WHEREAS by a Proclamation bearing date May 8, 1922, issued under section 4 of the Ordinance No. 11 of 1891, intituled "An Ordinance to re-adjust the Customs Duties leviable on Firearms and to impose an Export Duty on certain Hides and Horns," the exportation of horns and hides and cut horns of the spotted deer and sambur for commercial or trade purposes was prohibited for a period extending to June 30, 1925:

And whereas it is expedient to continue the prohibition for a further period of three years:

Now know Ye that We, the Governor, in exercise of the powers in Us vested by section 4 of the above-named Ordinance, do hereby, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, prohibit the exportation for commercial or trade purposes of horns and hides and cut horns of the spotted deer and sambur for a further period of three years, commencing from June 30, 1925, provided, however, that nothing herein contained shall be deemed to affect the rights of the Crown.

VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended March 21, 1925.

Births.—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 150 (1 European, 9 Burghers, 85 Sinhalese, 14 Tamils, 31 Moors, 5 Malays, and 5 Others). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on January 1, 1925, viz. 254,867) was 30.7, as against 30.5 in the preceding week, 22.4 in the corresponding week of last year, and 27.6 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 134 (1 European, 4 Burghers, 68 Sinhalese, 27 Tamils, 26 Moors, 2 Malays, and 6 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 27.4, as against 32.1 in the previous week, 33.8 in the corresponding week of last year, and 29.8 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 134 total deaths, 40 were of infants under one year of age, as against 35 in the preceding week, 35 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 32 the average for last year.

Stillbirths.—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 14.

Principal Causes of Death.—Fourteen deaths from *Phthisis* were registered, 5 in Maradana hospitals (including 2 deaths of non-residents), 4 in Kotahena South, 2 in Maradana North, and 1 each in New Bazaar, Slave Island, and Kollupitiya, as against 11 in the previous week and 13 the weekly average for last year.

2. (a) Eleven deaths from *Pneumonia* were registered, 6 in Maradana hospitals (including 3 deaths of non-residents), 2 in Maradana East, and 1 each in Kotahena South, Kollupitiya, and Wellawatta North, as against 20 in the previous week and 18 the weekly average for last year.

(b) Eight deaths from *Bronchitis* were registered, 3 in Maradana hospitals (including 2 deaths of non-residents), 2 in Kotahena South, and 1 each in Kotahena North, New Bazaar, and Maradana South, as against 12 in the previous week and 4 the weekly average for last year.

(c) One death from *Influenza* was registered in San Sebastian, as against 4 in the previous week and 4 the weekly average for last year.

3. Three deaths from *Plague* were registered, 1 each in Pettah, Maradana hospital, and Wellawatta North, as against nil in the previous week and 3 the weekly average for last year.

4. One death (of a non-resident) from *Enteric Fever* was registered in Maradana hospital, as against 8 in the previous week and 5 the weekly average for last year.

5. Fifteen deaths were registered from *Debility*, 12 from *Infantile Convulsions*, 5 from *Enteritis*, 4 each from *Diarrhoea* and *Tetanus*, 2 each from *Dysentery*, *Worms*, and *Puerperal Septicæmia*, and 50 from *Other Causes*.

6. Sixty-eight cases of *Chickenpox*, 18 of *Measles*, 4 of *Enteric Fever*, and 3 each of *Smallpox* (in Port), and *Plague* were reported during the week, as against 80, 19, 10, 7, and 2, respectively, of the preceding week.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 79.8°, against 79.2° in the preceding week and 82.0° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29.835 in., against 29.857 in. in the preceding week and 29.909 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 0.55 in., against 6.30 in. in the preceding week and 5.59 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.

ARTICLES OF ASSOCIATION OF THE MANANA MINES, LIMITED.

1. Subject as hereinafter provided the regulations contained in Table C in schedule annexed to "The Joint Stock Companies Ordinance, No. 4 of 1861," shall apply to this Company, and be deemed to be incorporated with these presents.

BUSINESS.

TRANSFER.

THE Pravesa (Preliminary), Bala Pandit (Intermediate), and the Pandit (Final) examinations, conducted by the Jaffna Oriental Studies Society, will be held at Batticaloa, Chunnakam, Colombo, and Jaffna on April 5, 1926, and the following three days in accordance with the following rules and syllabus:—

2. Candidates may enter for the three examinations in Tamil alone; and for the Pandit examination in Sanskrit alone, provided the candidate has previously passed the Tamil Bala Pandit examination. 4. Intending candidates should apply on the prescribed form to the Honorary Secretary of the Society not later than February 5, 1926. These forms may be obtained from the Education Office, Colombo; the Education sub-office, Jaffna; and the Secretary of the Society.

5. A fee of (i.) one rupee for the Preliminary examination, (ii.) three rupees for the Intermediate, and (iii.) five rupees for the Final examination should be remitted by Money Order or Postal Order in favour of the Secretary, along with the application form, by candidates other than those from registered Classical Schools.

6. Candidates should pass in the first three groups (I., II., and III.), and in two of the sections in group IV. any two and two only of which sections may be offered.

7. Candidates obtaining not less than 70 per cent. of the total number of marks will be placed in the First Division; those obtaining not less than 60 per cent. in the Second Division; and those obtaining not less than 40 per cent. in the Third Division; provided they obtain not less than 25 per cent. of marks for each question paper, provided also they obtain not less than 33 per cent. of marks for each group.

8. Separate accommodation will be provided for female candidates during the examination.

9. The time table and place of examination will be notified later on.

10. Candidates should bring their own pens. Other writing materials will be provided by the Society.

ABSTRACTS OF SEASON REPORTS.

SEASON REPORT FOR THE MONTH OF MARCH, 1925.

CENTRAL PROVINCE.

NUWARA ELIYA DISTRICT.

Paddy : sowing of maha season fields in Walapane is now over. In Uda Hewaheta some fields have young plants and others are ready for harvesting. Kotmale fields are being harvested.

Dry grains : kurakkan chenas in Uda Hewaheta and Walapane are being harvested.

Coconuts : 4,300 nuts, estimated crop.

Prices of foodstuffs : country rice, Rs. 6·50 to Rs. 8 per bushel ; paddy, Rs. 2 to Rs. 3·50 per bushel ; imported rice, Rs. 8 to Rs. 10 per bushel ; kurakkan, Rs. 2·50 to Rs. 3·50 per bushel ; coconuts, Rs. 8 to Rs. 12 per 100 nuts, salt, 16 to 20 cents per measure.

Health of inhabitants : good. Except for some cases of chickenpox in Kotmale, and influenza and sore-eyes in Uda Hewaheta and Walapane.

Health of cattle : good.

Weather : it was raining in Walapane ; fine in Uda Hewaheta, Kotmale, and the Nuwara Eliya gravets except in Nuwara Eliya town where the latter half of the month was dry.

EASTERN PROVINCE.

BATTICALOA DISTRICT.

Paddy : munmari. The paddy is in ripening ears and reaping has commenced in some pattus. The prospects for the harvest were excellent at the end of the month.

Kalapokam : paddy lands are being sown. Lands already sown are doing well.

Dry grain : kurakkan and Indian corn were sown in some pattus. The latter has been reaped and thrashed. The crop was very fair.

Coconuts : trees are healthy. Caterpillar pest was reported in certain parts of Akkarai pattu, and preventive measures are being taken to stop it.

Other products : vegetables, manioc, and plantains are grown in the district.

Prices of foodstuffs : paddy, Rs. 2 to Rs. 2·60 per bushel ; rice (country), Rs. 4·25 to 8·96 per bushel ; rice (imported) Rs. 9·50 per bushel ; kurakkan, Rs. 2·40 to Rs. 3·50 per bushel ; Indian corn, Re. 1·50 to Rs. 2·88 per bushel ; coconuts, Rs. 5 to Rs. 15 per 100 nuts ; salt, 3 to 5 cents per lb. ; salt 25 cents per measure in Wewgam pattu.

Health of inhabitants : malarial fever, cold, and cough prevail in some pattus.

Health of cattle : satisfactory. The animals attacked by hoof-and-mouth disease in Bintenne, Eraur, Korala, and Manmunai north pattus are recovering.

Condition of tanks and fisheries : good. Fishing in the sea is not satisfactory in the present season.

Weather : dry and dewy as a whole with occasional showers of rain during the month. The rainfall recorded for the month was 11·93 inches.

TRINCOMALEE DISTRICT.

Paddy : prospect of coming crop, fair ; probable yield, 86,000 bushels ; estimated crop harvested, 123,015 bushels.

Dry grain : prospect of coming crop, probable yield, and estimated crop harvested, nil.

Coconuts : prospect of coming crop, fair ; probable yield, 194,375 nuts ; estimated crop harvested, 155,375 nuts.

Other products : prospect of coming crop, probable yield, and estimated crop harvested, nil.

Prices of foodstuffs : country rice, Rs. 7 to Rs. 8·68 per bushel ; paddy, Rs. 2·75 to Rs. 3·50 per bushel ; imported rice, Rs. 9·50 per bushel ; kurakkan, nil ; maize, nil ; coconuts, Rs. 8 to Rs. 11 per 100 nuts ; salt, 4 to 8 cents per measure.

Health of people : fever prevails to some extent in town.

Health of cattle : satisfactory.

Condition of fisheries : fair.

Condition of tanks : full.

Weather : warm and dewy.

Harvest prospect generally : not satisfactory.

General remarks : nil.

NORTH-CENTRAL PROVINCE.

ANURADHAPURA DISTRICT.

Paddy : early maha crops being harvested and late maha and meda cultivation is in satisfactory condition. Owing to insufficiency of rain, paddy chenas have failed and yala cultivation too is not possible under a considerable number of tanks.

Dry grains : kurakkan chenas are being reaped. A fair crop is expected.

Coconuts : crops and prospects fair.

Prices of foodstuffs : country rice, Rs. 5·50 to Rs. 8·40 per bushel ; imported rice, Rs. 6·50 to Rs. 9 per bushel ; paddy, Rs. 2·50 to Rs. 3 per bushel ; kurakkan, Re. 1·50 to Rs. 2·50 per bushel ; maize, Rs. 2 to Rs. 2·25 per bushel ; coconuts, Rs. 6 to Rs. 14 per 100 nuts ; salt, 15 to 20 cents per measure.

Health of people : there has been less fever than in February, 1924, and the general health of the population is considered satisfactory, though the death-roll is still rather heavy.

Health of cattle : several tulanas have been proclaimed infected areas owing to outbreaks of hoof-and-mouth disease. In other parts of the Province the health of the cattle is satisfactory.

Weather : February has kept dry. Days are hot and night chilly.

Tanks : a few tanks are full while the majority are half-full, and unless heavy rains intervene it is feared that the latter will run dry by May.

Harvest prospects : not very promising.

MUNICIPALITY OF GALLE.

Minutes of Proceedings of a General Meeting of the Municipal Council of Galle held in the Municipal Office on February 14, 1925, at 2 p.m., pursuant to Notice dated February 9, 1925.

Present :—Mr. T. B. Russell, Chairman; Mr. D. G. Goonewardene, M.B.E.; Mr. C. E. de Vos; Mr. J. E. Perera; Mr. W. W. Morgan; Mr. C. L. Wickramasinghe; and Dr. E. P. Aserappa.

Before the business of the Meeting was started, the Chairman stated that, as this would be the last Meeting at which Mr. Morgan would be present before he went on furlough, he wished to refer to the valuable services of Mr. Morgan as a Member of the Council; and to move that the Council do record its appreciation of Mr. Morgan's services.

Mr. D. G. Goonewardene, M.B.E., in seconding the motion, referred to the improved condition of the roads since Mr. Morgan came to Galle, and to the works he had initiated; and he expressed the hope that Mr. Morgan would return to Galle after furlough.

Mr. C. E. de Vos, Mr. J. E. Perera, and Mr. C. L. Wickramasinghe supported the motion, which was put to the Meeting and carried unanimously.

Mr. Morgan thanked the Chairman and Members for their kind words and for the Council's appreciation.

1. The Minutes of the General Meeting of January 10, 1925, a copy thereof having been furnished to each Member, were taken as read and confirmed.

2. Pursuant to notice, Mr. D. G. Goonewardene, M.B.E., asked—

(1) What steps have been taken on my motion, duly carried, of April 12, 1924, as to the examination of water pipes?

(2) Has the Provincial Engineer reported thereon?

(3) If so, will the Chairman be pleased to table the report?

The Chairman replied :—The Provincial Engineer examined the 3-in. main at Hall's road, Jail road, and Great Moderabay street, and the 4-in. main at Circular road. His report, with the connected papers is tabled.

The Provincial Engineer also examined the 8-in. main; and, on his advice, with a view to the scraping of the pipes, the Railway Department was requested to duplicate the capacity of their storage tank, to ensure a sufficient supply in the event of an interruption of the service during scraping operations.

The question is under consideration, and I have requested information as to when an enlargement of the tank will be carried out.

Mr. Goonewardene asked permission to withdraw the following questions of which he had given notice, viz. :—

(4) What steps have been taken on my motion, duly carried, of November 8, 1924, as to providing stands for hiring rickshaws?

(5) If the Superintendent of Police has indicated the desirable sites, what is the delay in carrying out the work?

Permission having been granted, Mr. Goonewardene withdrew the questions (4) and (5).

3. Pursuant to notice, Mr. C. L. Wickramasinghe asked—

(1) For a return of the number of tenements in each Ward which have been purchased in 1924 by the Municipality for non-payment of taxes.

(2) For a return of the number of such tenements demolished.

The Chairman replied :—

(1) No tenements were brought on behalf of the Council for non-payment of rates.

(2) No such tenements were demolished.

(3) For a return of the number of applications in the years 1923 and 1924 for water service to private houses, and the number of applications which have been allowed in the years 1923 and 1924.

Reply :—In 1923 there were four applications. None were granted. In 1924 there were two applications. One was allowed.

(4) Has the Chairman any information as to the date when a commencement will be made with the Electric Lighting Scheme?

Reply :—I have received demi-official information from the Director of Public Works that the plans of the scheme are being checked and finished in respect of all details; and indents for materials and essentials are being prepared. He has suggested to Government the appointment of a suitable Engineer as Installation Supervising Engineer, and requested early approval as the matter is urgent. I have no information as to the date when the work will be started in Galle.

(5) On what basis have the various feeders and distributing mains been worked for the different areas proposed to be supplied by the electric scheme?

(6) Will they be capable of carrying a 50 per cent. increase in load on the present calculation?

(7) Could the current be efficiently supplied at a distance of four miles from the Power Station with the cables proposed to be laid?

(8) If this is not possible, what additions and alterations will be necessary?

Reply :—(5)–(8), I am not in a position to give the information asked for, but will make inquiries from the Director of Public Works.

4. Pursuant to notice, Mr. D. G. Goonewardene moved—

(1) That a park-keeper or overseer be appointed with a view to the better management and improvement of the Victoria park.

(2) That steps be taken to plant ornamental trees in the park as advised by the Divisional Agricultural Officer, Galle. Mr. C. E. de Vos seconded.

The Chairman moved, as an amendment—“That the Council should obtain expert opinion, and that Mr. Macmillan be asked whether he would be willing to advise the Council on the subject.” Mr. C. L. Wickramasinghe seconded the amendment.

The proposer with the consent of the seconder withdrew motions (1) and (2) in favour of the amendment, which was put to the Meeting and carried.

5. Pursuant to notice, Mr. D. G. Goonewardene moved—

(3) In view of the urgency of the matter that the attention of the Director, Public Works Department may be invited to his letter of November 14, 1924, informing that work in connection with the Electric Lighting Scheme would commence at the beginning of 1925, and that inquiries be made when the work is likely to commence now. Mr. C. E. de Vos seconded, and Mr. J. E. Perera supported the motion, which was put to the Meeting and carried unanimously.

6. Pursuant to notice, Mr. C. L. Wickramasinghe was to have moved—

“In view of the fact that the Electric Lighting Scheme is to benefit only a part of the town in its early stages, I move that steps be taken to light the rest of the town with lamps.”

With the permission of the Council, Mr. C. L. Wickramasinghe amended his motion to read as follows :—

“In view of the fact that the Electric Scheme is to benefit only a part of the town in its early stages, I move that steps be taken to replace lamps in those parts of the town which are being lighted at present and which do not come within the former area.” Mr. D. G. Goonewardene seconded.—Carried.

7. Application from the Galle Education District Committee to use the Municipal Office for its meetings, and for the accommodation of the clerk.—Resolved that the Galle Education District Committee may use the Municipal Office for meetings only, until other arrangements can be made, but that the Council is not prepared to provide accommodation for the clerk, or for the transaction of any other business.

8. To sanction, under rule 6 of the Municipal Council leave regulations—(1) excess leave of further 13 days, making 31 days over 30 days granted to Mr. F. Improvements in and relating to electron discharge devices.

Abstract.—A device is described with means for integrating high frequency wave trains into impulses or waves of lower frequency, tuning both for group frequency as well as wave frequency. A condenser furnished with a leakage path across its terminals is connected to the grid of the valve; its potential is altered and the leakage path is such that in the intervals between successive trains of oscillations there is just time for the grid to recover its normal potential.

The claims are:—

1. A wireless signalling system including an electron discharge device having connected to its grid or control electrode a condenser which has a leakage path connected across its terminals, for the purpose specified.
 2. A wireless signalling system including an electron discharge device having an electron emitting cathode, a co-operating anode and a grid for controlling the electron discharge, a condenser connected in circuit with the grid, and a high resistance to shunt the condenser.
 3. A receiver for wireless signals provided with a grid leak comprising a high resistance preferably in series with a source of electromotive force, connecting the plates of a condenser included in the grid circuit of a three-electrode electron discharge device.

Heating device for liquid fuels.

Abstract.—The nature of the invention is described in the claims as follows:—

1. A heating device, particularly for heavy fuel, of the kind in which the fuel is forced by means of pressure through a member, coiled tube or the like forming the carburettor, characterized by a cap or hood arranged above the carburettor and centrally over the nozzle of the latter, the said cap being provided near its border with openings for the exit of the gas and breaks-up the jet of flame and separates the latter into a number of individual flames which do not contain any soot.
 2. A heating device as claimed in claim 1, in which the cap or hood is closed-up at the bottom with the exception of an opening for the admission of the flame.
 3. A heating device as claimed in claim 1, in which a ring (11) is arranged just underneath the rim of the cap in order to prevent the flame from leaping out underneath the rim of the cap in case of lateral gusts of wind.
 4. A heating device as claimed in claim 1, in which the upper part of the cap is provided with a number of circularly arranged small holes (19) in order to form ignition flames which ignite the gases passing out of the openings (18) near the border of the cap during the first few seconds of the operation of the device.
 5. A heating device as claimed in claim 3, in which flanges (13) extend downwardly from the ring (11) and serve for protecting the flame in case of storm.
 6. A heating device as claimed in claim 1, in which the screw for closing-up the fuel filling opening of the fuel receptacle is constructed and acts as a valve for regulating the pressure in the said receptacle.
 7. A heating device, particularly for heavy fuels constructed, arranged, and adapted to operate substantially as herein described with reference to the example illustrated by the accompanying drawings for the purpose specified.

A means of loading and discharging ships or the like of cargo of grain or other granulated substance or liquids.

Abstract.—This invention relates to apparatus for loading and discharging and conveying granulated substances, e.g., grain or slack, or liquids either from vessels lying at the wharf or from outlying vessels to the shore, or for conveying grain direct from the thresher to the granary for the conveyance and distribution of slack along great distances to blast furnaces, and the like, thus expediting the process and thereby obtaining a great saving of cost. The apparatus is of the type wherein the material to be conveyed is carried by a current of air. The invention consists as to one part in imparting to such air under pressure a rotary or helical motion. The compressed air is passed through a suitable feed tube from the engine room or the deck or other convenient part of the ship, or from the thresher or any other site from which the material is to be conveyed. The material is fed into a revolving feeding box superimposed upon a suitable valve body with suitable valves therein provided for the purpose, the feeding box being driven by any suitable power. The material passes through the valves and out at the lower end of the valve body into the hopper, when it gets into

contact with the compressed air and is driven through a discharge tube communicating with the compressed air tube and carried away to any distance through a flexible or other tube connected to the discharge tube. The compressed air tube has a rifled-shaped or helical blade or vane therein so as, as stated, to impart to the air in the inlet tube and feeding box a rotary or helical motion.

A cut-off plate is provided at the lower end of the valves so as to prevent any direct communication between the valves and the feed-box, thus preventing any escape of the compressed air.

The claims are :—

1. In apparatus of the type described for loading, discharging, and conveying, the use of compressed air to which a rotary or helical motion has been imparted.
 2. Apparatus as claimed in claim 1, characterized by the provision of a compressed air inlet tube having a rifled-shaped or helical blade or blades therein and communicating with a tube for the discharging or conveying of the material.
 3. Apparatus as claimed in claim 1, characterized by the provision of a valve body with suitable valves.
 4. Apparatus as claimed in claim 2, characterized by the provision of a feeding-box superimposed on said valve body and communicating with the valves.
 5. Apparatus as claimed in claim 2, characterized by the provision of a cut-off plate with an opening communicating with a hopper suitably fixed to lower end of valve body, said plate being securely fixed to central shaft and revolving with it.
 6. Apparatus as claimed in claims 3 and 4, characterized by the provision of a wearing or antifriction plate between the feeding box and the valve body and with openings communicating with the valves.
 7. Apparatus as claimed in claim 3, characterized by the provision of a shaft carried in the valve body, a worm suitably mounted on said shaft and gearing with a worm wheel suitably fixed to a central shaft with which the feeding box revolves.
 8. Means of loading, discharging, and conveying grain and other substances and liquids as claimed in claim 1, the valve arrangement constructed substantially as hereinbefore described and illustrated on Figure 5 of the drawings.
 9. In means of loading, discharging, and conveying grain and other substances and liquids as claimed in claim 1, the valve arrangement constructed substantially as hereinbefore described and illustrated in Figure 6 of the drawings.
 10. In means of loading, discharging, and conveying grain and other substances and liquids, the general arrangement and combination of parts, all substantially as and for the purposes hereinbefore described and illustrated on the accompanying sheets of drawings.

Tanning process.

Abstract.—This invention relates to improvements in the treatment of hides, pelts, and the like, and more particularly to the treatment of limed pelts for the purpose of affecting the conversion of the lime salt and the swelling of the hide or pelt. According to the present invention a solution made by previously fermenting vegetable seeds either in water or a solution containing enzymic activator and in conjunction with a sodium salt of a fatty acid, is supplied to the hides or pelts to be treated.

In carrying out the invention 500 lb. rape seed or soya bean meal is placed in a vat of about 1,000 gallons capacity with water at a temperature of 95° F to 97° F. 30 lb. to 50 lb. sulphonated oleic acid or sulphonated castor oil is added together with 1 lb. to 2 lb. manganese borate, zinc sulphate, or other activator. The mixture is allowed to digest for several days until the fermentation has ceased, when the liquid portion of the infusion is separated.

After washing free from superfluity of calcium salts, the goods to be prepared for tanning are treated either in a vat, paddle-wheel, or drum with a sufficient amount of the prepared infusion, and are immersed for a sufficient length of time to convert the whole of the calcium salts from the caustic alkaline condition to the neutral state, and the pelt has become slightly swollen with the organic acids present in the infusion.

The claims are :—

1. The preparation of the pelt for tanning by the employment of a previously fermented infusion of vegetable seeds.
 2. A process preparatory to tanning for the purpose of treating hides or skins in a solution prepared by previously fermenting vegetable seeds in water in conjunction with a soda or potash salt and a vegetable organic acid.
 3. The employment of a natural organic acid produced by the fermentation of vegetable seeds in conjunction with sulpholeates for the purpose of removing lime from skins preparatory to tanning; the tanning process consisting of the employment of a previously digested infusion of vegetable seed meal with sulpholeates or sulphoricinate with or without an enzymic activator in conjunction with a vegetable or mineral tanning material in the process of tanning leather.
 4. The process which consists in treating hides, skins, and the like in a pre-fermented infusion as hereinbefore described with the addition of tanning material.
 5. The process which consists in preparing hides, skins, and the like for tanning as hereinbefore described and simultaneously tanning them.
 6. The preparatory treatment for tanning of hides, skins, and the like, substantially as described.
 7. A process of manufacture of an infusion from ingredients and in proportions, substantially as hereinbefore described.
 8. The process of treating hides, skins, or the like, substantially as described.
 9. Hides, skins, or the like treated according to the process hereinbefore claimed.

Improvements relating to the distillation, calcination, dehydration, and like heat treatment and combustion of solid and other materials.

Abstract.—The nature of the invention is described in the claims as follows :—

1. In the distillation, calcination, dehydration, and like heat treatment of solid and other materials, the process which consists in subjecting the material simultaneously to centrifugal action and heat within a container, whereby the material is spread out and sustained in a relatively thin and uniform layer or body against the wall of said container during the heat treatment, and removing the residual or treated material from said container either during or subsequent to the centrifugal operation.
2. In the heat treatment of solid and other materials for the extraction and recovery of volatile constituents therefrom the process which consists in subjecting the material simultaneously to centrifugal action and heat within a

container, whereby the material is spread out and sustained in a relatively thin and uniform layer or body against the wall of said container during the heat treatment, and withdrawing the volatile or gaseous products from said container into a condenser or receptacle for the recovery of said products during such centrifugal operation.

3. In the distillation, calcination, dehydration, and like heat treatment of solid and other materials, the process which consists in subjecting the material simultaneously to centrifugal action and heat within a container, whereby the material is spread out and sustained against the wall of said container during the heat treatment, withdrawing the volatile or gaseous products from the container during the centrifugal action, and removing the residual or resultant material from said container during or subsequent to the centrifugal operation.

4. A process for the distillation and combustion of carbonaceous material which consists in subjecting the material simultaneously to centrifugal action and heat within a container whereby the material is spread out and sustained against the wall of said container during the heat treatment, delivering the gaseous products from said container, into a furnace or combustion chamber, and discharging the residual matter from said container into said furnace or combustion chamber to thereby effect complete combustion of the fuel therein.

5. A process in accordance with any of the foregoing claims characterized by interrupting the centrifugal action during the heat treatment to thereby permit the material to fall from the wall of the container, and thence resuming the centrifugal operation, whereby the particles of material are separated and re-grouped about the wall of said container for the purpose set forth.

6. A process according to any of the foregoing claims characterized in that the material is caused to gravitate or move through the centrifugal container from end to end thereof during treatment, for the purpose specified.

7. A process according to any of the foregoing claims characterized in that the material is fed into and the residue of resultant material is discharged from the centrifugal container during the centrifugal operation.

8. A process according to any of the foregoing claims characterized by the formation of a fluid seal around an opening of the container, by centrifugal action during the process for the purpose specified.

9. A process according to claim 8, wherein the material under treatment is caused to form a fluid seal around an outlet opening at one end of the centrifugal container, whereby residual fluid from such material is automatically discharged through said seal during the centrifugal operation.

10. A process according to any of the foregoing claims characterized by the introduction of steam into the centrifugal container during the centrifugal operation, the resultant gaseous products from the treatment of the material being simultaneously drawn off from said container.

11. In apparatus for the distillation, calcination, dehydration, and like heat treatment of solid and other materials, the combination of a centrifugal container in which the material is subjected to centrifugal action, and thereby spread out and sustained against the wall of said container, means for heating the material in said container during such centrifugal operation, and means for discharging the residual or treated material from the container.

12. In apparatus for the extraction and recovery of volatile constituents from solid and other materials, the combination of a centrifugal container within which the material is subjected to centrifugal action, and thereby spread and sustained against the wall of said container, means for heating the material within said container to extract the volatile elements therefrom during such centrifugal process, a condenser or device for the recovery of the volatile products, means for withdrawing such volatile products from said container into said recovery device during the centrifugal process.

13. In apparatus for the distillation, calcination, dehydration, and like heat treatment of solid and other materials, the combination of a centrifugal container within which the material is subjected to centrifugal action means for heating the material within said container during the centrifugal process, means for admitting the material into said container, a conduit for the withdrawal of volatile or gaseous elements from the container during the centrifugal process, and independent means for discharging the residual or resultant material from said container.

14. Apparatus according to claims 12 or 13, in combination with means for forming a liquid seal around an opening at one end of the centrifugal container, for the purpose specified.

15. Apparatus according to claim 14, wherein said liquid seal is formed by an annular channel-shaped member which accommodates and rotates about a stationary member, substantially as and for the purpose set forth.

16. Apparatus according to claim 15, wherein said annular channel-shaped member is attached to one end of the centrifugal container and rotates therewith about said stationary member which is formed about a central opening or conduit communicating with the interior of said container, substantially as and for the purpose set forth.

17. Apparatus according to claims 15 or 16, characterized by means for rotating said annular channel-shaped member of the liquid seal device independently of the centrifugal container for the purpose specified.

18. Apparatus according to any of the foregoing claims 11 to 17, characterized in that the centrifugal container is of cylindrical form and is provided at each end with a central opening communicating with a passage through a hollow axle or conduit, whereby the material may be admitted to the container at one end thereof, and the gaseous products or residue withdrawn at the opposite end.

19. Apparatus according to any of the foregoing claims 11 to 18, characterized by heat conducting tubes extending through the centrifugal container from end to end thereof adjacent the peripheral wall of the container for the purpose specified.

20. Apparatus according to claim 19, characterized by cowls or hoods formed over the open ends of said heat conducting tubes externally of the centrifugal container, substantially as and for the purpose specified.

21. Apparatus according to any of the foregoing claims 11 to 20, characterized by means for automatically feeding the material into the centrifugal container at one end thereof, and means for automatically discharging the residual or resultant material from the opposite end of said container during the centrifugal process.

22. Apparatus according to any of the foregoing claims 11 to 21, characterized by a screw conveyor or conveyors working within a hollow axle or passage at one or both ends of the centrifugal container for the purpose specified.

23. Apparatus according to any of the foregoing claims 11 to 22, characterized by a scraping device disposed with the centrifugal container and adapted to remove adhesions from the wall thereof during the centrifugal process for the purpose set forth.

24. Apparatus according to claim 23, wherein the scraper consists of an arm projecting outwardly from a trough or casing which passes through an opening in one end of the centrifugal container, whereby the material removed from the wall of the container by the outer end of the scraper arm falls into said trough or casing through which it is discharged from said container.

25. Apparatus according to any of the foregoing claims 11 to 24, in combination with a receiving chamber or collector in communication with the centrifugal container and adapted to receive the residual or treated material therefrom, and means for cutting off communication between said receiving chamber and the centrifugal container during the discharge of the treated material from said receiving chamber, for the purpose set forth.

26. Apparatus according to any of the foregoing claims 11 to 25, characterized by a steam inlet pipe passing into the centrifugal container for the purpose specified.

27. Apparatus according to claims 14 to 16, in combination with an annular collecting trough extending around the liquid seal device which is adapted to function, substantially as described with reference to Figures 1 and 2 of the accompanying drawings.

28. Apparatus according to any of the foregoing claims 11 to 27, in combination with a spiral heating rib or ribs extending around the exterior of the centrifugal container, substantially as and for the purpose described with reference to Figure 3 of the accompanying drawings.

29. Apparatus according to claim 22, wherein an outlet pipe for the volatile products extends through a screw conveyor at one end of the centrifugal container, substantially as described with reference to Figures 8 and 9 of the accompanying drawings.

30. Apparatus for the distillation and combustion of carbonaceous fuel consisting in the combination of a centrifugal container within which said material is subjected to centrifugal action to spread out the particles of fuel, a furnace or combustion chamber associated with said container for the heating thereof during said centrifugal operation, means for the admission of the carbonaceous material into said container, and means whereby the gaseous products and the residual matter resulting from said heat treatment may be discharged from the centrifugal container into said furnace or combustion chamber for the purpose specified.

31. Apparatus according to claim 30, wherein the centrifugal container is mounted within said furnace or combustion chamber and is provided at its outer end with an inlet opening for the admission of the fuel, and at its inner end with discharge openings arranged to deliver the gaseous products and residual material into said furnace, for the purpose specified.

32. Apparatus according to any of the foregoing claims 11 to 21, wherein the centrifugal container is inclined downwardly or diverges from one end, where the material is introduced for treatment, to its opposite end where the residual or resultant material is discharged for the purpose specified.

33. Apparatus for the distillation, calcination, dehydration, and like treatment of solid and other materials, substantially as herein described and as illustrated in the accompanying drawings.

Improvements in and relating to double-fluid cells.

Abstract.—The nature of the invention is described in the claims as follows:—

1. A double-fluid cell in which a semi-permeable diaphragm is formed between the two fluids, characterized in that an adequate diaphragm producing material, held in the mass itself of the porous partition wall reacts with a suitable reagent contained in the depolarizing solution, or in the exciting solution, or simultaneously with adequate reagents contained in both solutions in order to form said semi-permeable diaphragms.

2. A modification of the cell according to claim 1, characterized in that the diaphragm producing material is contained in an adhesive layer or a layer made adhesive, attached to the wall of the porous vessel.

3. A cell according to claims 1 and 2, characterized in that the diaphragm producing material is chalk or any other non-acid material, to which is added a porous adhesive material, such as cement, with an optional addition of porous indifferent material, such as powdered pumice stone, to increase the porosity of the mixture coating the porous wall, said non-acid material being capable of reacting with a depolarizing solution containing ferrous sulphate or chloride to form a semi-permeable diaphragm.

4. A cell according to claims 1, 2, and 3, characterized in that the exciting substance contains, say, chloride of zinc as material reacting with chalk for the formation of the semi-permeable diaphragm.

5. A cell according to claim 4, characterized in that the exciting solution contains sulphate of zinc in order to moderate the formation of the semi-permeable diaphragm.

6. A cell according to claims 1 to 5, characterized in that the outer receptacle and porous partition wall have level marks corresponding to the osmotic pressures of the depolarizing and exciting liquids, respectively.

7. A modification of the cell according to claim 6, characterized in that both marks are provided on the porous partition wall, one on the side of the depolarizer and the other on the side of the exciter.

8. A cell according to claims 1 to 7, characterized by two openings provided in the closure of the outer receptacle, one serving as a neck and the other as an airhole, and closed by means of screw-plugs in order to protect the liquid in said receptacle from the prejudicial action of air continuously renewed.

9. A cell according to claims 1 to 8, characterized in that the upper part of the porous vessel is screw-threaded for the reception of a screw-threaded cover, having an opening for the reception of a hollow plug through which extends the conducting wire of the negative pole, in order to protect the liquid in the porous vessel from the prejudicial action of air continuously renewed.

10. A cell according to claims 1 to 9, characterized in that the wax forming the closure contains an absorbing material which may be good conductor of electricity, in order to have a durable electric connection between the carbons or positive poles, and moreover make such wax more solid and less fusible.

11. The improved double-fluid cell, constructed and arranged substantially as herein shown and described.

Improved manufacture of crude rubber.

Abstract.—This invention is related to a previous invention by Ernest Hopkinson, Patent No. 1,738, to which reference is made in the Specification, as well as to apparatus described in No. 1,911 dated December 7, 1921, granted to the General Rubber Co. The invention consists in heating the sprayed latex so as to obtain crude rubber of a dark brown or black colour. The product so coloured and manufactured is claimed to be identifiable when compared with crude rubber of the same colour produced by other processes.

The claims are:—

1. A process for obtaining crude rubber, which consists in desiccating latex to obtain substantially all the solid constituents thereof, and heating the same to obtain a dark coloured product, for the purpose described.

2. A process as claimed in claim 1, in which the desiccation of the latex is effected by spraying it into a drying gas.

3. A process as claimed in claim 2, in which the solid constituents are subjected during the spraying operation to heat sufficient to render the dried rubber of dark colour, and/or to render the major portion of its protein constituents insoluble in water.

4. A process as claimed in claims 2 or 3, in which the heating of the solid constituents to produce a rubber of dark colour is conducted with control of the inlet and outlet temperatures of the drying gas employed in desiccating the latex.

5. A process as claimed in claims 1, 2, or 3, in which heat is applied beneath the floor or surface upon which the dried rubber particles collect.

6. A crude rubber of dark colour containing less than five per cent. of acetone-soluble material and more than one per cent. of water-soluble material.
 7. A crude rubber of dark colour containing more than one per cent. of water-soluble material.

Improvements in sheet-metal pipes or culverts.

Abstract.—The nature of the invention is described in the claims as follows:—

1. A corrugated metal pipe- or culvert-segment provided along one or both of its longitudinal sides or edges with a number of transverse slits or slots to form parallel tongues, every other tongue being bent or cranked at or near its root so as to form a shoulder or abutment, and to allow the plain or unshouldered side or edge of a complementary segment to engage between the cranked tongues and the plain or unshouldered tongues in order to form a complete pipe section, a series of holes near each side or edge of each segment, screw bolts provided with nuts adapted to be inserted in and engage one series of holes and bent rods adapted to be inserted, and to engage in the other set of holes each of said bent rods being furnished with an eye to be engaged by the bolt and nut.
 2. A curved corrugated metal sheet forming a pipe- or culvert-segment, as claimed in claim 1, in which the slits or slots are made in the valleys or concavities of the corrugations in order to form tongues which are externally convex.
 3. A corrugated sheet metal pipe- or culvert-segment, as claimed in claim 1, or claim 2, in which the screw bolts and/or the eyed rods are cranked to engage in the holes in the corrugated metal.
 4. A corrugated sheet metal pipe- or culvert-segment, as claimed in claim 1, or claim 2, in which the screw bolts and/or the eyed rods are hooked to engage in the holes in the corrugated metal.
 5. The construction of corrugated sheet metal segments for forming a pipe or culvert, as shown in Figures 1, 2, and 3, provided with fastening means as therein shown or as shown in Figure 4 or Figure 5.

Process for the coagulation of rubber latex.

Abstract.—The inventor states:—

In carrying my invention into effect, I take the fresh latex from the trees and mix this with a saccharine solution the aggregate being subsequently boiled until coagulation takes place after which the coagulum is left in clean water to cool off before going to the washing mills.

The process of boiling effectually separates the mother liquor or albuminous matter from the latex proper, and the latex proper is reinforced with the saccharine solution with which it forms a perfect chemical combination. The result is a much tougher and purer rubber and one having a greater tensile strength, improved ageing qualities, and more rapid vulcanizing qualities than is the case with rubber produced with an acid coagulation which is the general practice hitherto adopted.

Moreover, there is a complete absence of mould, rust, or tackiness in the improved rubber.

It will, of course, be understood that the saccharine employed may be the ordinary saccharine of commerce or may be produced in any suitable or desired manner, but I prefer saccharine obtained from cane sugar molasses which are reduced to a specific gravity of $\cdot 1008$ at 60° F, the solution being clarified by means of a precipitant and subsequent filtration and being then boiled two or more times in order to check fermentation.

Furthermore, I may vary the proportions of the various ingredients the actual temperatures employed, and the periods of time adopted for the various operations, but as merely one example of a method which has been found to give satisfactory results, I give the following:—

The aggregate consists of ingredients in the following proportions:—

Latex	3 gallons (480 oz.)
Saccharine solution	13½ oz.
Added water	72 oz.

The time taken to produce coagulation (in this case by boiling at 213° F by the aid of superheated steam at a pressure of 15 lb. per square inch) was 9 minutes, and 9½ lb. of dry rubber were produced.

The coagulum produced may be rolled out to any desired form in the washing mills, or may otherwise be suitably treated.

The claims are:—

1. A process for the coagulation of rubber latex which comprises the use of saccharine.
2. A process for the coagulation of rubber latex which consists in boiling rubber latex with a saccharine solution.
3. Improved process for the coagulation of rubber latex, substantially as hereinbefore described.
4. Rubber latex coagulated by the aid of saccharine.
5. Rubber latex coagulated by the herein described process.

A rubber paving or covering formed of a number of units in juxtaposition, in which each unit consists of a grid or frame of suitable material into which rubber is moulded so as to adhere thereto, the rubber below the grid or frame in contact with the road-bed or the like being continuous, while the actual tread is formed of blocks of rubber protruding above the grid or frame, substantially as described.

2. Units for rubber coverings or pavings as in the preceding claim, in which the grids or frames are adapted to overlap, so that the units may be secured in the road-bed or other surface by spikes or the like passing through the overlapping grids, substantially as described.

3. Units for rubber coverings or pavings and coverings and pavings formed of such units as hereinbefore described with reference to the accompanying drawings.

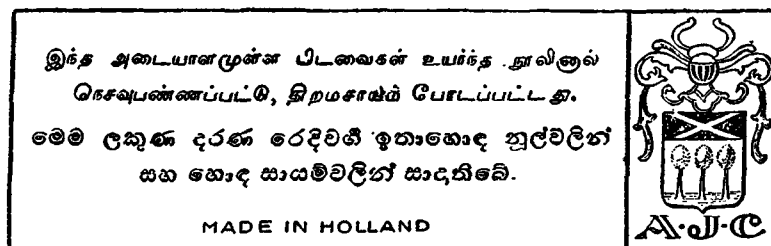
