REGULATION made by the Sanitary Board of the Ratnapura District, under section 9 E (2) of the above-named Ordinance, and approved by His Excellency the Governor in Executive Council.

REGULATION REFERRED TO.

Delete regulation No. 1 of Chapter XII. of the regulations dated February 15, 1921, and published in *Government Gazette* No. 7,163 of March 18, 1921, and substitute therefor:

1. All owners, tenants, or occupiers of lands within the limits of the Sanitary Board shall keep the same clean and free from all refuse, rubbish, rank or noisome vegetation, and from all weeds or vegetation likely to prove prejudicial or injurious to health.

Notes.

Government Agents in their respective Provinces take precedence after Members of the Executive Council and the Puisne Judges.

Chairman of Urban and Rural District Councils will have precedence within their District Council areas immediately after the Assistant Government Agent of the District in which the Councils are situated, or immediately after the Government Agent of the Province if there is no Assistant Government Agent of the District.

His Majesty's Trade Commissioner for India and Ceylon will rank with, but before, Officers of the Second Class,

Ceylon Civil Service.

By established usage Naval, Military, and Royal Air Force Officers not mentioned in the table rank in Ceylon as follows:

Captains of three years' seniority in the Royal Navy, Colonels in the Army, Group Captains and Air Commodores in the Royal Air Force, and Officers of relative rank with, but before, Officers of the Fi st Class, Ceylon Civil Service. Captains of under three years' seniority and Commanders in the Royal Navy, Lieutenat-Colonels in the Army,

Wing Commanders in the Royal Air Force, and Officers of relative rank rank with, but before, Officers of the Second Class, Ceylon Civil Service.

Lieutenant-Commanders in the Royal Navy, Majors in the Army, Squadron Leaders in the Royal Air Force, and Officers of relative rank rank with, but before, Officers of the Third Class, Ceylon Civil Service.

Lieutenants in the Royal Navy, Captains in the Army, Flight Lieutenants in the Royal Air Force, and Officers of

relative rank rank with, but before, Officers of the Fourth Class, Ceylon Civil Service. Sub-Lieutenants in the Royal Navy, Lieutenants in the Army, Flying Officers in the Royal Air Force, and Officers of relative rank rank with, but before, Officers of the Fifth Class, Ceylon Civil Service.

Extracts from the Royal Instructions dated September 11, 1920, relative to the Precedence interse of Members of

the Executive Council:

The Executive Council of the Island shall be composed of the under-mentioned officers, that is to say, the persons for the time being lawfully discharging the functions of Colonial Secretary, Attorney-General, and Government Agent for the Western Province, who shall be styled ex officio Members of the said Council, and such other persons as the Governor in pursuance of Instructions from Us through one of Our Principal Secretaries of State, may from time to time appoint under the Public Seal of the Island.

The Members of the Executive Council shall have seniority and precedence as We may specially assign, and in default thereof, first the ex officio Members in the order in which their several offices are above-mentioned, then other Members according to the priority of their respective appointments, or, if appointed by the same Instrument, according

to the order in which they are named therein.

Extracts from the Ceylon (Legislative Council) Order in Council, 1920, relative to the precedence inter se of Members of the Legislative Council:-Ex officio Members.

(1) The Senior Military Officer for the time being in command of His Majesty's regular troops in the Island if not below the rank of Captain in His Majesty's Army; and

(2) The persons for the time being lawfully exercising the function of the respective offices of-

(b) Attorney-General (c) Controller of Revenue (a) Colonial Secretary

The ex officio Members of the Council shall take precedence of the other Members, and shall rank among themselves in the order in which they are hereinbefore named (except that the Senior Military Officer, if he be below the rank of Lieutenant-Colonel in His Majesty's Army, shall take precedence in the said Council next after the person lawfully discharging the functions of Attorney-General in the Island).

The other Members shall rank amongst themselves in the order of date of their appointment or election, and two or more Members appointed or elected on the same day shall rank in the alphabetical order of their names. Provided always that every such Member re-appointed or re-elected immediately on the termination of his term of office shall take precedence according to the date from which he has been continuously a Member of the Council.

"THE SMALL TOWNS SANITARY ORDINANCE, 1892."

EGULATIONS and table of fees made by the Sanitary Board of the Mullaittivu District, under sections 9 R. (2) and 5 A of "The Small Towns Sanitary Ordinance, 1892," and approved by the Governor in Executive Council.

Regulations referred to.

CHAPTER I. [Section 9 \times (2) (a).]

Time and Place of Meeting and Order to be observed thereat.

1. The ordinary meetings of the Board shall be held on such days and at such time and place as the Board shall from time to time by resolution determine. Any special meeting shall be convened at the discretion of the Chairman, or on Provided that it shall be the written requisition of two members of the Board. lawful for the Board to adjourn any meeting to any other day or hour.

2. For all purposes connected with the Board the precedence and seniority of

the members shall be as follows:

The Ex-officio Chairman.

The members nominated by the Governor in the order in which they have been gazetted.

The Chairman shall preserve order and decide on all disputed points of order.

As soon after the hour appointed for any meeting (whether ordinary or special) as a quorum shall assemble, the member entitled to preside shall take the chair, and the Board shall proceed to business. Should a quorum not be present at the expiration of half an hour from the time appointed for the meeting, the meeting shall stand adjourned, if an ordinary meeting to the day appointed for the next ordinary meeting, or if a special meeting sine die.

Any member desiring to ask a question or to make a motion, unless in the course of discussion or in case of emergency by special leave of the Board, shall give notice of such question or motion either at some previous meeting of the Board, or by notice in writing at least four days before the day on which he intends

to ask such question or make such motion.

6. Every member in giving such notice shall deliver to the Chairman a copy of such question or motion.

7. All questions asked and motions made at a meeting shall be made in the order of the notices thereof, unless the Board shall decide otherwise.

A motion negatived at a meeting shall not again be brought forward until after the expiration of at least three months, and no motion in any way contrary to one passed by the Board at a meeting shall be entertained until after the expiration of the same period.

9. Any member presenting a petition or other communication will be held responsible for its contents being throughout respectful, and no document shall be laid before the Board unless the name and address of the drawer be legibly recorded

- The business of the ordinary meetings of the Board shall be conducted in 10. the following order:
 - (a) The minutes of the preceding meeting shall be read and confirmed after being, if necessary, corrected.

(b) Memorials, petitions, or other communications addressed to the Board shall be laid before the meeting and orders made thereon.

(c) The other business shall be considered in the order set down in the order book

hereinafter mentioned.

An order book shall be kept in which shall be entered and numbered in succession the subjects to be brought under discussion at each meeting.

The clerk shall also keep a minute book, in which the proceedings of the Board shall be entered, and the minutes of every meeting of the Board as entered in the book shall, after they have been confirmed at any subsequent meeting, be signed by the Chairman of the meeting at which they are so confirmed.

The clerk shall lay on the table at each meeting all complaints addressed to the Board, and all reports made by officers of the Board, and notes of any action

taken by the Chairman since the last previous meeting of the Board.

Notice of every special meeting shall be served on each member or left at his residence two days at least before the day of each meeting.

CHAPTER II. [Section 9 E (2) (b).]

Execution of Works, Streets, Roads, and Bridges.

All votes of money for public works shall be made on estimates previously

prepared and approved by the Board.

2. It shall be lawful for any person or persons thereunto authorized in writing by Chairman, between the hours of 7 A.M. and 5 P.M., with all the necessary and proper servants, labourers, workmen, carriages, and animals and other means to enter upon any land adjacent or near to any existing or intended street within the limits of the Board, and there severally to do and perform all acts, matters, and things necessary for the purpose of tracing, measuring, making, working, opening, altering, turning, repairing, clearing, improving, or fencing any street, or for building, excavating, repairing, clearing, or improving any bridge, fence, drain, dam, or ditch thereupon, or in any way connected therewith, or for performing any act, matter, or thing under the provisions of this Ordinance.

3. In the tracing, measuring, making, working, opening, altering, turning, repairing, clearing, or improving any existing or intended street, or building, excavating, repairing, or improving any bridge, fence, drain, dam, or ditch thereupon, or in any way connected therewith, it shall and may be lawful for the person or persons authorized as aforesaid to throw upon any land adjacent or near thereto such earth, rubbish, or materials as it shall or may be necessary to remove from the place of any such work; provided that such earth, rubbish, and material shall be

removed within a reasonable time.

4. It shall be lawful for any person thereunto authorized in writing by the Chairman to make any temporary road through the ground near to any existing or intended thoroughfare during the execution of any work in any way connected therewith; provided such road shall not run over any ground whereon any building stands, nor over an enclosed garden or yard.

5. It shall be lawful for any person thereunto specially authorized in writing by the Chairman to cut and remove and place upon any ground near thereto all trees, bushes, or shrubs, and all leaves or branches, or roots of trees that shall grow in or overhang any thoroughfare, or cause any obstruction or harm thereto, to enter upon any land or premises with such persons, animals, and instruments as may be necessary for the removing of such trees, bushes, shrubs, leaves, branches, or roots.

6. It shall be lawful for any person thereunto authorized in writing by the Chairman, to put up or make fences, hedges, ditches, drains, or banks by the side

of any thoroughfare whenever to him it shall appear necessary.

7. Any person thereunto specially authorized in writing by the Chairman shall have power to make and cleanse all drains, or water-courses, and also to make such bridges as he shall deem necessary for the preservation, improvement, repair, or construction of any road or canal in and through any lands or grounds lying near to such road or canal or intended road or canal.

8. Any officer of the Board thereunto specially authorized in writing by the Chairman shall have power to lay any matter or thing whatsoever upon any road and to allow the same to remain there during the time such road is under repair, and for such time before the repairs are commenced and after the repairs are completed as may be necessary for facilitating the making of such repairs, or for preventing damage to such recently repaired road, but he shall take due and reasonable precaution for preventing danger or injury to persons passing along such road.

9. It shall be lawful for any such person or persons authorized as aforesaid, with the servants, workmen, and labourers employed by or under him, between the hours of 7 A.M. and 5 P.M., with all necessary and proper carriages, animals, and other means, to search for, dig, cut, take, and carry away any water, timber, brushwood, stone, gravel, clay, or any other material whatsoever for the purpose of tracing, measuring, making, working, opening, altering, turning, repairing, clearing, improving, or fencing, or in any way assisting in the tracing, measuring, making, working, opening, altering, turning, repairing, clearing, improving, or fencing any existing or intended street, or of building, excavating, repairing, clearing, or improving any bridge, fence, drain, dam, or ditch thereupon, or repairing any lines or any buildings whatsoever required on or near any such thoroughfare for the use of any officer of the Board employed on any work connected with such street, or any workman, carriages, persons, or things employed in his service in and from any land adjacent or near to any such street and to carry away the same through the ground of any person without being deemed a trespasser; provided that no such material shall be dug for, cut, or taken away upon or from any yard, avenue to a house or lawn or any enclosed garden, plantation, field, or wood without the consent of the owner thereof, unless sufficient material cannot conveniently be obtained from the neighbouring waste land or common or abandoned grounds, in which case the person or persons authorized as aforesaid may take any such material where these can be conveniently procured; provided also that reasonable compensation for all material so taken, and for the damages done by the getting and carrying away the same shall be made to the owner thereof; and provided further, that such person or persons shall rail or fence off any quarries or pits from which any such materials shall be taken, so that the same shall not be dangerous to any person or animal.

10. Any officer of the Board authorized in writing by the Chairman shall have power to make, scour, cleanse, and keep open all ditches, gutters, and drains, or water-courses, and also to make and lay such trunks, tunnels, plats, or bridges as he shall deem necessary for the protection, preservation, improvement, repair, or construction of any street or road, in and through any lands or ground adjoining or

lying near to such street or road, or intended street or road.

11. It shall be lawful for the Chairman, should he deem it necessary, to require, by notice in writing, the owner of any yard or ground adjoining a dwelling house or the owner of any alley to have such yard, ground, or alley paved or levelled in such manner as the Chairman shall direct and to lay sufficient drains or pipes to the nearest town sewer or drain for the purpose of draining such yard, ground, or alley. Such drains or pipes shall be of such material, of such size, of such level, and with such fall, and shall be carried to such point of junction with the said sewer or drain as the Chairman shall appoint; provided that the Board shall supply to such owner

on application, at cost price, the materials necessary for the drains or pipes which he is required to lay. If such owner shall fail to comply with the requirements of such notice within the time appointed, the Chairman and any officer or workmen authorized by him may enter upon the premises and cause the required work to be done, and the cost thereof shall be paid by the owner.

CHAPTER III, [Section $9 \in (2)$ (c).]

Regulation of the Scale and Manufacture of Bread.

1. The flour, water, and other materials used in the manufacture of bread shall be good and wholesome, and it shall be lawful for any person thereto authorized in writing by the Chairman from time to time to demand and obtain a sample thereof.

CHAPTER IV. [Section 9 E(2)(d).]

Establishment and Regulation of Public Markets, Control of Bakeries, Tea and Coffee Boutiques.

1. Whenever it shall be determined by the Board to establish a public market, the Chairman shall give not less than ten days' notice of the time when the same will be opened, and such notice will be published by beat of tom-tom.

2. Whenever a public market for any Sanitary Board town shall have been established by the Board, no person shall hold a private market within the limits

of such town without a license from the Board.

3. All public markets shall be open daily from 6 A.M. to 9 P.M., and it shall be the duty of the Board or its lessee to make provision for the proper lighting of the market.

4. A table of rents and fees leviable at each market by the servants of the Board or by its lessee shall be printed in English, Sinhalese, and Tamil and placed in a conspicuous place at each market, and it shall be unlawful for any person to demand or receive higher sums than those authorized by such notice.

5. The rents and fees leviable at the markets established by the Board shall be

as follows :---

For each square yard of floor space occupied, one cent a day.

6. The several rents and fees payable in respect of a public market shall be paid in advance from time to time on demand to the Chairman of the Board or the lessee, or other persons authorized by the Board or their lessees to recover the same.

7. If any person liable to the payment of any rent or fee authorized as aforesaid, does not pay the same when demanded, the Board or any person authorized by the Chairman of the Board to collect the same may levy the same by seizure and sale of all and any of the articles in the market belonging to, or in the possession or custody of the person liable to pay such rent or fee.

8. No person shall keep or expose for sale in any stall any article, the keeping or sale of which therein shall have been prohibited by notice posted in the market.

or sale of which therein shall have been prohibited by notice posted in the market.

9. No person shall keep or expose for sale in any fish market or stall any provisions or things other than fish or salt fish.

10. No person shall sell or expose for sale in any vegetable or fruit market or stall any meat or fish, whether fresh or salted, or any cooked food or any article of

food other than fresh fruit or vegetables.

11. No occupant of a stall shall enclose in any way any portion of a market, or erect any awning or screen or fixture of any kind, nor shall he leave any goods in any market between the hours of 9 P.M. and 6 A.M. without first having obtained the sanction of the Chairman.

12. Every occupant of a stall, space, or seat in any market shall keep such stall, space, or seat clean and free from filth or rubbish. No person suffering, or who to the knowledge of any person in charge of a public market has recently suffered, from any contagious or infectious disease, or has recently been on attendance on any person suffering from such disease, shall occupy any stall, seat, or place in such public market, or expose for sale thereat any provisions whatsoever.

13. No person using or occupying any portion of a public market shall-

(a) Behave in a disorderly manner or commit any nuisance in or about such market.

(b) Carry on any cooking in any such market.

(c) Remain in or loiter about such market after the place is closed for business at 9 P.M. without being able to give a satisfactory account of himself.

- (d) Damage or in anywise deface any portion of the buildings, stalls, lamps, or any property of the Board in or about such market, or defile or pollute in any way the water provided for use in such market.
- 14. It shall be lawful for the Inspector or Supervisor of the Board, upon the seizure by him as unwholesome or unfit for human food of any meat, poultry, fish, game, flesh, vegetable, fruit, or other article of food introduced into or exposed for sale within the limits of the Sanitary Board, to convey the same to the Medical Officer of the station, or in his absence, or if there be no such officer, to the Magistrate, or in case where there is no Police Court, to the President of a Village Tribunal; and if it appear to such Medical Officer, Magistrate, or President that such meat, poultry, fish, vegetable, fruit, or other provisions are unfit for human food, he shall order the same to be destroyed or to be disposed of so as to prevent their being exposed for sale, or used as food.

15. It shall be the duty of the market-keeper or of the lessee of a market to maintain order within the limits of the market, and every person who shall obstruct or resist any person appointed by the Board to superintend any public market, or to collect the rents or fees, or to enforce order or cleanliness therein whilst in the

execution of his duty, shall be guilty of an offence.

16. Whenever it shall appear to the Board that the use or consumption by the public of any particular kind of fish is injurious, or that during the prevalence of any epidemic the use or consumption of any particular kind of fruit or vegetable is hurtful, it shall be lawful for the Board, on the recommendation of the Medical Officer, by beat of tom-tom or other sufficient notice, to prohibit for such time as to the Board shall appear necessary the sale of any such fish, fruit, or vegetable in any market or other place within the limits of the Board, and after such notice to cause the same, whether exposed for sale or not, to be seized and destroyed in such manner as the Board or Chairman may direct.

No cart or vehicle shall remain within any market premises for a longer

period than is necessary for loading or unloading.

18. No rubbish, refuse, bones, skins of animals, or other articles, likely to be offensive or injurious to the public health shall be deposited in or upon any public market or its premises otherwise than within a covered receptacle provided for such

purpose by the Board.

19. When a slaughter-house has been provided by the Board, no carcase of any animal (or any portion thereof) which has not been slaughtered at the public slaughter-house provided by the Board shall be brought into a public or private market or sold or exposed for sale in any public or private market. The provisions of this by-law shall not apply to frozen meat, game, or fish imported into the Island

B.—General.

(a) No person shall, within the limits of a Sanitary Board town, keep any bakery, eating-house, tea or coffee boutique, or cattle gala without an annual license from the Chairman of the Sanitary Board, which license the Chairman is hereby empowered to refuse to any person failing to comply with any of the following rules. Every such license shall remain in force until December 31 of the year in respect of which such license is issued or until such license is cancelled.

Such license shall further be subject to such fees as the Sanitary Board shall

from time to time determine with the sanction of the Governor in Council.

(b) If any person shall have been convicted twice or oftener by any court of the breach of any of the following rules, it shall be lawful for the court recording such second and subsequent conviction to cancel the license issued to such person under this chapter by the Chairman of the Sanitary Board. Upon such cancellation of a license by a court the Chairman of the Sanitary Board is empowered in his discretion to refuse to issue any fresh license to such person. Provided that these rules shall not apply to stalls in markets established by or vested in any public body.

C.—Bakeries.

- Bakery shall mean any premises on which bread, biscuits, or confectionery are baked for sale as food for man, and also includes any premises on which such food is prepared for baking or on which the materials for preparation of such food are stored.
- Every bakery shall be well ventilated and well lighted, and the walls thereof plastered with lime mortar and whitewashed, the floor cemented, and drainage sufficiently provided.
- 3. The trough and all the utensils used in the making of bread and pastry shall be kept scrupulously clean, and must be capable of being moved about for the purpose of cleaning the floor. No bakery, eating-house, or tea and coffee boutique, shall be within thirty

feet of any cesspit, manure heap, open sewer, or privy.

- 5. Every bakery shall be kept in a cleanly state and free from effluvia arising from any drain, privy, cesspit, or other nuisance.
- All refuse and dirt in or about the premises of a bakery, eating-house, or tea and coffee boutique shall be removed without delay, and the drains kept well flushed.

No place used as a bakery shall be used as a dwelling place or for any other

purpose whatsoever.

It shall be lawful for any member of the Board or other person authorized in writing by the Chairman, at any time to enter and inspect any bakery, eatinghouse, or tea and coffee boutique, provided there is some one in charge of the premises at the time.

No animal shall be kept in the bakery on any pretence whatever.

10. No person suffering, or who to the knowledge of any person in charge of the bakery has recently suffered, from any contagious or infectious disease, or has been recently in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, shall be permitted by any such person in charge of the bakery to enter the bakery or take part in the manufacture or sale in the premises, of bread, biscuits, or confectionery.

11. A copy of these by-laws shall be framed and hung up on a prominent place in every bakery.

D.—Eating-houses, Tea and Coffee Boutiques.

All eating houses and tea and coffee boutiques shall be kept clean and sanitary to the satisfaction of the Chairman.

All utensils, furniture, and other requisites used in or belonging to any eatinghouse or tea or coffee boutique shall always be kept clean.

3. The walls of the eating-houses and tea or coffee boutique shall be plastered and limewashed, and the rooms shall be well ventilated and lighted.

4. No person suffering, or who to the knowledge of any person in charge of the eating-house or tea or coffee boutique has recently suffered, from any contagious or infectious disease, or has been recently in attendance on any person suffering from such disease, shall be permitted by any such person in charge of the eating house or tea or coffee boutique to be employed in or about any such eating-house or tea or coffee boutique.

E.—Galas.

Every licensed gala shall be registered by the Chairman, and a notice board shall be hung up by the licensee at the entrance to every such gala, with the words

Registered Gala No.--, and the name of the owner painted thereon.

2. Every gala or halting place for carts or cattle shall be properly levelled and drained to the satisfaction of the Chairman, and the ground shall either be paved or properly consolidated with broken metal, so that it keeps a hard and level surface. Such gala or halting place shall be kept in a clean and sanitary state, being thoroughly cleaned daily, and all dung and refuse removed daily to such place at a distance from any dwelling houses as the Chairman shall approve. No goods, materials, or substance of any kind shall be deposited upon such gala or halting place in such a manner as to obstruct such daily cleansing.

3. Every stable, cattle stall, or cattle halting place shall be kept in a clean and sanitary state, being thoroughly cleaned daily, and dung and refuse removed daily to such place at a distance from any dwelling houses as the Chairman shall approve.

4. Every gala shall be open for inspection at all reasonable times by the officers of the Board or by any other person thereto authorized in writing by the Chairman. All orders which the Chairman is empowered to make under these by-laws shall be in writing.

CHAPTER V. [Section 9 E (2) (f).]

Offensive Trades.

1. Dangerous and offensive trades shall for the purpose of these rules mean and include any of the following:-

Storage or manufacture of artificial manure, boiling of blood or offal, drying blood or offal, tanning, fat melting, fat extracting, soap making, soaking of coconut husks, fibre dying, coconut oil manufacture (where machinery is employed), manufacture or storing of fibre, storing of hides, bones, artificial manures, or any material for the manufacture of artificial manure, storing of dried fish in quantity over five cwts. in weight, quarrying for metal, cabook, or gravel, the manufacture of bricks and tiles, the burning of lime, the manufacture of ærated waters, storing or curing of plumbago.

No owner or occupier of any land or premises within the limits of the Sanitary Board or other person shall carry on or suffer to be carried on upon such land or premises any offensive or dangerous trade or manufacture without a license from the Chairman of the Sanitary Board, who is further empowered to refuse such license to any person failing to comply with any of these or other already existing Sanitary Board rules. Such licenses shall be subject to such fees as the Sanitary Board from time to time may determine with the sanction of the Governor in Council.

3. If any person shall have been convicted twice or oftener by any court of the breach of any of these rules, it shall be lawful for the court recording such second or subsequent conviction to cancel the license issued to such person under this Chapter by the Chairman of the Sanitary Board. Upon such cancellation of a license by a court, the Chairman of the Sanitary Board is empowered in his discretion to

4. All materials required for the purpose of carrying on any of the aforesaid trades, businesses, or manufactures shall be stored so as to prevent effluvium or nuisance, and all-such materials which have to be brought along any public thoroughfare, and which are likely to be offensive and give off effluvia shall be transported in non-abosorbent covered receptacles, or in such other manner as the Chairman shall direct, so as to obviate the creation of any nuisance.

5. Effective means shall be adopted for rendering innocuous any offensie vapours

or gases emitted during any process of manufacture. Such vapours and gases shall either be discharged into the external air in such manner and at such a height as to admit of their diffusion without injurious or offensive effects, or they shall be passed directly through a fire or into a condensing apparatus. All premises shall be adequately drained, and the drains kept in efficient order and washed daily.

6. Floors shall be maintained in a proper state of repair and cleansed daily, and when so ordered by the Chairman shall be constructed of such impermeable

material as he may direct.

Walls shall be kept in good order so as to prevent the absorption of filth and whitewashed twice annually or oftener, if so ordered by the Chairman of the

Sanitary Board or the Senior Sanitary Officer.

8. All apparatus, including implements and vessels, shall be kept clean, and where possible they shall be cleaned daily. All refuse, sweepings, scrapings, together with waste and dye products, shall be removed daily from the premises in covered receptacles, unless intended to be forthwith subjected to further trade purposes on the premises.

9. Tanks used for washing or soaking skins or any other materials must be

emptied and cleansed as often as may be necessary to prevent effluvia.

10. No person carrying on any offensive trade or manufacture, nor any owner or occupier of any land or premises upon which such offensive trade or manufacture is carried on, shall pollute any river, stream, channel, canal, well, tank, or open piece of water by discharging thereinto, or suffering to flow thereinto any foul, ill-smelling, or offensive water or other fluid, or by throwing thereinto or suffering to be washed thereinto any offensive substance, nor shall he in any other way pollute or contaminate such river, stream, canal, channel, well, tank, or open piece of water.

11. The premises of all afore-mentioned trades shall be open for inspection at all reasonable hours by the Chairman of the Sanitary Board or by any person duly

authorized by the Chairman.

12. The owner or occupier of any land from which clay, earth, stone, gravel, cabook, or other material is cut for the manufacture of bricks or tiles, or for building, or for any other purpose shall be responsible for seeing that proper drainage is provided, and that the pits or trenches cut are afterwards filled so that water cannot stagnate therein.

13. No person shall spread or expose fish for drying except in such place or

places as are approved by the Sanitary Board.

CHAPTER VI. [Section 9 E (2) (i).]

Care of Waste and Public Lands.

1. No person shall remove any sand, earth, stone, or growing plants, or trees from or in any way alter or deface the surface of any waste or public lands without the authority of the Chairman.

CHAPTER VII. [Section 9 E (2) (j).]

Putting up and Preservation of Boundaries.

1. It shall not be lawful for any person or persons to erect, re-erect, repair, add to, or enlarge any building, whether permanent or temporary, or to renew or repair, or alter, or add to, to the frontage of any such building in any way, or to build any drain, or bridge, or platform, or structure, or a drain, or any privy or cesspool, without twenty-one days' previous notice in writing to the Chairman accompanied by details and plans of the work sufficient to show the arrangement proposed in respect of ventilation, drainage, and sanitation. No such building operations shall be commenced without the written permission of the Chairman or until after the expiry of the twenty-one days notice.

Every owner or occupier of any house, garden, building, or land within the town shall keep such house, garden, building, or land surrounded by a wall or good

fence of not less than four feet in height from the level of the ground

3. Whenever any tree or branch or fruit of a tree within the limit of any town shall be deemed after inspection by himself or some person authorized by him to be likely to fall upon any house or building and injure the occupiers thereof, or whenever the same shall overhang any street, it shall be lawful for the Chairman to cause notice in writing to be given to the owner or occupier of the land upon which such tree stands to cut down or remove the said tree or branch or fruit, and if such owner or occupier shall not cut down or remove the same within twenty-four hours after such notice has been served on him, the Chairman or any officer authorized by him in writing, with necessary workmen, may enter upon such land and cause the work to be done, and expenses thereby incurred shall be paid by such owner or occupier, and shall be ascertained and determined and recoverable as a debt due by the owner to the Board.

CHAPTER VIII. [Section 9 E (2) (m).]

Dogs.

1. All stray dogs shall be seized, and if diseased, or suspected of disease, destroyed; otherwise they shall be impounded in a pound provided by the Board, and a sum of 40 cents for the first day of detention and 15 cents for each succeeding day, to meet the expenses incurred by the Sanitary Board, shall be levied from the owner of the dog if he claims it and desires to remove it. Impounded dogs, if not claimed within three days, shall be destroyed.

CHAPTER IX. [Section 9 E (2) (0).]

For regulating the Dimensions of the Houses to be constructed.

- 1. It shall not be lawful for any person to erect a house or hut for the purpose of a dwelling house, or permit the same to be occupied as a dwelling place, within the limits of any town, except under the following conditions:—
 - (a) Every such house or hut or any room therein to be used for human habitation shall not be less than 120 superficial feet in area, and not less than 10 feet in height, and shall have eaves at least six feet from the ground.

(b) Every room to be used for human habitation shall have at least one door not less than six feet by three feet and at least one window not less than three feet by two feet.

(c) When any house or hut has a frontage upon any thoroughfare; the level of the floor of such house or hut shall be at least one foot above the level of such thoroughfare, and the house or hut shall be situated at least four feet from such thoroughfare.

Chapter X. [Section 9 E (2) (r).] .

Prevention of Malaria.

1. Hollow places in compounds or close to dwelling houses shall be filled up or drained so that water may not stagnate in them, and all unnecessary vessels or receptacles of any description lying about the said premises and which are liable to hold or contain water likely to become stagnant shall be removed.

2. It shall not be lawful for any one, without the written permission of the Chairman, to dig hollows or borrow pits in any town, or to excavate earth from any land within the limits of any town, in such a manner as to allow the accumulation of water.

CHAPTER XI. [Section 9 E (2) (t).]

General Conservancy.

1. All owners, tenants, or occupiers of lands within the limits of the Sanitary Board shall keep the same clean and free from all weeds or rank and noisome vegeta-

tion, as well as from all refuse and rubbish.

2. Any person who is desirous that ashes, sweepings, refuse, or other rubbish, from his premises shall be removed by the scavengers of the Board, shall deposit the same in proper covered tubs, boxes, or other like receptacles as the Board may prescribe, at the edge of the road outside his premises, at such hours daily as the Board shall from time to time appoint by notice duly published, and shall remove the said tub, boxes, or other like receptacles within half an hour after the emptying of such tubs, boxes, or other like receptacles by the scavenger. No person shall place ashes, sweepings, refuse, or other rubbish on any street except in such manner as aforesaid, or on any public place other than public dust bins where such are provided.

3. It shall be lawful for the Chairman at any time to require the owner or occupier of any house, building, enclosure, or premises within the limts of the Sanitary Board, by notice in writing to remove or cause to be removed the contents of any privy, pit, or water-closet in or belonging to such house, or building, enclosures, or premises to such place or places, and within such time as shall be set forth in the said notice. Should such owner or occupier fail to comply with the requirements of such notice within seven days from the time when such notice shall have been served upon him, the Chairman may cause the necessary work to be done, and for that purpose shall have power to enter into and upon any such house, outhouse, building, enclosure, or premises with such labourers, implements, and things as may be required, and the expenses incurred shall be recoverable as a debt due by the owner to the Board.

4. The occupier of any house or premises within or upon which any cattle, horse, sheep, or goat, or pig may die shall, within four hours after its death, or if death occurs at night, within four hours after day light, either remove the carcase at his own expense to such place as may be appointed by the Chairman for that purpose, or report its death to the Supervisor or Inspector of the Board, and in such latter case shall pay to the Board the expense of removing or burying the carcase at such rate

as the Chairman shall determine.

5. It shall be lawful for any Inspector or any officer authorized in writing by the Chairman, between the hours of 7 A.M. and 5 P.M., to enter upon any building or premises within the limits of the Board and do all things necessary for the purpose of ascertaining whether such building or premises are kept in a sanitary condition.

6. No person shall deposit any dirt, manure, filth, sweepings, or rubbish of any kind, nor any old bottles, tins, chatties, coconut shells, or other receptacles of any kind capable of holding rain water, on any street, road, or public place, or in any drain of any such street, road, or public place, or in any land or premises in proximity to any dwelling house. Such dirt, manure, filth, sweepings, or rubbish of any kind and any old bottles, tins, chatties, coconut shells, or other receptacles of any kind capable of holding rain water shall be burnt or carried away to a suitable place

approved of by the Chairman.

7. Whenever it shall appear to the Chairman that any ground or premises in the vicinity of any dwelling house is in an insanitary condition by reason of the growing of weeds or rank and noisome vegetation upon it, or by reason of accumulation of manure, filth, or rubbish, or of stagnant water, or of receptacles likely to contain rain water and stagnate lying about, the Chairman may require the owner or occupier of such ground, by notice in writing, to do within a reasonable time to be specified in such notice, such work as is necessary to put the said ground in a sanitary condition. If the owner or occupier shall fail to carry out the said work within the time specified, or if at any subsequent time, he shall again allow the said land to get into such insanitary condition as aforesaid, the Chairman may cause the necessary work to be done, and for that purpose shall have power to enter into and upon such land with such labourers, implements, and things as may be required, and the expenses incurred shall be recoverable as a debt due by the owner to the Board. Provided that nothing in this rule contained shall prevent the Chairman from at any time entering any prosecution under these rules, should he consider such prosecution advisable.

8. It shall be the duty of the owner of every house or hut used for human habitation to keep the same in a state of good repair, unless he proves to the satisfaction of the Chairman that a tenant or occupier has agreed to undertake this duty, in which case the said duty shall fall on such tenant or occupier, as the case may be.

9. Whenever it shall appear to the Chairman that any such house or hut is in such a state of repair that it is in an insanitary condition and prejudicial to the health of the inmates or the neighbours, he may cause a notice in writing to be served upon the owner, tenant, or occupier, as the case may be, whose duty it is to keep such house in good repair, requiring him, within a reasonable time to be fixed in

such notice, to do such work as may be necessary to put the said house or hut into a sanitary state. If such owner, tenant, or occupier shall neglect to do the necessary work within the time fixed, the Chairman may cause the work to be done, and the expenses incurred shall be recoverable as a debt due to the Board by such owner, tenant, or occupier. Provided that no action taken by the Chairman under this rule shall prevent such owner, tenant, or occupier being at any time punished for a breach of rule 8 of this Chapter.

10. It shall not be lawful for any person to ease himself on any thoroughfare, street, road, or path, or any public place whatsoever within the limits of any town other than a public latrine, or a building, or enclosed space which has been set apart

for such purpose.

"THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT ORDINANCE, No. 11 of 1920."

BY-LAWS made by the Matale Urban District Council, under sections 164 and 168 (6) (d) and (e) of Ordinance No. 11 of 1920, approved by the Local Government Board, confirmed by the Governor in Executive Council, and published as required by section 166 (1).

By-LAWS REFERRED TO.

1. It shall be lawful for every mortgagee of any immovable property situate within the District Council area, or for his heirs, or any one of them, or the legal representative of such mortgagee if deceased, to cause any such mortgage to be registered at the office of the Council, and every person holding any such mortgage, and desiring to have it registered, shall either by himself or by his agent furnish the Council with his name and address and with the name and address of the owner or mortgager of the property so mortgaged, together with any other particulars connected with its description or otherwise necessary for the proper identification of the property; and thereupon, and upon the payment of a fee of fifty cents to be paid by such person, the Council shall cause the aforesaid particulars to be entered in a book kept for that purpose in the office of the Council.

2. Every such register shall at all times, during the office hours of the Council, be open to the inspection of any person desiring to have such inspection, on payment

of a fee of twenty-five cents to the Council.

3. In the event of any property concerning which any such mortgage shall have been registered as herein above provided being seized in execution for the recovery of rates, taxes, or charges due to the Council, the Council shall at least fourteen days before advertising such property for sale, post or deliver to the party who shall have registered such mortgage notice in writing of the said seizure, and of the amount of arrears of rates, taxes, or charges for the realization of which such property shall have been seized.

4. It shall be lawful for any such mortgagee, or for his heirs, or any one of them, or for his legal representative to pay to the Council, at any time before the sale of such property seized as aforesaid, all arrears of rates, taxes, or charges, or the arrears in respect of which the seizure shall have been made, due by the owner or mortgagor of such property, and upon such payment being made the property

shall be released from seizure.

"THE BIRTHS AND DEATHS REGISTRATION ORDINANCE, 1895."

WHEREAS by Notification dated July 1, 1899, published in Government Gazette No. 5,629 of July 1, 1899, His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, divided the Central Province of the Island for the purposes of the registration of births and deaths into the divisions specified in Part II. of the schedule to the said notification:

And whereas it is expedient to amend Divisions Nos. 4 and 5 of the Revenue District of Matale:

It is hereby notified that His Excellency the Governor, in exercise of the powers vested in him by section 6 of "The Births and Deaths Registration Ordinance, 1895," as amended by "The Births and Deaths (Amendment) Ordinance, 1900," and with the advice of the Executive Council, has been pleased to amend and alter, with effect from October 1, 1923, the said Divisions Nos. 4 and 5 of the Revenue District of Matale, and in the first column of the schedule hereto more fully described, in the manner specified in the second column of the said schedule.

RULES REFERRED TO.

- 1. Rule 26 of the Rules and Rates for the conveyance of Goods Traffic published by Notification dated October 11, 1907, in *Government Gazette* No. 6,210 of October 11, 1907, is hereby revoked, and the following rule substituted therefor:—
 - 26. Fruits and vegetables in lots not exceeding 56 pounds, from one consignor to one consignee, will be booked by goods trains at goods rates from goods stations above Peradeniya Junction at actual mileage rates to the following passenger stations:—

Hunupitiya, Kelaniya, Kollupitiya, Bambalapitiya, Wellawatta, Dehiwala, Mount Lavinia, Angulana, Lunawa, Kalutara North, Katukurunda, Paiyagala North, and Maggona.

Fruits and vegetables so booked will be conveyed by goods trains to Hunupitiya and Kelaniya, and to the Coast Line stations above named by goods trains as far as Maradana, and from Maradana by passenger trains.

2. Any provision contained in any rule or classification made under "The Ceylon Railways Ordinance, 1902," in any way contrary to the provisions of the said rule 26 as set out above, is hereby repealed.

"THE COLOMBO MUNICIPAL COUNCIL WATERWORKS ORDINANCE, 1907."

I'I is hereby notified that the Municipal Council of Kandy, under the provisions of section 17 of Ordinance No. 18 of 1907, read together with Ordinance No. 12 of 1918, has with the consent of the Governor in Executive Council revoked the exemption from water-rate, notified by Notification dated March 20,1919, in Government Gazette No. 7,005 of March 28, 1919, of the parts of the divisions numbered 1, 3, 4, and 5 of the Kandy Municipality, and defined in the schedule annexed to the said Notification:

STATISTICS. VITAL

Registrar-General's Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended September 22, 1923.

-The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 109 (5 Burghers, 71 Sinhalese, 14 Tamils, 13 Moors, 4 Malays, and 2 Others). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on July 1, 1923, viz., 250,431) was 22 7, as against 27 5 in the preceding week, 28 6 in the corresponding week of last year, and 27.9 the weekly average for last year.

Death.—The total deaths registered were 164 (3 Europeans, 8 Burghers, 95 Sinhalese, 25 Tamils, 28 Moors, 2 Malays, and 3 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 34·1, as against 31·9 in the previous week, 25·1 in the corresponding week of last year, and 31·2 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 164 total deaths, 37 were of infants under one year of age, as against 38 in the preceding week, 25 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 33 the average for last year.

Stillbirths.—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 7.

Principal Causes of Death.—1. (a) Twenty-eight deaths from Phthisis were registered, 12 in Maradana hospitals (including 6 deaths of non-residents), 4 in Slave Island, 3 each in Kotahena North and Kollupitiya, and 2 each in St. Paul's, and 2 each in St. Pa San Sebastian, and Kotahena South, as against 15 in the previous week, and 12 the weekly average for last year.

(b) Four deaths of residents of Colombo town occurred at the Ragama hospital from Phthisis during the week.

2. (a) Thirteen deaths from Pneumonia were registered, 4 in Maradana hospitals (including 2 deaths of nonresidents), 2 each in Kotahena North, Maradana North, and Maradana East, and 1 each in St. Paul's, Kotahena South, and Maradana South, as against 8 in the previous week, and 22 the weekly average for last year. (b) Three deaths from Influenza were registered, 2 in St. Paul's and 1 in Kotahena South, as against 7 in the previous week, and 6 the weekly average for last year.

(c) Two deaths from Bronchitis were registered, I each in Maradana East and Maradana South, as against 3 in the previous week, and 4 the weekly average for last year.

3. Seven deaths from *Plague* were registered, 4 in Maradana hospitals, 2 in Slave Island, and 1 in Maradana North, same as in the previous week, and against 2 the weekly average for last year.

Six deaths from Enteric Fever were registered, 3 in Maradana hospitals (including 1 death of a non-resident),

4. Six deaths from Enteric Fever were registered, 3 in Maradana hospitals (including I death of a non-resident), 2 in San Sebastian and 1 in Slave Island, as against 4 in the previous week, and 4 the weekly average for last year.

5. Ten deaths were registered from Infantile Convulsions, 10 from Debility, 8 from Enteritis, 6 from Dysentery, 4 from Worms, 3 from Diarrhæa, 1 from Puerperal Septicæmia, and 63 from Other Causes.

6. Fourteen cases of Enteric Fever, 12 of Measles, 8 of Chickenpox, and 8 of Plague were reported during the week as against 13, 5, 13, and 5, respectively of the preceding week.

State of Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 80.4°, against 80.9° in the preceding week and 80.8° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29.875 in., against 29.841 in. in the preceding week and 29.882 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 2.81 in., against 2.52 in. in the preceding week and 0.14 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.

MUNICIPALITY OF KANDY.

Minutes of Proceedings of a Meeting of the Municipal Council of Kandy, held in the Town Hall, Kandy, on August 18, 1923, at 8.30 a.m., in accordance with Notice dated August 14, 1923.

Present:—Hon. Mr. W. L. Kindersley, Chairman; Mr. J. C. Ratwatte; Mr. L. H. S. Pieris; Mr. Geo. E. de Silva; Mr. A. Vallipuram; Mr. W. D. Perera; Dr. G. P. Hay; Mr. P. M. Bingham; and Dr. R. F. LaBrooy.

1. The Minutes of Proceedings of (1) the General Meeting of Council held on July 21, 1923, (2) the Meeting of the Special Committee appointed to consider whether it is possible to hand over the entire control of the Electricity Department accounts to Mr. Chick held on August 3, 1923, and (3) the Meeting of the Special Committee appointed to consider the question of the abolition of the poll tax held on August 3, 1923, having been previously submitted to the Chairman for his approval and copies thereof furnished to each Member, were taken as read and confirmed by the Chairman.

- The following documents were submitted:-
- Statement of accounts from close of 1922 to July 31, 1923, on account of the Municipal fund.

(b) Progress report of works brought up to the same date.

Health Officer's report for July, 1923.

Statements of cases instituted by the several Inspectors and of work done by the Municipal Magistrateduring the month of July, 1923.

(e) The reservoir readings for July, 1923.

Resolved that the statement (a), together with the Minutes of Proceedings of this Meeting, as required by section 83 of, "The Municipal Councils Ordinance, No. 6 of 1910," be forwarded to the Colonial Secretary for publication in the

While considering the monthly statement of accounts, Mr. Ratwatte, with the permission of Council, moved—that a vote of thanks be passed to Mr. Chick and his staff for their services in connection with the erection of the storage battery. Mr. de Silva seconded, and the Chairman supported. The motion was put to the Meeting and unanimously carried.

- 3. The following papers were laid on the table:—Reports by the several Inspectors on laundries, bakeries, dairies, standpipes, and house-service taps inspected during July, 1923.
- 4. Correspondence:—(1) Letter No. 18 of July 24, 1923, from the Hon. the Colonial Secretary informing that His Excellency the Governor in Executive Council, has approved of the amendment to by-law relating to slaughter-house -Read.
- (2) Letter No. 19 of July 24, 1923, from the Hon. the Colonial Secretary, informing that His Excellency the Governor in Executive Council has sanctioned the increase of the vote for upkeep of the Free Library from Rs. 1,800 to Rs. 2,400.-
- (3) Letter No. 20 of July 31, 1923, from the Hon the Colonial Secretary, approving of the purchase of pipes with

the grant of Rs. 17,365 allowed for increasing the sources of water supply.—Read.

(4) Letter No. 5,210 of July 20, 1923, from the Superintendent of Police, Central Province, re speed of motor lorries.—

Resolved that the speed of motor lorries be fixed at 8 miles an hour.

- (5) Letter No. 1,944A of July 28, 1923, from Mr. H. F. Macmillan, informing that he will furnish a report on the asthetic improvement of Kandy as early as possible.—Read.
- 5. Pursuant to notice, Mr. G. E. de Silva asked—(1) Who is responsible for making Lady Blake's drive unfit for vehicular traffic?
 - (2) Who authorized the putting up of mud on the road instead of gravel?

(3a) How long has the Mahaiyawa playground been under construction? (3b) How many years does the Council intend taking to complete the work?

(4) When does the Council intend obtaining the lawn mower to Bogambra grounds which had been sanctioned?

(5) How much money is spent yearly on the maintenance of Bogambra grounds?

Mr. de Silva explained that question (1) referred to the section of the road between the quarry and the Getambe end, and question (2) referred to Lady McCallum's drive.

Chairman replied as follows:—(1) This section of the road is in charge of the Public Works Department. I shall address the Provincial Engineer on the subject.

(2) Mud has not been placed.

(3a) An estimate was sanctioned in 1920 to fill up the low-lying ground between Lady Anderson's road and Katugastota road with ash from the incinerator at Mahaiyawa, and to cover it over with earth and ultimately convert the land into a playground. There was originally no intention of hurrying the work as it afforded a convenient way of getting rid of the ash and unburnt rubbish and a cheap method of filling the ground. In deference, however, to the wishes of certain members, an estimate was sanctioned this year for filling the rest of the land with earth, and to complete the playground.

(3b) It is expected to complete the work this year. The rain since June has held up the work.

(4) Vote taken for the purpose, Rs. 500, is insufficient for the purchase of a suitable roller. I shall bring up the question with next year's Budget.

(5) On an average Rs. 750 per annum.

- 6. Pursuant to notice, Mr. G. E. de Silva moved—Some of the palm trees round the lake being old and dangerous, that all such trees be cut down. Mr. Pieris seconded. It was agreed to refer the proposal to Mr. MacMillan for report.
- 7. Pursuant to notice, Mr. de Silva moved—(a) That the Superintendent of Works be called upon to give an estimate to construct cement drains round the esplanade; (b) to build up a parapet wall along Ward street between the main road and the lake bund. Mr. Pieris seconded.—Carried.
- 8. Mr. de Silva was to move—That the maintenance of all Municipal roads should be given on contract from next

With the leave of Council the motion was amended as follows:—That tenders be called for the maintenance of the following roads for 1924:—(i.) Alutgantota and Lady Anderson's roads; (ii.) Udawattekëlle roads; (iii.) Halloluwa, Bahirawakanda, and Hospital roads; (iv.) Lady Blake's drive; (v.) Lady McCallum's drive. Mr. Ratwatte seconded.—

9. Recommendations of the Special Committee appointed to consider whether it is possible to hand over the entire control of the Electricity Department accounts to Mr. Chick:—

That the procedure laid down in Council's resolution No. 13 of May 20, 1922, for working of the financial side of the Eelectricity Department be modified in the following respects with effect from September 1, 1923:—(1) That all bills be made out and served by the Electricity Department; (2) That all recoveries thereon be made by the Electricity Department and collections deposited daily at the Mercantile Bank to the credit of the Municipal fund; (3) That the Engineer be allowed a petty cash imprest of Rs. 1,000 renewable as needed; and (4) That there be no alteration of staff or salaries of any Officer of the Council as a result of these changes. Resolved that the recommendations be adopted.

10. Recommendations of Standing Committees:-

Standing Committee A.

(1) That the draft notification under section 17 of Ordinance No. 18 of 1907, defining parts of the Municipal area exempt from the payment of water-rate be approved, with effect from October 1, 1923.

Standing Committee B.

(2) That a permanent watcher be kept and an additional watcher during perahera to prevent nuisances being committed at the completed back lane.

Standing Committee C.

(3) That the employment of a substitute at Rs. 2 50 per diem for Mr. Kulasekera, License Clerk, on sick leave, be approved.

(4) That the payment of Rs. 195.75 to Messrs. Liesching & Lee being their fee for drawing up the deed of mortgage of Municipal rates and taxes in connection with the overdraft obtained from the Mercantile Bank, Kandy, be approved.

(5) That the payment of Rs. 28.87 to Mr. M. Vanderwall, Notary Public, being his fee for drawing up the deed of release of the Electric Installation, be approved.

(6) That the payment of Rs. 3 25 to Mr. I. M. Leitan, being his fee for translating by-laws, be approved.

(7) That the arrears of rent and taxes on account of 1922 on the Katugastota toll house, amounting to Rs. 136 08 be waived, as the premises were not used by the lessee.

(8) That the estimate of Rs. 95 for providing electric lights for four retail rice depôts on the market grounds be

approved.

(9) That an annual grant of Rs. 240 be given to the Palle Mahaiyawa Girls' School under section 45 (j) of the Municipal Councils Ordinance on condition that the school is registered as a Government Grant-in-aid School within twelve months of payment of the first grant.

(10) That A. Z. A. Jaldin, Overseer, Rat Destruction Campaign, be given biennial increments on Rs. 60 on his

present salary up to a maximum of Rs. 540 per annum, with effect from January 1, 1923.

(11) That a further overdraft of Rs. 15,000 be obtained from the Mercantile Bank at 8 per cent. per annum, interest to be cleared on or before October 31 next, on the authority of the Colonial Secretary's letter No. 17 of May 31, 1922, to the Chairman, Municipal Council.

Standing Committee D.

(12) That the estimate of Rs. 3,900 for extending the Municipal Free School building be passed, and that the vote of Rs. 3,900 taken in the Budget for a school at Lewella (item 29, page 16 of Budget, 1923) be appropriated for this extension. (13) That the estimate of Rs. 240 for laying water service to Roseneath Bungalow be passed.

(14) That the following application for water service be allowed:—No. 45, Castle Hill street, James Senanayake.—

Resolved that the recommendations 1 to 11 and 13 and 14 be adopted.

As regards item 12, Mr. de Silva moved as an amendment that the transfer of the vote be sanctioned on condition

The Council undertake to provide a like sum in the Budget for 1924 for a school at Lewella. Mr. Perera seconded.

The amendment was put to the Meeting and lost by 6 to 3. Ayes:—Mr. Pieris, Mr. de Silva, and Mr. Perera.

Noes:—The Chairman, Mr. Ratwatte, Mr. Vallipuram, Dr. Hay, Mr. Bingham, and Dr. La Brooy.

The Standing Committees recommendation was then put to the Meeting, and carried by 6 to 3. Ayes:—The Chairman, Mr. Ratwatte, Mr. Vallipuram, Dr. Hay, Mr. Bingham, and Dr. LaBrooy.

Noes:—Mr. Pieris, Mr. de Silva, and Mr. Perera.

Improvements relating to direct cooling of goods.

Abstract.—The applicant states that the entrance of salt into the goods to be frozen and injury of the sectional surfaces is prevented and that the amount of refrigerating liquid is reduced by the use of a combined solution of a salt and an organic substance, preferably common salt and glycerine.

The claims are --

- 1. A process for refrigerating or freezing goods by direct treatment with a cooling liquid consisting in subjecting the goods to the direct action of a cooled solution of one or more inorganic salts and one or more organic matters.
- 2. A process for refrigerating or freezing goods by direct treatment with a cooling liquid consisting in cooling a solution of one or more inorganic salts and one or more organic matters down to a temperature below the freezing point of the salt-solution and subjecting the goods to the direct action of said cooled solution.
- 3. A process for refrigerating or freezing goods by direct treatment with a cooling liquid, consisting in subjecting the goods to the direct action of a solution of salt and organic matter, cooling the said liquid below the freezing point of the salt solution and without the formation of ice, and maintaining the said solution below said point during its absorption of heat from the goods.

4. The herein described process for refrigerating or freezing of goods, consisting in cooling a solution of salt and organic matter below the freezing point of the salt solution and after its temperature has been raised by the absorption of the heat of the goods, recooling the solution below said point for subsequent use.

A prophylactic apparatus adapted to cure Broncho-Pulmonary and Nose troubles in domestic animals.

Abstract.—The applicants describe a bridle for veterinary use in which are provided devices for the administration of medicine in the form of liquid, and spray and also in the form of a masticatory paste. Arrangements are also described for bathing or spraying the nose, mouth, and throat.

The claims are :—

- 1. A means for using compressed air supplied by a blower, air-pump or similar arrangement for the treatment of complaints in animals or for applying medical precautions therefor, the air passing through pipes or tubes which connect the blower or the like with one, or more receptacles (which contain the physic to be administrated as a beverage, inhalation; or wash for throat, mouth, palate, or nasal channels) and forcing the contents of said receptacles through suitable apparatus into the mouth, throat, or nostrils of the animals.
- 2. For use in the treatment of complaints in animals or for taking medical precautions a device (13) consisting of a perforated receptacle adapted to contain solid physic which will gradually dissolve by the action of the saliva or the breathing of the animal, said receptacle being connected by suitable harness or means to be fastened in the mouth of the animals.
- 3. For the treatment of complaints in or for taking medical precautions with animals a tube (17) with a knob or bulb thereon which may be attached to or used in combination with the device as claimed in Claim 2, and which is connected to containers by tubes and connecting pieces, and serves to secure the swallowing of the liquids held in the containers and ejected therefrom by compressed air.
- 4. A means similar to that claimed in Claim 3, but wherein the tube terminates in a perforation bulb for bathing the throat of the animal.
- 5. For use with apparatus for the purpose herein described a curved tube (15) having a shape similar to that of the arch of the palate, with various perforations therein, and communicating with the containers by means of suitable connections serving for the purpose of washing the mouth and palate.*
- 6. For use with apparatus for the purpose herein described a tube (6a) fitted to the containers and terminated in perforated bulbs for the purpose of inserting into the nostrils and spraying the passages thereof on pressure being applied by means of blower or air-pump.
- 7. The disposition and arrangement of the tubes of the bridle forming a prophylactic apparatus, wherein one connection permits one to feed the bulb for administering beverages or bathing the throat, whilst another connection serves for administering palate and gums washes, in combination with the masticatory device to which two wings are fitted to define its location, as and for the purpose described with reference to the accompanying drawings.
- 8. In a prophylactic apparatus as cl imed in Claim 7, the screwed adjustment on the lateral prolongations of the tubes that form the bridle whereby the lateral buckles or wings may be adjusted according to the size of the animal's head, substantially as described.
- 9. In a prophylactic apparatus as claimed in 6 or 7, the improvements in the bulb for applying throat washes or for administering drinks, which improvements consist in having a semi-spherical rotary cap that admits at will of the ejection of the liquid by a large orifice or by various smaller orifices from the same bulb.

"System of operating fluid for prime movers."

Abstract.—The applicant describes in improvement in the process of operating steam or the like engines. He states that in the ordinary process of steam raising part of the heat is used in raising the water to its boiling point, part in overcoming the latent heat of vaporization and part in superheating the steam. He states that it is advantageous to decrease the proportion of the heat used in the second stage and that this can be done by operating at higher pressures because the latent heat decreases as the pressure (and therefore the boiling point) rises. At high pressures and boiling points however the densities of the water and steam become closer and this causes "priming" in the narrow tubes which have to be used. The difficulty can be overcome by operating at or above the critical temperature and pressure of the fluid used: there is then no ebullition, the change from liquid to gas is continuous and a large temperature drop can be obtained.

The claims are :-

- 1. Improved process for power production which consists in circulating the working fluid through a prime mover in a closed cycle, the characteristic of which is that during the heat reception process the pressure in the generator is maintained above the critical pressure and the temperature of the fluid is raised up to or above the critical temperature.
- 2. Improved process for power production which consists in heating a fluid in a closed cycle, the pressure in the heat generator being maintained above the critical pressure, so that ebullition cannot occur however high the temperature is raised.
- 3. Improved process for power production which consists in heating a fluid in a generator, the pressure being maintained so high as to prevent dissociation of the working fluid at the temperature employed or to render negligible the amount of such dissociation.
- 4. Improved process for power production which consists in heating the working fluid in a generator in which the pressure under normal load conditions is maintained so high as to prevent it from falling below the critical pressure under fluctuating load conditions.

- 5. Improved process for power production as claimed above in which the generator is provided with a pressure storage device, which becomes operative for the maintenance of the pressure above the critical pressure in the event of a sudden demand for power.
- 6. Improved process for power production which consists in heating the working fluid under pressure in a rubular heat generator up to the critical temperature, then adding further heat, then expanding it through a prime mover, exhausting it into a condenser, and finally returning the condensate to the generator.
- 7. Improved process for power production which consists in heating the working fluid at constant pressure up to or beyond the critical temperature, then expanding the fluid through a throttle or the like with the further addition of heat to maintain the temperature of the fluid substantially constant during expansion, then passing the fluid through the prime mover, condensing, and finally returning the fluid to the generator in a closed cycle.
- 8. Improved process for power production as claimed in Claim 7 in which heat is added to the working fluid during expansion in the prime mover or at any stage or between stages in the expansion of the working fluid through the prime mover, substantially as described.
- 9. Improved process for power production which consists in heating the working fluid at constant pressure up to or beyond the saturation temperature, then expanding the fluid through a throttle or the like with the further addition of heat to maintain the temperature of the fluid substantially constant during expansion, then passing the fluid through the prime mover, condensing, and finally returning the fluid to the generator in a closed cycle.
- 10. Improved process for power production which comprises heating processes B D or B L or combination processes B D E or B N E, or process B E with expansion in the prime mover either along D G or L M or E M, substantially as described with reference to the accompanying diagram.
- 11. Improved combined expansive process for power production in which two or more working fluids are employed together or separately, substantially as described.
- 12. In the combines expansive process claimed in Claim 11 arranging the fluids so that the heat of one working fluid shall be maintained or increased by the addition of part of the heat of the other fluid or fluids, substantially as described.
 - 13. An improved process of producing steam, substantially as described.
 - 14. A process of producing a substitute for steam, substantially as described.

"Improvements in or relating to apparatus for power production."

Abstract —The applicant describes an apparatus for circulating the working fluid in a closed cycle, heating to a temperature above the critical temperature at a pressure above the critical pressure, operating prime movers by the expansion of this fluid, condensing the fluid and returning it to the heater.

The claims are :--

1. An apparatus for circulating the working fluid through a prime mover in a closed cycle and heating and superheating the same in a generator in which the pressure is maintained above the critical pressure of the working fluid.

2. An apparatus as claimed in Claim 1 in which the temperature of the working fluid is raised above its critical temperature.

- 3. An apparatus for continuously heating and superheating the working fluid at a pressure higher than the critical pressure and to a temperature higher than the critical temperature, operating prime movers by the kinetic energy of the working fluid, condensing the fluid in a condenser and returning same to the heating apparatus for continuous re-use in a closed cycle.
- 4. In apparatus of the kind set forth the provision of an elastic resistance to the varying pressure in the system which consists of a spring loaded accumulator or a compressed air or gas reservoir or the like.
- 5. An apparatus as claimed in Claims 1, 2, 3, and 4 in which the various organs are automatically controlled by the prime mover governor, substantially as described.
- 6. An apparatus for continuously heating and superheating the working fluid circulated in a closed cycle in which the working fluid is superheated at nearly constant temperature by expansion through a throttle or the like at or near the maximum temperature in the cycle and by simultaneous heating in the heat generator itself, between the heat generator and the prime mover or during expansion in the latter, substantially as described.
- 7. In apparatus of the kind set forth for producing motive power of high temperature and pressure in a closed cycle, the construction of heating apparatus having tubes or the like of more than one material and in more than one part, said parts and materials autogenously welded together to withstand extreme and differing pressures and temperatures at their various parts and to retain the motive fluid or fluids in a closed cycle.
- 8. In apparatus of the kind set forth for producing motive power fluids at high temperature and pressure in a closed cycle, the construction of heating apparatus consisting of multiple coils in parallel in which each coil is fed by a separate pump and each delivery pipe is fitted with a spring loaded accumulator or the like, substantially as described.
- 9. Apparatus for continuously heating and superheating a plurality of fluids or vapours each in a closed cycle at a pressure above their critical pressure and to a temperature in excess of their critical temperature, expanding these through separate prime movers and condensing them in condensers in such manner that the heat liberated on the condensation of any one fluid is absorbed by any other of the fluids returning the said fluids on condensation to the heating apparatus for continuous re-use in a closed cycle, substantially as described.
- 10. Apparatus for continuously heating and superheating a plurality of fluids or vapours each in a closed cycle at a pressure above their critical pressure and to a temperature in excess of their critical temperature, mixing these in a combining nozzle expanding the mixed fluid in a prime mover, condensing and separating the fluids and returning them to the heating apparatus for continuous re-use in a closed cycle, substantially as described.
- 11. In apparatus of the kind set forth the provision on the turbine shaft of one or more dynamos for the production of electric current for the control of the apparatus as set forth.
- 12. In apparatus of the kind set forth where the feed pump is driven direct by the prime mover, the provision of a bypass and valve on the delivery side of the pump, the opening and closing of the valve being controlled by the pressure in the system, substantially as described.
