THE following copy of a Treaty of Commerce and Navigation between the United Kingdom and Latvia signed at London on June 22, 1923, is published for general information, and it is notified that the Government of Ceylon has intimated to the Secretary of State for the Colonies its adherence to the Treaty.

Treaty of Commerce and Navigation between the United Kingdom and Latvia.

Signed at London, June 22, 1923.

[Ratifications exchanged at London, November 5, 1923.]

HIS Majesty the King of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, Emperor of India, and the President of the Latvian Republic, being desirous of further facilitating and extending the commercial relations already existing between their respective countries, have determined to conclude a Treaty of Commerce and Navigation with this object, and have appointed as their Plenipotentiaries, that is to say—

His Majesty the King of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, Emperor of India; the Most Honourable the Marquess Curzon of Kedleston, K.G., His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs; and

The President of the Latvian Republic: M. George Bisseneek, Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary of the Latvian Republic in London,

who, after having communicated to each other their respective full powers, found in good and due form, have agreed upon the following Articles :----

ARTICLE 1.

There shall be between the territories of the two Contracting Parties reciprocal freedom of commerce and navigation. The subjects or citizens of each of the two Contracting Parties shall have liberty freely to come, with their ships and cargoes to all places and ports in the territories of the other, to which subjects or citizens of that Party are, or may be, permitted to come, and shall enjoy the same rights, privileges, liberties, favours, immunities, and exemptions in matters of commerce and navigation as are or may be enjoyed by subjects or citizens of that Party. The subjects or citizens of each of the Contracting Parties shall not be subject in respect of their persons or property,

The subjects or citizens of each of the Contracting Parties shall not be subject in respect of their persons or property, or in respect of their commerce or industry, to any taxes, whether general or local, or to imposts or obligations of any kind whatever, other or greater than those which are or may be imposed upon subjects or citizens of the other, or subjects or citizens of the most favoured nation.

ARTICLE 2.

The Contracting Parties agree that, in all matters relating to commerce, navigation, and industry, any privilege, favour, or immunity which either Contracting Party has actually granted, or may hereafter grant, to the ships and subjects or citizens of any other foreign State, shall be extended simultaneously and unconditionally, without request and without compensation to the ships and subjects or citizens of the other, it being their intention that the commerce, navigation, and industry of each Party shall be placed in all respects on the footing of the most favoured nation.

ARTICLE 3.

The subjects or citizens of each of the Contracting Parties in the territories of the other shall be at full liberty to acquire and possess every description of property, movable and immovable, which the laws of that Party permit, or shall permit, the subjects or citizens of any other foreign country to acquire and possess. They may dispose of the same by sale, exchange, gift, marriage, testament, or in any other manner, or acquire the same by inheritance under the same conditions which are or shall be established with regard to the subjects or citizens of that Contracting Party. They shall not be subjected, in any of the cases mentioned, to any taxes, imposts, or charges of whatever denomination other or higher than those which are or shall be applicable to subjects or citizens of that Contracting Party.

The subjects or citizens of each of the Contracting Parties shall also be permitted, on compliance with the laws of the other Party, freely to export the proceeds of the sale of their property and goods in general without being subjected as foreigners to other or higher duties than those to which the subjects or citizens of that Party would be liable under similar circumstances.

ARTICLE 4.

The subjects or citizens of each of the Contracting Parties in the territories of the other shall be exempted from all compulsory military service whatsoever, whether in the army, navy, national guard, or militia. They shall similarly be exempted from all judicial, administrative, and municipal functions whatever, other than those imposed by the laws relating to juries, as well as from all contributions, whether pecuniary or in kind, imposed as an equivalent for personal service, and finally from any military exactions or requisitions. The charges connected with the possession by any title of landed property are, however, excepted as well as compulsory billeting and other special military exactions or requisitions, to which all subjects or citizens of that Party may be liable as owners or occupiers of buildings or land.

In the above respects the subjects or citizens of each of the Contracting Parties shall not be accorded in the territories of the other less favourable treatment than that which is, or may be, accorded to subjects or citizens of the most favoured nation.

ARTICLE 5.

Articles, the produce or manufacture of the territories of one of the Contracting Parties imported into the territories of the other, from whatever place arriving, shall not be subject to other or higher duties or charges than those paid on the like articles, the produce or manufacture of the territories of any other foreign country. Nor shall any prohibition or restriction be maintained or imposed on the importation of any article the produce or manufacture of the territories of either of the Contracting Parties into the territories of the other, from whatever place arriving, which shall not equally extend to the importation of the like articles being the produce or manufacture of the territories of any other foreign country.

The only exceptions of this general rule shall be in the case of the sanitary or other prohibitions occasioned by the necessity of securing the safety of persons or of cattle, or of plants useful to agriculture, and of the measures applicable in the territories of either of the Contracting Parties to articles enjoying a direct or indirect bounty in the territories of the other Contracting Party.

ARTICLE 6.

Articles, the produce or manufacture of the territories of either of the Contracting Parties, exported to the territories of the other shall not be subjected to other or higher duties or charges than those paid on the like articles exported to any other foreign country. Nor shall any prohibition or restriction be imposed on the exportation of any article from the territories of either of the Contracting Parties to the territories of the other which shall not equally extend to the exportation of the like article to any other foreign country.

ARTICLE 7.

As an exception from the general undertaking given by the Latvian Government to accord most-favoured-nation treatment to the commerce of His Britannic Majesty's territories, it is understood that His Britannic Majesty will not claim the benefit of any Customs preferences or other facilities of whatever nature which are, or may be, granted by Latvia in favour of Russia, Finland, Esthonia, or Lithuania in regard to Russian, Finnish, Esthonian, or Lithuanian goods respectively so long as such preferences or facilities are not extended by Latvia to any other foreign country.

ARTICLE 8.

The stipulations of the present Treaty with regard to the mutual accord of the treatment of the most favoured nation apply unconditionally to the treatment of commercial travellers and their samples. The Chambers of Commerce, as well as such other Trade Associations and other recognized Commercial Associations in the territories of the Contracting Parties as may be authorized in this behalf, shall be mutually accepted as competent authorities for issuing any certificates that may be required for commercial travellers.

Articles imported by commercial travellers as samples, shall in the territories of each of the Contracting Parties be temporarily admitted free of duty on compliance with the Customs regulations and formalities established to assure their re-exportation or the payment of the prescribed Customs duties if not re-exported within the period allowed by law. But the foregoing privilege shall not extend to articles which, owing to their quantity or value, cannot be considered as samples, or which, owing to their nature, could not be identified upon re-exportation.

The marks, stamps, or seals placed upon such samples by the Customs authorities of one Contracting Party at the time of exportation and the officially attested list of such samples, containing a full description thereof, issued by them shall be reciprocally accepted by the Customs officials of the other as establishing their character as samples and exempting them from inspection, except so far as may be necessary to establish that the samples produced are those enumerated in the list. The Customs authorities of either Contracting Party may, however, affix a supplementary mark to such samples in special cases where they may think this precaution necessary.

ARTICLE 9.

No internal duties levied for the benefit of the State, local authorities, or corporations which affect, or may affect, the production, manufacture, or consumption of any article in the territories of either of the Contracting Parties, shall for any reason be a higher or more burdensome charge on articles, the produce or manufacture of the other, than on similar articles of native origin.

The produce or manufacture of either of the Contracting Parties imported into the territories of the other, and intended for warehousing or transit, shall not be subjected to any internal duty. It is understood that ordinary charges for the handling of goods in the ports are not within the scope of this Article and may be levied.

ARTICLE 10. .

The establishment and the activities of limited liability and other companies and associations, commercial, industrial; financial, forwarding, navigation and assurance are based on the laws and regulations of the Contracting Party in the territories of which they may be situated.

It is understood that this Article does not give the right to impose by the enactment of laws or otherwise special conditions on companies of either of the Contracting Parties operating in the territories of the other involving treatment less favourable than that which is applied to national or foreign companies operating in those territories.

ARTICLE 11.

Limited liability and other companies and associations, commercial, industrial, and financial, already or hereafter to be organized in accordance with the laws of either Contracting Party, and registered in the territories of such Party, are authorized, in the territories of the other, to exercise their rights and to appear in the Courts either as plaintiffs or defendants, subject to the laws of such other Party.

ARTICLE 12.

Each of the Contracting Parties undertakes to place no obstacle in the way of any company (duly organized in accordance with the laws of the other) which may desire to carry on in its territories, whether through the establishment of branches or otherwise, commercial, industrial, insurance, banking, or other description of business which the subjects or companies of any foreign country are or may be permitted to carry on; and in framing and administering laws with regard to the taxation of such companies and branches, each Contracting Party will be guided by the principle embodied in Article 1 of this Treaty, that is to say, that the system of taxation shall be so framed and administered as to place national companies and the business in the territories of each Contracting Party of the companies organized in the territories of the other so far as possible on the same footing in this respect.

ARTICLE 13.

The measures taken by the Contracting Parties for regulating and forwarding traffic across their territories shall facilitate free transit by rail or waterway on routes in use convenient for international transit. No distinction shall be made which is based on the nationality of persons, the flag of vessels, the place of origin; departure; entry, exit, or destination, or on any circumstances relating to the ownership of goods or of vessels, coaching or goods stock; or other means of transport.

In order to ensure the application of the foregoing provisions the Contracting Parties will allow transit in accordance with the customary conditions and reserves across their territorial waters.

Traffic in transit shall not be subject to any special dues in respect of transit (including entry and exit) except for such dues as are intended solely to defray expenses of supervision and administration entailed by such transit. It is understood that ordinary charges for the handling of the goods in the ports are not within the scope of this Article and may be levied.

Neither Contracting Party shall be bound by this Article to afford transit for passengers whose admission into its territories is forbidden, or for goods of a kind of which the importation is prohibited, either on grounds of public health or security, or as a precaution against diseases of animals and plants.

For the purpose of this Article, persons, baggage, and goods, and also vessels, coaching and goods stock, and other means of transport shall be deemed to be in transit across the territories of the Contracting Parties, when the passage across such territories, with or without transhipment, warehousing, breaking bulk, or change in the mode of transport, is only a portion of a complete journey, beginning and terminating beyond the frontier of the Party across whose territories the transit takes place.

ARTICLE .14.

Each of the Contracting Parties shall permit the importation or exportation of all merchandise which may be legally imported or exported; and also the carriage of passengers from or to their respective territories, upon the vessels of the other; and such vessels, their cargoes and passengers, shall enjoy the same privileges as, and shall not be subjected to any other or higher duties or charges than, national vessels and their cargoes and passengers or the vessels, cargoes, and passengers of the most favoured nation.

ARTICLE 15.

The provisions of this Treaty relating to the mutual concession of national treatment in matters of navigation do not apply to the coasting trade, in respect of which the subjects and vessels of the Contracting Parties shall enjoy most-favoured-nation treatment.

British and Latvian vessels may, nevertheless, proceed from one port to another, either for the purpose of landing the whole or part of their cargoes or passengers brought from abroad, or of taking on board the whole or part of their cargoes or passengers for a foreign destination.

It is also understood that, in the event of the coasting trade of either Party being exclusively reserved to national vessels, the vessels of the other Party, if engaged in trade to or from places not within the limits of the coasting trade so reserved, shall not be prohibited from the carriage between two ports of the former Party of passengers holding through tickets or merchandise consigned on through bills of lading to or from places not within the above-mentioned limits, and while engaged in such carriage these vessels and their passengers and cargoes shall enjoy the full privileges of this Treaty.

ARTICLE 16.

In all that regards the stationing, loading, and unloading of vessels in the ports, docks, roadsteads, and harbours of the territories of the Contracting Parties, no privilege or facility shall be granted by either Party to vessels of any other foreign country or to national vessels which is not equally granted to vessels of the other Party.

ARTICLE 17.

In regard to duties of tonnage, harbour, pilotage, lighthouse, quarantine, or other analogous duties or charges of whatever denomination, levied in the name or for the profit of the Government, public functionaries, private individuals, corporations, or establishments of any kind, the vessels of either Contracting Party shall enjoy in the ports of the territories of the other treatment at least as favourable as that accorded to national vessels or the vessels of any other foreign country.

ARTICLE 18.

Any vessel of either of the Contracting Parties which may be compelled, by stress of weather or by accident, to take shelter in a port of the other, shall be at liberty to refit therein, to procure all necessary stores, and to put to sea again, without paying any dues other than such as would be payable in a similar case by a national vessel. In case, however, the master of a merchant vessel should be under the necessity of disposing of a part of his merchandise in order to defray his expenses, he shall be bound to conform to the Regulations and Tariffs of the place to which he may have come.

If any vessel of one of the Contracting Parties should run aground or be wrecked upon the coasts of the other, such vessel, and all parts thereof, and all furniture and appurtenances belonging thereunto, and all goods and merchandise saved therefrom, including any which may have been cast into the sea, or the proceeds thereof, if sold, as well as all papers found on board such stranded or wrecked vessel, shall be given up to the owners of such vessel, goods, merchandise, &c., or to their agents when claimed by them. If there are no such owners or agents on the spot then the vessel, goods, merchandise, &c., referred to shall, in so far as they are the property of a subject or citizen of the other Contracting Party, be delivered to the Consular Officer of that Contracting Party in whose district the wreck or stranding may have taken place, upon being claimed by him within the period fixed by the laws of that Contracting Party, and such Consular Officers, owners, or agents shall pay only the expenses incurred in the preservation of the property, together with the salvage or other expenses which would have been payable in the like case of a wreck or stranding of a national vessel. The Contracting Parties agree, moreover, that merchandise saved shall not be subjected to the payment of any

Customs duty unless cleared for internal consumption.

In the case of a vessel either being driven in by stress of weather, run aground, or wrecked, the respective Consular Officers shall, if the owner or master or other agent of the owner is not present, or is present and requires it, be authorzied to interpose in order to afford the necessary assistance to their fellow-countrymen.

ARTICLE 19.

All vessels which, according to British law, are to be deemed British vessels, and all vessels which, according to Latvian law, are to be deemed Latvian vessels, shall for the purpose of this Treaty be deemed British and Latvian vessels respectively.

ARTICLE 20.

It shall be free to each of the Contracting Parties to appoint Consuls-General, Consuls, Vice-Consuls, and Consular Agents to reside in the territories of the other. Such Consuls-General, Consuls, Vice-Consuls, and Consular Agents, however, shall not enter upon their functions until after they shall have been approved and admitted in the usual form by the Government to which they are sent.

ARTICLE 21.

The Consular Officers of each of the Contracting Parties residing in the territories of the other shall receive from the local authorities such assistance as can by law be given to them for the recovery of deserters from the vessels of their respective countries.

Provided that this stipulation shall not apply to subjects or citizens of the Contracting Party in whose territory the desertion takes place.

ARTICLE 22.

The subjects or citizens of each of the Contracting Parties shall have in the territories of the other the same rights in regard to patents for inventions, trade marks, and designs, and copyright in literary and artistic works as their respective laws do now or may hereafter grant to their own subjects or citizens.

ARTICLE 23.

Latvia agrees on condition of reciprocity to recognize and protect all rights in any industrial, literary, or artisticproperty belonging to British subjects in force, or which but for the War or Revolution in Russia would have been in force in any part of her territories before transfer to Latvia, and for the purpose of renewal of such rights the proper extension of time will be accorded.

It is understood that for the purposes of the above provisions Latvia may require proof of title and also registration of such rights in Latvia.

It is further understood that patents and trade marks which have been registered in Latvia before the date of conclusion of this Treaty and would be identical with those previously registered by British subjects in Russia, can be revoked in Latvia only by the decision of the Courts of Law. Latvia agrees to promulgate within six months from the date of the ratification of this Treaty a special law concerning revocation of patents and trade marks so registered.

ARTICLE 24.

All goods bearing marks or descriptions which state or manifestly suggest that the goods are the produce or manufacture of the territories of either of the Contracting Parties shall, if such statement or suggestion be false, be seized on importation into the territories of either of the two Parties. The seizure may also be effected in the State where the false indication of origin has been applied, or in that into which the goods bearing the false indication may have been imported,

The seizure shall be effected either at the request of the proper Government Department or of an interested party. whether an individual or a society, in conformity with the domestic legislation of each Contracting Party, but the authorities are not bound to effect the seizure of goods in transit.

The Pribunals of each Contracting Party shall decide what descriptions, on account of their generic character, do not fall within the provisions of the present Article.

ARTICLE 25.

This Treaty shall not be deemed to confer any right or to impose any obligation in contravention of any general International Convention to which either His Britannic Majesty or the President of the Latvian Republic is or hereafter may be a party.

ARTICLE 26.

The stipulations of the present Treaty shall not be applicable to India or to any of His Britannic Majesty's self-governing Dominions, Colonies, Possessions, or Protectorates, unless notice is given by His Britannic Majesty's Representative at Riga of the desire of His Britannic Majesty that the said stipulations shall apply to any such territory. Nevertheless, goods produced or manufactured in India or in any of His Britannic Majesty's self-governing Dominions, Colonies, Possessions, or Protectorates shall enjoy in Latvia complete and unconditional most-favoured-nation treatment so long as goods produced or manufactured in Latvia are accorded in India or such self-governing Dominion, Colony, Possession, or Protectorate treatment as favourable as that accorded to goods produced or manufactured in any other foreign country.

ARTICLE 27.

The terms of the preceding Article relating to India and to His Britannic Majesty's self-governing Dominions, Colonies, Possessions, and Protectorates shall apply also to any territory in respect of which a mandate on behalf of the League of Nations has been accepted by His Britannic Majesty.

ARTICLE 28.

The present Treaty shall be ratified and the ratifications shall be exchanged at London as soon as possible. It shall come into force immediately upon ratification, and shall remain in force until the expiration of twelve months from the date on which either of the Contracting Parties shall have denounced it.

date on which either of the Contracting Farties shall have denounced it. As regards, however, India or any of His Britannic Majesty's self-governing Dominions, Colonies, Possessions, or Protectorates, or any territory in respect of which a mandate on behalf of the League of Nations has been accepted by His Britannic Majesty, to which the stipulations of the present Treaty shall have been made applicable under Articles 26 or 27, either of the Contracting Parties shall have the right to terminate it separately at any time on giving twelve months' notice to that effect.

In witness whereof the respective Plenipotentiaries have signed the present Treaty and have affixed thereunto their seals.

To convert all such trees and every utilizable part of every fallen or felled tree or sapling in the following blocks, excepting the boles of teabox trees marked "S" into firewood, to deliver the firewood at the nearest place on the railway considered suitable by the Divisional Forest Officer, at the rate of 1,000 cubic yards per month. To have always ready for transport 10 per cent. more wood than is actually delivered monthly.

The blocks are subdivided into coupes. The contractor will not be permitted to work in more than one coupe at a time, except with the written authority of the Divisional Forest Officer. He shall not enter a fresh coupe, until he has completed all work in the previcus coupe or coupes and, unless he obtains a written authority from the Divisional Forest Officer.

(2) Felling is to commence within a week of signing the contract and to cease on November 30, 1925. Final delivery of wood to be made on or before December 15, 1925.

(3) All herbacious and other undergrowth to be cut out in a straight line as specified above, at least a fortnight before any tree supling or tree seedling is felled. This operation must be carried out throughout the block even where no utilizable trees remain from previous fellings. All stools of trees, from previous fellings, left standing over 12 inches high, should be reduced to within 12 inches of the ground.

(4) Thereafter to coppice out with sharp catties cr other suitable instrument within 2 inches of the ground all saplings and seedlings which are under one inch diameter.

(5) Thereafter to fell with axes and immediately to coppice by means of sharp adzes clearly and flush with the ground or as directed by the Divisior al Forest Officer all saplings which are over 1 inch diameter and not exceeding 8 inches diameter.

(6) Thereafter to fell all trees over 8 inches in diameter and on the same day to coppice all the stumps which are less than 15 inches in diameter cleanly and flush with the ground, or at such height as may be required by the Divisional Forest Officer.

(7) In order to perform this work systematically, cheaply. and efficiently, operation 3 above should be completed by a separate working party a fortnight before operation 4 commences. Operation 3 should always cover in advance a depth of the block sufficient to provide three weeks material for the firewood cutters. Operation 4 should be completed one week ahead of operation 5, separate working parties should be assigned to the separate operations, and separate workmen should be detailed to keep the coppicing tools continually sharp. Surplus sharpened tools should always be ready to hand in the felling area. The cost of coppicing in this manner is estimated at 15 cents per cubic yard.

(8) The contractor, if so required by the Divisional Forest Officer shall submit a list of every carter or raftman employed by him and be responsible for the delivery of all wood to the railway.

Scantlings.-6 in. by 4 in. (cross section) of various lengths.

VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended October 11, 1924.

Births.—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 117 (1 European, 11 Burghers, 63 Sinhalese, 17 Tamils, 18 Moors, 6 Malays, and 1 Other). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on July 1, 1924, viz., 253,224) was $24 \cdot 2$, as against $25 \cdot 4$ in the preceding week, $30 \cdot 0$ in the corresponding week of last year, and $28 \cdot 3$ the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 171 (8 Burghers, 106 Sinhalese, 26 Tamils, 23 Moors, 5 Malays, and 3 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was $35 \cdot 3$, as against 26 $\cdot 8$ in the previous week, $27 \cdot 3$ in the corresponding week of last year, and $35 \cdot 6$ the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 171 total deaths, 39 were of infants under one year of age, as against 22 in the preceding week, 30 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 37 the average for last year.

Stillbirths.-The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 18.

Principal Causes of Death.—1. (a) Eleven deaths from Pneumonia were registered, 6 in Maradana hospitals (including 3 deaths of non-residents), 2 in St. Paul's, and 1 each in New Bazaar, Slave Island, and Wellawatta North, same as in the previous week and against 24 the weekly average for last year.

(b) Five deaths from *Influenza* were registered, 2 each in St. Paul's and Maradana North, and 1 in San Sebastian, same as in the previous week and against 6 the weekly average for last year.

(c) Two deaths from *Bronchitis* were registered, 1 each in Maradana North and Maradana South, as against 11 in the previous week and 4 the weekly average for last year.

2. Nine deaths from *Enteric Fever* were registered, 4 in Maradana hospitals (including 1 death of a non-resident), 2 in Kotahena South, and 1 each in Maradana North, Slave Island, and Wellawatta North, as against 1 in the previous week and 5 the weekly average for last year.

3. Eight deaths from *Phthisis* were registered, 3 in Maradana hospitals, 2 each in New Bazaar and Maradana North, and 1 in Kollupitiya, as against 17 in the previous week and 15 the weekly average for last year.

4. Fourteen deaths were registered from Enteritis, 14 from Debility, 10 from Infantile Convulsions, 7 from Diarrhæa, 4 each from Dysentery and Worms, 1 from Pueperal Septicæmia, and 82 from Other Causes.

5. Nine cases of *Enteric Fever*, 8 of *Measles*, and 7 of *Chickenpox* were reported during the week, as against 5, 3, and 4, respectively, of the preceding week. No case of *Plague* was reported either in this week or in the previous week.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was $81 \cdot 6^{\circ}$, against $80 \cdot 1^{\circ}$ in the preceding week and $80 \cdot 8^{\circ}$ in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was $29 \cdot 847$ in., against $29 \cdot 879$ in. in the preceding week, and $29 \cdot 934$ in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was $0 \cdot 04$ in., against $2 \cdot 49$ in. in the preceding week, and $2 \cdot 14$ in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.

It is agreed as follows :-

1. (a) Table C not to apply; Company to be governed by these Articles.—The regulations contained in Table C in the schedule annexed to "The Joint Stock Companies Ordinance, 1861," shall not apply to this Company, which shall be governed by the regulations contained in these Articles, but subject to repeal, addition, or alteration by special resolution. (b) The sub-headings in these Articles shall not be deemed to be part of or affect the construction of these presents.

2. Power to alter the Regulations.—The Company may, by special resolution, alter and make provisions instead of, or in addition to, any of the regulations of the Company, whether contained and comprised in these Articles or not. 3. Commencement of Business .-- The Company may proceed to carry out the objects for which it is established, and to employ and apply its capital as soon after the registration of the Company as the Directors in their discretion shall think fit; and notwithstanding that the whole of the shares shall not have been subscribed, applied for, or allotted, they shall do so as soon as in the judgment of the Directors, a sufficient number of shares shall have been subscribed or applied

Business to be carried on by Directors .-- The business of the Company shall be carried on by, or under the management or direction of, the Directors, and subject only to the control of General Meetings, in accordance with these presents.

CAPITAL.

Nominal Capital.-The nominal capital of the Company is Six hundred thousand Rupees (Rs. 600,000), divided into Sixty thousand (60,000) shares of Ten Rupees (Rs. 10) each.

SHARES.

8. (a) Issue and Allotment.-The shares, except where otherwise provided, shall be allotted at the discretion of and by the Directors, who may from time to time issue any unissued shares, and may add to such shares such an amount of premium as they may consider proper; provided that such unissued shares shall be first offered by the Directors to the registered Shareholders for the time being of the Company, in accordance with their rights and subject in the case of preference shares or shares of any particular class to any limitations as to participating in any issue of shares which may attach to such preference shares or shares of such particular class, as nearly as possible in proportion to the shares already held by them, and such shares as shall not be accepted by the Shareholder or Shareholders to whom the shares shall have been offered within the time specified in that behalf by the Directors, may be disposed of by the Directors in such manner as they think most beneficial to the Company; provided also that the Directors may at their discretion allot any unissued shares in payment for any estates or lands or other property purchased or acquired by the Company or for services rendered or to be rendered to the Company, without first offering such shares to the registered Shareholders for the time being of the Company, and may make arrangements on an issue of shares for a difference between the holders of such shares in the

amount of calls to be paid and the time of payment of such calls. (b) Commission for placing Shares.—The Directors may at any time pay a commission to any person for subscribing or agreeing to subscribe (whether absolutely or conditionally) for any shares in the Company, or procuring or agreeing to procure subscriptions (whether absolute or conditional) for any shares in the Company.

9. Payment of Amount of Shares by Instalments.—If by the conditions of allotment of any share the whole or part of the amount thereof shall be payable by instalments, every such instalment shall, when due, be paid to the Company by the holder of the share.

10. Acceptance.—Every person taking any share in the Company shall testify his acceptance thereof by writing under his hand in such form as the Company from time to time directs.
 11. Payment.—Payment for shares shall be made in such manner as the Directors shall from time to time determine

and direct.

12. Shares held by a Firm.-Shares may be registered in the name of a firm, and any partner of the firm or agent duly authorized to sign the name of the firm shall be entitled to vote and to give proxies, but not more than one partner may vote at a time.

13. Shares held by two or more Persons not in Partnership.-Shares may be registered in the names of two or more persons not in partnership.

14. One of Joint-Holders, other than a Firm, may give Receipts; only one of Joint-Holders resident in Ceylon entitled to Vote. -Any one of the joint-holders of a share, other than a firm, may give effectual receipts for any dividends payable in respect of such share; but only one of such joint-shareholders shall be entitled to the right of voting and of giving proxies ³ and exercising the other rights and powers conferred on a sole Shareholder, and if the joint-holders cannot arrange amongst themselves as to who shall vote or give proxies and exercise such other rights and powers conferred on a sole Shareholder, the Shareholder whose name stands first on the register of shares shall vote or give proxies and exercise those rights and powers ; provided, however, that in the event of such first registered Shareholder being absent from the Island, the first registered Shareholder then resident in Ceylon shall vote or give proxies and exercise all such rights and powers as aforesaid.

15. Survivor of Joint-Holders, other than a Firm, only recognized.—In case of the death of any one or more of the joint-holders, other than a firm, of any shares, the survivor or survivors shall be the only person or persons recognized by the Company as having any title to or interest in such shares.
 16. Liability of Joint-Holders.—The joint-holders of a share shall be severally as well as jcintly liable for the pay-

mont of all instalments and calls due in respect of such share.
17. Trusts or any Interest in Share other than that of Registered Holder or of any Person under Article 38 not recognized.

-The Company shall not be bound to recognize (even though having actice of) any contingent, future, partial, or equitable interest in the nature of a trust or otherwise in any share, or any other right in respect of any share, except an absolute right thereto in the person from time to time registered as the holder thereof, and except also the right of any person under Article 38 to become a Shareholder in respect of any share.

INCREASE OF CAPITAL.

18. Increase of Capital by Creation of new Shares .- The Company in General Meeting may, by special resolution from time to time, increase the capital by creation of new shares of such amount per share and in the aggregate, and with such special, preferential, deferred, qualified, or other rights, privileges, or conditions attached thereto as such resolution shall direct.

19. Issue of new Shares.-The new shares shall be issued upon such terms and conditions, and with such preferential, deferred, qualified, special, or other rights, privileges, or conditions attached thereto, as the General Meeting resolving on the creation thereof or any other General Meeting of the Company shall direct ; and in particular such shares may be issued with a preferential or qualified right to the dividends and in the distribution of assets of the Company, and with a special or without any right of voting. The Directors shall have power to add to such new shares such an amount of premium as they may consider proper. 20. How carried into Effect.—Subject to any direction to the contrary that may be given by the meeting that

sanctions the increase of capital, all new shares shall be offered to the Shareholders, in accordance with their rights and subject in the case of preference shares or shares of any particular class to any limitations as to participating in any issue of shares which may attach to such preference shares or shares of such particular class, in proportion to the existing shares held by them. Such offer shall be made by notice specifying the number of shares to which the Shareholder is entitled, and limiting a time within which the offer, if not accepted, will be deemed to be declined, and after the expiration of such time, or on the receipt of an intimation from the Sharcholder to whom such notice is given that he declines to accept the shares offered, the same shall be disposed of in such manner as the Directors may determine. Provided that the Directors may, at their discretion, allot such new shares or any portion of them in payment for any estates or lands or other property purchased or acquired by the Company, or for services rendered or to be rendered to the Company, without first offering such shares to the registered Shareholders for the time being of the Company.

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Same as Original Capital.---Except so far as otherwise provided by the conditions of issue or by these presents, 21. any capital raised by the creation of new shares shall be considered part of the original capital, and shall be subject to the provisions herein contained with reference to the payments of calls and instalments, transfer, transmission, forfeiture, tion, surronder, and otherwise.

REDUCTION OF CAPITAL AND SUBDIVISION OR CONSOLIDATION OF SHARES.

22. Reduction of Capital and Subdivision or Consolidation of Shares .- The Company in General Meeting may, by special resolution, reduce the capital in such manner as such special resolution shall direct, and may, by special resolution, subdivide or consclidate the shares of the Company or any of them.

SHARE CERTIFICATES.

23. Certificates how issued.-Every Shareholder shall be entitled to one certificate for all the shares registered in his name, or to several certificates, each for one or more of such shares. Every certificate shall specify the distinctive number of the share in respect of which it is issued.

24. Certificates to be under Seal of Company.—The certificatos of shares shall be issued under the seal of the Company. 25. Renewal of Certificate.—If any certificate be worn out or defaced, then upon production thereof to the Directors

they may order the same to be cancelled and may issue a new certificate in lieu thereof ; and if any certificate be lost or destroyed, then upon proof thereof to the satisfaction of the Directors, and on such indemnity as the Directors deem adequate being given, a new certificate in lieu thereof shall be given to the porson entitled to such lest or destroyed certificate. A sum of fifty cents shall be payable for such new certificate.

26. Certificate to be delivered to the first named of Joint-Holders not a Firm.-The certificate of shares registered in the names of two or more persons not a firm shall be delivered to the person first named on the register.

TRANSFER OF SHARES.

27. Exercise of Rights.—No person shall exercise any right of a Shareholder until his name shall have been entered in the register of Shareholders, and h_2 shall have paid all calls and other moneys for the time being payable on every share in the Company held by him.

Transfer of Shares.-Subject to the restriction of these Articles, any Shareholder may transfer all or any of 28. his shares by instrument in writing. 29. No transfer to Minor or Person of Unsound Mind.—No transfer of shares shall be made to a minor or person of

unsound mind.

30. Register of Transfers.-The Company shall keep a book or books to be called "The Register of Transfers," in which shall be entered the particulars of every transfer or transmission of any share.

31. Instrument of Transfer.-The instrument of transfer of any share shall be signed both by the transferor and transferee, and the transferor shall be deemed to remain the holder of such share until the name of the transferee is entered in the register in respect thereof.

32. Board may decline to register Transfers.—The Board may, at their own absolute and uncontrolled discretion, decline to register any transfer of shares by a Shareholder who is indebted to the Company, or upon whose shares the Company has a lien or otherwise ; cr to any person not approved by them.

33. Not bound to state Reason.-In no case shall a Shareholder or proposed transferee be entitled to require the Directors to state the reason of their refusal to register, but their declination shall be absolute.

34. Registration of Transfer.- Every instrument of transfer must be left at the effice of the Company te be registered, accompanied by such evidence as the Directors may reasonably require to prove the title of the transferor, and a fee of Rs. 2 50, or such other sum as the Directors shall from time to time determine, must be paid ; and the raupon the Directors, subject to the powers vested in them by Articles 32, 33, and 35, shall register the transferet as a Shareholder and retain the instrument of transfer.

35. Directors may authorize Registration of Transferees.-The Directors may, by such means as they shall deem expedient, authorize the registration of transferees as Shareholders without the necessity of any meeting of the Directors for that purpose.

36. Directors not bound to inquire as to Validity of Transfer.—In no case shall the Directors be bound to inquire into the validity, legal effect, or genuineness of ary instrument of transfer produced by a person claiming a transfer of any share in accordance with these Articles; and whether they abstain from so inquiring, or do so inquire and are misled, the transferor shall have no claim whatsoever upon the Company in respect of the share, except for the dividends previously

declared in respect thereof, but, if at all, upon the transferst only. 37. Transfer Books when to be closed.—The transfer books may be closed during the fourteen days immediately preceding each Ordinary General Meeting, including the First General Meeting; also, when a dividend is declared, for the three days next ensuing the meeting; also at such other-times as the Directors may decide, not exceeding in the whole twenty-one days in any one year.

TRANSMISSION OF SHARES.

38. Title to Shares of Deceased Holder.-The executors, or administrators, or the heirs of a deceased Shareholder

shall be the only persons recognized by the Company, as having any title to shares of such Shareholder.
39. Registration of Persons entitled to Shares otherwise than by Transfer.—Any curator of any minor Shareholder, any committee of a lunation Shareholder, or any person becoming entitled to shares in consequence of the death, bankruptcy, all liquidation of a purchased shareholder. on liquidation of any Shareholder, or the marriage of any female Shareholder, or in any other way than by transfer, shall, upon producing such evidence that he sustains the character in respect of which he proposes to act under this clause, or of his title, as the Company think sufficient, be forthwith entitled, subject to the provisions herein contained, to be registered as a Shareholder in respect of such shares on payment of a fee of Rs. 2.50; or may, subject to the regulations as to transfers

h >reinbefore contained, transfer the same to some other person.
40. Failing such Registration, Shares may be sold by the Company.—If any person who shall becom > ntitled to be
r >gistered in r >spect of any share under Article 39 shall not, from any cause whatever, within 12 calendar months after the event on the happening of which his title shall accrue, be registered in respect of such share, or if, in the case of the death of any Shareholder, no person shall, within 12 calendar months after such death, be registered as a Shareholder in respect of the shares of such deceased Shareholder, the Company may sell the same either by public auction or private contract, and give a receipt for the purchase money; and the purchaser shall be mittled to be registered in respect of such share, and shall not be bound to inquire whether the events have happened which entitled the Company to sell the same; the nett proceeds of such sale, after deducting all expenses and all moneys in respect of which the Company is entitled to a lien on the shares so sold, shall be paid to the person entitled thereto.

SURRENDER AND FORFEITURE OF SHARES.

41. The Directors may accept Surrender of Shares .-- The Directors may accept in the name and for the benefit of the Company, and upon such terms and conditions as may be agreed upon a surrender of the shares of Shareholders who may be desirous of retiring from the Company. Č.

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42. (a) If Call or Instalment be not paid, Notice to be given to Shareholder.—If any Shareholder fails to pay any call or instalment on or before the day appointed for the payment of the same, the Directors may at any time thereafter, during such time as the call or instalment remains unpaid, serve a notice on such Shareholder or his executors or administrators, or the trustee or assignee in his bankruptcy, requiring him to pay the same, together with any interest that may have accrued at the rate of 9 per cent. per annum, and all expenses that may have been incurred by the Company by reason of such non-payment.

(b) Terms of Notice.—The notice shall name a day (not being less than one month from the date of the retice) on and a place or places at which such call or instalment and such interest and expenses as afcresaid are to be paid; the notice shall also state that, in the event of non-payment at or before the time and at the place appointed, the shares in respect of which the call was made or instalment is payable will be liable to be forfeited.

respect of which the call was made or instalment is payable will be liable to be forfeited. (c) In Default of Payment, Shares to be forfeited.—If the requisition of such notice as aforesaid be not complied with, every or any share or shares in respect of which such notice has been given may at any time thereafter, before payment of calls or instalments, with interest, and expenses due in respect thereof, be declared forfeited by a resolution of the Board to that effect.

(d) Shareholder still liable to pay Money owing at Time of Forfeiture.—Any Shareholder whose shares have been so declared forfeited shall, notwithstanding, be liable to pay, and shall forthwith pay to the Company all calls, instalments, interest, and expenses owing upon or in respect of such shares at the time of the forfeiture, together with interest thereon from the time of forfeiture until payment at 9 per cent. per annum, and the Directors may enforce the payment thereof if they think fit.

43. Surrendered or Forfeited Shares to be the Property of the Company, and may be sold, &c.—Every share surrendered or so declared forfeited shall be deemed to be the property of the Company, and may be sold, re-allotted, or otherwise disposed of upon such terms and in such manner as the Board shall think fit.

44. Effect of Surrender or Forfeiture.—The surrender or forfeiture of a share shall involve the extinction of all interest in, and also of all claims and demands against, the Company in respect of the share and the proceeds thereof, and all other rights incident to the share, except only such of those rights (if any) as by these presents are expressly saved.

and all other rights incident to the share, except only such of those rights (if any) as by these presents are expressly saved. 45. (a) Certificates of Surrender or Forfeiture.—A certificate in writing under the hands of two of the Directors and of the Agent or Secretary or Agents or Secretaries that a share has been duly surrendered or forfeited, stating the time when it was surrendered or forfeited shall be conclusive evidence of the facts therein stated as against all persons who would have been entitled to the share but for such surrender or forfeiture ; such certificate and the receipt of the Company for the price of such share shall constitute a good title to such share, and a certificate of proprietorship shall be delivered to any person who may purchase the same from the Company ; such purchaser thereupon shall be deemed the holder of such share, discharged from all calls due prior to such purchase, and he shall not be bound to see to the application of the purchase money, nor shall his title to such share be affected by any irregularity in the proceedings in reference to such forfeiture or sale.

(b) Forfeiture may be remitted.—The Directors may in their discretion remit or annul the forfeiture of any share within six months from the date thereof upon the payment of all moneys due to the Company from the late holder or holders of such share, and all expenses incurred in relation to such forfeiture, together with such further sum of money by way of redemption money for the deficit, as they shall think fit, not being less than 9 per cent. per annum on the amount of the sums wherein default in payment had been made, but no share bona fide sold or re-allotted or otherwise disposed of under Article 43 hereof shall be redeemable after sale or disposal.

46. Company's Lien on Shares.—The Company shall have a first charge or paramount lien upon all the shares of any holder or joint-holders for all moneys for the time being due to the Company by such holder, or by all or any of such joint-holders respectively, either in respect of such shares or of other shares held by such holder or joint-holders or otherwise, and whether due from any such holder individually or jointly with others, including all calls, resolutions for which shall have been passed by the Directors, although the times appointed for the payment thereof shall not have arrived ; and where any share is held by more persons than one, the Company shall be entitled to the said charge or lien in respect of any money due to the Company from any of such persons. And the Directors may decline to register any transfer of shares subject to such charge or lien.

47. Lien how made Available.—Such charge or lien may be made available by a sale of all or any of the shares subject to it, provided that no such sale shall be made except under a resolution of the Directors, and until notice in writing shall have been given to the indebted Shareholder or his executors or administrators or heirs, or the assignee or trustee in his bankruptcy, requiring him or them to pay the amount for the time being due to the Company, and default shall have been made for twenty-eight days from such notice in paying the sum thereby required to be paid. Should the Shareholder over whose share the lien exists be in England or elsewhere abroad, sixty days' notice shall be allowed him.

48. Proceeds how applied.—The net proceeds of any such sale as aforesaid under the provisions of Articles 43 and 47 hereof shall be applied in or towards satisfaction of such debts, liabilities, or engagements, and the residue (if any) shall be paid to such Shareholder or his representatives.

49. Certificate of Sale.—A certificate in writing under the hands of two of the Directors and of the Agent or Secretary or Agents or Secretaries that the power of sale given by Article 47 has arisen, and is exercisable by the Company under these presents, shall be conclusive evidence of the facts therein stated. 50. Transfer on Sale how executed.—Upon any such sale two of the Directors may execute a transfer of such share

50. Transfer on Sale how executed.—Upon any such sale two of the Directors may execute a transfer of such share to the purchaser thereof, and such transfer, with the certificate last aforesaid, shall confer on the purchaser a complete title to such shares.

PREFERENCE SHARES.

51. Preference and Deferred Shares.—Anyshares from time to 'ime to be issued or created may from time to time be issued with any such right of preference, whether in respect of dividend or of payment of capital, or both, or any such other special privilege or advantage over any shares previously issued or then about to be issued (other than shares issued with a preference), or with such deferred rights as compared with any shares previously issued or then about to be issued, or subject to any such conditions or provisions, and with any such right or without any right of voting, and generally on such terms as the Company may, from time to time, by special resolution, determine.

52. Modification of Rights and Consent thereto.—If at any time, by the issue of preference shares or otherwise, the capital be divided into shares of different classes—

- (1) The holders of any class of shares by an extraordinary resolution passed at a meeting of such holders may consent, on behalf of all the holders of shares of the class. to the issue or creation of any shares ranking equally therewith, or having any priority thereto, or the abandonment of any preference or priority, or of any accrued dividend, or the reduction for any time or permanently of the dividends payable thereon, or to any scheme for the reduction of the Company's capital affecting the class of shares ;
- (2) All or any of the rights, privileges, and conditions attached to each class may be commuted, abrogated, abandoned, added to or otherwise modified by a special resolution of the Company in General Meeting, provided the holders of any class of shares affected by any such commutation, abrogation, abandonment, addition, or other modification of such rights, privileges, and conditions consent thereto on behalf of all the holders of shares of the class by an extraordinary resolution passed at a meeting of such holders.

Any extraordinary resolution passed under the provisions of this Article shall be binding upon all the holders of shares of the class, provided that this Article shall not be read as implying the necessity for such consent as aforesaid in any case in which but for this Article the object of the resolution could have been effected without it.

53. Meeting affecting a Particular Class of Shares.—Any meeting for the purpose of the last preceding clause shall be convened and conducted in all respects as nearly as possible in the same way as an Extraordinary General Meeting of the Company; provided that no Shareholder, not being a Director, shall be entitled to notice thereof or to attend thereat, unless he be a holder of shares of the class intended to be affected by the resolution, and that no vote shall be given except in respect of a share of that class, and that at any such meeting a poll may be demanded in writing by any Shareholder personally present and entitled to vote at the meeting.

CALLS.

54. (a) Directors may make Calls.—The Directors may from time to time make such calls as they think fit upon' the registered holders of shares in respect of moneys unpaid thereon, and not by the conditions of allotment made payable at fixed times; and each Shareholder shall pay the amount of every call so made on him to the persons and at the times and places appointed by the Directors, provided that two months' notice at least shall be given to the Shareholders of the time and place appointed for payment of each call.

(b) Calls, Time when made.—A call shall be deemed to have been made at the time when the resolution authorizing the call was passed at a Board Meeting of the Directors or by resolution in writing in terms of Article 121.

(c) Extension of *Time for Payment of Call.*—The Directors shall have power in their absolute discretion to give time to any one or more hareholder or Shareholders, exclusive of the others, for payment of any call or part thereof on such terms as the Directors may determine. But no Shareholder shall be entitled to any such extension except as a matter of grace or favour.

55. Interest on Unpaid Call.—If the sum payable in respect of any call or instalment is not paid on or before the day appointed for the payment thereof, the holder for the time being of the share in respect of which the call shall have been made, or the instalments shall have been due, shall pay interest on the same at the rate of 9 per centum per annum from the day appointed for the payment thereof to the time of the actual payment, but the Directors may, when they think fit, remit altogether or in part any sum becoming payable for interest under this clause.

56. Payments in Anticipation of Calls.—The Directors may at their discrition receive from any Shareholder willing to advance the same, and upon such terms as they think fit, all or any part of the amount of his shares beyond the sum actually called up.

BORROWING POWERS.

57. Power to Borrow .--- The Directors shall have power to procure from time to time, in the usual course of business, such temporary advances on the produce in hand, or in the future to be obtained from the Company's estates, as they may find necessary or expedient for the purpose of defraying the expenses of working the Company's estates, or of erecting, maintaining, improving, or extending buildings, machinery, or plantations, or otherwise. Also from time to time, at their discretion, to borrow or raise from the Directors or other persons any sum or sums of money for the purposes of the Company, but so that the amount at any one time owing in respect of moneys so borrowed or raised shall not, without the sanction of a General Meeting, exceed the sum of One hundred thousand Rupees (Rs. 100,000). The Directors shall, with the sanction of a General Meeting, be entitled to borrow cr raise such further sum or sums, and at such rate of interest as such meeting shall determine. The Directors may, for the purpose cf securing the repayment of any such sum or sums of money so borrowed or rais 3d, create and issue any mortgages, debentures, mortgage debentures, debenture stock, bends, or obligations of the Company, charged upon all or any part of the undertaking, revenue, property, and rights or assets of the Company (both present and future), including uncalled capital or unpaid calls, or give, accept, or endorse on behalf of the Company any promissory notes or bills of exchange. Provided that before the Directors execute any mortgage, issue any debentures, or create any debenture stock they shall obtain the sanction thereto of the Company in General Meeting, whether Ordinary or Extraordinary, notice of the intent on to obtain such sanction at such Any such securities may be issued either at par or at a premium or discount, and may meeting having been duly given. from time to time be cancelled or discharged, varied, or exchanged as the Directors may think fit, and may contain any special privileges as to redempt on, surrender, drawings, allotment of shares, or otherwise. Every debenture or other instrument issued by the Company for securing the payment of money may be so framed that the moneys thereby secured shall be assignable free from any equities between the Company and the person to whom the same may be issued. declaration under the Company's seal contained in or endorsed upon any of the documents mentioned in this Article and subscribed by two or more of the Directors, or by one Director and the Agent or Secretary or Agents or Secretaries, to the effect that the Directors have power to borrow the amount which such document may represent, shall be conclusive evidence thereof in all questions between the Company and its creditors, and no such document containing such declaration shall, as regards the creditor, be void on the ground of its being granted in excess of the aforesaid borrowing power, unless it shall be proved that such creditor was aware that it was so granted.

MEETINGS.

58. First General Meeting.—The First General Meeting of the Company shall be held at such time, not being more than twelve months after the registration of the Company, and at such place as the Directors may determine.

59. Subsequent General Meetings.—Subsequent General Meetings shall be held once in every year at such time and place as may be prescribed by the Company in General Meeting, and if no time or place is prescribed, at such time and place as may be determined by the Directors.

60. Ordinary and Extraordinary General Meetings.—The General Meetings mentioned in the two last preceding clauses shall be called Ordinary General Meetings; all other meetings of the Company shall be called Extraordinary General Meetings.

61. Extraordinary General Meetings.—The Directors may, whenever they think fit, call an Extraordinary General Meeting, and the Directors shall do so upon a requisition made in writing by not less than one-seventh of the number of Shareholders holding not less than one-seventh of the issued capital and entitled to vote.

62. Requisition of Shareholders to state Object of Meeting; on Receipt of Requisition, Directors to call Meeting, and in Default, Shareholders may do so —Any requisition so made shall express the object of the meeting proposed to be called shall be addressed to the Directors, and shall be sont to the registered office of the Company. Upon the receipt of such requisition, the Directors shall forthwith proceed to convene an Extraordinary General Meeting, to be held at such time and place as they shall determine. If they do not proceed to convene the same within seven days from the delivery of the requisition, the requisitionists may themselves convene an Extraordinary General Meeting, to be held at such place and at such time as the Shareholders convening the meeting may themselves fix.

63. Notice of Resolution.—Any Shareholder may, on giving not less than ten days' previous notice of any resolution, submit the same to a meeting. Such notice shall be given by leaving a copy of the resolution at the registered office of the Company.

(a) Seven Days' Notice of Meeting to be given --- Seven days' notice at least of every General Meeting, Ordinary 64 cr Extraordinary, and by whomsoever convened, specifying the place, date, hour of meeting, and the objects and business of the meeting, shall be given either by advertisement in the Ceylon Government Gazette or by notice sent by post, or otherwise served as hereinafter provided, but an accidental omission to give such notice to any Shareholder shall not invalidate the proceedings at any General Meeting, provided, however, that holders of preference shares or shares of any particular. class shall not be entitled to notice of any meeting at which by the conditions or provisions attached to such preference shares or shares of such particular class they shall not be entitled to attend or vote thereat.

(b) Two Meetings convened by one Notice.-Where it is proposed to pass a special resolution the two meetings may be convened by one and the same notice, and it is to be no objection to such notice that it only convenes the second meeting contingently on the resolution being passed by the requisite majority at the first meeting.

65. Business requiring and not requiring Notification.—Every Ordinary General Meeting shall be competent, without special notice having been given of the purposes for which it is convened, or of the business to be transacted thereat, to receive and discuss any report and any accounts presented thereto by the Directors, and to pass resolutions in approval or disapproval thereof, and to declare dividends, and to elect Directors and Auditors retiring in rotation, and to fix the remuneration of the Directors and Auditors; and shall also be competent to enter upon, discuss, and transact any business whatever of which special mention shall have been made in the notice or notices upon which the meeting was convened.

Notice of other Business to be given.-With the exceptions mentioned in the foregoing Articles as to the 66. business which may be transacted at Ordinary General Meetings without notice, no General Meeting, Ordinary or Extraordinary, shall be competent to enter upon, discuss, or transact any business which has not been specially mentioned in the notice or notices upon which it was convened.

67. Quorum to be Present.-No business shall be transacted at any General Meeting, except the declaration of a dividend recommended by a report of the Directors or the election of a Chairman, unless there shall be present in person at the commencement of the business two or more persons, being Shareholders, entitled to vote, or persons holding proxies. or powers of attorney from Sharsholders entitled to vote.

If a Quorum not Present, Meeting to be dissolved or adjourned ; Adjourned Meeting to transact Business. 68. -If at the expiration of half an hour from the time appcinted for the meeting, the required number of persons shall not be present at the meeting, the meeting, if convened by or upon the requisition of Shareholders, shall be dissolved, but in any other case it shall stand adjourned to the same day in the next week at the same time and place ; and if at such adjourned meeting a quorum is not present, those Shareholders who are present shall be a quorum, and may transact the business for which the meeting was called.

69. Chairman of Directors or a Director to be Chairman of General Meeting ; in Case of their Absence or Refusal, a Shareholder may act.—The Chairman (if any) of the Directors shall be entitled to take the chair at every General Meeting, whether Ordinary or Extraordinary; but if there be no Chairman, or if at any meeting he shall not be present within 15 minutes after the time appointed for holding such meeting, or if he shall refuse to take the shair, the Shareholders shall choose another Director as Chairman; and if no Directors be present, or if all the Directors present decline to take the chair, then the Shareholders present shall choose one of their number to be Chairman.

70. Business confined to Election of Chairman while Chair vacant.-No business shall be discussed at any eneral Meeting, except the election of a Chairman whilst the chair is vacant.

Chairman with Consent may adjourn Meeting.-The Chairman, with the consent of the meeting, may adjourn any meeting from time to time and from place to place, but no business shall be transacted at any adjourned meeting other than the business left unfinished at the meeting from which the adjournment took place, unless due notice shall be given.

72. Minutes of General Meetings.—Minutes of the proceedings of every Ceneral Meeting, whether Ordinary or Extracrdinary, shall be entered in a bock to be kept for that purpose, and shall when so entered be signed as scon as practicable by the Chairman of the same meeting, or by the Chairman of the succeeding meeting, and the same when so entered and signed shall be evidence of all such proceedings and of the proper election of the Chairman.

VOTING AT MEETINGS.

Votes.—At any meeting every resolution shall in the first instance be decided by a show of hands. In case 73. there shall be an equality of votes, the Chairman at such meeting shall be entitled to give a casting vote in addition to the votes to which he may be entitled as a Shareholder; and unless a poll be immediately demanded in writing by some Shareholder present at the meeting and entitled to vote, a declaration by the Chairman that a resolution has been carried, and an entry to that effect in the Minute Fook of the Company, shall be sufficient evidence of the fact without proof of the number of votes recorded in favour of or against such resolution.

74. Poll.---If a poll be duly demanded, the same shall be taken in such manner, and at such time and place as the Chairman shall direct, and the result of the poll shall be deemed to be the resolution of the meeting at which the poll was demanded. The demand of a poll shall not prevent the continuance of a meeting for the transaction of any business other than the question on which a poll has been demanded.

75. Poll how taken.—If at any meeting a poll be demanded by notice in writing signed by some Sharsholder present at the meeting and entitled to vote, which notice shall be delivered during the meeting to the Chairman, the meeting shall, if necessary, be adjourned and the poll shall be taken at such time and in such a manner as the Chairman shall direct; and in such case every Shareholder shall have the number of votes to which he may be entitled as hereinafter provided, and in case at any such poll there shall be an equality of votes, the Chairman of the meeting at which such poll shall have been taken shall be entitled to a casting vote in addition to any votes to which he may be entitled as a Shareholder and proxy and attorney, and the result of such poll shall be deemed to be the resolution of the Company in such meeting. ' 76.

No Poll on Election of Chairman or on Question of Adjournment.-No poll shall be domanded on the election of a Chairman of the meeting or on any question of adjournment.

Voting in Person or by Proxy or Attorney.-Votes may be given either personally or by proxy or by attorney 77. duly authorized.

Number of Votes to which Shareholder entitled .-- On a show of hands every Shareholder present in person or 78. by attorney duly authorized shall have one vote only. In case of a poll every Shareholder present in person or by proxy or attorney shall have one vote for every share held by him up to ten shares ; he shall have an additional vote for every ten shares held by him beyond the first ten shares up to one hundred shares; an additional vote for every twenty-five shares held by him beyond the first one hundred shares. When voting on a resolution involving the sale of the Company's estates or any of them or any part or portion thereof or the winding up of the Company, every Shareholder shall have one vote for every share held by him.

Curator of Minor, &c., when not entitled to Vote.-The parent or curator of a minor Shareholder, the com-79. mittee or other legal guardian of any lunatic Shareholder, the husband of any female Shareholder not entitled to her shares as separate estate, and the executor or administrator of any deceased Shareholder, or any one of such persons as aforesaid, if more than one, shall not be entitled to vote in the place of such minor, lunatic, female, or deceased person, unless such person shall have been registered as a Shareholder.

Non-Shareholder not to be appointed Proxy; but Attorney though not Shareholder may Vote .- No person shall be 80. appointed a proxy who is not a Sharehold r of the Company, but the attorney of a Shareholder, even though not himself a Shareholder of the Company, may represent and vote for his principal at any meeting of the Company.

81. Shareholder in Arrear or not registered at least three Months previous to the Meeting not to Vote.-No Shareholder shall be entitled to vote or speak at any General Meeting unless all calls due from him on his shares, or any of them, shall have been paid ; and no shareholder other than the trustee or assignee of a bankrupt or representative of a deceased Shareholder, or person acquiring by marriage, shall be entitled to vote or speak at any meeting held after the expiration of three months from the registration of the Company, in respect of or as the holder of any share which he has acquired by transfer, unless he has been at least three months previously to the time of holding the meeting at which he proposes to vote or

speak, duly registered as the holder of the share in respect of which he claims to vote or speak. 82. Proxy to be Printed or in Writing.—The instrument appointing a proxy shall be printed or written, and shall be signed by the appointor, or if such appointor be a corporation, it shall be under the common seal of such corporation. Provided always that an instrument appointing a proxy may be signed by the attorney of the appointor duly authorized in writing under the hand or the common seal, as the case may be, of the appointor.

 83. (a) When Proxy to be deposited.—The instrument appointing a proxy shall be deposited at the registered office of the Company not less than twenty-four hours before the time appointed for holding the meeting or adjourned meeting at which the person named in such instrument proposes to vote.

(b) When Power of Attorney to be deposited.—The power of attorney under which a proxy has been signed or under which a person proposes to vote shall be deposited at the registered office of the Company for registration in the books of the Company at least twenty-four hours before the time appointed for holding the meeting or adjourned meeting at which the person named in such power of attorney or in the proxy; as the case may be, proposes to vote. 84. Form of Proxy.—Any instrument appointing a proxy may be in the following form :—

85. Objection to Validity of Vote to be made at the Meeting or Poll.-No objection shall be made to the validity of any vote (whether given personally or by proxy or by attorney) except at the meeting or poll at which such vote shall be tendered, and every vote (whether given personally or by proxy or by attorney) to which no objection shall be made at

such meeting or poll shall be deemed valid for all purposes of such meeting or poll whatsoever. 86. No Shareholder to be prevented from Voting by being personally interested in Result.—No Shareholder shall be prevented from voting by reason of his being personally interested in the result of the voting.

DIRECTORS.

87. Number of Directors.-The number of Directors shall never be less than two nor more than five. In the event of the number of Directors in Ceylon ever being reduced to one, such remaining Director shall immediately cause to be convened an Extraordinary General Meeting of the Shareholders for the purpose of filling up one or more of the vacancies; but, in the event of a quorum of Shareholders not attending such Meeting, the remaining Director shall himself appoint a Director to fill one of the vacancies. Any Director so appointed shall hold office until the next Ordinary General Meeting of the Company. Until such appointment the remaining Director shall not act except for the purpose of appointing another, and, if necessary, enabling him to be placed on the register of Shareholders.

 $The ir Qualification and {\it Remuneration}. -- The qualification of a Director shall be his holding shares in the Company, the result of the company of the$ 88. whether fully paid up or partly paid up, of the total nominal value of at least One thousand Rupees (Rs. 1,000), and upon which, in the case of partly paid up shares, all calls for the time being shall have been paid, and this qualification shall apply as well to the first Directors as to all future Directors. As remuneration for their services the Directors shall be entitled to appropriate a sum not exceeding Five thousand Rupees (Rs. 5,000) annually to be divided between them in such manner as they may determine, but the Company in General Meeting may at any time alter the amount of such remuneration for the future, and such remuneration shall not be considered as including any remuneration for special

or extra services hereinafter referred to, nor any extra remuneration to the Managing Directors of the Company. 89. Appointment of First Directors and Duration of their Office.—The first Directors shall be George Kenneth Logan of Colombo; Ernest Masters of Colombo and Fredrick Robert Bisset of Welimade Group, Welimade, who shall hold office

till the First Ordinary General Meeting of the Company, when they shall all retire, but shall be eligible for re-election. 90. Directors may appoint Managing Director or Directors; his or their Remuneration.—One or more of the Directors may be appointed by the Directors to act as Secretary, Managing Director or Managing Directors, and (or) Visiting Agent or Visiting Agents of the Company, or Superintendent or Superintendents of any of the Company's estates, for such time and on such terms as the Directors may determine or fix by agreement with the person or persons appointed to the office ; and they may from time to time revoke such appointment and appoint another or other Secretary, Managing Director or Managing Directors, and (or) Visiting Agent or Agents, Superintendent or Superintendents, and the Directors may impose and confer on the Managing Director or Managing Directors all or any duties and powers that might be imposed or conferred on any Manager of the Company. If any Director shall be called upon to perform any extra services, the Directors may arrange with such Director for such special remuneration for such services, either by way of salary, com-

mission, or the payment of a lump sum of money, as they shall think fit. 91. Appointment of Successors to Directors.—The General Meeting at which Directors retire or ought to retire by rotation shall appoint successors to them, and in default thereof such successors may be appointed at a subsequent General Meeting. No person, not being a retiring Director, shall, unless recommended by the Directors for election, be eligible for election to the office of Director at any General Meeting, unless he or some other Shareholder intending to propose him has, at least seven clear days before the meeting, left, at the office, a notice in writing under his hand signifying his candidature for the appointment or the intention of such Shareholder to propose him.

92. Board may fill up Vacancies.—The Board shall have power at any time and from time to time before the First Ordinary General Meeting to supply any vacancies in their number arising from death, resignation, or otherwise.
93. Duration of Office of Director appointed to Vacancy.—Any casual vacancy occurring in the number of Directors subsequent to the First Ordinary General Meeting may be filled up by the Directors, but any person so chosen shall retain his office so long only as the vacating Director would have retained the same if no vacancy had occurred.

94. To retire Annually .-- At the Second Ordinary General Meeting and at the Ordinary General Meeting in every subsequent year, one of the Directors for the time being shall retire from office as provided in Article 95. 95. Retiring Directors how determined.—The Directors to retire from office at the Second and Third General

Meetings shall, unless the Directors otherwise arrange among themselves, be determined by ballot ; in every subsequent year the Directors to retire shall be those who have been longest in office.

96. Retiring Directors eligible for Re-election.-Retiring Directors shall be eligible for re-election.

97. Decision of Question as to Retirement.—In case any question shall arise as to which of the Directors who have been the same time in office shall retire, the same shall be decided by the Directors by ballot.

98. Number of Directors how increased or reduced.—The Directors, subject to the approval of a General Meeting, may, from time to time at any time subsequent to the Second Ordinary General Meeting, increase or reduce the number of Directors, and may also, subject to the like approval, determine in what rotation such increased or reduced number is to go out of office.

99. If Election not made, Retiring Directors to continue until next Meeting.—If at any meeting at which an election of a Director ought to take place, the place of the retiring Director is not filled up, the retiring Director may continue in office until the First Ordinary General Meeting in the next year, and so on from meeting to meeting until his place is filled up, unless it shall be determined at such meeting to reduce the number of Directors.

100. Resignation of Directors.—A Director may at any time give notice in writing of his intention to resign by delivering such notice to the Secretary, or by leaving the same at the office, or by tendering his written resignation at a meeting of the Directors.

101. No contract, arrangement, or transaction entered into by or on behalf of the Company with any Director, or with any company or co-partnership of which a Director is a partner, or of which he is a Director. Managing Director, or Manager, shall be void or voidable, nor shall such Director be liable to account to the Company for any profit realized by such contract, arrangement, or transaction by reason only of such Director holding that office, or of the fiduciary relation thereby established, provided that the fact of his interest or connection therewith be fully disclosed to the Company or its Directors.

102. When Office of Director to be vacated .-- The office of Director shall be vacated ---

- (a) If he accept or hold any office of place of profit other than Managing Director, Visiting Agent, Superintendent, or Secretary under the Company.
- (b) If he become bankrupt or insolvent or suspend payment or file a petition for the liquidation of his affairs, or compound with his creditors.
- (c) If by reason of mental or bodily infirmity he become incapable of acting.
- (d) If he cease to hold the required number of shares to qualify him for the office.
- (e). If he be concerned or participate in the profits of any contract with, or work done for, the Company.
- (f) If he cease to ordinarily reside in Ceylon or be absent from Ceylon for a period of three consecutive months.

Exceptions.—But the above rule shall be subject to the following exceptions :—That no Director shall vacate his office by reason of his being a member of any corporation, company, or firm which has entered into any contract with, or done any work for, the Company, of which he is a Director, or by his being \triangle gent, or Secretary, or Proctor, or by his being a member of a firm who are Agents, or Secretaries, or Proctors of the Company ; nevertheless, he shall not vote in respect of any contract, work, or business in which he may be personally interested.

103. How Directors removed and Successors appointed.—The Company may, by an extraordinary resolution, remove any Director before the expiration of his period of office, and may, by an ordinary resolution, appoint another person in his stead. The Director so appointed shall hold office only during such time as the Director in whose place he is appointed would have held the same if he had not been removed.

104. Indemnity to Directors and Others for their Own Acts and for the Acts of Others.—Every Director or officer and his heirs, executors, and administrators shall be indemnified by the Company from all losses and expenses incurred by him respectively in or about the discharge of his respective duties, except such as happen from his respective wilful acts or defaults; and no Director or officer, nor the heirs, executors, or administrators of any Director or officer shall be liable for any other Director or officer, or for joining in any receipt or other acts of conformity, or for any loss or expense happening to the Company by the insufficiency or deficiency of title to any property acquired for or on behalf of the Company, or for the insufficiency or deficiency of any security in or upon which any of the moneys of the Company shall be invested, or for any loss or damage arising from the bankruptcy, insolvency, or tortious act of any person with whom any moneys, securities, or effects shall be deposited, or for any other loss, damage, or misfortune whatsoever which shall happen in the execution of the duties of his office or in relation thereto, unless the same happen through his own wilful act or default.

105. No Contribution to be required from Directors beyond Amount, if any, unpaid on their Shares.—No contribution shall be required from any present or past Director or Manager exceeding the amount, if any, unpaid on the shares in respect of which he is liable as a present or past Shareholder.

POWERS OF DIRECTORS.

106. The Directors shall have power to purchase or otherwise acquire the said Shamrock estate of about 208 acres, situated in the Kandy District, as on and from the First day of July, 1924.

107. To manage Business of Company and pay Preliminary Expenses, &c.—The business of the Company shall be managed by the Directors either by themselves or through a Managing Director, or with the assistance of an Agent or Agents and Secretary or Secretaries of the Company to be appointed by the Directors for such period and on such terms as they shall determine, and the Directors may pay out of the funds of the Company all costs and expenses, as well preliminary as otherwise, paid or incurred in and about the formation and the registration of the Company, and in connection with the placing of the shares of the Company, and in and about the valuation, purchase, or acquisition of the said Shamrock estate, and the purchase, lease, or acquisition of any other lands, estates, or property, and the opening, clearing, planting, and cultivation thereof, and in or about the working and business of the Company.

108. To acquire Property, to appoint Officers and pay Expenses.—The Directors shall have power to purchase, take on lease or in exchange, or otherwise acquire for the Company any estate or estates, land or lands, property, rights, options, or privileges which the Company is authorized to acquire at such price and for such consideration and upon such title, and generally on such terms and conditions as they may think fit; and to make and they may make such regulations for the management of the business and property of the Company as they may from time to time think proper, and for that purpose may appoint such managers, agents, secretaries, treasurers, accountants, buyers, and other officers, visiting agents, inspectors, superintendents, clerks, artisans, labourers, and other servants for such period or periods, and with such remuneration, and at such salaries and upon such terms and conditions as they may from time to time remove or suspend all or any of the managers, agents, secretaries, treasurers, accountants, other officers, visiting agents, derks, artisans, agents, secretaries, treasurers, accountants, and other officers, visiting agents, superintendents, clerks, artisans, accountants, buyers, inspectors, superintendents, clerks, artisans, accountants, buyers, visiting agents, superintendents, clerks, artisans, accountants, and other officers, visiting agents, superintendents, clerks, artisans, accountants, and other officers, visiting agents, inspectors, superintendents, clerks, artisans, agents, secretaries, treasurers, accountants, and other officers, visiting agents, inspectors, superintendents, clerks, artisans, labourers, and other servants for such reasons as they may think proper and advisable and without assiming any cause

 109. To appoint Proctors and Attorneys.—The Directors shall have power to appoint a proctor or proctors, solicitor or solicitors, attorney or attorneys to assist in carrying on or protecting the business of the Company on such terms as they may consider proper, and from time to time to revoke such appointment.
 110. To open Banking Accounts and operate thereon, &c.—The Directors shall have power to open on behalf of the

110. To open Banking Accounts and operate thereon, &c.—The Directors shall have power to open on behalf of the Company any account or accounts with such bank or banks as they may select or appoint, and also by such signatures as they may appoint to draw, accept, make, endorse, sign, and execute cheques, bills of exchange, and promissory notes, bills

of lading, receipts, contracts, and agreements, bonds, mortages, proxies to any proctor or proctors and other documents on behalf of and to further the interests of the Company.

111. To sell and dispose of Company's Property, &c.—It shall be lawful for the Directors, if authorized so to do by a special resolution of the Shareholders in General Meeting, to arrange terms for the amalgamation of the Company with any other company or companies, or individual or individuals, or for the sale or disposal of the business, estates, lands, and effects of the Company or any part or parts, share or shares thereof, respectively, or the assignment of the whole or any part or parts of its leasehold interests in any estate or estates, land or lands, or the sub-lease of the whole or any part or parts thereof to any company or companies, or person or persons, upon such terms and in such manner as the Directors shall think fit, and the Directors shall have power to do all such things as may be necessary for carrying such amalgamation, sale, or other disposition into effect so far as a resolution or a special resolution of the Company is not by law necessary for such purpose; and in case any terms so arranged by the Directors include or make necessary the dissolution of the Company, the Company shall be dissolved to that end.

112. General Powers.—The Directors shall carry on the business of the Company in such manner as they may think most expedient; and in addition to the powers and authorities by the Ordinance or by these presents expressly conferred on them, they may exercise all such powers, give all such consents, make all such arrangements, appoint all such agents, managers, secretaries, treasurers, accountants, and other officers, clerks, assistants, artisans, and workers, and generally do all such acts and things as are or shall be by the Ordinance and by these presents directed and authorized to be exercised, given, made, or done by the Company, and are not by the Ordinance or by these presents required to be exercised, or done by the Company in General Meeting, subject, nevertheless, to the provisions of the Ordinance and of these presents and to such regulations and provisions (if any) as may, from time to time, be prescribed by the Company in General Meeting; but no regulation made by the Company in General Meeting shall invalidate any prior act of the Board which would have been valid if such regulation had not been made. The generality of the powers conferred by any clause in these presents on the Directors shall not be taken to be limited by any clause conferring any special or expressed power. 113. Special Powers.—In furtherance and not in limitation of, and without prejudice to, the general powers

conferred or implied in the last preceding clause, and of the other powers conferred by these presents, it is hereby expressly declared that the Directors shall have the powers following (that is to say) :-

- (1) To institute, conduct, defend, compound, or abandon any action, suit, prosecution, or legal proceedings by and against the Company, or its officers or otherwise concerning the affairs of the Company, and also to compound and allow time for payment or satisfaction of any debts due and of any claims and demands by and against the Company.
- (2) To refer any claims or demands by or against the Company to arbitration, and observe and perform the awards.
- (3) To make and give receipts, releases, and other discharges for money payable to the Company and for claims and demands of the Company.
- (4) To act on behalf of the Company in all matters relating to bankrupts and insolvents with power to accept
- the office of trustee, assignee, liquidator, inspector, or any similar office. (5) To invest any of the moneys of the Company which the Directors may consider not immediately required for the purposes thereof upon such securities and in such manner as they m_{ay} think fit, and so that they shall not be restricted to such securities as are permissible to trustees without special powers, and from time to time to vary or release such investments.
- (6) From time to time to provide for the management of the affairs of the Company abroad in such manner as they think fit, and to establish any local boards or agencies for managing any of the affairs of the Company abroad, and to appoint any persons to be members of such Local Board or any managers or agents and to fix their remuneration.
- (7) From time to time and at any time to delegate to any one or more of the Directors of the Company for the time being or any other person or company for the time being, residing or carrying on business in Ceylon or elsewhere, all or any of the powers hereby made exercisable by the Directors, except those relating to shares and any others as to which special provisions inconsistent with such delegation are herein contained; and they shall have power to fix the remuneration of and at any time to remove such Director or other person or company and to annul or vary any such delegation. They shall not, however, be entitled to delegate any powers of borrowing or charging the property of the Company to any agent of the Company or other person except by instrument in writing, which shall specifically state the extent to which such powers may be used by the person or persons to whom they are so delegated, and compliance therewith shall be a condition precedent to the exercise of these powers.

PROCEEDINGS OF DIRECTORS.

114. Meeting of Directors.—The Directors may meet for the dispatch of business, adjourn, and otherwise regulate their meetings as they may think fit, and determine the quorum necessary for the transaction of business ; until otherwise determined, two Directors shall be a quorum.

115. A Director may summon Meetings of Directors.—A Director may at any time summon a meeting of Directors. 116. Who is to preside at Meetings of Board.—The Board may elect a Chairman of their meetings and determine the period for which he is to hold office, and all meetings of the Directors shall be presided over by the Chairman, if one has been elected and if present, but if there be a vacancy in the office of Chairman, or if at any meeting of Directors the Chairman be not present at the time appointed for holding the same, then and in that case the Directors present shall choose one of their number to be Chairman of such meeting.

117. Questions at Meetings how decided.—Any question which shall arise at any meeting of the Directors shall be decided by a majority of votes, and in case of an equality of votes the Chairman thereat shall have a casting vote in addition to his vote as a Director.

118. Board may appoint Committees .- The Board may delegate any of their powers to committees consisting of such member or members of their body as the Board think fit, and they may from time to time revoke and discharge any such committee, either wholly or in part, and either as to persons or purposes, but every committee so formed shall, in exercise of the powers delegated to it, conform to all such regulations as may be prescribed by the Board. All acts done by any such committee, in conformity with such regulations and in the fulfilment of the purposes of their appointment, but not otherwise, shall have the like force and effect as if done by the Board.

119. Acts of Board or Committee Valid notwithstanding Informal Appointment.—The acts of the Board or of any com-mittee appointed by the Board shall, notwithstanding any vacancy in the Board or committee, or defect in the appointment of any Director or of any member of the committee, be as valid as if no such vacancy or defect had existed, and as if every person had been duly appointed, provided the same be done before the discovery of the defect. 120. Regulation of Proceedings of Committees.—The meetings and proceedings of such committees shall be governed

by the provisions herein contained for regulating the meetings and proceedings of Directors, so far as the same are applicable thereto, and are not superseded by the express terms of the appointment of such committee respectively, or any regulation imposed by the Board.

121. Resolution in Writing by all the Directors as Valid as if passed at a Meeting of Directors.—A resolution in writing signed by all the Directors for the time being resident in Ceylon shall be as valid and effectual as if it had been passed at a meeting of the Directors duly called and constituted, provided that not fewer than two Directors shall sign it.

a meeting of the Directors duly called and constituted, provided that not fewer than two Directors shall sign it. 122. Minutes of Proceedings of the Company and the Directors to be recorded.—The Directors shall cause minutes to be made in books to be provided for the purpose of the following matters, videlicet :—

(a) Of all appointments of officers and committees made by the Directors.

- (b) Of the names of the Directors present at each meeting of the Directors and of the members of the Committee appointed by the Board present at each meeting of the Committee.
- (c) Of the resolutions and proceedings of all General Meetings.
- (d) Of the resolutions and proceedings of all meetings of the Directors and of the Committees appointed by the Board.
- (e) Of all orders made by the Directors.
- (f) Of the use of the Company's seal.

1.23. Signature of Minutes of Proceedings and Effect thereof.—All such minutes shall be signed by the person or one of the persons who shall have presided as Chairman at the General Meeting, the Board Meeting, or Committee Meeting at which the business minuted shall have been transacted, or by the person or one of the persons who shall preside as Chairman at the next ensuing General Meeting, Board Meeting, or Committee Meeting, respectively; and all minutes purporting to have been signed by any Chairman of any General Meeting, Board Meeting, or Committee Meeting, respectively, shall, for all purposes whatsoever, be primá facie evidence of the actual and regular passing of the resolutions, and the actual and regular transaction or occurrence of the proceedings and other matters purporting to be so recorded, and of the person appearing to have signed as Chairman, and of the date on which such meeting was held.

COMPANY'S SEAL.

124. The Use of the Seal.—The seal of the Company shall not be used or affixed to any deed, certificate of shares or other instrument except in the presence of two or more of the Directors or of one Director and the agents and secretaries of the Company, who shall attest the sealing thereof; such attestation on the part of the agents and secretaries, in the event of a firm being the agents and secretaries, being signified by a partner or duly authorized manager, attorney, or agent of the said firm signing the firm name or the firm name per procurationem or signing for and on behalf of the said firm as such agents and secretaries, and in the event of a company registered under the Ordinance being the agents and secretaries, being signified by a Director or the secretary or the duly authorized attorney of such company signing for and on behalf of such company as agents and secretaries. The sealing shall not be attested by one person in the dual capacity of Director and representative of the agents and secretaries. Any instrument sealed with the seal of the Company and signed by two or more Directors or by one Director and the agents and secretaries of the Company shall be presumed to be duly executed.

ACCOUNTS.

125. What Accounts to be kept.—The agent or secretary or the agents or secretaries for the time being, or, if there be no agent or secretary or agents or secretaries, the Directors shall cause true accounts to be kept of the paid-up capital for the time being of the Company, and of all sums of money received and expended by the Company, and of the matters in respect of which such receipt and expenditure take place, and of the assets, credits, and liabilities of the Company, and generally of all its commercial, financial, and other affairs, transactions, and engagements, and of all other matters necessary for showing the true financial state and condition of the Company, and the accounts shall be kept in such books and in such a manner at the registered office of the Company, as the Directors think fit.

126. Accounts how and when Open to Inspection.—The Directors shall from time to time determine whether, and to what extent and at what times and places, and under what conditions or regulations, the accounts and books of the Company or any of them shall be open to the inspection of the Shareholders; and no Shareholder shall have any right of inspecting any account or books or document of the Company, except as conferred by the Ordinance or authorized by the Directors or by a resolution of the Company in General Meeting.

127. Statement of Accounts and Balance Sheet to be furnished to General Meeting.—At the Ordinary General Meeting in every year the Directors shall lay before the Company a statement of the profit and loss account for the preceding financial year, and a balance sheet containing a summary of the property and liabilities of the Company made up as at the end of the same period.

128. Report to accompany Statement.—Every such statement shall be accompanied by a report as to the state and condition of the Company, and as to the amount which they recommend to be paid out of the profits by way of dividend or bonus to the Shareholders, and the statement, report, and balance sheet shall be signed by the Directors.

129. Copy of Balance Sheet to be sent to Shareholders.—A printed copy of such balance sheet shall, at least seven days previous to such meeting, be delivered at, or posted to, the registered address of every Shareholder.

DIVIDENDS, BONUS, AND RESERVE FUND.

130. Where any asset is bought by the Company as from a past date (whether such date be before or after the incorporation of the Company) upon the terms that the Company shall as from that date take the profits and bear the losses thereof, such profits or losses, as the case may be, shall, at the discretion of the Directors, be credited or debited wholly or in part to revenue account, and in that case the amount so credited or debited shall, for the purpose of ascertaining the fund available for dividend, be treated as a profit or loss arising from the business of the Company.
131. Declaration of Dividend, dc.—The Directors may, with the sanction of the Company in General Meeting

131. Declaration of Dividend, &c.—The Directors may, with the sanction of the Company in General Meeting from time to time, declare a dividend to be paid, and (or) pay a bonus to the Shareholders in proportion to the amounts paid on their shares, but no dividend or bonus shall be payable except out of nett profits.

Any General Meeting may direct payment of any dividend declared at such meeting or of any interim dividends which may subsequently be declared by the Directors, wholly or in part in sterling by means of drafts or cheques on London, or by the distribution of specific assets and in particular of paid-up shares, debentures, or debenture stock of the Company, or of any other company, or in any other form of specie, or in any one or more of such ways, and the Directors shall give effect to such direction; and where any difficulty arises in regard to the distribution, they may settle the same as they think expedient, and in particular may issue fractional certificates, and may fix the value for distribution of such specific assets, or any part thereof, and may determine that cash payments shall be made to any Shareholder upon the footing of the value so fixed, in order to adjust the rights of all parties. 132. Interim Dividend.—The Directors may also, if they think fit, from time to time and at any time, without the sanction of a General Meeting, determine on and declare an interim dividend to be paid, and (or) pay a bonus to the Shareholders on account and in anticipation of the dividend for the then current year.

133. Reserve Fund.—Proviously to the Directors paying or recommending any dividend on preference or ordinary shares, they may set aside out of the profits of the Company, such a sum as they think proper as a reserve fund, and may invest the same in such securities as they shall think fit, or place the same on fixed deposit in any bank or banks.

134. (a) Application thereof.—The Directors may from time to time apply such portions as they think fit of the reserve fund to meet contingencies, or for the payment of accumulated dividends due on preference shares or for equalizing dividends, or for working the business of the Company, or for repairing or maintaining or extending the buildings and premises, or for the repair or renewal or extension of the property or plant connected with the business of the Company or any part thereof, or for any other purpose of the Company which they may from time to time deem expedient.

(b) Issue of Bonus out of Reserve. The Directors may, with the sanction of the Company in General Meeting from time to time, apply such portion of the reserve fund or any other fund representing undivided profits of the Company as the General Meeting sanctioning such application may direct in or towards payment of a bonus in accordance with their rights to the Shareholders or to the members of any class of Shareholders, and may with the like sanction satisfy such bonus or any part thereof by the issue and allotment in accordance with their rights to the Shareholders, or to the members of any class of Shareholders, of shares in the Company to be issued and allotted in accordance with their rights to the Shareholders or the members of any class of Shareholders in such proportions and upon such terms in all respects as the General Meeting sanctioning the same may direct.

135. Unpaid Interest or Dividend not to bear Interest.-No unpaid interest or dividend or bonus shall ever bear interest against the Company

136. No Shareholder to receive Dividend while Debt due to Company.-No Shareholder shall be entitled to receive payment of any dividend or bonus in respect of his share or shares whilst any moneys may be due or owing from him (whether alone or jointly with any other person) to the Company in respect of such share or shares, or otherwise howscever. 137. Directors may deduct Debt from the Dividends.—The Directors may deduct from the dividend or bonus pay-

able to any Shareholder all sums of money due from him (whether alone or jointly with any other person) to the Company, and notwithstanding such sums shall not be payable until after the date when such dividend is payable.

138. Dividends may be paid by Cheque or Warrant and sent through the Post.-Unless otherwise directed any dividend may be paid by cheque or warrant sent through the post to the registered address of the Shareholder entitled, or in the case of joint-holders, to the registered address of that one whose name stands first on the register in respect of the joint-holding; but the Company shall not be liable or responsible for the loss of any such cheque or dividend warrant sent through the post.

139. Notice of Dividend : Forfeiture of Unclaimed Dividend.-Notice of all dividends or bonuses to become payable shall be given to each Shareholder entitled thereto; and all dividends or bonuses unclaimed by any Shareholder for three years after notice thereof is given may be forfeited by a resolution of the Board of Directors for the benefit of the Company, and, if the Directors think fit, may be applied in augmentation of the reserve fund. For the purposes of this clause any cheques or warrants which may be issued for dividends or bonuses and may not be presented at the Company's bankers for payment within 3 years shall rank as unclaimed dividends. 140. Shares held by a Firm.—Every dividend or bonus payable in respect of any share held by a firm may be paid to,

and an effectual receipt given by, any partner of such firm or agent duly authorized to sign the name of the firm. 141. Joint-Holders other than a Firm.—Every dividend or bonus payable in respect of any share held by several

persons jointly, other than a firm, may be paid to, and an effectual receipt given by, any one of such persons.

AUDIT.

142. Accounts to be audited.—The accounts of the Company shall from time to time be examined, and the correct ness of the balance sheet and profit and loss account ascertained by one or more Auditor or Auditors.

Qualification of Auditor .-- No person shall be eligible as an Auditor who is interested otherwise than as a 143. Shareholder in any transaction of the Company, but an Auditor shall not be debarred from acting as a professional accountant in doing any special work for the Company which the Directors may deem necessary. It shall not be a necessary qualification for an Auditor that he be a Shareholder of the Company, and no Director or officer of the Company shall, during his continuance in office, be eligible as an Auditor.

144. Appointment and Retirement of Auditors.—The Directors shall appoint the first Auditor or Auditors of the Company and fix his or their remuneration; all future Auditors, except as is hereinafter mentioned, shall be appointed at the First Ordinary General Meeting of the Company in each year by the Shareholders present thereat, and shall hold their office only until the First Ordinary General Meeting after their respective appointment, or until otherwise ordered by a General Meeting.

Retiring Auditors eligible for Re-election --- Retiring Auditors shall be eligible for re-election. 145.

Remuneration of Auditors.—The remuneration of the Auditors, other than the first, shall be fixed by the 146. Company in eneral Meeting, and this remuneration may from time to time be varied by a General Meeting. 147. Casual Vacancy in Office of Auditor how filled up.-If any vacancy that may occur in the office of Auditor

shall not be supplied at any Ordinary General Meeting, or if any casual vacancy shall occur, the Directors shall (subject to the approval of the next Ordinary General Meeting) fill up the vacancy by the appointment of a person who shall hold the office until such meeting.

148. Duty of Auditor.-Every Auditor shall be supplied with a copy of the balance sheet and profit and loss account intended to be laid before the next Ordinary General Meeting, and it shall be his duty to examine the same with

the accounts and vouchers relating thereto and to report thereon to the meeting generally or specially as he may think fit. 149. Company's Accounts to be open to Auditors for Audit.—All accounts, books, and documents whatsoever of the Company shall at all times be opened to the Auditors for the purpose of audit.

NOTTOES.

Notices how authenticated.-Notices from the Company may be authenticated by the signature (printed or 150. written) of the Agent or Secretary, Agents or Secretaries, or other persons appointed by the Board to do so. Shareholders to register Address.-Every Shareholder shall furnish the Company with an address in Ceylon. 151.

which shall be deemed to be his place of abode, and shall be registered as such in the books of the Company.

152. Service of Notices.—A notice may be served by the Company upon any Shareholder either personally or by sending it through the post in a prepaid letter addressed to such Shareholder at his registered address or place of abode : and any notice so served shall be deemed to be well served for all purposes, notwithstanding that the Shareholder to whom such notice is addressed be dead, unless his executors or administrators shall have given to the Directors, or to the Agent or Secretary or Agents or Secretaries of the Company, their own or some other address in Ceylon.

Notice to Joint-Holders of Shares other than a Firm.-All notices directed to be given to Shareholders shall, 153. with respect to any share to which persons other than a firm are jointly entitled, be sufficient if given to any ore of such persons, and notice so given shall be sufficient notice to all the holders of such shares.

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154. Date and Proof of Service.—Any notice if served by post shall be deemed to have been served on the day on which the letter containing the same would in ordinary course of post have been delivered at its address, and in proving such service it shall be sufficient to prove that the letter containing the notice was properly addressed and put into a post box or posted at a post office, and the entry in the Company's books of the leaving or sending by post of any notice at or to such address shall be sufficient evidence thereof, and no further evidence shall be necessary.

155. Non-resident Shareholders must register Addresses in Ceylon.—Every Shareholder resident out of Ceylon shall name and register in the books of the Company an address within Ceylon at which all notices shall be served upon him, and all notices served at such address shall be deemed to be well served. If he shall not have named and registered such an address, he shall not be entitled to any notice.

All notices required to be given by advertisement shall be published in the Ceylon Government Gazette.

ARBITRATION.

156. Directors may refer Disputes to Arbitration.—Whenever any question or other matter whatsoever arises in dispute between the Company and any other company or person, the same may be referred by the Directors to arbitration pursuant to and so as with regard to the mode and consequence of the reference and in all other respects to conform to the provisions in that behalf contained in the Civil Procedure Code, 1889, and the Arbitration Ordinance, 1866, or any then subsisting statutory modification thereof.

EVIDENCE.

157. Evidence in Action by Company against Shareholders.—On the trial or hearing of any action or suit brought or instituted by the Company against any Shareholder or his representatives to recover any debt or money claimed to be due to the Company in respect of his shares, it shall be sufficient to prove that the name of the defendant is or was when the claim arose on the register of Shareholders of the Company as a holder of the number of shares in respect of which such claim is made, and that the amount claimed is not entered as paid in the books of the Company ; and it shall not be necessary to prove the registration of the Company, nor the appointment of the Directors who made any call, nor that a quorum of Directors was present at the Board at which any call was made, nor that the meeting at which any call was made was duly convened or constituted, nor any other matter whatsoever, but the proof aforesaid shall be conclusive evidence of the debt.

PROVISIONS RELATIVE TO WINDING UP OR DISSOLUTION OF THE COMPANY.

158. Purchase of Company's Property by Shareholders.—Any Shareholder, whether a Director or not, or whether alone or jointly with any other Shareholder or Director, and any person not a Shareholder, may become the purchaser of the property of the Company or any part thereof in the event of a winding up or a dissolution, or at any other time when a sale of the Company's property or effects or any part thereof shall be made by the Directors under the powers hereby or under the Ordinance conferred upon them.

159. Distribution.—If the Company shall be wound up, and there shall be any surplus assets after payment of all debts and satisfaction of all liabilities of the Company, such surplus assets shall be applied, first, in repaying to the holders of the preference shares (if any) the amounts that may be due to them, whether by way of capital only or by way of capital and dividend, or arrears of dividend or otherwise in accordance with the rights, privileges, and conditions attached thereto, and the balance in repaying to the holders of the ordinary shares the amounts paid up or reckoned as paid up on such ordinary shares. If after such payments there shall remain any surplus assets, such surplus assets shall be divided among the ordinary Shareholders in proportion to the capital paid up, or reckoned as paid up, on the shares which are held by them respectively at the commencement of the winding up, unless the conditions attached to the preference shares expressly entitle such shares to participate in such surplus assets.

160. Payment in Specie, and vesting in Trustees, Right of Contributory to Dissent, &c.—If the Company shall be wound up, the liquidator, whether voluntary or official, may, with the sanction of an extraordinary resolution, divide among the contributories in specie any part of the assets of the Company, and may, with their sanction, vest any part of the assets of the Company in trustees upon such trusts for the benefit of the contributories as the liquidator, with like sanction, shall think fit, and if thought expedient any such division may be otherwise than in accordance with the legal rights of the Shareholders of the Company, and in particular any class may be given preferential or special rights or may be excluded altogether or in part, and the liquidator shall be entitled to sell all or any of the assets of the Company in consideration of or in exchange for shares, ordinary, fully paid, part paid, or preference in the purchasing Company, but in case any division otherwise than in accordance with the legal rights of the contributories shall be determined on or any sale made of any or all of the assets of the Company in exchange for shares in the purchasing company either ordinary, fully paid or part paid, or preference, any contributory who would be prejudiced thereby shall have a right to dissent as if such determination were a special resolution passed pursuant to section 192 of the Companies (Consolidation) Act of 1908 in England, but for the purposes of an arbitration as in sub-section (6) of the said section, provided the provisions of the Ceylon Arbitration Ordinance, 1866, and of the Civil Procedure Code, 1889, shall apply in place of the English and Scotch Acts referred to in the said sub-section (6) of section 192 of the aforewritten Companies (Consolidation) Act, and the said section 192, save as herein excepted, shall be deemed to be part and parcel of these present articles.





of the preceding January. Application for admission to the examinations should be made to the Director of Education not later than January 31, prescribed forms, which can be obtained from the on the Education Office.

The subjects for which a candidate desires to enter, the date of his matriculation, his name in full (initials not sufficient) should be stated on the application form. The admission fee—vide particulars in footnotes—must be credited to the account of the Director of Education in the

Mercantile Bank of India, Limited, Colombo, and the receipt of the Bank and a certificate of good conduct sent with the form of application. No eash or Bank draft or Money Order or Cheque will be accepted.

N.B.—The University fee should not under any circumstances be remitted direct to the University of London or to the Education Office.

Except in the circumstances specified in the following paragraph, if a candidate withdraw his name after having entered for, or fail to appear at; or to pass, the examination, the fees shall not be returned to him; and the full fee* shall be payable upon every re-entry. A candidate who withdraws his name before April 1 will

have his University fee refunded to him : a candidate who has paid the full fee, but does not present himself for the examination, will be allowed to enter for the next following examination in the same faculty, upon payment of a reduced feet. If he retire after commencement of the examination, or fail to pass it, the

after commencement of the examination, or fail to pass it, the full fee* shall be payable upon every re-entry. The examination shall be conducted by means of printed papers; but for the purpose of ascertaining the competence of the candidates to pass, the Examiners shall not be precluded from putting vivá voce questions to any candidate. In the Physics, Chemistry, Botany, and Geology papers, questions will be set involving (1) the translation of passages in French or in German, and (2) answers with regard to the subject-matter thereof. Candidates are recommended to read some books or papers in French or in German on the subjects which they select for the examination. These questions will be optional in the examinations as held in the Colonies. No candidate offering an Experimental Science subject will be

No candidate offering an Experimental Science subject will be allowed to pass who fails to satisfy the Examiners in the practical part as well as the written part of the examination in the subject chosen.

SUBJECTS FOR THE INTERMEDIATE EXAMINATION IN ARTS. Candidates shall be examined in four subjects! as follows:

upon every re-entry. Candidates who have passed the Intermediate Examination in Divinity with Latin and/or Classical Greek are exempted from the corresponding papers at the Intermediate Examination in Arts.

Candidates shall not be approved by the Examiners unless they have shown a competent knowledge in each of the subjects selected by them. A candidate at the Intermediate Examination who takes all

the prescribed subjects on one and the same occasion, but who the prescribed subjects on one and the same occasion, but who fails to reach the minimum standard in one subject only may be "referred," *i.e.*, he may be permitted, on the recommendation of the Examiners, to present himself in that subject alone on one occasion only, at one of the corresponding Intermediate Examinations held not more than two years from the date of the examination at which he was referred. Referred candidates who do not pass in their referred subjects within the above stated limits will be required when no entraine to effort all four subjects limits will be required when re-entering to offer all four subjects again^{††}. The Examiners will recommend that a candidate be referred only if his failure in one subject is not serious, and if his performance in the remaining subjects is reasonably good.

A candidate who has completed the Intermediate Examination after having been referred in one subject will be deemed for all purposes to have passed the examination in question on the date of completion, and will be entitled to the same rights and privileges as if he had passed in all the subjects on one and the same occasion.

The whole of the above to be treated in an elementary manner, Candidates will be required to show that they have seen and

practised a great variety of experiments, and are familiar with the appearance of common laboratory materials.

II.—Practical Examination

(Candidates will be allowed to bring into the Examination Laboratory any one book on Quantitative Analysis, provided it do not contain any reference to Qualitative Analysis.)

Candidates will be required to show that they are familiar with easy quantitative operations, gravimetric and volumetric, with the easy quantitative operations, gravimetric and volumetric, with the rudiments of qualitative analysis, and that they have prepared a number of elements or compounds by processes involving the manipulation of gases and the purification of substances by crystallization, distillation, &c. Candidates are required to bring to the Practical Examination their *original* Laboratory Notebooks for inspection, should the Examiners so desire. These Notebooks must be taken away by the candidates at the close of the examination. Specimens made by the candidate, duly attested by the teacher, if any, may be submitted to the Examiners.

Botany (Two Papers and a Practical Examination).

Each sheet must contain at least two columns of one order with entablature complete drawn to scale, the columns being not less than ten inches high on the paper, together with details drawn to at least three times the scale of the columns. These drawings are to be sent to the University one week before the date of the examina-tion. Candidates who submit these drawings will be required to sit for the paper in section (1) only, viz., Greek and Roman Architecture.

Candidates must take section (1) and either section (2) or (3).

English History (Two Papers).

English History treated generally so as to include the growth of the British Empire, with a special study of a standard work to

be prescribed two years previously[†]. Due attention to be paid to changes in foreign policy, society, government, and customs, and to the development of the material and intellectual life of the nation.

Modern European History (Two Papers).

Modern European History, from about 1400 to the present ay. One paper will deal with the general History, the other day. with a prescribed text[†].

Ancient History (Two Papers).

Either (a) The History of Egypt, Western Asia, Greece, and Rome from the Earliest Dynasties to 30 B.C. Or (b) Greek and Roman History from 776 B.C. to 330 A.D. A selected portion[†] of an historical author will be prescribed from time to time.

Candidates will not be required to show more than a general acquaintance with the book prescribed. Knowledge of the Text in the original will not be required.

Geography (Two Papers).

I.-General Geography .- The distribution of land and water. The leading facts of wind and water circulation.

The broad structural features of the continents, and the chief processes by which surface features are produced.

II.—Regional Geography.—The great divisions of the world considered under the following heads :---

- Superficial configuration together with the leading facts of the distribution of soils and rocks and minerals of economic importance.
- The reaction of configuration upon air and water circulation and the resulting local climates.

The river systems as related to configuration and climate. The influence of the foregoing physical factors on agricultural production and the supply of animal and vegetable products independently of agriculture.

The sources of mechanical power.

The distribution of population as related to the foregoing physical factors and as influencing labour supply and the value of land.

The localization of industries as determined by all the foregoing factors.

Transport. Trade centres and trade routes.

States as conditioned by geographical circumstances-physical, economic, and strategic.

Economics (Two Papers).

I.-Industrial and Commercial History .- The outlines of the industrial and commercial development of England, the questions being mainly chosen so as to deal with the period subsequent to 1760.

To include :---The effects of the introduction of machine industry. The developments of transport. Changes in indus-dustrial organization. The Great War (1793-1815) and its economic effects. Tariff policy. Movements of foreign trade. The growth of Banking, the adoption of the gold standard, the history of general prices. Poor Law. Trade Unionism.

11.—Principles of Economics.—Economics, analytical and des-criptive. with special reference to the United Kingdom. To include :—The scope of economics ; meaning of the principal

economic terms; causes of differences in productive power; analysis of various forms of organization for production; value in relation to production, exchange, distribution, and consump-tion; the distribution of income between individuals and classes; causes of variations in wages, profits, interest, and rent ; econon ic effect of the ordinary actions of governmerod. The whole to be illustrated as far as possible by reference in past and present conditions of the United Kingdom.

SUBJECTS FOR THE INTERMEDIATE EXAMINATION IN SCIENCE.

Candidates shall be examined in any four subjects! selected by themselves out of the following eight subjects of exami-nation, viz., (1) Pure Mathematics, (2) Applied Mathematics, (3) Experimental Physics. (4) Chemistry, (5) Botany, (6) Zoology, (7) Geology, (8) General Physiology, and (9) Geography (one at least of the four subjects selected from the foregoing list must be taken from amongst the first three).

REGULATION AS TO EXEMPTION FROM THE MATRICULATION EXAMINATION.

UNIVERSITY OF LONDON.-INTERMEDIATE EXAMINATIONS IN SCIENCE (ECONOMICS), 1925.

(This examination commences on the second Monday in July.)

NO candidate shall be admitted to this examination unless he have passed, or been admitted under Statute 116 (see Appendix) as exempt from, a Matriculation Examination not later than that of the preceding January.

Application for admission to the examination should be made to the Director of Education not later than January 31, on the prescribed form, which can be obtained from the Education Office.

The subjects for which a candidate desires to enter, the date of his matriculation, his name in full (initials not sufficient) should be stated on the application form.

The admission fee of Rs. 120.50 must be credited to the account of the Director of Education in the Mercantile Bank of India, Limited, Colombo, and the receipt of the Bank and a certificate of good conduct sent with the form of application. No cash or Bank draft or Money Order or Cheque will be accepted.

N.B.—The University fee should not under any circumstances be remitted direct to the University of London or to the Education Office.

Except in the circumstances specified in the following paragraph, if a candidate withdraw his name after having entered for, or fail to appear at, or to pass, the examination, the fees shall not be returned to him; and the full fee shall be payable upon every re-entry.

A candidate who withdraws his name before April 1 will have his University fee refunded to him; a candidate who has paid the full fee, but does not present himself for the examination, will be allowed to enter for the next following examination in the same faculty, upon payment of Rs. 65.50. If he retire after commencement of the examination, or fail to pass it, the full fee of Rs. 120.50 shall be payable upon every re-entry.

* Candidates are exempted from examination in Pure Mathematics or British Constitution or Logic and Scientific Method; at the Intermediate Examination in Economics if they have passed, with any of those subjects, the Intermediate Examination, or the Degree Examination, in the Faculty of Arts or of Science or of Engineering for External Students. Similar exemptions are allowed to candidates who have passed any of the above-mentioned examinations as Internal Students, provided they have passed, with the necessary subjects, at one and the same examination.

Candidates are exempted from examination in Geography at the Intermediate Examination in Economics if they have passed the B.A. Examination with Geography.

2. Principles of Economics.—Economics, anlytical and descriptive, with special reference to the United Kingdom. To include : (a) The scope of Economics ; meaning of the principal economic terms ; causes of differences in To include: (a) The scope of Economics; meaning of the principal economic terms; causes of differences in productive power; analysis of various forms of organization for production; value in relation to production, exchange, distribution, and consumption; the distribution of income between individuals and classes; causes of variations in wages, profits, interest, and rent; economic effect of the ordinary actions of government. The whole to be illustrated as far as possible by reference to past and present conditions of the United Kingdom. (b) The present organization of trade and industry, including recent developments in Industrial Combination, Conciliation and Arbitration, Co-operation, and the fixing of Wages. British Foreign Trade, its statistics and organization ; shipping; the balance of trade and the foreign exchanges. The nature of money and the money market, including an elementary sketch of the English banking system

elementary sketch of the English banking system. In this examination a general knowledge only of the subject will be required, and the candidate will not be expected

to have a minute knowledge of detail, or to be able to deal with the more difficult questions of theory.

II .--- THE BRITISH CONSTITUTION.

Outlines of the constitution and public administration of the United Kingdom at the present day, including the organization and working of Parliament, the Executive (Crown, Ministers, and Civil Service), and the Judiciary; the constitution and powers of the Local Authorities in England; the relations between the United Kingdom and its Colonies and Dependencies.

Candidates will be expected to have some acquaintance with the chief events in the development of British political institutions since 1832.

IIIA.-MATHEMATICS.

Algebra.

Theory of indices, nature and use of logarithms. Arithmetic and Geometric progression. The binomial, exponential, and logarithmic series. Simple limits and approximations. The use of Horner's method of solving equations in simple cases. Simple applications of the above.

Graphic Algebra and Co.ordinate Geometry.

The straight line. Solution of linear simultaneous equations.

The graphs of $a + bx + cx^2 + dx^2$ and of $\frac{A + Bx}{a + bx}$, with special reference to the approximate solution of equations in which y is an explicit function of x. Equation of the circle, equation of the ellipse and hyperbola, referred to axes parallel to their principal axes. (Focal properties are not required.) Simple applications of the above.

Pure Geometry.

Relations and properties of similar plane figures. Orthogonal projection; the properties of the ellipse as the projection of the circle.

Trigonometry.

Definitions and graphs of sine, cosine, and tangent. Use of four figure tables of natural sines, cosines, and tangents, The formulæ for the sine and cosine of the sum of two angles. Circular measure. Approximate values of the sine, cosine. and tangent of small angles.

General.

The slope of curves as determined by the limiting value (h = 0) of $\{f(x + h) - f(x)\}/h$. Effect of change of scale on the slope and on the area of a curve. Simple cases of derived curves, illustrated by the functions and series named above, and simple cases of maxima and minima.

IV .--- GEOGRAPHY.

General Geography.

The distribution of land and water. The leading facts of wind and water circulation.

* I.e., 1793-1815.

Regional Geography.

Superficial configuration together with the leading facts of the distribution of soils, rocks, and minerals of economic importance.

The reaction of configuration upon air and water circulation and the resulting local climates.

The river systems as related to configuration and climate.

The influence of the foregoing physical factors on agricultural production and the supply of animal and vegetable products independently of agriculture.

The sources of mechanical power.

The distribution of population as related to the foregoing physical factors and as influencing labour supply and the value of land.

The localization of industries as determined by all the foregoing factors. Transport. Trade centres and trade routes.

The geographical circumstances which influence the economic and strategical position of States.

The examination shall be conducted in the order shown on the Time Table which will be sent to each (andidate who has entered.

The examination shall be conducted by means of printed papers; but the Examiners shall not be precluded from putting, for the purpose of ascertaining the competence of the candidate to pass, vivá voce questions to any candidate in the subjects in which they are appointed to examine.

In the subjects in which they are appointed to examine: Candidates shall not be approved by the Examiners unless they have shown a competent knowledge in the foregoing subjects, and have shown a capacity to read with intelligence either French or German. A candidate at the Intermediate Examination who takes all the prescribed subjects on one and the same occasion, but who fails to reach the minimum standard in one subject only may be "referred," *i.e.*, he may be permitted, on the recommendation of the Examiners, to present himself in that subject alone on one occasion only at one of the corresponding Intermediate Examinations held not more than two years from the date of the examination at which he was referred.

Referred candidates who do not pass in their referred subjects within the above-mentioned limits will be required when re-entering to offer all four subjects again*. The Examiners will recommend that a andidate be referred only if his failure in one subject is not serious, and if his performance in the remaining subjects is reasonably good. A candidate who has completed the Intermediate Examination after having been referred in one subject will be

deemed for all purposes to have passed the examination in question on the date of completion, and will be entitled to the same rights and privileges as if he had passed in all the subjects on one and the same occasion.

REGULATIONS FOR THE JUNIOR AND SENIOR COMMERCIAL EDUCATION CERTIFICATES CHAMBER OF COMMERCE. AND TEACHERS' DIPLOMAS OF THE LONDON

These examinations are of two grades :

(f.) Junior; (II.) Senior.

-Senior candidates may sit for the Teachers' Diploma, providing they are engaged in teaching, or intend to Note.become teachers of commercial subjects.

The subjects of the examinations, for both Junior and Senior candidates, may be taken-

(a) For a full certificate at one and the same examination ; or

(b) For a group certificate of correlated subjects, which certificate may be counted towards a full certificate; or (c) For a single subject certificate, which also may be counted towards a full certificate.

Senior candidates taking the Teachers' Diploma Examination are required to obtain a higher percentage of marks "Pass" than those taking the Senior Certificate only. The full Junior Commercial Education Certificate and the Senior Higher Education Certificate taken at one and the for a

same examination are distinct from those which have been built up from successes in successive examinations.

3. Applications for these examinations on the prescribed form, which may be obtained from the Education Office, must be made to the Director of Education not later than November 30, and must be accompanied by a Bank receipt for the fees credited to the account of the Director of Education in the Mercantile Bank of India, Ltd., Colombo, at the rate of Rs. 3 per subject or Rs. 16.50 for the full Junior Certificate, and Rs. 5 per subject for the Senior Examination. Entry fees are not returnable.

4. The examinations in 1925 will commence on May 4.

No papers will be set in Danish, Norwegian, Swedish, or Russian unless 50 or more candidates enter for an examination in the same subject.

NOTE.-No candidate will be granted a certificate in any subject unless the paper is written in good and legible handwriting, and the spelling and composition are satisfactory.

In order to obtain a full "Junior Commercial Education Certificate," candidates are required to pass in each of the obligatory subjects, and in at least two subjects in one of the groups of optional subjects.

The extent of the knowledge required of the student in these subjects will be gathered from the following syllabus :--

(a) ENGLISH GRAMMAR AND COMPOSITION, including Dictation, Orthography, Essay, and Analysis.

Note.-In this subject candidates must satisfy the Examiners in English, Reading, and Conversation.

(b) HANDWRITING, including round, text, and smallhand, as a test in (i.) slope, (ii.) the proportion of capital to smallletters, (iii.) the systematic teaching of powers of observation, (iv.) ability to copy form, and (v.) steadiness of hand.

Addressing envelopes of various sizes, as a test of writing without lines, and of ability to write them correctly, both as regard position and terms of address.

Copying a draft letter or manuscript, a tabular statement or printed matter, &c., correcting any erasures, additions, or alterations therein.

Copying and ruling up, where necessary, arithmetical examples, items of an invoice, a statement, a receipt, a bill of exchange, a telegram, or other commercial forms of document in general use, and the displaying of headings, or other matter by different sizes of writing.

Simple lettering with the pen, and without the use of the pencil, thus : A B C, a b c, A B C, a b c.

-Special attention is called to this subject, and no pains should be spared in seeking to meet the requirement Note.of commercial houses in respect to handwriting.

The old fashioned copy book style of penmanship, thick in the downstrokes, almost invisible in the upstrokes, and abounding in flourishes, should be avoided. The characteristic most desired is legibility. Each letter should, therefore, be clearly and accurately formed, so that its identity may be distinguished apart from its position in the word—the u's distinguished from the n's, &c.—and the turnings should be round, and not angular. The writing, too, should be of moderate thickness and regular, and the loops and tails of letters should be short and full; otherwise they might run into and thus mar the legibility of the line above or below.

Certificates in this subject are given for Handwriing irrespective of technical knowledge.

(c) ARITHMETIC, including (i.) a thorough familiarity with arithmetical theory and practice, and particularly a knowledge of the metric system, (ii.) mental arithmetic, and (iii.) tots. Candidates must pass in (i.) and (ii.) in order to obtain a certificate.

(d) A MODERN FOREIGN LANGUAGE, comprising Conversation, Translation, Dictation, and Composition. (Selected from Group B.)

(e) COMMERCIAL GEOGRAPHY. - The Commercial and Industrial Geography of the British Empire.

2.—Optional Subjects.

GROUP A .--- MERCANTILE.

(i.) COMMERCIAL HISTORY.—The history of the commerce of the British Empire.

(ii.) BOOKKEEPING.-General principles of bookkeeping by double entry, including keeping of ledger and subsidiary .books. Knowledge of commercial terms.

Note .-- A student may pass if his work is sufficiently good, by using a general ledger only, but by using sectional ledgers he stands a chance of earning extra marks.

(iii.) SHORTHAND.-Writing in shorthand (any system) from passages dictated at the rate of 50, 60, 70, or 80 words per minute for a period of five minutes. Transcription of any one of the above passages for which the candidate is allowed 40 minutes.

Spelling, punctuation, and neatness of writing in transcription will be taken into account in judging the candidate's work.

N.B.-Any one of the four speeds may be chosen by the candidate, but a speed of 80 words per minute is required for the full certificate, or to qualify for a prize in this subject.

Papers will be set in French, Spanish, and German shorthand, and any other modern foreign language if a sufficient number of entries are received.

(iv.) TYPEWRITING.-Copying, in correct form, commercial letters and tabular statements from manuscript copy. Special attention must be paid to accuracy, correct spelling, syllabification and punctuation, and general intelligence. Candidates will be allowed to use any make of machine they choose. They must bring their own machines ; otherwise they

will be expected to typewrite on the machine provided, irrespective of make or model. (v.) COMMERCIAL COMMODITIES.—A general knowledge of the following :—Acids, alkalies and salts, alcohol,

aluminium, amber, antimony, asbestos, bamboo, beer, brass, canned goods, carpets and floorcloths, celluloid, chicory, coal, cocoa, coffee, copper, copra, cotton, dyes, feathers and furs, gas, glass, glue, gums and resins, gutta percha, hair, indigo, ink, ivory, iron and steek, jute, lace, leather, lead, linen, marble and slate, meerschaum, mica, oils, paints, paper, pearls, plumbago, pottery, the precious metals, precious stones, rice, 1ubber, salt, silk, soap, sugar, tea, timber, tin, tobacco, varnishes, wheat, white lead, wool, yeast, zinc.

(vi.) MODERN BUSINESS ROUTINE.—The division of a business into various departments; organization and functions of each department.

The organization and equipment of a large office. Modern labour saving devices, card and loose-leaf systems, calculating machines, &c.

The preparation and handling of correspondence, giving special methods suitable for commercial houses and agents. Letter writing-importance, style, arrangement of letters, various types of business letters.

Methods of filing multiplex copies of letters and documents.

The filing and indexing systems.

Cashier's duties, involving a review of banking practice, opening an account at a bank, cheques, promissory notes, / bills of exchange, overdrafts, loans.

Purchase and sales of goods (wholesale and retail), prices, current, price lists, quotations, tenders, estimates, contracts, orders, packing and unpacking of goods, methods of checking goods, received and issued invoicing, debit and credit notes, discounts (trade, cash and bankers).

Records of stores received and delivered, systems of control, organization of the General Post Office regarding inland, foreign, and Colonial correspondence, letters, post cards, printed papers, samples, and parcels. Registration and insurance, telegraph and telephone, money orders and postal orders. The Post Office Savings

The extent of the knowledge required of the student in these subjects will be gathered from the following syllabus :---(a) ENGLISH :

(1) Composition and Précis.-The candidate will be expected to write a short essay on some generally known subject. paying special attention to grammar and style; also a précis in the form of a narrative of the contents of one or of a number of letters or documents dealing with a particular subject, so that anyone reading the précis may be put into possession in the smallest space of time of the main features of the subject to which the documents refer.

(2) Literature, History, and Geography.-The questions will be set with the object of testing the candidate's knowledge of-

(i.) English literature generally.

(ii.) English History with special reference to the growth of the British constitution.

(iii.) Geography with special reference to the British Empire.

NOTE.—In this subject candidates must satisfy the examiner in English Reading and Conversation.

(b) FOREIGN LANGUAGES.-(French, Spanish, Italian, Portuguese, Danish, Norwegian, Swedish, German, Russian).

(1) Translations from and into the foreign languages with grammatical questions.

(2) A short essay in the foreign languages.

(3) Questions on technical terms of commerce translation of an English commercial letter into the foreign languages or composition of a commercial letter in the foreign languages from notes.

(4) Dictation in the foreign languages.

(5) The candidates' ability to express themselves with ease in a colloquial manner will be tested by conversation in the foreign languages.

Candidates must pais in Conversation as well as in the written portion of a language in order to obtain a certificate. Foreigners taking the examination in their own language must satisfy the examiner in English.

No papers will be set in Danish, Norwegian, Swedish, or Russian, unless 25 or more candidates enter for an examination in the same subject.

In languages other than those using the Roman letters candidates must show a knowledge of the written characters. by taking down a passage dictated and by translating a fascimile letter in the same.

ESPERANTO.—The syllabus is similar to that of foreign languages.

(c) ADVANCED ARITHMETIC :

Advanced exercises in proportion, discounts, stocks and shares, profit and loss and compound interest (including its application to the repayment of loans), the use of logarithms (particularly as applied to compound interest, insurance, and annuities), rates of exchange and transactions in home and foreign bills, the money market, metric system, and coinages.

Candidates will be expected to show a knowledge of duplicating processes. Special attention should be paid to accuracy, correct spelling, syllabification, punctuation, and general intelligence. The papers given will cover the ordinary range of subjects that fall within the province of the typist and correspondence clerk. Candidates will be allowed to use any make of machine they choose. Successful candidates in this examination are entitled to use the initials C.E.T.D. after their names.

Note.-The Teachers' Diploma of the London Chamber of Commerce is recognized by the London County Council, inter alia, in connection with appointments to the panels of evening institute instructors. In cases where the instructors have had little or no teaching experience the Council may require as a condition of appointment to the panel, attendance at recognized pedagogic courses.

WHEREAS by proclamation dated September 2, 1924 published in the Government Gazette No. 7,413 of September 5, 1924, the premises bearing assessment No. 11, situated at Hunupitiya road, Colombo, were proclaimed an infected area in terms of sub-sections (1) and (2) of section 5 of Ordinance No. 25 of 1909; and whereas rinderpest no longer exists in the said premises, it is now declared free from rinderpest, and to be no longer an infected area.

This declaration shall take effect from September 13, 1924.

ABSTRACTS OF SEASON REPORTS.

SEASON REPORTS FOR THE MONTH OF SEPTEMBER, 1924.

WESTERN PROVINCE.

COLOMBO DISTRICT.

Paddy : yala crop has been harvested and a fair crop has been realized. Some of the fields have been cultivated for maha season, and others are being prepared for cultivation. Dry grain : kurakkan crop in Siyane korale west has been reaped and gathered.

Coconuts: prospects of the coming crop are fair, flowering is fair. The crop harvested for the months is about 65,700,000 nuts.

Other products : oranges can be had at moderate prices, but other fruits are scarce.

Prices of foodstuffs : country rice, Rs. 5 to Rs. 6 50 per bushel ; imported rice, Rs. 6 to Rs. 8 50 per bushel ; paddy, Rs. 2 50 to Rs. 3 per bushel ; coconuts, Rs. 5 to Rs. 7 per 100 nuts ; salt, 12 cents per measure.

Health of inhabitants: satisfactory, except for a few cases of dysentery, chickenpox and measles.

Health of cattle : unsatisfactory. Epidemic of rinderpest and foot-and-mouth disease continued. Foot-andmouth is on the decrease.

Weather : during the latter part of the month rainy weather prevailed. The rainfall at the Colombo Observatory for September was 15.01 inches on 21 days.

KALUTARA DISTRICT.

Paddy : the yala harvest was reaped during the month. Dry grain : there was no dry grain cultivation in the district.

Coconuts : the month's yield of coconuts is estimated at 2.382.700 nuts.

Other products: fruit and vegetables were scarce throughout the district.

Prices of foodstuffs: country rice is not available in the market; paddy, Rs. 2 to Rs. 3 per bushel; imported rice, Rs. 5 to Rs. 9 25 per bushel; kurakkan, Rs. 3 25 to Rs. 5 per bushel (not available for sale); maize, nil; coconuts, Rs. 5 to Rs. 8 per 100 nuts; salt, 10 to 12 cents per measure.

Health of inhabitants : there were a few cases of dysentery, chickenpox, fever, measles, and enteric.

Health of cattle : on the whole good. Rinderpest and foot-and-mouth disease existed in many villages of the totamunes

Remarks applicable to particular districts : there was a fair supply of fish during the month.

Weather : rainfall was very heavy.

Harvest prospects generally: the heavy rains caused considerable damage to the crops and the harvest was, therefore, not satisfactory.

General: nil.

CENTRAL PROVINCE.

KANDY DISTRICT.

Paddy (prospect of coming crop, &c.) : all the yala fields have been reaped and the crops were satisfactory. Maha fields are in plants.

Dry grain (prospect of coming crop, &c.): chenas being prepared for cultivation. Coconuts (prospects of coming crop, &c.): flowering

satisfactory.

Other products (prospects of coming crop, &c.): the yield from cacao, areacanut, and fruit trees have been unsatisfactory.


