WHEREAS by section 12 of "The Maintenance Orders (Facilities for Enforcement) Ordinance, No. 15 of 1921," as inserted by "The Maintenance Orders (Facilities for Enforcement) (Amendment) Ordinance, No. 11 of 1922," it is enacted that where the Governor is satisfied that reciprocal provisions have been made by the Legislature of any British Possession or any territory under His Majesty's protection, for the enforcement within such possession or territory, of maintenance orders made by courts in Ceylon, the Governor may by Proclamation published in the Government Gazette extend that Ordinance to maintenance orders made by courts within such possession or territory, and that thereupon the Ordinance shall apply to such maintenance orders as if they had been made in England or Ireland:

And whereas we are satisfied that reciprocal provisions as aforesaid have been made by the Legislature of the British Possession appearing in the schedule hereto, for the enforcement within the said possession of maintenance orders made by courts in Ceylon:

Now know Ye that We, the Governor of Ceylon, in exercise of the power in Us vested as aforesaid, do hereby extend "The Maintenance Orders (Facilities for Enforcement) Ordinance, No. 15 of 1921," to maintenance orders made by courts within the said possession.

W ITH reference to the Notification published in the Gazette of October 6, 1922, regarding the Order entitled the Destructive Insects and Pests Order of 1922, issued by the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries of the Imperial Government, it is hereby notified that the Ministry of Agriculture for Northern Ireland has issued the following Orders dated July 25, 1922:—

The Northern Ireland Orders have effect from September 1, 1922, but reasonable time will be allowed in their administration to admit of exporters abroad becoming acquainted with the requirements.

"THE IRRIGATION ORDINANCE, No. 45 of 1917."

IIS Excellency the Governor in Executive Council has, under section 45 of Ordinance No. 45 of 1917, sanctioned the following scheme which the proprietors of the irrigation area under the Pattipola-aru Irrigation Scheme have adopted by resolution under sections 4 and 39 of the said Ordinance.

SCHEME.

That an irrigation rate shall be imposed on all lands at present irrigable by the Pattipola-aru irrigation works in the Eastern Province, variable by His Excellency the Governor according as the circumstances of the paddy cultivation industry may warrant and in accordance with the following arrangement:—

- (1) From the date of the meeting until the end of the year 1931, the rate leviable shall be as follows:—
 - (a) In respect of A lands, 50 cents per acre per annum.

(b) In respect of B lands, Re. 1 per acre per annum.

(2) Thereafter the irrigation rate per acre per annum shall never be increased by Government above a limit which multiplied by the irrigable acreage will bring in annually 5 per cent, on the capital cost and in addition pay the maintenance costs of the irrigation works.

(3) The proprietors of B lands shall, however, pay at the rate of 50 cents per acre more than the proprietors of the A lands from and including the years 1932 to 1936, and after that date the proprietors of the B lands shall pay the same irrigation rate as the proprietors of the A lands.

(4) For the purpose of ascertaining the limit to which the irrigation rate might be raised as aforesaid, the total capital expended on the scheme shall be taken as at September 30, 1920, to have amounted to Rs. 718,000, and to this amount there shall be added every year the cost of such further works of improvement as are carried out for the benefit of the irrigation works and irrigable lands.

(5) The proprietors shall never be called upon to repay to Government the actual balance of the capital cost. The limit of 5 per cent. interest upon this, plus the cost of maintenance being fixed, entirely in their own interests, as the limit above which the irrigation rate cannot be raised.

(6) It should be noted that the above scheme does not affect the special concession granted by Government to remit irrigation rates up to the end of 1924 on all land that is cultivated.

VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended March 17, 1923.

Births.—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 132 (2 Europeans, 10 Burghers, 82 Sinhalese, 20 Tamils, 12 Moors, 3 Malays, and 3 Others). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on January 1, 1923, viz., 249,046) was 27.6, as against 31.4 in the preceding week, 25.8 in the corresponding week of last year, and 27.9 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 170 (1 European, 6 Burghers, 88 Sinhalese, 28 Tamils, 29 Moors, 11 Malays, and 7 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 35 6, as against 33 5 in the previous week, 35 4 in the corresponding week of last year, and 31 2 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 170 total deaths, 42 were of infants under one year of age, as against 38 in the preceding week, 38 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 33 the average for last year.

Stillbirths.—The number of still births registered during the week was 11.

Principal Causes of Death.—1. (a) Twenty-three deaths from Pneumonia were registered, 12 in Maradana hospitals (including 5 deaths of non-residents), 2 each in Kotahena North, Kotahena South, New Bazaar, and Slave Island, and 1 each in St. Paul's, Kollupitiya, and Wellawatta South, as against 21 in the previous week and 22 the weekly average for last year.

- (b) Seven deaths from *Influenza* were registered, 3 in Slave Island, 2 in Maradana North, and 1 each in Kotahena North and New Bazaar, as against 9 in the previous week and 6 the weekly average for last year.
- (c) Six deaths from *Bronchitis* were registered, 2 in Maradana East, and 1 each in St. Paul's, New Bazaar, Maradana North, and Slave Island, as against 6 in the previous week and 4 the weekly average for last year.
- 2. Sixteen deaths from *Phthisis* were registered, 7 in Maradana hospitals (including 4 deaths of non-residents), 2 each in St. Paul's and New Bazaar, and 1 each in San Sebastian, Maradana East, Maradana South, Slave Island, and Kollupitiya, as against 21 in the previous week and 12 the weekly average for last year.

Three deaths of residents of Colombo town occurred at the Ragama hospital from Phthisis during the week.

- 3. Three deaths from *Plague* were registered, 2 in Wellawatta North and 1 in St. Paul's, as against 6 in the previous week and 2 the weekly average for last year.
- 4. Three deaths from Enteric Fever were registered, I each in New Bazaar, Maradana hospital, and Slave Island, as against 4 in the previous week and 4 the weekly average for last year.
- 5. Seventeen deaths were registered from Infantile Convulsions, 13 from Debility, 8 from Enteritis, 5 from Dysentery, 2 from Diarrhæa, 1 each from Worms, Measles, and Puerperal Septicæmia, and 64 from Other Causes.

6. Forty-eight cases of Chickenpox, 44 of Measles, 6 of Enteric Fever, and 1 of Plague were reported during the week, as against 44, 40, 11, and 4, respectively, of the preceding week.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 81·3°, against 80·6° in the preceding week and 81·3° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29·911 in., against 29·922 in. in the preceding week and 29·920 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 1·45 in., against 0·41 in. in the preceding week and 0·70 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.

MUNICIPLAITY OF COLOMBO.

Minutes of Proceedings of a General Meeting of the Municipal Council of Colombo held in the Town Hall on Wednesday, February 7, 1923, at 3 p.m.

The Council met this day at 3 P.M., pursuant to notice dated January 31, 1923.

Present:—Mr. T. Reid, C.C.S., Chairman; Mr. C. P. Dias; the Hon. Mr. N. H. M. Abdul Cader, M.L.C.; the Hon. Mr. H. L. De Mel, C.B.E., M.L.C.; Dr. E. V. Ratnam; Dr. W. P. Rodrigo; the Hon. Dr. G. J. Rutherford, M.L.C.; Mr. W. C. S. Ingles; Mr. Harold Creasy; Mr. W. Philps; Mr. A. E. de Silva; Mr. E. W. Jayewardene; Mr. C. H. Z. Fernando; Mr. T. H. Tatham; Mr. J. S. Collett; Mr. G. Adamjee Lukmanjee; Mr. W. E. V. de Rooy; and Mr. G. W. Dodds.

The Minutes of the General Meeting of January 17, 1923, having been previously printed and copies thereof having been sent to each Member of Council, were taken as read.

Resolved that the Minutes of the General Meeting of January 17, 1923, be confirmed.

The following questions stood against the name of Dr. W. P. Rodrigo:-

- With the permission of Council, Dr. W. P. Rodrigo to ask the Chairman:—(a) What cars other than the Chairman's and the Waterworks Engineer's are repaired in the Council's Workshop? (b) how many such cars have been repaired for the years 1920, 1921, and 1922, respectively? (c) to whom do they belong? (d) what was the nature of the repairs and what amounts have been paid to the Municipal fund by the owners for such repairs? (e) how does such amounts paid compare with charges made by outside firms for similar work? (f) as the Council's Officers are paid very substantial travelling allowances, does the Chairman consider it fair to compete with private firms in this manner?
- What arrangements have been made for the transport of goods, e.g., cement, &c., from Waga station to Labugama? Were tenders advertised for such work and has any contract been given? If so, who is the contractor? And what are the rates? Has any security been taken from such contractor? Has the Council had to pay any charges to the Railway Department for non-removal of goods within the prescribed time? If so, how much?

Dr. W. P. Rodrigo, said that he had no objection to postponing the questions for the next meeting. Owing to

delay in the post, sufficient notice of them had not been given.

Pursuant to notice, Dr. W. P. Rodrigo moved that a Committee consisting of the Elected Members of this Council be appointed to consider and report to Council what steps should be taken by the Council with regard to the petition sent by the Members of the Higher Staff of this Council to the Hon. the Colonial Secretary.—Dr. E. V. Ratnam seconded.

A lengthy discussion ensued in which Mr. E. W. Jayewardene and Mr. C. H. Z. Fernando spoke in favour of the motion, while Mr. W. E. V. de Rooy, Mr. T. H. Tatham, Mr. C.-P. Dias, and the Chairman spoke against the motion.

Substitute the following for the existing Sub-sections and provisos:—

2. (i.) Any person who shall have served for one hundred and twenty months or less than one hundred and twentyone months may receive an annuity equal to 180/720ths of the salary as defined hereinafter of the permanent office or offices
held by such person at the time of retirement.

(ii.) Any person who shall have served for hundred and twenty-one or less than one hundred and twenty-two months

may receive an annuity equal to 181/720ths of such salary.

(iii.) In like manner, an addition may be granted of 1/720ths for each additional month of service until the completion of four hundred and twenty months of service, when the maximum pension of 480/720ths of the salary may be granted. These fractions include in each case a climate bonus of 60/720ths, representing five years' service, granted for service

in the tropics:-

(iv.) (a) Any person retiring on account of illness or age after completing 120 months' gross service, but before completing 120 months' service counting for pension in accordance with Section 8, may receive an annuity, calculated on 720ths as in the preceding Sub-sections, but based on the actual number of months counting for service under that section, with an addition of one month for each complete period of two months' of such service.

(b) Any person retiring on account of illness or age before completing one hundred and twenty months' gross service may receive a gratuity calculated at the rate of 1/12th of a month's salary of the permanent office or offices held by

such person at the time of retirement, for each month of service.

Provided that female emplyees holding pensionable appointments may receive gratuities on compulsory retirement on marriage under the following conditions:—

(a) The grant of such gratuities will be limited to cases in which resignation on marriage is required by the Council's regulations or terms of appointment.

(b) The marriage must be notified to the Chairman immediately on its taking place.

- (c) Persons retiring under such circumstances, at the discretion of the Chairman, and with the approval of the Council, may receive a gratuity at the rate of 1/12th of a month's pay for each complete month of established service, but not exceeding in the whole a maximum of twelve months' pay. No gratuity will, however, be paid when the service is less than thirty-six months, and any period under temporary agreement will be excluded unless followed by two years on the permanent establishment.
- (d) No person who has received such a gratuity and has subsequently become a widow can be re-employed on the pensionable establishment without the sanction of the Council, and her previous service will not be allowed to count for pension.

Substitute the following for the existing Section 5:-

- 5. (1) In the case of abolition of office the pension or gratuity grantable to a Municipal Officer or Servant whose office has been declared to be pensionable will be as follows:—
- (i.) If the officer has completed 120 months' gross service he may be granted a pension of 1/720th of his salary for each month of his service counting for pension in accordance with Section 8, with an addition to such service of one month for each complete period of two months' service, the addition in no case exceeding 120 months.

(ii.) If the officer has not completed 120 months' gross service he may be granted a gratuity of 1/12th of a month's salary for each month of service counting for pension in accordance with Section 8, with an addition of 50 per cent. thereon.

- (2) Provided always that the officer who is thus retired shall be liable to be recalled to the Municipal Service for reemployment on a salary which, together with his pension, shall not be less than that enjoyed at the time of abolition and that in no case shall the number of months to be added to the actual service exceed that which, it added to the age of the retiring officer, would bring that age up to 60 years.
 - 18A. Second paragraph: Substitute "1/720th for each month of service" in place of "1/60th of each year of service."
- 18B. Substitute "2 (iv.) (b)" in place of "2 (iv.)," in 7th line and "180/720ths" in place of "15/60ths" in the 8th line.
- 21. Substitute "1/36th of a month's pay for each complete month's service" in place of "one-third of a month salary for each year's service."
 - 22. (iii.) Substitute "720ths as the months" in place of "60ths as the years."

ntes of Proceedings of a Meeting of the Municipal Council of Kandy, held in the Town Hall, Kandy, on January 20, 1923, at 8 a.m., in accordance with Notice dated January 16, 1923.

-Mr. W. L. Kindersley; Mr. J. C. Ratwatte; Mr. L. H. S. Pieris; Mr. Geo. E. de Silva; Mr. A. Vallipuram; Dr. A. de Saram; and Mr. J. Oorloff.

Minutes of Proceedings of the Meeting held on December 16, having been previously submitted to the approval and a copy thereof furnished to each Member, were taken as read and confirmed by the Chairman. lowing documents were submitted :-

Resolved that the Statement (a), together with the Minutes of Proceedings of this Meeting, as required by section 83 of "The Municipal Councils Ordinance, No. 6 of 1910," be forwarded to the Colonial Secretary for publication in the Government Gazette.

- The following papers were laid on the table:—Reports by the several Inspectors on laundries, bakeries, dairies. standpipes, and house-service taps inspected during December.
- 4. Correspondence :- (1) Letter No. 48 of December 15, 1922, from the Hon. the Colonial Secretary, confirming telegram relating to the appointment of Mr. J. Oorloff as Nominated Member.-Read.
- (2) Letter No. 49 of December 18, 1922, from the Hon. the Colonial Secretary, re temporary increases to pensioners.—Read.
- (3) Letter No. 50 of December 19, 1922, from the Hon. the Colonial Secretary, re "The Land Surveyors, Auctioneers', and Brokers' (Amendment) Ordinance, No. 25 of 1922."—Read.
- (4) Letter No. 51 of December 20, 1922, from the Hon. the Colonial Secretary, intimating that Government is unable to agree to the application of the Municipal Council, Kandy, for an annual grant of a sum representing 50 per cent. of the proceeds of sale of the arrack and toddy taverns within the limits of the Municipality being allowed.—Read.
- (5) Letter of January 10, 1923, from the Hon. the Colonial Secretary, nominating Mr. F. G. Morley to be Auditor of the Accounts of the Municipality, for the information of the Chairman.—Read.
- (6) Letter of December 14, 1922, from the Chairman, Municipal Council, Colombo, enclosing account from Mr. Thyne for Rs. 600 for professional services rendered to the Kandy Municipal Council.—Resolved that the payment of Rs. 600 be sanctioned.
- (7) Letter of December 15, 1922, from the Accountant, asking for authority to exceed certain votes for 1922 by the amounts noted against each.—Resolved that papers be circulated.
- (8) Letter of December 16, 1922, from Dr. J. W. S. Attygalle, resigning his seat in Council as Member for Division
- The Chairman proposed—"That this Council do place on record their sense of the services rendered by Dr. Attygalle to this Council and the town of Kandy, and the loss that both will sustain by his resignation." Mr. Vallipuram seconded. Mr. Ratwatte spoke in support. The resolution was put to the Meeting and carried unanimously.
- (9) Letter of January 16, 1923, from Dr. J. W. S. Attygalle, suggesting the utilization of the water running to waste at the lake spill level in connection with the electric installation.—Resolved that the matter be referred to the Municipal Electrical Engineer for report.
- (10) Application for leave from Mr. J. R. Jayatileke, Secretary, for 10 months from May 1, 1923.—Resolved that the leave and the proposed arrangements for his work, including the employment of a temporary clerk on Rs. 75 a month,
- (11) Letter from the Asgiriya Priests, dated December 15, 1923, accepting the terms agreed upon at the conference between the Priests and the Committee composed of Messrs. J. C. Ratwatte, Dr. J. W. S. Attygalle in connection with the grant of a strip of Temple land for the Asgiriys road.—Resolved that the terms contained in the letter be accepted, and that the Special Committee consisting of Mr. Ratwatte and Dr. Attygalle be thanked for the settlement effected.
- 5. Pursuant to notice, Mr. Vallipuram asked—(i.) Is the Chairman aware of the remarks made by a Member at the last Meeting to the effect "that the executive had got hold of some of the Members and passed the Salaries Scheme"; (ii.) Is there any truth in such a statement? If not, will the Chairman call upon the Member in question to withdraw the statement in open Council.

Before the Chairman replied to the question, Mr. de Silva rose to a point of order and objected to questions in regard to any imputations of improper motives made at a Meeting being asked at a subsequent Meeting. He urged that the proper procedure was to take immedate notice of the words objected to, and added that this remarks referred to the Chairman then presiding, and not to the absent Chairman.

The Chairman said that any knowledge he had regarding the discussion at the last Meeting was derived from accounts

in the newspapers.

Whether the accounts were right or not he could not say.

Mr. de Silva had said that the Municipal Council was "rotten to the core" and "that the executive had got hold Such a statement was defamatory and not creditable to a Member to make. The statements were of the Members." untrue

In the heat of argument things might have been said and no interruption made at the time as feeling was running Mr. Vallipuram had therefore taken the wiser course.

If the statements made are said to have referred to Mr. Ratwatte, who presided at the last Meeting, the explanation cannot be accepted as Mr. Ratwatte was not an Executive Officer.

If Mr. de Silva withdrew the words, he would be well advised and, in fact, would show good taste.

Mr. de Silva explained that he had made no such statements as those referred to, and that he was not responsible for what appeared in the newspapers.

The following motion appeared in the name of Mr. Pieris: -- "That weekly cash advances be paid instead of a

rice issue to the coolies employed by the Municipality."

With the seave of the Council he moved the following amendment:—"That a Special Committee be appointed o consider whether weekly cash advances should be paid instead of a rice issue to the coolies employed by the Municipality. Mr. Ratwatte seconded.

The motion was put to the Meeting and carried by the Chairman's casting vote.

Ayes.—Mr. Pieris, Mr. Ratwatte, Mr. de Silva, and the Chairman. Noes.—Mr. Vallipuram, Dr. Hay, Dr. de Saram, and Mr. Oorloff.

The Special Committee is to consist of Messrs. Ratwatte, Pieris, De Silva, and the Chairman.

- 7. Pursuant to notice, Mr. Ratwatte moved-"That the Chairman be authorized to apply for acquisition survey of such part of Hantana estate as forms the catchment area of the Gonapilikannu and Haloya streams and a 6 feet wide strip for the laying of a pipe line. Mr. de Silva seconded.—Carried.
- Papers re the construction of culvert near Poorana estate.—Resolved that a sum of Rs. 250 be contributed towards the construction of the culvert. Payment to be made after the work has been passed by the Superintendent of Works. The Superintendent of Poorana estate to be responsible for future upkeep.
 - 9. To obtain a vote of Rs. 260 for the purchase of a bicycle for the orderly. Resolved that the vote be allowed.
 - To re-appoint the following Special Committees:
- (i.) Special Committee appointed to submit a report on the necessity or otherwise for legislation on the lines of the Rents Restriction Act of 1920. (Messrs. Ratwatte, Pieris, Bingham, Dr. Attygalle, and the Chairman).

- (ii.) Special Committee appointed to investigate into the causes of the high rate of infant mortality in Kandy and to suggest what measures the Council should adopt to reduce the number of such deaths. (Dr. de Vos, Dr. Hay, Dr. Attygalle, and the Chairman).
- (iii.) Special Committee appointed to inquire generally into the working of the various departments with a view to re-organization of the same as will ensure retrenchment coupled with greater efficiency. (Dr. Attygalle, Mr. Pieris, Dr. Hay, Mr. Bingham, Mr. de Silva, Mr. Ratwatte, and the Chairman).

Resolved that (i.) and (ii.) be not re-appointed, and that (iii.) be re-appointed.

All the elected Members, including the one to be elected for the vacant seat, Dr. Hay and the Chairman to serve on this Committee.

- 11. To elect the Standing Committees for the year, 1923. The election resulted as follows:—
- Law and General Subjects. Messrs. L. H. S. Pieris, G. E. de Silva, and A. Vallipuram.

Finance and Assessment.—Messrs. J. C. Ratwatte, A. Vallipuram, and Dr. G. P. Hay.

Markets and Sanitation.—Dr. G. P. Hay, Dr. A. de Saram, and Mr. J. Oorloff.

Municipal Works.—Messrs. J. C. Ratwatte, L. H. S. Pieris, and J. Oorloff.

- 12. Application from the Sanitary Inspectors for a Special allowance of Rs. 25 a month from November last on account of smallpox duty.—Resolved that each Sanitary Inspector be granted an allowance of Rs. 25 per mensem during the prevalance of the epidemic.
- 13. Application dated January 11, 1923, from the Superintendent of Works for permission to spend Rs. 411 25 out of the sanctioned estimate for materials for conservancy on the purchase of waterproof capes for kanganies and cumbilies for coolies.—Resolved that the permission asked for be granted.
- 14. Papers retaking soundings of the reservoir for preparing a cross section of it.—Resolved that the vote of Rs. 200 asked for by the Superintendent of Works for the purpose be allowed.

MUNICIPILITY OF GALLE.

Minutes of Proceedings of a General Meeting of the Municipal Council of Galle held in the Municipal Office on Saturday, February 10, 1923, pursuant to Notice dated February 5, 1923.

Present.—Mr. F. Bartlett, Chairman; Mr. D. G. Goonewardene; Mr. H. M. Macan Markar; Dr. C. B. Lourensz; Mr. C. E. de Vos; Mr. J. E. Perera; Mr. D. I. Durham; and Mr. A. Rothwell:

The Minutes of the General Meeting of January 13, 1923, a copy thereof having been furnished to each member, were taken as read and confirmed.

2. Pursuant to notice, the Chairman moved—"That the substantive salaries and the temporary increases of Municipal officers be consolidated under the one head of salaries." Mr. J. E. Perera seconded,—Carried.

- 3. Mr. D. G. Goonewardene asked leave of Council to withdraw the motion, of which he had given notice. Leave having been granted, the motion was withdrawn, viz. :- In view of the fact now established by the report of the Assistant Sanitary Commissioner that plague was introduced to Galle by the shipping bringing rice to this port from India; and also in view of the fact that all the income from such shipping, both as harbour dues and duty on rice landed, is appropriated exclusively by Government; and also in view of the further fact that of the rice brought into this port from India only a small preportion is used for consumption by the tax payers of this Municipality, while the bulk is sent out to the estates in this and Matara District beyond Municipal limits as also to various outlying places such as Ambalangoda, Matara, and that Government may be graciously pleased to vouchsafe to this Council some material help with respect to the burden of the heavy expenses incurred in connection with the recent outbreak of plague within this Municipality by paying into this Council at least a moiety of the amount so spent.
- 4. Letter No. 466 of January 27, 1923, from the General Manager, Ceylon Government Railway, intimating that the approach road to the goods shed, Galle, has been completed.—Read.

5. To submit the return giving particulars with respect to all officers employed by this Council, in terms of the

Abstract.—The applicants describe a method of carrying out their invention in which the internodes of the bamboo are split into convenient widths by hand and are then fed lengthwise between a pair of rollers having longitudinal grooves. The rollers push the bamboos between a pair of thicknessing knives which reduce them to the required degree of thickness. The material then passes between a pair of rolls provided with circumferential grooves, the grooves on one roller being opposite the projections in the other: here the bamboo is split to the required width and then passes to a pair of rolls with longitudinal knife edge which cut the strips to the required length.

The claims are:

1. The method of splitting bamboo and like woods into desired widths by means of a pair of rollers having encircling grooves, the rollers being arranged that the projections on one enter the grooves in the other.

2. Means for splitting bamboo and like woods into desired widths consisting of a pair of rollers having encircling
