That in consideration of the work done by Government in repairing Kanukkeni tank and channels, situated in Mullaitivu District, Northern Province, and on condition that Government maintains the tank and main channels in the future, and that the old rate of Re. 1 per acre in perpetuity is abolished, the proprietors of the lands irrigable under the tank have agreed to pay rates which shall be variable by His Excellency the Governor in accordance with the following arrangement:—

- (1) For the period 1925 to the end of 1931 the rate leviable shall be Rs. 2 per acre per annum.
- (2) Thereafter for every succeeding period of 5 years the rate leviable shall be ascertained as follows:—

To or from the probable cost of maintenance for the next succeeding period of 5 years, as estimated by the Director of Irrigation for the time being, there shall be added or subtracted the loss or profit, as the case may be, on the maintenance for the preceding period of 5 years. The nett amount so ascertained shall be divided by the total acreage and the figure thus obtained—being divided by five—shall be the irrigation rate per annum for the next succeeding quinquennial period.

VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended September 8, 1923.

Births.—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 133 (1 European, 7 Burghers, 86 Sinhalese, 20 Tamils, 12 Moors, and 7 Malays). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on July 1, 1923, viz., 250,431) was 27.7, as against 24.6 in the preceding week, 24.6 in the corresponding week of last year, and 27.9 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 147 (2 Europeans, 6 Burghers, 76 Sinhalese, 31 Tamils, 26 Moors, 3 Malays, and 3 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 30.6, as against 40.6 in the previous week, 23.8 in corresponding week of last year, and 31.2 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 147 total deaths, 32 were of infants under one year of age, as against 41 in the preceding week, 29 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 33 the average for last year.

Stillbirths.—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 5.

Principal Causes of Death.—1. (a) Twenty-one deaths from *Pneumonia* were registered, 7 in Maradana hospitals (including 1 death of a non-resident), 3 in New Bazaar, 2 each in Kotahena South, Maradana North, Slave Island, and Wellawatta North, and 1 each in Pettah, Maradana East, and Kollupitiya, as against 35 in the previous week, and 22 the weekly average for last year.

(b) Six deaths from *Influenza* were registered, 1 each in St. Paul's, San Sebastian, Kotahena South, New Bazaar, Maradana South, and Kollupitiya, as against 10 in the previous week, and 6 the weekly average for last year.

(c) One death from *Bronchitis* was registered in Wellawatta South, as against 6 in the previous week, and 4 the weekly average for last year.

2. Eleven deaths from *Phthisis* were registered, 7 in Maradana hospitals (including 1 death of a non-resident), 2 in Slave Island, and 1 each in St. Paul's, and New Bazaar, as against 16 in the previous week, and 12 the weekly average for last year.

3. Five deaths from *Enteric Fever* were registered, 2 in Maradana hospitals, and 1 each in Kotahena North, New Bazaar, and Wellawatta North, as against 7 in the previous week, and 4 the weekly average for last year.

4. Three deaths from *Plague* were registered, 1 each in Kotahena South, Slave Island, and Wellawatta North, as against 7 in the previous week, and 2 the weekly average for last year.

5. Eighteen deaths were registered from *Infantile Convulsions*, 9 from *Debility*, 6 from *Diarrhoea*, 5 from *Dysentery*, 4 from *Suicide*, 2 from *Enteritis*, 1 each from *Worms*, *Tetanus*, and *Puerperal Septicæmia*, and 53 from *Other Causes*.

6. Nine cases of *Enteric Fever*, 6 of *Plague*, 5 of *Chickenpox*, and 4 of *Measles* were reported during the week, as against 13, 7, 21, and 4, respectively, of the preceding week.

State of Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 80.2°, against 81.5° in the preceding week, and 81.4° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29.872 in., against 29.851 in. in the preceding week, and 29.879 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 5.78 in., against 1.37 in. in the preceding week, and 0.71 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.

REGULATIONS FOR TEACHERS' CERTIFICATE EXAMINATIONS.

PRELIMINARY EXAMINATION FOR CEYLON TEACHERS' CERTIFICATE, 1924.

THIS examination will be held yearly in Colombo, commencing on the last Monday in August.

2. To be eligible for the examination candidates must be (i.) registered as supplementary teachers in Assisted English Schools under clause 62 of the Code (The Cambridge Junior Examination will be regarded as equivalent to the E. S. L. C. for this purpose); or (ii.) registered as uncertificated teachers over 18 years of age in Assisted English Schools; or (iii.) teachers over 18 years of age in Government English and Anglo-vernacular Schools, who have passed the E. S. L. C. Examination.

3. Applications on forms provided for the purpose, bearing a Rs. 5 stamp duly cancelled, must be forwarded through the manager of the school in which the candidate is employed, or direct in the case of Government teachers so as to reach the Education Office on or before June 1, 1924.

4. Regulations for the Kindergarten Teachers' Preliminary Examination will be published separately.

Candidates will be expected to give from memory only formulæ for the triangle and the circle.

The syllabus is intended to cover only that part of Nature Study included within Animal and Plant Life. It will involve, however, an elementary knowledge of the composition and properties of air, water, and soil, as this knowledge is essential for the understanding of many of the functions of plants and animals. As the study of animals has been very restricted so far in Ceylon schools, a wide choice of questions will be allowed for a certain number of years. No candidate, however, will be able to secure very good marks unless he has a knowledge of both Animal and Plant Life. It is of great importance for a teacher to have not only a theoretical understanding of Nature Study, but also a practical knowledge of the subject. The candidates will therefore be tested in their powers of observation, of description and of drawing, and also on their immediate acquaintance with specimens or types that are easily procurable or are situated in the neighbourhood of schools. Stress will be laid on distribution of plants and animals, and its relation to climate and other external conditions forming the environment.

7. The period of service referred to in paragraphs 4, 5, and 6 will be counted up to June 1, 1924.

History.—One paper will be set. Time 2 hours.

Twelve questions will be set, three on each of the following sections (six questions must be answered)—

- (3) Elementary civics.
- (4) Arrangement of history syllabus and use of maps.

Section E.

Geography.—One paper will be set. Time 2 hours.

Candidates are advised to study the following books from which questions will be set:—

"A Class Book of Practical Geography" (Philip & Son).
 "Man on the Earth" by Lyde (Blackie and Sons).
 "Physical Geography for Schools" by Smith (Black).
 "The Teaching of Geography," Chapter IV. in the "Suggestions for the Consideration of Teachers" (Board of Education).

Special attention should be paid to the teaching of the Geography prescribed by the syllabuses appearing in the Code.

Section F.

Elementary Mathematics.—One paper will be set. Time 3 hours.

Arithmetic.—In addition to the Arithmetic of the Preliminary Examination, questions may be set on the methods of teaching Arithmetic. Questions will also be set to test the ability to construct problems suitable for different standards from given data.

Elementary Algebra.—Questions will be set up to and including simple quadratic equations.

Section G.

Language other than English.—One paper will be set. Time 2 hours.

No set books are prescribed for study. The passages for translation into English will be taken both from prose writers and from poets. Passages for translation from English into the language and in the case of modern languages, exercises in free composition will be set. A sound knowledge of grammar and syntax will be required.

Section H.

Elementary Science.—One paper of 3 hours will be set containing questions from the whole syllabus for written work.

A practical examination of one hour will be held. A number of easy experiments will be set from both Physics and Chemistry. Candidates will be expected to perform two experiments, one from Physics and one from Chemistry.

General.—This section is intended to give the teacher an insight into scientific method and an acquisition of useful knowledge by discovery and exposition of the Scientific or Laboratory method of training, so that he may apply these methods wherever possible to all other subjects of the school curriculum.

SYLLABUS.

1. *Physical Geography.*—A general course in this is suggested because it applies Physics, Chemistry, Biology, and Geology most simply and aptly. Huxley's "Physiography" or Geikie's "Physical Geography" or Mill's "The Realm of Nature" is suggested as a text book for general reading.

2. *Physics and Chemistry Course:*—

Text Books—

- (a) A course of Physics by C. H. Draper (Blackie & Sons).
- (b) A Junior Chemistry by E. A. Tyler.
- (c) Science of Common Life by A. T. Simmons and E. Stenhouse (Macmillan).

(a) *Physics*.—The course is to be on an experimental basis with as little mathematical deduction as possible :—

Draper's course of Physics—

Part I. : (As in the book).

Part II. : (As in the book).

Part III. : *Mechanics*.—Emphasis is to be laid on the equilibrium of forces, work and energy, and application of the principle of conservation of energy.

Part IV. : *Heat*.—Emphasis is to be laid on the application of principles of Heat to phenomena in Physical Geography to Ventilation and to Hygrometry.

Part V. : *Sound*.—Questions will be set only on Elementary Laws derived from qualitative experiments.

Part VI. : *Light*.—Emphasis is to be laid on Physical rather than Geometrical optics.

Part VII. : *Magnetism and Electricity*.—Electrostatics and Magnetism to be confined only to simple experiments that lead to a clear understanding of the terms used in current Electricity.

Current Electricity.—Elementary ideas on the application of its principles to the telegraph, telephones, electric bells, induction coils, and electric lamps should be known.

(b) *Chemistry*.—An experimental knowledge of the chemical processes used in the preparation and study of properties of the Elements and Compounds treated in the text book.

(c) Questions may be set on the application of the principles of Physics and Chemistry to Hygiene and the Science of Common Life.

Practical.—Experiments set on the subject matter above indicated will be largely qualitative and consist of short and simple experiments. A certain number of the important elementary quantitative experiments in Physics will be set. No systematic qualitative analysis will be required in Chemistry. Experiments may be set from those in (c) which show the applications of the principles of Chemistry and Physics to Hygiene and Science of Common Life.

Section I.

Domestic Science.—Candidates must pass in the following subjects : One paper of 3 hours, and a practical test in Needlework.

Needlework.—The same syllabus as the Preliminary Examination.

Physiology and Hygiene.—A knowledge of the various parts of the body and their functions. Air, water, lighting, ventilation, sanitation, care of the hair, teeth, and skin, rest and exercise, digestion and absorption of food.

Care of the Sick.—Taking of temperature and pulse ; preparing bed for patients and use of draw sheets ; making and application of bandages, poultices, and fomentations ; feeding of patients ; preparation and care of the sick room ; common diseases.

Child Welfare—

(a) *Infants*.—Care of new born child ; infant bathing ; clothing and food ; rest and exercise ; formation of habits.

(b) *Older Children*.—Bathing, clothing, and food at different ages ; rest and exercise ; training of the senses ; and formation of habits.

(c) Common ailments and emergencies of childhood.

Section J.

Hygiene and Physical Training.—A paper of 1 hour, and a practical test will be given. The examination will be set upon the "Syllabus of Physical Training for Schools, 1919," and "Suggestions in regard to Games" published by the Board of Education. There will be a practical test from a Table Group selected by the candidate, who must however be familiar with the principles underlying the exercises in all the Table Groups.

Section K.

Drawing.—One paper including practical test, 2 hours.

(a) Written answers to questions on the theory and the practical application of drawing.

(b) Blackboard illustrations in class teaching, e.g., rapid sketches of common objects, including maps, descriptive of races, religions, products, animal life, &c.

(c) Geometrical Drawing : Construction of circles, triangles, quadrilaterals, and polygons with given data.

Section L.

Mathematics.—One paper of 2 hours.

(a) Questions will be set on the theory of quadratics, on graphs, including variation of functions, their maximum and minimum values, and on the Remainder theorem and its applications in factorisation.

(b) *Geometry*.—The subjects of Euclid I.—IV. with simple deductions, including easy loci and the areas of triangles and parallelograms of which the bases and altitudes are given. Euclid's proofs will not be insisted on, but all proofs of geometrical theorems must be geometrical. The use of properties of similar figures will be allowed.

(c) *Trigonometry*.—The elements of Trigonometry including the following : Ratios, variation of ratios, solution of triangles with practical applications.

Section M.

Natural History.—One paper will be set. Time 2 hours.

The syllabus is intended to cover only that part of Nature Study included within Animal and Plant Life. It will involve, however, an elementary knowledge of the composition and properties of air, water, and soil, as this knowledge is essential for the understanding of many of the functions of plants and animals. As the study of animals has been very restricted so far in Ceylon schools, a wide choice of questions will be allowed for a certain number of years. No candidate, however, will be able to secure very good marks unless he has a knowledge of both Animal and Plant Life.

It is of great importance for a teacher to have not only a theoretical understanding of Nature Study, but also a practical knowledge of the subject. The candidates will therefore be tested in their powers of observation, of description and of drawing, and also on their immediate acquaintance with specimens or types that are easily procurable or are situated in the neighbourhood of schools. Stress will be laid on distribution of plants and animals, and its relation to climate and other external conditions forming the environment.

SYLLABUS.

PLANT LIFE.

1. *The Stem*.—Internal structure (a) Stems and roots, (b) The cell as exemplified by Spirogyra, (c) Plant tissues.

2. A knowledge of the characters of the following Natural Orders : Dilleniaceæ, Malvaceæ, Leguminosæ, Myrtaceæ, Convolvulaceæ, Scrophulariaceæ, Acanthaceæ, Curcubitaceæ, Rubiaceæ, Compositæ, Liliaceæ, Amaryllidaceæ, Graminæ, Palmæ.

3. Adaptation of plants to different habitats. Climatic conditions and geographical distributions of plants in Ceylon.

ANIMAL LIFE.

1. A general knowledge of the structure and physiology of the following: (a) Vascular system, (b) Nervous system, (c) Types of muscles.

2. Structure and functions of (a) a skeleton of a bird, a frog, a snake. (N.B.) Detailed study of the skull to be omitted, (b) skin, (c) kidneys.

3. External structure and life habits of the following:—

Crustaceans—Prawn, crab, hermit crab.

Arachnids—Spider, scorpion.

Annalids—Earthworm, leech.

N.B.—A knowledge of the distinguishing characters of the above groups is required.

4. The structure of the animal cell as exemplified by amoeba. Vegetative division of the cell.

Interference of Telegraph and Telephone Lines by Trees.

THE attention of landowners is drawn to section 10 of the Telegraph Ordinance No. 35 of 1908, which authorizes the Telegraph Department, *inter alia*, to cut down any tree or branch which may in any way injure or which is likely to injure, impede, or interfere with any telegraph line, and to section 17 which reads as follows :—

“Whenever a telegraph line has been placed under, over, along, or across any immovable property, no person who, subsequent to the date on which such telegraph line has been so placed, plants any tree or shrub which may be likely in the future to injure, impede, or interfere with such telegraph line, shall be entitled to receive any compensation should such tree or shrub or any branch thereof be cut down under the provisions of section 10.”

Much trouble and interference with the public telegraph and telephone service is caused by the non-observance of the Ordinance, and owners of land in the vicinity of telegraph and telephone wires are requested to take early steps to remove such trees or branches as are now or may be in the future liable to cause obstruction to the telegraph and telephone service; in default the Department will have to get the obstruction removed.

Bill Incorporating the Comrades of the Great War (Ceylon) Association.

NOTICE is hereby given that a Bill is being introduced into the Ceylon Legislative Council for the incorporation of the Comrades of the Great War (Ceylon) Association. The general nature of the Bill is to incorporate the Comrades of the Great War (Ceylon) Association, which is an Association established for the purpose—

- (1) Of promoting and perpetuating the spirit of comradeship, patriotism, and devotion which has characterized the fighting forces of the Empire.
- (2) Of perpetuating the memory of those who died in the Great War.
- (3) Of watching and safeguarding the interests of its members.
- (4) Of protecting its members and their dependents.
- (5) Of assisting and protecting the women and children left by those who have fallen in the Great War.
- (6) Of seeing that all monies raised and contributed from any source for the welfare of the members of the corporation are utilized for that purpose.

2. The Ordinance provides for the appointment of a Committee or Committees as may be prescribed by rules thereunder to manage the affairs of the Association (section 4): for the vesting and holding of property in, and by, the Association (sections 8 and 9); and for dealing with the debts and liabilities of the existing Association.

3. The Association is given the power to make rules for the purposes of administering its funds, conducting business, and generally managing its affairs (section 6). Rules are scheduled to the Bill which are to remain in force until altered or revoked by the association (sections 6 and 7).

Ingles; the Hon. Mr. Harold Creasy, M.L.C.; Mr. W. Philips; Mr. C. H. Z. Fernando; Mr. J. S. Collett; Mr. A. D. Prouse; and Mr. W. E. V. de Rooy.

1. The Minutes of the General Meeting of July 11, 1923, having been previously printed and copies thereof having been sent to each Member of Council, were taken as read.

Resolved that the Minutes of the General Meeting of July 11, 1923, be confirmed.

2. Pursuant to notice, Dr. W. P. Rodrigo asked the Chairman :—(1) At whose suggestion was the advertisement dated July 28 last published (cutting enclosed)? (2) Is the Council to understand from it that no tenders will be advertised for in the future for the supply of the articles mentioned in that notice? (3) If so, is non-advertisement for tenders conducive to the best interests of the rate-payers? (4) Is the Chairman aware that on various occasions this Council has expressed its disapproval of the practice of calling for tenders, except by public advertisements in the daily press?

The Chairman replied as follows :—(1) The Member for Wellawatta in November, 1922, suggested in Council that tenders be called for by advertisement in the press. The Chairman undertook to submit the matter to the Works and Finance Committees, who in the same month resolved that the best way of advertising was to register the names of persons willing to tender and thereafter to notice them whenever supplies were needed. It was decided to call on such persons to have their names registered by annual advertisement in the press. This decision is embodied in Standing Order No. 82, and the advertisement was put in the press in compliance with that rule; (2) tenders will be advertised for in future for the supply of articles needed and for which the names of would-be suppliers are registered, but not by advertisement in the press, unless special circumstances so require. All those persons registered will be asked to tender; (3) non-advertisement for tenders is not, in the Chairman's opinion, conducive to the rate-payer's interests. The present system of advertising amongst those who register their names as would-be suppliers is at least as effective in obtaining tenders as is the method of advertising in each and every newspaper every time a supply of any articles is needed. The present system is very much cheaper as it necessitates advertisements in the press only once a year; (4) the Chairman is not aware of any resolution of Council disapproving of the system of calling for tenders, except by advertisement in the press. On one or two occasions reliable firms were by mistake not called on to tender. Hence the revised system calling on those interested to register their names was adopted so as to secure that no would-be supplier is omitted.

Dr. Rodrigo asked a further question, "What about the new firms?"

The Chairman replied that the firms interested could send in their names. The lists would be revised once a year.

With the permission of the Council Mr. C. P. Dias moved that the Council should place on record its high appreciation of the services rendered to this Council and to the rate-payers of the city by the Hon. Mr. Harold Creasy, who was that day sitting at that Board for the last time. In congratulating Mr. Creasy on his deserved promotion, he said the Council was not only losing a very valuable Member but the Councillors were losing a good friend.

The Chairman in seconding the motion cordially endorsed the remarks of the Senior Member. The motion was carried unanimously.

The Hon. Mr. Harold Creasy thanked the Council for the very kind appreciation of his services.

3. (1) Pursuant to notice, Dr. W. P. Rodrigo moved that reference be made to the Sanitation Committee to inquire into the circumstances that have led to the recent accidents to coolies and others in the City Sanitation Engineer's Department, and to report what further precautions, if any, are necessary to be taken for the greater safety of workmen of the department and the general public. Dr. E. V. Ratnam seconded.

The Chairman explained that with regard to the accident which occurred in 1921, Mr. C. H. Z. Fernando asked a question in Council and the facts were fully detailed in connection with that question. The Chairman said he would be very glad if the Sanitation Committee would go into the matter and see if any further precautions were needed for the greater safety of the workmen. The motion was put to the meeting and carried.

(2) Pursuant to notice, Dr. W. P. Rodrigo moved that reference be made to the Four Standing Committees to consider and report what conditions should be fulfilled by the owners of private lanes in the city before they are taken over by the Council. Mr. C. P. Dias seconded.

The Chairman stated that Dr. Rodrigo had alighted on one of the serious drawbacks in the city, namely, the neglected state of private streets and said that if the Council wished to refer the matter to the Standing Committees he had no objection. He referred to the proposal made by the Council in 1922 to amend the law so as to give the local authority power to compel private streets to be made up at the expense of those interested. The motion was put to the meeting and carried.

4. To submit, in terms of section 102 of Ordinance No. 6 of 1910, the Chairman's Administration Report for the Financial Year, 1922.

Mr. C. P. Dias moved that, in terms of section 102 of Ordinance No. 6 of 1910, the Chairman's Administration Report for the Financial Year 1922, be submitted in due course, to His Excellency the Governor. In doing so, he said that the Members of the Council and the general public should congratulate the Mayor on the excellent report he had submitted to the Council. The Hon. Mr. N. H. M. Abdul Cader seconded.

The Chairman said he was thankful to them for the kind remarks that had been made, but would point out that the report was not entirely written by him but was contributed to by the various Heads of the Departments. He particularly alluded to the masterly report of Dr. Marshall Philip, which was read with appreciation outside Ceylon. He stated that the report had been printed for the first time in recent years by their own Printing Department. The motion was put to the meeting and carried.

The Hon. Mr. N. H. M. Abdul Cader moved that the Council do go into Committee to consider items Nos. 5 to 11 (inclusive) on the agenda. Mr. C. P. Dias seconded.—Carried.

The following extracts from the Minutes of the Standing and the Special Committees named and a list of the properties vested in the Council to be reconveyed, as per reports of the Council's lawyers, Messrs. Julius & Creasy, were laid before the Council in Committee :—

Extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Law and General Subjects of July 28, 1923.

3. To consider :—(a) Letter No. 78 of June 13, 1923, from the Municipal Veterinary Surgeon, with regard to unclaimed animals that recover from contagious diseases.—Considered.

(b) The proposed amendment to Regulation No. 15 of the regulations relating to cattle disease framed under Ordinance No. 25 of 1909.—Recommended that the following amendment be adopted. The words in italics are additions :—

Regulation No. 15.—It shall be lawful for the Government Agent to establish quarantine, isolation or inoculation stations in any part of a Province, and to cause any cattle to be moved thereto and detained for such period as may be necessary, and to cause inoculation to be carried out if advisable.

All animals so detained shall be fed and attended to at the expense of the owner of such animals, and where an animal, so detained, is unclaimed, and remains unclaimed for fifteen days after the recovery of such animal, it shall be lawful for the Government Agent to authorize the sale by public auction of such animal to defray the cost of feeding. The remainder of the proceeds of such sale, if any, shall be paid to the owner if claimed within three months of sale, and if not so claimed, shall be credited to the general revenue. Provided that when such sale is effected within the limits of a local authority, the proceeds of the sale shall be credited to the revenue of the local authority concerned.

5. To consider :—(a) The correspondence with Dr. R. L. Spittel with regard to drainage of premises No. 22A/417, Buller's road.—Considered.

(b) A plan and an estimate of Rs. 13,727·45 from the Acting City Sanitation Engineer for the construction of a special 9-inch sewer in Buller's road and Jawatta road.—Recommended that a sewer be put in at a cost of Rs. 13,727·45.

7. To consider the question raised in connection with the motion of Dr. W. P. Rodrigo, M.M.C., in Council, on July 11, 1923, viz. :—That this Council do adopt the same policy with regard to sewage mains in private lanes, as is now adopted with regard to water mains in such lanes, that is, that the Council do lay the mains and charge the owners of property abutting on the lanes a proportionate rate of the expenditure when they connect their premises to such mains.—Recommended that the resolution of the Council of May 16, 1922, be adhered to.

8. To consider the motion of Dr. W. P. Rodrigo, M.M.C., in Council, on July 11, 1923, "That the Chairman do consult the Law Committee, the Council's lawyers, or other counsel as to who should be compelled to incur the expenses of drainage connections in the case of properties vested in persons who own only a life interest in the property."—In the opinion of the Law Committee the person actually in receipt of the rents for the time being of the premises should be regarded as the owner, and be required to effect the drainage connections.

10. To consider a memorandum of the Financial Assistant dated May 11, 1923, with regard to the form of security bond for butchers using stalls in the Council's markets, and a report of the Secretary thereon.—Recommended that the Butcher's Security Bond be abolished.

13. To recommend under section 18 (4) of Ordinance No. 19 of 1915, street lines for Galle road (Turret road to Laurie's road), as indicated in plan No. 42 dated June 29, 1923, signed by Mr. N. M. Ingram, Municipal Works Engineer.—Recommended that streets lines be not formally declared under section 18 (4) of Ordinance No. 19 of 1915, as the Council can declare street lines whenever necessary, now that the surveys and maps have been completed for the trace in question.

Resolutions.

With regard to item No. 7 (corresponding to item No. 14 of the extracts from the Minutes of the Sanitation Committee of July 30, and item No. 18 of the extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committees on Municipal Works and Finance (meeting together) of August 1, 1923), a discussion arose, initiated by Dr. W. P. Rodrigo, with regard to the recommendation of May 16, 1922, as to the methods of recovery of the cost of connection.

Dr. W. P. Rodrigo moved that this question be referred to the Four Standing Committees. The Hon. Mr. N. H. M. Abdul Cader seconded.—Carried.

Resolved that the recommendations of the Standing Committee with regard to the remaining items be adopted.

Extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Sanitation and Markets of July 13, 1923.

(3) To consider letter No. 138 of May 3, 1923, from the Medical Officer of Health, with regard to the importation and sale of skimmed milk in Ceylon.—Recommended : (a) That the attached by-laws submitted by the Medical Officer of Health be adopted (*vide* Annexure A at the end of these Minutes) ; (b) that Government be approached again to pass the Food and Drugs Ordinance, with the proviso that its adoption by local bodies be optional to them as required.

(6) To consider :—(a) A memorandum of the Chairman dated July 9, 1923, with regard to Municipal laundries ; (b) estimates of the Acting City Sanitation Engineer, as follows : (1) Improvements at Wekande laundry, Rs. 1,200 ; (2) improvements at Blömendahl laundry, Rs. 2,800.—(a) Considered. (10) To consider a memorandum of the Financial Assistant dated June 28, 1923, with regard to the four new boutiques adjoining Kotahena market, recommending the following rents :—No. 1, Kotahena street, Rs. 55 per mensem ; No. 2, Corner of Kotahena street and Bonjean road, Rs. 55 per mensem ; No. 3, Bonjean street, Rs. 50 per mensem ; No. 4, Bonjean street, Rs. 50 per mensem.—Recommended.

(12) To recommend :—(a) One month's leave to Dr. D. W. Perera, Medical Officer, Slave Island Dispensary, commencing from August 1, 1923 ; (b) the appointment of a substitute ; (c) the provision of Rs. 272 for the payment of the substitute in terms of resolution of Council of May 16, 1922.—Recommended (a), (b), and (c).

(14) To consider the question raised in connection with the motion of Dr. W. P. Rodrigo, M.M.C., in Council, on July 11, 1923, viz. :—That this Council do adopt the same policy with regard to sewage mains in private lanes, as is now adopted with regard to water mains in such lanes, that is, that the Council do lay the mains and charge the owners of property abutting on the lanes a proportionate rate of the expenditure when they connect their premises to such mains.—Recommended that the resolution of Council of May 16, 1922, be adhered to.

Resolutions.

With regard to item No. 14, *vide* resolution of Council on page 324 of these Minutes in connection with the recommendation of item No. 7 of the Law Committee of July 28, 1923.

Resolved that the recommendations of the Standing Committee with regard to the remaining items be adopted.

Extracts from the Minutes of the Special Committee re Building of the New Town Hall of July 31, 1923.

(2) To consider the question re Architect's Office :—Recommended that it is very advisable that the Architect's temporary office on the Town Hall site should be retained till the work is finished.—Recommended that the Architect be allowed to use this office, free of charge, if he pays the cost of installing and maintaining the telephone.

(3) To consider a letter dated July 6, 1923, from the Architect regarding his premium of Rs. 5,000 and regarding commission on work completed up-to-date.

It is the opinion of the Committee that the Architect was entitled to be paid the premium as soon as he won first place in the competition.

Recommended that the Architect be paid the sum of Rs. 5,000, the amount to be deducted from his commission later on.

Recommended that the Architect be paid a sum of Rs. 1,920, *i.e.*, two-thirds of his commission on the estimate of Rs. 36,000 for the new road culverts and drains at the Town Hall site, sanctioned by the Council on May 2, 1923.

Recommended that a sum of Rs. 750 be voted for the making of a model of the new Town Hall for the use of the Architect, builders, and of the Building Committee, and Members of Council.

(4) To consider the details regarding advertising for tenders for building the Town Hall after the foundations have been completed.

In the opinion of the Committee it is desirable to save as much time as possible in calling for tenders for the erection of the superstructure.

The Architect stated that he hoped to have all drawings, plans, bills, and quantities ready by the end of September.

Recommended that intending contractors be noticed by advertisement to signify their intention of tendering and that they be requested to remit a sum of Rs. 100 as proof of *bona fides*, the sum to be returned to them on receipt of a *bona fide* tender.

When it is thus discovered who intend to tender it will be possible to ascertain what reproductions of drawings, bills, and quantities, &c., will be needed for the use of intending tenderers, and such information can be given without further delay to those who intend to compete.—Recommended that the advertisement be published in Ceylon, Calcutta, Bombay, Madras, and Singapore.

Resolution.

Resolved that the above recommendations of the Special Committee be adopted.

Extract from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Municipal Works of August 1, 1923.

Senaratne, who proceeded to England on June 4, 1920, to improve his qualifications, to consider :—(a) An application from him stating that if the Council is satisfied with his present qualifications he would return within three months, or if the Council persists on his being an Associate Member of the Institute of Civil Engineers, in addition he may be granted an extension of leave of another year; (b) a report of the Financial Assistant and the remarks of the Chairman on the subject.—Recommended that Mr. O. T. F. Senaratne be informed that the Council is unable to advise him as to the qualifications he should secure, and that unless he returns to take up his post of Sub-Inspector in the Council's service before the end of the current year the post will thereafter be no longer available to him.

Dr. W. P. Rodrigo moved, as an amendment, that the matter be referred to the Four Standing Committees.

Dr. E. V. Ratnam withdrew his motion and seconded the amendment, which was thereupon put to the meeting as the substantive motion and carried.

With regard to item No. 5, Mr. C. H. Z. Fernando opposed the recommendation of the Standing Committees as he objected to the use of this open space for the building of tenements. He moved that the papers be re-circulated and the matter be brought up before the Sanitation Committee. Dr. W. P. Rodrigo seconded.—The Hon. Mr. N. H. M. Abdul Cader supported the motion.

The motion was put to the meeting and carried.

With regard to item No. 13 *vide* resolution of Council on page 324 of these Minutes in connection with the recommendation of item No. 7 of the Law Committee of July 28, 1923.

Resolved that the recommendations of the Standing Committees with regard to the remaining items be adopted.

Clerk in his Department be transferred to the stores, and that Mr. Wijeyeratne be granted an allowance of Rs. 10 per mensem, whilst he is performing the duties at the stores. ANNEXURE A.

Proposed By-laws framed under Section 110 (19) of Ordinance No. 6 of 1910.

Milk.

1. Milk shall be the normal, clean, and fresh secretion obtained by completely emptying the udder of the healthy cow or buffalo properly fed and kept, excluding that got during fifteen days immediately before, and ten days immediately following on, parturition. It shall not contain any foreign substance. It shall contain in the case of a cow not less than eight and five-tenths parts per centum of solids-not-fat, three and five-tenths parts per centum of milk-fat, and twelve parts per centum of total milk solids. It shall contain in the case of a buffalo not less than nine parts per centum of solids-not-fat, seven parts per centum of milk-fat, and sixteen parts per centum of total milk solids.

Cream.

2. Cream shall contain not less than thirty parts per centum of milk-fat. It shall not contain any foreign substance.

Skim or separated milk.

3. Skim or separated milk shall contain in its fat free liquid not less than eight and eight-tenths parts per centum of milk solids.

Condensed or concentrated milk.

4. Condensed or concentrated milk shall be milk condensed or concentrated by the evaporation of a portion of its water content.

Unsweetened condensed or concentrated milk.

5. Unsweetened condensed or concentrated milk shall contain not less than twenty-two parts per centum of milk solids-not-fat, and nine parts per centum of milk-fat.

The addition to concentrated milk of any foreign substance (other than boron compounds in proportion not exceeding 0·25 per cent. calculated as boric acid), is hereby prohibited.

Sweetened condensed milk.

6. Sweetened condensed milk shall contain not less than twenty-two parts per centum of milk solids-not-fat, and not less than nine parts per centum of milk-fat. It shall not contain any foreign substance save sugar.

Labelling.

7. There shall be written on the principal label attached to every package which contains any condensed or concentrated milk, directions for making with its contents milk of composition at least equal to milk as standardized by by-law 1 of these by-laws in the following form :—

“To make milk not below the Colombo standard add (here insert the number of parts) parts of water by weight.”

Provided that the presence of sugar in the contents of any such package when diluted in accordance with such statement shall not be deemed to constitute a contravention of this regulation.

Condensed skim or separated milk.

8. Condensed skim or separated milk shall be skimmed or separated milk from which a considerable proportion of water has been evaporated. It shall not be lawful to sell, offer, or expose for sale condensed skim or separated milk.

Dried milk.

9. Dried milk shall be milk from which the water has been removed by a process of heating, and without the addition of any foreign substance. When it is dissolved in or treated with water in the proportion set out in any label accompanying it, the resulting liquid shall conform with the Colombo standard for milk with respect to total milk solids and milk fat.

Labelling.

10. There shall be written on the principal label attached to every package which contains any dried milk, directions for making with its contents milk of composition at least equal to milk as standardized by by-law 1 of these by-laws in the following form :—

“To make milk not below the Colombo standard add (here insert the number of parts) parts of water by weight.”

**Minutes of Proceedings of a Meeting of the Municipal Council of Kandy, held in the Town Hall, Kandy,
on July 21, 1923, at 8.45 a.m., in accordance with Notice dated July 17, 1923.**

Present :—Hon. Mr. W. L. Kindersley, Chairman; Mr. J. C. Ratwatte; Mr. L. H. S. Pieris; Mr. G. E. de Silva; Mr. A. Vallipuram; Mr. W. D. Perera; Dr. G. P. Hay; Mr. P. M. Bingham; and Dr. R. F. La Brooy.

1. The Minutes of Proceedings of the Meeting held on June 16, 1923, having been previously submitted to the Chairman for his approval, and a copy thereof furnished to each Member, were taken as read and confirmed by the Chairman.

Mr. Perera presented a petition from Mr. S. Halim Deen regarding water service to premises Nos. 99 and 100, Trincomalee street.—Considered, and resolved that the Council adhere to the previous decision of the Chairman.

2. The following documents were submitted :—(a) Statement of receipts and disbursements from close of 1922 to June 30, 1923, on account of the Municipal Fund; (b) Progress report of works brought up to the same date; (c) Health Officer's report for June, 1923; (d) Statements of cases instituted by the several Inspectors and of work done by the Municipal Magistrate during the month of June, 1923.

Resolved that the Statement (a), together with the Minutes of Proceedings of this Meeting, as required by section 83 of the Municipal Councils Ordinance, No. 6 of 1910, be forwarded to the Colonial Secretary for publication in the *Government Gazette*.

3. The following papers were laid on the table :—Reports by the several Inspectors on laundries, bakeries, dairies, standpipes, and house-service taps inspected during June, 1923.

4. Correspondence :—(1) Letter No. 16 of June 29, 1923, from the Hon. the Colonial Secretary, informing that Government is unable to contribute towards cost of repairs to the dredger.—Read. Resolved that a vote for cost of repairs to the dredger be considered with the Budget for 1924.

(2) Letter No. 2,828 of June 12, 1923, from the General Manager of Railway, asking that the rent recovered by the Council on the Rice Store at the Railway Goods Shed in excess of the cost of partitioning the shed be remitted to him.—Read. Resolved that the sum of Rs. 423·36 be refunded.

(3) Letter No. 94 of June 16, 1923, from the Joint Secretary, Kandy Agri-Horticultural and Industrial Show, 1923, asking for a donation in aid of the Show.—Read. Resolved that a grant of Rs. 100 be given under section 45 (i.) of the Municipal Councils Ordinance.

(4) Letter No. E 101 of June 21, 1923, from Mr. P. M. Bingham, asking for Council's permission to meet motor car hire up to a sum not exceeding Rs. 60 per month, incurred on his visits to Hantane for purposes of gauging the water supply available, out of the vote of Rs. 2,000 taken for the purpose.—Read. Resolved that Mr. Bingham be paid his out-of-pocket expenses. Mr. Pieris dissents.

(5) Letter dated July 19, 1923, from the Municipal Electrical Engineer, reporting that the erection of the Storage Battery is complete.—Read.

5. Pursuance to notice Mr. de Silva asked—(1) Why were the accounts relating to the Electricity Department not submitted to the Council Members monthly? (2) Who is responsible for this?

Chairman replied—(1) The delay in obtaining bills from the various firms for goods supplied in spite of frequent reminders is often the cause of the delay in making up the accounts. Revenue accounts and balance sheets have been regularly submitted at meetings, except during the Accountant's absence on sick leave. (2) Nobody.

6. Pursuant to notice Mr. Vallipuram moved—That this Council do address the Public Works Department and the Railway Department with a view to widening of the road leading to the cemetery from the junction at Trincomalee street, and that this Council do take steps to widen the portion of the road belonging to this Council as well as improve the roads and gradients inside the cemetery. Mr. Ratwatte seconded.

On the Chairman's suggestion Mr. Vallipuram withdrew the words "as well as improve the roads and gradients inside the cemetery," and the motion as amended was unanimously carried.

7. Pursuant to notice Mr. Ratwatte moved—That this Council do take immediate steps to improve the market grounds. Mr. de Silva seconded.

The motion was not put to the vote, the mover having agreed to await the report of Mr. MacMillan on the æsthetic improvement of Kandy.

8. Pursuant to notice Mr. Ratwatte moved—That a Committee be appointed to consider the question of starting a propaganda for advertising this town. Mr. Vallipuram seconded.

The motion was unanimously carried, and the following Committee, with power to add to their number, was agreed to :—The Chairman, Dr. Hay, Mr. de Silva, Mr. Pieris, Mr. Perera, the mover, and the seconder.

9. Pursuant to notice Mr. de Silva moved—That the accounts of Electricity Department should be handed over to Mr. Chick from next month to be under his entire control. Mr. Pieris seconded.—Chairman opposed the motion.

Mr. Ratwatte moved as an amendment—That a Special Committee be appointed to consider whether it is possible to hand over the entire control of the Electricity Department accounts to Mr. Chick. Mr. Perera seconded.

Mr. de Silva having withdrawn his motion in favour of the amendment which was carried unanimously, the following Committee was appointed :—Chairman, Mr. de Silva, Mr. Bingham, Mr. Pieris, and the mover and the seconder of the amendment.

10. The following motion, which stood in the name of Mr. de Silva was, with the leave of Council, withdrawn :—
"As it is insanitary to allow people to bathe in the pond near the lake spill, I move that by-laws be framed to prevent the public from bathing in the pond and washing their clothes."

11. Mr. de Silva was to move—That a number of spouts be erected for the use of the public for bathing. With the leave of Council he amended the motion as follows :—That a report be called for from the Medical Officer of Health and the Superintendent of Municipal Works for consideration at the next Meeting as to whether a number of spouts can be erected for the use of the public for bathing. Mr. Vallipuram seconded, and the motion was unanimously carried.

12. To obtain formal sanction to the suggestions submitted to Government with Chairman's letter No. 33 of June 23, 1923, in connection with the Ordinance proposed to enact to further amend the Municipal Councils Ordinance, 1910.—Resolved that the suggestions submitted be approved.

13. Proceedings of the Special Meeting of the Finance Committee held in the Town Hall on February 19, 1923, to consider memorials from certain Municipal Officers.

Chairman moved—That the report be adopted. Dr. La Brooy seconded.

Mr. de Silva opposed the motion, and moved as an amendment—That the report of the Finance Committee be rejected as it has not given due attention to the grievances of the memorialists. Mr. Perera seconded and Mr. Pieris supported.

The amendment was put to the Meeting and lost by 6 to 3.

Ayes.—Mr. de Silva, Mr. Pieris, and Mr. Perera.

Noes.—The Chairman, Mr. Ratwatte, Mr. Vallipuram, Dr. Hay, Mr. Bingham, and Dr. La Brooy.

Chairman's motion was then put to the Meeting and carried by 6 to 3.

Ayes.—The Chairman, Mr. Ratwatte, Mr. Vallipuram, Dr. Hay, Mr. Bingham, and Dr. La Brooy.

Noes.—Mr. de Silva, Mr. Pieris, and Mr. Perera.

14. Report of the Special Committee appointed at the Meeting of Council held on January 20, 1923, to consider whether weekly cash advances should be paid instead of rice issue to the Municipal coolies.

Mr. Pieris moved—that the recommendations in the report be adopted, with effect from August 1, 1923, only as regards coolies drawing 60 cents and under. Mr. de Silva seconded.—Carried.

At this stage Mr. Vallipuram left the Meeting.

15. Auditor's Report for 1922.—Tabled.

16. Estimate from Mr. Bingham for the purchase of pipes out of the Government grant of Rs. 17,365 allowed for increasing the Kandy water supply.—Resolved that the estimate be passed.

17. Recommendations of Standing Committees:—

Standing Committee (C).

(1) That the Head Teacher, Municipal School (Mr. W. S. Herath), be placed on the salary scale of Rs. 624 per annum from January 1, 1923.

(2) That the excesses on votes for 1922 referred to in the Accountant's memorandum of June 15, 1923, be passed.

(3) That the estimate of Rs. 62 for providing three electric lights to the wholesale granary on the market grounds be passed.

Standing Committee (D).

(4) That a vote of Rs. 500 be taken for repairs to the irrigation channel on Lewella road.

(5) That a vote of Rs. 1,188.50 be taken to pay compensation for trees cut and cattle shed demolished on Asgiriya road.

(6) That a vote of Rs. 350 be taken to replace timber, &c., carried away by floods at Halloluwa which were kept there for repairs to the ferry boat.

"Improvements in and relating to wire shoots and the like."

Abstract.—The applicant describes a device for slowing down the motion of a runner and its load on a wire shoot: the device consists in shunting the runner on to a wire rope siding having an upward gradient and means for doing this are described.

The claims are:—

1. In wire shoots and the like, means for gradually arresting the runner and its load at the terminus, comprising a ramp provided with a steadying arm, the said ramp being clamped to the wire shoot; and clamped also to a second divergent wire rope stretched with an up gradient, forming a siding on to which the said ramp shunts the runner and its load.

2. In wire shoots and the like, a ramp to shunt the rubber and its load on to a siding as claimed in claim 1, and further characterized in that a steadying arm projects downwards or outwards whose pendulous motion is limited by the moment of inertia of an adjustable mass adjustably attached near the lower or outer end of it, for the purpose of limiting the range of tilt sideways of the ramp when the rubber with its load is shunted from the wire shoot on to the divergent wire rope forming the said siding.

3. In wire shoots and the like, a siding with an up gradient formed of a wire rope diverging from the wire shoot and connected thereto by a ramp provided with a steadying arm as claimed in the preceding claims as and for the purposes described.

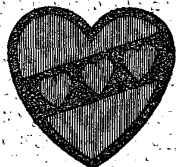
