SCHEDULE A.

Talpe Pattu Fishing Rules.

Rules 17 and 18 of the rules framed under the said Ordinance, and appearing in *Government Gazette* No. 6,522 dated September 13, 1912, shall be amended as follows :—

Rule No. 17 to be deleted.

Rule No. 18: "Any person catching Koramburuwa, Ehelaburuwa, or bollo fish with nets in any of the following warayas or galparas, namely, Rumaswala waraya, Unawatuna waraya, Dalawelle para, and all the warayas and galparas between Goiyapana and Poloya, where such fish periodically come and remain for some time, shall be guilty of an offence.

Provided, however, that whenever bait fish are exceedingly plentiful in the said warayas or galparas, the Village Committee may from time to time suspend the operation of this rule for a period to be fixed by the Committee, such period not to exceed five days at one time.

Notification of such suspension shall be made by beat of tom-tom.

Irrigation Rules for the Kegalla District.

1. At the cultivation season the Vel-Vidanes shall notify the proprietors of paddy lands to commence the usual works for the repairs of dams and water-courses, and for the construction of fences for the joint cultivation of their range of fields, and such proprietors shall, without unnecessary delay, proceed to perform the several works aforesaid.

2. The Vel-Vidanes shall see to the just and equitable distribution of water to the different fields.

3. No person shall lead water to his fields by cutting or piercing the dam above them.

4. No person shall cut an amuna under any pretence whatsoever.

5. Boundary dams shall not be cleared, renewed, or repaired, except in the presence of the parties concerned and the Vel-Vidane.

6. The work of fencing a range of fields shall be carried on simultaneously, on notice given by the Vel-Vidane, by the joint labour of all proprietors in proportion to the extent which each person holds or cultivates, and shall be completed within eight days after the notice as aforesaid has been given.

7. Every fence shall be repaired and maintained in good order by the persons who made it, and shall not be removed, except on the orders of the Vel-Vidane and after the work of harvesting is completely finished.

8. On a range of fields being fully prepared for sowing, the Vel-Vidanes shall notify the proprietors to sow their portions, within one week from the date of such notice, unless the weather or the peculiar position of this field renders it impossible for any proprietor to sow within the prescribed time.

9. Within the time appointed by the Vel-Vidane for sowing a tract of paddy fields, all the joint owners or cultivators shall sow their respective fields with the description of seed paddy previously agreed upon by them. Any of the cultivators or proprietors who shall be unable to procure the necessary description of seed paddy or having such seed paddy, to sow it within the proper time, shall be allowed to sow their fields with such description of bala-wi as shall ripen at the same time with the paddy which has been sown in the rest of the tract, but bala-wi shall on no other account be sown where paddy of a superior quality has been agreed upon by the proprietors or cultivators to be used in the tract.

10. Channels (vellas) shall be cleared and maintained by the joint labour of all the proprietors of the fields irrigated, in proportion to the extent of land owned by each.

11. No owner of a paddy field situated in a range shall drive in cattle to his field after reaping, until all the fields in the range have been reaped and crops removed.

12. After cultivation has once commenced, no cattle shall be admitted to the tract of fields, except for the necessary purposes of cultivation, until all the fields in the tract have been reaped and crops removed.

13. If the cultivation of any field be neglected, abandoned, or delayed by its owner, the Village Council may get the same cultivated by any person they may choose, who shall give the ground share to the owner.

14. The Vel-Vidanes shall have the power to cause the branches of trees (not being fruit trees or trees on a Government road) overhanging a paddy field to be cut down.

15. All dams or other works required for preventing the overflowing of streams or for improving any existing irrigation work shall be executed by the joint labour of all the proprietors interested in proportion to the extent of land held by each.

16. No person shall divert water to asweddumize new land without the consent of the owners of the existing fields or of the Assistant Government Agent.

Any existing custom has the force of rules. 17. No person shall for any purpose whatever obstruct, encroach upon, or lessen the width of any water-course (vella) or threshing-floor.

18. No person shall wilfully prevent water flowing to the fields below his own; if any person infringe this rule, the Vel-Vidane shall proceed to the spot with witnesses and open the gaps (wekkada) himself.

19. No person shall be exempted from contributing his fair quota of labour to any work required in the general interests of the proprietors on the ground that he has not cultivated for the season.

20. Should a portion of the paddy sown in a tract ripen before the rest, either by the cultivation of bala-wi or other cause, the cultivators of that portion shall, with the consent of the other joint owners or cultivators, be allowed to reap and store the same, but the cultivators whose crops have been so reaped and stored shall continue to contribute their usual amount of assistance towards the protection of the unreaped portion of the tract.

21. Before the crops of a range of fields are reaped, the threshing-floor of the range shall be put into proper order by the joint labour of the landowners concerned after due notice by the Vel-Vidane.

22. Should a case occur in which, before sowing has commenced, it is found that the source of supply to the tract of fields is insufficient to irrigate the whole extent of the tract, the majority of the proprietors intending to sow for that season shall decide on the extent and the portion of the tract to be cultivated, and that portion shall be divided among such proprietors in proportion to their shares of the tract.

23. Should a case occur in which from any cause the source of supply to the tract of fields should prove insufficient after sowing has been completed to bring the whole extent sown to maturity, the majority of the proprietors of the fields sown shall decide what part of the tract shall be abandoned, and the remainder shall be divided among the proprietors who sowed in proportion to the extent sown by each. All disputes arising in this connection shall be referred to the President of the Village Tribunal, whose decision will be final.

24. The owners of cattle shall clear and keep in repair all roads (pita-parawal) outside the paddy fields and dwelling gardens which have been constructed or hereafter may be constructed to drive cattle in and out, the liability being in proportion to the number of cattle over one year old belonging to the owner.

25. No person shall open any drain from high land into a paddy field so as to damage the paddy fields.

26. No person shall fell, destroy, or clear the jungle or trees growing on the borders and in the immediate vicinity of any stream, water-course, channel, or spring, and required for its preservation and protection.

27. No person shall throw any stones, rubbish, or other matter into any channel, ela, or water-course whereby the passage of the water may be impeded or the water in any way polluted.

28. Gansabhawa paths through fields, whether cultivated or not, shall be kept in repair three feet wide by the proprietors in proportion to the extent of field owned by each according to the limit prescribed by the ancient customs. Any cultivator or cultivators who prefer to substitute and keep up a six feet pita-para in place of a three feet road through paddy land during the cultivation season, are at liberty to do so on obtaining the sanction of the Assistant Government Agent.

29. No person other than the proprietors of persons acting on their behalf shall fish in the paddy fields or in the channels or elas belonging to them.

30. In addition to the ordinary labour of the year, whenever the Assistant Government Agent or person acting under his orders shall find it necessary to call out the labour of a village to perform an urgent work of repair, or for the prevention of inevitable damage, labour either in person or by substitute shall at once be furnished by every shareholder and continued daily until the completion of the work. Such labour may not be commuted by a money payment.

31. Any custom now existing relating to paddy cultivation, not expressly provided for in these rules and not opposed thereto, shall have the force of these rules and be considered part of them.

Duties of Vel-Vidanes.

Huwandiram.

32. The Vel-Vidanes shall have the entire supervision of all works of irrigation and paddy cultivation within their limits, and shall enforce the above rules and bring all breaches of the same before the Village Council, and shall themselves be liable for every neglect of their duty proved to the satisfaction of the Village Council, as for a breach of rules.

33. The Vel-Vidane shall be entitled to huwandirm or commission of one per cent. of the produce of all the paddy fields (except those sown with el-wi) within his subdivision. Such commission shall be paid at the threshing-floor before any grain is removed. Should it be proved to the satisfaction of the Assistant Government Agent that any Vel-Vidane has neglected his work, the Assistant Government Agent may order the whole or part of his huwandiram or commission be withheld.

ORDER FOR FURTHER AMENDING "THE CIVIL APPELLATE RULES, 1913."

We, the Honourable Sir Anton Bertram, Kt., King's Counsel, Chief Justice of the Island of Ceylon, and the Honourable Mr. George Francis Macdaniel Ennis, and the Honourable Mr. Thomas Edward de Sampayo, King's Counsel, and the Honourable Mr. William Thomas Porter, and the Honourable Mr. Gualterus Stewart Schneider, King's Counsel, Puisne Justices of the said Court, do hereby, in pursuance and execution of the powers given to us by "The Courts Ordinance, 1889 and 1901," and all other powers and authorities enabling us in this behalf, order and direct as in manner following :--

1. Rule 3 (1) of "The Civil Appellate Rules, 1913," is hereby annulled, and the following substituted therefor :—

"(1) The appellant shall apply in writing to the Registrar of the Supreme Court, through the District Judge or the Commissioner of Requests, so the case may be, within the time limited by law for the completion of the security for costs of appeal for typewritten copies of the record, stating in such application whether copies of the whole or portions only, if so, of what portions of the record, are necessary for the decision of the appeal."

2. Rule 3 (3) of "The Civil Appellate Rules, 1913," is hereby amended by the addition of the words "which shall be duly cancelled by the appellant or his proctor" after the word "application" and before the word "and " in the second line thereof, and shall read as follows :—

"(3) Payments for such copies shall be made by stamps affixed to the application, which shall be duly cancelled by the appellant or his proctor, and every such application shall state the value of the subject-matter and the nature of the action or proceedings in which the appeal is preferred."

3. The following additional proviso shall be inserted immediately after (5) and be numbered (6):—

"(6) Provided that in the event of any additional copy being found necessary subsequently to the original application, the Registrar may in his discretion supply such additional copy on application being made either direct to the Registrar or through the District Judge or Commissioner of Requests, and the provisions of this rule as to payment and scale of charges shall apply to every such application."

11. The Government does not bind itself to accept the lowest or any tender, and reserves to itself the right of accepting one tender for the two quarters for Customs Preventive Officers and two sets of quarters for watchers of Customs Preventive Staff or separate tenders for each quarter.

VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended January 27, 1923.

Births.—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 166 (2 Europeans, 13 Burghers, 89 Sinhalese, 25 Tamils, 25 Moors, 3 Malays, and 9 Others). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on January 1, 1923, viz., 249,046) was 34.8, as against 33.7 in the preceding week, 37.9 in the corresponding week of last year, and 27.9 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 208 (1 European, 11 Burghers, 108 Sinhalese, 39 Tamils, 35 Moors, 6 Malays, and 8 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 43.5, as against 46.7 in the previous week, 38.7 in the corresponding week of last year, and 31.2 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 208 total deaths, 38 were of infants under one year of age, as against 36 in the preceding week, 47 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 33 the average for last year.

Stillbirths.—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 10.

Principal Causes of Death.—1. (a) Thirty-four deaths from Pneumonia were registered, 12 in Maradana hospitals (including 4 deaths of non-residents), 6 in Kotahena North, 4 in Kotahena South, 2 each in San Sebastian, New Bazaar, Maradana North, and Slave Island, and 1 each in Pettah, St. Paul's, Maradana East, and Wellawatta South, same as in the previous week, as against 22 the weekly average for last year.

(b) Six deaths from *Influenza* were registered, 3 in Kotahena South, and 1 each in Pettah, Maradana hospital (of a non-resident), and Wellawatta South, as against 9 in the previous week, and 6 the weekly average for last year.

(c) Three deaths from *Bronchitis* were registered, 1 each in Maradana hospital (of a non-resident), Maradana North and Slave Island, as against 2 in the previous week and 4 the weekly average for last year.

2. (a) Eighteen deaths from *Phthisis* were registered, 7 in Maradana hospitals, 4 each in Kotahena South, and Maradana North, 2 in St. Paul's, and 1 in Slave Island, as against 19 in the previous week and 12 the weekly average for last year.

(b) Two deaths of residents of Colombo Town occurred at the Ragama Hospital from Phthisis during the week.

3. Ten deaths from *Enteric Fever* were registered, 6 in Maradana hospitals (including 1 death of a non-resident), and 1 each in Kotahena North, New Bazaar, Maradana South, and Slave Island, as against 5 in the previous week and 4 the weekly average for last year.

4. Five deaths from *Plague* were registered, 2 in Maradana hospitals and 1 each in Pettah, Kotahena South, and Wellawatta North, as against 1 in the previous week and 2 the weekly average for last year.

5. Seventeen deaths were registered from Debility, 12 from Diarrhæa, 10 from Enteritis, 9 from Infantile Convulsions 8 from Dysentery, 6 from Worms, 1 from Puerperal Septicamia, and 69 from Other Causes.

6. Twenty-six cases of *Measles*, 19 of *Chickenpox*, 10 of *Enteric Fever*, and 3 of *Plague* were reported during the week, as against 17, 44, 17, and 4, respectively, of the preceding week,

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was $79 \cdot 2$, against $78 \cdot 9$ in the preceding week and $79 \cdot 7^{\circ}$ in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was $29 \cdot 905$ in., against $29 \cdot 917$ in. in the preceding week and $29 \cdot 927$ in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was $1 \cdot 02$ in., against $4 \cdot 17$ in. in the preceding week and $0 \cdot 01$ in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.

UNIVERSITY OF LONDON.-REGULATIONS FOR MATRICULATION.

[The date of the June Matriculation will be altered in and after 1924.]

IMPORTANT NOTICE.

The attention of all students who matriculate is directed to the following extract from Statute No. 120 :-

" No student shall be admitted to the Final Examination for a degree until the expiration of at least three years after Matriculation, unless the Senate in special cases or special classes of cases otherwise determine."

MATRICULATION.

Candidates for any Degree in this University unless admitted under Statute 113*, or under the second clause of Statute 116† must have passed the Matriculation Examination either in its ordinary form or in the form of the general School Examination, at least three years previously to the Final Examination for a First Degree.

First Degree, 1 Students admitted under Statute 113, or under Statute 116, upon a qualification other than the Matriculation Examination, must pay a registration fee of £3. 3s, to the appropriate Registrar. The Matriculation Examination and all other examinations of

the University are open to men and women. There shall be two examinations at Ceylon centres-

There shall be two examinations at Ceylon centres—Colombo and Jaffn.—for matriculation in each year, one commencing on the second Monday in January, and the other on the second [in and after 1924, the first] Monday in June. Candidates for admission to the January examination must forward their applications on or before July 31, or for the June examination before December 31, on forms which may be obtained from the Education Office; and forward with the applications in the same cover (a) a certificate showing that the candidate will have completed his sixteenth year on or before January 14 for the January examination, or on or before July 31 for the June examination; (b) acertificate of good conduct; and (c) a hank receipt for the fees which should be credited to the and (c) a bank receipt for the see, which should be credited to the account of the Director of Education in the Mercantile Bank of India, Limited, Colombo. Those offering a special language or Geology or Zoology must apply seven calendar months before the month of examination, *i.e.*, before May 31 for the January examination, or before October 31 for the June examination.

Those who enter for the examination as private candidates should forward with their applications for admission to the examination a certificate from their private tutors, stating their qualifications, and whether they have a reasonable chance of passing the examination.

The following are the particulars of the foregoing subjects of examination :

I.-ENGLISH.

The Examination in English will consist of two papers covering three hours, and will include-

- (a) A subject for an essay to be chosen by each candidate from several subjects set. Those proposed may include some having reference to Geography and History, and some involving an acquaintance with English Authors, as well as more abstract subjects, the main object being to test power of comparison thought and arrangement general reading of expression, thought, and arrangement, general reading, and knowledge.
- (b) Questions testing knowledge and command of English. These may include questions on précis writing, paraphrase, and analysis of sentences.
- (c) Questions testing general reading and knowledge of English books.

Candidates are expected to devote to the essay at least one hour, after the expiry of which they will be supplied with the Second Paper.

II.--ELEMENTARY MATHEMATICS.*

There will be two papers : one in Arithmetic and Algebra and the other in Geometry.

-Elementary principles and processes of Arithmetic. rithmetic. The principles of vulgar and decimal fractions (excluding reourring decimals).

Knowledge and use of the tables required, both in the English and Metric System for the measurement of length, area, volume, capacity, weight, and time.

Mensuration of the rectangle, parallelogram, triangle, and trapezium. (*Note.*—Questions on these may be such as will involve the application of Algebra and Geometry.) Averages, Ratio, Proportion, Percentages.

Practical applications of Arithmetic.

Great importance will be attached to correct working. The use of Logarithms* is allowed except in questions where they are expressly forbidden.

Algebra.---The fundamental processes of Algebra.

Symbolical expression of general results in Arithmetic.

Interpretation and evaluation of Formulæ. Changing the subject of a Formula.

Factors of expressions of simple types. Equations of the first and second degree containing one unknown quantity. Simultaneous equations of the first degree, and two simultaneous equations of which one is of the first degree and the other of the second degree.

Easy examples in fractions. Graphs of simple algebraic functions with easy applications. Simple questions on fractional and negative indices (formal proofs not being required). Use of logarithms to the base 10.*

Arithmetic and Geometric Series. Application of Algebra to the solution of problems.

Geometry .--- The subjects of Euclid I.-IV., with simple deductions, including easy loci and the areas of triangles and parallelograms of which the bases and altitudes are given commensurable lengths.

Euclid's proofs will not be insisted on, but all proofs of geometrical theorems must be geometrical. The use of properties of similar figures will be allowed.

III. -- OPTIONAL LANGUAGES.

Latin.—The paper shall contain passages to be translated into English from Latin books not previously prescribed, together with questions on Grammar and simple and easy sentences of English to be translated into Latin. †

Greek.—The paper shall contain passages to be translated into English from Greek books not previously prescribed, together with questions on Grammar and simple and easy sentences of English to be translated into Greek ‡ French or German.—The paper shall contain (1) passages for

translation from the language, (2) a fairly easy and a more difficult passage for translation into, and a fairly easy and a more difficult subject for free composition in, the language, candidates being allowed the option of doing either the more easy translation and the more difficult free composition, or the more difficult translation and the more easy free composition.

• Logarithms or four-figure logarithmic tables will be supplied to candidates in the room by the University Candidates who so desire can obtain copies of these tables from the University of London Press, 17, Warwick Square, E.C. 4. Candidates are not permitted to bring their own copies into the Examination Room

Other Modern European Languages. — The paper in any other Modern European Language approved for the Matriculation Examination shall be drawn up as nearly as may be practicable in conformity with the following syllabus ||:-

The paper shall contain (1) an easy passage or easy passages for translation from the language in question, (2) a fairly easy and a more difficult passage for translation into, and a fairly easy and a more difficult subject for free composition in, the language in question, candidates being allowed the option of doing either the more easy translation and the more difficult free composition, or the more difficult translation and the more easy free composition.

Oriental Languages (including Hebrew). §—The paper in any Oriental Language, including Hebrew, approved for the Matriculation Examination, shall be drawn up as nearly as may be practicable in conformity with the following syllabus

The paper shall contain (1) an easy passage or easy passages for translation from the language in question; (2) an easy piece for translation into the language in question, or as an alternative an essay of a simple character to be written in the language in question; (3) questions on Grammar, limited to Accidence and Elementary Syntax.

IV.-HISTORY.

The questions will be framed to test the general conceptions of history and historical development rather than technical detail.

Ancient.—The general course of Greek and Roman History, and an outline of the earlier monarchies.

English.-The general course of English history from 1485 to the death of Queen Victoria, with some reference to the contempo-rary history of Europe and Colonial developments.

Modern European.-The period from 1789 to 1910.

V.-PHYSICAL AND GENERAL GEOGRAPHY.

The following regions in decreasing detail :—(a) England and Wales, (b) Scotland and Ireland, (c) Europe, the Mediterranean, the North Atlantic, North America, and Greenland, (d) the remaining Continents. Recapitulation from the point of view of the British Empire.

Attention should be directed to the following aspects of the several regions :---The broad contrasts and chief features of the land relief. The chief features of the coastal outline as related to those of the relief. The disposition of the water partings and of the chief river basins. The winds and sea currents, distribution of rainfall, the climatic contrasts, and the resulting agricultural contrasts. The district of exceptionally dense or rare population considered in relation to their position, natural resources, and industrial activities. The arrangement of the political divisions upon the land relief and with reference to the drainage system. The analysis of the positions of the great towns.

Candidates will be expected to understand the main physical causes of the phenomena they describe, such as variations of atmospheric temperature and pressure, their seasonal and regional distribution; the causes of precipitation, winds-their cause and prevalence in different regions, the interpretation of weather charts, and the meaning of the network and other conventional-symbols employed in maps. Time need not be spent in elaborate map drawing. The answers in the examination should be illustrated, where necessary, by simple diagrams, correct in general proportion, but without detail. Candidates may be expected to identify maps without names, to insert upon such maps the position of geographical features, and to work problems as to local time.

VI.-LOGIC.

The Term : classification of terms, denotation and connotation. Division, definition, the Predicables.

The Proposition : classification of propositions, reduction of sentences to logical form.

Laws of thought, opposition of propositions, immediate inference. The Syllogism : moods and figures, the expression of arguments in syllogistic form.

Hypothetical and disjunctive propositions and arguments. Inductive reasoning in its various

forms. **Observation and experiment: canons** of scientific induction.

Combination of induction and deduction: hypothesis and explanation. Fallacies.

VII.-GEOMETRICAL AND MECHANICAL DRAWING.

Plane Geometry .- Construction of scales, triangles, quadrilaterals, and polygons. Problems on circles and tangents and on areas of plane figures. Simple problems on loci, including paths of points in elementary linkwork. Construction of Archimedean spiral, ellipse, cycloid, and involute of circle, with their tangents and normals.

Solid Geometry.—Elementary projections of points, lines, planes, inclined surfaces, and solids, including the cylinder, cone, and sphere. Simple sections. Projection of additional plans and elevations.

Isometric or oblique projection, without using "isometric scale," of simple plane surfaces and solids.

Developments of the surfaces of simple solids; elementary problems in interpenetration of prisms, cylinders and cones, and developments of penetrated surfaces.

Projection of simple helix and square-threaded screw.

Machine Drawing.—Making scale drawings, two or more views, with simple sections of elementary machine parts, from rough partly-dimensioned sketches.

VIII. --- MATHEMATICS (MORE ADVANCED).*

Harder questions may be set on the syllabus of Elementary Mathematics.

Algebra .--- Theory of indices; logarithms, and the use of logarithmic tables.

Theory of quadratics.

Permutations and Combinations.

Binomial Theorem for a positive integral index.

Trigonometry.—Including the addition formulæ and the solution of triangles, together with the practical solution of triangles and applications, and numerical examples involving the use of logarithmic and other tables.

Geometry .- Similar figures.

Mensuration of the Circle. Elementary Co-ordinate Geometry of the straight line and circle.

Calculus.—Limits. Gradient of a graph. Differentiation of sum, product, and quotient of functions.

Differentiation of a function of a function. Differentiation of simple algebraic functions involving positive and negative integral powers of the variable.

Differentiation of elementary trigonometric functions (the inverse functions are excluded).

Simple questions on maxima and minima.

Integration of expressions formed by sums of terms of the type x^n $(n \pm 1)$, sin x and cos x. (Integration by parts is excluded.)

Elementary questions and problems involving differentiation and integration with simple applications to rates, areas, and

volumes. The Sections on Geometry and on Calculus are alternative. Candidates may not attempt questions in both.

IX.—OPTIONAL SCIENCES.

The Examinations in Science shall aim at ascertaining whether candidates possess a knowledge of fundamental scientific methods acquired by observation of nature or by a simple course of experiments in physical measurement, or by the investigation of simple problems and commonly occurring phenomena illustrating natural laws.

Mechanics.

Elementary notions of Displacement, Velocity, and Acceleration. Motion of a body with constant Acceleration. Resolution and Composition of Velocities, Accelerations, &c.

Elementary notions of Mass and Momentum.

Elementary notions of Force as measured by rate of change of momentum.

Newton's Laws of Motion.

Kinetic Energy and Work. Units of Force and Measurement.

Balancing of Forces.

Torques or Moments.

Conditions for the equilibrium of Three Parallel Forces. Resolution and Composition of Parallel Forces in one plane. Centre of Parallel Forces. Centre of Gravity. Stable, Unstable, and Neutral Equilibrium.

and Neutral Equilibrium. Conditions for the equilibrium of Three Forces not parallel. Triangle and Parallelogram of Forces. Moments, Simple illus-trations of Conditions of Equilibrium and of the Principle of Work, as in levers, pulleys, the inclined plane, &c. Pressure in Liquids; variations with depth. Transmission of Liquid Pressure; Hydraulic Press. Pressures on immersed and floating badian

General characteristics of the metals, including an elementary

study of sodium, calcium, and iron, and their common compounds. The oxidation of the metals, magnesium, zinc, iron, copper, lead, and the properties of their oxides. The interaction of these metals and their oxides with the common acids.

Action of water on sodium, magnesium, and iron. The reversible character of the action of water on iron.

Elementary experiments illustrating the quantitative nature of chemical combination.

Lines of force. Magnetic moment. The Simpler Phenomena of Electrified Bodies. Conduction and Insulation. Electrification by Friction and by Induction (Influence).

Electric Currents.

The Simple Voltaic Cell The Daniel Cell. Magnetic Field of Current. Galvanometers.

Magnetic Field of Carry Simple Electromagnets.

Ohm's Law.

Heating Effects of Currents.

Elementary Phenomena of Electrolysis. The Simple Phenomena of Induced Currents. Induction Coil. The questions set will have regard to the conditions under which these subjects may best be experimentally taught in schools.

Botany.†

1. The appearance and structure of the organs of a flowering plant so far as these can be observed with the naked eye or with the aid of a hand lens.

The functions of these organs so far as they can be ascertained by observation and simple experiment.

2. The main phenomena of the life-history of common flowering plants (excluding the microscopic processes of maturation and union of the sexual elements and of the development of the seed). The mechanisms of pollination; fruit and seed dispersal. Germination, particularly as illustrated by seedlings easily grown in the garden or in pots or boxes. The structure of garden soil. Different types of soil and their water and air contents. Rough methods of mechanical analysis of soils.

3. The nature and structure (excluding miscroscopic details) of the vegetable materials met with in every day life, such as wood, cork, &c. (excluding manufactured substances); also of the common edible fruits and vegetables.

5. An elementary knowledge of the nutrition growth irrita-

5. An elementary knowledge of the nutrition, growth, irritability of plants, particularly of such facts as can be demonstrated by simple qualitative and quantitative experiments. Candidates will be expected to show evidence that they have performed such experiments themselves.

The questions set will have regard to the conditions under which these subjects may best be experimentally taught in schools.

(An elementary knowledge will be assumed of the chemical and physical properties of the atmosphere and of water, together with some acquaintance with the use of the barometer and thermometer.)

6. The main features of the more easily accessible types of Vegetation, and of the different habitats in which they are found. Common weeds of cultivated soil, and the causes of their prevalence.

An elementary knowledge of the adaptations shown by native plants to their environment.

7. The outlines of the cellular structure of the living plant as shown for example in simple fresh-water algae and in the mesophyll of a foliage leaf.

Zoology.*

(1) The general principles of animal life treated in an elementary fashion and illustrated by the types specified in paragraph (4). Growth and Metamorphosis as illustrated by the frog and butterfly. Conditions under which life can exist. Differences between animals and plants.

(2) The gross structure of the skin; the skeleton; the alimentary tract and its glands; the respiratory mechanism; the vascular system; the central nervous system; and the functions of these organs in a typical mammal.

of these organs in a typical mammal. (3) The structure and mode of life of Amœba and Hydra treated in an elementary manner. (4) The chief external characters and mode of life of a jelly

(4) The chief external characters and mode of life of a jelly fish (Aurelia), an anemone, and a coral, an earth worm, a crayfish or lobster, a blow-fly, a bee, a butterfly, a spider (the structure of the mouth parts of the foregoing arthropods not to be studied in detail), a starfish, a freshwater mussel, and a snail, a fish, a frog, a lizard, a tortoise, and a snake, and a typical bird and mammal.

Candidates must possess a practical acquaintance with the external characters of the types specified in section (4).

Except in the case of English and Elementary Mathematics candidates will only be allowed to take one paper in each subject. Two papers will be set in many other subjects in order to compress the examination into as short a period as possible, but no candidate will be allowed to take more than one of these papers. No option is allowed as to the order in which they are taken, and if the candidate does not present himself for examination in a given subject at the right time, he will on no account whatever be allowed to take a paper which may be set later in the same subject. It is, therefore, of the greatest importance that candidates should attend to the following rule :--

Candidates, having selected their subjects in accordance with the Regulations, will be examined in these subjects in the numerical order in which they occur in the above list, and must take each subject on the first possible occasion accordingly.

Thus, for example, a candidate who offers, in addition to English and Mathematics (Elementary), Botany, Mechanics, and French, must take Botany (No. 6) on the afternoon of the third day, Mechanics (No. 9) on the morning of the fourth day, and French (No. 14) on the afternoon of the fourth day. Again, a candidate who offers Latin, French (14), and German (15), must take French in the morning and German in the afternoon of the fourth day.

Candidates who take any of the subjects for which two additional months' notice or more is required will be informed when the examinations in these subjects will take place.

A pass certificate, signed by the principal and setting forth the subjects of examination taken by the candidate, shall be delivered to each successful candidate after the report of the Examiners shall have been approved by the Senate.[‡]

APPENDICES. I.

Statute 113 :---

113. Provided also that the Senate may admit as Internal students and as candidates for any of the higher degrees (except in Medicine and Surgery) without their having previously taken any lower degree the following persons (that is to say) :---

- (1) Graduates of Universities approved by the Senate for this purpose;
- (2) Persons who have passed the examinations required for a degree in some University approved as aforesaid;
- (3) Persons who have obtained from the University of Cam-bridge a certificate stating that they have satisfied the examiners in a Tripos Examination qualifying as a Final Examination for a first degree ;
- (4) Persons who have passed or obtained Honours at the Second Public Examination of the University of Oxford, provided that they have also either passed or obtained Honours at the First Public Examination, or have passed such other examination or examinations as under the provisions of the University of Oxford are accepted as statutably equivalent thereto.

REGULATIONS FOR REGISTRATION AS EXEMPT FROM THE MATRICULATION EXAMINATION.

Statute 116 is as follows :- Every candidate for admission as a student of the University shall pass such Entrance or Matri-culation Examination or fulfil such other tests of fitness to be admitted as a student as may be from time to time prescribed.

No person who has been registered under Statute 116 is permitted to enter for the Matriculation Examination.

Students proposing to be registered under Statute 116 as exempt from the Matriculation Examination should carefully observe that while such registration secures to them within the University all the privileges of matriculated students, except that of entry for the matriculation supplementary certificate, it does not follow that other Public Authorities or Bodies it does not follow that other Public Authorities or Bodies outside the University will accord to students thus registered the facilities or exemptions which they may have undertaken to accord to students who have passed the Matriculation Exami-nation of the University of London. All inquiries as to the conditions under which such facilities or exemptions are given must be directed not to the University of London nor to the Director of Education, Caylon, but to the bodies from whom such privileges are sought.

Students registered under Statute 116 receive an official notification that they have been exempted from the Matriculation Examination and admitted as matriculated students of the University, no certificate or diploma is sent, nor is there any mention of the examination in virtue of which the exemption has been granted.

No person can be registered as a matriculated student of the University until after the last day upon which the Matriculation Examination immediately following the completion of his sixteenth year can commence, but students who attain the age of sixteen years between June 14 and July 31 will be registrable as from the June Matriculation Examination of the year in which they attain that age.

The standing of students registered under Statute 116 shall date, for the purposes of External Examinations, from the Matriculation Examination immediately preceding the date of registration. To secure that a registration under Statute 116 shall date from any Matriculation Examination, such registration must be completed before the commencement of the next Matri-culation Examination as defined above oulation Examination, as defined above.

Persons who register as tended above. Persons who register as from the January Matriculation Examination in any year, completing their registration at any time between January 14 and May 1 in the same year, will (as reg_rds any faculty other than Medicine or Veterinary Science) be admissible to the Intermediate Examination of the year in which they so register and to the Final Degree E amination of the year next but one ensuing. Thus, a registration completed between January 14 and May 1 of the year (1900 + x) admits, at the e rliest, to the Degree Examination of any faculty other than Medicine or Veterinary Science of the year (1900 + x + 2) than Medicine or Veterinary Science of the year (1900 + x + 2).

Persons who register as from the June or September Matri-culation Examination—i.e., at any time between June 14 and the end of December in the same year—will not be admissible to the Intermediate Examination of the year in which they so register nor to the Final Degree Examination till the third year next ensuing. Thus, a registration completed between June 15 and December 31 of the year (1900 + x) admits, at the earliest, to the Degree Examination of any faculty other than Medicine or Veterinary Science of the year (1900 + x + 3).

Nevertheless Oxford and Cambridge Graduates in First of Second Class Honours can be admitted to their Degree Examination in any Faculty other than Medicine or Veteria nary Science after two years from any September Matrie culation Examination provided that their registration be completed before January 14 of the year succeeding such September Matriculation Examination; and further provided that in each case the interval specified by the Regulations between the Intermediate and Final Examina-tion is observed. Oxford or Cambridge Graduates in First or Second Class Honours who register as from the September Matriculation Examination of the year (1900 + x) are admissible to the Degree Examination of any Faculty other than Medicine or Veterinary Science in the year (1900 + x)+ 2). Such registration must be completed before January 14 of the year (1900 + x + 1).

No further exemptions from the examinations of this University are granted to persons registering under Statute 116, save those provided for in the current Regulations.

Persons presenting any of the approved certificates with a view to registration under Statute 116 are informed that depar-ture from the conditions laid down can under no circumstances be allowed. The subjects in which the applicant has attained the necessary standard must be specifically those set forth in the Regulations relating to the several certificates so approved, and further, the subjects must all have been taken on one and the same accession same occasion

It should be carefully observed that the certificates herein described are registrable under present Regulations and until further notice; but the Senate reserves the right to withdraw any certificate from the list of those upon the basis whereof exemption can be claimed, or to alter the terms upon which it is recognized. Students proposing to claim exemption in virtue of such certificates are therefore advised to register without undue delay after obtaining them.

There are no *partial* exemptions from the Matriculation Examination. If the qualifications of which a candidate can produce evidence are not sufficient to exempt him altogether, the examination for matriculation must be taken in its entirety, according to the Regulations.

Applications for registration must be accompanied by Applications for registration must be accompanied by a registration fee of three guineas, together with official certifi-cation of qualification in accordance with the conditions set forth below. Bank Draft or Money Orders must be made payable to the "University of London" and crossed "London County Westminstor and Parr's Bank, Brompton Square, S.W.; University of London Account." The fee and evidence must be forwarded together by registered nost and addressed to "Tha forwarded togethor by registered post and evidences nu External Registrar, University of London, S.W. 7." Shoul The Should the certificate be found insufficient for registration purposes the fee will be at once returned, as will the certificate in any case. There is no special form for these applications. Unless the certificate shows the names in full and that the

applicant is at least sixteen years of age, evidence of age must be produced.

No candidate will be admitted to any examination, nor registered as an Internal Student in this University who has not furnished to the University his full name in accordance with the above paragraph.

Such registered student will then come under the Regulations Such registered student will then come under the regulations of the University with respect to every examination above the matriculation, all of which he will proceed to take in accordance with the said Regulations, which may be obtained post free on application to the University, his standing in the University dating, for the purposes of External Examinations, from tho Matriculation Examination immediately preceding the date of his registration. No student registered under Statute 116 will be premitted to entay for the Intermediate Examination in Arts be permitted to enter for the Intermediate Examination in Arts for Internal students, with Latin as one of his subjects at that examination, unless he has, not later than the January preceding the Intermediate Examination in question, either passed with Latin an examination accepted by the University as exempting from the Matriculation Examination, or satisfied the Examiners in Latin at an examination accepted by the University as exempting from the Matriculation Examination subsequently to having passed such examination as a whole, or satisfied the Examiners in Latin at a Matriculation Examination or at any examination conducted by the University in lieu thereof.

No foreign certificates are recognized as giving exemption from the Matriculation Examination.

The following cortificates of qualifications obtained in Great Britain or Ireland are severally recognized under Statute 116 as riving exemption from the Matriculation Examination of the University of London :-

Minutes of Proceedings of a General Meeting of the Municipal Council of Colombo held in the Town Hall on Wednesday, December 6, 1922, at 3 p.m.

The Council met this day at 3 P.M., pursuant to notice, dated November 29, 1922.

Fernando ; Mr. T. H. Tatham ; Mr. J. S. Collett ; Mr. G. Adamjee Lukmanjee ; Mr. W. E. V. de Rooy ; Mr. A. F. G. Walker ; Mr. G. W. Dodds ; and Mr. W. Geddes. 1. The Minutes of the General Meeting of November 1, 1922, having been previously printed and copies thereof having here each Meeting of Council From taking and Mr.

having been sent to each Member of Council, were taken as read.

Resolved that the Minutes of the General Meeting of November 1, 1922, be confirmed. 2. Pursuant to notice, Dr. E. V. Ratnam asked the Chairman, the following questions : (1) Whether he is aware that there is an alarming increase in the number of accidents from mechanically-propelled vehicles in the streets of Colombo ? (2) If he is, what action he has taken with a view to reduce the danger to life and property from this source ? (3) Whether he has ascertained why the regulations as to speed limit are not being strictly enforced? (4) Why constables are not posted for duty at all hours of the day and up to a reasonable length of time of the night at all busy and important junctions within the City ? The Chairman replied as follows :--

I am not aware that there is an alarming increase. The Police inform me that there is a decrease this year in street nts. In 1920 there were 62 serious accidents ; in 1921 there were 26 serious accidents out of a total of 306 ; in 1922 accidents. to the end of the third quarter, there were 12 serious accidents out of a total of 203.

Since 1920 I personally have taken the following steps :-

I asked the Police to try to confine pedestrians to the sides of the streets or on pavements where they exist. Twenty-four notices have been put up warning pedestrians to the like effect. The Police were also requested to keep carts to the sides of the streets and to deal with furious driving of motors. Illuminated signs inculating slow-driving have been sides of the streets and to deal with furious driving of motors. Illuminated signs inculating slow-driving have been suspended in the very narrow parts of the Galle road. I suggested instruction in schools as to observance of the rules of the road, and as to rushing across roads without looking to see if any vehicle were approaching. I found that the Police had already taken up that matter with the Director of Education, and the required instruction has keen given. The Police have also recently established a driver's signal code.

Recently several dangerous junctions have had Automobile Club warning signals erected at places approved by the Municipality. I suggested the issue of instructions to motor drivers; this has been adopted by the Police and also instruction to examiners of drivers. About five miles of pavements have been re-constructed or newly made in the last two years.

In the last two years the following dangerous corners have been removed :-

Serpentine road and Thurston road, Serpentine road and Laurie's road, Skinner's road and Kotahena road, Cotta road and Kanatta road, Turret road and Colpetty. The acquisition of land at dangerous corners is almost completed at Laurie's road and Galle road, Dematagoda road and Maradana, Thurstan road and Bagatelle road.

The following roads, inter alia, have been widened or newly made recently :-

Prince of Wales Avenue, Darley road, one end of Turret road, part of Thursten road. The most dangerous road in Colombo is the Colpetty road. The Council recently voted Rs. 250,000, with Rs. 150,000 to follow, to widen this road. Everything was ready for acquisition, when the Finance Committee of the Legislative Council wished the Municipality to bear part of the cost of widening this trunk road. The matter is still under consideration.

To prevent the construction of unduly narrow roads, street lines have been laid down liberally of recent years, and a lay out for Colombo is being worked out on paper and on the ground as funds permit. In co-operation with the Police, by-law powers are being used to keep down hedges at corners.

The Police, in my opinion, are dealing properly with excess of speed limit. In 1920 there were 61 prosecutions; in 1921, 42; and in 1922, to the end of the third quarter, there were 31.

The Inspector-General of Police informs me that constables are posted at all hours of the day and up to certain hours at night at important junctions, as far as men are available.

Generally, in my opinion, the Police efforts are up to the best standard of Eastern cities. They co-operate with

Municipal efforts in every way. The essential needs in my opinion are :---(a) Widening of streets; (b) Rounding of corners; (c) Making of footpaths.

All three are merely financial problems. The extraordinary stringency in Municipal finance from the earliest days has led to periodical shelving of comprehensive street improvement schemes. The result is that it would now cost many millions of rupe's to widen even the main arteries of traffic. 3. The Chairman stated that Dr. W. P. Rodrigo had given notice of the following questions, as the questions had

been received late, the Chairman inquired whether the leave of Council would be given to their being put. The leave was granted.

In the absence of Dr. W. P. Rodrigo, the questions in his name were put by the Hon. Mr. H. L. De Mel, and the Chair man replied to each :--(a) What is the total cost of the Council of the lych gate at the general cemetery ? (b) Is that generally known as the main entrance to the content of the council of the spen gate at the general content, i (c) is since the generally known as the main entrance to the cemetery, and is it set apart for the sole use of any particular religious denomination, and by whom was it so set apart ? (c) If not, who is responsible for the attempt to close the gate against the funeral procession of the late Ven. the High Priest of the Maligakande Temple ? (d) How many private roads have been done up by this Council during the last three years; to whom do these roads belong, and at whose request were they done up ? (e) What was the total cost to the Council of such work for the years 1920-1921 and 1922, respectively, and what were the amounts paid into the Municipal Fund on account of those works; under what headings are such payments shown in the Municipal books ? (/) If such work has been done by the Council's officers, will the Chairman be good enough to say whether he considers it regular for the Council to do such work; upon what basis they are paid for, and whether the Chairman is prevared to undertake the making up of and or maintaining private roads by Municipal service in the future and at what rates ? (g) If such work has been done by the Council in the past and the Chairman considers it irregular for the Council to do such work, will the Chairman be good enough to tell the Council what action he is going to take against the officers who are responsible for this irregularity ?

The Chairman replied as follows :— 🔅

There are two lych gates at the general cemetery. I do not know how much the gate opening on Buller's road cost. The Kanatta road lych gate cost Rs. 11,840.13.

The Kanatta road entrance is generally regarded as the main entrance. It is not set apart for any particular denomination. The Roman Catholics and Buddhists generally use the Buller's road gate, as that entrance is nearest to their burial grounds and as entrance by it is convenient for them, and obviates the necessity of taking funerals throughout the length of the cemetery, which has led to injury of graves and flowers on occasions when large crowds assemble

The cometery-keeper, with the Chairman's approval, has always tried to divert very large Buddhist funerals to the Buller's road gate. In this case I was informed beforehand that it was desired to take the funeral through the Kanatta road gate, and I directed that it be left open. At the funeral both gates were open and both were used. At the same time I cancelled the standing order, and directed that in future a funeral be allowed to enter by either gate, according to the wish of those concerned.

During the last three years the following private roads or footpaths have been made up by the Municipality. Τ exclude road side entrance culverts which are done every day when and as required :---1920-21, nil; 1922, Queen street. While constructing new pavements in Queen street it was necessary to re-grade and re-make the private court yards

alongside. This was pointed out to the owners who, with proper public spirit, agreed to bear the cost, Rs. 347.90. The work was done with my approval. On the occasion of the visit of His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, the Turf Club requested the Municipality

to make an entrance roadway from Serpentine road and to widen Serpentine road near the main entrance to the Grand Stand, so as to make a new entrance for His Royal Highness. The cost of the work, Rs. 1,646 81, was borne by the Turf Club. Ten per cent. in the above cases was credited to the Municipal Fund for departmental charges, plant, &c, under the Head, Miscellaneous Sundries. It has been customary and I consider it regular and highly desirable that the Council's the Head, Miscellaneous Sundries. It has been customary and I consider it regular and highly desirable that the Council's officers should do work of this kind that can be so easily done by the Municipal officers with their knowledge of road-making and as they possess the plant required, both of which private persons generally lack. The actual cost is charged to the parties concerned, together with the ten per cent. referred to above. Each case would be considered by me on its merits. Where any officer succeeds in inducing private parties to pay for the making up of the neglected private streets in Colombo, I should feel strongly inclined, in the public interest, to allow the Municipal Engineers to carry out the work if they could spare the time and plant, or to hire the plant required as has often been done. The trouble at present is that owners of spare the time and plant, or to five the plant required as has often been done. The trouble at present is that owners of private streets generally do not make up these streets, or offer to pay the Municipality to make them up. I would consider that any officer who changed their attitude in this respect would be deserving of commendation. The Hon. Mr. H. L. De Mel moved that the Council do go into Committee to consider items Nos. 4 to 11 (inclusive).
Dr. E. V. Ratnam seconded—Carried.

Mr. C. H. Z. Fernando seconded. Mr. E. W. Jayewardene supported the motion. Mr. T. H. Tatham opposed the motion. Mr. W. E. V. de Rooy and Mr. W. Geddes spoke to the motion. The Chairman stated that it was for the Council to decide whether this report should go forward as the report of the Special Committee, or whether it should go as the considered report of the whole Council. Should the Hon. Mr. De Mel's motion be carried, he (the Chairman) would, in forwarding the report, make it clear in his covering letter that it was the report of the Special Committee consisting of the Chairman and the elected members of the Council. The Hon. Mr. H. L.

The motion was put to the meeting and carried, the Chairman untertaking, in reply to a question from Mr. Tatham, to explain the procedure which had neen adopted that day.

(12) To elect a Member in place of Dr. G. Thornton for the Standing Committee on Sanitation and Markets. It was resolved that the vacancy be not filled, as the election of Members for the Standing Committees takes place at the General Meeting of Council early in the new year. ANNEXURE A.

Report of the Special Committe with Regard to the Reform of the Constitution of the Colombo Municipality.

Introductory.

By a resolution of the Council, dated July 5, 1921, we were appointed to consider the subject of the reform of the constitution of Municipalities. Since then we have held eight meetings and have considered various schemes, all of which were attempts to reach a compromise between the principles of complete democratic control, through elected members, and the present system by which half the members are nominated by His Excellency the Governor, one of the nominated members being Chairman of the Council and Head of the Executive.

General Policy.

2. Our final considered opinion is that any system by which a nominated Chairman and Head of the Executive would be combined with, say, a two-thirds elected majority in Council, would not satisfy the political demand made for popular control, and would for that and other reasons prove to be unworkable in practice.

3. We, therefore, consider that, if a more democratic constitution than the present one is to be established, it should be a constitution in which full power, subject to ultimate control by the Central Government, should be given to the Council, together with full responsibility.

We consider that such a scheme will completely satisfy those who desire democratic local self-government, and 4. that it will put to the test the contentious question as to whether such a form of Municipal Government will be a practical. success in Colombo.

The Electorate.

5. We propose that the voters' franchise be broadened. The property qualification required to entitle a citizen to vote, in our opinion, should be as at present occupation of a building as a monthly rental of not less than Rs. 15. Since this qualification was imposed, the purchasing power of the rupee has greatly depreciated, and the qualification, therefore, s lower now than it was at the time it was first established in 1887.

But we consider that the boarder's qualification of not less than Rs. 100 a month for board and lodging is too The spread of education amongst clerks, shop assistants, artisans, &c., has rendered large number of citizens as fit high. to exercise the Municipal franchise as many of those who have a vote under the present system, even though the former pay less than Rs. 100 per month for board and lodging. We, therefore, would reduce the boarder's qualification to one of not less than Rs. 30 per month.

We are also of opinion that women should have the same rights to vote as are allowed to men, because their 7. interests are vitally concerned in Municipal administration, because they also own property and because their primary education, at least in Colombo, is practically as good as that given to men, and as the disqualification on the ground of sex has now been generally discarded. We are aware that the customs of some communities would deter their women from voting; but no one is compelled to vote. We recommend that women be allowed to vote in person, or, as at present, through their husbands or eldest sons, or through an accredited agent.

The Councillors.

8. Here again, we realize that the property qualifications now in force are, by reason of the depreciation of the rupee's purchasing power, much more democratic than they were when first established in 1865, and we do not propose to alter them. We do not think it likely that many cases will occur where persons fit for the responsibilities of membership of the Council are not in possession of immovable property worth at least Rs. 5,000, or do not occupy a house of a rental of Rs. 500 annually.

9. For this reason, too, we do not consider it necessary to introduce special qualifications, irrespective of pecuniary status, to meet the case of persons with special literary, artistic, technical, or other qualifications. Furthermore, when we tried to devise a list of degrees, diplomas, &c., which might be a qualification for Councillorship, we found the task an invidious one. We are of opinion that women should be eligible for election as Councillors on the same terms as apply to men.

10. We recommend that all the Councillors should be elected. We suggest that the existing ten Wards be increased to sixteen by sub-division of the Kotahena, Maradana, Kollupitiya, and Wellawatta Wards, as shown in the annexed map. The sub-division of Wards suggested will make the electoral districts more equal with reference to area and population than is now the case, while it will in no way complicate the comparison of past and future statistics, as would be the case if portions of existing Wards were amalgamated.

11. We propose that there should be one territorially elected member for each Ward and eight elected by public bodies, representing important interests, that is twenty-four in all. We suggest that four of these public bodies should be the Port Commission, the Chamber of Commerce, the Low-country Products Association, and the Educational Association. We suggest that the remaining four public bodies should be selected from time to time by His Excellency the Governor.

President,

We recommend that the Head of the Council should be called the President, and that he should be elected by 12. the Councillors from amongst themselves.

13. We recommend that full executive authority should be vested in the Council, which should have power to delegate its executive authority to an officer who would be Head of the Executive and not a member of the Council. This officer should be appointed by the Council, and the rest of the staff should be subordinate to him.

Government Control.

The Colombo Municipality is a local Government institution, and, therefore, must be subject to the ultimate 14. control of the Central Government. Suggestions to set up an imperium in imperio are not worth serious consideration.

The Municipal Administration of Colombo is a matter of general concern to the Central Government. Further, 15. the Colombo Municipality owes the Ceylon Government a sum of over Rs. 15,000,000, and that Government, therefore, has a special interest in Colombo Municipal finances. Further, the Central Government's credit is an invaluable asset to the Municipal Council when loans have to be raised, as that Government can secure, through the Crown Agents for the Colonies, if not in law, at least in practice, the unrivalled credit of the British Government for the Colombo Municipality. 16. For these reasons, *inter alia*, we consider that the Ceylon Government should retain in abeyance powers of

interforence similar to those given in Ordinance No. 6 of 1910.

17. Finally, we consider that Colombo has now become sufficiently large to be administered by a City Corporation. It covers nearly 9,000 acres and may be extended in future; its normal population approaches 300,000; it is one of the greatest ports in the world and is the capital of Ceylon. In fact, it is the only really large town in Ceylon; and it would be beneficial from an administrative point of view if its instrument of Government were a special Ordinance relating to Colombo only.

18. For a similar reason we have confined our suggestions to Colombo, though the terms of reference were wider. We do not consider that the Kandy and Galle Municipalities should necessarily have in future the same constitution as Colombo, and, in any case, we think it inadvisable to take upon ourselves the responsibility of making suggestions as regards these two bodies,

DISSENT.

We dissent from the opinion expressed that a nominated Chairman and Head of the Executive combined with, say, a two-thirds elected majority in Council would prove to be unworkable in practice.

We are not convinced that a wholly elected Council, constituted on the lines recommended in this report, will best serve the interests of the . ity of Colombo or the rate-payers generally.

We suggest that the seats reserved for four public bodies to be selected from time to time by His Excellency the Governor, be filled at the discretion of His Excellency, who would select members to serve on Council on behalf of important interests, not already represented.

DISSENT.

We are sorry we have to dissent from the views of the Committee as regards the extension of the franchise to women and their eligibility for election as Councillors. (Vide paras 7 and 9 of the report.)

2. We are aware that after several centuries of Constitutional Government by men and a generation of fighting, women of the West have secured to themselves these privileges, but however much sheer circumstances have necessitated this change in the West, we maintain that such extension of the franchise to women is not warranted by the circumstances at present obtainable in Ceylon.

We are also aware of the progress women have made in education, &c., in Ceylon. But when dealing with these political rights, we must remember that there are local peculiarities to be considered and that it will not do for us to follow the West blindly.

4. The argument underlying the extension of political rights to women has, in our opinion, been this. If the large majority of women earn their own living and have to compete with men in various walks of life, why should man alone have the right to manage affairs of State ? Under these circumstances it must be conceded that it is an unfair and invidious distinction to keep women from having a voice in the management of matters of common interest.

Can this argument be satisfactorily applied to Ceylon ? Do women have to compete with men in the various `5. spheres of life to earn a living ? No, is the emphatic answer. Where then is the necessity, we ask, of giving women this privilege ?

6. In the West, this very circumstance of having to earn their own living has taught women to be independent of men in various other ways also. They think independently, they act independently and they judge independently of men. Can this be said of Ceylon ? What percentage of women of all races put together think, act, or judge independently of their male relations in Ceylon ? We answer not five per cent. How many of those who recommend this innovation in Ceylon would allow their wives, or sisters, or daughters to join the opposite party to theirs in a political campaign ? Fow many of them would forgive one of these latter for such an unwarranted lack of loyalty ? We are sorry to think not one. How can then the extension of the franchise to women be justified, except to multiply a man's vote by the number of women relations he has who possess voting qualifications.

7. Thirdly, in the West, there is not perhaps one in a ten thousand women who is kept away from a polling booth by reason of her religion or national customs, whereas in Ceylon, taking all eligible women to account, 90 per cent. would not, in our opinion, go to the poll on account of these disabilities. How then can the extension of the franchise to women be justified under these prevailing circumstances, except to penalize certain communities for their religions and "national backwardness ?

8. We beg to point out here the very great loss one community in particular stands to suffer by this policy of extending the franchise to women. Among the Muhamm dan community a very considerable number of qualifying properties are owned by women whose husbands have the right to vote at present. Under the present proposal this right would be confined to women, who from religious scruples cannot go out to vote. Thus it is obvious that a very large number of qualifying properties owned by Muhammadan women would be thrown out and, in fact, that community would be disenfranchised to a very large extent, unless they are prepared to secure the vote by the appointment, as at present, of an attorney at not inconsiderable expense.

9. Besides these political reasons, there are other social and sentimental grounds which induce us to believe that the East does not yet need the extension of the franchise to women.

10. Indeed, we do not congratulate the West over the circumstances which have forced this state of affairs and we fear that those same circumstances are tending to breed in the West, nations with unsexed women conspicuously lacking in the charm peculiar to the female sex. The results of such evolution are so obvious to all sensible men that we need not describe them here.

11. We further fear that the introduction of this privilege to Ceylon, amongst races so radically different from the West in their religions, social habits and customs, is apt to too seriously disturb the peace and purity of Oriental homes and therefore, we think that the disadvantages of such a change so far outweigh the advantages (and we deny there are any advantages at all) that it would not be just, no fair, nor to the best interests of the majority do so.

12. We further point out that although by the recommendation contained in the last sentence of clause 7 of this report (which by the way is an acknowledgment of weakness) an attempt has been made to undo, to a certain extent, the mischief contemplated in the rest of the clause, that recommendation is fatal to the principle of the secret ballot, and any suggestion that necessitates such a make-shift is best omitted altogether.

DISSENT.

While agreeing to the principle that full democratic Municipal Government should be granted to the people of the city of Colombo to look after their affairs, we dissent from the recommendations, paragraphs 12 and 13 of the report, dated November 2, 1922, of the Committee appointed with regard to the reform of the constitution of the Colombo Municipality, for the following reasons :-

The said recommendation is not in conformity with the English system of Municipal Government.

1. The said recommendation is not in conformity with the English system of Municipal Government. The principle of an elected Chairman and a nominated Commissioner with delegated powers has not been followed in all the corporations of the big ities of India.

2. A constitution of two-thirds elected and one-third nominated members, with a nominated Chairman, without executive powers and responsibility was tried in Ceylon from 1865–1887. and proved a failure. It might be urged that the advancement in education, &c., among the different communities since 1887 warrants the recommendations made, but in our opinion, in spite of the progress made by the people, it is not safe to introduce far-reaching changes in the constitution all at once.

A Council with a two-thirds majority of elected members will satisfy the present needs.

3. If the Council delegates its executive powers to an officer, the latter will find it difficult to exercise such powers as he is not the President of the Council. He will in effect be simply an advisor to the elected Chairman. The elected The elected Chairman, on the other hand, cannot himself take or feel the full responsibility of his position as he has no executive power. Thus he will be a mere figurehead without responsibility. The only power he will have is the right to use his casting vote, and to regulate the proceedings at the meetings of the Council.

4. A nominated Commissioner or Head of the Executive, who is not the President of the Council, but who has executive authority delegated to him by the Council, cannot act with responsibility, because he takes no part in the deliberations of the Council.

5. It is conclusively proved that a full-time Administrator, with great experience, is essential as the Head of the Executive of the Municipal Council of Colombo, and, in our opinion, the work of the Council could not be carried out efficiently if he is not at the same time a member of the Council, because the person who is thoroughly conversant with the work is deprived of deliberative powers, and the other person, who is not conversant with the work and who is deprived of all executive powers, is endowed with deliberative powers.

6. There may be occasions when the elected Chairman and the Head of the Executive disagree. How will this contingency be met, the latter having no opportunity of vindicating his opinion in Council ?

We are, therefore, of opinion that it is preferable to retain the services of a First Class Civil Servant as President of Council, and that he should, as at present, have full executive authority.

A full-time Administrator of experience would thus be assured, and he would command the confidence of the ratepayers of the various communities in the city of the Council and of the staff.

8. In this connection we may mention that the right of His Excellency the Governor to nominate members to represent communal interests should not be interfered with, as it is evident that in the recent elections, members for the different Urban and District Councils, the minorities have been left unrepresented.

ANNEXURE B.

Architectural Competition.

Before the business of the Works and Finance Committees was commenced, the Chairman announced to the Committees that the designs sent in for the above competition had been opened on Monday, the 13th instant, in the presence of himself, the Assessor, Mr. Woodeson, Mr. Harold Creasy, Member of the Works Committee, Mr. N. M. Ingram, Works Engineer, and the Secretary, Mr. E. H. Joseph. The Works Committee had been invited to be present at the opening of the designs.

The designs were all numbered as opened, and the estimates and reports were carefully scrutinized by the Chairman, Mr. Creasy, and the Secretary, with a view to ascertaining whether there was anything to identify the competitors. This scrutiny resulted in the discovery that the competitors whose designs were numbered, respectively, Nos. 12, 20, and 21 were disqualified for disclosing their names, that No. 19 was disqualified for using a motto, and that No. 26 was disqualified by reason of being received too late, besides which the last-named competitor was one from Europe, and the competition was only confined to competitors in the East and Far East.

The reports and estimates of those not disqualified were taken charge of by the Assessor; who, after most careful consideration, extending over a week of all the plans and designs received, had made the awards of the first three prizes to the competitors whose designs were numbered, respectively, 4, 1, and 2. The sealed envelopes containing the names of the candidates, which had been kept by the Chairman under lock and key, in the seal almirah, were taken out, and the three bearing the numbers 4, 1, and 2 were handed to the Assessor, who opened them in the order given, and announced that the winners were :-

First Prize. --Rs. 5,000. Mr. S. J. Edwards, M.A., A.R.I.B.A., P.A.S.I., of the firm of Messrs, Ralph Booty & Co. 23 and 24, Winchester House, Collyer Quay, Singapore. Second Prize.—Rs. 3,500. Mr. W. H. Bourne, F. R. I. B. A., The Club, Allahabad, India.

Mr. Ram Rup Sharma, with whom was associated the Consulting Architect to the Third Prize.-Rs. 2,000. Government of U. P., Allahabad, whose name was undecipherable.

The Committees decided that the competitors who had been disqualified should be informed of the grounds for their disgualification.

Recommended that the Council should at its next meeting appoint a Building Committee of three members, one at least of whom should have engineering experience, to form a Building Committee in connection with the building of the New Town Hall.

The Chairman stated that he would write to the successful Architect inquiring when he will be able to come to Colombo to make the necessary arrangements for the work of building the New Town Hall.

Resolved that the names of the unsuccessful competitors should not be published.

A draft Budget containing :---(a) An estimate of the available Municipal income ; (b) details of proposed expendi-ture, as printed and published in the *Government Gazette* and circulated among the Members and submitted to Council on December 6, 1922, according to the provisions of section 97 of Ordinance No. 6 of 1910, was laid before the Council in Committee






