board may direct what persons have duly attended to perform and have properly performed upon such work the labour due by them for the current year, and what persons have refused or neglected to do so.
- 10. It shall be lawful for the Chairman of the Sanitary Board, upon proof to his satisfaction that any person resident within any town or village and liable to perform labour is either from disease or bodily infirmity incapable of performing labour, to exempt such person from the performance thereof either for life or for such period as he, the Chairman, may think fit. Any person not already exempted for life or other specified period by such Chairman and desiring to be exempted from the performance of labour on any of the grounds in this regulation, or on the ground that he is above the age of 55 or under the age of 18 years, shall, on or before March 31 in the year for which exemption is claimed, apply to such Chairman for exemption. Such Chairman may in his discretion refuse in respect of the current year any application not presented within the time so limited.
- 11. Every person whose name is inscribed in the list mentioned in regulation 6, and which shall not have been struck off therefrom by the Chairman, shall be liable to labour on the roads, and the lists either before or after amendment, should any amendment to them be made, or any copy thereof certified to be a copy by the Chairman, shall be final and conclusive evidence of the liability to labour of any person whose name shall appear thereon, unless, in case of a copy, it shall be proved to the Sanitary Board that such list was not a true copy of the original:
- 12. A supplemental list, should such be found necessary, may be prepared in the same manner as the list mentioned in regulation 6. Provided that any such supplemental list shall be published not later than April 13 in any year, and provided that such supplemental list shall not include any person who was not an inhabitant on March 31 of that year.
- 13. Upon any supplemental list being so published, all the provisions of these regulations relating to lists shall apply, so far as may be practicable, to any such supplemental list in the same manner as if such list had been prepared and published under regulation 6.
- 14. No person liable to perform labour shall be required to attend for the performance thereof on a Sunday, nor except during the customary hours of labour.

- the Chairman of the Sanitary Board shall give notice to the inhabitants of his division liable to perform labour, who shall not in the manner hereinafter provided have commuted the same, to attend and perform such labour at the time and place appointed by the Chairman, and such notice shall be given by beat of tom-tom not less than seven days, before the day appointed for the attendance of such inhabitants and in such other way as the Chairman shall direct. Provided that no such notice shall be given until the time during which a person is under regulation 22 allowed to commute shall have elapsed.
- 16. Any person liable to perform labour who has not commuted in the manner hereafter provided, and who shall without lawful excuse, the proof of which excuse shall be on such person, fail to attend to perform labour at the time and place appointed for that purpose, or who shall fail to pay the amount of commutation money due by him as hereinafter provided, shall be liable, on receiving notice so to do, to labour on the thoroughfares or public tanks of the town or village in which such person's liability to work arose for double the number of days for which such person was originally liable. Provided that any person who shall have become liable to the performance of the double labour under this regulation may commute such double labour in the manner hereinafter provided.
- 17. If any person attending to perform labour under any of the provisions of these regulations shall without lawful excuse, the proof of which excuse shall be on such person, neglect or refuse to remain in attendance during the working hours, or be guilty of any drunkenness, wilful neglect, or disobedience of the orders of the officer in charge, or of not taking due care of the tools and implements entrusted to him, or of any other misconduct in the performance of the labour, every such person shall after inquiry be liable to be condemned by the Chairman of the Sanitary Board to work for an extra number of days not exceeding three days for any one of the offeness. Provided that the aggregate amount of punishment imposed upon any one person under this section shall not exceed six days' labour.
- 18. Whenever any person fails after receiving notice to attend, or neglects or refuses to perform or abandons the performance of double labour under regulation 16 or additional labour under regulation 17, he shall be guilty of an offence and be liable to the punishment provided by regulation 19, and the Chairman of the Sanitary Board of the district in which the town or village in which such person is bound to labour is situated is hereby empowered and required, unless such person be otherwise before him, to issue his warrant for the arrest of such person; every such warrant may be executed by the person or persons to whom it is addressed, or by any public officer, headman, Fiscal, or Fiscal's officer, and every such warrant shall be executable throughout the Island without any endorsement, anything in the Criminal Procedure Code to the contrary notwithstanding.
- 19. Any person arrested under the provisions of these regulations shall be taken without delay before the Chairman of the Sanitary Board, according to the terms of the werrant, and the Chairman upon being satisfied that the party arrested is the person against whom the warrant was issued and that the offence mentioned in such warrant was committed by such person, shall by warrant commit such person to prison to be detained at hard labour for the period of one month. Provided that the Chairman may in his discretion, in lieu of committing such person to prison, adjudge him to pay a penalty of Rs. 10, and if such sum be paid forthwith, or within such time as the Chairman may allow, such person shall not be committed to prison, but otherwise he shall; and the Chairman may, if such person

- shall have been released prior to the payment of such fine when inflicted, issue, if necessary, a warrant for his arrest. Provided that if after the commitment of such person such penalty shall be paid, it shall be lawful for such Chairman to discharge such person out of prison. There shall be no appeal from any decision of the Chairman under this regulation. Any penalty so recovered shall be credited to Government.
- 20. A register shall be kept by the Chairman of the Sanitary Board in which shall be entered a list of all warrants issued under these regulations, the reasons for which such warrants were issued, and the punishment inflicted upon the offenders brought up in virtue of such warrants.
- 21. Any person sentenced to imprisonment under the provisions of these regulations may be imprisoned in the same way as if he had been condemned under the authority of a court.
- 22. It shall be lawful for any inhabitant to commute the performance of the labour due by him for any one year, except any double or increased labour to which he may have become liable under these regulations, by a money payment of such sum as the Sanitary Board may from time to time fix in respect of the town or village in which such inhabitant resides. And it shall be lawful for any person who shall have become liable to the performance of double labour to commute such double labour by the payment of double the amount of the rate of commutation leviable in that town or village at any time previous to the day on which such person shall have been notified to perform double labour.
- 23. (1) Any person desiring to commute the performance of labour by a money payment shall pay the amount due by him on or before March 31 in each year, and up to such date a person shall not be liable to the penalties provided by regulation 16.
- (2) The amount payable in commutation is fixed at Re. 1 \cdot 50 per head.
- 24. The amount due by any person as commutation money shall be paid to a division officer of the town or village to which the person liable to pay may belong, or to the Chairman of the Sanitary Board, who shall grant a receipt therefor, and any money paid as such commutation money shall be deemed and taken to be a payment to His Majesty.
- 25. If any person shall deliver any receipt given to him by the division officer or by the Chairman of the Sanitary Board to any other person, in order that such last-mentioned person may make use of the same in proof of his having paid any sum of money due by him, or for any other fraudulent purpose, or if any person shall deceitfully make use of any receipt given to any other person by a division officer or by a Chairman of a Sanitary Board as a receipt given to him, such persons, or either of them, shall be guilty of an offence, and be liable to such punishment as the court before which they or either of them may be tried shall impose.
- 26. Every offence against any of these regulations may be inquired into, tried, and determined by the Police Court within the jurisdiction of which the offence was committed.
- 27. The Sanitary Board shall have the application, direction, and control of the labour due under these regulations, and of the amount paid as commutation money; and it shall be lawful for such Board to apportion the amount paid as commutation money between the several towns and villages in the Mannar District brought under the operation of "The Small Towns Sanitary Ordinance, 1892," in such manner as it may think fit.

The Regulation of Board Meetings.

Time and place of meeting.

The ordinary meetings of the Board shall be held on the first Thursday of each month at 9 A.M. at the office of the Board in the Colombo Kachcheri. Provided, however, that it shall be lawful for the President to determine some other time or place for the meeting. And provided, further, that it shall be lawful for the Board to adjourn any meeting to any other day or hour.

President of meeting.

2. The President shall preside at each meeting, and in his absence at any meeting the members of the Board present shall choose some one of their number to be Chairman of such meeting.

President to preserve order

3, The President, or in his absence, the member so chosen, shall preserve order and decide on all disputed points of order.

Specialmeetings of the Board.

It shall be competent for the President to hold a special meeting either on his own motion or at the request of three members of the Board.

Quorum at any meeting.

Four members of the Board shall form a quorum at any of its meetings.

Procedure at meetings.

6. As soon after the hour appointed for any meeting (whether ordinary or special) as a quorum shall assemble, the President shall take the chair, and the Board shall proceed to business. Should a quorum not be present at the expiration of half an hour from the time appointed for the meeting, the meeting shall stand adjourned, if an ordinary meeting to the day appointed for the next ordinary meeting, or if a special meeting sine die.

Notice of question or motion.

7. Any member desiring to ask a question or to make a motion, unless in the course of discussion or in case of emergency by special leave of the President, shall give notice of such question or motion either at some previous meeting of the Board or by notice in writing at least four days before the day on which he intends to ask such question or make such motion.

Copy to he delivered to Secretary.

shall deliver to the Secretary a copy of such question or motion. All questions asked and motions made

at a meeting shall be made in the order of the notice thereof, unless the President shall decide otherwise. 10. A motion negatived at a meeting shall not be again made except with the

Proceedings upon petition

12. When a petition or other communication is presented, the purport thereof shall be concisely stated, and on the motion of any member duly seconded the question shall be put whether or not the document shall be read.

13. The business of the ordinary meetings of the Board shall be conducted in the following order :-

(a) The minutes of the former meeting shall be read and confirmed after being, if necessary, corrected;

(b) Memorials, petitions, or other communications addressed to the Board shall be laid before the meeting and orders made thereon;
The other business shall be considered

in the order set down in the order book hereinafter mentioned.

All acts of the Board and all questions coming or arising before the Board may be done and decided by the majority of such members of the Board as are present and voting at the meeting. In case of equality of votes, the President shall have a second or casting vote.

15. At any meeting, unless a poll is demanded by a member, a declaration by the President that a resolution has been carried and an entry to that effect in the minute book and journal shall be sufficient evidence of the fact without proof of the number or proportion of the votes recorded in favour of or against such resolution.

16. If a poll is demanded, the same shall be taken in such manner as the President directs, and the result of such poll shall be deemed to be the resolution of the Board.

The Secretary shall keep an order book in which shall be entered and numbered in succession the subjects to be brought under discussion at each meeting, and he shall serve on each member or leave at his residence, two days at least before each meeting a notice containing the order of the day copied from the order book.

18. The Secretary shall keep a book to be called the minute book, in which shall be minuted during each sitting in the order in which they occur the proceedings of the Board. And he shall keep another book to be called the journal, in which he shall cause all minutes of proceedings to be fairly transcribed.

19. The Secretary shall at each sitting of the Board lay on the table all reports made to the President (if any), and notes of any action taken thereon by the President since the last previous meeting of the Board.

20. The proceedings of the Board shall not be open to the public, but the Secretary shall, at the end of each meeting, send to the press for publication a copy of so much of the minutes of the day as the President may consider desirable.

23rd December, 1920.

BE it enacted by the King's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:-

- 1. If any person for the purpose of gaining admission, or of assisting any other person to gain admission, to a prohibited place, within the meaning of the Official Secrets Act, 1911 (hereinafter referred to as "the principal Act"), or for any other purpose prejudicial to the safety or interests of the State within the meaning of the said Act-
 - (a) Uses or wears, without lawful authority, any naval, military, air-force, police, or other official uniform, or any uniform so nearly resembling the same as to be calculated to deceive, or falsely represents himself to be a person who is or has been entitled to use or wear any such uniform; or

Orally, or in writing in any declaration or application, or in any document signed by him or on his behalf, knowingly makes or connives at the making of any false

statement or any omission; or

(c) Forges, alters, or tampers with any passport or any naval, military, air-force, police, or official pass, permit, certificate, licence, or other document of a similar character (hereinafter in this section referred to as an official document), or uses or has in his

possession any such forged, altered, or irregular official document; or

Personates, or falsely represents himself to be a person holding, or in the employment of a person holding office under His Majesty, or to be or not to be a person to whom an official document or secret official code word or pass word has been duly issued or communicated, or with intent to obtain an official document, secret official code word or pass word, whether for himself or any other person, knowingly makes any false statement; or

(e) Uses, or has in his possession, or under his control, without the authority of the Government Department or the authority concerned, any die, seal, or stamp of or belonging to, or used, made or provided by any Government Department, or by any diplomatic, naval, military, or air force authority appointed by or acting under the authority of His Majesty, or any die, seal, or stampso nearly resembling any such die, seal, or stamp as to be calculated to deceive, or counterfeits any such die, seal, or stamp, or uses, or has in his possession, or under his control, any such counterfeited die, seal, or stamp;

he shall be guilty of a misdemeanour.

(2) If any person-

(a) Retains for any purpose prejudicial to the safety or interests of the State any official document, whether or not completed or issued for use, when he has no right to retain it, or when it is contrary to his duty to retain it, or fails to comply with any directions issued by any Government Department or any person authorized by such department with regard to the return or disposal thereof; or

(b) Allows any other person to have possession of any official document issued for his use alone, or communicates any secret official code word or pass word so issued, or, without lawful authority or excuse, has in his possession any official document or secret official code word or pass word issued for the use of some person other than himself, or on obtaining possession of any official document by finding or otherwise, neglects or fails to restore it to the person or authority by whom or for whose use it was issued, or to a police constable; or

Without lawful authority or excuse, manufactures or sells, or has in his possession

for sale any such die, seal, or stamp as aforesaid;

he shall be guilty of a misdemeanour.

(3) In the case of any prosecution under this section involving the proof of a purpose prejudicial to the safety or interests of the State, sub-section (2) of section one of the principal Act shall apply in like manner as it applies to prosecutions under that section.

2. (1) In any proceedings against a person for an offence under section one of the principal Act, the fact that he has been in communication with, or attempted to communicate with, a foreign agent, whether within or without the United Kingdom, shall be evidence that he has, for a purpose prejudicial to the safety or interests of the State, obtained or attempted to obtain information which is calculated to be or might be or is intended to be directly or indirectly useful to an enemy.

Communications with foreign agents to he evidence of commission of certain offences

- (2) For the purpose of this section, but without prejudice to the generality of the foregoing A.D. 1920. provision - Charles Williams and Table Vil
 - (a) A person shall, unless he proves the contrary, be deemed to have been in communication with a foreign agent ifelekt, Wildela 👯

(i.) He has, either within or without the United Kingdom, visited the address of a foreign agent or consorted or associated with a foreign agent; or

- (ii.) Either, within or without the United Kingdom, the name or address of, or any other information regarding a foreign agent has been found in his possession, or has been supplied by him to any other person, or has been obtained by him from any other person;
- (b) The expression "foreign agent" includes any person who is or has been or is reasonably suspected of being or having been employed by a foreign power either directly or indirectly for the purpose of committing an act, either within or without the United Kingdom, prejudicial to the safety or interests of the State, or who has or is reasonably suspected of having, either within or without the United Kingdom, committed, or attempted to commit, such an act in the interests of a foreign power;

(c) Any address, whether within or without the United Kingdom, reasonably suspected of being an address used for the receipt of communications intended for a foreign agent or any address at which a foreign agent resides, or to which he resorts for the purpose of giving or receiving communications, or at which he carries on any business, shall be deemed to be the address of a foreign agent, and communications addressed to such an address to be communications with a foreign agent.

3. No person in the vicinity of any prohibited place shall obstruct, knowingly mislead or otherwise interfere with or impede, the chief officer or a superintendent or other officer of police, or any member of His Majesty's forces engaged on guard, sentry, patrol, or other similar duty in relation to the prohibited place, and, if any person acts in contravention of, or fails to comply with, this provision, he shall be guilty of a misdemeanour.

- 4. (1) Where it appears to a Secretary of State that such a course is expedient in the public interest, he may, by warrant under his hand, require any person who owns or controls any telegraphic cable or wire, or any apparatus for wireless telegraphy, used for the sending or receipt of telegrams to or from any place out of the United Kirzdom, to produce to him, or to any person named in the warrant, the originals and transcripts, either of all telegrams, or of telegrams of any specified class or description, or of telegrams sent from or addressed to any specified person or place, sent or received to or from any place out of the United Kingdom by means of any such cable, wire, or apparatus, and all other papers relating to any such telegram as aforesaid.
- (2) Any person who, on being required to produce any such original or tanscript or paper as aforesaid, refuses or neglects to do so shall be guilty of an offence under this Act, and shall, for each offence, be liable on conviction under the Summary Jurisdiction Acts to imprisonment with or without hard labour for a term not exceeding three months, or to a fine not exceeding

fifty pounds, or to both such imprisonment and fine.

(3) In this section the expression "telegram" shall have the same meaning as in the Telegraph Act, 1869, and the expression "wireless telegraphy" shall have the same meaning as in the Wireless Telegraphy Act, 1904.

(1) Every person who carries on, whether alone or in conjunction with any other business, the business of receiving for reward letters, telegrams, or other postal packets for delivery or forwarding to the persons for whom they are intended, shall as soon as may be send to the chief officer of police for the district, for registration by him, notice of the fact together with the address or addresses where the business is carried on, and the chief officer of police shall keep a register of the names and addresses of such persons, and shall, if required by any person who sends such a notice, furnish him on payment of a fee of one shilling with a certificate of registration, and every person so registered shall from time to time furnish to the chief officer of police notice of any change of address or new address at which the business is carried on, and such other information as may be necessary for maintaining the correctness of the particulars entered in the register.

(2) Every person who carries on such a business as aforesaid shall cause to be entered in a book kept for the purpose the following particulars-

(a) The name and address of every person for whom any postal packet is received, or who has requested that postal packets received may be delivered or forwarded to him;

(b) Any instructions that may have been received as to the delivery or forwarding of

postal packets;

(c) In the case of every postal packet received, the place from which the postal packet comes, and the date of posting (as shown by the post-mark) and the date of receipt, and the name and address of the sender if shown on the outside of the packet, and, in the case of a registered packet, the date and office of registration and the number of the registered packet;

(d) In the case of every postal packet delivered, the date of delivery and the name and

address of the person to whom it is delivered;

(e) In the case of every postal packet forwarded, the name and address to which and the date on which it is forwarded;

- addressed, unless there is left with him instructions signed by the last-mentioned person as to the delivery thereof, and shall not forward any postal packet to another address unless there is left with him written instructions to that effect signed by the addressee.
- (3) The books so kept and all postal packets received by a person carrying on any such buiness, and any instruction as to the delivery or forwarding of postal packets received by any such person, shall be kept at all reasonable times open to inspection by any police constable.
- (4) If any person contravenes or fails to comply with any of the provisions of this section, or furnishes any false information or makes any false entry, he shall be guilty of an offence under this Act, and shall, for each offence, be liable on conviction under the Summary Jurisdiction Acts to imprisonment with or without hard labour for a term not exceeding one month, or to a fine not exceeding ten pounds, or to both such imprisonment and fine.
- (5) Nothing in this section shall apply to postal packets addressed to any office where any newspaper or periodical is published, being postal packets in reply to advertisements appearing in such newspaper or periodical.
- (6) Nothing in this section shall be construed as rendering legal anything which would be in contravention of the exclusive privilege of the Postmaster-General under the Post Office Acts, 1908 to 1920, or the Telegraph Acts, 1863 to 1920.
- 6. It shall be the duty of every person to give on demand to a chief officer of police, or to a superintendent or other officer of police not below the rank of inspector appointed by a chief officer for the purpose, or to any member of His Majesty's forces engaged on guard, sentry, patrol, or other similar duty; any information in his power relating to an offence or suspected offence under the principal Act or this Act, and, if so required, and upon tender of his reasonable expenses, to attend at such reasonable time and place as may be specified for the purpose of furnishing such information, and if any person fails to give any such information or to attend as aforesaid, he shall be guilty of a misdemeanour.
- 7. Any person who attempts to commit any offence under the principal Act or this Act, or solicits or incites or endeavours to persuade another person to commit an offence, or aids or abets and does any act preparatory to the commission of an offence under the principal Act or this Act, shall be guilty of a felony or a misdemeanour or a summary offence according as the offence in question is a felony, a misdemeanour or a summary offence, and on conviction shall be liable to the same punishment, and to be proceeded against in the same manner, as if he had committed the offence.
- 8. (1) Any person who is guilty of a felony under the principal Act or this Act shall be liable to penal servitude for a term of not less than three years and not exceeding fourteen years
- (2) Any person who is guilty of a misdemeanour under the principal Act or this Act shall be liable on conviction on indictment to imprisonment, with or without hard labour, for a term not exceeding two years, or, on conviction under the Summary Jurisdiction Acts, to imprisonment, with or without hard labour, for a term not exceeding three months or to a fine not exceeding fifty pounds, or both such imprisonment and fine:

Provided that no misdemeanour under the principal Act or this Act shall be dealt with summarily except with the consent of the Attorney-General.

- (3) For the purposes of the trial of a person for an offence under the principal Act or this Act, the offence shall be deemed to have been committed either at the place in which the same actually was committed, or at any place in the United Kingdom in which the offender may be found.
- (4) In addition and without prejudice to any powers which a court may possess to order the exclusion of the public from any proceedings if, in the course of proceedings before a court against any person for an offence under the principal Act or this Act or the proceedings on appeal, or in the course of the trial of a person for felony or misdemeanour under the principal Act or this Act, application is made by the prosecution, on the ground that the publication of any evidence to be given or of any statement to be made in the course of the proceedings would be prejudicial to the national safety, that all or any portion of the public shall be excluded during any part of the hearing, the court may make an order to that effect, but the passing of sentence shall in any case take place in public.

"The expression 'munitions of war' includes the whole or any part of any ship, submarine, aircraft, tank or similar engine, arms and ammunition, torpedo, or mine, intended or adapted for use in war, and any other article, material, or device, whether actual or proposed, intended for such use.

Minor amendments of principal Act.

11. (1) This Act may be cited as the Official Secrets Act, 1920, and shall be construed as one with the principal Act, and the principal Act and this Act may be cited together as the Official Secrets Acts, 1911 and 1920...

Short title, construction, and repeal.

- (a) This Act shall not apply to any of the following Dominions, that is to say, the Dominion of Canada, the Commonwealth of Australia (which for this purpose shall be deemed to include Papua and Norfolk Island), the Dominion of New Zealand, the Union of South Africa, Newfoundland, and India; and
- (b) Nothing in the principal Act shall be construed as preventing an offence under this Act which is to be tried summarily being tried in Scotland by the sheriff.
- (2) The provisions of the principal Act mentioned in the Second Schedule to this Act are hereby repealed.

(3) For the purposes of this Act, the expression "chief officer of police,"

(a) With respect to any place in England other than the city of London, has the meaning assigned to it by the Police Act, 1890;

With respect to the city of London, means the Commissioner of the City Police

With respect to Scotland, has the meaning assigned to it by the Police (Scotland) Act, 1890; and

With respect to Ireland, means, in the police district of Dublin metropolis, either of the Commissioners of Police for that district and elsewhere the district inspector of the Royal Irish Constabulary.

Registrar-General's Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended September 3, 1921.

Births.—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 127 (2 Europeans, 6 Burghers, 79 Sinhalese, 12 Tarqils, 21 Moors, 5 Malays, and 2 Others). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the Census population on March 18, 1921, viz., 244,182) was 27·1, as against 29·0 in the preceding week, 24·1 in the corresponding week of last year, and 24.5 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 134 (6 Burghers, 68 Sinhalese, 23 Tamils, 28 Moors, 5 Malays, and 4 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 28.6, as against 30.3 in the previous week, 26.2 in the corresponding week of last year, and 27.5 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 134 total deaths, 40 were of infants under one year of age, as against 37 in the preceding week, 33 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 31 the average for last year.

Stillbirths.—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 11.,

Principal Causes of Death.—1. Twelve deaths from Phihisis were registered, 5 in Maradana (including 4 deaths of non-residents in hospitals), 2 each in New Bazaar and Wellawatta, and 1 each in Kotahena, Slave Island, and Kollupitiya, as against 23 in the preceding week and 14 the weekly average for last year.

- 2. (a) Eleven deaths from *Pneumonia* were registered, 4 in Maradana, 2 in New Bazaar, and 1 each in Fort, Pettah, San Sebastian, Kotahena, and Kollupitiya, as against 9 in the preceding week and 20 the weekly average for last year.
- (b) Three deaths from Influenza were registered, 1 each in St. Paul's, New Bazaar, and Slave Island, as against 2 in the preceding week and 6 the weekly average for last year.
 - (c) One death from Bronchitis was registered in New Bazaar, as against 2 in the preceding week.
- 3. No death from Enteric Fever or Plague was registered during the week. There was one death from Enteric Fever in the previous week.
- 4. Sixteen deaths were registered from Debility, 15 from Infantile Convulsions, 8 from Enteritis, 5 from Diarrhæa, 3 from Dysentery, 2 from Worms, and 58 from Other Causes.
- 5. Twelve cases of Chickenpox, 6 of Enteric Fever, and 2 of Measles were reported during the week, as against 14, 5, and 2, respectively, of the preceding week.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 81·3°, against 82·1° in the preceding week and 80·9° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29·917 in., against 29·878 in. in the preceding week and 29·958 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 0·67 in., against 1·04 in. in the preceding week and 0·30 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 143 (1 European 11 Burghers, 64 Sinhalese, 33 Tamils, 26 Moors, 2 Malays, and 6 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 30.5, as against 28.6 in the previous week, 22.0 in the corresponding week of last year, and 27.5 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 143 total deaths, 40 were of infants under one year of age, as against 40 in the preceding week, 19 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 31 the average for last year.

Stillbirths.—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 17.

Principal Causes of Death.—1. (a) Sixteen deaths from Phthisis were registered, 4 each in Maradana (including 1 death of a non-resident in hospital), and Slave Island, 3 each in Kotahena and Kollupitiya, and 1 each in San Sabastian and St. Paul's, as against 12 in the previous week and 14 the weekly average for last year.

- 2. (a) Nine deaths from *Pneumonia* were registered, 4 in Maradana (including 2 deaths of non-residents in hospitals), 3 in New Bazuar, and 1 each in St. Paul's and Wellawatta, as against 11 in the previous week and 20 the weekly average for last year.
- (b) Six deaths from Influenza were registered, 2 in Pettah, and 1 each in San Sabastian, St. Paul's, New Bazaar, and Maradana (of a non-resident in hospital), as against 3 in the previous week and 6 the weekly average for last year.
- (c) One death from Bronchitis was registered in Maradana (of a non-resident in hospital), same as in the previous week.
- 3. Five deaths from *Enteric Fever* were registered, 2 in Kotahena, and 1 each in Pettah, New Bazaar, and Maradana (of a non-resident in hospital), as against nil in the previous week, and 6 the weekly average for last year.
- 4. Seventeen deaths were registered from Debility, 16 from Infantile Convulsions, 11 from Enteritis, 5 from Diarrhoa, 1 each from Dysentery, Worms, and Tetanus, and 54 from Other Causes.
- 5. Sixteen cases of Chickenpox and 10 of Enteric Fever were reported during the week, as against 12 and 6, respectively of the preceding week.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 82.4°, against 81.3° in the preceding week and 81.3° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29.950 in., against 29.917 in. in the preceding week and 29.941 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 0.05 in., against 0.67 in. in the preceding week and 0.12 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.

MUNICIPALITY OF COLOMBO.

Minutes of Proceedings of a General Meeting of the Municipal Council of Colombo held in the Town Hall: on Tuesday, August 2, 1921, at 3 p.m.

THE Council met this day at 3 P.M., pursuant to notice dated July 26, 1921.

Present:—Mr. B. G. de Glanville, Chairman; Mr. C. P. Dias; Major A. W. de Wilton; the Hon. Mr. N. H. M. Abdul Cader; the Hon. Mr. Arthur Alvis; the Hon. Mr. H. L. de Mel, C.B.E.; Dr. E. V. Ratnam; Dr. W. P. Rodrigo; the Hon. Dr. G. J. Rutherford; Mr. W. C. S. Ingles; the Hon. Mr. Harold Creasy; Mr. A. E. de Silva; Lieut.-Col. S. Boylan Smith, D.S.O., O.B.E.; Mr. E. W. Jayewardene; Mr. R. L. Pereira; Mr. C. H. Z. Fernando; Mr. T. H. Tatham;

1. The Minutes of the General Meeting of July 5 and of the Special Meeting of July 26, 1921, having been previously printed and copies thereof having been sent to each Member of Council, were taken as read.

Resolved that the Minutes of the General Meeting of July 5 and of the Special Meeting of July 26, 1921, be confirmed.

2. The Chairman read the following:—Since the last Meeting of Council, two fatal cases of human plague have been reported, one of which was bubonic and the other septicæmic, bringing the total to 158 cases for this year, as against 70 during the corresponding period of last year.

Rat Plague.—Five plague infected rats have been reported, and the total for the year up to date is 48, against a total of 86 during the corresponding period of last year.

3. Pursuant to notice, the Hon. Mr. H. L. de Mel presented a petition from dhobies of the City, in regard to the washing facilities in the City and the peaceful continuance of their occupations.

The Hon. Mr. H. L. de Mel moved that the petition be read. Mr. C. P. Dias seconded.—Carried.

The Secretary then read the petition.

- 4. Mr. C. P. Dias moved, with the leave of Council, that a petition from certain residents in Muhandiram's lane, San Sebastian, complaining of overcrowding in that locality to a great extent, be considered by the Chairman and disposed of. The Hon. Mr. N. H. M. Abdul Cader seconded. Mr. R. L. Pereira supported. The motion was put to the Meeting and carried.
- Pursuant to notice, the Hon. Mr. H. L. de Mei asked the Chairman the following questions and the Chairman 5. replied seriatim :-

(1) What was the cost of each of the tables supplied to the laundry rooms at Wekande? (1) The City Sanitation Engineer reports that the 12 wooden tables erected cost Rs. 859 22 or Rs. 71 60 each.

- Q. (2) What was the necessity to have such expensive teak tables.

 A. (2) I see no reason to think that the tables were unduly expensive. The City Sanitation Engineer reports that teak was considered to be the most suitable wood. Jak wood might have been used, but the cost would have been practically the same.
- Q. (3) Who advised the building of further laundry rooms at Wekande before the first set had proved successful?
 A. (3) The meaning of the question is not clear. Council on July 9, 1920, voted the sum of Rs. 54,169 82 for the erection of a Municipal Manual Laundry, and the Chairman, on July 12, informed the Colonial Sercetary that it was hoped that the laundry, with accommodation for 30 dhobies, would be completed by the end of the year. After part of the accommodation had been erected, the City Sanitation Engineer reported that the complete laundry would require more land than was originally estimated. The matter was considered by the Sanitation Committee and it was decided to apply to Government for additional land. Government was good enough to grant the land, and the laundry is now nearing completion.

Q. (4) What is the estimated cost of the new work?

(4) The answer to the previous question shows that no answer to this question is possible.

(5) Is it not an unwise expenditure?

(5) This is a matter of opinion. I am not prepared, in answer to a question, to express an opinion on the A. wisdom of expenditure voted.

(6) Is the Chairman aware that two dhobies cannot iron clothes at the same time in the rooms let out for that

Q. purpose?

A. (6) Each clean linen room is provided with a teak table and a cement concrete table. At each table, I understand, two dhobies can do ironing, except perhaps when they are dealing with very big or long articles. It is reported to me that the tables are larger than those in private laundries, the room and table at the private laundry owned by the Hotel dhoby, who probably has the largest clientele of any of these Wekande dhobies, being smaller than those provided by the Council.

(7) Is the Chairman aware that there are bugs in the new laundry rooms?

A. (7) Bugs are reported to have been introduced into the laundry by the dhobies either in infected clothing or infected mats. The rooms and tables were disinfected on July 18. They were examined again on the 25th, and were then reported free of bugs, with the exception of some remaining in the crevices of the tables in the ironing rooms occupied until recently by the Hotel dhoby. These tables were treated again on July 30, and are now reported to be free from these pests.

Q. (8) The rooms being unfit for human habitation, what remunerative use the Chairman suggests that they should

Q. (8) The rooms being unit for numer.
be now put to?
A. (8) I have no suggestions to offer.
Q. (9) Does the Chairman realize that, in addition to washing, drying, and ironing, the tenants of the Wekande laundry had to provide their own steaming or boiling apparatus?
A. (9) I am aware that most of the dhobies use some form of steaming apparatus. I understand that the form of apparatus used by the majority is a wide-mouthed clay pot, the cost of which is between 75 cents and one rupee. A house for the carrying on of these operations has been provided. The provision of large boilers was originally contemplated, but the idea was dropped on representations made by the dhobies themselves to the City Sanitation Engineer that the majority of them would not find it economical to pay for the large amount of fuel which such boilers would require.
Mr. C. H. Z. Fernando and Dr. E. V. Ratnam had sent in the following questions to be asked, with leave of Council:—

6. Questions by Mr. C. H. Z. Fernando:-

(1) Whether the Chairman is aware that boutique keepers in Colombo are holding up supplies of controlled rice in their possession and only selling uncontrolled Bangkok rice at exorbitant rates?

(2) Whether steps are being taken to take stock of the supplies of Bangkok rice held by boutique keepers and to control the sale price of such rice within the City of Colombo?

- Questions by Dr. E. V. Ratnam :-
- (1) How long the stock of rice at present available is calculated to last?

If, as is reported, there is sufficient rice to last till December, what is the immediate necessity for rationing?

When the rationing of rice will come into force?

(4) What provision has been made against the possibility of registered rice boutique keepers refusing to issue rice on ration cards for want of rice or other reasons? If any instructions have been issued to the public as to what they should do in such eases; and if not, whether he would be good enough to issue instructions in English, Sinhalese, and Tamil for the guidance of the public before rationing is enforced?

if he would consider the desirability of making some provision to enable householders who now buy rice monthly

by the bag or bushel to continue to do so during the period of the control of the issue of rice?

(6) Will it not be more advantageous to the people to introduce the coupon system whereby the consumer can buy his rice wherever he likes, and thus avoid the inconvenience that is likely to be caused by the issue of cards compelling the buyer to buy from a particular boutique?

The Chairman stated that the questions comprised in items Nos. 6 and 7 on the Agenda were received very late, With the leave of Council, and if the members who had given notice of the questions were agreeable, he proposed to read a statement, which he hoped would answer the questions more fully than a mere formal reply to each question.

The Council and Members concerned having agreed, the Chairman read the following:

The general position, so far as I am aware, is that stocks of Indian or Burma rice in hand or promised are sufficient to last, with rationing, until about the end of November. Without rationing, they would probably last only about half that time. Rationing was decided upon, and I was asked to undertake the rationing of Colombo. The rationing of some 250,000 people, with the issue of ration cards for each, is a laborious and difficult undertaking. (On the last occasion when it was undertaken, it took about 7 weeks to get out the ration cards). During the time necessarily required for the preparation of the cards, the Deputy Food Controller, Chalmers Granaries, has done all that he could to assist and to prevent hardship by issuing rice, as far as possible, to all boutique keepers who applied for it, but when it was found that these boutique keepers were taking advantage of this and drawing as much as four or five times their normal requirements, it became necessary to close the Granaries and to stop further issues until rationing was in force. The difficulties of the preparation of ration cards were much increased and their distribution delayed by the extraordinary inaccuracy of the information furnished by householders, which necessitated innumerable alterations and corrections. The greater part of the cards have now, however, been correctly prepared and issued, and it is hoped that distribution will be complete this week. Provisional permits were issued to the boutique keepers yesterday, and rice is now being freely drawn from the Granaries on these permits. It was originally intended to issue permits to all boutiques dealing in rice, but this has proved to be impracticable. The issue of rice from the Granaries in very small quantities to a vast number of applicants would lead to unworkable congestion and delay, and is, in fact under existing conditions, a physical impossibility. A minimum issue of 10 bags has had to be fixed, and we have, therefore, had to rule out all boutique keepers who are not able to purchase and store 10 bags had to be nxed, and we have, therefore, had to rule out all bounque keepers who are not able to purchase and store 10 bags at a time. Further, in areas where the number of boutiques dealing in rice is large in proportion to the number of consumers in the vicinity, it was found impossible to make allotments to all such boutiques, as to do so would mean that the individual allotments would fall very much below 10 bags. The system adopted is admittedly imperfect, but it is the only practicable alternative to the depôt system, which would entail total stoppage of dealings in rice by all boutiques and considerably more inconvenience to consumers. About two-thirds of the existing boutiques will receive permits. It has been suggested that consumers, instead of being allotted to stated boutiques, might be allowed to purchase their rice where they liked. Such a system would leave it in the power of any boutique keeper, to whom application was made for rice, to state that his stocks were exhausted, and it is to prevent the consumer being thus placed entirely at the mercy of the boutique keeper that the system of allotment has been introduced. The boutique keeper will now draw weekly from the Granaries a stock sufficient to supply for a week the rations of all consumers allotted to him, and will, therefore, be precluded from asserting that he has not got rice to supply them. If he does so, he will be at once struck off the list and can be prosecuted for refusing to sell. Consumers who wish to do so will be able to purchase one week's rations at a time. It is not possible to arrange for purchase in larger quantities than this. A certain amount of difficulty and inconvenience is inevitable in the initial stages of the introduction of rationing on a scale such as the present. Every endeavour has been made to keep such inconvenience down to the minimum, and it is hoped that by next week the system will be working with reasonable smooth-

8. Pursuant to notice, the Hon. Mr. H. L. Cox, late City Sanitation Engineer, of the post of Deputy Director of Public Works, Nigeria, and recognize his retention of a claim to ultimate pension in respect of his service under the Municipal Council; and do further resolve that the Colonial Secretary be requested to be good enough to place before His Excellency the Governor in Executive Council the desirability of embodying the provisions of rule 21 of the Government Pension Minute in the Municipal Pension Rules in order to remove any possible ambiguity with regard to the pension rights of Municipal Officers in similar cases in the future.

Mr. R. L. Pereira rose to a point of order as to whether the motion was in order on the grounds that the matter

covered by the motion had been dealt with recently by the Council.

The Chairman stated that there was nothing in the Council's by-laws or in the Municipal Council's Ordinance to prevent a matter being brought up again, and in view of this he ruled that the motion was in order.

ANNEXURE A.

By-laws with regard to Motor Omnibuses framed under Section 22 of "The Vehicles Ordinance, No. 4 of 1916."

These by-laws may be called "The Colombo Motor Omnibus By-laws, 1921."
They shall apply throughout the limits of the Colombo Municipality.
In these by-laws "Motor Omnibus" shall mean a mechanically propelled vehicle, other than a tramcar, used

wholly or mainly for the conveyance of passengers, and provided with accommodation for eight or more passengers.

(1) No person shall act as a conductor of a motor omnibus unless he holds a subsisting license granted by the Chairman, Municipal Council, Colombo, or some other competent authority authorizing him to conduct a motor omnibus, and no person shall employ any one to conduct a motor omnibus, who does not hold such a license, for which a fee of Rs. 5 is payable with an annual renewal fee of Re. 1.

(2) No person shall act as a driver of a motor omnibus unless he holds a subsisting license granted by the Chairman, Municipal Council, Colombo, or some other competent authority authorizing him to drive a motor omnibus, and no person shall employ any one to drive a motor omnibus, who does not hold such a license, for which a fee of Rs. 5 is payable annually.

(3) Every conductor of a motor omnibus shall wear a prescribed uniform and badge.

(4) Age of Drivers and Conductors.—No driver or conductor of a motor omnibus shall be under the age of twenty-one years, and, in the event of a contravention of this sub-section, the proprietor or proprietors of the vehicle will be held liable.

The conductor of a motor omnibus plying for hire shall, immediately after the completion of a journey, carefully search for any property accidentally left in it, and shall take the same within 24 hours, if not sooner claimed by the owener, to the nearest police station.
6. (1) No motor omnibus shall ply for hire except on such routes and over such bridges as have been approved

by the Chairman, Municipal Council, Colombo.

(2) When making application for the vehicle to be registered, the proprietor must specify the route or routes upon which, and the hours between which, he intends the vehicle to ply, and these routes may not be departed from except after the permission of the Chairman of the Municipal Council has been obtained in writing.

(3) No motor omnibus shall stand for the purpose of taking up or setting down passengers except in such places as

may be authorized by the proper authority.

(4) No passenger shall get into or upon, or attempt to get into or upon, or shall quit or attempt to quit a motor omnibus while in motion.

Weight.—Every motor omnibus must be so constructed that the following maxima of weight are in no case exceeded:-

Unloaded

or, if the manufacturers prefer-

Back axle-weight laden

4 tons. Front axle-weight laden

The total weight shall not exceed six tons when the vehicle is in every respect ready for service and has its full. lawful load; one hundred and forty pounds each shall be allowed for the passengers, the driver, and the conductor.

8. Chassis Length.—The length of the chassis of a motor omnibus must not exceed 20 feet; but if the platform is, to be constructed upon the frame the total length may be 21 feet, provided that the total length of the complete vehicle shall in no case exceed 21 feet.

9. Motor omnibuses shall be vehicles of one storey only.

10. All the under parts of the vehicle inside the pivots of the front axle and steering arms (which must be placed as near as possible to the road wheels) as far back at least as the rear axle must clear the ground at least 10 inches when the vehicle is fully loaded, sufficient allowance in addition being made to provide for the wear of the tyres, set of the springs, or other causes of lessened height, so that the minimum clearance of 10 inches is at all times maintained.

11. Chassis Spring.—The springs of the chassis must be properly hung, and must be of sufficient strength and

flexibility to meet all likely contingencies.

12. Wheel-base.—(1) The Wheel-base must not exceed 14 feet 6 inches, and it must in all cases be so proportioned

to the load that the risk of skidding is reduced to a minimum.

(2) If it is found that a vehicle skids badly or cannot be held under proper control, the proper authority may serve a notice on the proprietor "not to use the vehicle," and may refuse to license the vehicle again until the defects have been remedied.

emedied.

13. Wheel-track.—The wheel-tracks of both front and rare wheels shall coincide, and the measurement from centre to centre taken in line with the axles must be not less than 5 feet 6 inches.

14. The road-wheels must be of sufficient and suitable diameter, but must not be made so heavy as to throw an undue strain upon the steering gear or other parts.

strain upon the steering goal of other parts.

15. Tyres.—The materials of which the tyres are made must be soft and elastic so as to reduce vibration.

16. Chassis Breadth.—The over-all width of the omnibus must not be greater than 7 feet 6 inches at any part.

17. Every motor omnibus must be fitted with at least two independent brakes, each capable of stopping and holding the vehicle under all conditions. They must also, where necessary, be fitted with an approved form of compen-

sating device.

18. The breaks shall be so fixed as to be capable of easy application, and at least one must be applied by a pedal. Brakes will not be deemed independent which are operated by pedals or levers acting through the same connections, upon the same brake blocks, or upon the same brake drums, and at least one must act directly upon the road-wheel without any connection with the propelling gear.

The operation of either brake must in no case declutch. 19.

20. Each vehicle must be capable of being readily steered and of turning corners without unduly interfering with other traffic.

The steering arms and other connections of the vehicle must be of ample strength and, as far as possible, 21.

protected from damage by collision.

22. All parts connected by bolts or studs, and nuts, subject to severe vibration, must be fastened by lock nuts, or by nuts and approved spring or lock nut washers, to prevent their working loose and causing noise, and any vehicle with lamp brackets or other fittings loose, and likely to cause unnecessary noise, will be regarded as unfit for public service.

23. The machinery must be so constructed that no undue noise or vibration arises from its use. Every motor omnibus must be submitted to be tested at least once every three months at a time and place appointed, in respect of its brakes, or of noise and vibration, on the orders of the proper authority or of any Police Officer

not below the rank of Inspector.

25. Every omnibus must be so geared that its highest speed shall not be in excess of the maximum laid down, viz.,

12 miles an hour.

26. When a vehicle is submitted for inspection, the gear ratio must be supplied, and this ratio must not be altered without the authority of the Chairman, Municipal Council, Colombo. The revolution of the engine when running at the speed which will give 12 miles an hour with the stated highest speed gear must also be supplied.

27. The lubrication of the engine and the carburation of the working mixture must be so controlled that smoke shall

not be emitted with the exhaust, or from any other part.

28. Carburetters or other petrol receptacles, unless they are suitably encased or screened, must not be placed in close proximity to magnetos, or to connections of wires carrying electric current.

29. When a guard-tray, or undershield, is fixed beneath the engine and adjacent machinery, it must be so constructed that no overflow of petrol shall be retained in the tray.

30. Suitable and approved appliances for extinguishing fire must be carried in such a position as to be readily available for use

available for use.

31. Tanks for petrol or other liquid fuel must be made of suitable material properly constructed, and of sufficient th. 'They must be so placed that any overflow shall not fall upon woodwork, or accumulate where it can be readily strength. They must be so placed that any overflow shall not fall upon woodwork, or accumulate where it can be readily ignited. The filling nozzle or inlet for the petrol or other liquid fuel should, where possible, be brought to the outside of the body.

All wires carrying electric current must be properly insulated and protected from injury, and so placed that they cannot be a cause of danger.

33. Effective means must be adopted for preventing the heat of the motor generator or exhaust pipe connections from injuriously affecting any parts of the vehicle or the comfort of the passengers.

34. The exhaust pipe must not be led inside the tray or undershield or be fixed in such a position that oil, or any vaporizable or inflammable material, is likely to be dropped upon it.

35. The width between seat backs must not be less than 56 inches, where the seats are placed lengthwise.

36. At least 16 inches measured in a straight line must be allowed for each passenger on every seat, which must be fit and proper and convenient for sitting on. When cross or "garden" seats are fitted, each such seats must be at least 26 inches clear from the inside back of the seat in front of it, so that there shall be room for the knees of passengers.

37. No seat will be permitted which, when occupied, is likely to cause obstruction to persons using the landing-

board or gangways.

The backs of all seats must be closed to avoid unnecessary risk of the pockets of passengers being picked. 39. No person shall smoke or chew betel, tobacco, or other like substance in the motor omnibus, after being requested by the conductor or any passenger to desist from so doing.

40. When cushions are provided for seats, they must be covered with leather, cloth of good quality, rattan, or

other suitable material.

The steps for entrance to the inside must be at the rear of the vehicle. They must be safe and convenient; suitable and efficient means being provided by rails or bands to assist passengers entering and leaving. The lowest step suitable and emelent means being provided by rails or bains to assist passengers entering and leaving. The lowest step shall not be more than 15 inches nor less than 10 inches above the ground.

42. The risers of all steps must be closed and the treads of each fitted with an approved form of tread plate.

43. There must be proper ventilation, without the necessity for opening windows, except where small separate working the model of the control of the

ventilation windows are provided, in which case suitable provision must be made for the opening to be adjustable.

44. The vehicle must be suitably lighted inside and outside. Where acetylene or other gas is used, the cylinders or vessels which contain the gas or in which it is generated must be fixed outside in such a position as to be removed, as far as possible from the removed and the removed of the remo far as possible, from danger of accidental ignition. The pipes must be led along the outside of the vehicle, but not along the outside of the roof.

45. The proprietor or proprietors of any motor omnibus plying for hire shall maintain the same in good order, well vernished or printed and incidental and outside to the actifaction of the root.

 46. A hand-bulb horn for giving due warning of the approach of the vehicle must be provided.

 47. A box or other approved means must be fitted to the front and to the rear of the vehicle to show the destination to which the vehicle is proceeding. The letters and background must be black and white, respectively, and the letters at least 4½ inches high and proportionately thick.

 48. The principal points of the route shall be subject to the approval of the Chairman, Municipal Council, and must be painted in black or white letters not less than four inches high and of proportionate thickness, and be exhibited on boards to the front and rear of the vehicle. These boards shall be so made that the points of route are shown in geographical sequence according to the direction the vehicle. Revealing. Boute boards may also be affixed to the sides of geographical sequence according to the direction the vehicle is travelling. Route boards may also be affixed to the sides of
- the vehicle.

 49. The destination boards shall be illuminated by night in an approved manner for the guidance of intending

50. The following particulars must also be suitably painted on the omnibus:—

(a) The weight and speed limit;

(b) The name of the proprietor, or proprietors, to be painted on each side clear of the wheels;

(c) The words "Colombo Motor Omnibus" and the number on the number plate, to be painted inside the omnibus and also outside at the back on the near side;

(d) The number of passengers which the vehicle is licensed to carry to be legibly painted inside and outside the vehicle.

- 51. In every motor omnibus there shall be displayed for the inspection of passengers a list of rates and fares charged. Such rates and fares shall not exceed the maximum prescribed from time to time under the Vehicles Ordinance, No. 4 of 1916.
- 52. No advertisement in black and white will be allowed on the front of the vehicle nor will any writing or lettering be permitted when its form or position is such as to hide, or, in the opinion of the proper authority, to interfere with the easy legibility of the destination indicators or route boards.

53. No printed, written, or other matter shall appear on the outside or inside of the vehicle, or be carried by way of advertisement, except such, if any, as may be approved by the Chairman, Municipal Council, Colombo.

Note.—The colour of these advertisements must be entirely distinct from that of the route-boards, and they must be so placed or shown that no confusion in reading the routes, &c., is, in the opinion of the proper authority, likely to arise.

- 54. No person, except a learner, fitter, or other official, when specially authorized by the proprietor (such person to carry a special pass or badge) or a person authorized by the Chairman, Municipal Council, shall be allowed to ride beside the driver at any time.
- 55. No cans or other receptacle for oil, water, &c., are to be carried on the driver's footboard, nor may anything be placed in such a manner or position as will be likely to hamper the driver.

56. Each motor omnibus must be fitted with an approved means for enabling passengers, both inside and outside, to signal to the driver or conductor when required.

57. Notwithstanding anything contained in these rules, if there is anything in the construction, working, or general appearance of a motor omnibus which, in the opinion of the proper authority, renders the vehicle unfit for public use, it shall not be licensed.

58. Where any motor omnibus is not maintained in accordinace with the foregoing by-laws, the proper authority may serve a notice upon the proprietor of such motor omnibus, not to use such vehicle and thereafter such vehicle shall

not ply for hire or be used upon the road until any defects have been set right to the satisfaction of the proper authority.

59. These by-laws shall be in addition to any other by-laws in the force under the Vehicle Ordinance, No. 4 of 1916 and shall in no way exempt motor omnibuses from any of the provisions of such by-laws where applicable.

ARTICLES OF ASSOCIATION OF THE SINHALA JATIYA, LIMITED.

In is agreed that the regulations contained in the Table C in the schedule annexed to "The Joint Stock Companies Ordinance, 1861," subject to the hereinafter mentioned modifications, shall be deemed to be the regulations of the Company. The modifications are as follows:-

Issuing and Transferring Shares.—Every instrument of transfer shall be left at the office of the Company for approval by the Directors, accompanied by such evidence as may be required by the Directors to prove the title of the transferrer. If the transferrer be approved, such approval shall be certified in writing under the hand of two of the Directors endorsed on such instrument of transfer, and the Company shall thereupon register the transfere as a Shareholder. If the transfer be not approved of, the proposed transfer shall be absolutely void and notice of non-approval shall be sent to the Shareholder within 20 days the transfer intending to transfer such charges. "An improved process for obtaining oil from the fresh nut of the cocoanut or any oil-bearing nut, seed, or plants." Abstract.—The nature of the invention is described in the claims, which are as follows:-

1. An improved process for obtaining oil from the fresh nut of the cocoanut or any other oil-bearing nut, seeds, or plants, consisting of the boiling of the comminuted meat of the fresh nut with closed or open steam, the gradual addition of water during the process, varying in temperature from 22° C. to 100° C., the total amount of water added being equal ultimately to about the weight of the fresh nut, drawing off and separating centrifugally, with the addition of water, equal to about 5 times its bulk the surface oil, and thus clarifying the said oil, substantially as described.

2. In the process as claimed in claim 1, the step of drawing off and separating centrifugally, with the addition of water, equal to about five times its bulk the surface oil obtained under claim 1, and thus clarifying the said oil and obtaining a pure white oil containing a maximum of '20 per cent. free fatty acids, substantially as described.

3. In the process as claimed in claim 1, the step of the gradual addition during the boiling of the comminuted meat of the fresh nut of water, varying in temperature from 22°C. to 100°C., the total amount added being about equal to the weight of the fresh nut, substantially as described.
