*Division No. 1.*—North, the Nilwala-ganga; west, the Nilwala-ganga; south, the sea; east, a line drawn from the sea to the Nilwala-ganga along the centre of Elliott road.

*Division No. 2.*—North, the Nilwala-ganga; west a line drawn from the sea to the Nilwala-ganga along the centre of Elliott road; south, the sea; east, a line from the sea to the Eliyakanda Wesleyan Mission (Vernacular) School, the line being a continuation of the direction of the Eliyakanda-Meddawatta road, thence the western edge of the Eliyakanda-Meddawatta road, thence a line at right angles to the Tangalla road to a distance of 700 feet north of the Tangalla road, thence in a westerly direction a line to the Nilwala-ganga, crossing the Kekunadura and Naimana roads at points respectively 700 feet from the Tangalla road.

*Division No. 4.*—North, the centre line of the road leading westwards from a point on the Hakmana road 150 feet south of the Kitulawala iron bridge to the Nupe canal; west, the Nupe canal; south, the Nilwala-ganga; east, the centre line of the Hakmana road from a point 150 feet south of the Kitulawala iron bridge to the Nilwala-ganga.

*Division No. 5.*—North, the trace of the road running from the Nupe canal to the  $\frac{3}{4}$  milepost on the Akuressa road; west, the centre line of the Akuressa road from the  $\frac{3}{4}$  milepost to its junction with the Old Galle road, thence eastwards along the centre line of the Old Galle road as far as its junction with Temple road, thence along the centre line of Temple road and Paramulla road to the sea; south, the sea; east, the Nupe canal and Nilwala-ganga.

*Division No. 6.*—North and west, the centre line of the Akuressa-Matara road from the  $\frac{3}{4}$  milepost to a point 270 feet south of that post, thence by the eastern edge of the Gansabhawa road southwards to the 1st milepost on the Matara-Welegoda road, thence westwards along the southern edge of the latter road to a point 550 feet from the 1st milepost thereon, thence southwards along the eastern edge of the Gansabhawa road as far as the 98 $\frac{1}{4}$  milepost on the Galle-Matara main road, thence along the southern edge of the latter road westwards as far as the 98th milepost, thence a straight line southwards at right angles to the road as far as the Talanwila canal, thence along the southern bank of the canal westwards as far as the Polhena cross roads, thence southwards along the eastern edge of the latter road as far as its junction with the Madhiya-Polhena road, thence a line to the sea at right angles to the latter road; south, the sea; east, the centre line of the Akuressa road from the  $\frac{3}{4}$  milepost to its junction with the Old Galle road, thence eastwards along the centre line of the Old Galle road as far as its junction with Temple road, thence along the centre line of Temple road and Paramulla road to the sea.

## "THE VEHICLES ORDINANCE, No. 4 OF 1916."

BY-LAWS made by the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, under section 18 of "The Vehicles Ordinance, No. 4 of 1916," for the town of Kalutara, in the District of Colombo, Western Province, within the limits set out and defined in Schedule A.

*By-laws framed under Section 18 of "The Vehicles Ordinance, No. 4 of 1916."*

1. No person shall pull or draw a jinrickshaw for hire unless he holds a license from the Chairman, Local Board, Kalutara. The license shall be in force from the date of its issue until December 31 next following. It shall contain the licensee's name in full and the licensed number, his nationality, the print of his left thumb, and any other particulars which may ensure his complete identification. Every such licensee shall wear in a conspicuous place on his left arm a metal badge bearing his licensed number to be provided by the Board.
2. It shall be lawful for the Chairman to refuse to grant a license to any applicant, or to cancel, withdraw, or suspend any license granted by him, for such grounds as to him may seem reasonable.
3. Every person pulling or drawing a jinrickshaw for hire shall at any time when required to do so by an officer of police not below the rank of Sub-Inspector, or by any officer of the Board, furnish proof of his identity by producing his license, and by allowing the impression of his thumb to be taken in such manner and at such places as the said officer may require.
4. It shall be the duty of every person pulling or drawing a jinrickshaw for hire to produce his license immediately for inspection when required to do so by any person who employs him for hire.
5. The number painted, branded, cut, or stamped under section 10 (1) of the Ordinance No. 4 of 1916, on any licensed jinrickshaw shall not be defaced or covered or concealed from view in any way whatever, and the owner or the person licensed to pull any licensed jinrickshaw, the painted, branded, cut, or stamped number of which is defaced or covered or concealed from view, shall be guilty of an offence.
6. (1) Any owner of a licensed jinrickshaw who shall suffer it to be pulled or drawn by any other than a licensed person; or  
(2) Any person who shall pull or draw a licensed jinrickshaw without having obtained a license, or after it has been cancelled, withdrawn, or suspended, or its renewal refused, shall be guilty of an offence.
7. The Chairman may from time to time appoint places as public stands for unengaged licensed jinrickshaws and separate public stands for engaged licensed jinrickshaws and may at any time by notice abolish or alter the situation of any such public stand.
8. Except for the purpose of setting down or taking up passengers the person licensed to pull a licensed jinrickshaw shall not at any time cause or suffer the same to stand in any street, other than a place appointed as a stand for licensed jinrickshaws, or to loiter in any street nor shall he obstruct any other person licensed to pull any licensed jinrickshaw in taking up or setting down any person, or wilfully, or wrongfully, or forcibly prevent or endeavour to prevent any other person licensed to pull any licensed jinrickshaw from taking a fare.

REGULATIONS REFERRED TO.

1. For the purposes of these regulations the proper authority shall be the Principal Civil Medical Officer and Inspector-General of Hospitals, the Sanitary Commissioner, or any officer authorized by either of them in writing.
2. The owner, occupier, or lessee of every building shall when notified in writing by the proper authority, provide latrine accommodation sufficient for the use of the occupants of the said building to the satisfaction of such proper authority within a period of two months from the date of such notification.
3. The proper authority shall have the right to order the demolition or alteration of any pit, trench, or other latrine already in use on any land which shall, in his opinion, be a nuisance or likely to become a nuisance, or be dangerous or likely to be dangerous to the health of any person or persons residing or employed in the neighbourhood.
4. Every latrine built after these regulations shall come into force, whether on orders of the proper authority under the preceding regulation or otherwise, shall be built on a site to be approved by the proper authority and in accordance with plans to be approved by the proper authority. (Type plans may be had from the proper authority or the Sanitary Inspector of the district).
5. Every latrine shall be at all times kept in a clean and sanitary state and in a good state of repair, and the owner, occupier, or lessee of the building which the latrine serves shall cause to be carried out within the time to be allowed by the proper authority any alterations, repairs, additions, or other requirements directed by the proper authority which the proper authority may deem to be necessary for the purpose of abating any nuisance arising or likely to arise from the faulty condition or control of such latrine.
6. The night soil from latrines shall be disposed of in such manner and at such place as shall be fixed by the proper authority.
7. It shall be the duty of every householder to take every precaution to secure the effective operation of these regulations.

## BY-LAWS REFERRED TO.

1. No animals intended for slaughtering shall be kept or left at the place of exposure for more than forty-eight hours, and no animal shall be placed in or removed from such place of exposure except in the presence of an officer duly authorized by the Chairman of the Local Board.
2. No animals shall be slaughtered at the said slaughter-house except between the hours of 7 and 9 A.M. and 1 and 3 P.M., or at such hours as may be determined by the Chairman of the Local Board, notice of which shall be posted at the slaughter-houses, nor until after they have been inspected and approved by the Medical Officer, Badulla, as fit to be slaughtered for human consumption.
3. An officer duly appointed by the Chairman shall keep a Register of all animals brought to the slaughter-house in the following form and obtained daily the initials of the Medical Officer thereto.

4. The said Medical Officer may prohibit the slaughter of any animal notwithstanding that it has been approved as aforesaid if it should before slaughter be found to be diseased.

5. Any animal which after the slaughtering of it found to be diseased may be disposed of in such manner as the Medical Officer shall direct.

6. No cattle shall be exposed or slaughtered for which a cattle voucher containing a correct description of the animal is not produced.

7. In the case of sheep or goats a written permit to slaughter signed by the Medical Officer shall be produced with each animal brought for slaughter.

8. The following fees shall be recoverable by the Board for the use of the slaughter-house :—

## BY-LAWS REFERRED TO.

1. No animals intended for slaughtering shall be kept or left at the place of exposure for more than forty-eight hours, and no animal shall be placed in or removed from such place of exposure except in the presence of an officer duly authorized by the Chairman of the Local Board.

2. No animals shall be slaughtered at the said slaughter-house except between the hours of 7 and 9 A.M. and 2 and 4 P.M., or at such hours as may be determined by the Chairman of the Local Board, notice of which shall be posted at the slaughter-houses, nor until after they have been inspected and approved by the Medical Officer, Bandarawela, as fit to be slaughtered for human consumption.

3. An officer duly appointed by the Chairman shall keep a Register of all animals brought to the slaughter-house in the following form and obtain daily the initials of the Medical Officer thereto.

4. The said Medical Officer may prohibit the slaughter of any animal notwithstanding that it has been approved as aforesaid if it should before slaughter be found to be diseased.

5. Any animal which after the slaughtering of it found to be diseased may be disposed of in such manner as the Medical Officer shall direct.

6. No cattle shall be exposed or slaughtered for which a cattle voucher containing a correct description of the animal is not produced.

7. In the case of sheep or goats a written permit to slaughter signed by the Medical Officer shall be produced with each animal brought for slaughter.

8. The following fees shall be recoverable by the Board for the use of the slaughter-house :—

## "THE CEYLON RAILWAYS ORDINANCE, 1902."

RULE made by His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, under section 5 of "The Railways Ordinance, 1902," in substitution for the additional sub-clause (e) of rule 44 of the rules and rates relating to the Conveyance of Goods Train Traffic, published in *Gazette* No. 6,730 of July 30, 1915 :—

## RULE 44.

*Additional Sub-clause (e).*

In addition to the receptacles specified in sub-clause (b), receptacles of capacity in excess of 5 gallons and not exceeding 65 gallons will be accepted for conveyance by goods train unpacked, provided they are in accordance with the samples approved by and deposited with the General Manager of the Railway.

Any provision contained in any rule made under the said Ordinance in any way contrary to the provision of this rule shall, as from the coming into operation of this rule, be repealed.

### VITAL STATISTICS.

#### Registrar-General's Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended June 10, 1922.

**Births.**—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 118 (10 Burghers, 73 Sinhalese, 8 Tamils, 13 Moors, 10 Malays, and 4 Others). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on January 1, 1922, viz., 246,273) was 25.0, as against 22.9 in the preceding week, 35.9 in the corresponding week of last year, and 32.8 the weekly average for last year.

**Deaths.**—The total deaths registered were 134 (1 European, 7 Burghers, 74 Sinhalese, 22 Tamils, 22 Moors, 3 Malays, and 5 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 28.4, as against 31.5 in the previous week, 29.3 in the corresponding week of last year, and 30.5 the weekly average for last year.

**Infantile Deaths.**—Of the 134 total deaths, 27 were of infants under one year of age, as against 36 in the preceding week, 33 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 40 the average for last year.

**Stillbirths.**—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 12.

**Principal Causes of Death.**—1. (a) Twenty-four deaths from *Pneumonia* were registered, 14 in the hospitals (including 1 death of a non-resident), 5 in New Bazaar, 2 in Kotahena North, and 1 each in San Sebastian, Slave Island, and Wellawatta South, as against 19 in the previous week and 17 the weekly average for last year.

(b) Eight deaths from *Influenza* were registered, 2 each in New Bazaar and Maradana North, and 1 each in St. Paul's, San Sebastian, Slave Island, and Kollupitiya, as against 9 in the previous week and 5 the weekly average for last year.

(c) Four deaths from *Bronchitis* were registered, 2 in New Bazaar and 1 each in the hospital (of a non-resident) and Kollupitiya, as against 2 in the previous week.

2. (a) Twelve deaths from *Phthisis* were registered, 5 in the hospitals (including 3 deaths of non-residents), 2 each in Kotahena South and New Bazaar, and 1 each in San Sebastian, Slave Island, and Wellawatta North, as against 11 in the previous week and 14 the weekly average for last year.

(b) Two deaths of residents of Colombo Town occurred at the Ragama Hospital from *Phthisis* during the week.

3. Seven deaths from *Enteric Fever* were registered, 4 in the hospitals (including 1 death of a non-resident), and 1 each in Fort, San Sebastian, and Kotahena North, as against 2 in the previous week and 4 the weekly average for last year.

4. Eight deaths were registered from *Enteritis*, 8 from *Infantile Convulsions*, 2 each from *Diarrhoea*, *Dysentery*, *Worms*, *Tetanus*, and *Debility* and 53 from other causes.

5. Eight cases of *Chickenpox*, 6 of *Enteric Fever*, 4 of *Measles*, and 2 of *Plague* were reported during the week as against 12, 13, 2, and 2 respectively of the preceding week.

**State of the Weather.**—The mean temperature of air was 81.9, against 82.1° in the preceding week and 82.3° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29.842 in. against 29.870 in. in the preceding week and 29.880 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 3.56 in.; against 1.99 in. in the preceding week and 0.27 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.

## Examination for Archæological Scholarships.

## Arrack Rent Sale Conditions, 1922-23.

THE following conditions on which the arrack rents for the period from October 1, 1922, to September 30, 1923, in the Central Province, will be sold, have been approved by His Excellency the Governor, under section 18 of "The Excise Ordinance, No. 8 of 1912," and are hereby published for general information:—

Arrack Rent Sale Conditions applicable to arrack taverns in the Central Province. The rent of each arrack tavern will be sold separately as is now done in the case of toddy taverns.

The conditions on which the exclusive privilege of selling arrack by retail during the period from October 1, 1922, to September 30, 1923, is sold are, in addition to the general conditions applicable to all Excise licenses published in the *Government Gazette* No. 7,250 of March 31, 1922, as follows:—

1. The Government Agent shall have power, in his discretion, to refuse to accept any bid or tender, subject to which power the highest bidder or tenderer shall be the grantee of the privilege, and shall confirm to and perform all the conditions under which the privilege is sold.

2. The privilege extends only to the sale of toddy arrack of the prescribed strength.

3. The privilege will, subject to condition 1 above, be sold to the person who offers the highest price (exclusive of duty and cost price) for every gallon of arrack removed from the warehouses for sale in the tavern.

4. Arrack shall be purchased only from the warehouse established by Government at Kandy.

5. The duty and cost price to be paid per gallon at 32 u.p. at the warehouse are given below:—

6. (a) The grantee shall, immediately on being declared the grantee, sign these conditions and pay to the Government Agent a sum equivalent to two months' rent of the privilege as a security deposit, which amount shall be liable to forfeiture in whole or in part, at the discretion of the Government Agent, for breach of any of the conditions; and such forfeiture shall be in addition to any other penalty prescribed by the conditions for such breach. The grantee shall hypothecate the said security deposit by a bond in form 112 within 14 days of the sale of the privilege above prescribed.

Note.—The rent will be calculated on the basis of the average consumption for two months during the period October, 1921, to March, 1922.

(b) The grantee shall at the same time execute, if so required by the Government Agent, in the form sanctioned by law, a power of attorney to confess judgment in any action which may be instituted against him for the recovery of any moneys due in respect of this privilege.

(c) The grantee shall, on signing the conditions of sale, elect, and under his hand signify, a post office to which all notices and processes whatever in connection with the above said privilege shall be addressed under registered post; and all such notices or processes as aforesaid so addressed to the post office so elected and posted in due course shall be considered as good and effectual to all intents and purposes as if the same were served personally.

7. The grantee shall, in addition to the duty and cost price referred to in condition 5 above, pay to Government the rent due on each consignment of arrack removed before the arrack is issued from the warehouse.

8. All sums on account of duty, cost price, and rent shall be paid into a Kachcheri and a receipt obtained therefor. On this receipt being delivered to the officer in charge of the warehouse he will deliver the quantity of arrack for which the duty, cost price, and rent have been paid.

9. The quantities purchased at any one time from the warehouse shall not be less than 10 gallons.

10. (a) The grantee shall have no claim to a remission if the Government Agent or his Assistant shall find it necessary to order the taverns upon any road to be closed for a limited period during the march of troops, or upon the plea of losses arising from any cause whatever.

(b) On days of polling the Government Agent or his Assistant shall order the closure of all taverns in the area in which polls are held, and the grantee shall have no claim to a remission on this account.

11. No payment of any sum due by the grantee to the Crown shall be considered as duly made unless the grantee shall produce a Kachcheri receipt therefor; and no money which, for his own convenience, the grantee may think fit to leave in the Shroff's hands shall be considered as money paid under this contract.

12. The grantee shall be bound to accept such arrack as is available at the warehouse. He shall also be bound to keep such minimum quantity of arrack as the Government Agent may prescribe.

The grantee shall be bound to draw such proportion of the arrack issued in sealed bottles as the Commissioner of Excise or Assistant Commissioner of Excise may require in the light of past consumption, and shall pay a further sum of Rs. 2.10 as the extra cost per gallon of such arrack in white sealed bottles and Re. 1.60 as the extra cost per gallon of such arrack in black sealed bottles.

The grantee shall keep such sealed bottles always prominently in view of customers at the bar of each tavern.

13. All arrack exposed or kept for sale shall be of a strength not weaker than 35 u.p. according to Sykes' hydrometer test. No water and no colouring or flavouring or other matter shall be added thereto.

All arrack or exposed for sale in taverns shall at all times be open to inspection and test by Excise Officers.

14. Should the grantee fail to perform any of the conditions of sale, the Government Agent shall be at liberty to order the amount paid by the grantee under clause 6 hereof, or any portion thereof, to be forfeited, and shall have power after 15 days' notice to the grantee of his intention to do so, without further process of law, to re-sell the privilege at the risk and loss of the grantee. The notice referred to may be given in such manner as the Government Agent may direct.

15. The Government Agent is not bound to find sites for taverns in the event of the grantee not being able to procure sites from private parties or otherwise.

16. The grantee shall have no power to interfere in any way, directly or indirectly, with the sale of arrack at the Military Canteens, which are altogether excluded from the privilege aforesaid.

17. The right of Government to manufacture and sell or to issue licenses for the manufacture or sale of methylated spirits, as also the right to grant licenses for the manufacture, sale, and use of spirits distilled in the Island for chemical and other purposes, but not for drinking purposes, is hereby expressly reserved from the privilege sold under these conditions.

18. The Government Agent shall exercise his right, as he may think proper, of issuing licenses to any person to sell foreign liquor by the glass or the bottle.

19. The grantee shall have no concern or interest, direct or indirect, with the sale of fermented toddy, or with the purchase of any privilege for the sale of toddy within the area of his rent.

20. The grantee and the servants employed by him are prohibited from having any pecuniary dealings with Excise officers. The grantee will be responsible for the acts of his servants.

21. The grantee shall, within 10 days from the date on which the privilege commences to run, or within such extended time as the Government Agent may grant, apply to the Government Agent and obtain a license for the sale by retail of arrack in respect of the privilege purchased by him.

22. No barrel, cask, keg, vat, or other large receptacle shall be used to store, keep, or transport arrack, unless it shall bear clearly marked on it its capacity in terms of gallons.

23. The grantee (a) shall not sell any arrack whether by the dram or by the "bottle" or gallon at a lower price than at the rate of Rs. 9.60 per gallon at 32 u.p.; and (b) shall not sell arrack in any one particular tavern at a cheaper rate by "bottle" or gallon than the rate by the dram at which he sells arrack in that tavern. Nor shall the grantee sell any arrack at a higher rate than at the rate of Rs. 12.96 per gallon at 32 u.p. provided that the Government Agent may for special reasons, and on the application of the grantee, permit the sale of arrack at a higher rate than Rs. 12.96 per gallon at 32 u.p. as the Government Agent may determine.

24. The grantee may sell arrack in white sealed bottles at Rs. 2.50 per gallon more than the above rates, and arrack in black sealed bottles at Rs. 2 per gallon more than the above.

25. It shall be an offence for any grantee, or his employees, to serve short measure, and his license shall be liable to summary cancellation on such offences with forfeiture of all sums paid by him. Each grantee shall be liable to punishment under section 50 of Excise Ordinance No. 8 of 1912, for any such offence wilfully committed by any of his employees.

21. The grantee shall, within 10 days from the date on which the privilege commences to run, or within such extended time as the Government Agent may grant, apply to the Government Agent and obtain a license for the sale by retail of arrack in respect of the privilege purchased by him.

22. No barrel, cask, keg, vat, or other large receptacle shall be used to store, keep, or transport arrack, unless it shall bear clearly marked on its correct capacity in terms of gallons.

23. The grantee (a) shall not sell any arrack whether by the dram or by the "bottle" or gallon at a lower price than at the rate of Rs. 9.60 per gallon at 32° u.p.; and (b) shall not sell arrack in any one particular tavern at a cheaper rate by "bottle" or gallon than the rate by the dram at which he sells arrack in that tavern. Nor shall the grantee sell any molasses arrack at a higher rate than at the rate of Rs. 11.52 per gallon, and any toddy arrack at a higher rate than at the rate of Rs. 12.96 per gallon at 32° u.p., provided that the Government Agent may for special reasons and on the application of the grantee permit the sale of molasses arrack at a rate higher than Rs. 11.52 per gallon and toddy arrack at a rate higher than Rs. 12.96 per gallon, at 32° u.p. as the Government Agent may determine.

24. Each kind of spirit shall be kept in separate vessels and must be separately accounted for, each in a separate tavern register prescribed for this purpose.

25. It shall be an offence for any grantee, or his employees, to serve short measure and his license shall be liable to summary cancellation on such offence with forfeiture of all sums paid by him. Each grantee shall be liable to punishment under section 50 of Ordinance No. 8 of 1912 for any such offence wilfully committed by any of his employees.

26. The grantee may sell arrack in white sealed bottles at Rs. 2.50 per gallon more than the rates quoted in clause 23 hereof; and arrack in black sealed bottles at Rs. 2 per gallon more than the rates quoted in clause 23 hereof.

## WESTERN PROVINCE.

## COLOMBO DISTRICT.

Paddy: (a) the prospects of the coming crop (yala) are satisfactory, except in Siyane korale east and Hapitigam korale where there is no yala cultivation; (b) estimated crop just harvested, nil; (c) general remarks, nil.

Dry grains: kurakkan is being cultivated in Siyane korale east and Siyane korale west.

Coconuts: (a) prospects of the coming crop are fair; (b) probable yield is about 2,955,000 nuts or more; (c) estimated crop just harvested, 73,022,374 nuts; (d) general remarks, nil.

Other products: (a) prospect of coming crop, good; (b) probable yield, nil; (c) estimated crop just harvested, nil; (d) general remarks, nil.

Prices of food stuffs: country rice, Rs. 5 to Rs. 6.50 per bushel; paddy, Rs. 2.50 to Rs. 3.50 per bushel; imported rice, Rs. 6 to Rs. 8 per bushel; maize, nil; coconuts, Rs. 5 to Rs. 6.50 per 100 nuts; salt, 12 cents to 14 cents per measure; any other prices of interest, nil.

Health of inhabitants: unsatisfactory. There have been several cases of chickenpox, enteric fever, measles, and dysentery in almost all the korales. Fever is also reported to be prevailing in an epidemic form in Alutkuru korale north and Hewagam korale.

Health of cattle: satisfactory. There were a few cases of hoof-and-mouth disease in some korales and a case of rinderpest in Colombo Mudaliyar's division. This is the first case of rinderpest which has occurred in the Western Province for the last one year or more. The disease is well in hand.

Conditions of fisheries and tanks: good.

Weather: rainfall for the month in the Colombo Observatory was 22.6 in. in 26 days.

Harvest prospects: fair.

General: nil.

## CENTRAL PROVINCE.

## KANDY DISTRICT.

Paddy—maha: the crop, which has been harvested, was unsatisfactory. Prospects of the yala crop is not bright as a large extent of fields has not been cultivated owing to want of water.

Dry grain: chenas being prepared for sowing.

Coconuts: flowering fair. The crop was not satisfactory.

Other products: tea has fetched good prices. Cacao and arecanut have not been as productive as in previous months.

Prices of food stuffs: country rice, Rs. 5.60 to Rs. 7 per bushel; paddy, Rs. 2.25 to Rs. 3 per bushel; imported rice, Rs. 6 to Rs. 8 per bushel; kurakkan, Rs. 2 to Rs. 3 per bushel; coconuts, Rs. 5 to Rs. 10 per 100 nuts; salt, 14 cents to 16 cents per measure.

Health of inhabitants: good. There were few cases of chickenpox, sore-eyes, fever, and dysentery.

Health of cattle: good.

Weather: there were some welcome showers of rain which, however, was insufficient.

## MATALE DISTRICT.

Coconuts (prospects of coming crop, &c.): 414,206 nuts estimated crop.

Health of inhabitants: in Matale South and East, fair; and in Matale North, good.

Remarks applicable to particular district, e.g., condition of tanks or fisheries, &c.: In Matale North tanks are from 1/4 to 1/2 full. In Matale South rainfall was not sufficient for cultivation.

Weather: dry, except for a few occasional showers. Rainfall, Matale 2.75 in.; Dambulla 65 in.; Sigiriya, 1.48 in.

Harvest prospects generally: prospects unsatisfactory for want of sufficient water.

General: there is some prospect of being able to cultivate a few of the abandoned paddy fields in Matale South by June. In Matale North tobacco cultivation is proceeding. Some plantations abandoned owing to drought, but others now being taken up.

"An improved electric sewing machine."

*Abstract.*—The applicant states that the object of the invention is to provide a self contained electrically driven, electrically controlled, and electrically lighted "sewing head" adapted for reception as a unit, within the sewing head receiving aperture of the usual support, or cabinet. Electrical connections are concealed. An improved knee shift control for the driving motor is provided, and also a safety device whereby the knee shift can only be operated when the sewing head is in sewing position.

"Improvements relating to the disinfecting of, and destruction of vermin in, clothes, bedding, and the like."

*Abstract.*—Apparatus, particularly for use in the treatment of clothes and bedding in the field, comprises a water-proof sack which is filled with the articles to be treated, the mouth being then closed by a drawstring. After pressing on the sack to expel as much air as possible, steam is admitted from a boiler by a pipe to displace the remaining air downwardly. In a modification, a number of units are arranged around a central flue, to which the flues from the various boilers are connected. Arrangements are made for allowing a portion of the heated gases to pass to the outside of the units, which are surrounded by a chamber formed of blanketing or stones, mud, and bricks. In further modifications, a single boiler supplies a number of units or a single large collapsible chamber may be used having a weighted roof which can be lowered by pulleys to expel the air.

The claims are:—

1. A method of disinfecting, and of destroying vermin in, clothes, bedding, and the like, according to which the clothes and/or other articles to be treated are directly arranged within a collapsible chamber made of flexible fluid-tight material, and current steam is admitted directly into said chamber at the top thereof and is caused to pass downward therethrough and to downwardly displace and expel the air therein.

2. Apparatus for carrying out the method claimed above, comprising a plurality of units connected to a chimney common to them all and each consisting of a sack or envelope connected to a boiler, an air-intake flue passing under the boiler and communicating with the chimney, an insulating hot air chamber containing the sack or envelope, and a hot air flue between the air-intake flue and said chamber.

3. Apparatus as claimed in claim 2, in which the chamber is formed by blanketing or like heat insulating material, or brick, or the like walls arranged over and around the sack or envelope and the steam pipe.

4. Apparatus as claimed in claim 1, comprising a collapsible and waterproof chamber sub-divided into, or formed as, separate compartments each of which is adapted to be supplied with steam from an independent boiler or from a boiler common to them all.

5. Apparatus as claimed in Claim 1 or 4, in which the envelope or chamber is fitted with a heavy roof adapted to be raised and lowered by a windlass, cords or the like, and pulleys, or by other suitable means.

6. Apparatus as claimed in claim 1, 2, 4, or 5, in which after the sack, envelope, or chamber has been filled with the articles to be treated, and the mouth or filling opening thereof more or less closed, the majority of the air is pressed out of same before the steam is admitted thereinto.

7. The improved apparatus for the disinfecting of, and destruction of vermin in, clothes, bedding, and the like, constructed substantially as described with reference to Figure 1, or to Figures 2 and 3, or to Figures 4 and 5, or to Figures 6 and 7 of the accompanying drawings.

"Improvements in machines for use in making boxes."

*Abstract.*—The applicant describes a box making machine in which the work is fed continuously and the fastener setting mechanism is caused to operate to drive fasteners at selected times only.

The claims are :—

1. In a machine for use in making boxes, crates, and the like, adapted to operate without interruption upon a succession of box assemblies and comprising mechanism for feeding the work continuously and fastener-setting mechanism to drive fasteners into the moving work ; mechanism for automatically controlling the position of fasteners in the work, whereby fasteners may be driven into the work at predetermined points relative to box part edges and adjacent fasteners, substantially as described.

2. A machine according to claim 1, in which the fastener-setting mechanism moves parallel to the movement of the work during a fastener-setting operation, and the position of the fasteners in the work is controlled by controlling operations of the fastener-setting mechanism.

3. A machine according to claim 1, in which the fastener-setting mechanism is normally inactive during the running of the machine, and is thrown into operation at selected times by the controlling mechanism.

4. A machine according to claim 1, in which the mechanism for controlling the position of a fastener includes a member located relative to a selected fastener-receiving point in the work and movable in accordance with the movement of the work.

5. A machine according to claim 1, in which the mechanism for controlling the position of fasteners in the work includes a pattern of members variably spaced relatively in accordance with the desired spacing of fasteners in a box assembly or series of box assemblies, and adapted to cause a fastener-setting operation as each selected fastener-receiving point in the work is moved to fastener-receiving position.

6. A machine according to claims 1 and 5, in which the pattern of controlling members is adapted to repeat its operation upon a succession of box assemblies or series of box assemblies without interruption, positioning fasteners in each assembly or series of assemblies in accordance with the pattern.

7. A machine according to claims 1 and 5, in which the controlling members move synchronously with the work.

8. A machine according to claims 1 and 5, in which the work-feeding mechanism includes an endless chain or belt, and the controlling members move parallel with the movement of the chain or belt.

9. A machine according to claim 8, in which the controlling members are adjustably secured to a chain or belt having connection with the work-feeding chain or belt.

10. In a machine of the class described for making boxes, crates, and the like, fastener-positioning mechanism constructed and operating, substantially as described with reference to the accompanying drawings.

11. A machine of the class described for making boxes, crates, and the like, constructed and operating, substantially as described with reference to the accompanying drawings.

12. A machine according to claims 1 and 3, in which the mechanism for throwing the fastener-setting mechanism into operation during the running of the machine includes a positive clutch adapted to lock the driving and driven parts at any point in their cycle of operation.

13. A machine for use in making boxes, crates, or the like, substantially as described with reference to the accompanying drawings.

"Single line safety token carrier."

*Abstract.*—The nature of the invention is described in the claims as follows :—

1. In apparatus for carrying single line tokens for the safety of trains, a mechanical device substantially as described which ensures a correct token being carried in the cab of a locomotive when running between stations.

2. In apparatus for carrying single line tokens, a metal pouch in combination with a revolving disc running on a tapered race ring inside a base box with four or more dowels attached to the disc. The disc being operated by a handle mechanism, substantially as described.

3. In apparatus for carrying single line tokens, as claimed in claims 1 and 2, a horizontal bar attached to the handle mechanism and operating a vertical rod for raising and lowering the striking lever, substantially as described.

4. In apparatus for carrying single line tokens, as claimed in claims above, a striking lever operating a valve mechanism for the action of the brake of the locomotive through the medium of air or steam, substantially as described.
