WHEREAS by the 5th section of "The Prisons Ordinance, No. 16 of 1877," as amended by section 1 of Ordinance No. 24 of 1890, it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, to establish any prison for this Island or for any part thereof :

And whereas it is expedient to establish a prison at Ratnapura :

Now know Ye that We, the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, in exercise of the powers vested in Us as aforesaid, do by this Our Proclamation establish the lock-up at Ratnapura as a prison at Ratnapura aforesaid for the reception of prisoners of every description committed or remanded under the authority of the several courts of the Island, for the period of the Ratnapura Sessions of the Supreme Court of the Island of Ceylon, which begin on Monday, August 21, 1922.

Given at Colombo, in the said Island of Ceylon, this Fourteenth day of August, in the year of our Lord One thousand Nine hundred and Twenty-two.

**S**PECIAL Regulations relating to the shipping and transshipping of goods made under section 79 of Ordinance No. 17 of 1869 by His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council:—

*Exportation.*

1. With all goods brought for shipment shall be sent a note giving particulars as to the number and contents of packages, the ship by which they are to be shipped, and the name of the shipper. It shall be given up at the gate to the Tide Waiter on duty. A separate note shall be sent with each cart, lorry, or other vehicle.
2. A shipping specification shall be furnished for all dutiable cargo sent for shipment, and no cargo shall be shipped until such specification has been received by the Export Officer.
3. (i.) With each boat load of goods laden for shipment shall be sent a boat note specifying the number of packages and the marks and numbers or other description thereof, and the name of the vessel to which the packages are to be shipped, and the port of destination, and such boat note shall be furnished and signed by the shipper or his agent.  
(ii.) Boat notes for all goods laden for shipment shall, after such examination as the Landing Waiters consider necessary, be initialled and stamped by the Locker.  
(iii.) Masters of vessels are prohibited from accepting boat notes not bearing the Customs stamp.
4. (i.) No goods shall be shipped before entries have been passed, except in cases where the deposit required by section 6 of the regulations of May 30, 1900 (see Customs Pamphlet No. 1, page 9), has been made. Shipment will not be allowed, where the estimated duty on the proposed shipment exceeds the amount standing to the credit of the shipper, without the special permission of a Supervising Officer, and then only if rule 2 has been complied with.  
(ii.) Entry must be passed, and further rent and dues, if any, paid within four days of the clearance of the vessel.
5. (i.) In the event of any goods laden for shipment being shut out for any reason, the original boat note shall be produced to the Landing Waiter before re-landing with an endorsement thereon signed by the Shipping Company's Agent giving the number and description of the packages shut out. No such goods shall be re-landed until the Landing Waiter has given permission to do so and has initialled and dated the boat note.  
(ii.) If the boat note cannot be produced, or if the Shipping Company desires its return, application to re-land shall be made in writing, giving full particulars of such cargo.

6. The delivery for shipment shall close the first period of deposit as regards all dues. On re-landing and re-deposit in the warehouse a fresh period shall commence from the day on which the cargo was shut out.

7. In the case of sailing vessels—

(i.) If before all the cargo has been discharged the vessel has to be stiffened, the Master may on application obtain a stiffening order, on production of which to the Export Officer permission may be given for the delivery of the cargo therein mentioned for shipment;

(ii.) If no stiffening order has been granted, the Master must submit the clearing bill duly reported upon before shipment will be permitted.

*Transshipment.*

8. Unless special permission has been obtained to land the cargo into an Import Warehouse, all goods for transshipment, to be entitled to be treated as transshipment cargo, must be deposited in a Transshipment Warehouse and re-shipped therefrom on applications on the proper forms. No re-shipment shall be allowed until deposit and shipment applications have been received by the Transshipment Landing Waiter.

9. If transshipment cargo has been landed into an Import Warehouse and cannot be removed to a Transshipment Warehouse for want of space, a certificate from the Transshipment Officer to this effect should be obtained on the deposit application, and from the date of such certificate the cargo may be treated for computation of harbour dues and rent as removed to a Transshipment Warehouse.

10. Boat notes for transshipment cargo to be shipped shall be stamped and initialled by the Locker or Transshipment Landing Waiter.

11. Transshipment cargo may be delivered for shipment before payment of dues when the application is signed by steamer agents who have given a bond.

12. If any portion of the cargo taken for shipment is shut out, it shall not be re-landed without a written permission on an application which shall be produced to the Transshipment Landing Waiter specifying the cargo shut out.

13. Separate applications shall be furnished for shipments to different vessels.

14. Applications to tranship direct from ship to ship shall be furnished in duplicate, and, when sanctioned by a Supervising Officer, shall be taken first to the Export Officer to be noted, and then to the Charges Officer, who shall appoint an officer to each vessel to tally the deliveries and receipts by boat notes.

15. (i.) Coastwise goods brought for transshipment, if on a through Bill of Lading are free of harbour dues, both inward and outward, but are liable to rent at the same rate as coastwise cargo locally consigned.

(ii.) In all other cases such goods are liable to harbour dues and rent as ordinary coastwise cargo, both inward and outward, if landed, outward only if re-shipped without being landed.

16. (i.) Goods brought from abroad and re-shipped to a coastwise port (including passengers' baggage not cleared on a declaration) shall be treated as transshipment cargo, and dues levied thereon according to the warehouse in which they are allowed to remain. The usual application to deposit should be furnished, but, before re-shipment, instead of the outward application, an entry containing the name of the landing vessel, port of sailing, marks, number of packages, description, and value of the goods shall be passed. Such entry shall bear on its face the words "To be removed under section 46 of Ordinance No. 17 of 1869 to \_\_\_\_\_ in the ss. '\_\_\_\_\_'."

(ii.) A bond must be entered into in double the amount of duty leviable for the payment to the Collector at the port of destination of the amount of duty due and for the due delivery of the goods.

(iii.) Such goods are not liable to export harbour dues.

17. For a breach of any one of these rules the Collector of Customs may impose a penalty not exceeding Fifty Rupees (Rs. 50) in the aggregate, and such penalty may be recovered as a fine by a Police Court on the Collector of Customs certifying that such penalty is due.

## " THE CEYLON RAILWAYS ORDINANCE, 1902."

**R**ULE made by His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, under section 5 of "The Railways Ordinance, 1902," in substitution for clause 32 c of the rules relating to the conveyance of traffic by goods train, dated January 22, 1914, and published in *Government Gazette* No. 6,604 of January 30, 1914 :—

32 c. *Petroleum in packages.*—Petroleum in wooden cases containing two tins or in substantial drums or barrels will be conveyed at the special rates sanctioned for the conveyance of kerosine oil in bulk, namely, 8 cents per ton per mile over all sections of the line below Nawalapitiya, and 10 cents per ton per mile above Nawalapitiya (exclusive of the Uda Pussellawa Line), but the minimum charge will be as for the following loads per wagon from one consignor to one consignee, provided that where tank wagons have been specially provided for any consignor for the conveyance of petroleum in bulk, the special rates will only be applied to the conveyance of petroleum in packages, subject to satisfactory loading being guaranteed for such tank wagons :—

Broad gauge 12-ton wagons, minimum charge as for 10 tons (7 tons north of Madawachchi).  
Kelani Valley 14-ton wagons, minimum charge as for 12 tons.

*Petroleum in tins unprotected by cases.*—Until further notice, consignments of petroleum in tins unprotected by cases tendered in wagon loads from one consignor to one consignee will be conveyed under the following conditions and charged for at the above special rates and subject to the same minima :—

- (1) Such consignments will only be conveyed in iron or steel covered wagons.
- (2) A layer of wet loose coconut fibre must be placed on the floor of the vehicle and between each tier of tins. Where goods are transferred from one wagon to another, the fibre used at the place of loading must also be transferred and utilized in packing the tins as specified above.
- (3) Tins must be so loaded that the lower tins cover the whole of the floor space in order to obviate tins on the top tier falling and being damaged in transit.

*Small consignments of petroleum in tins unprotected by cases* will be conveyed in explosive van goods wagons, subject to the conditions specified in clause 46 of the regulations and charged for at 2nd class rates.

Empty receptacles will be returned in truck loads at 12 cents per wagon mile.

Demurrage will be charged if wagons are detained under load for more than 24 hours after arrival.

Any provision contained in any rule made under the said Ordinance in any way contrary to the provision of this rule shall, as from the coming into operation of this rule, be repealed.

## VITAL STATISTICS.

### Registrar-General's Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended August 12, 1922.

**Births.**—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 131 (6 Europeans, 5 Burghers, 87 Sinhalese, 22 Tamils, 6 Moors, 4 Malays, and 1 Other). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on July 1, 1922, viz., 247,642) was 27·6, as against 26·3 in the preceding week, 34·0 in the corresponding week of last year, and 32·8 the weekly average for last year.

**Deaths.**—The total deaths registered were 157 (2 Burghers, 87 Sinhalese, 37 Tamils, 18 Moors, 9 Malays, and 4 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 33·1, as against 30·5 in the previous week, 30·7 in the corresponding week of last year, and 30·5 the weekly average for last year.

**Infantile Deaths.**—Of the 157 total deaths, 37 were of infants under one year of age, as against 35 in the preceding week, 30 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 40 the average for last year.

**Stillbirths.**—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 7.

**Principal Causes of Death.**—1. (a) Twenty-two deaths from *Pneumonia* were registered, 12 in Maradana hospitals (including 7 deaths of non-residents), 3 in Slave Island, 2 each in Kotahena North and Kotahena South, and 1 each in St. Paul's, New Bazaar, and Maradana South, as against 27 in the previous week and 17 the weekly average for last year.

(b) Seven deaths from *Bronchitis* were registered, 3 in Maradana Hospitals (including 1 death of a non-resident), and 1 each in St. Paul's, San Sebastian, Kotahena North, and Kotahena South, as against 3 in the previous week.

(c) Six deaths from *Influenza* was registered, 2 each in San Sebastian and Kollupitiya, and 1 each in Pettah and St. Paul's, as against 4 in the previous week and 5 the weekly average for last year.

2. (a) Eleven deaths from *Phthisis* were registered, 4 in Maradana hospitals (including 3 deaths of non-residents), 2 each in Kotahena South, Maradana North, and Wellawatta North, and 1 in Slave Island, as against 10 in the previous week and 14 the weekly average for last year.

(b) Three deaths of residents of Colombo town occurred at the Ragama hospital from *Phthisis* during the week.

3. Five deaths from *Enteric Fever* were registered in Maradana hospitals (including 2 deaths of non-residents), as against 2 in the previous week and 4 the weekly average for last year.

4. Two deaths from *Plague* were registered, 1 each in Maradana hospital and Slave Island, as against 4 in the previous week and 3 the weekly average for last year.

5. Fifteen deaths were registered from *Debility*, 10 from *Infantile Convulsions*, 5 from *Dysentery*, 4 each from *Diarrhœa* and *Enteritis*, 1 each from *Worms*, *Tetanus*, and *Puerperal Septicæmia*, and 63 from *Other Causes*.

6. Twelve cases of *Enteric Fever*, 5 of *Chickenpox*, 3 of *Measles*, and 1 of *Plague* were reported during the week, as against 8, 4, 7, and 3 respectively of the preceding week.

**State of the Weather.**—The mean temperature of air was 81·4°, against 82·1° in the preceding week and 80·3° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29·870 in., against 29·856 in. in the preceding week, and 29·938 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was nil, against 0·06 in. in the preceding week and 1·01 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.

## MISCELLANEOUS DEPARTMENTAL NOTICES.

**Directions under Rule 9 of Regulations published in "Gazette" of June 30, 1922, under Sections 3 and 4 of Insect Pest and Quarantine Ordinance, for Payment of Fumigatorium Fees.**

1. Whenever any plants, seeds, &c., require fumigation, the consignee or his agent shall, after paying all necessary import duty and dues, apply at the baggage office, not later than 12 noon, for the services of the fumigatorium attendant, and pay the prescribed fee of 50 cents per package. The application shall be made in the form appended at schedule B.

2. (i.) The charges officer on receiving the application, and ascertaining that all import dues and duty where necessary have been paid, shall receive the fumigation fee, grant a receipt, and appoint an officer to supervise the removal of the consignment, under Customs supervision, to the fumigatorium. The customary fee for such supervision must be paid by the consignee.

(ii.) The charges officer shall at the same time notify the fumigatorium attendant.

3. The tidewaiters supervising the removal of the consignment shall take the application form duly certified by the charges officer and hand it over with the consignment to the attendant at the fumigatorium.

4. The fumigatorium attendant shall certify on the application form the receipt of the consignment and proceed with the fumigation necessary in each case.

5. (i.) On completion of the fumigation, the fumigatorium attendant shall certify the fact on the application form, and if the consignee so desires fill in and hand over to him the duplicate certificate on the detachable form at the bottom of the application.

(ii.) The fumigatorium attendant shall then hand over the application form to the tide-waiter supervising the removal of the consignment.

6. The tidewaiter will then accompany the consignment to the Kochchikade gate. The gate officer will tally the consignment out of the gate, treating the application form duly certified as a cart note.

7. The agent of the consignee will then sign, and the tidewaiter and gate officer initial the form, and the tidewaiter will take it back with him to the charges officer to be forwarded to the landing waiter in charge of the Blue Book.

8. The charges officer will keep a register of all fumigation fees received, and account for such fees as in the case of his other daily takings at the baggage office.

## WESTERN PROVINCE.

## COLOMBO DISTRICT.

Paddy: (a) prospect of the coming crop (yala), thriving; (b) prospect of the yield, a good crop is expected; (c) cultivation has commenced in almost all the korales for the maha season; (d) general remarks, nil.

Dry grains: the kurakkan crops in Siyane korale east, Siyane korale west, and Hewagam korale are thriving.

Coconuts: (a) prospect of the coming crop, fair; (b) probable yield is about 73,600,000 nuts; (c) estimated crop just harvested, 73,200,000 nuts; (d) general remarks, nil.

Other products: (a) prospect of the coming crop, good; (b) probable yield, nil; (c) estimated crop just harvested, nil; (d) general remarks, nil.

Condition of fisheries and tanks: satisfactory.

Weather: rainfall for the month in the Colombo Observatory was 2.71 inches in 10 days.

Harvest prospects: fair.

General: nil.

## KALUTARA DISTRICT.

Paddy: the paddy plants of the yala season are forming into ear. A fairly good crop can be expected.

Dry grain: there is very little dry grain cultivation in the district.

Coconuts: the month's crop is estimated at 2,246,700 nuts.

Other products: fruit and vegetables were as usual scarce.

## CENTRAL PROVINCE.

## KANDY DISTRICT.

Paddy: fields for maha ready for sowing. Yala fields flowering and ripening.

Dry grain: kurakkan chenas are blossoming.

Coconuts: usual crops have been plucked.

Other products: there was a fair yield of cacao and pepper. Price of green tea leaf has slightly risen.

Dry grains: nil.

Coconuts: 6,919 estimated crop.

Prices of foodstuffs: country rice, Rs. 5.50 to Rs. 7 per bushel; paddy, Rs. 2.50 to Rs. 3 per bushel; imported rice, Rs. 7 to Rs. 9.50 per bushel; kurakkan, Re. 1.75 to Rs. 2.50 per bushel; maize, Re. 1.75 to Rs. 3 per bushel; coconuts, Rs. 7 to Rs. 15 per 100 nuts; salt, 15 to 18 cents per measure.

Health of inhabitants: good. There were a few cases of chickenpox, measles, influenza, and sore-eyes in the villages.

Health of cattle: good. There were a few cases of foot-and-mouth disease in Kotmale.

Weather: Dry weather prevailed in Uda Hewaheta and Walapane, while it was very wet in Kotmale and the gravets.

## MATALE DISTRICT.

## Minutes of Proceedings of a General Meeting of the Municipal Council of Colombo held in the Town Hall on Wednesday, July 5, 1922, at 3 p.m.

The Council met this day at 3 P.M., pursuant to notice dated June 28, 1922.

*Present* :—Mr. T. Reid, Chairman; Mr. C. P. Dias; the Hon. Mr. N. H. M. Abdul Cader; the Hon. Mr. H. L. De Mel, C.B.E.; Dr. W. P. Rodrigo; Mr. W. C. S. Ingles; Mr. Harold Creasy; Mr. W. Philips; Mr. E. W. Jayewardene; Mr. R. L. Pereira; Mr. C. H. Z. Fernando; Mr. T. H. Tatham; Mr. J. S. Collett; Mr. G. Adamjee Lukmanjee; Mr. W. E. V. de Rooy; the Hon. Dr. G. Thornton; and Mr. G. W. Dodds.

1. The Minutes of the General Meeting of June 7, 1922, having been previously printed and copies thereof having been sent to each Member of Council, were taken as read.

Resolved that the Minutes of the General Meeting of June 7, 1922, be confirmed.

2. Pursuant to notice, Dr. W. P. Rodrigo asked the Chairman, whether he is aware that a portion of the asphalt coating lately put on in the Maligakanda reservoir has come down? If so, will he be good enough to tell the Council what proportion accurately of the whole work has been so lost and to what causes he attributes it? Does any portion of this failure encroach on the cracks reported on before the work was sanctioned. Is the reservoir exposed to any serious danger on account of this mishap?

The Chairman replied as follows :—

The Waterworks Engineer reports :—“The Chairman was informed by me that a small patch about 6 feet by 4 feet of asphalt lining had come off. The portion necessitating re-asphalting, including the above patch, owing to the concrete wall being damp behind the asphalt is 0.77 per cent. of the whole work. The asphalt removed was re-used. The cause was owing to water percolating through the concrete walls from the embankment, which causes the formation of a blister or a swelling on the surface of the asphalt. It is only when the water level in the reservoir is below such affected parts that this occurs. In my report on the completion of the work I stated that the pathway round the reservoir at top of the embankment was asphalted to minimize such occurrences. No portion of the repairs encroached on cracks. As regards the question ‘Is the reservoir exposed to any serious danger on account of this mishap’ the answer is, ‘no.’ Nothing has occurred which has not happened frequently since the first lining of the reservoir. What happened was anticipated, and regular inspection is made of the surface of the reservoir walls when the water falls to the lowest level for the day, and any repairs necessary done immediately.”

Mr. C. P. Dias moved that the Council do go into Committee to consider items Nos. 3 to 7 (inclusive) on the agenda.

Mr. W. C. S. Ingles seconded.—Carried.

3-7. The following extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committees, named, were then laid before the Council in Committee :—

*Extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Law and General Subjects of June 17, 1922.*

(3) To consider the allegations made by Wellappa Nadar (Vellai Nadar) in his letter to the Chairman dated February 24, 1922, on the mandatory order from the Municipal Magistrate to demolish the unauthorized buildings put up by him at No. 140, Dematagoda.—Recommended that Wellappa Nadar (Vellai Nadar) be prosecuted, the Council bearing the cost of the prosecution.

(5) To recommend re-conveyance of premises No. 880A/18, Fourth Cross street, vested in Council, to Ahamado Ally Abdul Raheman and Oduma Lebbe Marikar Yoosooif Lebbe for the western portion of the land shown on plan No. 2,165 of July 1, 1921 (as regards the eastern portion there is no evidence of title), on payment of all rates and costs which would have been due up to the end of the quarter in which the re-conveyance is signed, had the property not been vested in the Council. (A sum of Rs. 1,194.35 has been paid up to and including the 1st quarter, 1922.)—Recommended.

(6) To recommend re-conveyance of premises No. 699/34, Kirillapona, vested in the Council, to Kahawe Vidanelage Don Mathias Appuhamy, as regards an undivided 3/5ths and 13/14ths of an undivided 1/5th thereof, on payment of all rates and costs which would have been due up to the end of the quarter in which the re-conveyance is signed, had the property not been vested in the Council. (A sum of Rs. 157.72 has been paid up to and including the 2nd quarter, 1922, subject to the unsatisfied mortgages on the property, *vide* Messrs. Julius & Creasy's report dated November 9, 1920.)—Recommended.

(8) To recommend re-conveyance of premises Nos. 87/3 and 88/3, Albion road, vested in Council, to Pana Lana Pana Lana Palaniappa Chetty, on payment of all rates and costs which would have been due up to the end of the quarter in which the re-conveyance is signed, had the property not been vested in the Council. (A sum of Rs. 1,171.22 has been paid up to and including the 1st quarter, 1922, subject to the uncanceled mortgages mentioned in Messrs. Julius & Creasy's report dated February 8, 1922.)—Recommended.

(11) To recommend re-conveyance of premises No. 2,198/5, Forbes lane, vested in Council, to Caluharage Hendrick de Silva, on payment of all the rates and costs which would have been due up to the end of the quarter in which the re-conveyance is signed, had the property not been vested in the Council. (A sum of Rs. 790.38 has been paid up to and including the 1st quarter, 1922.)—Recommended.

(14) To consider the proposal to widen Colpetty road. The Committee are of opinion that a 78-foot road would be sufficient for the present, and recommend that the road should be widened to this width from Turret road corner to the Galle Face Hotel corner.—Recommended, in addition, that the land needed be acquired at once at a cost of about Rs. 250,000.

#### Resolutions.

With regard to item No. 3 (corresponding to item No. 2 of the extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Sanitation and Markets of June 19, 1922), Dr. W. P. Rodrigo moved that the matter be referred back to the Law Committee to take action in the ordinary course by a reference to the Hon. the Attorney-General. Mr. C. P. Dias seconded. Mr. C. H. Z. Fernando supported.

The Chairman gave the history of the matter to show the Council how the Committees had come to this decision. He supported the recommendation of the Committees. The Hon. Mr. H. L. De Mel, C.B.E., spoke to the motion. Mr. E. W. Jayewardene supported the recommendation of the Committees. Dr. W. P. Rodrigo replied.

The motion was put to the meeting and lost. It was resolved that the recommendation of the Standing Committee be adopted.

With regard to item No. 14 (corresponding to item No. 18 of the extracts from the Minutes of the Sanitation Committee of June 19, 1922, and item No. 21 of the extracts from the Minutes of the Works and Finance Committees (meeting together) of June 21, 1922), Dr. W. P. Rodrigo moved that the matter be referred back to the Committees for re-consideration. The Hon. Mr. H. L. De Mel seconded. Mr. C. H. Z. Fernando spoke to the motion.

The Chairman explained the facts and controverted some of the statements made by some of the previous speakers. Dr. W. P. Rodrigo replied. Mr. E. W. Jayewardene, Mr. R. L. Pereira, and Mr. T. H. Tatham supported the recommendation of the Committees.

The Chairman suggested that the second paragraph of the recommendation should be altered to read as follows:—“Recommended, in addition, that the land needed be acquired at a cost of about Rs. 250,000, if and when Government approves of the scheme.”

The recommendation of the Committee, as so amended, was put to the meeting and unanimously carried.

Resolved that the recommendations of the Standing Committee with regard to the remaining items be adopted.

#### Extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Sanitation and Markets of June 19, 1922.

(2) To consider the allegations made by Wellappa Nader (Vellai Nader) in his letter to the Chairman dated February 24, 1922, on the mandatory order from the Municipal Magistrate to demolish the unauthorized buildings put up by him at No. 140, Dematagoda.—Recommended that Wellappa Nader (Vellai Nader) be prosecuted, the Council bearing the cost of the prosecution. Dr. W. P. Rodrigo dissenting.

(3) To consider the correspondence with regard to the storage of grain and the declaration of a diseased locality.—Recommended that the prohibition to sell grain in this area, excepting in rat free boutiques, should not be enforced.

Resolved that copies of the regulations *re* rat free boutiques should be sent to the owners of the boutiques.

(5) To recommend that Mr. B. A. Perera, Assistant Market-keeper, be granted 20 days full-pay leave in excess of 91 days full-pay leave allowable from the accumulated leave 1921 and 1922.—Recommended.

(9) To consider a plan and an estimate of Rs. 800, from the Works Engineer, for the erection of a fruit and flower stall on the piece of vacant land near the Queen Victoria Jubilee Fountain.—Recommended.

(10) To consider a plan and an estimate of Rs. 6,184 from the Acting City Sanitation Engineer for the erection of a public latrine at Wasala road.—Recommended.

(17) To consider an application from the Acting City Sanitation Engineer for supplementary provision of Rs. 13,401.73, under vote M. 23, of 1921 “Drainage of Cattle Mart and Slaughter-house.”—Recommended.

(18) To consider the proposal to widen Colpetty road. The Committee are of opinion that a 78-foot road would be sufficient for the present, and recommend that the road should be widened to this width from Turret road corner to Galle Face Hotel corner.—Recommended, in addition, that the land needed be acquired at once at a cost of about Rs. 250,000.

#### Resolutions.

With regard to item No. 18, the recommendation of the Committee was adopted as amended, *vide* resolution of Council on item No. 14 of the extracts from the Minutes of the Law Committee of June 17, 1922, page No. 196 of these Minutes.

Resolved that the recommendations of the Standing Committee with regard to the remaining items be adopted.

#### Extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Municipal Works of June 21, 1922.

(3) To consider a petition presented through Mr. C. H. Z. Fernando, M.M.C., in Council on June 7, 1922, from D. A. Don Gabriel of 15, Temple road, praying that the Council do lay a water main in order to enable him to get a certificate of occupation for his house.—Recommended, as the Council has now laid a main in the Ketawalamulla lane, that he should connect to this main.

(6) To consider the correspondence with regard to advertisement hoardings.—Recommended that the two sites objected to by Government, namely (1) at junction of Torrington place and Buller's road, and (2) at junction of Turret road and Colpetty road, be eliminated from the list of sites.

## Resolutions.

With regard to item No. 6, Dr. W. P. Rodrigo moved that the matter be postponed and that the papers be circulated. Mr. R. L. Pereira seconded.—Carried.

Resolved that the recommendation of the Standing Committee, with regard to the remaining item be adopted:

*Extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committees on Municipal Works and Finance (meeting together) of June 21, 1922.*

(4) To consider the correspondence with regard to the storage of grain and the declaration of a diseased locality.—Recommended that the prohibition to sell grain in this area, excepting in rat free boutiques, should not be enforced.

Resolved that copies of the regulations, re rat free boutiques, should be sent to the owners of the boutiques.

(6) To consider the recommendation of the Waterworks Engineer, that Mr. O. P. Gunawardene be confirmed in the appointment of Inspector, Waterworks Department, on a salary of Rs. 2,160 rising to Rs. 3,600 by increments of Rs. 120 per annum, plus temporary increase of 33½ per cent, and commuted allowance of Rs. 600 per annum. Mr. W. M. Thyne, Waterworks Engineer, and Mr. E. G. B. Calyanaratne were present. Mr. Calyanaratne was permitted to lay his claims before the Committees, which he did. He asked that the decision of the Committees, if adverse to him, should go before the Council.—Recommended that Mr. O. P. Gunawardene be confirmed in the appointment.

(7) To consider (a) the estimate of Rs. 2,700 from the Works Engineer for the opening of the riding track in Victoria park; (b) the correspondence with Government with regard to its contribution of Rs. 2,232.50.—Recommended (a) and (b).

(9) To consider a plan and an estimate of Rs. 800 from the Works Engineer for the erection of a fruit and flower stall on the piece of vacant land near the Queen Victoria Jubilee fountain.—Recommended.

(10) To consider a plan and an estimate of Rs. 6,184 from the Acting City Sanitation Engineer for the erection of a public latrine at Wasala road.—Recommended.

(12) To consider an application from the Executive Committee of the Borella Social Service Circle for a piece of Municipal Council land to put up a building, temporary or otherwise, for their free night school.—Recommended that the land be leased at Re. 1 per mensem on the condition that only a temporary building should be erected, and that the Council may resume possession of the land at any time it requires it.

(13) To consider the conditions of competition for the proposed new Municipal Offices.—Recommended that the conditions of competition and the schedule of rates be approved.

(15) To consider a memorandum of the Acting City Sanitation Engineer, dated May 15, 1922, with regard to acquisition of land (Pansala road widening) and the report of the Municipal Assessor, as follows:—(1) 0.32 perches, Rs. 25; (2) 2.88 perches, Rs. 210.—Recommended.

(16) To consider an application from the Acting City Sanitation Engineer:—(a) for the temporary appointment from June 1, 1922, of a 2nd Grade Draughtsman on a salary of Rs. 720 per annum rising to Rs. 1,140 plus temporary increase, to cope with the extra work consequent on the handing over of the drainage works to his Department; (b) recommending that Mr. D. M. H. Perera, the Drainage Works Draughtsman, who has 14 years service, be appointed to the post applied for on the salary recommended.—Recommended (a) and (b).

(18) To consider the correspondence with regard to the upkeep of road surface on the tramway track.—Recommended that no alteration be made in the present arrangements.

(19) To re-consider the question of the lighting of McCallum road and Prince of Wales' avenue. Resolved that electric light be installed in McCallum road.—Recommended that electric light be installed in Prince of Wales' avenue, and that the offer of Messrs. Boustead Brothers, as detailed in their letter to the Chairman dated May 11, 1922, be accepted.

(21) To consider the proposal to widen Colpetty road. The Committee are of opinion that a 78-foot road would be sufficient for the present, and recommend that the road should be widened to this width from Turret road corner to Galle Face Hotel corner.—Recommended, in addition, that the land needed be acquired at once at a cost of about Rs. 250,000.

(23) To recommend provision of Rs. 250, "Maintenance of Laundries" (City Sanitation Department) to meet the expenses of maintenance from July to December, 1922, (vote M 26).—Recommended.

(24) To consider an application from the Acting City Sanitation Engineer, for supplementary provision of Rs. 13,401.73 under vote M 23 of 1921, "Drainage of Cattle Mart and Slaughter-house".—Recommended.

(25) To consider the recommendation of the Secretary, Municipal Council, with regard to the appointment of a Municipal Printer, when the present holder retires on September 30, 1922.—Recommended that the recommendation of the Secretary be adopted, viz., that a fully qualified man be appointed on a salary of Rs. 1,800 rising to Rs. 3,000 per annum by annual increments of Rs. 120 without temporary increments.

(26) To consider a report of the Works Engineer dated June 15, 1922, with regard to workshop machinery.—Recommended that the supplementary vote of Rs. 20,500 be voted.

(27) To recommend the purchase of 1,000 barrels of cement through the Council's agents for the sum of Rs. 10,810 or about Rs. 10.81 per barrel at Rs. 15 to the pound. This price includes Council's agents commission and is c. i. f., Colombo, and subject to refund of shipping rebate later.—Recommended.

(29) To consider the recommendation of the Financial Assistant that the following quotations for the supply of 3 tons of cotton waste and 10 cwt. of brass scrap be accepted:—(1) S. P. S. S. Chetty for the supply of 3 tons of cotton waste at Rs. 23 per cwt., Rs. 1,380; (2) Messrs. Hoare & Co., for the supply of 10 cwt. brass scrap at 55 cents per lb., Rs. 616; total, Rs. 1,996.—Recommended (1) and (2).

(30) To consider the recommendation of the Financial Assistant, that the quotation of Messrs. Lee, Hedges & Co., Ltd., for the purchase of 1,000 cubic feet of Indian teak squares at Rs. 190 per ton of 50 cubic feet at a total cost of Rs. 3,800, be accepted.—Recommended.

## Resolutions.

With regard to item No. 21 the recommendation of the Committee was adopted, as amended, *vide* resolution of Council on item No. 14 of the extracts from the Minutes of the Law Committee of June 17, 1922, page 196 of these Minutes. Resolved that the recommendations of the Standing Committees with regard to the remaining items be adopted.

(2) To consider the recommendation of the Financial Assistant that the sum of Rs. 872.96 due as rates for 1911 on Crown property, premises No. 208/63, Baseline road, from A. A. Gabo Singho, the lessee, be written off as irrecoverable. The property was outside the Municipal Council limits when the lease was entered into, and as soon as the property was included within the Municipal Council limits the lessee cancelled the lease.—Recommended.

(3) To consider the recommendation of the Financial Assistant:—(1) That 48 days leave granted to Mr. D. H. P. Goonetilleke, Clerk, Finance Department, in excess of 42 days in 1922, be sanctioned; (2) that Mr. Goonetilleke be granted full-pay leave for 3 days in excess of 91 days, in terms of section 10 (3) of the Municipal Council Leave Minute.—Recommended (1) and (2).

(6) To recommend supplementary provision of Rs. 100, under vote L II, "Library," (Assessing Department), the amount provided in the Budget is Rs. 100 as against Rs. 500 last year.—Recommended.

(7) To consider (a) the recommendation of the Acting Superintendent of the Fire Brigade that Fireman, F. N. Amith, of the Fire Brigade be granted house allowance, as from May 1, 1922, at Rs. 7.50 per mensem; (b) the report of the Financial Assistant that supplemental provision of Rs. 60 is necessary if the house allowance is granted.—Recommended (a) and (b).

(9) To recommend the sanction of Council for the purchase of the following for the Fire Brigade :—(1) from Messrs. Shand Mason & Co., London, 24 pairs fireman's boots, 1 pair officer's boots at a total cost of £73 14s. 8d. to be met out of vote G 3, "Uniforms"; (2) from Messrs. Reddaway & Co., Manchester, 3,600 feet fire hose, 1 collecting head, 4 hydrant standpipes, 4 ajax gun metal branches with nozzels at a cost of £437 17s. 3d. to be met out of vote G 7, "Purchase of hose couplings."—Recommended (1) and (2).

(11) To recommend supplementary provision of Rs. 25, under vote C 12, "Purchase of new types for the Printing Department," in order to meet the cost of freight.—Recommended.

(13) To consider (a) a memorandum of the Municipal Assessor dated June 19, 1922, with regard to Symond's road acquisition; (b) an application for supplementary provision of Rs. 9,453 for same.—Recommended supplementary provision of Rs. 9,453.

(15) To consider a letter dated June 19, 1922, from Mr. J. G. Vaandersmagt, Chief Surveyor, Works Department :—(a) tendering his resignation from the Council's service; (b) asking that he may be granted even a gratuity.—Recommended that the resignation be accepted, and that he be informed that the rules of the Council do not allow of a gratuity being granted.

#### Resolutions.

With regard to item No. 15 it was resolved that the consideration of the matter be deferred, and that the papers be circulated. Resolved that the recommendations of the Standing Committee with regard to the remaining items be adopted, Mr. C. P. Dias moved that the Council do resume and that the resolutions of Council in Committee be adopted as amended. The Hon. Mr. H. L. De Mel seconded.—Carried.

The Chairman formally moved in Council that the resolutions of Council in Committee and the recommendations of the various Committees, subject to any amendments of such recommendations by the Council in Committee, be adopted. Mr. C. P. Dias seconded.—Carried.

8. With the permission of Council the Chairman moved that Mr. A. E. de Silva, who ceased to be a Member in consequence of having failed to attend three consecutive General Meetings, be restored to office, under the provisions of section 30 of Ordinance No. 6 of 1910. Mr. C. P. Dias seconded.—Carried.

9. To elect a Member in place of Mr. W. Philips resigned, for the Standing Committee on Finance. Mr. T. H. Tatham was declared elected, as the result of voting by ballot.

10. To sanction excess leave of 24 days over 42 days granted to U. Nanayakkara, Machine Minder, Printing Branch, owing to ill-health. Mr. C. P. Dias moved that the leave be granted. Dr. W. P. Rodrigo seconded.—Carried.
