REGULATIONS FOR THE GOVERNMENT UNIVERSITY SCHOLARSHIPS.

1. (1) Three scholarships of the annual value of £300, tenable for two years, together with an outfit allowance of £50, second class passage to proceed to the British Isles, and second class passage for return to Ceylon after completion of a course of study in the British Isles, will be awarded annually until further notice, one on the results of the Final Examination in Arts of the University of London, one on the results of the Final Examination in Science of the University of London, and one on the results of the Final Examination in Science of the University of London for the study of Agriculture or Forestry according to the conditions defined below, to the candidates recommended by the authorities of the University of London, provided they are physically fit.

(2) These scholarships are awarded subject to the following conditions, viz.:—

(a) That the holder shall enter as a student at one of the Universities of Oxford, Cambridge, London, or Dublin or at one of the Scotch Universities or such other place as shall be approved by His Excellency the Governor.

(b) That the holder shall transmit quarterly to His Majesty's Secretary of State for the Colonies a certificate signed by the College tutor or other responsible authority stating that he continues to pursue his studies with diligence, and that his general conduct is satisfactory.

2. Candidates to be eligible for one of these scholarships—

(1) Must have been registered as students of the University College;

(2) Must have been resident in the Island for five years next before the Examination; and

(3) Must not have completed their twenty-second year before the first day of the month fixed for the Examination.

3. A proper certificate of birth must accompany the application; a certificate of baptism will be accepted instead, provided such baptism took place within four months of the date of the candidate's birth.

4. The holder of a scholarship shall pursue a course of studies approved by the Council.

5. The duration of the Government University Scholarship may be extended to a further period of one year in cases where a scholarship-holder engages in a course of study which lasts more than two years, provided that he has shown marked promise and ability during the first two years that he has held the scholarship.

6. A scholar will be permitted to postpone his return for two years after the expiration of the scholarship without special permission to do so, and with permission of His Excellency the Governor or the Right Hon. the Secretary of State for the Colonies to remain in Europe for a further period not exceeding three years, on the distinct understanding that such permission will be given only to enable the scholar to pursue a course of studies or to acquire professional qualifications likely to be of benefit to the Colony on his eventual return.

7. The return passage of University Scholars will not be paid by Government unless they have notified the Crown Agents that they are returning to Ceylon in order to enter the Public Service, to practice a profession, or in some other way to confer on the community the benefit of their training.

8. The medical expenses of University Scholars will be paid by Government in cases recommended by the Director of Colonial Students, but the total sum which will be paid for any one scholar on this account is limited to £50. If the student is placed in a nursing institution, not more than three guineas a week will be paid by Government towards the charges of the institution.

9. The parent or guardian of every University Scholar will be required to execute a bond for an amount of not less than Rs. 1,000, to be utilized to meet medical expenses in excess of £50 which are considered to be necessary by the Director of Colonial Students. The Secretary of State may at any time order the return to Ceylon of any University Scholar on the recommendation of the medical advisers to the Colonial Office.

10. Candidates for the University Scholarship for Agriculture or Forestry must take Botany, Chemistry, and one other Natural Science subject.

11. Candidates for the University Scholarship in Arts shall not offer a Science subject.

12. No students shall be entitled to sit for a scholarship who does not state, in his form of application to sit for the London Final Examinations, that he is a candidate for a scholarship.

CENSUS OF PRODUCTION, 1921.

TEA AND RUBBER.

The provisional totals of the Census of Estate Production for the year ending September 30, 1921, are published in the annexed tables for general information.

"A" Estates.—For the purpose of this Census, a number of the larger estates in the charge of Superintendents who could fill in the returns in English were designated "A" estates, and forms were sent direct to them from the Statistics Office. I am greatly indebted to these Superintendents and their staffs for the care and promptitude with which the returns were sent in. By the end of December, 1921, only 108 estate returns were outstanding.

Other Estates.—The Census of Production for the smaller estates, village gardens, &c., was taken by the Government Agents and Assistant Government Agents through their headmen, and by the Chairmen of Municipalities and Local Boards through their subordinate officers.

Accuracy.—As this is the first occasion on which an attempt has been made to collect any figures for the smaller areas, it is probable that the totals for "Other" estates are subject to a considerable error, but it is hoped that they contain less guess work than the previous estimates. The returns from the "A" estates ought to be correct to the first four significant figures, even when allowance is made for the difficulties of dealing with interplanted areas. The totals for "Other" estates are probably not correct beyond the second figure.

Time required for Compilation.—With a few exceptions, the returns for the "A" estates were ready about the end of 1921, but it was considered advisable to await the figures for the "Other" estates before publication. The collection of these data through a large number of minor headmen required a longer time, and it was not till the end of February, 1922, that the abstraction of the "Other" totals for tea and rubber were complete. The returns for coconuts are still under compilation, and will be published separately in due course.

Difficulties of Definition.—While it was fully realized that returns by planting districts would be of greater use to the planting community, it is regretted that it was found impossible to utilize these districts for the Census of "Other" estates. The only way in which a Census of all planted lands could be taken was according to the Revenue Districts, and the annexed returns are in this form. The conversion of the "A" part of the tables to planting districts is receiving attention, but it will show little difference from the figures published by the District Planting Associations for 1921, as they are supplied from the same sources, namely, the estate superintendents. Nevertheless, it is most important that a standard classification of estates should be decided upon to render possible comparisons of official and unofficial figures and I hope shortly to take that matter up with the Associations concerned.

The figures.—Any detailed examination of the figures in the annexed tables cannot be attempted here, but it may be noted that the grand totals do not appear to conflict seriously with previous estimates. The total acreage in tea has been usually put at about 400,000 acres, apparently a slight under-statement, while the number of pounds returned as manufactured between September 30, 1920, and September 30, 1921 (152,000,000) is about 4.5 per cent. less than the exports in the calendar year 1921. The acreage in rubber on "A" estates—303,000—is probably an accurate figure, and the total of 390,000 acres agrees well enough with the figure of 405,000 acres obtained by the Director of Agriculture in 1919. The total amount of rubber manufactured—82,900,000 lb.—in the year ending September 30, 1921, is about 6 per cent. less than the exports in 1921.

Notes regarding the Tables.—The sign "—" in the tables generally means "details not available" except in the cases of lines with all items so marked when it means "nil." It will be seen that detailed particulars have not been collected for "Other" estates. The figures for "A" estates in column 3 of both tables should be equal to the sum of corresponding figures in columns 4 and 5; those in column 10 of the rubber table to the sum of items in columns 7, 8, and 9. But in the cases marked * in the rubber table this is not so, as the information for one or more of the columns 4, 5, 7, 8, 9 was omitted from some of the returns.

SEASON REPORTS FOR THE MONTH OF
FEBRUARY, 1922.

WESTERN PROVINCE.

COLOMBO DISTRICT.

Paddy : fields are being prepared for the yala cultivation. Maha crop is being reaped.

Dry grains : the kurakkan and amu crop in Siyane korale west has been reaped, and it is maturing satisfactorily in Siyane korale east.

Other products : prospects of coconuts are fairly good. The estimated crop for the month is 81,069,858 nuts. There is a fairly good supply of fruits and vegetables.

Price of staple products : (a) the price of imported rice varies from Rs. 6.50 to Rs. 8 per bushel ; (b) coconuts are sold at Rs. 50 to Rs. 70 per 1,000.

Harvest prospects : fair.

Rainfall : the rainfall was 2.12 in. in 6 days at the Colombo Observatory.

Health of people : satisfactory. There were a few cases of chickenpox, dysentery, enteric fever, measles, and fever during the month.

Health of cattle : good. Hoof-and-mouth disease which was prevalent in some korales is now subsiding.

KALUTARA DISTRICT.

Paddy : the reaping of the maha harvest commenced during the month.

Dry grain : there was very little dry grain cultivation in the district.

Other products : fruit and vegetables were scarce, except in the totamunes where the supply was as usual fair. The flowering of coconuts was good, and the month's crop is estimated at 1,986,500 nuts.

Prices of staple products : no country rice was available in the market. Coast rice was sold from 19½ to 26½ cents per measure. The price of coconuts ranged from Rs. 40 to Rs. 100 per 1,000 nuts.

Remarks on harvest prospects generally : satisfactory.

Rainfall : there was only little rain during the month. Total 5.47 in. ; average .19 in. per day as registered at Kalutara.

Health of the people : good. A few cases of fever, dysentery, chickenpox, &c., prevailed.

Health of cattle : good.

CENTRAL PROVINCE.

KANDY DISTRICT.

Paddy : reaping of the crop has been started in some divisions. The untimely rain that fell in the early part of the month has damaged the crops in places and delayed reaping. The outlook on the whole is good.

Rainfall : there were a few heavy showers of rain during the first half of the month.

MANNAR DISTRICT.

Paddy : kalapokam harvesting has commenced, and the prospects of the crop are fair.

Dry grains : the cultivation of kompanpullu near Tarakundu has not been harvested yet. The prospects of the coming crop in the Musali division are fair.

Coconuts : these are in good condition. The yield for the month in the Mannar Island is poor, realising about 80,000 nuts.

Other products : nil.

Prices of foodstuffs : country rice, Rs. 5·76 to Rs. 7·25 per bushel ; paddy, Rs. 2 to Rs. 2·62½ per bushel ; imported rice, available for sale in the Mannar Island alone at Rs. 7·50 to Rs. 9 per bushel ; kurakkan, available for sale in the Musalai division only at Rs. 2 per bushel ; coconuts, Rs. 6 to Rs. 12 per 100.

Dry grain : a few acres of chena were cultivated in Varikkuttiur and the crop has been reaped. Kurakkan crop in the Maritime pattus is reaped but not very satisfactory.

Tobacco : planting is over. Prospects satisfactory.

Health of inhabitants : fair. Being the fever season, malarial fever prevailed to a large extent in almost every village.

Health of cattle : good. Pasture, good ; except in Maritime pattus. No disease.

TODDY RENTS, WESTERN PROVINCE, 1922-23. — COLOMBO DISTRICT.

NOTICE is hereby given that the Government Agent for the Western Province will, at the Colombo Kachcheri, at 10 A.M. on Monday, April 24, 1922 (and on such subsequent days as the Government Agent shall, if necessary, notify), expose for sale by auction, subject to the Conditions in the Schedule A hereto, the privilege of selling Fermented Toddy by Retail from October 1, 1922, to September 30, 1923, at Taverns to be established by the purchasers in the villages specified in the Schedule B hereto, not more than one shop being allowed in each such village, at a site to be approved by the Government Agent.

2. No sale of Fermented Toddy will be allowed in villages other than those in the said Schedule B expressly specified.

3. (a) If taverns are to be moved from present sites, a month's notice has to be given by the Government Agent under paragraph 5 of IV. of Excise Notification No. 85 of February 12, 1919. Application should therefore be made by purchasers to the Government Agent for sites without delay.

(b) No rebate will be allowed in respect of any taverns in the event of objections to sites being upheld after inquiry by the Government Agent.

4. The purchasers will be required to pay in stamps the stamp duty under the Stamps Ordinance of 1919 in respect of the Conditions of Sale as well as of the security bond referred to in clause 2 (a) of the Conditions of Sale.
5. The attention of intending purchasers is specially drawn to clause 2 (b) of the Conditions of Sale.
6. Save in exceptional circumstances no trees will be licensed in dry areas.

Schedule A.—TODDY RENT SALE CONDITIONS.

The conditions on which the exclusive privilege of selling fermented toddy by retail within the villages described in Schedule B., from October 1, 1922, to September 30, 1923, is sold are, in addition to the general conditions applicable to all excise licenses published in the *Government Gazette* No. 6,615 of March 13, 1914, as follows:—

1. The Government Agent shall have power, in his discretion, to refuse to accept any bid or tender, subject to which power the highest bidder or tenderer shall be the grantee of the privilege, and shall conform to and perform all the conditions under which the privilege is sold.

2. (a) The grantee shall, immediately on being declared the grantee, sign these conditions of sale and pay to the Government Agent a sum equivalent to two months' rent of the privilege as a security deposit, which amount shall be liable to forfeiture in whole or in part, at the discretion of the Government Agent, for breach of any of the conditions; and such forfeiture shall be in addition to any other penalty prescribed by the conditions for such breach. The grantee shall hypothecate the said security deposit by a bond in form Excise T 23 within fourteen days of sale of the privilege above prescribed.

(b) If the highest bid or tender under condition 1 exceeds the sum of Rs. 2,000, the grantee shall at the same time execute, if so required by the Government Agent, in the form sanctioned by law, a power of attorney to confess judgment in any action which may be instituted against him for the recovery of any moneys due in respect of this privilege.

(c) The grantee shall, on signing the conditions of sale, elect, and under his hand signify, a post office to which all notices and processes whatever in connection with the above said privilege shall be addressed under registered post; and all such notices or processes as aforesaid so addressed to the post office so elected and posted in due course shall be considered as good and effectual to all intents and purposes as if the same were served personally.

3. The grantee shall pay to the Government Agent the purchase money or rent in twelve equal monthly instalments, and also any duty, fee, cost price, or other sum due to the Government from him. The first instalment of the purchase money or rent shall be considered due and payable on September 30, 1922, and the remainder on the last day of each succeeding month. Interest at the rate of 9 per cent. per annum shall be payable on all arrears.

4. No payment of any sum due by the grantee to the Crown shall be considered as duly made unless the grantee shall produce a Kachcheri receipt therefor; and no money which, for his own convenience, the grantee may think fit to leave in the hands of the Shroff or any other officer of the Kachcheri shall be considered as money paid under this contract.

5. If an instalment or part of the instalment of the purchase money or rent, or any duty, fee, cost price, or other sum due to the Government from the grantee remains unpaid after the same shall have become due and payable, the Government Agent shall have power, after 15 days' notice to the grantee of his intention to do so, without further process of law, to cancel the license or licenses issued to the grantee, and to re-sell the privilege at the risk and loss of the grantee. The notice referred to may be given in such manner as the Government Agent may direct.

6. The grantee shall, on receipt of the license to sell, furnish to the Superintendent or Assistant Superintendent of Excise an application on the prescribed form showing the numbers and situations of the trees which he proposes to tap for the supply of fermented toddy for sale at each tavern, and no tree shall be tapped or toddy drawn for this purpose except under cover of a license setting forth the numbers and situations of the trees, the name of the drawer, and the tavern for which the fermented toddy is intended. The Superintendent of Excise or Assistant Superintendent of Excise shall have power, subject to appeal to the Excise Commissioner, to refuse any application to tap trees for any tavern if such application is, in his opinion, open to serious objection.

7. No tree shall be tapped or toddy drawn therefrom for the supply of fermented toddy for sale at a tavern unless such tree shall first have been marked for this purpose in a manner prescribed by the Excise Commissioner; nor shall toddy be transported to the tavern except under cover of a pass granted by the Superintendent of Excise or the Assistant Superintendent of Excise. Such pass shall set forth the name of the person who transports the toddy and shall be issued to the grantee, who shall hand it to the person who transports the toddy.

8. The grantee, if he taps the trees and draws the toddy himself, or, if he delegates the work to another person, such person shall, at the time of tapping the trees or drawing the toddy, invariably carry the license on his person, and shall produce it forthwith on the demand of any Excise Officer or village headman.

9. The grantee shall have no concern or interest, direct or indirect, in the sale of arrack, or in the purchase of any privilege for the sale of arrack, within the Revenue District in which he possesses the privilege of selling toddy.

10. Except under the written authority of the Assistant Commissioner of Excise, no toddy, except toddy drawn from trees licensed and marked for a particular tavern, shall be kept, offered for sale, or sold in that tavern.

11. No fermented toddy shall be sold at a lower price than 40 cents per gallon, and in proportion for any smaller quantity.

12. The Government Agent shall not be bound to find a site for any tavern in the event of the grantee not being able to procure a site. No tavern shall be opened at any place except with the approval of the Government Agent.

13. The purchaser shall, within ten days from the date on which the privilege commences to run, or within such extended time as the Government Agent may grant, apply to the Government Agent and obtain a license or licenses for the sale by retail of fermented toddy at the taverns within the area covered by the privilege.

NOTICE is hereby given that the privilege of selling Fermented Toddy by retail in the areas specified in the Schedule on page 703, for the period of twelve months from October 1, 1922, to September 30, 1923, will be put up for sale by public auction on the following Conditions:—

Toddy Rent Sale Conditions applicable to Toddy Taverns in respect of which "off" sales are not prohibited.
