REGULATIONS REFERRED TO.

Appointment of
Attendance
Officers.

1. It shall be lawful for an Education District Committee, appointed under section 18 of Ordinance No. 1 of 1920, to appoint one or more attendance officers to secure the attendance of children at elementary schools in districts in which by-laws for their compulsory attendance are in force. The salaries of such attendance officers shall be fixed by the Education District Committee and shall be paid out of their funds.

Power of
Attendance Officers
to demand
information.

2. An attendance officer appointed under section 1 of these regulations may require the occupier of any premises to give full information with regard to the children residing in such premises and with regard to the provision, if any, which is made for their instruction.

Penalties.

3. Any person who refuses to give an attendance officer any information which such attendance officer is authorized by these regulations to require, or wilfully gives any information which is false in any particular, or wilfully obstructs any attendance officer in the discharge of his duties, shall be guilty of an offence, and shall be liable on conviction thereof to a fine not exceeding twenty rupees or in default of payment to imprisonment of either description for a period not exceeding one month.

NOTICES CALLING FOR TENDERS.

TENDERS are hereby invited for the supply of about 2,025 crossing timbers and 100,000 broad gauge and 10,000 narrow gauge sleepers for the Ceylon Government Railway in lots, for immediate delivery, in numbers as shown in paragraph 22 and in accordance with the under-mentioned specification and conditions. 2. (b) All crossing timbers and all sleepers shall be cut from well matured trees of the true species of timber named in paragraph 22 felled in the proper season when the sap is not in circulation.

(c) All crossing timbers and sleepers may be sawn or hewn, and shall be good sound strong timber free from heart-wood and sapwood, dryrot, and knot holes, shall be cut square and out of winding and straight, except that hewn sleepers may have camber to the extent of half an inch. They shall not be cut on full quarter and shall be cut with an allowance of ¼ in. in width and ½ in. in thickness to allow for shrinkage, and no further allowance shall be made, but will allow slight variation in cutting sound gum veins, gum pockets up to 6 in. by ¾ in., surface sun shakes; end shakes up to 6 in., a few pin holes, but not in groups; sap or wane not to exceed 2 in. on either face and not to come under rail seat; also sound and firm knots up to 2 in. in diameter.

3. The total consignment must be delivered at Colombo as early as possible, and tenderers must specify in the tenders the dates on which deliveries will be begun and completed. Should a contractor fail to complete delivery by the specified date, he shall be liable to a deduction as damages of 10 per cent. on the value of the sleepers and crossing timbers not then delivered.

4. Should the contractor at any time during the execution of the contract find that he will be unable to deliver the crossing timbers or sleepers or any portion of them within the period named, he shall at once give notice accordingly to the General Manager of the Railway.

5. The crossing timbers and sleepers shall be subject to inspection as stipulated in paragraph 25, and any sleepers or crossing timbers rejected at such inspection will not be accepted by the Ceylon Government.

6. If any difference or dispute shall arise between the parties of this contract as to the true intent and meaning of any of the conditions herein contained, or to any matter in dispute arising out of this contract, such difference or dispute shall be referred to a Board of Arbitration, of which each party shall appoint one arbitrator, and the two arbitrators so appointed shall, before proceeding with the reference, appoint an umpire. The award of the arbitrators and umpire, or of the majority of them, shall be conclusive and binding on both parties hereto.

7. The suppliers shall inform the General Manager by telegraph immediately the steamers commence to load, stating the probable date of sailing and shall again telegraph immediately the vessel has sailed. As each consignment is shipped the contractor must send direct to the General Manager in care of the master of the vessel conveying the sleepers or crossing timbers—

1 bill of lading (stamped).	1 copy of charter party (if any).

8. The contractors shall take all risk of accident or damage to the crossing timbers and sleepers from whatever cause arising, and shall insure them against all marine risks from shore to shore with a first class Insurance Company or Companies whose names have been approved by the Government of Ceylon.

9. All tenders should be in duplicate, and must be accompanied by a letter signed by two responsible persons, whose addresses must be given, engaging to become security for the due fulfilment of the contract. The documents must be sealed under one cover marked "Tender for Sleepers" in the left hand top corner of the envelope, and must be addressed to the Chairman of the Tender Board, Office of the Controller of Revenue, Colombo.

10. Tenders should be deposited in the tender box in the Office of the Controller of Revenue, or sent through the post so as to reach the Office of the Controller of Revenue not later than noon on Tuesday, December 8, 1925.

11. Tenders are to be made on forms which will be supplied upon application at the Office of the Railway Store-keeper, and no tender will be considered unless it is on the recognized form. Alterations must be initialled, otherwise the tenders may be treated as informal and rejected.

12. A deposit of Rs. 100 in favour of the Hon. the Treasurer of Ceylon will be required to be made at the General Treasury, Colombo, or at any Kachcheri or Bank in Colombo, and a receipt produced for the same before any form of tender is issued.

13. Applications from outside Ceylon accompanied by a draft on a Colombo Bank in favour of the Hon. the Treasurer of Ceylon, will be considered on intimation being received from the Bank that such a draft has been placed to the credit of Government.

14. No contract shall be entered into with any person whose name is on the list of Crown defaulting contractors, either individually or jointly with any other person, nor shall the contractor employ any person, whose name is on the list of Crown defaulting contractors or any other person to whom the General Manager, for reasons which appear to him sufficient, objects after giving due notice of his objection in writing.

15. All tenders for imported articles will be accepted only on the condition that the tenderer shall give the Government the benefit of any decrease in the Customs duties made after the signing of the tender and up to the expiry of the contract entered into hereafter, and the Government likewise undertakes to pay over and above the tendered rate such sum as shall adequately compensate the tenderer for any increase in the Customs duties during the period aforesaid.

16. Applicants must satisfy the General Manager that they are in a position to execute the contract in a satisfactory manner, documentary or other evidence being produced for the purpose if called for, and in the case of tenderers who are not resident in the Colony by a duly constituted agent specially empowered in that behalf.

17. Tenders from tenderers not resident in the Colony will not receive consideration, unless submitted by duly constituted agent resident in the Colony specially empowered to tender for the same, and to execute a valid contract in that behalf and to fulfil all the terms of the contract.

18. Should any tenderer decline to enter into the contract and bond, or fail to furnish approved security, within ten days of receiving notice in writing that his tender has been accepted, such deposit will be forfeited to the Crown, and the defaulter will render himself liable to be included in the list of defaulting contractors precluded from having any concern in a Ceylon Government contract. All other deposits will be returned upon signature of a contract.

19. Sufficient sureties will be required to join in a bond for the due fulfilment of each contract. The amount of security required will be Rs. 1,000 in cash or fixed deposit for every 20,000 sleepers and crossing timbers or lesser number contracted for.

20. No tender will be considered unless in respect of it all the conditions laid down have been strictly fulfilled.

21. The Ceylon Government reserves to itself the right, without question, of rejecting any or all tenders, and the right of accepting any portion of a tender. If any special conditions attach to the acceptance of part of a tender or of lots in other numbers than those specified they must be clearly laid down in the tender.

22. Tenders will be considered for the following species of timber for sleepers:—

The narrow gauge sleepers and crossing timbers are to be jarrah.

23. Tenders must state the country or State in which the timber for the sleepers and crossing timbers to be supplied was grown, and must give the correct botanical name of the timber. No tender will be considered which does not give this information.

24. Tenders should state the number of each species they are prepared to supply, and if more than one kind is offered in any tender, the rate for each kind should be specified, with the minimum and maximum number of a kind that can be supplied. Tenders must also state whether sleepers are sawn or hewn.

25. In cases of Australian woods all sleepers and crossing timbers must be passed before shipment by the Government Inspector of the State from which the timber is obtained.

Arrangements will be made for a preliminary inspection before shipment of sleepers from India (including Burma), or the Straits Settlements. In the case of sleepers from other countries delivery will be accepted in Colombo, subject to the sleepers being strictly in accordance with the specification.

26. In case of failure to comply with the specification, the General Manager may deduct such sum from the payment as he may consider justifiable, by reason of the inferior quality of sleepers and crossing timbers supplied, whether the same shall have been previously inspected or passed as provided in the last preceding clause or not. Any dispute as to the amount so deducted shall be referred to a Board of Arbitrators, of which each party shall appoint one arbitrator, and the two arbitrators so appointed shall, before proceeding with the reference, appoint an umpire. The award of the arbitrators or umpire, or a majority of them, shall be conclusive and binding on both parties hereto.

27. The price quoted in the tender is to include all costs, till delivered in ship's slings at vessel's side in Colombo harbour, and sleepers and crossing timbers to be at risk of contractors till so delivered.

Freight must be provided by the contractor.

28. Payment will be made to the contractors by the Treasurer for each separate shipment on delivery of the sleepers, and crossing timbers, subject to such deductions as may be made under clause 26.

29. The contractor shall not assign or transfer the contract without the permission of the General Manager of the Railway.

30. Delivery shall not be made in lots of less than 1,000 sleepers and may commence from date of acceptance of tender.

31. If any contractor fails to supply the sleepers or crossing timbers or any of them in accordance with his contract, or commits a breach of any of the covenants of the contract, the General Manager of the Railway shall be at liberty, by notice in writing to forthwith determine the contract; and thereupon the contractor will be liable to pay the excess cost of purchasing crossing timbers or sleepers elsewhere as such price as the General Manager of the Railway shall deem fit to the quantity which he contracted to supply, and shall, in addition, be liable to forfeit the security mentioned in paragraph 19.

General Conditions.

Not less than three days shall have elapsed between the execution of operation 1 and the commencement of operation 2 in any portion of the area and there shall be an interval on the ground of not less than one chain between operation 1 and 2 except where the terminating boundary is reached.

Operation.—3.

All saplings which are over 1 inch in diameter and not exceeding 8 inches in diameter shall be felled within 12 inches of the ground and on the day of felling, the stools shall be coppiced by means of sharp adzes cleanly and flush with the ground. This operation shall proceed from and to the same boundaries and with the same intervals in relation to operation 2 as the latter is required to proceed with, in relation to operation 1.

Operation.—4.

All trees over 8 inches in diameter shall be felled within 2 inches of the ground and within three days of felling all the stools which are between 8 inches and 15 inches diameter shall be coppiced cleanly and to within 1 inch of the ground. This operation shall proceed from and to the same boundaries and with the same intervals in relations to operation 3 as operation 2 is required to proceed with in relation to operation 1.

Separate working parties shall be assigned to these four separate operations and separate workmen shall be detailed to keep the coppicing tools invariably sharp.

(4) The contractor shall spread the branchwood evenly over the blocks immediately after conversion so as to leave no bare patches liable to soil erosion.

VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended September 5, 1925.

Births.—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 117 (17 Burghers, 56 Sinhalese, 16 Tamils, 23 Moors, 1 Malay, and 4 Others). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on July 1, 1925, viz., 256,049) was 23·8, as against 24·2 in the preceding week, 25·4 in the corresponding week of last year, and 27·6 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 140 (13 Burghers, 68 Sinhalese, 27 Tamils, 27 Moors, 2 Malays, and 3 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 28·5, as against 30·1 in the previous week, 26·4 in the corresponding week of last year, and 29·8 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 140 total deaths, 28 were of infants under one year of age, as against 20 in the preceding week, 25 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 32 the average for last year.

Stillbirths.—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 4.

Principal Causes of Death.—1. Seventeen deaths from *Phthisis* were registered, 8 in Maradana hospitals (including 2 deaths of non-residents), 3 in St. Paul's, 2 in Kollupitiya, and 1 each in San Sebastian, Kotahena South, Maradana North, and Wellawatta North, as against 12 in the previous week, and 13 the weekly average for last year.

2. (a) Nine deaths from *Pneumonia* were registered, 3 in New Bazaar, 2 in Maradana hospitals, and 1 each in San Sebastian, Maradana South, Slave Island, and Wellawatta North, as against 15 in the previous week, and 18 the weekly average for last year.

(b) Four deaths from *Bronchitis* were registered, 2 each in Maradana hospitals and Maradana North, as against 3 in the previous week, and 4 the weekly average for last year.

(c) Three deaths from *Influenza* were registered, 1 each in Kotahena South, New Bazaar, and Maradana South, as against 11 in the previous week, and 4 the weekly average for last year.

3. Four deaths from *Enteric Fever* were registered in Maradana hospitals (including 1 death of a non-resident), as against 7 in the previous week and 5 the weekly average for last year.

4. Three deaths from *Plague* were registered, 1 each in St. Paul's, San Sebastian, and Kotahena South, as against 2 in the previous week, and 3 the weekly average for last year.

5. One death from *Chickenpox* was registered in Slave Island, the number in the previous week was also the same.

6. Thirteen deaths were registered from *Infantile Convulsions*, 6 each from *Dysentery* and *Debility*, 4 each from *Diarrhoea* and *Enteritis*, 3 each from *Worms* and *Puerperal Septicæmia*, 1 from *Tetanus*, and 59 from *Other Causes*.

7. Fourteen cases of *Chickenpox*, 9 of *Enteric Fever*, 8 of *Measles*, and 3 of *Plague* were reported during the week, as against 10, 6, 9, and 2, respectively, of the preceding week.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 82·0°, against 81·6° in the preceding week, and 81·2° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29·844 in., against 29·873 in. in the preceding week, and 29·842 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 0·09 in., against nil in the preceding week, and 1·74 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.

REGULATIONS FOR ENGLISH TEACHERS' CERTIFICATE EXAMINATIONS, 1926 AND 1927.

PRELIMINARY EXAMINATION FOR CEYLON TEACHERS' CERTIFICATE.

A.—For Ordinary Certificate.

B.—For Kindergarten Certificate.

THIS examination will be held yearly in Colombo and Jaffna, commencing on the last Monday in August.

2. To be eligible for the examination candidates must be (i.) registered as supplementary teachers or student teachers in Assisted English Schools under clause 62 of the Code (the Cambridge Junior Examination will be regarded as equivalent to the E. S. L. C. for this purpose); or (ii.) registered as uncertificated teachers over 18 years of age in Assisted English Schools; or (iii.) teachers over 18 years of age in Government English and Anglo-vernacular Schools who have passed the E. S. L. C. Examination.

3. Applications on forms provided for the purpose, bearing a Rs. 10 stamp duly cancelled, must be forwarded through the manager of the school in which the candidate is employed, or direct in the case of Government teachers, so as to reach the Education Office on or before June 1, 1926.

4. A candidate who gives notice of withdrawal to this office 15 days before the commencement of the examination will have the value of stamps affixed to his entry form refunded to him. In cases where a candidate is rejected owing to his not satisfying the conditions for admission, a refund of $\frac{2}{3}$ ths the value of the stamps will be made. In no other case will a refund be made, but a candidate prevented by illness from taking up the examination for which he has entered will be permitted to re-enter for either of the two following examinations without further fee, provided notice of withdrawal accompanied by the entry form and a medical certificate from a qualified medical officer be sent to this office not later than the last day of the examination, and provided further that the regulations are complied with in other respects.

The syllabus is intended to cover only that part of Nature Study included within Animal and Plant Life. It will involve, however, an elementary knowledge of the composition and properties of air, water, and soil, as this knowledge is essential for the understanding of many of the functions of plants and animals. As the study of animals has been very restricted so far in Ceylon schools, a wide choice of questions will be allowed for a certain number of years. No candidate, however, will be able to secure very good marks unless he has a knowledge of both Animal and Plant Life. It is of great importance for a teacher to have not only a theoretical understanding of Nature Study, but also a practical knowledge of the subject. The candidates will therefore be tested in their powers of observation, of description, and of drawing, and also on their immediate acquaintance with specimens or types that are easily procurable or are situated in the neighbourhood of schools. Stress will be laid on distribution of plants and animals, and its relation to climate and other external conditions forming the environment.

Candidates may be asked to cut out any of the above mentioned garments.

CEYLON TEACHERS' CERTIFICATE EXAMINATION.

A.—For Ordinary Certificate.

B.—For Kindergarten Certificate.

This examination will be held yearly in Colombo and Jaffna, commencing on the last Monday in August.

2. To be eligible for the examination candidates must be registered as holders of English Teachers' Third Class Certificates, or as provisionally certificated teachers under the 1916 Code, or as provisionally certificated teachers under clause 63 of the Code at least one year before the date of the examination.

3. Provisionally certificated and third class certificated teachers who have passed the London University Intermediate Arts or Science Examination will be exempted from taking up the subjects of the examination included under Groups II. and III.

4. Teachers who now hold Second Class English Teachers' Certificates, and those who hold Third Class English Teachers' Certificates who have taught continuously for ten or more years in recognized English schools *after obtaining the Third Class Certificate*, may sit for the Ceylon Teachers' Certificate Examination in the subjects included under Group I. only, and on passing will be awarded the Second Class Certificate under clause 66 of the Code.

5. Teachers who now hold Third Class English Teachers' Certificates, and who have taught continuously for at least five years in recognized English schools *after obtaining the Third Class Certificate* will be exempted at this examination from subjects included under Group III.

6. Teachers who hold certificates exempting them from the Preliminary Examination will be entitled to the privileges mentioned in paragraphs 4 and 5 above according as they have taught continuously for at least ten or five years respectively, *after obtaining such certificates of exemption*, if they are specially recommended by their Principals and Inspectors of Schools.

7. The period of service referred to in paragraphs 4, 5, and 6 will be counted up to **June 1, 1925.**

8. Applications on forms provided for the purpose, bearing a Rs. 15 stamp duly cancelled, must be forwarded through the manager of the school in which the candidate is employed or direct in the case of Government teachers so as to reach the Education Office on or before June 1, 1926.

9. A candidate who gives notice of withdrawal to this office 15 days before the commencement of the examination will have the value of stamps affixed to his entry form refunded to him. In cases where a candidate is rejected owing to his not satisfying the conditions for admission, a refund of ¼ths the value of the stamps will be made. In no other case will a refund be made, but a candidate prevented by illness from taking up the examination for which he has entered

be permitted to re-enter for either of the two following examinations without further fee, provided notice of withdrawal accompanied by the entry form, and a medical certificate from a qualified medical officer be sent to this office not later than the last day of the examination, and provided further that the regulations are complied with in other respects.

Elementary Algebra.—Questions will be set up to and including simple quadratic equations.

SECTION G.

Language other than English.—One paper will be set. Time: 2 hours.

No set books are prescribed for study. The passages for translation into English will be taken both from prose writers and from poets. Passages for translation from English into the language and in the case of modern languages, exercises in free composition will be set. A sound knowledge of grammar and syntax will be required.

SECTION H.

Elementary Science.—One paper of 3 hours will be set containing questions from the whole syllabus for written work.

A practical examination of one hour will be held. A number of easy experiments will be set from both Physics and Chemistry. Candidates will be expected to perform two experiments, one from Physics and one from Chemistry.

General.—This section is intended to give the teacher an insight into scientific method and an acquisition of useful knowledge by discovery and exposition of the Scientific or Laboratory method of training, so that he may apply these methods wherever possible to all other subjects of the school curriculum.

SYLLABUS.

1. *Physical Geography*.—A general course in this is suggested because it applies Physics, Chemistry, Biology, and Geology most simple and aptly. Huxley's "Physiography" or Geikie's "Physical Geography" or Mill's "The Realm of Nature" is suggested as a text book for general reading.

2. *Physics and Chemistry Course* :—

Text Books—

(a) *Physics*.—The course is to be on an experimental basis with as little mathematical deduction as possible :—

Draper's course of Physics—

Part I : (As in the book).

Part II : (As in the book).

Part III. : *Mechanics*.—Emphasis is to be laid on the equilibrium of forces, work and energy, and application of the principle of conservation of energy.

Part IV. : *Heat*.—Emphasis is to be laid on the application of principles of Heat to phenomena in Physical Geography to Ventilation and to Hygrometry.

Part V. : *Sound*.—Questions will be set only on Elementary Laws derived from qualitative experiments.

Part VI. : *Light*.—Emphasis is to be laid on Physical rather than Geometrical optics.

Part VII. : *Magnetism and Electricity*.—Electrostatics and Magnetism to be confined only to simple experiments that lead to a clear understanding of the terms used in current Electricity.

Current Electricity.—Elementary ideas on the application of its principles to the telegraph, telephones, electric bells, induction coils, and electric lamps should be known.

(b) *Chemistry*.—An experimental knowledge of the chemical processes used in the preparation and study of properties of the Elements and Compounds treated in the text book.

(c) Questions may be set on the application of the principles of Physics and Chemistry to Hygiene and the Science of Common Life.

Practical.—Experiments set on the subject matter above indicated will be largely qualitative and consist of short and simple experiments. A certain number of the important elementary quantitative experiments in Physics will be set. No systematic qualitative analysis will be required in Chemistry. Experiments may be set from those in (c) which show the applications of the principles of Chemistry and Physics to Hygiene and Science of Common Life.

SECTION I.

Domestic Science.—Candidates must pass in the following subjects: One paper of 3 hours, and a practical test in Needlework.

Needlework.—The same syllabus as the Preliminary Examination.

Physiology and Hygiene.—A knowledge of the various parts of the body and their functions. Air, water, lighting, ventilation, sanitation, care of the hair, teeth, and skin, rest and exercise, digestion and absorption of food.

Care of the Sick.—Taking of temperature and pulse; preparing bed for patients and use of draw sheets; making and application of bandages, poultices, and fomentations; feeding of patients; preparation and care of the sick room; common diseases.

Child Welfare—

(a) *Infants*.—Care of new born child; infant bathing; clothing and food; rest and exercise; formation of habits.

(b) *Older Children*.—Bathing, clothing, and food at different ages; rest and exercise; training of the senses; and formation of habits.

(c) Common ailments and emergencies of childhood.

SECTION J.

Hygiene and Physical Training.—A paper of 1 hour, and a practical test will be given. The examination will be set upon the "Syllabus of Physical Training for Schools, 1919," "Suggestions in regard to Games" published by the Board of Education, and Haley "Physical Training" (Macmillan & Co.). There will be a practical test from a Table Group selected by the candidate, who must however be familiar with the principles underlying the exercises in all the Table Groups.

SECTION K.

Drawing.—One paper including practical test, 2 hours.

(a) Written answers to questions on the theory and the practical application of drawing.

(b) Blackboard illustrations in class teaching, e.g., rapid sketches of common objects, including maps, descriptive of races, religions, products, animal life, &c.

(c) Geometrical Drawing: Construction of circles, triangles, quadrilaterals, and polygons with given data.

SECTION L.

Mathematics.—One paper of 2 hours.

(a) *Algebra*.—Questions will be set on the theory of quadratics, on graphs, including variation of functions, their maximum and minimum values, and on the remainder theorem and its applications in factorization.

(b) *Geometry*.—The subjects of Euclid I.—IV. with simple deductions, including easy loci and the areas of triangles and parallelograms of which the bases and altitudes are given. Euclid's proofs will not be insisted on, but all proofs of geometrical theorems must be geometrical. The use of properties of similar figures will be allowed.

(c) *Trigonometry*.—The elements of Trigonometry including the following:—Ratios, variation of ratios, solution of triangles with practical applications.

SECTION M.

Natural History.—One paper will be set. Time: 2 hours.

The syllabus is intended to cover only that part of Nature Study included within Animal and Plant Life. It will involve, however, an elementary knowledge of the composition and properties of air, water, and soil, as this knowledge is essential for the understanding of many of the functions of plants and animals. As the study of animals has been very restricted so far in Ceylon schools, a wide choice of questions will be allowed for a certain number of years. No candidate, however, will be able to secure very good marks unless he has a knowledge of both Animal and Plant Life.

It is of great importance for a teacher to have not only a theoretical understanding of Nature Study, but also a practical knowledge of the subject. The candidates will therefore be tested in their powers of observation, of description and of drawing, and also on their immediate acquaintance with specimens or types that are easily procurable or are situated in the neighbourhood of schools. Stress will be laid on distribution of plants and animals, and its relation to climate and other external conditions forming the environment.

Surveying and Levelling Examination.

THE examination for the Surveyor-General's licence in surveying and levelling (Ordinance No. 26 of 1909), will be held in two parts, written and practical. The written examination will begin on October 26, and the practical examination on November 23, 1925.

2. The examination will be held in Colombo only.

3. To enter for the above examination application must be made on the form prescribed by the regulations. These forms can be obtained from the Surveyor-General.

4. Candidates must pay the following fees to the Surveyor-General before the date of closing of entries, viz., October 6, 1925.

5. The subjects of the written examination shall be as follows :—

(i.) *English.*—one paper.—[An exercise in composition and questions set to test the candidate's knowledge and command of English.]

(ii.) *Arithmetic and Algebra*—one paper.—[*Arithmetic.*—The principles and processes of arithmetic applied to whole numbers and vulgar and decimal fractions. The metric

system. Approximations to a specified degree of accuracy. Contracted methods of multiplication and division of decimals. Ratio and proportion; percentage. Averages. Practical applications of arithmetic.]

Algebra.—Symbolical expression of general results in arithmetic algebraic laws and their applications. Factors of simple binomial or quadratic expressions. Equations of the first or second degree, and problems leading thereto. Square root. Graphs of simple rational integral algebraic functions. Arithmetical and harmonical progression. Geometrical progression. Theory of indices. Logarithms and the use of logarithmic tables. Binomial theorem for a positive integral index.]

(iii.) *Geometry and Trigonometry*—one paper.

[*Geometry.*—The subjects of Euclid I.-IV., with simple deductions, including easy loci and the areas of triangles and parallelograms, of which the bases and altitudes are given commensurable lengths. (All proofs of geometrical theorems must be geometrical. Euclid's proofs will not be insisted upon.) Similar figures. Mensuration of the circle. Mensuration of the simpler solid bodies, namely, the cube, the rectangular block, the tetrahedron, the sphere, the cylinder, the wedge, the pyramid, and the cone.

Trigonometry.—Up to and including the solution of triangles, together with the practical solutions of triangles and applications, and numerical examples involving the use of logarithmic and other tables.]

(iv.) *Surveying*—one paper.—[Chain surveying. The transit and cradle theodolites, their use and their adjustments. Theodolite and compass traverses. Curve ranging. Sub-tense methods and tacheometry. Plane table surveying. Plane triangulation. The determination of azimuth.]

(v.) *Levelling*—one paper.—[The dumpy, Y and Cooke's reversible levels, their use and their adjustments. The practice and theory of levelling. Computation of earth-work. Road and railway surveys and setting out. Surveys for water supply works. Contours and the calculation of contents therefrom.]

The percentages of marks required for a pass will be : in papers (i.), (ii.), and (iii.), 40 per cent. in each paper and 50 per cent. in aggregate ; in papers (iv.), and (v.) 60 per cent.

6. Candidates in surveying only will be required to pass in papers (i.)-(iv.) inclusive ; and candidates in levelling only in paper (v.) only.

7. Candidates who fail in the written examination will not be required to present themselves for the practical examination.

RULES REFERRED TO.

1. The resthouse is intended for the use of travellers, and is not to be used as an office or place of business. Rest-house fees are payable by all persons using the resthouse.
2. Every person, other than infants, is separately chargeable for accommodation, as well as every visitor's servant occupying the resthouse for over three days.
3. Each visitor must sign his or her correct name in the resthouse book on entering the resthouse, and the resthouse-keeper is forbidden to allow the use of the resthouse or to supply refreshments until this is done.
4. No one shall occupy any portion of the resthouse for more than three consecutive days without the special authority of the Chairman of the Urban District Council.
5. Travellers shall note in the resthouse book only those resthouse charges which are payable to the Urban District Council.
6. The resthouse fees and charges shall be in accordance with the following tariff and shall be paid in cash. In default, further supplies will be refused. The attention of visitors is invited to Ordinance No. 33 of 1908, a copy of which shall be exhibited, together with these rules, in some conspicuous place in the resthouse.
7. A room may be engaged a day in advance, but when so engaged must be paid for whether occupied or not, provided that until the arrival of the person or persons engaging accommodation, the accommodation shall be at the disposal of any other person requiring it.
8. The resthouse-keeper is authorized to take no notice of telegrams asking him to prepare meals when the name and address of the sender are not given.

9. Beds, sofas, or couches in the resthouse shall not be used for the purpose of sleeping without sheets. Any person using any bed, sofa, or couch without sheets shall pay at the rate of Rs. 5 for each occasion on which a bed, sofa, or couch is so used.

10. Visitors shall pay for articles damaged or broken by them, their value in accordance with the scale of charges appearing in the resthouse notice board.

11. The resthouse-keeper is a paid servant of the Council, and is required to be personally in attendance. When waiting at table or otherwise in attendance on visitors, he must be neatly dressed and wear a white coat.

12. Any complaint which a traveller may have to make about the resthouse or the resthouse-keeper, should be noted in the complaint book, which the resthouse-keeper is bound to produce when asked for, or should be communicated to the Chairman, Urban District Council, Chilaw.

13. A breach of any of the above rules will render the person liable to a penalty not exceeding Rs. 25, unless a lesser penalty is provided by the particular rule, and such penalty shall be recoverable as a fine as provided by section 11 (1) (b) of Ordinance No. 21 of 1901.
