Western Province—Kalutara District.

Limits of the Town of Panadure as defined by Proclamation dated November 25, 1920.

7.—Panadure Town.

Boundaries: North by the village boundary of Gorakapola and Walana eastwards as far as the Old road; east by the Old road as far as its junction with the First Cross road, the First Cross road to a point about 5 chains as landmarked on the ground to the east of the Old road, a line drawn southwards parallel to the Old road at a distance of about 5 chains as landmarked on the ground to the east of the said road, boundaries enclosing the frontages to a distance of about 5 chains as landmarked on the ground on either side of the Gonabendiduwa District Road Committee road and Udahamulla-Aruggoda Village Committee road as far as the Tantrimulla-ela, excluding the paddy fields, a line drawn due north and south through a point about a quarter of a mile to the east of the junction of the Fourth Cross road and Gravets road, excluding paddy fields, from the last-named boundary a line drawn south-eastwards and eastwards parallel to the Horana road about 5 chains as landmarked on the ground to the north of that road as far as the western boundary of the Wekada mosque, a line drawn north and south through the western boundary of the Wekada mosque to a distance of about 5 chains as landmarked on the ground on either side of the Horana road, from the last-named boundary a line drawn westwards parallel to the Horana road about 5 chains as landmarked on the ground to the south of the said road as far as the Morawina road, the Morawina road southwards to the Nalluruwa-Mahawila Village Committee road, the said Village Committee road south-westwards to a point of about 5 chains as landmarked on the ground to the east of the Colombo-Galle road, a line drawn south-westwards parallel to the Colombo-Galle road, and about 5 chains as landmarked on the ground to the east of the said road as far as the boundary of the Pinwatta village; south by the boundary of the Pinwatta village to the sea; west by the sea and the centre of the Panadure river.

Limits of the Town of Panadure as defined by this Proclamation.

7.—Panadure Town.

Boundaries: North the village boundary between Gorakapola and Walana eastwards as far as the Old road; east the Old road as far as its junction with First Cross road, the First Cross road to a point 5 chains to the east of the Old road, a line drawn southwards parallel to the Old road at a distance of 5 chains to the east of the said road up to a point 5 chains to the north of Cemetery road, a line drawn parallel to the Cemetery road at a distance of 5 chains to the north of the said road to a point 5 chains to the north of Gonabendiduwa road, thence the boundaries enclosing the frontages to a distance of 5 chains on either side of the Gonabendiduwa road and Udahamulla-Aruggoda road as far as the Tantrimulla-ela, excluding the paddy fields. A line drawn due north and south through a point exactly a quarter of a mile to the east of the junction of the Fourth Cross road and Gravets road, excluding paddy fields. From the last-named boundary a line drawn southeastwards and eastwards parallel to the Panadure-Horana road 5 chains to the north of that road as far as the western boundary of the Wekada mosque. A line drawn north and south through the western boundary of the Wekada mosque to a distance of 5 chains on either side of the Panadure-Horana road. From the last-named boundary a line drawn westwards parallel to the Panadure-Horana road 5 chains to the south of the said road as far as the Morawinna road. The Morawinna road southwards to the Eighth Cross road. The said road southwards to the Eighth Cross road. westwards to a point 5 chains to the east of the Colombo-Galle road. A line drawn southwards parallel to the Colombo-Galle road, and 5 chains to the east of the said road as far as the village boundary between Pinwatta and Nalluruwa; south the village boundary between Pinwatta and Nallurwa; west the sea and the centre of the Panadure river.

#### SCHEDULE REFERRED TO.

#### Adjournment of Meetings.

1. Notice of an adjourned meeting shall be served on members at least twenty-four hours before the time fixed for such meeting.

Presence of Strangers.

2. Strangers, including the press, may be present at Council meetings in the places set apart for them, but must withdraw when called upon to do so by the Chairman, when in the opinion of the majority of the members of the Council present at the meeting, expressed by resolution, such exclusion is deemed advisable in the public interest.

#### Order of Business.

3. The business of the Council shall be transacted in the following order:---

(1) Confirmation of the minutes of the last preceding meeting.

(2) Memorials, petitions, complaints, and communications addressed to the Council, of which due notice has been given by a Councillor, shall be laid before the Council.

(3) Questions of which previous notice has been given.

(4) Motions.

(5) Any other matter set down in the notice shall be proceeded with, provided that the Council may, if it sees fit, deviate from the order herein prescribed.

(6) Monthly statements of receipts and disbursements, progress reports of works, and such other documents as are required by the Council shall be submitted to the Council.

#### Order of Precedence.

 $\textbf{4.} \ \ \, \textbf{For all purposes connected with the Council, the precedence and seniority of Councillors shall be regulated} \\ \textbf{as follows:---}$ 

After the Chairman shall rank the Councillors in order of the priority of their nomination or election, and in the case of former Councillors re-elected or re-nominated, of the priority of their continuous membership of Council (such continuous membership being deemed to be unimpaired during the absence of a nominated member for whom a temporary successor has been nominated).

#### Minutes.

5. Minutes of the proceedings of all meetings of the Council shall be drawn up and fairly entered in a book to be kept for that purpose, and shall be signed by the Chairman after each meeting and shall at all reasonable times be open at the Municipal Office to the inspection, without charge, of any Councillor, and to the inspection of any other person on payment of a fee of twenty-five cents.

6. The minutes of each meeting shall be printed and circulated. At the next or some subsequent meeting the question shall be put that the minutes be taken as read and confirmed. In the absence of objection or correction, the

minutes as printed shall be confirmed.

#### Memorials, Petitions, &c.

7. (a) A member presenting a petition or memorial to the Council may state concisely the purpose of the petition or memorial.

(b) Any member presenting a petition or memorial or other communication will be held responsible for its contents

being throughout respectful.

(c) It shall be competent for any member to move that such petition or memorial be read. In making such motion he shall state concisely his reasons for wishing to have it read.

(d) No debate shall be permitted on such motion nor shall any other member speak upon or in relation to such petition or memorial, except to second the motion formally.

(e) Such motion being seconded, the question shall be put whether the petition or memorial shall be read.

#### Hearing Petitioners.

8. In any cases wherein individual rights or interests may be affected by any act, order, or proceeding of Council, all parties so affected may be heard upon petition before the Council when in Committee, either in person or by Counsel.

#### List of Witnesses.

9. When it is intended to examine any witnesses, the petitioner or Councillor requiring such witnesses shall deliver to the Secretary, three days at least before the day appointed for their examination, a list containing the names, residences, and occupations of such witnesses.

#### Questions.

10. (a) Questions relating to Municipal affairs may be put to the Chairman.

(b) At least four clear days' notice—exclusive of Sundays and Government holidays—shall be given of such question.

(c) A written reply shall be read by the Chairman to each question.

(d) No member shall address the Council upon any question nor shall the terms of any question contain any argument or expression of opinion or statement of fact, except in so far as may be necessary to explain such question.

(e) Any member may put a supplementary question for the purpose of further elucidating any matter of fact regarding which an answer has been given: Provided that the Chairman shall disallow any supplementary question if, in his opinion, it infringes the rules as to the subject-matter of questions, and in that case the question shall not appear on the record of the minutes of the Council.

#### Motions.

11. (a) Every notice of motion shall be in writing, signed by the member of the Council giving the notice. such notice shall be in the hands of the Secretary four clear days—exclusive of Sundays and Government holidays—before the meeting of Council, the motion shall not be included in the agenda.

(b) All notices of motion shall be dated and numbered as received, and shall be entered by the Secretary upon

the agenda paper in the order in which they are received.

(c) Before any notice of motion is placed on the agenda paper, it shall be submitted to the Chairman who, if he be of opinion that it is out of order, shall cause the giver of the notice to be so informed.

(d) Every notice of motion shall be relevant to some question affecting the Municipal administration of Colombo.
(e) No motion to rescind any resolution which has been passed within the preceding six months nor any motion to the same effect as any motion which has been negatived within the preceding six months shall be in order, unless notice thereof shall have been given and specified in the agenda, and the notice shall bear, in addition to the member who proposes the motion, the signatures of five other members; and when such motion has been disposed of, it shall not be competent for any member to propose a similar motion within a further period of six months.

(f) No motion shall be deemed to have been submitted for debate until it shall have been proposed and seconded. (g) Any member may second a motion or amendment by rising in his place and bowing to the Chair, without

prejudice to his right to speak at a later period of the debate.

(h) Every motion moved in Council, and of which previous notice has not been given, shall be reduced to writing,

signed by the mover, and handed to the Secretary.

(i) When a motion has been made and seconded, and the debate thereon concluded, the question thereupon shall be put to the vote by the Chairman.

#### Withdrawal of Motion or Amendment.

12. A member who has made a motion or amendment may withdraw the same by leave of the Council, which shall be signified without debate, and it shall not be competent for any member to speak upon it after the mover has asked for permission for its withdrawal, unless such permission shall have been refused.

#### Reintroduction of Motion.

A motion which has been withdrawn may be made again at any subsequent meeting; but no motion shall be proposed which is the same in substance as any motion which, within the period of six months referred to in rule 11 (e), shall have been resolved in the affirmative or negative.

#### Am endments.

- (a) Every amendment shall be in writing and handed to the Secretary by the member proposing it.
- (b) Every amendment shall be relevant to the motion on which it is moved.

(c) Every amendment shall be read before being moved.

(d) No amendment shall be discussed or put to the Council until it shall have been seconded.

(e) A member who has seconded an amendment in a formal manner shall be permitted afterwards to speak upon it. (f) Whenever an amendment upon an original motion has been moved and seconded, no second or subsequent amendment shall be moved until the first amendment shall have been disposed of. If an amendment be carried, the motion as amended shall take the place of the original motion, and shall become the question upon which any further amendment may be moved.

#### Debate ceases when Question fully put.

15. No member may speak to any question after the same has been fully put by the Chairman. A question is fully put when the voting has been taken thereon.

#### Voting and Recording of Votes.

16. (a) The question shall be put by the Chairman and the votes may be taken by a show of hands, and the result shall be declared by the Chairman; but any member may call for a division, when the votes shall be taken by the Secretary, asking each member separately, according to the order of precedence, how he desires to vote, and recording the votes accordingly.

(b) On any question being put, either in Council or in Committee of the whole Council, every member present shall, unless he declines to vote, record his vote either for the ayes or noes.

(c) In the event of a member declining to vote, the Secretary, in case a division has been called for, shall enter his name upon the minutes as having declined to vote.

## Casting Vote of Chairman.

(d) The Chairman shall have an original vote in common with the other members of the Council, as also a casting

vote if upon any question the votes are equal.

(e) When the Council is in Committee of the whole Council, the Chairman shall have an original vote in common with the other members, and also a casting vote if upon any question the votes shall be equal.

## Members Dissenting.

17. It shall be competent for any Councillor who is in a minority to record the reasons of his dissent from the opinion of the majority and such written dissent, if sent to the Secretary within one week of the Council Meeting in question, shall be entered by the Secretary at the end of his minutes of the proceedings.

## Order of the Day.

18. The "Order of the Day" shall include all business to be transacted, arranged according to rule 3. Unless otherwise resolved the business shall be taken in the order printed.

## Preservation of Order.

19. (a) It shall be the duty of the Chairman to preserve order and his decision on all disputed points of order shall be final.

(b) Any member of the Council deviating from the rules may be immediately called to order by the Chairman, or by any other member of the Council, or Committee of the Council rising to a point of order.

## Decision of Questions of Order.

When the question of order has been stated, the member who raises it shall resume his seat, and no other 20. member, except by leave of the Chairman, shall rise till the Chairman has decided the question, after which, the member who was addressing the Council or Committee of the Council at the time the question was raised shall be entitled to proceed with his speech, if he conforms to the Chairman's ruling. If he does not so conform, the Chairman may refuse to allow him to proceed with his speech.

## Member not Explaining or Retracting.

Any member having used objectionable words and not explaining or retracting the same, or offering apologies for the use thereof to the satisfaction of the Council, may be censured or otherwise dealt with as the Council thinks fit.

#### Chairman Speaking.

When the Chairman is addressing the Council or Committee of the Council, any member then standing shall immediately resume his seat.

## Naming of Members.

23. (c) Not more than one member shall be named at the same time, unless several members present together have

jointly disregarded the authority of the Chair.

(d) If any member or members acting jointly, who have been suspended under this rule from the service of the Council, shall refuse, at any time during the period of suspension, to obey the direction of the Chairman to withdraw from the precincts of the Council Chamber, the Chairman may direct such steps to be taken as are required to enforce his decision.

#### Irrelevance or tedious Repetition.

24. The Chairman, after having called the attention of the Council or Council in Committee to the conduct of a member who persists in irrelevance or tedious repetition, either of his own arguments or of the arguments used by other members in debate, may direct the member to discontinue his speech.

#### Disorderly Conduct.

- (1) The Chairman may order members whose conduct is grossly disorderly to withdraw immediately from the Council Chamber during the remainder of the meeting, and may direct such steps to be taken as are required to enforce
- (2) If on any occasion the Chairman deems that his powers under this rule are inadequate, he may name such member or members in pursuance of rule 23.

#### Duty to Obey Order of Suspension or Withdrawal.

26. Members who are suspended under rule 23 or are directed to withdraw under rule 25 shall forthwith withdraw from the precincts of the Council Chamber.

## Power to Adjourn.

27. An adjournment of the discussion of any question may be moved by a Councillor at any time, and, if seconded, shall be forthwith put to the vote.

28. In the case of grave disorder arising in the Council or Committee of the Council, the Chairman may, if he thinks it necessary to do so, adjourn the Council or Committee of the Council without question put, or suspend the meetings for a time to be named by him.

## Rules for Members Speaking.

29. In speaking to any proposition under consideration of the Council or a Committee of the whole Council, the following rules shall be strictly observed :-

(1) The business shall be conducted in the English language.

(2) Every member shall address his observations to the Chairman, and shall speak standing.

(3) He shall not be interrupted, unless out of order.

(4) When he has finished his observations he shall resume his seat, and any other member wishing to address the Council or Committee of the Council may rise.

(5) A member shall not read his speech, but he may read extracts from written or printed papers in support of his argument.

If two members rise at the same time, the Chairman shall call on the member who first catches his eye. Every member must confine his observations to the subject under consideration.

(8) No member shall impute improper motives to any other member.

(9) All personalities shall be avoided.

(10) A member may speak to the question before the Council or any amendment proposed thereto.

(11) No member shall speak more than once on any proposition before the Council, except in explanation or to order, or when the Council is in Committee, or as is provided by rule 29 (13).

(12) By the indulgence of the Council a member may explain matters of a personal nature, although there be no question before the Council, but such matters may not be debated, and he must confine himself strictly to the vindication of his own conduct.

(13) The mover of any resolution or motion may reply after all the other members present have had an opportunity of addressing the Council and before the question is put, but he shall strictly confine himself to answering previous speakers and shall not introduce any new matter into the debate. right of reply shall not extend to the mover of an amendment, which having been carried has become the substantive motion.

In these rules Superintendent shall mean the Mudaliyar of the district duly appointed by the Assistant Government Agent in terms of section 20 (a) of "The Irrigation Ordinance, No. 45 of 1917," amended by Ordinance No. 22 of 1922, as an officer to assist him in exercising and carrying out the powers and duties conferred or imposed upon him by the said Ordinance.

Cultivation officer shall mean the Vidane Arachchi of the division or any other person duly

appointed by the Assistant Government Agent as aforesaid.

Irrigation headman shall mean the Vel-Vidane duly elected by the proprietors as the irrigation headman of the tract, or, in any case in which no person has been so elected, the person appointed as Vel-Vidane by the Assistant Govérnment Agent under section 21 (2) of the said Ordinance.

- 3. To ensure proper supervision there shall be appointed a Superintendent for each Chief Headman's division. The number of Vel-Vidanes shall be determined by the Assistant Government Agent.
- 4. The Cultivation Officers and Irrigation Headmen shall, under the direction of the Superintendent, supervise all works of irrigation and paddy cultivation within their limits, assist in collecting people and superintending the works, and shall enforce the following rules and all breaches of the same before the Village Tribunal through the Superintendent.

5. (a) During the rainy months all the dams and water-courses of each village shall be inspected three times a week by the Irrigation Headman and once a week by the Cultivation Officer. In seasons of floods this inspection shall take place daily, and if any minor repairs be found necessary they shall be executed by the proprietors of the lands in which such repair is needed.

- (b) In the event of a serious accident happening to any of the dams or water-courses and causing damage requiring immediate repair, the Cultivation Officer shall forthwith report the matter to the Superintendent. The Cultivation Officer and the Irrigation Headman shall immediately by beat of tom-tom or otherwise, as shall appear most effectual, collect all the proprietors of the fields depending upon the damaged works, and all parties interested in the cultivation of the land shall be in attendance on the spot, either by day or by night, as may be necessary, and they shall forthwith perform the needful work.
- (c) As soon as practicable the Cultivation Officer shall furnish a detailed report on the circumstances to the Superintendent of the division for transmission to the Kachcheri.

#### II.—Huwandiram.

6. All lands under cultivation shall be liable to pay 1/48 part of the produce as huwandiram, to be divided as follows:—\(\frac{1}{4}\) to the Iirrigation Fund for the maintenance and construction of minor works, pay of staff, and other incidental expenses; \(\frac{1}{4}\) to the cultivation officers; and \(\frac{1}{2}\) to the Irrigation Headmen elected or appointed under "The Irrigation Ordinance, No. 45 of 1917."

7. Any person who has been appointed to act for an Irrigation Headman shall be entitled to receive a share of the huwandiram in proportion to the period for which he has so acted.

8. The Assistant Government Agent shall have power to disallow the share of Huwandiram due to any headmen who have been guilty of inattention or of allowing the irrigation works of their district to fall into bad order.

9. All Huwandiram so disallowed shall be treated as a penalty recovered under the Ordinance.

10. It shall be lawful for the Assistant Government Agent, with the consent and advice of the District Advisory Committee, to direct that the right to collect 1/48 part of the produce as Huwan-diram be rented out.

#### III .- General Works.

11. All proprietors are required to clear, repair, and keep in good order the water-courses adjoining their respective fields. They shall also by their joint labour, in proportion to their respective holdings, repair the canals throughout their length and breadth.

12. The dams or amunas across canals and tracts of fields on which more than one subdivision in this division depends for irrigation shall be put up and kept in repair by the joint labour of all the owners and cultivators of lands in the several divisions dependent upon them, and those dams on which only particular subdivisions may depend shall be put up by the joint labour of the owners and cultivators of that subdivision; this labour shall be rendered at the call of the Cultivation Officer.

13. On the application of a majority of the cultivators of a tract of fields, the Superintendent is empowered to authorize the Cultivation Officers to cause the opening of such new canals, water-courses, and tanks, and erection of new dams, as the Superintendent may consider necessary for the irrigation and retention of water; and all the cultivators of the tract are required to do their portion of the work within the time that might be fixed by the Superintendent.

Vidane Arachchies, Vel-Vidanes election.

Duties.

Detailed inspection.

Rate distributi on.

Penalty for neglect.

Disposal.

Renting.

Of water-courses, or canals.

Of dams and tanks.

New dams or canals are erected or opened.

Encroachment, obstruction.

14. No person shall, for any purpose whatever, obstruct, encroach on, or lessen the width of any water-course, canal, or tank. Nor shall any person construct any work of a permanent nature in any water-course or canal without the consent of the Assistant Government Agent, whose approval of the type of work to be constructed must be obtained.

Cutting gaps in dams prohibited.

15. No gaps in any permanent dam shall be allowed to be cut, but pipes shall be inserted in all necessary places, by the Irrigation Headmen; the cost of insertion and upkeep of such pipes to be borne by the owners of all lands depending on the outlet, jointly at a rate proportioned to the extent of their lands.

Diversion of water.

16. No new amuna or dam to direct water from an ancient dam or amuna shall be constructed without the consent of all parties interested in the water from the old amunas, and no person shall break down an upper amuna to make up a deficiency or failure in the water at an amuna below it, except as provided for by the 18th and 19th rules.

#### IV.—Details of Irrigation and Distribution of Water.

Time of commencing agricultural operations,

- 17. (a) The Superintendent shall at least two weeks before the commencement of work for each harvest convene meetings of the proprietors at one or more centres in his district in order to fix dates for the commencement of work and sowing, to select the kinds of paddy to be sown and to decide all other matters connected with such harvest. The opinion of a majority of proprietors shall prevail on all matters for decision and shall be binding upon the minority. The Superintendent shall enter or cause to be entered minutes of every such meeting and shall at the close of such meeting sign the said minutes.
- (b) In the event of a sufficient number of proprietors failing to attend such meeting or meetings without reasonable cause and after due notice, it shall be competent for the Superintendent with the concurrence of the Cultivation Officers and Irrigation Headmen to fix dates for the commencement of work and sowing, to select the kinds of paddy to be sown, and to decide all other matters connected with such harvest. All such decisions shall be forthwith entered in the minutes and signed by the Superintendent, and shall be binding on all proprietors as if they had attended such meeting or meetings.

Distribution of water.

18. The distribution of water to the lands in the respective divisions shall be regulated by the Cultivation Officer or the Irrigation Headman, and no cultivator or owner, under any pretence whatever, is to block up a canal or water passage or open a sluice or dam without the approval of the Cultivation Officer or the Irrigation Headman; and in case of any such obstruction the Cultivation Officer is to remove the same himself in the presence of witnesses.

Division of water when insufficient. 19. If owing to drought or any unexpected accident to a dam the quantity of water available be found insufficient for the season, the Superintendent with the concurrence of the Cultivation Officer shall make a division to the several subdivisions by allowing the full volume of water to each subdivision for a given time, and such decision shall be final.

In case of deficiency of water in the tanks the extent to be cultivated. 20. If the water in any tank is deemed to be insufficient to irrigate the whole tract of fields dependent on such tank, the Superintendent shall after an inspection made by him and with the concurrence of the Cultivation Officers and Irrigation Headmen decide what extent of such tract shall be supplied with water from such tank for the harvest in question.

Stoppage in transition.

21. If any person shall wilfully prevent water flowing to the field below his own, the Irrigation Headman shall proceed to the spot with witnesses and open the gaps (wakkadas) himself.

Ploughing.

22. The time allowed for ploughing to each cultivator is calculated according to the extent of his land, and if a cultivator neglects to plough in proper time he loses his "turn of water." The ploughing shall commence with the Agawatta and end at the Mulata fields.

Rotation.

23. (a) When the fields in any tract have been prepared for sowing, the water shall first be let into the fields in the highest level, and the others shall be irrigated in succession down to the lowest. If any proprietor fails to sow his field within the prescribed time, without reasonable cause, he shall lose his turn of water. In like manner, when the respective turns for watering the crops arrive, the water shall be let into the fields in the same rotation. The quantity of water allowed to each proprietor

shall be regulated by the Irrigation Headmen.

(b) If any proprietor shall, either through negligence in the preparation of his own field or through malice, prevent the water flowing to the fields situated on a lower level than his own, the Cultivation Officer and Irrigation Headman shall forthwith proceed to the spot with witnesses and

remove any obstruction and open the gaps (wakkadas) himself.

Neglect or failure to cultivate.

- 24. If the cultivation of any field in a tract where the majority of the fields are being prepared for cultivation is neglected or abandoned or is unnecessarily delayed after notice has been given under rule 17, it shall be competent for the Superintendent to entrust the cultivation of such field to any person he may select, and such person shall cultivate the field and give the ground share to the owner.
- 25. Should any proprietor neglect or refuse to cultivate his paddy field or any share in it, the Superintendent may allow such to be cultivated by any other proprietor or cultivator who shall not be liable to pay any ground share should the crop fail. Such person shall be liable to all obligations under these rules in respect of such field or share of such field.

Water in transit.

26. Where water is carried in ancient channels through a tract of paddy fields in transit for the purpose of irrigating a tract below it no person shall divert the water from such water-course to the fields through which it passes, or obstruct, or otherwise injure the same.

#### V.—Tanks.

Bund not to be out.

27. No bund of a tank shall be cut through or lowered on any excuse without the leave of the Superintendent of the district, or where it is provided with a sluice without the special permission of the Assistant Government Agent of the district.

Cultivation of bed.

28. The bed or bund of tank shall not be cultivated without leave of the Assistant Government Agent.

Asweddumizing new lands.

29. No person shall divert water to asweddumize new lands without the consent of the owners of the fields interested. Should any owner refuse without reasonable cause an appeal shall lie to the Superintendent, whose decision shall be final.

#### V1.—General Works.

30. All owners or cultivators of fields shall make up their ridges at the same time, and leave proper gaps (wakkadas) for the conveyance of water to fields on the lower level.

Preparation.

31. No person shall in any way alter or injure any ridge (innivara) or boundary between fields in the same tract; and on information to that effect the Cultivation Officer shall as soon as possible proceed to the spot with witnesses and restore every such alteration to its original state.

Alteration.

32. The proprietors of paddy fields on either side of a limitary dam or innivara shall be jointly liable to erect and maintain the same.

Upkeep.

33. The ridges shall be kept clear of weeds by the proprietors of the adjacent lands.

Weeds.

34. Whenever the cultivation of a field is impeded by the irregular nature of the ridges, it shall be lawful for the Superintendent to order a rectification of such impediment, if the same can be done without affecting the rights of the parties interested.

Rectification.

35. The cultivators shall on the occurence of the first rain after the crops have been reaped, repair all dams and ridges, close the wakkadas, and keep them in good order until the next season for cultivation arrives, and it shall be the duty of the proper headmen to see this done.

•

#### VII.—Fences, Watch Huts, and Reaping.

36. If the cultivation officer is of opinion that a fence is required to be erected round a whole tract of fields, he shall measure the length of such fence and apportion the work connected with the erection of such fence to each proprietor in proportion to the area of his field without any regard as to whether the fence adjoins his field or not.

Erection of fences.

37. Watch huts for the protection of crops shall be put up by the proprietors who shall keep the same in good repair as determined by the Cultivation Officer and shall keep regular watch by turns.

Watch hut.

38. Atmagas shall be cleared to the extent of five fathoms round the edge of the field, provided no large or valuable timber or fruit trees are thereby injured; all the overhanging branches of such trees shall be removed by the proprietors, or, on default after due notice, by the Cultivation Officer at the expense of the proprietor with the concurrence of the Superintendent.

Atmaga.

39. Should a portion of any tract ripen before the rest, the cultivator of that portion shall, with the consent of the Cultivation Officer, be allowed to reap and store the same, but he shall still continue to contribute his usual amount of assistance towards the protection of the tract until the Cultivation Officer announces that the whole tract has been reaped and stored.

Reaping.

#### VIII.—Paths and Roads.

40. Where any principal path crosses a tract of fields a ridge of at least three feet in breadth must be left for it. Provided that in lieu thereof a proper pitapara may be substituted at the option of the proprietors with the concurrence of the Superintendent. No Village Committee path shall be fenced across without the leave of the Assistant Government Agent.

Crossings.

41. Where any principal path is crossed by water-courses, proper kumbusas (wooden pipes) should be provided by the proprietors whose fields are benefited by the water.

#### IX.—Cattle.

42. No person is to tether or graze any cattle in or by any field having growing crops on, or in any field or patch of ground left uncultivated or unsown in a tract of fields under crop.

Exclusion (cultivated tract).

43. People having cattle in the villages in which it is not the custom to fence paddy fields under cultivation should either tether their cattle remote from the fields having crops, or should remove them from the village as soon as notice for doing so shall have been given by the Cultivation Officer by beat of tom-tom, and shall not turn them out loose or bring them back to the village till permission is again given by the Cultivation Officer to do so.

Tethering and driving cattle.

44. No owner of a paddy field situated in a tract shall drive in cattle to his land after reaping or shall graze or tether cattle in it until all the fields in the tract have been reaped and crops removed.

#### X.—Miscellaneous.

45. Owners of paddy lands living out of the division shall give the Cultivation Officer in writing, six weeks before the commencement of work for each harvest, the names of the cultivators of their fields.

Proprietors to give the names of their cultivators.

- 46. No proprietor or other person is at liberty to do any act in his own interest having a tendency to injure the interest of other proprietors.
- 47. Where under these rules or any of them an obligation is cast upon the proprietors, the extent of the obligation of each proprietor shall be proportionate to the area of the fields held by such proprietor.
- 48. Non-resident proprietors shall make the customary arrangements for the prevention of injuries to the tank by sudden floods and for the performance of works of an urgent character which cannot be attended to by the non-resident proprietors.
- 49. Any person cultivating the land of a proprietor shall be liable to fulfil all the obligations which according to custom that proprietor has to perform.
- 50. All matters connected with the irrigation and cultivation of fields not affecting the title to land shall be decided by the Superintendent. In the event of the Superintendent not being able to effect a settlement the parties shall be referred to the Village Tribunal.
- 51. No paddy shall be allowed to remain on the threshing-floor without reasonable cause for more than twenty days after the reaping thereof, before the expiration of which period the paddy of each village shall be threshed, and the produce divided and distributed to those parties respectively who may be entitled to any share or shares thereof.
- 52. Any neglect to comply with the above rules or any act committed in breach of them will subject the offender to the penalties provided in chapter V. of the Irrigation Ordinance, No. 45 of 1917.
- 53. Any custom now existing relating to paddy cultivation and appropriation of dues by Government not expressly provided for in these rules shall have the force of these and be considered part of them.

Provided further, that the Committee shall have the power to order the removal or prohibit the erection of any such kraals, stockades, or enclosures where such in the opinion of the Committee constitute a nuisance.

## VITAL STATISTICS.

## Registrar-General's Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended August 22, 1925.

Births.—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 129 (2 Europeans, 9 Burghers, 78 Sinhalese, 20 Tamils, 14 Moors, 5 Malays, and 1 Other). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated) population on July 1, 1925, viz., 256,049) was 26.3, as against 27.1 in the preceding week, 27.3 in the corresponding week of last year, and 27.6 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 153 (8 Burghers, 86 Sinhalese, 30 Tamils, 20 Moors, 4 Malays, and 5 The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 31.2, as against 29.7 in the previous week, 25.4 in the corresponding week of last year, and 29.8 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 153 total deaths, 19 were of infants under one year of age, as against 32 in the preceding week, 26 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 32 the average for last year.

-The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 4.

Principal Causes of Death.—1. (a) Eighteen deaths from Pneumonia were registered, 7 in Maradana hospitals (including 5 deaths of non-residents), 3 in Wellawatta South, 2 each in Slave Island and Wellawatta North, and 1 each in Kotahena South, New Bazaar, Maradana North, and Kollupitiya, as against 15 in the previous week, and 18 the weekly

(b) Six deaths from Influenza were registered, 2 each in Kotahena South and New Bazaar, and 1 each in St. Paul's

Kotahena North, as against 8 in the previous week, and 4 the weekly average for last year.

(c) Two deaths from Bronchitis were registered in Maradana hospitals (including 1 death of a non-resident). The number in the previous week was 4, and the weekly average for last year was the same.

- 2. Eighteen deaths from *Phthisis* were registered, 7 in Maradana hospitals (including 2 deaths of non-residents), 3 in Kotahena North, 2 in Slave Island, and 1 each in St. Paul's, New Bazaar, Maradana North, Maradana East, Maradana South, and Kollupitiya, as against 11 in the previous week, and 13 the weekly average for last year.
- Five deaths from Enteric Fever were registered, 2 in Kotahena South, and 1 each in Maradana hospital (of a non-resident), Maradana North, and Kollupitiya, as against 6 in the previous week, and 5 the weekly average for last year.
- Two deaths from Plague were registered, I each in St. Paul's and Maradana hospital. The number in the previous week was also 2, against 3 the weekly average for last year.
- Twelve deaths were registered from Infantile Convulsions, 7 from Debility, 5 each from Dysentery and Enteritis, 3 from Worms, 1 each from Diarrhæa and Puerperal Septicæmia, and 68 from Other Causes.
- Thirteen cases each of Chickenpox and Enteric Fever, 8 of Measles, and 3 of Plague were reported during the week, as against 12, 4, 12, and 1, respectively, of the preceding week.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 81.3°, against 80.5° in the preceding week, and 81.1° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29.888 in., against 29.791 in. in the preceding week and 29.806 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 0.16 in., against 0.75 in. in the preceding week and nil in the the corresponding week of the previous year.

# SEASON REPORT FOR THE MONTH OF JULY, 1925.

#### BATTICALOA DISTRICT.

Paddy: the harvesting of pinmari crops is going on in some pattus, while in others the plants are in ear and part ready for harvest. Lands sown for "idaipokam" and "ethalai" are doing well and a good harvest is expected.

Some of the preliminary meetings to decide about the next munmari cultivation have already been held.

Dry grains: not in season. Chenas are being cleared. Coconuts: trees are healthy. The caterpillar pest reported from Akkarai pattu seems to have decreased.

Other produtes: not in season. Vegetables, tapioca, and plantains are available in Akkarai pattu and Wewgam

pattu.

Prices of food stuffs: paddy, Re. 1.80 to Rs. 2.50 per bushel; rice (imported), Rs. 9.25 per bushel; rice (country), Rs. 4.80 to Rs. 8.40 per bushel; kurakkan, Rs. 2 to Rs. 3.50 per bushel; maize, Re. 1.80 to Rs. 2.50 per bushel; salt, 3 to 5 cents per pound; salt per measure, 25 cents in Wewgam pattu.

Health of inhabitants; normal. There were cases of

fever in Karawaku pattu.

Health of cattle: good. The animals attacked by hoofand-mouth disease in Wewgam pattu have recovered. Condition of tanks or fisheries: tanks are in good order. The catch of fish in the sea was poor.

Weather: dry weather prevailed during the month The rainfall recorded for the month is 0.78 inches.

#### NORTH-CENTRAL PROVINCE.

#### Anuradhapura District.

Paddy: some yala fields are being reaped. Meda kanna crops have been gathered. The late cultivations have been attacked by pests.

Dry grains: maha chenas for kurakkan are being cleared.

Coconuts: satisfactory.

### MUNICIPALITY OF KANDY.

Minutes of Proceedings of a Meeting of the Municipal Council of Kandy, held in the Town Hall, Kandy on July 18, 1925, at 8,30 a.m., in accordance with Notice dated July 15, 1925.

Present.—Hon. Mr. W. L. Kindersley, Chairman; Hon. Mr. J. C. Ratwette; Mr. L. H. S. Pieris; Mr. G. E. de Silva; Mr. P. M. Bingham; Dr. R. F. La Brooy; Mr. Haji M. S. Usoof Ismail; and Mr. S. A. Wijayatileke.

Before the commencement of Proceedings for the day, Mr. Wijayatileke announced that an esteemed friend of his, Mr. K. B. Warakaulle, had offered to pay the cost of erecting the proposed Free Ayurvedic Dispensary and moved that a vote of appreciation and thanks be passed by this Council to be conveyed to him for his generous offer.

The Chairman had much pleasure in seconding the resolution which was unanimously carried.

Mr. L. B. Warakaulle, the son of the donor, then handed in a cheque for Rs. 2,000 and expressed a wish on behalf of his father that a better site than the one proposed opposite the model dwellings at Katukele be selected for the dispensary

It was agreed to ask the Superintendent of Works to report on the question of a site with as little delay as possible and to leave the selection of the site in the hands of the of Elected Members

- The Minutes of Proceedings of the Meeting held on June 20, 1925, having been previously submitted to the Chairman for his approval and a copy thereof furnished to each Member, were taken as read and confirmed by the Chairman,
  - 2. The following documents were submitted:
    - (a) Statement of receipts and disbursements from close of 1924, to June 30, 1925, on account of the Municipal Fund.

(b) Progress report of works brought up to the same date.

- (c) Health Officer's report for June, 1925.
  (d) Statements of cases instituted by the several Inspectors and of work done by the Municipal Magistrate during the month of June, 1925.
- (e) The reservoir readings for June, 1925.

Resolved that the statement (a), together with the Minutes of Proceedings of this Meeting, as required by section 83 of "The Municipal Councils Ordinance, No. 6 of 1910," be forwarded to the Colonial Secretary for publication in the Government Gazette.

- 3. The following papers were laid on the table:—Reports by the several Inspectors on laundries, bakeries, dairies, standpipes, and house-service taps inspected during June, 1925.
- Correspondence :- (1) Letter No. 2,138 of June 16, 1925, from the Director of Public Works inquiring whether the Municipal Council would contribute a moiety of the cost of tarring the Peradenya to Lewella Ferry road and the Katugastota to Queen's Hotel road, the estimates for which amount to Rs. 16,750.

Resolved that the matter be deferred for consideration till the question of loan of Rs. 250,000 for the Electricity Department is settled.

(2) Letter of July 3, 1925, from Messrs. George Steuart & Co., re the acquisition of a portion of Hantane estate in connection with scheme for increasing the water supply.

Resolved that Mr. Vanderwall, the Council's lawyer, be asked to obtain Advocate Samarawickrama's opinion on the question of the water rights of the proprietors of Hantane estate.

(3) Letter of June 30, 1925, from Mrs. Hawke stating that she is prepared to pay an increased rent of Rs. 60 per m if all necessary repairs to Roseneath bungalow are effected.

Resolved that the estimate of Rs. 525 for necessary repairs to the bungalow be passed.

(4) Letter of July 4, 1925, from Mr. A. Fernando asking the Council for a reasonable reduction of the rent (Rs. 1,250) he has paid for the lease of the market grounds for Perahera booths in view of the Police restrictions to be imposed. this time in regard to amusements and games.

Resolved that a sum of Rs. 625 be accepted for the lease in view of the restrictions.

- (5) Letter No. 16 of July 4, 1925, from the Hon, the Colonial Secretary re amendment of the Municipal Councils Ordinance.-Read.
  - (6) Letter of July 17, 1925, from Mr. J. Wimalasirie re the construction of the proposed Ayurvedic Dispensary. Resolved that the report of the Elected Members on the question of site be awaited.
- 5. Pursuant to notice, Mr. Wijayatileke asked.—Before giving effect to the resolution passed by the Council that the lease of the site opposite the Victoria Memorial Hall be auctioned, will the Chairman be pleased to call for plans. of the building which the applicants for the site intend to erect?

The Chairman replied as follows:—The lease of the site will be put up to auction subject to the condition that no building other than what in the opinion of the Council is considered suitable for the site will be allowed to be erected thereon.

6. Pursuant to notice, Mr. de Silva asked.—Will the Chairman be pleased to table a list of the resolutions passed by the Council during the last five years, showing the number of resolutions that have been carried out and a list of those that have not been carried out?

The Chairman stated that the information would be furnished in due course. Mr. de Silva restricted this question to resolutions voting sums of money for public works.

7. Pursuant to notice, Mr. de Silva asked—When does the Council intend undertaking the extension of water and electricity to Katugastota and Peradeniya?

The Chairman replied that the Superintendent of Works was taking steps as regards the extension of the water main. The Municipal Electrical Engineer will be asked for estimates for extension of lighting to Katugastota and Peradeniya

- 8. Pursuant to notice, Hon. Mr. Ratwatte asked-Will the Chairman be pleased to table the papers relating to correspondence with Government on the subject of improvements to Cemetery road? The papers were tabled.
- 9. Pursuant to notice, Mr. Ismail asked—(a) Where does the Council intend parking cars, lorries, and other motor vehicles during the ensuing Esala Perahera? (b) Does not the Council think it dangerous to allow parking of cars at King street and Trincomalee street during the said time? (c) If so, will the Council consider the advisability of asking. the Superintendent of Police to make arrangements to park all the cars and buses at Brownrigg street, Hill street, and Victoria drive during this Perahera?

The Chairman replied that the regulation of traffic would as usual be in the hands of the Superintendent of Police.

10. Pursuant to notice, Mr. Ismail asked—Will the Council be pleased to order the Electrical Engineer to instal two electric lights near the public latrine behind the Police Court?

The Chairman replied that the Municipal Electrical Engineer would be asked to put up two lights as desired.

11. Pursuant to notice, Mr. de Silva asked—(1) Whether the Chairman is aware of the insanitary condition of the drain that runs from the Railway bridge up to the Mahaiyawa cemetery? (2) As this drain is in a very insanitary condition, whether the Council proposes to build the same in order to make it sanitary?

The Chairman replied that he would call for report and estimate from the Superintendent of Municipal Works.

- 12. The following motion which stood in the name of Mr. de Silva was, with the leave of Council, withdrawn:—
  That this Council do frame by-laws to regulate the motor traffic along Katukele and Railway Approach road from the Post-box to the Police station.
- 13. The following motion which stood in the name of Mr. Pieris was, with the leave of Council, withdrawn:—That permission be granted to the Asiatic Petroleum Company to instal a petrol pump near the market on a site approved by the Superintendent of Police.
- 14. Pursuant to notice, Mr. Pieris moved—That necessary repairs be effected to the steps in Katukele Lake road. Mr. de Silva seconded.—It was agreed that an estimate for repairs be called for from the Superintendent of Municipal Works
- 15. Pursuant to notice, Mr. Pieris moved—That the Municipal standpipe in this road be removed to a position to suit the convenience of the residents of this locality. Mr. Wijayatileke seconded.—It was agreed to call for a report from the Superintendent of Municipal Works.
- 16. The following motion which stood in the name of Mr. Wijayatileke was, with the leave of Council, withdrawn:—That the Chairman may be pleased to request the Government to grant the vacant block of land opposite the Kandy Social Service League premises to this Council for the purpose of erecting the proposed Free Ayurvedic Dispensary:
- 17. Pursuant to notice, Mr. Wijayatileke moved—That the Superintendent of Works may be requested to submit a report for the improvement of the road leading to the Mulgampola cemetery. Mr. Ismail seconded.—It was agreed that a report and estimate be called for from the Superintendent of Municipal Works.
- 18. Pursuant to notice, Mr. Wijayatileke moved—That steps be taken to extend the conservancy service so as to include all those houses at Peradeniya and Ampitiya that fall within the Municipal limits. Mr. de Silva seconded and suggested the addition of Malabar street, which the mover agreed to.

It was resolved that for the present the conservancy of the Peradeniya Gardens and bungalows be undertaken on a payment of Rs. 60 per mensem. The night soil to be collected and deposited in drums by their coolies for removal by a Municipal cart.

- 19. The following motion which stood in the name of Mr. Ratwatte was, with the leave of Council, withdrawn:—That no water rate be charged in respect of premises in Katugastota until the water main is extended to Katugastota.
- 20. Papers re arrangements for the accounting work of the Electricity Department. It was agreed that the matter be deferred for consideration at the next meeting.
- 21. To consider the revision of the salary of the Municipal Electrical Engineer.
  Resolved that his salary be raised from Rs. 9,000 to Rs. 12,000 per annum by increments of Rs. 600 per annum, with effect from May 1, 1924.
  - 22. To consider the question of raising a loan of Rs. 250,000 for the Electricity Department. Resolved that application be made to Government for a loan of Rs. 250,000 repayable in fifteen years.
- 23. Papers re the lease of Railway land for a motor omnibus stand in Market street.

  Resolved that the terms of the General Manager be accepted, and that the Ratemahatmaya, Gravets, be asked to value the land.
- 24. Application from the Hony. Secretary, Sadachara Bauddha Kulangana Samithiya for permission to put up a cadjan shed 60 ft. by 30 ft. in Victoria esplanade for a fancy fair during August 1 to 3, 1925.

  Resolved that a site opposite the Land Registry be allowed.
- 25. Application from the Hony. Secretary, Kandy Sports Club, for the erection of a pavilion on a site to the west of Bogambara Green near the Powder Magazine.

Resolved that the application be allowed. The rent for site to be Rs. 5 per annum, and the site to be leased for 25 years with option of renewal for a further period of 25 years.
