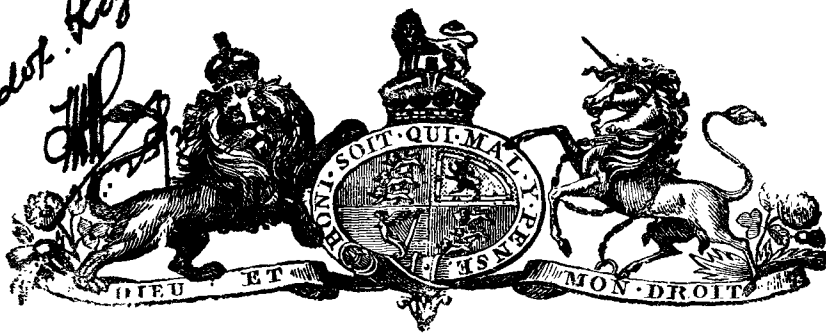

In the Name of His Majesty GEORGE THE FIFTH, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, King, Defender of the Faith.

#### PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Sir WILLIAM HENRY MANNING, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Knight Commander of the Most Excellent Order of the British Empire, Companion of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Ceylon, with the Dependencies thereof.

KNOW Ye that We, the Governor of Ceylon, in pursuance of the powers in Us vested by “The Necessaries of War Exportation Ordinance, No. 19 of 1914,” and of all other powers Us enabling, do hereby revoke the prohibition relating to Russian Rouble Notes contained in Our Proclamation dated April 28, 1920, and published in the *Government Gazette* No. 7,101 of April 30, 1920, the schedule whereof has from time to time been revoked and substituted by Proclamation in the *Government Gazette*, and is finally contained in the Proclamation dated July 30, 1920, published in *Government Gazette* No. 7,119 of July 30, 1920.

Given at Nuwara Eliya, in the said Island of Ceylon, this Sixteenth day of February, in the year of our Lord One thousand Nine hundred and Twenty-five.

No teacher can refuse to issue a leaving certificate to a parent or guardian who applies for one ; but in the case of a pupil against whose parent or guardian a prosecution has been instituted for the irregular attendance of the child, the certificate shall be on the form known as Q 1.

*Building and Equipment Grants.*—On page 14, after clause 40, insert the following additional clause :—

(c) *Building and Equipment Grants.*

40 A. In cases where additional buildings and equipment are required in schools carried on by local authorities or governing bodies of assured stability, the Director may make a grant towards the cost of same. Applications for building grants for payment during the next financial year (October 1 to September 30) should reach the Director not later than the end of December, and must be accompanied by plans and an estimate of cost.

## GENERAL RULE REFERRED TO.

Rules 2, 10, 123 (1), 125, 156 (1) and (2), 218, 222, 243, 245, 269, 271, 313, 315 (e), 322, 323 of the general rules made under "The Prisons Ordinance, 1877," and published by Notification dated June 11, 1913, in *Government Gazette* No. 6,574 of August 1, 1913, and the "Dietry Scale for European Prisoners" annexed to the said general rules, and also rule 220 (1) and (2) of the above general rules as amended by Notification dated October 5, 1918, and published in *Government Gazette* No. 6,971 of October 11, 1918, are hereby repealed and the following substituted therefor:—

2. He shall on each visit inspect and countersign the following books: the Standing Order Book, the Superintendent's Order Book, the Morning State, the Lock-up Register, the Admission Register, the Medical Journal, the Private Property Book, the Report Books against both Prisoners and Officers, the Mark Ledger, the Prisoners' Correspondence Register, the File of Orders issued under rule 117, the Ration Return Book, the Gate Book; and shall read the minutes, remarks, and other records of the officers, as well as the journals and records of the Medical Officers, relating to occurrences since his last visit.

10. Delete.

123. (1) Each subordinate officer shall be armed with a baton, such baton shall be supplied by Government, and shall be of a uniform pattern. It shall be competent for the Superintendent, by an order in writing, to direct that any subordinate officer shall also be armed with a revolver.

125. Each officer shall see that the prisoners are properly dressed when paraded for work, and that each prisoner has a tatty and a pint.

156. Any subordinate officer may be punished by the Superintendent for any of the offences included in the annexed schedule with (1) warning, (2) reprimand, (3) extra duty (Saturday and Sunday), (4) black marks, (5) forfeiture of pay for absence without leave, (6) reduction, (7) discharge, (8) dismissal, (9) prosecution.

- (1) Insubordination.
- (2) Allowing a prisoner to escape.
- (3) Trafficking with a prisoner.
- (4) Introducing prohibited articles or allowing prohibited articles to be introduced.
- (5) Being under the influence of drink.
- (6) Giving false evidence or making false reports.
- (7) Sleeping while on duty.
- (8) Sitting down on duty, either by day or night.
- (9) Holding familiar or unnecessary conversation with a prisoner.
- (10) Ill-treating a prisoner.
- (11) Taking prisoners' food.
- (12) Countenancing gambling or trafficking.
- (13) Allowing prisoners to have unauthorized communication with free persons.
- (14) Employing a prisoner to do unauthorized work.
- (15) Disobedience of orders, carelessness, and inattention to duty.
- (16) Telling a falsehood.
- (17) Absence without leave.
- (18) Unpunctuality.
- (19) Not reporting that prisoners desire to see the Jailer, &c.
- (20) Leaving a door unlocked when it ought to be locked.
- (21) Allowing prisoners to idle.
- (22) Not keeping proper supervision over his prisoners.
- (23) Not wearing uniform when required by rules to do so.
- (24) Leaving the Prison service without giving one month's notice to the Superintendent.
- (25) Breach of any authorized rule or order.

## RULES AS TO LABOUR OF CONVICTED PRISONERS.

218. On week days the hours of labour shall be as follows:—

- 5.30 A.M. to 6 A.M., opening cells, washing, cleaning, and morning meal.
- 6 to 10.30 A.M., such hard labour as shall be ordered.
- 10.30 A.M. to 12 noon, washing and breakfast.
- 12 noon to 4.30 P.M., such hard labour as shall be ordered.
- 4.30 to 5 P.M., bathing, washing, evening meal.
- 5 P.M., closing cells.

220. (1) No prisoner shall be compelled or allowed to work on Sunday, Good Friday, Christmas Day, or on Saturdays after 10.30 A.M., except on Prison services, which shall be confined to what is strictly necessary for the order of the Prison, and except in cases of special emergency on the written order of the Superintendent, when all convicted prisoners shall be required to work as directed.

(2) Prisoners belonging to the following religious denominations shall not be required to work on the days stated :—

Muslims	..	..	Hadji
Buddhists	..	..	Wesak
Hindus	..	..	Hindu New Year

222. Prisoners who have been guilty of continued bad or violent conduct shall be reported to the Inspector-General of Prisons for transfer to the special gang at Mahara. At this Prison a special gang shall be formed of these men, and they shall be kept entirely apart at all times from the rest of the inmates and occupied in such labour as the Inspector-General of Prisons shall direct from time to time. No transfer shall take place from this gang without the special authority of the Inspector-General of Prisons.

243. If, under the directions of Government, Christian services be held in any Prison on Sundays, and on other days when such service is performed, all Christian criminal prisoners shall, if of the church or persuasion to which the minister belongs, attend the same, unless prevented by illness or other reasonable cause to be allowed by the Jailer, or unless their attendance is dispensed with by the Superintendent. No prisoner, however, shall be compelled to attend any Christian service held or performed, or any religious instruction given, by the minister or religious instructor of a church or persuasion to which the prisoner does not belong.

245. No books or printed papers shall be admitted into any prison for the use of the prisoners, except by permission of the Superintendent, and the Jailer shall keep a catalogue of all books and printed papers admitted into the Prison. No prisoner shall be allowed to have in his possession more than two books at a time.

#### RULES AS TO PRISON VISITORS.

269. There shall be kept by the Jailer in every Prison a book called the Visitor's Book, in which shall be entered by every Visitor visiting the Prison the date of his visit, a record of his proceedings and orders upon such visits, a memorandum of every punishment that he may order, a statement of any facts that the visitor may desire to bring under the notice of the Government, and any minute that he may desire to make. Every entry in the Visitors' Book shall be signed by the Visitor, and a copy of such entry in duplicate shall be at once sent by the Superintendent to the Secretary of the Board of Prison Visitors.

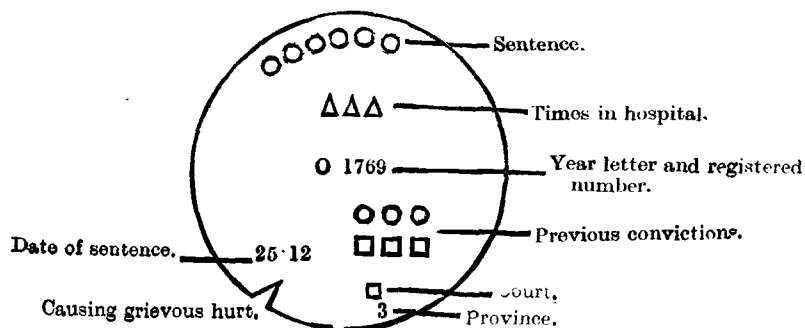
271. If any matter or thing prejudicial to the discipline of a Prison or to the health of the prisoners therein shall come to the knowledge of any Visitor, which such Visitor or any two of them have not power or jurisdiction to deal with, such Visitor shall immediately report the same to the Chairman, Board of Prison Visitors, who will forward such report to the Colonial Secretary.

313. All prisoners, except those in Welikada Prison, and except where provision is otherwise made in these rules, shall wear white clothing, stamped in conspicuous places with the "broad arrow" in black; and every article of clothing shall also be marked with the prison number and date of issue.

315. (e) The dress for prisoners found guilty of assault or escape under rule 260 (4) shall be as follows :—

A red patch of cloth 6 inches in diameter sewn on to the jumper back and front.

322. Every convict shall wear a tin badge attached to a waist belt, which shall contain the following information :—Year letter, registered number, date of conviction, sentence, Province in which convicted, Court, number of times in hospital, previous convictions, with a notch cut out of one edge to note if he has been convicted of causing grievous hurt. Thus :—



The method of marking being—

*Sentence.*—A small round hole for each year of sentence. Sentences from 1 to 12 months to be shown by figures; under 1 month by a cross at the top of the badge.

*Times in Hospital.*—A small triangular hole for each admission.

*Year Letter.*—The letter denoting the year of conviction, as laid down in rule 325.

*Registered Number.*—The prisoner's registered number.

*Previous Convictions.*—A small round hole for each conviction under "crime" as defined by Ordinance No. 32 of 1914. Convictions other than under this Ordinance by a small square hole in the middle of the badge.



*Date of Sentence.*—Day and month in figures.

*Court.*—A square hole if received from Supreme Court; a round hole when received from District Court; no hole when received from a Minor Court.

*Province.*—A figure to denote the Province in which convicted, according to rule 324.

*Grievous Hurt.*—A V-shaped notch.

## BY-LAWS.

1. *Offensive or Dangerous Trades.*—The following trades shall be deemed to be offensive or dangerous trades:—

- (1) Manufacture of artificial manure ;
- (2) Storage of materials for manufacture of artificial manure in quantity over one bag ;
- (3) Boiling or drying of blood or offal ;
- (4) Tanning ;
- (5) Fat melting or fat extracting ;
- (6) Soap making ;
- (7) Fibre dyeing ;
- (8) Storing of hides or bones ;
- (9) Manufacture of aerated waters ;
- (10) Manufacture of bricks or tiles ;
- (11) Manufacture of lime.

2. *Licenses.*—No person shall, within the limits of the Local Board of Badulla, keep any bakery, eating-house, tea or coffee boutique, dairy, laundry, common lodging house, or carry on or suffer to be carried on in any premises an offensive or dangerous trade without an annual license from the Chairman of the said Board, which license the Chairman is hereby empowered to refuse to any person failing to comply with any of the rules passed for the regulation, supervision, protection, or control of the places and trades aforesaid. Such license shall be subject to such fees as the Local Board from time to time may determine with the sanction of the Governor in Council, and every such license shall remain in force until December 31 of the year in respect of which such license is issued or until such license is cancelled.

3. If any person shall have been convicted twice or oftener by any court of the breach of any of the rules providing for the regulation, supervision, protection, or control of the places or trades aforesaid, it shall be lawful for the court recording such second or subsequent conviction to cancel the license issued to such person by the Chairman. Upon such cancellation of a license by court, the Chairman is further empowered in his discretion to refuse to issue any fresh license to such person ; provided that these rules shall not apply to stalls in markets established by or vested in any public body.

GENERAL CONDITIONS.

(a) Trees are to be felled within 6 inches from the ground by saw or axe and saw combined. All trees to be felled are enumerated and numbered. All trees of the approved species of 6 feet girth and over at 4 feet 3 inches from the ground will be felled by the contractor and stamped on reaching an inspection depôt. A list of the trees to be felled will be supplied to the contractor.

(b) All large unsound trees of valuable species standing in the area will be felled by the contractor at Rs. 2 per tree. If any sleepers or scantlings can be sawn from this material they will be paid for at the contract rate per sleeper and per cubic foot of scantlings, otherwise such trees will be left felled in the forest.

(c) All trees after felling should be logged to the longest available length and concentrated at an inspection depôt which will be selected by the officer supervising the operation, where the logs will be inspected by a Forest Officer and finally passed for transport to the delivery depôt. Logs which are rejected as unsuitable for delivery in the log will be marked in the inspection depôt for conversion into broad gauge or narrow gauge sleepers or into scantlings as may be directed by the inspecting officers. Such converted materials shall also be required to be passed as suitable for delivery to Government Departments before being transported to delivery depôt.

(d) Parts of logs attacked by fungus or defective parts of logs are not to be sawn into sleepers or scantlings. The sleepers and scantlings should be sawn from sound matured wood free from shakes, cracks, sapwood, and large or loose knots.

(e) Broad gauge sleepers are to be 9 feet by 10 inches by 5 inches and narrow gauge sleepers are to be 5 feet by 10 inches by 5 inches or 5 feet by 9 inches by 4½ inches. The quantity and sizes of the scantlings will be determined later. The sizes in any case will not exceed the sizes of the sleepers in respect of the cross section measurements.

(f) Sleepers and scantlings should be rectangular in form and sawn perfectly parallel on all sides. On no account will squaring of logs for sleepers or scantlings with an adze or axe be allowed.

(g) Sleepers and scantlings should be invariably placed under shade immediately they are sawn until they can be transported to the delivery depôt where they shall be stacked and kept under shade in the manner to be pointed out by a Forest Officer. Similarly, the logs should also be placed under shade at the delivery depôt and kept off the ground; depôts will be kept clear of undergrowth and weeds by the contractor at his expense.

(h) Rejected logs, sleepers, and scantlings will not be paid for and will lapse to Government as well as all refuse wood in the area of operation. The contractor shall have no claim in respect of any rejected material.

(i) All logs finally passed as suitable for delivery in the log must have both their ends neatly trimmed with saw alone before they are transported to the delivery depôt. Logs which are not so trimmed will not be passed for payment.

(j) Payment will be made from time to time by the Divisional Forest Officer, Eastern Division (North), Trincomalee, for all material passed by him as suitable for delivery to Government Departments. ## VITAL STATISTICS.

### Registrar-General's Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended February 14, 1925.

**Births.**—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 207 (11 Burghers, 129 Sinhalese, 29 Tamils, 26 Moors, 8 Malays, and 4 Others). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on January 1, 1925, viz., 254,867) was 42·3, as against 38·7 in the preceding week, 28·7 in the corresponding week of last year, and 27·6 the weekly average for last year.

**Deaths.**—The total deaths registered were 158 (4 Burghers, 91 Sinhalese, 29 Tamils, 27 Moors, 4 Malays, and 3 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 32·3, as against 33·3 in the previous week, 34·9 in the corresponding week of last year, and 29·8 the weekly average for last year.

**Infantile Deaths.**—Of the 158 total deaths, 33 were of infants under one year of age, as against 44 in the preceding week, 42 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 32 the average for last year.

**Stillbirths.**—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 10.

**Principal Causes of Death.**—1. (a) Twenty-one deaths from *Pneumonia* were registered, 9 in Maradana hospitals (including 2 deaths of non-residents), 3 in Kotahena South, 2 each in Maradana North and Maradana East, and 1 each in St. Paul's, San Sebastian, Kotahena North, New Bazaar, and Kollupitiya, same as in the previous week and against 18 the weekly average for last year.

(b) Three deaths from *Bronchitis* were registered, 1 each in Maradana hospital, Slave Island, and Kollupitiya, as against 6 in the previous week and 4 the weekly average for last year.

(c) Two deaths from *Influenza* were registered, 1 each in St. Paul's and Kotahena South, same as in the previous week and against 4 the weekly average for last year.

2. Eleven deaths from *Enteric Fever* were registered, 3 in San Sebastian, 2 each in Kotahena North, New Bazaar, and Maradana hospitals, and 1 each in Kotahena South and Slave Island, as against 10 in the previous week and 5 the weekly average for last year.

3. Ten deaths from *Phthisis* were registered, 6 in Maradana hospitals (including 3 deaths of non-residents), and 1 each in Kotahena South, New Bazaar, Kollupitiya, and Wellawatta North, as against 11 in the previous week and 13 the weekly average for last year.

4. Three deaths from *Plague* were registered, 2 in New Bazaar and 1 in Pettah, as against 4 in the previous week and 3 the weekly average for last year.

5. Nineteen deaths were registered from *Debility*, 12 from *Infantile Convulsions*, 6 from *Dysentery*, 5 from *Diarrhoea*, 4 from *Enteritis*, 3 from *Puerperal Septicæmia*, 2 each from *Worms* and *Tetanus*, and 55 from *Other Causes*.

6. Forty cases of *Chickenpox*, 23 of *Enteric Fever*, 11 of *Measles*, and 4 of *Plague* were reported during the week, as against 55, 11, 23, and 1 respectively of the preceding week.

**State of the Weather.**—The mean temperature of air was 79·5°, against 79·9° in the preceding week and 80·1° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29·926 in., against 29·892 in. in the preceding week and 29·874 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 2·43 in., against 3·78 in. in the preceding week and 0·74 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.

If any difference is found between the depot weight and the weight ascertained after re-weighing, a certificate will be issued by this Department showing the actual weight at the time of re-weighing, provided the buyers require such certificate for export purposes. But no allowance will be made for any shortage when making payment, the logs being sold by auction at a rate per lot and not per ton.
5. No timber shall be removed before payment of the full price bid, and all timber sold must be removed from the depot within ten days of date of notification of acceptance by the Conservator of Forests of such bid, and will be at the risk of the purchasers until removed.
6. Should any person to whom a lot is knocked down refuse to take it over at the full price bid, or refuse or fail to sign the sale book and pay 25 per cent. of his bid when so required or refuse or fail to pay the full purchase amount or balance thereof, as the case may be, and to remove the timber within the time specified in clause 5 above, the lot will again be put up for auction, and the original purchaser or bidder will be held liable for any loss to Government owing to a lower price being realized at the re-sale, while, if an enhanced price is realized at such re-sale, he shall, however, have no claim to the profit which shall accrue to Government.
7. Agents bidding for others will be required to produce a written authority from the firm or persons for whom they bid, such authority will be retained by the Assistant Conservator of Forests, and will hold good only at the particular sale at which it is produced.
8. The description of the logs appearing in the remarks column of the following list is entered merely for the guidance of the intending purchasers, who, as usual, should satisfy themselves as to its correctness before purchasing the logs.

## WESTERN PROVINCE.

## COLOMBO DISTRICT.

Paddy: fields that were cultivated for the maha season will be ready for reaping in February, and a fair crop is expected.

Dry grain: nil.

Coconuts: flowering is fair. The crop harvested for the month is about 60,600,000 nuts.

Other products: oranges, pineapples, and jak can be had at moderate prices.

Prices of foodstuffs: country rice, Rs. 5 to Rs. 6 per bushel; paddy, Rs. 2.50 to Rs. 3.50 per bushel; imported rice, Rs. 6.50 to Rs. 9 per bushel; kurakkan, Rs. 3 to Rs. 4 per bushel; coconuts, Rs. 5.50 to Rs. 7 per 100 nuts; salt, 10 to 14 cents per measure.

Health of inhabitants: good. There were, however, a few cases of chickenpox and measles.

Health of cattle: there were a few cases of rinderpest in Alutkuru korale north.

Weather: generally dry, with a few showers during the early part of the month.

## KALUTARA DISTRICT.

Paddy: the maha paddy is now ripening, and harvesting is expected to commence shortly.

Dry grain: there is very little dry grain cultivation in this district.

Coconuts: the crop of coconuts for the month is estimated at 2,390,000 nuts.

Other products: fruit and vegetables continued to be scarce throughout the district.

Prices of foodstuffs: country rice is not available in the market; paddy, Rs. 2 to Rs. 3.50 per bushel; imported rice, Rs. 5 to Rs. 9.50 per bushel; kurakkan, Rs. 3.25 to Rs. 5 per bushel (not available for sale); maize, nil; coconuts, Rs. 5 to Rs. 10 per 100 nuts; salt, 10 cents to 12 cents per measure.

Health of inhabitants: good.

Health of cattle: on the whole good.

Remarks applicable to particular districts: there was enough fish during the month.

Weather: the rainfall was not heavy.

Harvest prospects generally: a fair harvest is expected.

## CENTRAL PROVINCE.

## KANDY DISTRICT.

## NUWARA ELIYA DISTRICT.

Paddy: maha cultivation fields in Walapane are being ploughed and sown. In Uda Hewaheta some fields are being sown and others have young plants. Kotmale fields are being harvested.

Dry grains: kurakkan and Indian corn in Uda Hewaheta and Walapane chenas are blossoming.

Coconuts: 4,200 nuts estimated crop.

Prices of foodstuffs: country rice, Rs. 7 to Rs. 8 per bushel; paddy, Rs. 3 to Rs. 3.50 per bushel; imported rice, Rs. 8 to Rs. 10 per bushel; kurakkan, Rs. 3 to Rs. 3.50 per bushel; coconuts, Rs. 8 to Rs. 12 per 100 nuts; salt, 18 to 20 cents per measure.

Health of inhabitants: good, except for some cases of measles and chickenpox in Kotmale, and influenza, fever, and sore-eyes in Uda Hewaheta and Walapane.

Health of cattle: good.

Weather: it was very wet in Walapane, fine in Uda Hewaheta and the Nuwara Eliya gravets, and dry in Kotmale.

## MATALE DISTRICT.

Paddy (prospects of coming crop, &c.): maha crops budding. Some fields are ripening. Prospects good.

Dry grain (prospects of coming crop, &c.): kurakkan chenas ripening. Some are being reaped.

Coconuts: crops poor.

Prices of foodstuffs: country rice, Rs. 5 to Rs. 7.75 per bushel according to locality; paddy, Rs. 2 to Rs. 3 per bushel according to locality; kurakkan, Rs. 1.50 to Rs. 3 per bushel according to locality; imported rice, Rs. 7 to Rs. 9.50 per bushel according to locality; salt, 14 to 20 cents per measure according to locality; chillies, 30 to 62 cents per pound according to locality; coconuts, Rs. 5 to Rs. 10 per 100 nuts according to locality.

Health of inhabitants: good. Chickenpox prevails in many villages.

Health of cattle: good. There are a few cases of hoof-and-mouth disease.

Remarks applicable to particular district, e.g., condition of tanks, &c.: there was sufficient water in rivers and streams. Tanks in Matale North full.

Weather: early part of the month was wet. Rainfall: Matale, 14.53; Dambulla, 14.69; Sigiriya, 22.75.

## SOUTHERN PROVINCE.

## GALLE DISTRICT.

Paddy (prospects of coming crop, &c.): the maha crop is being harvested in some places. The estimated crop is 116,500 bushels. The last yala crop yielded 248,000 bushels.

Dry grain (prospects of coming crop, &c.) is not cultivated in the district to any appreciable extent.

Coconuts (prospects of coming crop, &c.): the estimate of the crop for the month is 30,086,290 nuts.

Other products (prospects of coming crop, &c.) are tea, rubber, cinnamon, and a variety of fruits and vegetables. No estimate of their yield can be given.

Minutes of Proceedings of a Meeting of the Municipal Council of Kandy, held in the Town Hall, Kandy, on December 20, 1924, at 8.30 a.m., in accordance with Notice dated December 16, 1924.

(2) Letter No. 42 of December 10, 1924, from the Hon. the Colonial Secretary, authorizing the Council to draw the grant of Rs. 3,000 for dredging the Kandy Lake.—Read.

(3) Letter No. 43 of December 10, 1924, from the Hon. the Colonial Secretary, stating that the question of the refund of Customs duty paid by the Council is awaiting consideration by the Finance Committee of the Legislative Council.—Read.

(4) Petition of November 12, 1924, from Mr. D. J. de Alwis *re* quotations for printed forms and books required by the Council for 1925.

Resolved that the order for quarterly receipts be placed with him at the same rate as last year.

(5) Letter of December 13, 1924, from Mr. J. C. Wimalasirie, submitting details of the scheme for establishing a free Ayurvedic Dispensary with an estimate of the cost.

Resolved that the matter be referred to the Special Committee appointed for the purpose.

The Chairman laid before the Meeting the Budget for the year 1925, with the schedule of rates and taxes proposed to be levied in 1925, as approved by the four Standing Committees at their Meeting held on October 25, 1924, and duly published in the *Government Gazette* and circulated among the Councillors, and as amended at the Meeting of Council held on November 15, 1924.

On the Chairman's motion the Council went into Committee.

Under Head 19, "Poor Relief," the vote of Rs. 3,500 for "Maternity and Child Welfare" was included, details of scheme being approved.

A vote of Rs. 125 for a notice board by the market was also included.

The Budget was then passed as amended by the Council at the Meeting held on November 15, 1924.

The Council resumed and the Budget as passed in Committee was adopted.

"Improvements in electric resistance welding."

*Abstract.*—In welding the current instead of being interrupted is fluctuated by compounding two (or more) currents so as to produce the equivalent of beats in a sound wave.

For example two single phase alternators of different frequency may be used.

Each alternator may supply current to a similar primary of a static transformer: the similar secondaries of the two transformers are connected in series with the primary of a third static transformer, and the secondary of this then gives the desired fluctuating current.

The claims are:—

1. A method of electric resistance welding consisting in supplying a compound alternating current to the welding means, this compound alternating current being obtained by superimposing alternating currents from a number of sources of supply differing in frequency.

2. An electric resistance welding system for carrying out the process according to either of the preceding claims, wherein the alternating currents from different sources of supply are passed through the primary windings of one or more transformers of which the secondary winding are in series so that the various currents will be superposed in the circuit which includes the secondary windings.

3. An electric resistance welding system according to claim 2, wherein identical single phase alternators supply current to separate primary windings of one or more transformers, whilst the secondary windings of the transformer or transformers are in series.

4. An electric resistance welding system according to claim 2, wherein each transformer is provided with separate sets of secondary windings, the windings of each set being arranged in series and supplying current to separate welding machines.

5. An electric resistance welding system according to claims 2 and 4, wherein each transformer is provided with two separate secondary windings, one of the windings being reversed in direction in relation to the direction of the other coils.

6. An electric resistance welding system according to claim 2, wherein two separate sources of current supply current to two primary windings of a transformer, the two secondary windings of the transformer being arranged in series.

7. The method and system of electric resistance welding by means of a compound alternating current, substantially as described in connection with the accompanying drawings.

"Improvements in or relating to apparatus for raising liquids."

*Abstract.*—The applicant describes a device in which a falling column of water entraps air and carries it down into a compression chamber: this compressed air is then used to lift the liquid to be raised to a greater height than the original high level of the water.

The claims are:—

1. Apparatus for raising liquids, comprising in combination an uptake or ascension conduit through which liquid is raised by means of compressed air admitted to the conduit at or near its lower end, and hydraulic air compressor in which air is entrained in a body of water falling by gravity through an induction or compressor conduit from a high level to a low level and is released and compressed in a compressor chamber, and an air pipe or conduit for leading the compressed air from the said chamber to the lower end of the ascension conduit, substantially as described.

2. Apparatus in accordance with claim 1 for raising part of the aerated water from the compressor chamber, wherein the ascension conduit is arranged with its lower end dipping into the aerated water in the compressor chamber and is formed at a position above the level of the aerated water with one or more holes or their equivalent through which the compressed air in the said compressor chamber enters the ascension conduit to effect the lifting of the said aerated water, substantially as described.

3. Apparatus in accordance with claim 2, wherein the compressor chamber is in the form of a conical casing with its larger end lowermost and open, and the lower part of the induction conduit is so shaped as to direct the water upwards into the said casing, substantially as described.

4. Liquid raising apparatus constructed, arranged, and adapted to operate substantially as hereinbefore described with reference to any of the examples illustrated by the accompanying drawings for the purpose specified.

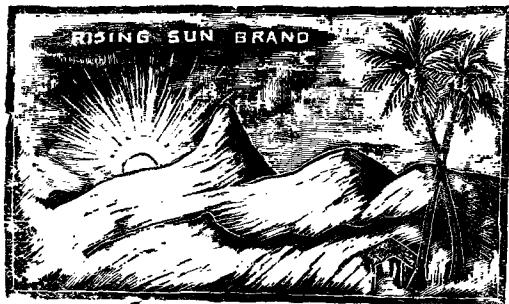
