"THE CEYLON RAILWAYS ORDINANCE, 1902."

RULE made by His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, under section 5 of "The Ceylon Railways Ordinance, 1902," in substitution for rule No. 26 s of the rules and rates for the conveyance of goods train traffic:—

26 B. Until further notice, Ceylon-grown paddy for consumption in the Island will be conveyed free by goods trains under the following conditions:—

(a) The traffic will be conveyed at "owner's risk," and free conveyance will apply only from stations serving the district where the paddy is grown. The concession will apply only to the original conveyance from such station to the station of destination, and, if the paddy is reconsigned from any station (including the station from which it was originally despatched), full freight charges must be paid. Consignors must enter and sign the following declaration on the "owner's risk "consignment note:—

"I certify that the paddy herewith consigned by me has been grown in the district served by the railway station at which it is tendered by me, that it has not previously been conveyed by the railway, and that it is intended for consumption in Ceylon only."

Any person submitting a false declaration will be prosecuted in terms of section 22 of "The Ceylon Railways Ordinance, No. 9 of 1902."

(b) The bags containing the paddy must be sufficiently strong and sound to prevent damage in transit.

(c) The concession of free conveyance granted under the conditions of (a) and (b) above will also be extended to Ceylon milled rice, prepared from Ceylon-grown paddy, in approved rice mills working in paddy growing areas. The manager of the mill must apply to the General Manager if he desires to obtain the concession, certifying adherence to the conditions of this clause, and he must also enter and personally sign the following declaration on the "owner's risk" consignment note presented with each consignment:—

"I certify that the milled rice herewith consigned by me has been prepared in the mill under my control, from Ceylon-grown paddy, and that it is intended for consumption in Ceylon only."

All previous rules regarding the free carriage and the exemption from all railway charges of rice are hereby cancelled, and all rice and paddy other than Ceylon-grown paddy for consumption in the Island, and locally milled rice prepared from Ceylon-grown paddy as specified above shall be subject to the usual railway charges.

Any provision contained in any rule made under the said Ordinance in any way contrary to the provision

of this rule shall, as from the coming into operation of this rule, be repealed.

12. No person shall drive a motor car unless he is in possession of a license, or unless he is under examination for issue of license, or under the immediate instruction of and accompanied by a duly licensed driver for the purpose of qualifying for examination for issue of a license.

Duration of license.

A license shall remain in force for twelve months from date of issue, but shall be renewable, and the same provisions shall apply with respect to the renewal of the license as apply with respect to the grant of a license.

Any person under the age of seventeen shall be disqualified from obtaining license.

VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended July 15, 1922.

Births.—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 120 (2 Europeans, 14 Burghers, 62 Sinhalese, 20 Tamils, 16 Moors, 5 Malays, and 1 Other). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on July 1, 1922, viz., 247,642) was 25·3, as against 25·7 in the preceding week, 41·0 in the corresponding week. of last year, and 32·8 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 136 (6 Burghers, 80 Sinhalese, 27 Tamils, 17 Moors, 3 Malays, and 3 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 28.6, as against 38.1 in the previous week, 29.0 in the corresponding week of last year, and 30.5 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 136 total deaths, 24 were of infants under one year of age, as against 40 in the preceding week, 40 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 40 the average for last year.

Stillbirths.—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 13.

Principal Causes of Death.—1. (a) Twenty-one deaths from Pneumonia were registered, 8 in Maradana hospitals (including 3 deaths of non-residents), 2 each in St. Paul's, Kotahena North, Kotahena South, Maradana North, Maradana South, and Slave Island, and 1 in New Bazaar, as against 28 in the previous week and 17 the weekly average for last year.

- (b) Four deaths from Influenca were registred, 1 each in St. Paul's, Maradana South, Slave Island, and Kollupitiya, as against 6 in the previous week and 5 the weekly average for last year.
- (c) Two deaths from Bronchitis were registered, I each in Maradana hospital and Maradana South, as against 7 in the previous week.
- 2. Fourteen deaths from Phthisis were registered, 3 each in Maradana hospitals (including 1 death of a non-resident) and Slave Island, and 2 each in Kotahena South, Maradana North, and Wellawatta South, and 1 each in St. Paul's and Kollupitiya, as against 9 in the previous week and 14 the weekly average for last year.
- 3. Four deaths from *Enteric Fever* were registered, 2 in Maradana hospitals (including 1 death of a non-resident) and 1 each in Kotahena North and Slave Island, as against 6 in the previous week and 4 the weekly average for last year.
- 4. Two deaths from *Plague* were registered, 1 each in Kotahena North and Wellawatta North, as against 1 in the previous week and 3 the weekly average for last year.
- 5. Ten deaths were registered from Debility, 7 from Infantile Convulsions, 6 each from Diarrhæa and Enteritis, 4 from Dysentery, 3 from Worms, 1 each from Tetanus, and Puerperal Septicæmia and 51 from Other Causes.
- 6. Ten cases of Enteric Fever, 3 of Measles, and 3 of Plague were reported during the week, as against 10, 3, and 1, respectively, of the preceding week. No case of Chickenpox was reported during the week, but 5 were reported in the previous week.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 79.9°, against 80.2° in the preceding week and 81.4° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29.835 in. against 29.905 in the preceding week and 29.868 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 1.07 in. against 1.31 in. in the preceding week and nil in the corresponding week of the previous year.

Archæological Scholarships.

- 3. Pursuant to notice, Dr E. V. Ratnam asked the Chairman the following questions:—(1) If he has seen the news headed "Engineer's short temper, clerk collared by the scruff of his neck," which appeared in the "Daily News" of the 1st instant.
 - (2) If he has, whether he has inquired into the incident therein reported.(3) What the result of such inquiry is ?

- The Chairman replied as follows: —I have seen the item headed "Engineer's short temper" in the Daily News. I have inquired into the matter, and find that the statement that an Engineer pulled a clerk out of his seat and dragged him by the scruff of the neck to the Head of his Department is untrue.
- (1) Pursuant to notice, Mr. C. H. Z. Fernando moved that in view of the fact that the Police arrangements during the Prince of Wales's first visit to Colombo have been universally condemned as an unnecessary interference with those who contribute to the upkeep of the roads of this City, the Chairman do write requesting Government that the Inspector-General of Police be directed to consult this Council before making traffic arrangements on all future occasions. Dr. E. V. Ratnam seconded.

Mr. C. P. Dias and Mr. E. W. Jayewardene supported the motion. Dr. W. P. Rodrigo opposed the motion.

The Chairman reviewed the circumstances in connection with the organization of the traffic arrangements during the first visit of H. R. H. the Prince of Wales, and deprecated what was tantamount to a vote of censure on the Police. He stated that the Acting Inspector-General of Police, whom he had seen in connection with this motion, had said that he would welcome the co-operation of the Chairman on future similar occasions. He suggested that the motion should, therefore, be withdrawn. Mr. R. L. Pereira also spoke to the motion.

Mr. E. W. Jayewardene, addressing the meeting a second time on the same subject, asked for the permission of the Chairman. There being no objection raised at the time, he was allowed to make some remarks, but, on a point of order

being raised, the Chairman upheld the point of order, and Mr. Jayewardene resumed his seat.

The Chairman suggested that the motion should be amended as follows:—" That the Chairman do write requesting the Inspector-General of Police to consult this Council and the Chairman before making traffic arrangements on a big scale for the City.

As this amendment was not accepted by the mover of the motion, the Chairman moved the amendment which

Dr. W. P. Rodrigo seconded.

Mr. E. W. Jayewardene and Mr. C. H. Z. Fernando opposed the amendment. The amendment was put to the meeting and carried.

Mr. C. H. Z. Fernando called for a division, and the Council divided as follows:

The Chairman reviewed the facts connected with the question, and, as a Member of the Works Committee, accepted the motion.

The motion was put to the meeting and carried unanimously.

(3) In any case in which the Council is satisfied that sufficient facilities are afforded for the public requirements of the market area by the public market, or by such market and other premises already authorized in combination, the Council may, by by-law made as aforesaid, prohibit the sale of meat, poultry, fish, fruit, or vegetables within the said area, except at such public market, or, if the Council so determine, except at such market and such other authorized premises.

4) In any such case, the Council may by such by law direct that no licenses, or no further licenses, as the case may be, shall be issued for the sale of meat, poultry, fish, fruit, or vegetables within the market area, and if it determine that no such licenses shall be issued, may, on providing adequate accommodation for the purpose in the public market, require that any person carrying on the sale of any of the said articles within the market area at premises other than the public market shall transfer such sale to the public market.

(5) Nothing in this section shall authorize the Council by by-law or otherwise to restrict the sale of poultry, fruit, or vegetables by itinerant vendors who do not sell at fixed places, or do not for the purpose of such sale establish themselves

on the public roads or other public places.

(7) To consider an application for permission for Dr. L. F. Hirst, Municipal Bacteriologist, to lecture at the Ceylon

(5) To consider the proposed amendments to Ordinance No. 6 of 1910, by the addition of section 203A, re market Recommended that the recommendation of the item No. 6 of the Sanitation Committee of May 22, 1922, be adopted.

(6) To consider an interim report of the Establishment Committee with regard to the re-organization of the Assessing Department.—Recommended that the recommendations of item No. 12 of the Sanitation Committee of May 22, 1922, be adopted.

(9) To consider reports dated April 1 and May 18, 1922, from the Hon. the Attorney-General, re Rules and Orders of the Colombo Municipal Council.—Recommended that the Hon. the Attorney-General's decision be adopted, and that sections 94 and 95 be retained in the Ordinance and not in the by-laws, and that by-laws Nos. 10 and 11 should, be deleted as suggested by the Hon. the Attorney-General, viz.:-

Summoning Witnesses.

By-law 10.—The Secretary shall thereupon, under the sanction of the Chairman, issue to each of the witnesses a summons in the Form A in the Appendix hereto, and such summons shall be served by some person appointed in that behalf by the Chairman, either by delivery thereof to the witness or by the affixing it to his residence forty-eight hours at least before the time appointed for his attendance. Every witness summoned shall be bound to obey such summons.

Evidence of Petitions.

By-law 11.—The evidence of every witness shall be given on oath or affirmation, and shall be recorded by the Secretary and read over to the witness, who may then desire any correction or addition to be made; and in case no such correction or addition is made, the evidence shall stand as recorded and shall not be altered thereafter. The Chairman shall have the power to administer such oaths or affirmation.

Rsolutions.

With regard to item No. 4 (1) and (2):

(1) It was resolved that the words "at a reasonable cost" be added after the words "or is capable of being developed for building purposes" in sub-sections (d) and (e).

(2) It was resolved that in cases referred to in sections 3 (d) and (e) an appeal should lie to the Council.

(3) It was resolved on the motion of Mr. R. L. Pereira, seconded by the Chairman, that in case of a building of two storeys or more, the capital site value for taxation system should not be applicable unless less than one-fifth of the land appurtenant thereto be not covered by buildings.

(4) It was resolved on the motion of Mr. W. E. V. de Rooy, seconded by the Hon. Mr. H. L. De Mel, that the rate

in sub-section (d) be reduced to $2\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. on all values on all classes of property.

(5) It was resolved on the motion of Mr. E. W. Jayewardene, seconded by the Chairman, that in sub-section 3 (c) that words "shall be taken to mean the annual rent as defined in the preceding two sub-sections (a) and (b) that it " be omitted.

Resolved that the recommendations of the Standing Committee with regard to the remaining items be adopted.

Mr. C. P. Dias moved that the Council do resume, and that the resolutions of Council in Committee be adopted as

amended. Dr. W. P. Rodrigo seconded.—Carried.

The Chairman formally moved in Council that the resolutions of Council in Committee and the recommendations of the various Committees, subject to any amendments of such recommendations by the Council in Committee, be adopted. Mr. C. P. Dias seconded.—Carried.

Mr. C. P. Dias moved that the leave referred to in item No. 11 be sanctioned. The Chairman seconded.—Carried. 11. To sanction excess leave of 55 days over 42 days granted to Dr. C. V. Aserappa, Assistant Medical Officer of Health, owing to ill-health.

ANNEXURE B.

Draft Amendments to Ordinance No. 19 of 1915 under Consideration by the Council.

Rule 3 (d).—It must be provided with a window and a door. The window must open directly or through an open verandah into an external open space. If the door also opens directly or through an open verandah into such external open space, the area of the window opening must be not less than 1/15 of the floor area of the room and the aggregate area of door and window shall be not less than 1/7 of the floor area of the room; if, however, the door does not open directly into such external open space, then the window opening must be not less than 1/7 the floor area of the room.

Rule 4.—" Where a window or door necessary for the purpose of compliance with the last preceding rule is situated on the side or interior or rear face of the buildings, the external open space referred to in the last preceding rule-

(a) Must be of such width that no portion of such space shall intersect any of a series of imaginary lines drawn across the open space from the limit opposite to such face at the level of its lowest inhabited storey at an angle of $63\frac{1}{2}$ ° to the horizontal;

(b) Must in no case be less than 7½ feet in width;

(c) Must either be exclusively attached to the building or be dedicated to public use.

Provided that where the owners of two adjoining buildings have registered at the office of the local authority an agreement binding each other to preserve a common open space between the two buildings, or if the same person is the owner of both buildings, where such person has registered at the office of the local authority, a declaration binding himself to preserve such common open space, such common open space may be treated as the open space required by this rule.

Provided further, that such common open space shall not be less than 15 feet in width.

Rule 5.—(1) Subject to any local by-laws requiring the reservation of a larger area in special localities, there must be in the rear of every factory or warehouse an open space of not less than 10 feet in depth throughout extending along the entire width of the building. Such open space must belong exclusively to the building, unless the rear of the building abuts upon a public street or lane of not less than 20 feet in width which is dedicated to public use.

(2) In the case of a factory or warehouse no portion of the building shall intersect any of a series of imaginary lines drawn across such space at an angle of 63½° with the horizontal, such lines being drawn at the surface of the ground from the boundary of the land belonging to the building or (if the buildings abut upon a public street or lane) from the centre

of the street or lane.

Rule 6.—For the purpose of Rule 4 and of this rule, the rear of a building shall be deemed to be that face which is farthest from any street on which the building is situated. Provided that where the building is situated on more than one street, the rear of the building, unless the Chairman otherwise directs, shall be deemed to be that face which is farthest from the widest of such streets.

Rule 6.—To be repealed. This rule was a relaxation of Rule 5 in respect of domestic buildings and will be no longer applicable when Rule 5 is no longer to apply to that class of building.

Rule 7 (a).—Suggested—"The front of every tenement of any such range or block of buildings which is not less than 100 feet in length shall abut directly upon a street. The whole of any one of the four sides of every such range or block which is less than 100 feet in length shall abut directly upon a street, and the front of every tenement of any such range or block shall be provided with adequate direct access to a public street to the satisfaction of the Chairman."

Rule 7 (c).—No tenements in any such range or block shall be placed back to back and the doors and windows required under Rule 3 (d) for any room in any such range or block shall be placed so as to secure through ventilation.

I suggest there is also a very necessary amendment which might be called.

Rule 7 (f).—"The space required under Rule 4 (b) shall in the case of the class of building dealt with under this section be not less than 15 feet."

ANNEXURE C.

Proposed Draft Amendments to Ordinance No. 6 of 1910.

Section 3.—"Building" includes any house, hut, shed, or roofed enclosure, whether used for the purpose of a human

habitation or otherwise, and also any wall, or advertising station.

"Advertising Station" means any land or building used temporarily or permanently for the exhibition of advertisements, or for the erection or attachment thereto of any hoarding, frame, post, wall, or structure used or designed for the exhibition of advertisements.

Section 3 (a).—" Annual value" means the annual rent which a tenant might reasonably be expected, taking one year with another, to pay for any house, building, land, or tenement if the tenant undertook to pay all public rates and taxes, and if the landlord undertook to bear the cost of repairs, maintenance, and upkeep, if any, necessary to maintain the house, building, land, or tenement in a state to command that rent.

(b) Provided that in estimating the annual value of any house, building, land, or tenement occupied for trade, business, or manufacturing purposes, there shall be excluded from the assessment any increased value arising from machines, tools, or appliances which are not fixed or attached to the house, building, land, or tenement, or are only so fixed or attached to the same that they can be removed from their place without necessitating the removal of any part of the house, building, land, or tenement, or the dismantling or separating of any part or parts of the machine. But the value of any machinery, machine, or plant used in or on the house, building, land, or tenement for producing or transmitting motive power, or for heating or lighting the house, building, land, or tenement shall be included in the assessment.

(c) Provided that so far as the Municipalities of Colombo and Kandy are concerned, annual value may be arrived

at as follows, in the circumstances referred to in the sub-sections (d), (e), and (f) following.

(d) Where land is not the site of or occupied as appurtenant to any house, or building but is suitable for building purposes, or is capable of being developed for building purposes at a reasonable cost, the annual value for the purpose of this Ordinance may be deemed by the Chairman to be a sum which is equivalent to the annual interest at two and a half per centum per annum on the estimated distribution. Provided that, for the purpose of this definition, land shall not be deemed to be so occupied, if such land is covered by buildings to an extent of less than one-third of the total area of such land, or to an extent of less than one-fifth of such total area where the main buildings are of two or more storeys. Should the buildings cover a lesser extent than the aforesaid fractions of the total area of such land, the Chairman may, if he does not assess the premises on rental value as set out in sub-section (a) above, assess the land with reference to the estimated capital site value of the whole area of such land including the site of the buildings in the manner

and at the rates defined in this sub-section (d).

(e) Where land which is suitable for building purposes, or is capable of being developed for building purposes, at a reasonable cost, is built on in such a way that the buildings cover one-third or one-fifth as set out in sub-section (d) or more of the area of the land, but are of such an unsatisfactory standard that the rental value or the probable rental value of the premises is, in the opinion of the Chairman, unduly small, having regard to the capital site value of the land concerned, the

Chairman may, if he does not assess the premises on rental value as set out in sub-section (a) above, assess the land with reference to the estimated capital site value of the whole area of such land including the site of the buildings in the manner

and at the rates defined in sub-section (d) above.

(f) In cases where the Chairman elects to assess with reference to estimated capital site value under the provisions of sub-sections. (d) or (e) above, and where it is proved to his satisfaction that money has been expended on any such land which is capable of being developed for building purposes, with the object of developing such land for such purposes, the money so expended shall be deducted from the estimated capital site value of such land for a period of five years after such expenditure. For the purposes of this sub-section, expenditure on buildings shall not be deemed to be expenditure on the land appurtenant thereto.

(g) In estimating annual value, no allowance or reduction shall be made for any period of non-tenancy whatsoever. (h) Capital site value of land for the purpose of this definition of annual value shall be deemed to be the probable price which such land, if not encumbered by any mortgage or other charge, would realize, at the date of the assessment in

the open market, assuming there were no buildings or growing things thereon.

(i) If any owner is aggrieved by the decision of the Chairman to assess his property as capital site value in the manner set out in sub-sections (d) and (e) above, it shall be lawful for him to appeal to the Municipal Council, whose decision shall be final, as to whether the property in question is to be assessed on the annual value as set out in sub-section (a) or on the annual value as set in sub-sections (d) and (e) above.

ANNEXURE D.

59A. (1) No matter or thing done and no contract extered into by any Municipal Council, and no matter or thing done under the direction of any Municipal Council by any member or officer of such Council, or by any other person whomsoever shall, if the matter or thing so done, or the contract so entered into was done or entered into bona fide for the purpose of executing this Ordinance or any other Ordinance relating to the powers and duties of the Council, or any by-law, rule, or regulation made thereunder, subject any member of the Council or any such officer or other person personally to any action, liability, claim, or demand whatsoever; and any expense incurred by any such Council, or by any member, officer, or other person acting as last aforesaid, shall be borne and repaid out of the Municipal Fund.

Provided that nothing in this section shall exempt any member of any such Council from liability to be surcharged with the amount of any payment which may be disallowed upon the audit of the accounts of such Council and which such

member authorized or joined in authorizing.

Subject and without prejudice to any other powers, the Municipal Council, where the defendant in any action, prosecution, or other proceeding is a member of the Council, or its officer, agent, or servant may, if it think fit, except so far as the Court before which the action, prosecution, or other proceeding is heard and determined otherwise directs, pay out of the Municipal fund all or any part of any sums payable by the defendant in or in consequence of the action, prosecution, or proceeding, whether in respect of costs, charges, expenses, damages, fines, or otherwise.

74A. (1) Every auditor acting in pursuance of this Ordinance shall disallow every item of account contrary to

law, and surcharge the same on the person making or authorizing the making of the illegal payment, and shall charge against any person accounting the amount of any deficiency or loss incurred by the negligence or misconduct of that person any sum which ought to have been, but is not, brought into account by that person, and shall in every case certify the amount

due from such person.

(2) Before making any surcharge or disallowance, the auditor shall afford an opportunity to the person against whom such surcharge or disallowance is made, to be heard or to make any representations with reference to the matter which he may think fit, and shall, in the event of his making such surcharge or disallowance, on application by any such person, state in writing the reason for his decision in respect of such disallowance or surcharge.

(3) Any person aggrieved by any disallowance or surcharge may appeal against such decision to the Supreme Court, and the Supreme Court may either confirm the said disallowance or surcharge, or, if it shall be of opinion that such disallow-

ance or surcharge is not in accordance with law, may modify or set aside the same accordingly.

(4) Every such appeal shall be presented, prosecuted, and enforced within the time and in the manner specified in rules prescribed for and observed in appeals from interlocutory orders of District Courts, and all proceedings in connection

therewith shall be subject to the same stamp duties as appeals from District Courts.

(5), In lieu of such appeal any person so aggrieved may, within fourteen days of the date of the decision of the auditor duly communicated to him, appeal from such decision to the Governor in Executive Council, and it shall be lawful for the Governor in Executive Council, upon any such appeal, to decide the same according to the merits of the case, and if he shall find that any disallowance or surcharge shall have been, or shall be, lawfully made, but that the subject matter thereof was incurred under such circumstances as make it fair and equitable that the disallowance or surcharge should be remitted, the Governor in Executive Council may, by order, direct that the same shall be remitted on payment of the costs, if any, which may have been incurred by the auditor in the enforcing of such disallowance or surcharge. Any amount directed to be recovered from any such person under any order made by the Governor in Executive Council may forthwith be recovered by the Chairman in the same manner as any sum certified to be due by an auditor is recoverable under the provisions of this section.

(6) No expenses paid by any Municipal Council shall be disallowed by the auditor, if such expenses have been

sanctioned by the Governor in Executive Council.

(7) Every sum certified to be due from any person by any auditor under this Ordinance shall be paid by such person to the Chairman of the Municipal Council within fourteen days after the same has been so certified, unless there is an appeal against the decision, and if such sum is not so paid and there is no such appeal, it shall be the duty of the Chairman to recover the sum from the person against whom the sum has been certified to be, and any sum, so certified to be due may, on application to a Police Magistrate having local jurisdiction, be recovered in the same manner as a fine in Court by such Magistrate, together with all costs and expenses incurred in connection with the enforcement thereof.

Section 156 of the principal Ordinance is hereby repealed, and the following section shall be inserted in lieu thereof:

- Whoever without license in that behalf from the Chairman builds any wall or erects or sets up any fence, rail, post, bracket, verandah, sunshade, or other obstruction, encroachment or erection, whether temporary or permanent, in or over any street or lake, or deposits or causes to be placed or depositied any box, bale, or package of merchandise, or any other thing in or over any open drain, sewer, or aquaduct along the side of any street or lake, or on any portion of such street or lake, shall be liable to a fine not exceeding one hundred rupees; and the Chairman may remove any such obstruction, encroachment, or erection, and the expense of such removal shall be paid by the person erecting or depositing the same, and shall be recoverable as hereinafter provided. Nothing herein contained shall prevent the Chairman from allowing any temporary erections in any street on occasions of festivals and ceremonies,
- 17. Sub-section 7 (b) of section 191 of the Principal Ordinance, as the same is inserted by Ordinance No. 2 of 1919, shall be deleted, and the following inserted in lieu thereof :-
- (b) In the event of any offence under this sub-section, every person having the use in common of such privy, water closet or urinal, or the approaches thereto, as the case may be as aforesaid, shall be presumed to have committed such offence unless he shall prove the contrary.

ANNEXURE E.

Section 116 of the principal Ordinance is hereby repealed, and the following section shall be inserted in lieu

116. (1) The Chairman may from time to time, as often as he shall think necessary for the purpose of assessment, divide any house, building, land, or tenement, and consolidate any separate houses, buildings, lands, or tenements whatsoever within the town, and assess, in respect of any rate or rates, tax or taxes, leviable or enforced under this Ordinance, each sub-divided portion separately and each such consolidated premises as a whole: Provided that in the case of any such consolidation, whether made under section 116 of Ordinance No, 6 of 1910 or under this Ordinance, the consolidated premises shall be assessed at the aggregate annual value of the several houses, buildings, lands, or tenements of which

(2) The Chairman shall cause a notice of such division or consolidation to be served on the premises of every occupier,

whether he be proprietor, joint proprietor, or tenant of each such house, building, land, or tenement.

(3) Nothing in this section shall be construed to affect the requirements of the next following section regarding the service of notice of assessment.

(4) The assessed annual value of any premises so dealt with shall not be raised or reduced for the year in which the division or consolidation is made, by reason of such division or consolidation.

Annexure F.

120. In order to enable the Council to assess the annual value of any houses, buildings, or lands liable to be rated, the Chairman shall require the owner and occupier of such houses, buildings, or lands to furnish returns of the rent or annual value thereof, and to give all such information as may be necessary for the preparation of the assessment or otherwise, and for the like purpose it shall be lawful to the Chairman or any person appointed by him for that purpose, at any time between sunrise and sunset, to enter and inspect and survey such buildings or lands, and it shall be the duty of the owner of any house, building, or land to notify in writing to the Chairman the completion of any new building intended for occupation. Whoever refuses or fails to furnish the return herein specified for the space of one week from the day on which he shall have been required to do so, and whoever knowingly makes a false or incorrect return, and whoever hinders, obstructs, or prevents the Chairman or any person appointed by him as aforesaid from entering or inspecting or, if need be, surveying any such houses, buildings, or lands, and whoever fails to notify the completion of any new building or of any addition to an existing building, within fourteen days from the date of such completion, shall be guilty of an offence, and shall be liable on conviction thereof to a fine not exceeding one hundred rupees.

ANNEXURE G.

Proposed Amendments to the Ordinance No. 6 of 1910.

Sections 117 to 119 and 121 and sections 137 to 148:

(1) The Chairman shall keep a book, to be called "the Assessment Book," in which the annual value of each house, building, land, or tenement, which is the subject of one separate assessment, shall be entered every year, and shall give public notice thereof and the place where the Assessment Book may be inspected.

(2) The Assessment Book shall also contain the name of the owner, as defined by the "The Municipal Councils Ordinance, 1910," of each property or consolidated property assessed for rates, or the names of the joint owners in cases

of divided ownership.

(3) To enable the Chairman to ascertain the names of such owners, it shall be lawful for him to serve a notice at any time on any person who occupies any house, building, land, or tenement or any part of the same, or on any person who pays or receives rent in respect of such or part of such house, building, land, or tenement, requiring such person or persons to state to whom such rent is paid, or on whose account such rent is received, or by whose authority occupation is permitted, or the nature of his or their interest in, or connection with, such house, building, land, or tenement. And such person or persons shall, within fourteen days of the receipt of such notice, be required to furnish the Chairman with full and correct information to the best of his or their knowledge in respect of the matters set out in the notice served by the Chairman. In failure thereof, such person or persons shall be liable to be prosecuted in the Court of the Municipal Magistrate, and, on conviction shall be liable to a fine not exceeding one hundred rupees.

(4) Every owner or occupier of any house, building, land, or tenement, or his authorized agent, shall be permitted, free of charge, to inspect any portion of the Assessment Book.

(5) The Chairman shall cause a notice of assessment in English, Sinhalese, and Tamil to be served on or left at the premises of every occupier, whether he be proprietor, joint proprietor, or tenant of the house, building, land, or tenement assessed; and the said notice shall be in the form contained in the Schedule E hereunto annexed; and there shall be appended thereto a demand of payment of the rate or rates leviable within such time and on such proportions as the Chairman shall deem reasonable. Provided that in the case of premises consolidated under section 1/16 of this Ordinance, the service of a single notice of assessment at the consolidated premises shall be deemed to be sufficient notice under this section:

6) Such notice shall further intimate that written objections to the assessment will be received by the Chairman

within one month from the date of service of notice.

(7) The Chairman shall cause all objections so received to be registered in a book to be kept for this purpose, and

shall give notice in writing to each objector of the day, time, and place when and whereat his objections will be investigated.

(8) At the time and date so fixed, the Chairman shall investigate or cause to be investigated the objections, in presence of the objector (or an agent authorized by him in writing) if he shall appear, and if not, in his abesence. The Chairman may adjourn the investigation from time to time for reasonable cause.

(9) When any objection is disposed of by the Chairman, he shall cause his decision to be notified to the objector, and the same shall be noted in the book of objections, and any necessary amendment shall be made in the Assessment Book.

(10) Every assessment against which no objection is made shall, subject to the provisions of section 123 of "The Municipal Councils Ordinance, 1910," be final for the year.

(11) It shall be the duty of the Chairman at any time before the end of each quarter of the year to serve on each premises assessed for rates, or in the case of consolidated premises, to serve on any one of the premises consolidated, a demand note stating the amount of rates due for the quarter in question on such premises or consolidated premises and the date on which payment of the same is due.

Provided that failure so serve any such demand note shall not be deemed to invalidate the recovery of a rate or rates in respect of the premises on which such demand note has not been served; but if the Chairman institutes legal proceedings in respect of the non-payment of a rate or rates for which such a demand note has not been so served on the premises concerned, it shall not be lawful for the Municipal Magistrate to award costs, and it shall be lawful for him to award to the party prosecuted for non-payment of a rate or rates in such a case, a sum which the Magistrate may deem sufficient to cover the legal and personal expenses caused to such party by the institution of legal proceedings against him, which stim shall be paid into Court by the Chairman.

(12) Whenever any assessed property situated within Municipal limits is sold, leased, donated, transferred, seized, attached, or is the subject of a decree made by any Court of Justice, or is in any way affected by any transaction which is subsequently registered at the office of the Registrar of Lands, it shall be the duty of such Registrar to inform the Chairman forthwith of such registration by delivering to the Chairman a notice in the Form K appearing in the Schedule to this Ordinance setting out a description of the property and its situation and the particulars of the document registered, and the Chairman shall pay to the Registrar of Lands a fee of fifty cents for each such notice so delivered by the Registrar.

Section 118 to be repealed. Section 119 to be repealed.

Section 121.—(1) If any house, building, or tenement which is the subject of one separate assessment in the Assessment Book becomes wholly untenanted for any reason whatsoever, a proportionate remission of the rate or rates payable in respect of such assessment may be allowed for each complete calendar month during which it is untenanted.

Provided that no such remission shall be allowed unless the person claiming such remission shall have given to the Chairman, within seven days of the commencement of the period for which remission is claimed, a written notice of the fact that such premises are untenanted, and shall in such notice have stated the date on which the premises became untenanted,

and the reason thereof, and an address to which all communications in respect of such notice may be posted.

Provided further, that in the event of any dispute arising regarding the occupation of such premises during any particular period, the decision of the Chairman thereon shall be notified in writing to the address given in the notice required by the preceding proviso hereof, and such decision shall be final, unless a written application for the revision of such decision be presented to the Chairman within seven days of the date upon which notice of such decision was posted or left at such address when such decision shall be subject to revision by the Council.

(2) On any premises becoming re-occupied, the person to whom such remission was allowed shall give notice of the fact of such re-occupation within seven days, and shall in such notice state the fact of such re-occupation and the date of the

commencement thereof.

Failure wilfully to give such notice shall render the person responsible for payment of the rate or rates, in respect of the premises in question, liable to pay the rate or rates for the whole of the period during which the premises were untenanted, and such rates can be recovered by the Chairman, as if they became due on the date on which he became aware of the re-occupation.

Schedule K.

Section 137.—(1) If the amount of any rate or rates assessed under the Ordinance, or the amount of any tax or taxes imposed thereunder is not paid into the Municipal Office within such time as the Chairman shall direct, it shall be lawful for the Chairman to enter a prosecution against the owner or joint owners or any one of the latter of the property assessed for a rate or rates, or the person liable to pay the tax or taxes in the Municipal Court having jurisdiction within the town in which is situated the property in respect of which the rate or rates are not paid as aforesaid, or in which the tax or taxes are legally due.

Section 138.—To be repealed.

(2) Any person so charged with the non-payment of any rate or tax, which is lawfully bound to pay shall, on conviction, be fined a sum equivalent to the amount of rates or taxes due, together with the costs as defined by section 139 of this Ordinance, and the Magistrate shall issue a warrant of distraint for the recovery of the total sum so computed to the Such warrant shall direct the Chairman to levy such rate or tax and the costs aforesaid by seizure and sale of all and singular the movable or immovable property of the convicted party. And the said warrant shall be in the form contained in the Schedule F hereunto annexed, with such variations as the circumstances require.

Section 139.—The costs of recovery as leviable under any warrant issued under the preceding two sections shall be a

charge of ten per cent. on the amount of rate or tax, due by way of costs on the issue of the warrant.

Section 140.—(1) The officer executing a warrant shall give a receipt to the lawful owner or person in custody of any movable property seized, and shall remove the movable property seized to some place for safe custody or keep the same in safe custody at the place at which it was seized. Notice of the sale shall be exposed by the Chairman at the place or places where the movable property is kept in safe custody, and such notice shall be published there or elsewhere by beat of tom-tom, affixing of sale notices, publication in a newspaper or newspapers or otherwise, or by one or more of these devices according to the circumstances of the case, and at least three clear days shall intervene between the date of such publication of notice of sale and the actual date of the sale.

(2) In the case of seizure of immovable property, notice of sale of such property by public auction shall be published in the Government Gazette and in one or more of the local newspapers and by the affixing of notice of sale at the Court and at the property seized. Provided that at least twenty-one clear days shall intervene between the last date of publication of

sale by all the devices herein referred to and the actual date of sale.

3) If at any time before the sale of movables or immovables the amount due on the warrant is paid to the Court or to the Chairman, the Magistrate shall cancel the warrant, and if any part of such sum is so paid, or if the Magistrate is of opinion that proceedings should be stayed or varied or suspended for any good cause, he may make such order as to the staying, postponement, varying, or amending of the proceedings as the circumstances require, provided that an appeal to the Supreme Court shall lie against any order made by the Magistrate under this section.

(4) It shall be lawful for the Magistrate to exempt from payment of rates in whole or in part any person legally liable to pay the same where such person is in such a state of abject poverty that the payment of the rates would cause that person extraordinary hardship and distress. It shall be lawful for the Chairman to move the Court for such an order of exemption, or such order may be made when a person is charged by the Chairman for non-payment of rates, provided that an appeal shall lie to the Supreme Court against any order of exemption made by the Magistrate under this sub-section, irrespective of the amount of the rates involved.

Section 141.—(1) Should the amount realized by the sale of movable or immovable property seized under this Ordinance exceed the amount due on the warrant, the surplus so accruing shall be restored by the Chairman to the owner or owners of the property so sold, and should it be impossible for any cause to notice such owner or owners and should he or they fail to take steps to receive such surplus, the surplus shall be credited to the Municipal Fund, if the owner or owners

fail to take possession of the surplus within twelve months from the date of the sale of the property in question.

(2) The Magistrate shall pay to the Chairman the amounts paid into Court on account of rates or taxes, the costs relating to the same as defined in section 139 of this Ordinance and all fines levied under section 137 of this Ordinance.

Section 142.—It shall be lawful for the Chairman by endorsement on the warrant to entrust the execution of the same to any Municipal Officer or servant, and it shall be lawful to the person to whom any warrant of distraint is so endorsed to break open in the daytime any house or building for the purpose of seizing property in pursuance of such warrant.

Section 143.—If land or other immovable property be sold under the warrant, a certificate substantially in form contained in the Schedule G hereunto annexed, signed by the Chairman, shall be sufficient to vest the property in the purchaser free from all encumbrances. Such certificate shall be liable to the stamp duty leviable on conveyances of immovable property and to any registration or other charges authorized by law, such duty and charges being payable by the purchaser.

Provided, however, that it shall be lawful for a mortgagee of such land or immovable property to pay and discharge the amount of rate or tax and costs due under and by virtue of such warrant, and upon such payment and discharge he shall be entitled to add such amount to the sum due on his mortgage, and the amount os added shall be secured by the

mortgage held by him.

Section 144.—In the event of any land or other immovable property seized and sold for non-payment of rates or taxes realizing a less amount than that due to the Council, nothing herein contained shall preclude the Council from recovering the balance of any amount which may be due to them after deducting the purchase money realized by the sale of the land or other immovable property.

Section 145.—(1) It shall be the duty of the Council to make provision by means of by-laws for the registration of

mortgages of immovable property situated within the town and of the addresses of the mortgages thereof.

(2) Before any property, in respect of which any mortgage has been registered under this section, and which has been seized for the recovery of any rates and taxes, is offered for sale, the Chairman, at least twenty-one days before the sale, shall cause a notice of the sale to be posted to the registered address of the mortgagee.

Section 146.—Nothing in the repeal of sections 117, 118, 119, and of sections 137 to 148 of the Ordinance No. 6 of 1910, shall affect, as regards rates or taxes leviable for any period prior to January 1, 1923, the provisions of OrdinanceNo. 6 of 1910 and such repealed sections shall continue to apply in respect of such rates and taxes as if the same were still in force.

Section 147.—Provided that in respect of arrears of rates or taxes leviable prior to January 1, 1923, in cases where the Council may have seized immovable property, or purchased the same after seizure, or where the same may have been vested in the Council, under the provisions of Ordinance No. 6 of 1910, it shall be lawful for the Council to cancel such seizures or sales or vesting certificates and to proceed under the authority of warrants issued or to be issued under the provisions of section 137 of Ordinance No. 6 of 1910, to seize the property of defaulters in accordance with the provisions of Ordinance No. 6 of 1910.

MUNICIPALITY OF GALLE.

Minutes of Proceedings of a General Meeting of the Municipal Council of Galle held in the Municipal Office on June 10, 1922, at 2 p.m., pursuant to Notice dated June 5, 1922.

Present:—Mr. F. Bartlett, Chairman; Mr. D. G. Goonewardene; Mr. H. M. Macan Markar; Mr. D. W. Subasinghe; Dr. C. B. Lourensz; Mr. C. E. de Vos; Mr. G. E. Abeywardene; Mr. J. E. Perera; Mr. D. I. Durham; and Mr. E. W. Cade.

- 1. The Minutes of the General Meeting of May 13, 1922, a copy thereof having been furnished to each Councillor, were taken as read and confirmed.
 - 2. Pursuant to notice, Mr. D. G. Goonewardene asked the following questions.

(1) What is the cause of delay in making a start with the building of the proposed Public Hall?

(2) Has not the generous donor of Rs. 30,000 for the building sent in the plan yet?

(3) Now that the site has been selected does not the Chairman deem it desirable to request the donor to commence

the building or to pay the promised sum to the Council?

The Chairman replied:—Mudliyar de Silva informs me that the delay is due to non-receipt of the plan of the building from the architect. He states that he hopes that the plan will be received and work will start shortly. He proposes to get the work done under the supervision of the Council's Engineer, and states that he does not think it necessary to pay the money to the Council meanwhile.

(4) Is the Chairman aware of the leak in the Hiyare reservoir referred to in the report of the interview granted by the late S. M. R., Galle, to the local correspondent of "The Times" newspaper?

Reply:—Yes. I went with the Provincial Engineer when he inspected the leak recently.

(5) If so, has the Chairman any information to give to the Council with respect to same?

(6) In view of the alarming nature of the report will the Chairman be so good as to obtain for the present a report

on the leak from the Provincial Engineer, Galle?

Reply to (5) and (6): —I am informed by the Provincial Engineer that a careful gauging of the leak in the tunnel has been taken for the last eight months, and the leaks show no signs of increase or decrease. They are all, with the exception of two small leaks on the inside of the puddle core; and it is more than probable that the two small leaks are in the joints of the masonry. The tunnel shows no signs of any settlement or crack, and the Provincial Engineer is of opinion that these leaks are of no consequence.

(7) When did the water go over the spill at Hiyare last?

Reply:—The water is not allowed to go over the spill. When the reservoir is full—as it has been since May 10 the scour valve is opened.

3. Pursuant to notice, Mr. G. E. Abeywardene asked: -Will the Chairman be pleased to furnish the Council with

a complete specification of the proposed electric lighting scheme for this town?

The Chairman replied:—I have not received a specification as yet. I have written to the Director of Public Works to ask if the Council will be given a specification of the scheme. I have not as yet had any reply from him.

- Pursuant to notice, Mr. D. G. Goonewardene moved:—That the attention of the proper railway authority may be invited to the extremely bad condition of disrepair of the approach road to the goods shed, Galle, and in view of the great inconvenience and hardship to vehicular traffic, that he be requested to be good enough to have the said road repaired at an early date. Mr. J. E. Perera seconded.—Carried.
- 5. Pursuant to notice, Mr. D. G. Goonewardene moved :---That a report may be obtained from the Provincial Engineer, Galle, (1) as to whether raising the bund of the Hiyare reservoir by two feet is feasible, (2) if so raised, as to whether there is the certainty of another two feet of water being stored in the reservoir, (3) as to what will be the probable cost of such raising of the bund.

With the permission of the Council, Mr. Goonewardene altered the word "bund" in (1) and (3) to "spill." Mr. C. E.

de Vos seconded.

Motions (1) to (3) as altered, were put to the meeting and carried, and it was resolved to request the Provincial Engineer to express his opinion as to the practical effect on the pressure in the town of the raising of the spill.

6. Pursuant to notice, Mr. D. W. Subasinghe moved:—(1) That Elliott road be supplied, without delay, with at least three street lamps. Mr. G. E. Abeywardene seconded, and Mr. J. E. Perera supported.

The motion was put to the meeting and carried, on the ground of the road being dangerous.

- (2) That the Superintendent of Works be requested to submit a sketch of a road connecting Morris road with Hirimbura Cross road, with a report giving the names of the owners of the land over which it will run, the extent of land which will have to be acquired from each of them, and its probable cost, with such details as will help the Council in considering the desirability of opening such a road. Mr. C. E. de Vos seconded.—Carried.
- Papers re the maintenance of the portion of the Talgas-ela, within Municipal limits:—In this connection Mr. J. E. Perera presented a petition from the Dayakayas of Gangarama Vihare, and residents of Magalle, to the effect that the deepening and widening of the Talgas-ela in Maitipe, without making provision for dealing with the Moragoda-ela and its discharge into the sea, would result in the flooding of the low-lying areas of Galupiadda.

Resolved that consideration of the question be deferred.

The following extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committees were laid before the Council.

- (2) Deviation of Humes road.—Recommended that the proposed deviation of Hume's road, which is rendered necessary by the alterations to the Civil Hospital, be sanctioned.

(4) Estimate of Rs. 275 for repairs to buildings in the Infectious Diseases Hospital.—Recommended.

(5) Estimate of Rs. 330 for making 2 scavenging carts.—Recommended subject to the Provinical Engineer's approval of the rates.

Resolved that the recommendations of the Standing Committees be adopted. 10. The following documents were laid on the table:—(1) Statement of receipts and disbursements to end of May, 1922; (2) progress report of works done on estimates during May, 1922; (3) report of the Inspector of Vehicles on carriages plying for hire during May, 1922; (4) reports of (a) the Medical Officer of Health, (b) the Superintendent of Works, and (c) the Manager, Health Department.

Improvements in Race Totalisators.

Abstract.—The applicant describes a mechanically operated horse total and grand total counter and indicator mechanism, controlled electrically through manually operated contacts. The apparatus comprises an assembly of separate groups of horse elements and a grand total element to which all the horse elements are geared: each horse element includes an integrating escapement, the wheel of which controls one member of an epicyclic train, for each ticket issuing machine corresponding to one horse. The grand total element includes an integrating epicyclic unit for each horse element. The initial movements affecting the escapements in the horse element are communicated electrically from the ticket issuing booths, wiring being provided to connect each booth to each horse element. booths, wiring being provided to connect each booth to each horse element.

The claims are :--

1. In a totalisator counter and indicator which includes inter-geared epicyclic trains in each horse element and control escapements on the epicyclic rotors actuated by connections from ticket issuing mechanisms, an accumulator device receptive of the aggregate of motions of said epicyclic trains, a floating weight drive associated with such accumulator, and back gear rewinding mechanism therefor driven by pinion to which the accumulator delivers up the received motions, means for applying drive to said pinion and for arresting its motion when the accumulator has discharged itself there through of the motions received by it from said epicyclic trains, means governed by the rate of motion of the epicyclic trains for speeding up and slowing down the accumulator, a primary transfer wheel geared to said pinion and a secondary transfer wheel connected therewith through a spiral spring, means for bringing said secondary transfer wheel to rest when the rotations transmitted to it through said spiral spring have been delivered by it, a chain belt gear connecting the spindle of said primary transfer wheel with the unit drum of an indicator and transmitting said rotations to such indicator and means for transferring to the tend drum of the indicator one decimal advance movement for every complete rotation of said secondary transfer wheel.

2. A totalisator counter and indicator comprising in sequence escapement governed epicyclic trains for transmitting ticket issuing movements from a plurality of ticket issuing booths, a motion accumulator direct connected through an epicyclic box or boxes to said epicyclic trains, means including a governor for taking off the accumulated motions from said accumulator and delivering the same through intermediate gear to the unit and the tens drums respectively of horse indicators, chain belt gearing from the unit drum shafts of said horse indicators to an epicyclic train on a grand total integrating shaft, a motion accumulator associated with said shaft and mechanism therewith for translating irregular continuous motion at a distributed rate and transferring the same to a grand total indicator, floating weight drive mechanism acting through epicyclic boxes on said grand total integrating shaft, and on the primary accumulator shaft and back gearing

operating to rewind said weight gear.

3. A totalisator wherein the ticket issuing motions are primarily transmitted to a motion accumulator in each horse element through escapement controlled epicyclic trains, capable of indefinite extension by the addition of further epicyclic elements thereto, thus qualifying the apparatus for enlargement to correspond with any required number of ticket issuing places; horse indicators turned by intermediate gearing from the said accumulators respectively; gearing from said indicators to an epicyclic train on a grand total integrating shaft, which shaft is adapted to carry any number of epicyclic elements, and is associated with a motion accumulator thereby qualifying the apparatus for extension by the addition to it of further horse totalling and horse indicating elements; and a grand total indicator operated through intermediate gearing from said grand total integrating shaft.

gearing from said grand total integrating shaft.

4. In a totalisator apparatus of the type herein described, the combination with an accumulator adapted for simultaneously receiving ticket issuing motions at an intermittent and irregular rate and delivering up said motions at a distributed rate, transfer mechanism between said accumulator and an indicator, said mechanism being fitted with a maximum speed governor and including a spiral spring connection with a crank wheel to which said governor is geared, the primary wheel of said transfer gear being connected to the unit drum of the said indicator, and the secondary spring driven wheel thereof

connected through reciprocating gearing to the tens drum of said indicator.

5. In a totalisator of the type herein described, the combination with an accumulator such as herein described geared to a barrel pinion, of mechanism intermediate said accumulator and an indicator and controlled by the accumulator traverse motion, said mechanism operating to arrest the drive thereto through said pinion when the accumulator is discharged and to liberate said drive whilst the accumulator is feeding, substantially as herein described with reference to Figs. 12 and 13.

6. In totalisator apparatus of the type herein described, mechanism intermediate the accumulator drum pinion and the indicator, comprising a driven gear wheel which is direct connected to the unit drum of the indicator, a spiral spring intermediate said gear wheel and a crank wheel, reciprocating mechanism driven by said crank wheel adapted for applying intermittent decimal progression to the tens drum of the indicator a high geared speed controlling governor geared to said crank wheel, and means for arresting the motion of said crank wheel when the rotations transferred to it through the spiral spring have been delivered to the indicator, said means comprising a spiral joggled track on the side of said crank wheel, and a runner working in said track and controlling a stop check.

7. In totalisator apparatus of the type herein described, a motor drive through a slipping belt to the accumulator drum pinion a rheostat controlling the motor circuit operated by the traverse of the accumulator nut, and a check for arresting the motion of the drum pinion and holding the drive, said device being also operated by the traverse of the accumulator.

lator nut, substantially as herein described.

8. In a totalisator including means for delivering the totality of the ticket issuing motions to a motion accumulator drum, a flotating weight drive for the motion delivering elements, and rewinding mechanism for said weight drive comprising an epicyclic box and a gear on one check wheel thereof driven by back gear from the accumulator drum pinion, substantially as herein described.

9. In totalisator mechanism of the type herein described means whereby motions transferred from ticket issuing devices at irregular rates are transmitted through a motion accumulator to the indicating mechanism at a distributed and progressively varying rate, said means comprising an electric motor drive operating the accumulator and the transmission, a rheostat controller for the motor circuit, and means for changing the rheostat contacts progressively in timing with the difference between the rate of transmission of motion to and from said accumulator.

10. In totalisator mechanism of the type herein described wherein ticket issuing motions are received and accumulated in one element and delivered therefrom at a distributed rate progressively increasing and diminishing with the rate of such receipt, driving means for the accumulating and transfer mechanism consisting of a floating pinion friction drive between a driving disc maintained permanently in rotation and a driven disc, said floating pinion being moved to vary the gear ratio between said discs by means of a connection to a traversing nut in the accumulator mechanism whereby the drive is accelerated and decelerated proportionate to the load on the accumulator.

11. In totalisator mechanism of the type herein described, driving means associated with the accumulator drum pinion, consisting of a floating friction pinion drive controlled by a lever 240, which is moved by traverse nut 44 of the

accumulator constructed substantially as described with reference to Fig. 22 of the drawings.

12. In totalisator mechanism of the type herein described, transfer mechanism intermediate the accumulator and the indicators, comprising in series two spring drum drives with motion arresting gear, a dash pot on the shaft of the first of said drives, and an air vane governor geared up to the driven element of the other of such drives, a chain gear from first of said drives to the unit indicator, and a chain gear from the other of said drives to the tens drum of such indicator, and reciprocating mechanism operated by the second of such drives acting on the indicator drums higher in series than the sadi tens drum.

13. In combination with totalisator apparatus substantially as shown in Fig. 22 of the drawings, a quick-break knife switch controlled by the traverse movement of the accumulator nut, governing the return circuit of the escapement mechanism and ticket issuing machines, whereby the operation of those parts is arrested when the accumulator is overloaded.

14. In combination with the accumulator drum pinion 26 (Fig. 2) a centrifugal governor on the shaft 25 operative only for decelerating the rotation of said shaft, in combination with mechanism operative for arresting rotation of said shaft when the accumulator is unloaded, substantially as described with reference to Figs. 7 to 9 of the accompanying drawings.

15. An "all round" escapement control for an epicyclic train shaft in totalisator mechanism of the type herein described, said gear comprising alternate lugs on a wheel 98 interacting with stops on the armature arm and on a loose lever 305 mounted thereon, in combination with a trip pawl 307 on an extension of said armature arm, said trip pawl being

adapted to engage said lever 305 substantially as described with reference to Fig. 20 of the drawings.

16. In totalisator apparatus of the type herein described, the shaft assembly and controls substantially as illustrated in Figs. 4 and 5 intermediate the transmission mechanism and the grand total indicator, comprising floating weight drives with epicyclic rewinding mechanism, epicyclic boxes chain geared to the horse total unit drums and adapted to aggregate the motions thereof and translate the same through step-by-step transfer mechanism (Fig. 5) whereby the totality of all indicator motions is transmitted intermittently to said grand total indicator, drive motor rheostat and weight rewinder rheostat controls, and brake control mechanism.

17. In totalisator mechanism of the type herein described wherein all the ticket issuing movements are ultimately integrated and transmitted to a grand total indicator; means intermediate the ticket issuing elements and the grand total indicator and associated with the driving mechanism of such indicator for translating the irregular rotational movements of motion receiving device in the transmission into distributed movements and applying such distributed movements to

said indicator, thereby effecting step-by-step progression in the rotation of said indicator...



AUDITOR'S REPORT ON THE ACCOUNTS AND BOOKS OF THE KALUTARA BASKET SOCIETY, LIMITED.

The statements attached to this report, you will observe, are drawn up in detail, and therefore comments on them, item by item, are not quite necessary. There are, however, a few points in regard to the accounts and a few matters connected with the general system of bookkeeping to which I would like to refer.

Stocks in Trade.

I have seen a list prepared by Mr. Abeysekara. This list, I was informed, was prepared after actual stock-taking. I have checked the quantities placed against each item with the stock register, and I have also verified the arithmetical accuracy of the stock list to the extent of checking the additions and the extensions.

The value of the hats was understated by Rs. 107 and another item was overstated by Rs. alterations having been made, the aggregate value of the stock in trade was Rs. 6,341 69.

Cash Account.

I have not called for a certificate in support of the amount to credit of the Society in the Kachcheri, as your President is in a position to verify the correctness of the statement that the amount in deposit was Rs. 4,481.91. On the next occasion a certificate should be obtained and submitted to the Auditor.

Debts due to the Society.

I refer to this because the amount due from customers as shown on the asset side of the statement of funds and effects is Rs. 5,880 32. Details of how this amount is made up are shown in the schedule prepared by Mr. Abeysekara, which I have checked and found correct. It will be observed that no provision has been made for bad and doubtful items.

Induruwe Attadassi Terunnanse.

I understand that the Rs. 450 paid by this person was in payment on account of the value of the land the Society had agreed to sell to the temple authorities. I have, therefore, shown this amount on the liability side of the statement of funds and effects, as distinct from the ordinary business debts of the Society.

Depreciation of Buildings and Furniture and Fittings.

I was informed that you had decided to provide for depreciation of these assets in the current year's accounts, no provision has therefore been made in the accounts under review. It is quite usual to charge against the profit and loss, when accounts are prepared at the end of a financial year, an amount to provide for the depreciation of the period covered by the accounts; on the other hand, as the profit of the Society are not available for distribution, no harm would be done by continuing the present arrangement to place against these assets, in the statement of funds and effects, the actual cost price.

This, however, is a matter for your consideration and decision. The Auditor will, of course, carry out your

instructions.

Subsidiary Books, &c.

The nature of the work of the Society makes it necessary to keep, in addition to the ordinary account books, a number of subsidiary books and other records. I am not in a position, on this occasion, to recommend change of system that would answer the purpose and reduce the work of your Clerical Staff. The present system may be continued in the next six months of the current year, when a change might be effected, as with increase in the operations of the Society the accounting and other clerical work would concurrently and correspondingly increase, and therefore unnecessary books and writing should be done away with as soon as possible.

Bookkeeping.

The present system of bookkeeping is not sufficiently complete, and I have, consequently, had to spend a considerable amount of time in analysing, as far as practicable, the sundry receipts and payments (cash and petty cash), sales, and purchases, for the purpose of preparing the statements submitted.

I have discussed this matter with Mr. Grenier and Mr. Abeysekara, and I have told the latter in what respect the present system is incomplete and how it might be improved in order to facilitate the annual closing of the books and the

preparation of the necessary statements.

Petty Cash Book.

As there are a large number of items in the petty books, and considerable time will have to be spent if these items were separately posted into the ledger. I suggest adopting the very common practice of analysing the petty cash at the end of each month and merely posting the totals, if that be done, the analysis should be kept in a permanent book so that it may be available for reference whenever required.

Audit.

In this connection I should like to suggest a continuous audit instead of, as at present, an annual one. The nature of the business carried on by the Society involves keeping of a considerable number of subsidiary books and other records, and an annual audit could only be a superficial one.

By a continuous audit more satisfactory work could be done than is possible on an annual audit that has ordinarily to be completed within the very short space of a week or ten days, and when the accumulation of work makes it somewhat difficult add inconvenient to examine in detail the sundry books and documents that are available and require to be examined.
