GOVERNMENT NOTIFICATIONS.

“THE PILGRIMAGES ORDINANCE, NO. 13 OF 1896.”

THE following rules and orders made by His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, under Ordinance No. 13 of 1896, entitled “An Ordinance relating to Pilgrimages,” for the conduct of the Mandur festival, where special precautions are necessary, are published for general information.

RULES AND ORDERS REFERRED TO.

1. For sanitary reasons the duration of the Mandur festival shall be and is hereby limited to twenty-one days, namely, August 17 to September 6, 1922, and further restricted to the inhabitants of Mandur, Tambalawattai, Palamunai, and Wellaveli.

2. No persons living outside the above-mentioned villages may attend the festival.

Provided that persons living outside these villages and connected officially with the temple may apply to the Government Agent, Eastern Province, for a pass to attend the festival. Such pass may be granted by the Government Agent, subject to such conditions as to medical examination, &c., as he may see fit.

3. In the event of an epidemic breaking out at Mandur during the festival, it shall be lawful for the Government Agent to declare the festival at an end, and to direct pilgrims at once to leave the village and proceed to their homes and to prescribe the roads they have to travel by.

"THE CEYLON RAILWAYS ORDINANCE, 1902."

RULE made by the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, under section 5 of "The Ceylon Railways Ordinance, 1902" :—

"Until further notice, as a temporary measure, imported unrefined salt (in bags) in consignments of 10 tons and over will be conveyed from the port of importation to any goods station on the Ceylon Government Railway at 6th class rates at owner's risk. Consignments of less than 10 tons will be charged at 3rd class rates on actual weight or at 6th class rates on 10 tons, whichever is lower. In the case of imported unrefined salt (in bags) from or to stations on the Northern Line north of Madawachchi, the reduced rate will apply to consignments of 6 tons and over."

DRAFT ORDINANCE.

MINUTE.

The following Draft of a proposed Ordinance is published for general information :—

An Ordinance further to amend "The Former Enemy Aliens Ordinance, No. 19 of 1919."

Preamble.

WHEREAS it is expedient further to amend "The Former Enemy Aliens Ordinance, No. 19 of 1919": Be it therefore enacted by the Governor of Ceylon, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows :

Short title.

1 This Ordinance may be cited as "The Former Enemy Aliens (Amendment) Ordinance, No. of 1922."

Substitution of new section for section 8 of the principal Ordinance.

2 For section 8 of the principal Ordinance, there shall be substituted the following section :

8. This Ordinance shall remain in force till the twenty-ninth day of August, One thousand Nine hundred and Twenty-three. Provided that the Governor in Executive Council may, from time to time by order to be published in the "Government Gazette," direct that the Ordinance shall continue in operation for a further period, and thereupon the Ordinance shall continue in full force and effect for the duration of the period specified therein ; but in no case shall such extended period exceed one year at any one time.

Statement of Objects and Reasons.

THE power to regulate the admission into, and the expulsion from, the Colony of former enemy aliens created by Ordinance No. 19 of 1919 will in terms of that Ordinance lapse on August 29.

Instructions have been received from the Secretary of State that these powers should be retained for another year and that at the same time provision should be made for extending the duration of the Ordinance, from time to time, if need be, for such further periods not exceeding one year at each extension.

The object of this Ordinance is to give effect to these instructions.
