WHEREAS by section 2 of the Ordinance No. 18 of 1892, entitled "An Ordinance to make provision for the imposition of a Sanitary Rate in certain Localities," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, by Proclamation to be for that purpose published in the *Government Gazette*, to bring any town or village mentioned in the schedule to the said Ordinance under the operation of the said Ordinance, and to define the limits of such town or village for the purposes of the said Ordinance, and such Proclamation to amend, alter, or revoke as and whenever the Governor shall, with the like advice, determine:

And whereas the town of Kégalla, in the Province of Sabaragamuwa, was brought under the operation of the said Ordinance by Proclamation dated 9th December, 1893, published in the

Government Gazette of the 5th January, 1894, and it has been deemed expedient to revoke such Proclamation :

Now know Ye that We, the said Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, do by this Our Proclamation revoke the said Proclamation of 9th December, 1893, bringing the town of Kégalla, in the Province of Sabaragamuwa, under the operation of the said Ordinance No. 18 of 1892.

SCHEDULE.

North.—A line drawn parallel to the Kandy high road, but 10 chains to the north of it, from the Mipitiya culvert on the east to the junction of the Kandy high road with the road from Kégalla to Polgahawela on the west.

East.—The path from the Mipitiya culvert on the Kandy high road to its junction with the Circular road.

South.—The Circular road from its junction with the Mipitiya path to its junction with the Bulatkohopitiya road ; thence the bridge at Welimannátota and the Cemetery road to its junction with the Kandy high road (including, however, the new General Cemetery), and thence the Kandy high road westward to its junction with the Kégalla-Polgahawela road.

West.—A line from the junction of the Kandy high road with the Kégalla-Polgahawela road due north for 12 chains.

SEASON REPORTS FOR THE MONTH ENDED FEBRUARY 28, 1895.

WESTERN PROVINCE.

COLOMBO DISTRICT.

Paddy : standing crops of paddy have been injured by the severe drought. Preparations for yala are in progress on a smaller extent of land than usual where the fields depend on rain for a supply of water.

Dry grain : amu and kurakkan crops mentioned in last report were harvested, and were fairly good.

Other products : fruit and vegetables are scarce and dear generally.

Prices of staple products : rice from Rs. 3.50 to Rs. 4 a bushel ; coconuts from Rs. 35 to Rs. 45 a 1,000.

Rainfall : only two showers of rain fell during the month.

Remarks on harvest prospects generally : paddy is in some localities being harvested. The crop will be generally rather below the average.

NEGOMBO DISTRICT.

Yala harvest : the crops of the fields sown in Hapitigam korale have been reaped and removed, and the fields in Alutkuru korale north are now being prepared for cultivation.

Maha harvest : some of the fields in Hapitigam korale and Alutkuru korale north are being reaped ; the crops of the fields of the former have been damaged owing to the drought, but in the latter they are good.

Dry grain : the crops of a few chenas in Hapitigam korale that have been sown with amu, meneri, kollu, and kurakkan have been reaped and threshed, but they are not good owing to drought. No dry grain cultivation in Alutkuru korale north.

Other products : fruits and vegetables scarce in both the korales.

Prices of staple products : rice, Rs. 3.50 to Rs. 4 per bushel ; paddy, Re. 1.75 per bushel ; coconuts, Rs. 35 to Rs. 40 per 1,000.

Rainfall scarce.

Remarks on harvest prospects generally : in Alutkuru korale north generally good, in Hapitigam korale not very good.

KALUTARA DISTRICT.

Paddy : the maha harvest is being reaped in the Rayigam and Pasdun korales. In the Totamunes the maha harvest is about three months old, and the prospects are fair. The fields are being prepared for the yala harvest.

Dry grain : amu and meneri are cultivated in the Pasdun korale. The condition is fair. The meneri crop is being gathered. No dry grain is cultivated in the Totamunes. There is very little dry grain cultivation in the Rayigam korale.

Other products : fruit and vegetables are abundant in the Rayigam korale. They are scarce in the Pasdun korale and the Totamunes.

Prices of staple products : country-grown rice, Rs. 3.50 per bushel ; imported rice, Rs. 3.50 to Rs. 4.50 per bushel ; coconuts, Rs. 30 to Rs. 45 a thousand.

Rainfall scarce.

Remarks on harvest prospects generally : the maha harvest is an average one.

CENTRAL PROVINCE.

KANDY DISTRICT.

Paddy : maha ripening or being harvested, except in Pata Dumbara and Pata Hewaheta, where the fields are in all stages from being harvested to transplanting. Crop fair, except in Tumpane and Udapalata, where prospects are good. Dry grain : maha ripening or harvested. Crops fair, except in Udunuwara and Pata Hewaheta. In the former the crops are bad, having been damaged by flies and droughts, and in the latter the crops are good.

Rainfall insufficient.

Prices : paddy, Re. 1.50 per bushel ; kurakkan, Re. 1.25 per bushel ; cocoanuts, Rs. 5 per 100.

MATALE DISTRICT.

Mátalé south : the rainfall registered .27 for the month, which is very poor. Several fields in Kohonsiya pattu and in Asgiriya korales died entirely, but the fields which had been sown in due time are being harvested, with good results.

The crops of Mátalé Udasiya pattu are fine, the fields there being dependent on hill-streams.

Mátalé north : the chenas sown in October have been reaped, and the return satisfactory. Chenas sown in November are poor in some villages. The paddy crops of fields under certain tanks are getting on well, and the prospects are satisfactory.

Mátalé east : chenas and paddy fields sown at the proper season gave a satisfactory crop, but chenas sown late have suffered considerably from the drought which prevailed during the month.

General prospects fair.

NUWARA ELIYA DISTRICT.

Kotmale : yala paddy crop being reaped ; crops good ; price per bushel Re. 1.25. No dry grain cultivation. Kurakkan, Re. 1.26 per bushel ; cocoanuts, Rs. 7 per hundred.

Walapane and Uda Hewaheta : paddy plants are progressing well, though in some villages the plants look rather poor for want of sufficient rain. Paddy per bushel, Re. 1.50 ; kurakkan, Re. 1.50 ; Indian corn, Re. 1.50. Fruits and vegetables deficient owing to dry weather.

NORTHERN PROVINCE.

JAFFNA DISTRICT.

Weather : there was no rain in any part of the district during the month, and the weather was dry by day with heavy dews at night.

Kalapokam paddy : reaping and threshing of paddy continued in all the divisions, and, as reported last month, the crops of Punakari, Karaichchi, Islands, Valigamam east and west, and Tenmiradchy were good. In the other divisions they were indifferent.

Dry grain crops : the reaping of varaku completed, and the outturn reported on the whole very good. Other dry grains, such as ellu, payaru, &c., are in plants and look well.

Tobacco : transplanting of tobacco from nurseries continued, and the plants are being watered from wells and kenes.

Rain is much wanted.

Price of staple articles : paddy, Re. 1.50 per bushel ; rice, Rs. 3.25 per bushel ; kurakkan, Re. 1.50 per bushel ; varaku, Re. 1.20 per bushel ; pinaddu, Rs. 3 per kudai.

VAVUNIYA DISTRICT.

Weather very dry. Crops in various stages approaching ripening—will be below average. Kurakkan also below average.

MANNAR DISTRICT.

The maha paddy crops in the Mantai division are now reaped and stacked. The crop is confined to a few villages, and the outturn is unsatisfactory.

In Muchali and Nanaddan pattus paddy crops failed, except in three or four villages, where they are now being reaped.

Dry grain cultivations in Mannar island and on the mainland is generally good ; the crops have been reaped.

Paddy sells at Re. 1.50 per bushel, kurakkan at Re. 1.25 per bushel.

Rainfall in February—nil.

Health of people not satisfactory : pneumonia, fever, and sore-eyes prevailing.

Health of cattle good.

MULLAITTIVU DISTRICT.

The reaping of paddy crops is now nearly finished. Crops fairly good, except in some villages of Tunukkai. Tobacco plants are being watered.

Prices : rice, Rs. 3 per bushel ; paddy, Re. 1.25 per bushel ; kurakkan, Re. 1 per bushel ; varaku, 75 cents per bushel ; manioc, 5 cents per pound.

No rain during the month.

SOUTHERN PROVINCE.

GALLE DISTRICT.

Paddy : yala sowings have commenced in low-lying lands only, as drought has interfered with the cultivation of owita lands.

Dry grain : maha crops reaped, and the harvest satisfactory.

Miscellaneous : breadfruit, sweet potatoes, and vegetables are plentiful. Jak is scarce. Coconut crop is poor, and price Rs. 35 per thousand nuts on an average.

Prices of staple products : a bushel of rice is from Rs. 3 to Rs. 3.50 ; paddy, Re. 1.25 ; mederi, Rs. 2 ; amu, Re. 1.25 ; kurakkan, Re. 1.50 ; breadfruit, Re. 1.50 per hundred ; jakfruit, Rs. 20 per hundred ; sweet potatoes, Re. 1.50 per cwt. ; plantain bunches, Rs. 30 per hundred ; cucumber, Rs. 2 per hundred.

Rainfall : 3.31 inches.

Health satisfactory in all the pattus, except Wellaboda pattu, where dysentery and fever prevailed to a large extent. Cattle free from disease.

HAMBANTOTA DISTRICT.

East Giruwa pattu : maha crops referred to in my last month's report are good.

Magan pattu : Tissa fields are thriving ; some are blossoming just now. Walawe fields have been reaped and crops threshed.

MÁTARA DISTRICT.

Paddy : the greater part of the maha crop was harvested during the month. The crop was generally good, though rather less was sown than for the maha of 1894. In the Wellaboda pattu there was a partial failure of crops. Dry grain : very little sown, but crops were excellent. Prices moderate, and going down as the new paddy comes to market.

EASTERN PROVINCE.

BATTICALOA DISTRICT.

Paddy : early munmari dependent on restored tanks is ripe, and is being harvested ; others dependent on rain are partially damaged, as there was no sufficient rain since 6th ultimo. Later munmari is dependent entirely on restored tanks, and is good except that under Sakamam tank, where the water seems insufficient for the extent under cultivation ; and if there be no good rain soon we must expect a failure.

Dry grain partly failed for want of rain in January last.

Price of paddy has gone down from Re. 1.13 in January to Re. 1 now, as new paddy is beginning to come to the market.

Rainfall 0.45 in. Owing to failure of rain great decrease in the yield is anticipated.

TRINCOMALEE DISTRICT.

Paddy : in Koddiyar pattu the crop, which is four months old, is good ; in Tamblegam pattu and Kaddukkulam pattu a full crop has been harvested. Price of paddy Re. 1.12½ per bushel.

Dry grain : in Koddiyar pattu and Kaddukkulam pattu fair. Price of grain Re. 1.25 per bushel.

Tobacco : good crops in Koddiyar pattu and Kaddukkulam pattu. Price Rs. 10 per tulam

Manioc : good crop in Koddiyar pattu. Price 2 cents per pound.

Fisheries : fair in Koddiyar pattu and scanty in Tamblegam pattu and Kaddukkulam pattu.

NORTH-WESTERN PROVINCE.

KURUNÉGALA DISTRICT.

No rain fell throughout the month ; young crops suffering in consequence. Advanced crops are in various stages of ripening. Outturn will be below average. Kurakkan crops reaped ; outturn tolerable. Chenas were being cleared for yala.

Health of people and cattle, generally speaking, good.

The weather has been unusually dry for February.

PUTTALAM DISTRICT.

Paddy and fine grain crop being reaped in Puttalam and Kalpitiya divisions. In Demala hatpattu early sowing of paddy maturing, late sowing earing in some places and in some withering for want of rain, so also chena paddy and fine grain being reaped in some places and partial failure in others.

Paddy crop : Puttalam division middling, Kalpitiya division fair, and Demalahatpattu moderate ; fine grain crop good.

CHILAW DISTRICT.

Maha paddy crop in all the divisions come to maturity, and being reaped. Condition good except in Kammal pattu, where damaged for want of rain.

Bala-wi crops partly come to maturity and partly earing ; prospects good.

Fields in southern division being prepared for yala.

Fine grain being reaped ; condition good.

Other products : fruit and vegetables scarce and dear.

Price of staple products : rice from Rs. 3.50 to Rs. 4.50 per bushel ; cocoanuts, Rs. 35 to Rs. 40 per thousand.

Rainfall deficient, only one shower having fallen during the month.

PROVINCE OF UVA.

BADULLA DISTRICT.

The yala crops have now been harvested, and the maha sowing is in full progress.

Indian corn and kurakkan crops have given a good yield in Wellawaya, and have been gathered in all divisions.

Wiyaluwa and Udukinda have suffered from a dearth of water.

Prices of commodities : paddy, Rs. 2 per bushel ; kurakkan, Re. 1.75 per bushel ; Indian corn, Re. 1.75 per bushel ; kollu, Rs. 3.50 per bushel.

PROVINCE OF SABARAGAMUWA.

RATNAPURA DISTRICT.

Paddy : in Kuruwiti, Nawadun, Atakalan, and Kukulukorales the maha crop is being harvested ; outturn favourable. In Kolonna korale the cultivation for maha is advancing. In Kuruwiti, Kolonna, and Atakalan korales the second maha crops are still young. In Atakalan, Kadawatu, and Meda and Kukulukorales the yala fields are being ploughed, and some have been sown ; prospects unfavourable owing to the present dry weather.

Dry grain : in Kuruwiti, Nawadun, and Kolonna korales maha chenas and owitas are being harvested ; prospects good. In Atakalan korale el-wi and kurakkan chenas are being reaped. In Kadawatu and Meda korales chena crops are being gathered in. In Kukulukorale amu chenas are damaged owing to dry weather.

Cattle disease abating.

KÉGALLA DISTRICT.

Maha paddy harvest is nearly over ; crops middling to good. Late maha fields in Four Korales have been for the greater part damaged the present drought.

Dry grain : hill paddy, iringu, and amu have been harvested, and the crops are generally good, except the iringu crop in Galboda and Kinigoda korales, which was affected with bambupidima. Kurakkan harvested in Beligal korale, the yield is middling ; kurakkan in Three Korales and Lower Bulatgama about to ear, but has for the most part withered owing to the drought. Chenas are being prepared in Galboda and Kinigoda korales and Paranakuru korale for sowing kurakkan. Meneri in Beligal korale has been harvested ; crop middling.

Rainfall registered at Ruwanwella 1 in., at Ambanptiya .43 in.

Price of paddy, Re. 1 to Re. 1.12 ; hill paddy, Re. 1 to Re. 1.12 ; kurakkan, 75 cents to Re. 1.

The district is free from cattle disease.
