"THE SMALL TOWNS SANITARY ORDINANCE, 1892."

THE following regulations made by the Sanitary Board of the Kandy District for the towns of Wattegama, Kadugannawa, Pussellawa, Norwood, Bogawantalawa, Maskeliya, Teldeniya, Mailapitiya, Galaha, Hulganga, Ulapane, and Panwila, under section 9E (2) (s), (a), (b), and (c) of "The Sanitary Board Ordinance, No. 18 of 1892," as amended by Ordinance No. 20 of 1921, and confirmed by His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, are published for general information.

The by-laws framed by the Sanitary Board of the Kandy District, and published in *Government Gazette* No. 6,898 of September 14, 1917, are hereby cancelled.

REGULATIONS REFERRED TO.

Prohibition of Cesspits and Establishment of Closets on the Dry-earth System.

1. *The Board may order cesspits to be closed when, in the opinion of the proper authority, they are likely to be a danger to the public health, &c.*—The Chairman, Sanitary Board, Kandy District, when specially empowered thereto by resolution of the Board, may, by notice in writing, require the owner or occupier of any house or building or land having a cesspit in his premises to close such cesspit and substitute a dry-earth closet therefor.

2. *Permission to bury in private premises.*—Permission may be granted in writing by the Chairman, Sanitary Board, Kandy District, to any householder to have night soil from his own premises buried, or otherwise disposed of on his own premises. Such permission may be revoked by the Chairman, Sanitary Board, at any time.

3. *Removal of night soil to the depôt.*—Every person (unless especially exempted in writing thereto by the Chairman, Sanitary Board, Kandy District, under regulation 2), on whose premises the dry-earth system is in operation, is hereby required to cause the daily removal of night soil to a depôt appointed by the Board for the disposal of the night soil.

4. *Name of person removing night soil to be registered at the Board Office.*—Any householder not having received written permission under regulation 2 may employ any person for the purpose of the removal and disposal of night soil. Provided that in the case of such private arrangements being entered into, the name of such person so employed shall be registered at the office of the Board, and the place to which the night soil shall be removed and the method in which it is to be disposed of shall be submitted to the Board for approval. Permission may be refused by the Chairman, Sanitary Board, Kandy District, to authorize the use of any place for the disposal of night soil.

5. *Fee for removal of night soil.*—Every person employing a Sanitary Board Officer for the removal of night soil shall pay to the Board such sum as shall be determined by the Chairman, not exceeding Rs. 2 per mensem, for each bucket in which such night soil is deposited on his premises for removal by such officer. Such sum shall be paid to the Chairman of the Sanitary Board on or before the 10th day of the month immediately following that for which the same is due.

British Claims against Bulgaria.

THE Administrator of Bulgarian Property has, under the powers conferred upon him by section 1 (iv.) of the Treaty of Peace (Bulgaria) Orders, 1920–1922, and with the approval of the President of the Board of Trade, prescribed September 30, 1922, as the final date by which proofs of debts by British nationals against Bulgarian nationals, and other claims by British nationals against the Bulgarian Government, must be made in order to rank for payment of the first dividend to be declared by him out of the Bulgarian assets within His Majesty's Dominions or Protectorates which are subject to the charge created by section 1 (iv.) of these Orders.

British nationals who have claims against Bulgarian nationals or the Bulgarian Government under Part IX. (Economic Clauses) of the Treaty of Neuilly-sur-Seine with the payment of which the Bulgarian assets above referred to are charged, and who have not yet lodged their claims upon the prescribed forms with the Controller, Clearing Office, Enemy Debts, Controller of Revenue's Office, Colombo, should do so immediately, as any such claims lodged after September 30, 1922, will only be permitted to rank against any surplus of the above-mentioned Bulgarian assets which may remain over after payment of the said first dividend.

Distance of transport is $\frac{1}{4}$ to $\frac{1}{2}$ mile. Final delivery to be made in the month of August, 1923.

(d) Any arrangements for trolleying the wood are entirely between the contractor and the Badulla Railway Extension.

(e) All enumerated trees after felling to be cut into sizes 9 inches longer than standard Public Works Department lengths, and these logs to be left lying in the strip. Any remaining wood from these enumerated trees to be converted into firewood.

(f) To cut all nelli, bamboo, thorns, and undergrowth, and to heap the same, together with all wood refuse, in continuous lines half a chain in breadth, and separated from each other and adjoining forests by properly cleared

lines half a chain in breadth. This work to be completed by August 10, 1923.

(g) To burn off the refuse heaped by August 20, 1923. To root out and completely clear of green growth on all patches not cleared by firing, and to leave the area in a complete state of fitness for planting by August 31, 1923. The strips to be felled will be pointed out on application by the Forest Ranger, Haputale Range.

(h) The contractor during the month of August, 1923, must supply the block 3,000 warichchies, 7 to 8 feet long and $2\frac{1}{2}$ to $3\frac{1}{2}$ inches in girth, 150 poles $9\frac{1}{4}$ feet long, and 9 to 10 inches in diameter.

VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended July 29, 1922.

Births.—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 114 (1 European, 5 Burghers, 68 Sinhalese, 18 Tamils, 18 Moors, 2 Malays, and 2 Others). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on July 1, 1922, viz., 247,642) was 24.0, as against 22.3 in the preceding week, 34.0 in the corresponding week of last year, and 32.8 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 162 (9 Burghers, 89 Sinhalese, 35 Tamils, 20 Moors, 2 Malays, and 7 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 34.1, as against 31.4 in the previous week, 29.9 in the corresponding week of last year, and 30.5 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 162 total deaths, 35 were of infants under one year of age, as against 41 in the preceding week, 41 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 40 the average for last year.

Stillbirths.—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 13.

Principal Causes of Death.—1. (a) Twenty-three deaths from *Pneumonia* were registered, 7 in Maradana hospitals, 6 in Kotahena South, 3 in Kotahena North, 2 in Maradana North, and 1 each in St. Paul's, Maradana South, Slave Island, Wellawatta North, and Wellawatta South, same as in the previous week. The weekly average for last year was 17.

(b) Seven deaths from *Bronchitis* were registered, 6 in Maradana hospitals (including 5 deaths of non-residents), and 1 in St. Paul's, as against 6 in the previous week.

(c) Seven deaths from *Influenza* were registered, 1 each in San Sebastian, Kotahena North, New Bazaar, Maradana North, Slave Island, Kollupitiya, and Wellawatta South, as against 5 in the previous week and 5 the weekly average for last year.

2. (a) Seven deaths from *Phthisis* were registered, 4 in Maradana hospitals (of non-residents), 2 in San Sebastian, and 1 in Wellawatta South, as against 12 in the previous week and 14 the weekly average for last year.

(b) Four deaths of residents of Colombo town occurred at the Ragama hospital from *Phthisis* during the week.

3. Three deaths from *Enteric Fever* were registered, 2 in Maradana hospitals (including 1 death of a non-resident), and 1 in New Bazaar, same as in the previous week. The weekly average for last year was 4.

4. One death from *Plague* was registered in Wellawatta North, as against 4 in the previous week and 3 the weekly average for last year.

5. Fourteen deaths were registered from *Infantile Convulsions*, 10 from *Debility*, 8 from *Worms*, 6 from *Enteritis*, 3 each from *Diarrhoea* and *Dysentery*, 2 from *Tetanus*, and 68 from *Other Causes*.

6. Four cases of *Enteric Fever*, 3 of *Chickenpox*, 1 of *Measles*, and 1 of *Plague* were reported during the week, as against 7, 4, 5, and 5, respectively, of the preceding week.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 81.1°, against 80.3° in the preceding week and 80.8° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29.885 in., against 29.838 in. in the preceding week and 29.918 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 0.31 in., against nil in the preceding week and 1.77 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.

Sale of Minor Forest Produce.

THE right to collect the forest produce specified in the appended schedule during the period commencing on October 1, 1922, and ending on September 30, 1923, from the Crown lands situated in the districts specified will be sold by public auction by the Deputy Conservator of Forests of the Southern division on the dates and at the places mentioned in the said schedule. The right in respect of the several products may be sold separately or collectively at the discretion of the Deputy Conservator of Forests.

2. The right to collect the produce hereby offered for competition shall be exclusive of such privileges as villagers have acquired under the provisions of the Forest Ordinance or by usage for their domestic or village requirements.

3. The highest bidder will be declared the purchaser subject to the approval of the Conservator of Forests, and shall immediately on his being so declared deposit the necessary amounts as hereunder and sign his name in the Register of Sale in admission of such purchase :—

Bids up to Rs. 100.

The amount of the bid in full and security Rs. 20 to be deposited immediately on conclusion of the sale pending the approval of the Conservator of Forests.

Bids over Rs. 100 and up to Rs. 500.

50 per cent. of the bid and security Rs. 50 to be deposited immediately on conclusion of the sale pending the approval of the Conservator of Forests. Balance to be paid within 14 days of the approval of sale by the Conservator of Forests.

Bids over Rs. 500 and up to Rs. 1,000.

50 per cent. of the bid and security of Rs. 75 to be deposited immediately on conclusion of the sale pending the approval of the Conservator of Forests. Balance to be paid regularly in two monthly instalments within two months of the date of approval of the sale by the Conservator of Forests.

Bids over Rs. 1,000.

50 per cent. of the bid and security Rs. 150 to be deposited immediately on conclusion of the sale pending the approval of the Conservator of Forests. Balance to be paid regularly in three monthly instalments within three months of the date of approval of the sale by the Conservator of Forests.

4. Should the required deposit not be made immediately on conclusion of the sale, the right to collect the produce will be at once offered again to public competition, and the person who failed in the first instance to make the required deposit will not be allowed to bid, unless he deposits in advance a sum of Rs. 50, which will be forfeited if he again refuses to make the required deposit on acceptance of his bid.

5. The balance of the purchase amount, if any, shall be paid as specified in condition 3.

6. Should the person decline or fail to enter into an agreement within ten days of receiving notice in writing from the Deputy Conservator of Forests of the Southern division to the effect that his bid has been accepted by the Conservator of Forests or to pay the balance of the purchase amount when due, the deposits already made on account of the purchase and the security shall be forfeited, and the right to collect the produce in question re-sold at the risk of the original purchaser, who shall be held liable to make good any deficiency in the price realized at such re-sale, but, on the other hand, he shall not be entitled to participate in any profit which may accrue to the Government by any re-sale.

7. The right to collect the produce in question shall not be assigned, re-sold, or sublet by the purchaser without the consent of the Conservator of Forests first obtained in writing.

8. Should the purchaser or his employees cause any damage to trees in the forests or commit any forest offence, the purchaser shall be held liable to pay compensation for all such damage or loss, and on failure to pay he shall be liable to prosecution.

9. The collection of *strychnos nux vomica* (Godakaduru) seed should cease 15 days before September 30, 1922, and the collection of all other minor forest produce should cease on August 31, 1922, to admit of the minor forest produce collected being transported to the Central Stores before September 30, 1922, after which date the purchasers will not be allowed to transport any produce to the Central Store, no matter when the minor forest produce might have been collected in forest.

10. The Government reserves to itself the right, without question, of rejecting the purchaser's employees, and of rescinding the agreement if the above conditions are not adhered to.

11. For any further information, and for inspection of the draft agreements, application should be made at the Office of the Deputy Conservator of Forests of the Southern division in which the forests are situated.

**UNIVERSITY OF LONDON.—INTERMEDIATE EXAMINATIONS IN ARTS, SCIENCE, AND
SCIENCE (AGRICULTURE), 1923.**

(These examinations commence on the first Monday in July.)

NO candidate shall be admitted to them unless he have passed, or been admitted under Statute 11 6 (see Appendix) as exempt from, a Matriculation Examination not later than that of the preceding January.

Application for admission to the Pass Examinations should be made to the Director of Education not later than January 31; those for the Honours Examinations not later than December 31, on the prescribed forms, which can be obtained from the Education Office.

The subjects for which a candidate desires to enter, the date of his matriculation, his name in full (initials not sufficient) should be stated.

The admission fee* should be credited to the account of the Director of Education in the Mercantile Bank of India, Limited, Colombo, and the receipt of the Bank and a certificate of good conduct should be sent with the form of application. *No cash or Bank draft or Money Order or Cheque will be accepted.*

Candidates from outside the Colony may, however, remit the fee by Money Order or Bank draft in favour of the Director of Education.

N.B.—*The University fee should not under any circumstances be remitted direct to the University of London or to the Education Office.*

If a candidate withdraws his name, or fails to present himself at the examination, the fee shall not be returned to him, but shall be allowed to enter for the next following Intermediate Examination in the same faculty on payment of a reduced fee.† If he retires after the commencement of the Examination or fails to pass it, the full fee* shall be payable upon every re-entry.

The Examiners will make no report on the B.A. Examination of any candidate who, having postponed‡ the English Literature and Essay of the Intermediate Examination to the occasion of such B.A. Examination, fails to satisfy the Examiners in the English Literature and Essay aforesaid.

The examination shall be conducted by means of printed papers; but the Examiners shall not be precluded from putting, for the purpose of ascertaining the competence of the candidates to pass, *vis à voce* questions to any candidate in the subjects in which they are appointed to examine.

In the Physics, Chemistry, Botany, and Geology papers questions will be set involving (1) the translation of passages in French or in German, and (2) answers with regard to the subject matter thereof. Candidates are recommended to read some books or papers in French or in German on the subjects which they select for the examination. These questions will be optional in the examinations as held in the Colonies.

No candidate offering an Experimental Science subject will be allowed to pass who fails to satisfy the Examiners in the practical part as well as the written part of the examination in the subject chosen.

SUBJECTS FOR THE INTERMEDIATE EXAMINATION IN ARTS.

Candidates for a pass shall be examined in the following subjects.§ They shall not be approved by the Examiners unless they have shown a competent knowledge in each of the subjects selected by them:—

(1) Latin with Roman History, or Greek with Greek History.

(2) One of the following subjects:—Latin with Roman History, if not already taken under (1); Greek with Greek History, if not already taken under (1); English; French; German; Tamil; Sinhalese; Pali.

Note.—Candidates taking Sinhalese, Tamil, Sanskrit, or Pali will be required to give *seven calendar months'* notice, and to pay a special fee of Rs. 79 in addition to the ordinary fee.

(3) One of the following subjects||:—Pure Mathematics¶; Applied Mathematics¶; Logic**; Experimental Physics; Chemistry; Botany; Geology; History of Architecture; Geography.

Candidates who have passed the Intermediate Examination in Divinity with Latin and/or Classical Greek are exempted from the corresponding papers at the Intermediate Examination in Arts.

Candidates for Honours shall be examined in any one or more of the following subjects, at the choice of the candidate, provided always that the number of subjects selected for Pass and Honours, together may in no case exceed four; and provided further that the subjects selected for Pass and Honours together satisfy the requirements of the four sections of the Pass Examination.†† (Honours in Mathematics will cover both the Pure and the Applied Mathematics of the Pass:—

Candidates for a Pass shall not be approved by the Examiners unless they have shown a competent knowledge in each of the subjects selected by them.

Candidates for Honours in any one of the above subjects (i.)–(iii.) shall not be examined in the corresponding subject or subjects of the Pass Examination††, but must satisfy the Examiners at the Pass Examination in each of their selected subjects in which they do not offer themselves for Honours.

Every candidate must state, upon his Form of Entry, the subject or subjects (if any) in which he desires to be examined for Honours.

A candidate who enters for, but fails to obtain, Honours in any subject, may be recommended by the Examiners for a Pass in that subject, if they are satisfied that he has shown such a competent knowledge thereof as is required by the Regulations for the Pass Examination.††

The Examiners will make no report upon the Examination for Honours of a candidate who has failed in any part of his Pass Examination.

Candidates must bring to the Practical Examination their Notebooks certified by their teachers as being the record of their work carried out by the candidate in the laboratory, so that the Examiners may inspect them if they so desire. These Notebooks must be taken away by the candidates at the close of the examination.

Chemistry (Two Papers and a Practical Examination).

The following outline is given for the general guidance of candidates as indicating the range of the Written Part (I.) and Experimental Part (II.) of the Examination in Chemistry:—

I.

The methods which lead to the discovery of the composition of common materials occurring in nature.

The determination of molecular weights, equivalents, and of atomic weights. Valency and structural formulae.

Classification of the elements, including the Periodic Scheme. General characters of the chief types of compounds, including acids, bases, and salts.

History, production, and properties of the more important and typical elements and their most familiar compounds.

The character of chemical changes, including combustion, thermal dissociation, and electrolysis; the conditions which determine and influence them, and the attendant phenomena.

The whole of the above to be treated in an elementary manner.

Candidates will be required to show that they have seen and practised a great variety of experiments, and are familiar with the appearance of common laboratory materials.

II.—*Practical Examination.*

(Candidates will be allowed to bring into the Examination Laboratory any one book on Quantitative Analysis, provided it do not contain any reference to Qualitative Analysis.)

Candidates will be required to show that they are familiar with easy quantitative operations, gravimetric and volumetric, with the rudiments of qualitative analysis, and that they have prepared a number of elements or compounds by processes involving the manipulation of gases and the purification of substances by crystallization, distillation, &c. Candidates are required to bring to the Practical Examination their *original* Laboratory Notebooks for inspection, should the Examiners so desire. These Notebooks must be taken away by the candidates at the close of the examination. Specimens made by the candidate, duly attested by the teacher, if any, may be submitted to the Examiners.

Botany (Two Papers and a Practical Examination).

Morphology.—The structure and properties of the cell and of the various kinds of tissues; cell formation and the development of the tissues. The plant body; its structure, development, and various modifications.

Special Morphology, Reproduction, and Taxonomy.

The morphological and physiological characteristics of Angiosperms, as exemplified by plants belonging to the following natural orders:—Dilleniaceae, Malvaceae, Portulacaceae, Myrtaceae, Leguminosae, Cucurbitaceae, Compositae, Convolvulaceae, Acanthaceae, Scrophulariaceae, Euphorbiaceae, Palmaceae or Commelinaceae, Orchidaceae, Gramineae.

The morphological and physiological characteristics of Gymnosperms, as exemplified by *Cycas*.

The morphological and physiological characteristics of Pteridophyta, as exemplified by *Selaginella*, *Aspidium*, *Asplenium*, or *Adiantum*.

The morphological and physiological characteristics of Bryophyta, as exemplified by *Polytrichum* (or *Funaria*) and by *Marchantia* (or *Lunularia*).

The morphological and physiological characteristics of Algae, as exemplified by *Fucus*, *Oedogonium*, *Pleurococcus*, and *Spirogyra*.

The morphological and physiological characteristics of Fungi, as exemplified by *Agaricus*, *Eurotium*, *Pythium*, *Saccharomyces*, and *Bacillus*.

Elementary Physiology.

The Chemical nature of the food elements of plants. Their sources, the modes in which they are respectively absorbed by the organism.

The absorption of water—turgescence, transpiration, root-pressure.

Movements of water in plants.

Aeration and respiration.

Photosynthesis. Outlines of metabolic changes within the plant.

Growth.

Irritability, Geotropism, Heliotropism.

Practical Examination.

The practical work will include the dissection and examination of plants or parts of plants, and the reference to their systematic position of plants or parts of plants comprised in the foregoing Syllabus.* Simple experiments in Practical Physiology may be set.

Candidates are required to bring to the Practical Examination their *original* Laboratory Notebooks for inspection, should the Examiners so desire. These Notebooks must be taken away by the candidates at the close of the examination.

Geology (Two Papers and a Practical Examination).

I.—*Physical Geology.*—The Earth as a Planet. Its larger surface features.

Atmospheric Agents and their effects. Action of surface and underground water and of ice.

The Ocean, its Movements and Work.

Features produced by Denudation (Outcrop, Escarpments, Outliers, Inliers, Unconformity, Overlap).

II.—*Mineralogy relating to the important Rock-forming Minerals.*—The common crystal forms and combinations, with the principles of crystallographic notation.

Minerals, their Physical Properties and Chemical Composition. Silica in its different forms. The chief minerals of the following groups:—Pyroxenes, Amphiboles, Felspars, Micas, Garnets, Zeolites, Chlorites. Also Olivine, Zircon, Beryl, Epidote, Zoisite, Cordierite, Leucite, Nepheline, Sodalite, Nosean, Haiyne, Tourmaline, Andalusite, Fibrolite, Kyanite, Staurolite, Sphene, Serpentine, Talc, Kaolin, Native Elements [Carbon, Sulphur]. Oxides [Iron Oxides, Spinels, Corundum, Rutile]. Rock Salt. Fluor Spar. Apatite. The Rock-forming Carbonates, Sulphides, and Sulphates.

Practical Examination.

Interpretation of Weather Charts. Physical Maps with contour lines and the method of drawing sections across them.

Drawing sections across some simple Geological Map.

Identification and Description of simple crystal forms and combinations by means of models or from actual specimens. Determination of the important Rock-forming Minerals in hand specimens, and in thin slices under the microscope.

Candidates are required to bring to the Practical Examination their *original* Laboratory Notebooks for inspection, should the Examiners so desire. These Notebooks must be taken away by the candidates at the close of the examination.

History of Architecture.

- (1) Greek and Roman Architecture (one paper).
- (2) History of Greek and Roman Art (one paper).

The characteristics of various periods and their course of development in Egypt, Assyria, Greece, and Rome.

- (3) Drawings of Greek and Roman Orders done during the session to be submitted and marked.

Two Imperial size sheets of drawings will be required, giving examples—one on each sheet—of either the Doric, Ionic, or Corinthian Orders; one must be Greek, the other Roman. Each sheet must contain at least two columns of one order with entablature complete drawn to scale, the columns being not less than ten inches high on the paper, together with details drawn to at least three times the scale of the columns. These drawings are to be sent to the University one week before the date of the examination. Candidates who submit these drawings will be required to sit for the paper in section (1) only, viz., Greek and Roman Architecture.

Candidates must take section (1) and either section (2) or (3).

History (Two Papers).

English History treated generally so as to include the growth of the British Empire, with a special study of a standard work to be prescribed two years previously.*

Due attention to be paid to changes in foreign policy, society, government, and customs, and to the development of the material and intellectual life of the nation.

Modern European History (Two Papers).

Modern European History, from about 1400 to the present day. One paper will deal with the general History, the other with a prescribed text.†

Geography (Two Papers).

I.—*General Geography.*—The distribution of land and water.

The leading facts of wind and water circulation.

The broad structural features of the continents, and the chief processes by which surface features are produced.

The objects and relative value of Mercator's, the orthographic, and the conic projections.

II.—*Regional Geography.*—The great divisions of the world considered under the following heads:—

Superficial configuration together with the leading facts of the distribution of soils and rocks and minerals of economic importance.

The reaction of configuration upon air and water circulation and the resulting local climates.

The river systems as related to configuration and climate. The influence of the foregoing physical factors on agricultural production and the supply of animal and vegetable products independently of agriculture.

The sources of mechanical power.

The distribution of population as related to the foregoing physical factors and as influencing labour supply and the value of land.

The localisation of industries as determined by all the foregoing factors.

Transport. Trade centres and trade routes.

States as conditioned by geographical circumstances—physical, economic, and strategic.

ALTERNATIVE SUBJECTS.

One of the following subjects may be taken in place of one of the languages, French or German:—

- (a) Advanced modern English Literature (two papers).
- (b) Sanskrit‡ (two papers).

(c) The British Constitution as defined in the Syllabus for the Intermediate Examination in Economics, but with special reference to the Government of the Colonies and Dependencies (two papers).

I.—(a) Passages for translation from Sanskrit into English from the following books:—Story of Nala, Books I.–VII.; Hitopadesa, Books I. and II. (Peterson's Edition—Bombay Sanskrit Series with annotations).

(b) Questions on Sanskrit Grammar.

II.—(a) Passages of easy Sanskrit (unseen) for translation into English.

(b) A passage of English Prose to be translated into Sanskrit.

(c) *The British Constitution.*

Outlines of the Constitution and Public Administration of the United Kingdom at the present day, including the Organization and Working of Parliament, the Executive (Crown, Ministers, and Civil Service), and the Judiciary; the Constitution and Powers of the Local Authorities in England; the relations between the United Kingdom and its Colonies and Dependencies.

Candidates will be expected to have some acquaintance with the chief events in the development of British political institutions since 1832.

SUBJECTS FOR THE INTERMEDIATE EXAMINATION IN SCIENCE.

Candidates shall be examined for a pass in any four subjects selected by themselves out of the following seven subjects of examination, viz., (1) Pure Mathematics, (2) Applied Mathematics, (3) Experimental Physics, (4) Chemistry, (5) Botany, (6) Zoology, and (7) Geology (one at least of the four subjects selected from the foregoing list must be taken from amongst the first three); or for Honours in any one or more of the following subjects:—Mathematics (Pure and Applied), Chemistry, Zoology, provided that the subjects selected for Pass and Honours together satisfy the requirements of the four sections of the Pass Examination.

Questions will be set involving (1) the translation of passages in French or in German, and (2) answers with regard to the subject-matter thereof. Candidates are recommended to read some books or papers in French or in German on the subjects which they select for the examination.

The questions in French or in German, which by the regulations are set for the home candidates, will be made optional in the examinations as held in the Colonies.

The Examiners shall be at liberty to test any candidate by means of *visà voce* questions.

Every candidate must state upon his form of entry the subject or subjects (if any) in which he desires to be examined for Honours.

No candidate may take both the Pass and the Honours Papers in the same subject, but every candidate must take the Pass Papers in those of his selected subjects in which he does not offer himself for Honours. Candidates who take Honours in Mathematics (Pure and Applied) will only be required to take two other subjects of the examination.

N.B.—No candidate offering an Experimental Science subject will be allowed to pass who fails to satisfy the Examiners in the practical part as well as the written part of the examination in the subject chosen.

Candidates shall not be approved by the Examiners unless they have shown at one and the same examination a competent

knowledge in all of the four subjects selected by them out of the foregoing seven subjects of the examination.†

A candidate who enters for but fails to obtain Honours in Mathematics may be recommended by the Examiners for a Pass in that subject if they are satisfied that he has shown such a competent knowledge thereof as is required by the regulations for the Pass Examination.‡

Simple Cases of Direct and Oblique Impact.

Same as for Intermediate Examination in Arts.

Chemistry.

Same as for Intermediate Examination in Arts.

Botany.

Same as for Intermediate Examination in Arts.

Zoology (Two Papers and a Practical Examination).

1. The fundamental facts and laws of Zoology, as exhibited in the following types:—Amœba, Euglena, Paramecium, Monocystis, Hydra, Obelia, Lumbricus, Distomum, Astacus, Amphioxus, Scyllium, Rana, Lepus.

2. The student will be expected to acquire a practical knowledge of the general organization of each of the types above specified and an elementary knowledge of—

(a) The chief biological laws which the structural phenomena illustrate, including an elementary knowledge of heredity, variation, and evolution.

(b) The structure and properties of the Cell, and the general characters of the Tissues, including Epithelia, Blood, Lymph; Nervous, Muscular, Connective, and Skeletal Tissues; and the microscopic structure of the more important organs of the body.

(c) The phenomena of Sexual and Asexual Reproduction, including the general history and characters of the Germ Cells, the chief types of Segmentation of the fertilized Ovum, the Metamorphosis of the Frog, and an elementary knowledge of the Development of the Chick up to the third day of incubation, and the formation of the Fœtal Membranes in the Bird and Mammal.

3. A knowledge of the diagnostic characters of the following groups:—

Protozoa:—Lobosa, Foraminifera, Radiolaria, Sporozoa, Flagellata, Ciliata.

Coelenterata:—Hydrozoa, Anthozoa.

Platyhelminia:—Turbellaria, Trematoda, Cestoda.

Annelida:—Oligochata, Polychata.

Articulata:—Crustacea, Insecta, Arachnada.

Chordata:—Urochorda, Cephalochorda.

Craniata:—Pisces, Reptilia, Amphibia, Aves, Mammalia

* This List of Honours Subjects will be revised at intervals of five years. The next Revised List in Greek will be published in 1924 to take effect in 1926.

† Candidates who in any year from 1880 to 1896 inclusive have passed the Intermediate Examination in Science, and candidates who in and after 1897 shall have passed that examination taking the following subjects, viz. Experimental Physics, Chemistry, Botany, and Zoology, will, for the purposes of these regulations, be credited with having passed the First Examination for Medical Degrees.

‡ Candidates who have passed an Intermediate Examination in Science or Agriculture with Chemistry, or Physics, or Botany and Zoology, will be exempted at the First Examination for Medical Degrees from examination in the subjects in which they have passed.

Candidates who have passed the B.Sc. Examination with Physics, or Chemistry, or Botany and Zoology, will be exempted at the First Examination for Medical Degrees from examination in the subjects in which they have passed. No exemption in General Biology at the First Examination for Medical Degrees will be granted to candidates who have not passed an Intermediate Examination in Science, or the B.Sc. Examination with Botany and Zoology.

Candidates who passed in Chemistry at the Intermediate Examination in Science in 1904 will be exempted from further examination in Organic and Applied Chemistry at the Second Examination for Medical Degrees Part I.

Candidates who enter for or have passed the Intermediate Examination in Engineering as External Students may in order to obtain exemption from the whole of the Intermediate Examination in Science, complete that examination by taking an additional subject at the Intermediate Examination in Engineering. Such additional subject may be taken either at an entry for the Intermediate Examination in Engineering or at any Intermediate Examination in Engineering subsequent to that at which the candidate has passed; and a fee of Rs. 70/50 will be payable in respect of each entry in such additional subject.

Candidates who enter for or have passed the Intermediate Examination in Engineering will be allowed to complete the Intermediate Examination in Science as above, and also, should they so desire, to enter for the B.Sc. Examination in the same year in which they do so complete, provided that they have passed the Intermediate Examination in Engineering not less than one year previously.

Candidates who have passed the Intermediate Examination in Agriculture may claim exemption at the Intermediate Examination in Science from subjects which could have been taken at the Intermediate Examination in Science.

Candidates must bear in mind that the standard of attainment for the Honours Examination is much higher than that for the Pass Examination, and they should therefore exercise due caution in making their choice, to which they are required to adhere.

Practical Examination.

The candidate must be prepared to examine microscopically, to dissect, and to describe specimens or parts of the animals comprised in paragraphs 1 and 2 in the foregoing Syllabus (with the exception that for the skull of *Lepus* will be substituted that of *Canis*), and to determine the zoological position of specimens in accordance with paragraph 3 above. The list of animals may be changed from time to time, but two years' notice of any change will always be given.

Candidates are required to bring to the Practical Examination their original Laboratory Notebooks for inspection, should the Examiners so desire. These Notebooks must be taken away by the candidates at the close of the examination.

Geology (Two Papers and a Practical Examination).

I.—Physical Geology.—Same as for Intermediate Examination in Arts.

II.—Mineralogy.—Elements of Crystallography as exemplified by Crystals of Galena, Pyrite, Zircon, Beryl, Calcite, Quartz, Barytes, Gypsum, Albite. Twin Crystals. Crystallographic Notation.

Physical Properties and Chemical Constitution of Minerals; the relations existing between these and Crystalline Form (Isomorphism and Polymorphism), Crystalline Form, Physical Properties, Chemical Composition, and General Mode of Occurrence of the following Minerals:—Graphite; Diamond, Pyrite, Marcasite, Copper Pyrites, Galena, Zinc-Blende, Rock Salts; Fluor. Quartz, Chalcedony, Opal; Zircon, Rutile, Cassiterite, Corundum, Ilmenite, Hematite; Limonite, Spinel, Magnetite, Chromite. Argonite; Calcite, Dolomite, Magnesite, Chalybite. Barytes, Anhydrite; Gypsum. Apatite. Felspars (Orthoclase, Microcline, Albite, Oligoclase, Labradorite, Anorthite). Felpathoids (Nepheline, Leucite, Sodalite, Nosean, Hauyne). Micæ (Muscovite, Lepidolite, Biotite, Phlogopite). Pyroxenes (Enstatite, Hypersthene, Diopside, Augite, Diallage, Aegerine). Amphiboles (Anthophyllite, Tremolite, Actinolite, Hornblende, Riebeckite, Glaucophane). Olivine; Garnet; Kyanite, Sillimanite, Andalusite, Topaz; Staurolite; Cordierite; Tourmaline, Spheñ. Zeolites (Analcime, Appophyllite, Natrolite); Kaolin; Epidote; Chlorite, Chloritoid; Tale; Serpentine.

EXAMINATION FOR HONOURS.*

Any candidate who presents himself at the Intermediate Examination in Science for examination in four subjects may be examined for Honours at the same examination in the following subject:—

Mathematics.

Same as for Intermediate Examination in Arts.

Chemistry.

Chemistry treated more fully than at the Pass Examination.

Practical Examination.

[Candidates will be allowed to bring into the Examination Laboratory any one book on Quantitative Analysis provided that it do not contain any reference to Qualitative Analysis.]

The subjects of the Pass Examination treated more fully. Candidates may be required to make simple Chemical preparations according to instructions given at the time of Examination.

For this Examination two Papers shall be set and a Practical Examination held on the days appointed in the Order of Examinations.

Candidates must bring to the Practical Examination the original notebooks containing the record of their laboratory work.

Zoology.*

The Typical Structure and mode of Development with the chief deviations from each, of every class in the Animal Kingdom.

Candidates may also be tested practically by description of the whole or parts of skeletons and skulls and by dissection of animals selected from the following lists:—

Skeletons and Skulls for Description.

Notidanus (skull only), Scyllium, Chimaera (skull only), Protopterus, Acipenser, Salmo, Rana, Monitor, Chelone, Crocodilus (skull only), Columba, Echidna, Lepus, Canis (skull only), Sus (skull only), Ovis (skull only), Lemur (skull only), Cebus (skull only), Chimpanzee (skull only), Man.

* Candidates for Honours Examinations must forward their entries so as to reach the Education Office not later than December 31.

† Any candidate whether Internal or External, who has passed on one and the same occasion in all the subjects of the Intermediate Examination in Arts, Science, Economics, or Engineering, shall be exempted from examination at the Intermediate Examination in Agriculture in any subject in which he passed at such examination; and may thereafter be examined in any remaining subjects of the Intermediate Examination in Agriculture, and, if successful therein, at the B.Sc. (Agriculture) Examination in the same year.

Animals for Dissection.

Hydra, Obelia, Aurelia, Aleyonium, Lumbricus, Nereis, Sipunculus, Hirudo, Anodonta, Helix, Haliotis Sepia, Lepus, Asellus, Astacus, Carcinus, Periplaneta, Apis (appendages only), Pieris (appendages only), Scolopendra (appendages only), Ascaris, Ciona, Amphioxus, Scyllium, Raia, Rana, Columba, Lepus.

For this Examination two Papers shall be set and a Practical Examination held on the days appointed in the Order of Examinations.

Candidates must bring to the Practical Examination the original notebooks containing the record of their laboratory work.

SUBJECTS FOR THE INTERMEDIATE EXAMINATION IN SCIENCE (AGRICULTURE).

Candidates shall be examined for a pass in (1) Chemistry, (2) Botany, (3) Zoology, and (4) One of the following subjects:—Pure Mathematics, Applied Mathematics, Physics, Geology.

Candidates shall not be approved by the Examiners unless they have shown at one and the same examination a competent knowledge in all of the four subjects of the examination.†

Question will be set involving (1) the translation of passages in French or in German, and (2) answers with regard to the subject matter thereof. Candidates are recommended to read some books or papers in French or in German on the subjects which they select for the examination.

The questions in French or in German, which by the regulations are set for the home candidates, will be made optional in the examinations as held in the Colonies.

The Examiners shall be at liberty to test any candidate by means of *vivæ voce* questions.

N.B.—No candidate offering an Experimental Science subject will be allowed to pass who fails to satisfy the Examiners in the practical part as well as the written part of the examination in the subjects chosen.

Chemistry.

Same as for Intermediate Examination in Arts.

Botany.

Same as for Intermediate Examination in Arts.

Zoology.

Same as for Intermediate Examination in Science.

Pure Mathematics.

Same as for Intermediate Examination in Arts.

Applied Mathematics.

Same as for Intermediate Examination in Science.

Experimental Physics.

Same as for Intermediate Examination in Arts.

Geology (Two Papers).

I.—Physical Geology.—The Earth as a Planet. Its larger surface features.

Atmospheric Agents and their Effects. Action of surface and underground waters, and of ice. The Ocean; its Movements and Work.

Distribution of Temperature and Pressure in the Earth; and its Density. The Internal Forces and their Effects. Subsidence and Elevation. Volcanoes and Earthquakes.

Characters and Relations of Rock Masses. The Modes of Formation and Occurrence of Aqueous and Igneous Rocks (Strike, Dip, Jointing, Folding, Faulting, Cleavage, Foliation; Interbedding and Intrusion of Igneous Rocks); Features produced by Denudation (Outcrop Escarpments, Outliers, Inliers, Unconformity, Overlap).

II.—Elementary Mineralogy and Petrology.—Physical Characters and Chemical Composition of common rock-forming Minerals. Classification and Description of Rocks. The more important relations of rocks one to another and the changes which they have undergone.

III.—Elementary Stratigraphy.—Stratigraphical Geology. Nature and Relations of the chief Fossils characteristic of the successive Geological Periods.

IV.—Economic Geology.—The origin of Soils and Sub-soils, and their relations to underlying rocks. Special knowledge of the nature and distribution of Drift deposits. The circulation of underground and surface waters. The character and occurrence of rocks used as Building Stone, Road Metal, Brick Earth. The nature and distribution of mineral or rock deposits of importance in agriculture.

Candidates who have passed an Intermediate Examination in Agriculture, with Chemistry, or Physics, or Botany and Zoology, will be exempted at the First Examination for Medical Degrees from examination in the subjects in which they have passed, but the full fee for that examination must be paid.

No exemption in General Biology at the First Examination for Medical Degrees will be granted to candidates who have not passed both in Botany and in Zoology.

Practical Examination.

Description and identification of common rock-forming Minerals and of the principal varieties of Rocks. The study of the structure of the chief types of rocks in thin sections under the microscope.

Identification of common Fossils and recognition of their stratigraphical horizon.

The Interpretation of simple Geological maps by description and the drawing of sections.

Candidates are required to bring to the Practical Examination their *original* Laboratory Notebooks for inspection, should the Examiners so desire. These Notebooks must be taken away by the candidates at the close of the examination.

APPENDIX.

Statute 116 :—

116. Every candidate for admission as a student of the University shall pass such Entrance or Matriculation Examination, or fulfil such other tests of fitness to be admitted as a student, as may be from time to time prescribed.

REGULATION AS TO EXEMPTION FROM THE MATRICULATION EXAMINATION.

Graduates of such British, Colonial, and Indian Universities as are approved by the Senate for that purpose, and those who have passed all the examinations required for a degree in those Universities, also women who have obtained Tripos Certificates granted by the University of Cambridge, and women who have obtained certificates showing that, under the conditions prescribed by the Delegacy for women students at Oxford, they have passed the Second Public Examination of that University or have obtained Honours in the Oxford University Examination for Women in Modern Languages, may on application be registered as Matriculated Students on payment of the registration fee of £3. 3s. without passing the Matriculation Examination.

For conditions under which the following examinations will give exemption from the Matriculation Examination of the University of London, see separate regulations obtainable on application to the External Registrar, University of London, South Kensington, London, S.W. 7 :—

Oxford Senior Local Examination.

Higher Certificate Examination of the Oxford and Cambridge Schools Examination Board.

School Certificate of the Oxford and Cambridge Schools Examination Board.

Previous Examination of the University of Cambridge.

Matriculation Examination of the Joint Board of the Northern Universities.

School Certificate of the Joint Matriculation Board of the Northern Universities.

Scotch School-leaving Certificate Examination.

For conditions under which the Cambridge Senior School Certificate Examination will give exemption from the Matriculation Examination, see regulations for Matriculation Examination.

The Standing of students registered under Statute 116 shall date, for the purposes of External Examinations, from the Matriculation Examination immediately preceding the date of registration. (See Extract from Statute 120 below.) To secure that a registration under Statute 116 shall date from any Matriculation Examination, such registration must be completed before the commencement of the next Matriculation Examination.

Oxford and Cambridge Graduates in First or Second Class Honours can be admitted to their Degree Examination in any Faculty except Medicine after two years from their registration.

N.B.—Applications for registration must be accompanied by the proper fee and official documentary evidence of qualification in accordance with the above regulation. Drafts must be made payable to the "University of London," and crossed "London County and Westminster and Parrs Bank, Brompton Square Branch." The fee and evidence must be forwarded together by registered post and addressed to the External Registrar, University of London, South Kensington, London, S.W. 7.

EXTRACT FROM STATUTE 120.

"No student shall be admitted to the Final Examination for a degree until the expiration of at least three years after Matriculation, unless the Senate in special cases or special classes of cases otherwise determine."

"Improvements in means for obtaining motive power."

Abstract.—The inventor describes a process of generating power in which alcohol is used instead of the water in the ordinary steam engine, whereby owing to the lower specific heat and latent heat of the alcohol greater thermal efficiency is produced.

The claims are :—

1. The herein described process of generating power which comprises vaporizing alcohol under pressure and conducting the alcohol vapor into a steam engine.
2. In the boiler-engine system of obtaining motive power, the employment of alcohol as the liquid to be vaporized, whereby a substantial improvement in the thermal efficiency of the system is produced.

"Improvements in and relating to vulcanizing processes and apparatus for the manufacture of high pressure expanded vulcanized rubber and like substances."

Abstract.—In the manufacture of porous expanded india rubber by vulcanization in an inert gas under high pressure, a wax or resinous substance, such as ceresin, is added to the ingredients to minimize the diffusion of gas from the spongy mass. The wax or resin may be omitted from the outer layer, which then gradually loses its gas and forms a resilient skin which prevents excessive expansion of the interior mass. The ingredients are placed in a shell surrounded by an outer vessel which is provided with a heating-jacket. Compressed gas is admitted to the vessel, and when a certain pressure is attained adjustable automatic valves in the passages admit the gas to the inner shell. Heat is then applied, and temperature and pressure are gradually increased to the maximum values of about 305° F. and 75 atmospheres. When vulcanization is complete, the temperature is first somewhat reduced and then the vessel is rapidly exhausted. The automatic valves retain a pressure of about 100 lb. per square inch in the shell which is allowed to remain until the product has cooled and is then released. A mixture of rubber and balata may be substituted for pure rubber if desired, but the proportion of rubber should not be less than one-third.

The claims are :—

1. In a process for manufacturing rubber substance, the application of an inert gas under pressure to the interior mass within a skin or covering of porous rubber which maintains permanently the equilibrium of tension and pressure after vulcanization, substantially as set forth.
2. In a process for manufacturing an expanded vulcanized rubber, as in claim 1, the admixture of a wax or fluxing substance for the purpose of forming a permanent and substantially impervious material which will retain an inert gas under pressure, substantially as set forth.
3. In a process for manufacturing an expanded rubber, the application of two bodies of different grades of rubber compound each containing gas under pressure, the gas being permanently retained by the inner body, while the external body diffuses its gas and forms an external skin or covering to the inner body mechanically preventing the disruption of the inner mass after vulcanization, substantially as set forth.
4. In an apparatus of the character described, for use as in claim 1, a high pressure vulcanizing chamber in combination with a removable inner pressure chamber provided with inlet and outlet valves automatically to control the discharge of the fluid pressure at a predetermined limit by the variation of the external gas pressure.
5. In an apparatus of the character described, for use as in claim 1, a high pressure vulcanizing chamber in combination with a removable inner pressure chamber provided with inlet and outlet valves which automatically control the entry and discharge of a fluid pressure at two rates of working which pertain to the rates of working of entry and discharge of the gas or fluid at low and high pressure controlled automatically by the variation of the external gas pressure in the gum.
5. A compound rubber substance consisting of an interior mass of rubber with the admixture of some suitable sealing compound under high gas pressure, and an exterior skin of rubber under tension in equilibrium with the interior gas pressures manufactured, substantially as described.

"Improvements in roller bearings."

Abstract.—Bearing rollers are formed with ellipsoidal surfaces and flat ends so proportioned that the moment of inertia of each roller about its normal axis of rotation is greater than that about any other axis passing through its centre. The radius of curvature of the rollers is less than the radius of curvature of the raceways. With this arrangement, the

rollers tend to return to the normal position if slightly displaced. By eccentrically displacing one of the race-rings, the full number of rollers can be inserted edgewise without the need for filling-openings, the rollers being afterwards spaced around the bearing and turned into the running position.

The claims are:—

1. A roller-bearing of the type set forth in which the rollers are proportioned in such a manner, that their moment of inertia with reference to their normal axis of rotation exceeds the moment of inertia with reference to any other axis passing through their centre of gravity, and in which the radius of the transverse curvature of the raceways is larger than the radius of the transverse curvature of the operative surface of the rollers.

2. A roller-bearing as claimed in Claim 1, in which the rollers are of such breadth, that this breadth multiplied by the number of rollers in the bearing is equal or nearly equal to half of the circumference of the bearing measured along the outer edge of the inner ring.

3. The improved roller-bearing, substantially as hereinbefore described and as illustrated in the accompanying drawings.
