A PROCLAMATION.

HUGH CLIFFORD.

WHEREAS by section 41 of "The Branch Roads Ordinance, No. 14 of 1896," it is enacted that in any case in which a road or portion of a road has been constructed or partially constructed or shall hereafter be constructed by the proprietors of any estates, it shall be lawful for the proprietors or a majority of the proprietors for the time being of such estates, to apply to the Governor that such road may be treated as a branch road constructed under this Ordinance, and on receipt of such application the Governor may, if he thinks fit, with the advice of the Executive Council, publish a Proclamation in the Government Gazette declaring that such road shall be treated as a branch road constructed under this Ordinance and defining the limits of the district, the estates in which will be assessed for the improvement, repair, or upkeep of such road:

And whereas the proprietors of Elkaduwa group, Mahatenne estate, Galgawatte estate, and Edragaila estate have constructed and extended the existing road which commences at the termination of the Dotale road, 17½ miles from Kandy, continues for a distance of 1¾ miles and terminates at the Hunugalla Factory in the District of Matale, Central Province:

And whereas the proprietors of the said estates have applied to the Governor that such sticked portion of road may be treated as a branch road constructed under the said Ordinance:

And whereas the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, thinks fit to declare that the said extended portion of road, 1\sum_\text{g} miles in length, shall be treated as a road made under "The Branch Roads Ordinance, 1896":

Now know Ye that We, the said Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby declare that the said portion of road 13 miles in length, called and known as the Elkaduwa-Hunugala road, constructed by the proprietors of Elkaduwa group, Mahatenne estate, Galgawatte estate, and Hunugalla estate shall, as from and after January 28, 1927, be treated as a road made under "The Branch Roads Ordinance, 1896," and do further define the limits of the district, the estates in which will be assessed for the improvement, repair, or upkeep of such road as consisting of the estates called and known as Elkaduwa group, Mahatenne estate, Galgawatte estate, and Hunugalla estate, in extent 972 acres, 306 acres, 253 acres, 665 acres, respectively.

The Revenue District of Mannar.

1. The revenue from gun licences issued under The Firearms Ordinance, No. 33 of 1916," in the District of Mannar will cease to be recovered in stamps from January 14, 1927, and will be collected in cash or by cheque, money order, or postal order.

The applicant for the renewal of an old licence will take or send it to the Assistant Government Agent, together with the fee due, which may be remitted either by cash, cheque, money order, or postal order. In return he will receive a fresh licence in the prescribed form.

3. An applicant for a new licence will send in his application accompanied by the necessary documents and the licence fee.

INDIAN CIVIL SERVICE.

Open Competition of 1927.

An Open Competitive Examination for admission to the Indian Civil Service will be held in London in 1927. vivá voce test (subject 6) will be held in July, and each candidate will in due course be informed when he is to appear. question papers for some written tests of Section B subjects will probably be set in the week beginning July 24. examination in Section A subjects which are taken by all candidates will begin on the August 1.

The number of persons to be selected at this examination will be announced hereafter.

No person will be admitted to compete from whom the Secretary, Civil Service Commission, has not received, on or before May 16, 1927, an application on the prescribed form, a copy of which is sent herewith. No allegation that an application form or a letter respecting such form has been lost or delayed in the post will be considered by the Commissioners unless the person making such allegation produces a Post Office certificate of posting. Candidates who delay their applications until the last days will do so at their own risk.

Acknowledgments of such application forms are sent, and any candidate who has filled up and returned the printed application form but has not received an acknowledgment of it within four complete days should at once write to the Secretary, Civil Service Commission, Burlington Gardens, London, W.1. Failure to comply with this provision will

deprive the candidate of any claim to consideration.

Candidates will be notified in June of the date and place fixed for their vivâ voce test and of the manner in which the fee (£8) is to be paid. The time table of the written part of the examination will be posted early in July to the address given on the form of application, and will contain instructions as to the time and place at which candidates are to attend.

Note.

If Open Competitive Examinations for the following services, viz. :-

Eastern Cadetships in the Colonial Service;

Junior Grade of the Administrative Class in the Home Civil Sirvice;

should be held in 1927 concurrently with the Open Competitive Examination for the Indian Civil Service, candidates duly eligible in respect of age, &c., will be admitted to compete for any two or all three of these services, subject to the following conditions :-

(1) Every successful candidate who may have been admitted to compete for either the Indian or the Colonial Service (or both), as well as for the Home Service, will be called upon to declare, immediately after the announcement of the result of the competitions, whether he prefers his name to remain on the list of candidates for the Indian or Colonial Service or on the list of candidates for the Home Service.

The name of any candidate who fails to declare his choice when called upon to do so will be removed from the

list of candidates for the Home Service.

(2) Every successful candidate who may have been admitted to compete for both the Indian and Colonial Services will be called upon to declare, immediately after the announcement of the result of the competitions, whether he prefers his name to remain on the list of candidates for the Indian Service or on the list of candidates for the Colonial Service:

The name of any candidate who fails to declare his choice when called upon to do so will be removed from the

list of candidates for the Colonial Service.

(3) All declarations of choice are irrevocable.

(4) Candidates for all three or any two of the above-mentioned services will be required to pay a consolidated fee of £8.

EXAMINATIONS FOR THE INDIAN CIVIL SERVICE.

REGULATIONS FOR ADMISSION TO THE INDIAN CIVIL SERVICE.

** The following regulations, made by the Secretary of State for India in Council, are liable to alteration from year to year :---

1. An examination for admission to the Indian Civil Service, open to all qualified persons, will be held in London in July and August of each year for such number of appointments to that Service as the Secretary of State may on each occasion determine. The date of the examination will be announced beforehand by the Civil Service Commissioners.

2. Save as hereinafter provided a candidate must be a British subject. If the candidate (being a British subject)

or his father or his mother was not born within His Majesty's Dominions and allegiance then at the time of his birth his father must have been a British subject or the subject of a state in India, and such father must be or must have continued to be until his death a British subject or the subject of such state in India. Provided that a ruler or subject of any state in India in respect of whom the Governor-General in Council has made a declaration under section 96 A of the Government of India Act may be considered eligible.

3. A candidate must have attained the age of twenty-one, and must not have attained the age of twenty-four

on the first day of August of the year in which the examination is held.

4. A candidate who is a native of India must obtain a certificate of age and qualification under regulations 2 and 3 issued under Notification of the Government of India, No. 1,114, dated September 12, 1918, and signed, should he be a resident in British India, by the Secretary to Government of the Province, or the Commissioner of the division within which his family resides, or, should he reside in a native state, by the highest Political Officer accredited to the state in which his family resides.*

^{*} Candidates should be careful to see that the wording of this certificate of age and qualification is strictly in accordance with the form laid down in Rules VIII. and IX. of Government of India Notification No. 1,114 dated September 12, 1918.

5. A candidate must be free from disease, constitutional affection or bodily infirmity, unfitting him, or likely to unfit him, for the Indian Civil Service.*

6. A candidate shall satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners that his character is such as to qualify him for employ-

ment in the Indian Civil Service.

7. No person who, in a previous year, accepted the offer of a nomination as a selected candidate for the Indian

Civil Service and subsequently resigned his position as a selected candidate, will be admitted to the examination.

8. Should the evidence upon the above points he prima facie satisfactory to the Civil Service Commissioners, the candidate, on payment of the prescribed fee, will be admitted to the examination. The Commissioners may, however, in their discretion, at any time prior to the grant of the certificate of qualification hereinafter referred to, institute such further inquiries as they may deem necessary; and if the result of such inquiries in the case of any candidate should be unsatisfactory to them in any of the above respects he will be ineligible for admission to the Indian Civil Service, and, if already selected, will be removed from the position of a probationer.

10. The auxiliary language in Section A or Section C will be tested by means of translation from the language. The following languages may be offered:—French, German, Italian, Spanish, Portuguese, Dutch, Norwegian, Swedish, Danish, Russian, Latin, Ancient Greek.

No candidate may offer any language or General Anthropology or Special Anthropology twice in the examination.

No candidate may offer in Section A and C together two languages of the group Italian, Spanish, Portuguese, or two of the group Norwegian, Swedish, Danish.

Only a candidate who takes two modern languages in Section B may offer Latin or Ancient Greek as an auxiliary language.

Instead of an auxiliary language a candidate whose mother tongue is an Indian language may offer as subject 5 either General Anthropology or Special Anthropology.

^{*} The Civil Service Commissioners will regard no person as constitutionally fitted for appointment to the Indian Civil Service who has not been satisfactorily vaccinated within the last seven years.

† A syllabus defining in general terms the character of the examination in the various subjects is sent herewith.

11. In subjects 50 to 67 the civilization subject associated with a language can only be taken by candidates who offer the language itself for examination.*

12. A candidate desiring to offer subject 24 or any of the subjects 31 to 43 must produce evidence satisfactory to the Commissioners of laboratory training in an institution of university rank. For Astronomy (29), Geography (44), the Physical Anthropology branch of Special Anthropology (46), and Agriculture (47), other equivalent training will be required. There will be no laboratory test as part of the examination.

13. From the marks assigned to candidates in each subject such deduction will be made as the Civil Service

Commissioners may deem necessary in order to secure that no credit be allowed for merely superficial knowledge.

14. Moreover, if a candidate's handwriting is not easily legible a further deduction will, on that account, be made

from the total marks otherwise accruing to him.†

15. A list of the competitors shall be made out in order of their proficiency as disclosed by the aggregate marks finally awarded to each competitor, and in that order so many competitors, up to the determined number of appointments, as are found by the Civil Service Commissioners to be qualified by examination, shall be designated to be selected candidates for the Indian Civil Service, provided that they appear to be duly qualified in other respects.

Should any selected candidate become disqualified, the Secretary of State for India will determine whether the vacancy thus created shall be filled or not. In the former case the candidate next in order of merit, and in other respects

duly qualified, shall be deemed to be a selected candidate.

16. Application for permission to attend an examination must be made in the handwriting of the candidate, at such time and in such manner as may be fixed by the Civil Service Commissioners.

INDIAN CIVIL SERVICE GROUP OF COMPETITIONS.

Syllabus for such competitions as may be held in London in the year 1927 for appointment to the following services:

Indian Civil Service.

Junior Grade of the Administrative Class in the Home Civil Service.

Colonial Service: Eastern Cadetships.

Foreign Office and Diplomatic Service.

Consular Services (General, Levant, and Far East) and Intelligence Officer Grade in the Department of Overseas Trade.

Evidence of Training.—Candidates who desire to offer any of the subjects 24, 29, 31-44, 46 (Physical Anthropology branch only), or 47 must send to the Secretary of the Civil Service Commission, so as to arrive not later than May 16, 1927, the evidence of training described below. Such evidence should be in the form of a certificate signed by a responsible officer of the institution, and may be sent in advance of the form of application. In the case of an institution not situated in the British Isles, the certificate must state that the institution in which the work has been done is authorized to prepare candidates in that subject for a degree. A candidate who has been refused permission to take one of these subjects will be allowed to substitute another subject within the regulations provided the substitution is made within the time allowed for sending in application forms.

Essay.—An essay to be written on one of several specified subjects.

English.—A paper of questions to test the understanding of English and the workmanlike use of words. optional exercise in the writing of verse will be included.

3. Present Day.—Questions on contemporary subjects, social, economic, and political. A liberal choice of questions will be given. Effective and skilful exposition will be expected.

4. Everyday Science.—In this subject such knowledge will be expected as candidates will have who have studied science intelligently at school and have since then kept their eyes open. A liberal choice of questions will be given. Attention should be paid to orderly, effective, and exact expression.

5. Auxiliary Language.—Passages dealing with history and politics may be set, but no technical matter. Verse is not excluded. Accuracy and skill in the use of English will be expected.

6. Viva Voce.—The examination will be in matters of general interest, not in matters of academic interest; it is intended to test the candidate's alertness, intelligence, and intellectual outlook. The candidate will be afforded an opportunity of furnishing the record of his life and education. On the interview and record the Commissioners judge. the value of the candidate's personality for each service for which he is entered. His value may differ for different services, and in that case the mark by which the Commissioners express their decision will differ for different services.

SECTION B.

HISTORY: Subjects 7-10.—Candidates should know something of the original authorities, of the principles of historical criticism, and of the principles and the facts of geography in relation to history. They must be prepared to

draw sketch maps.

7, 8. English History to 1660, British History 1660-1914.—The history will be taken as a whole; politics, economics, and constitution will be considered as mutually affecting each other, and all together as the outcome of the common life of the nation. Literature will not be excluded. Candidates will be expected to know so much of European history as will make the external action of this country fully intelligible and will explain those movements at home which had their beginnings abroad, e.g., the Renaissance, the Reformation, and the reactions in this country of the French Revolution. In subject 8 the outstanding incidents and movements in the history of British possessions will be included.

9, 10. European History.—Period 1, from 400 to 1494; Period 2, from 1494 to 1763; Period 3, from 1763 to 1914.

Although a fixed date is given for the beginning of a period, candidates will be expected to know in general outline how the initial position was reached. The history of the American continent, of India, and of the Far East, will be included in so far as it influences European fortunes in an important degree.

11. General Economics.—The subject will be treated as a whole, and candidates should be prepared to illustrate the theory by the facts and to analyse the facts by the help of the theory. The history of economic thought will be included.

 $E_{e}g$., a candidate desiring to offer subject No. 51 (Roman Civilization), must also offer subject No. 50 (Latin Language). † It is notified for general information that the number of marks deducted for bad handwriting may be considerable.

Economic History.—Candidates will be expected to have a general acquaintance with the early economic history of England; but special attention will be paid to the economic development of the British Isles and other portions of the Empire during the last two or three centuries, and so much knowledge of European and American conditions will be expected as is necessary for the understanding of British economic history.

13. Public Economics.—The questions will deal with the main forms of state action, central and local, in the

economic sphere, together with public finance.

14. Political Theory.—Candidates will be expected to show a knowledge of political theory and its history, political theory being understood to mean not only the theory of legislation, but also the general history of the State and its connection with kindred studies such as Ethics, Psychology, Jurisprudence, Public International Law, and Economics. Candidates will be expected to show a knowledge of original authorities.

15. Political Organization.—This will include Constitutional Forms (Representative Government, Federalism, &c.) and Public Administration, central and local. The history of institutions is not included, but candidates will be

expected to know the earlier stages from which existing institutions have directly developed.

16. Constitutional Law.—The Constitutional Law of the United Kingdom and of the British Empire, and the

Law of English Local Government.

Private Law.—The following branches of English Private Law:—The Law of Real and Personal Property

(including the Law of Succession), Contracts, and Torts.

18. Roman Law.—Roman Private Law and its history studied in connection with the Institutes of Gaius and Justinian, including the history of the legislative and judicial processes. Passages will be set for translation and comment, but credit will not be given merely for capacity to translate the texts.

 International Law.—Public International Law.
 Moral Philosophy.—The history of the subject will be included. Candidates will have an opportunity of showing their strength either in Ancient Philosophy or in Modern Philosophy.

21. Metaphysics.—As for Moral Philosophy.

22. Logic.—The subject will be interpreted in a wide sense. Epistemology in its bearing on logical problems will be included, together with Formal Logic and Scientific Method. Questions may be set on Mathematical Logic, i.e., on the Logic of Mathematics, Symbolic Logic, and the Logic of Probability; and also on the history of Logic. considerable choice of questions will be allowed.

23. Psychology.—Questions on the history of the subject may be included.

24. Experimental Psychology.—A candidate who desires to offer this subject must produce evidence satisfactory to the Civil Service Commissioners of laboratory training in an institution of university rank.

MATHEMATICS: Subjects 25-28.—The use of the slide-rule and of mathematical tables will be allowed.

25. Lower Pure Mathematics.—Geometry of two and of three dimensions according to Eurlid (synthetic geometry), to Descartes (analytical geometry), and to Monge (descriptive geometry, dealing with three-dimensional figures by the use of plan and elevation). The method of vectors including scalar and vector products, with applications. Only the main properties of conics and quadrics, including those of poles, polars and polar planes, are expected.

Algebra: Complex numbers; uniformly converging infinite series; the elements of the theory of equations, including the numerical solution of algebraic equations, but not including the formal solution of the cubic and

quartic.

Infinitesimal calculus of real variables to partial differentiation and multiple integrals, with applications to geometry. Candidates should be able to deal with the types of differential equations occurring in elementary mechanics.

The proof of Taylor's series will not be required.

No great skill will be expected in solving complicated problems of an elementary nature. The questions will involve the use of mathematical instruments.

26. Higher Pure Mathematics.—Lower Pure Mathematics together with—

The geometry of curves and surfaces. Tensor calculus.

Elementary analysis, including simple functions of a complex variable and contour integration.

Differential equations in one independent variable. Elementary treatment of partial differential equations, with special reference to the differential equations of mathematical physics. Existence theorems are excluded.

Mathematical theory of probability, including theory of errors, method of least squares, curve fitting, and

Calculus of finite differences, including numerical integration and summation and linear difference equations.

A considerable choice of questions will be allowed, so that full marks may be obtained by covering about half the

range stated.

Lower Applied Mathematics.—Statics, hydrostatics, dynamics, elementary theory of electricity and magnetism including the induction of currents. Questions will be of an elementary character, but will not be confined to two dimensions; they will involve the use of the calculus. Candidates are free to use differential equations, but a knowledge thereof will not be necessary to answer the questions. Attention will be paid to problems which arise naturally and to general principles; artificial problems will be avoided. The questions will involve the use of mathematical instruments.

28. Higher Applied Mathematics.—Lower Applied Mathematics together with-

Statics to a more advanced stage, including graphical treatment. Dynamics to the equations of Euler and Lagrange and including the theory of the vibration of strings and other simple systems.

Hydrodynamics, including the elementary theory of the motion of solids through a liquid, surface waves, and vibrations in gases.

Elasticity, including the elements of the vibrations of rods, plates, and bars.

Electricity and Magnetism.

Thermodynamics, kinetic theory of gases, radiation.

A considerable choice of questions will be allowed, so that full marks may be obtained by covering about half the range stated.

29. Astronomy.—Geometrical optics will be included.

A candidate who desires to offer this subject must produce evidence satisfactory to the Civil Service Commissioners

of practical training in an observatory.

30. Statistics.—Frequency distributions, averages, percentiles, and simple methods of measuring dispersion; graphic methods; elementary treatment of qualitative data, e.g., investigation of association by comparison of ratios, consistency of data: the practice of the simplest graphic and algebraic methods of interpolation.

Practical methods used in the analysis and interpretation of statistics of prices, wages and incomes, trade, transport, production, and consumption, education, &c.; the more elementary methods of dealing with population and vital statistics; miscellaneous methods used in handling statistics of experiments or observations.

Elements of modern mathematical theory of statistics:—Frequency curves and the mathematical representation of groups generally; accuracy of sampling as affecting averages, percentages, the standard deviation; significance of observed differences between averages of groups, &c.; the theory of correlation for two variables.

NATURAL SCIENCE: Subjects 31-42.—The standard of the higher division of a science will be that which is required in the main subject for an honours degree at the universities. The standard for the lower division of a science will be that required in a subject subsidiary to the main subject whether required at the final degree examination or at a preceding examination.

A candidate who desires to offer a science must produce evidence satisfactory to the Civil Service Commissioners of laboratory training in that science in an institution of university rank; the period of training required is one academic year, whether the candidate offers the higher division of the science or the lower division or both divisions.

Lower Botany. Vegetable Physiology will be included in each division. Higher Botany. 36.

Lower Geology. 37. Mineralogy will be included in each division.

Higher Geology. Strength of materials; theory of structures; mechanism and dynamics of machines; heat and thermodynamics; surveying; hydraulics, including hydraulic machines; electricity and magnetism.

The subject will be treated in a general manner and the questions will be confined to the more elementary parts of the subject. The candidate will be expected to be familiar with graphical methods and to have some skill in mechanical drawing.

A candidate who desires to offer Engineering must produce evidence satisfactory to the Civil Service Commissioners

of training for at least one academic year in an institution of university rank.

44. Geography.—Geography as understood in the universities, not excluding topics which concern geography jointly with other subjects such as economics, history, physics, botany, and geology. There will be a practical test which will necessitate a knowledge of cartographical methods and notations, and for this test drawing instruments may be required.

A candidate who desires to offer this subject must produce evidence satisfactory to the Civil Service Commissioners

of training for at least one academic year in an institution of university rank.

General Anthropology.—Primitive culture in its various aspects; knowledge and technique, economic pursuits (food collecting, hunting, fishing, domestication of animals, agriculture); the general scheme of primitive social organization; early religion and magic, mythology, beliefs, rituals and ceremonial. Candidates will be expected to show some knowledge of the customs, institutions, and beliefs of living races of rude culture rather than knowledge of prehistory, archaeology, or evolutional or historical conjectures.

46. Special Anthropology.—Candidates will choose between Social Anthropology and Physical Anthropology.

Social Anthropology.—A fuller knowledge of primitive social organization will be here expected: the tribe, the village community, kinship grouping, and the family. Study of the manner in which law works among primitive people and of their forms of administering justice. The economic organization of the primary pursuits and industries; people and of their forms of administering justice. The economic organization of the primary pursuits and moustries; the types of distribution, exchange, and trade. Exchange and the beginnings of currency. Adjustments of European economic systems, laws and morality to races on an earlier level or of a different type of culture. Early forms of magical and religious belief and ritual. The relation between faith and knowledge in primitive societies.

Physical Anthropology.—Physical Anthropology, Prehistoric Archaeology, and Technology. Candidates will be expected to have such knowledge as may be acquired by laboratory and museum work, consisting mainly in the handling and study of specimens and exhibits. The subject will be treated with special, but not exclusive, reference to peoples

of rude culture, including prehistoric civilizations.

A candidate who desires to offer this subject must produce evidence satisfactory to the Civil Service Commissioners of training in an institution of university rank.

47. Agriculture.—Agricultural chemistry, agricultural botany, and agricultural zoology will be included.

A candidate who desires to offer this subject must produce evidence satisfactory to the Civil Service Commissioners

of training in an approved institution. 48, 49. English Literature.—Period 1, from 1350 to 1700; Period 2, from 1660 to 1914.

Candidates should be prepared to show a first-hand knowledge of some of the works of the following authors and of their place in the history of their country :-

Questions on other writers will not be excluded, but, on the whole, the questions will be directed to the best-known authors and their best-known works. Candidates should know so much of the history as is necessary to understand the literature in its relation to other activities of the nation.

Questions will not be set on the history of the language before Chaucer, nor, in general, on its morphological or phonological changes since his time; the history of workmanship, style, and prosody will not be excluded.

CIVILIZATIONS AND LANGUAGES: Subjects 50-67.—In these the civilization subject associated with a language

can be taken only by candidates who also offer themselves for examination in the language itself.

can be taken only by candidates who also offer themselves for examination in the language itself.

In the questions on civilization, history, and literature will, as far as possible, be brought into close relation. In history, candidates will be expected to show a knowledge of the original authorities. They must also be prepared to answer questions on historical geography, and to draw sketch maps. The questions on literature will require first-hand knowledge of the authors; and the authors dealt with will be those which candidates ought to have read. Passages of literature may be set for comment on matters of social, political, legal, or other historical importance. Questions on philology and the older forms of the languages may be set, but will not be compulsory. In the question papers on civilization, condidates will not be required to write their answers in the foreign language. tion, candidates will not be required to write their answers in the foreign language.

In the conversation test importance is attached to pronunciation. The study of phonetics is an important aid to correctness of pronunciation, and candidates who take modern languages will be expected to have studied phonetics

in connection with the language or languages taken.

50. Latin Language.—Translation and prose or verse composition. The composition paper will be so arranged that candidates may confine themselves to prose composition or to verse composition or, if they prefer, may take some prose and some verse.

Roman Civilization.—Roman History and Latin Literature. The outlines of the history and development down to 180 A.D. should be known; but the main stress will be laid on the period 133 B.C. to 117 A.D.

52. Greek Language.—As for Latin.

Greek Civilization.—Greek History and Literature. In history the main stress will be on the period 510 B.C. 53. to 323 B.C.

French Language.—Translation, free composition, set composition, and conversation. 54.

French Civilization.—French History and Literature. The outlines of the history and development prior to 1589 should be known; the period from 1589 to 1660 in somewhat more detail; but the main stress will be on the period from 1660 to the present day.

German Language.—As for French.

German Civilization.—German History and Literature. Candidates should know in outline the history of the Medieval Empire, of the growth of the German cities, of the Reformation in Germany, and of the Thirty Years War; but the main stress will be on the period from the accession of Frederick the Great to the present day.

Spanish, Italian, Language.—As for French.

Spanish Civilization.—Spanish History and Literature. In history the main stress will be on the periods from the Union of Castile and Aragon under Ferdinand and Isabella to the liberation of the Netherlands, and again from 1800 to the present day.

Italian Civilization.—Italian History and Literature. In history the main stress will be on the 15th century and. the first half of the 16th century, and again on the period from 1789 to the present day. Sufficient should be known of the earlier period to understand the position of the Pope and the Emperor in Italy, the rise of the towns, and the position of Dante in history.

60. Russian Language.—As for French.
61. Russian Civilization.—Russian History and Literature. Something should be known of the history since the accession of Peter the Great, but the main stress will be on the period from 1800 to the present day. Only the broadest outlines of the history prior to Peter the Great will be required.

62. Arabic Language.—Translation, frae composition, set composition, conversation. The examination will be

in the modern language.

63. Arabic Civilization .- Arabic History and Literature. The main stress in both history and literature will be on the period from the middle of the 6th century A.D. to the middle of the 13th century A.D.

Persian Language.—Translation, free composition, set composition, conversation. The examination will be

in the modern language.

65. Persian Civilization.—Persian History and Literature. The main stress in both history and literature will be on the period 1000 A.D. to 1500 A.D. Candidates will be expected to have a general knowledge of the history of Persia before 1000 A.D. and from 1500 A.D. to the present time.

The following applies only to Candidates for the Indian Civil Service:

Sanskrit Language.—Translation, prose composition, and questions on Vedic and Sanskrit grammar. Both Vedic and classical Sanskrit passages will be set for translation; composition will be required inclassical Sanskrit alone 67. Sanskrit Civilization.—Sanskrit literature and the history of the civilization and thought of India from the Vedic period to A.D. 1200.

Procedure.

Immediately the results of the examination are known, each successful candidate will be summoned to attend at the Civil Service Commission to be medically examined and to state their choice among the services open to them and among the various Departments, Provinces, or Colonies. That statement of choice is irrevocable.

Evidence of Age.

A candidate born in the United Kingdom must not send in a birth certificate with this form, but must be prepared to produce it when required.

A European or Anglo-Indian who was born in India must be prepared to produce when required a certificate of baptism from the district in which he or she was baptized. If this does not also mention the date of birth it must be accompanied by a statutory declaration by one of the candidate's parents, stating the date and place of birth.

An Indian born in India must send in with this form a certificate under Government of India Notification No. 1,114 of September 12, 1918. If the candidate's family is resident in British India the certificate must be signed by the Secretary to the Government of their province or by the Commissioner of their division. If they reside in an Indian State it must be signed by the highest political officer accredited to that State.

Fees are not to be forwarded by candidates. Instructions respecting the manner of payment of the fee prescribed (£8), and respecting the time and place of the examination, will be sent to candidates before the examination.

In the circumstances stated the substitute for the vernacular language for a One-year Probationer is British History; for a Two-year Probationer it is British History at the Intermediate Examination and European History at the

Final Examination.

The Civil Service Commissioners will in each case decide whether a candidate is to study the principal vernacular

or the substituted subject or subjects.

(9) The ordinary session of the Final Examination for the testing of riding will take place in advance of the rest of the Final Examination, and a special session will when necessary be held at a later date or the benefit of any candidate who may have failed at the ordinary session.

Candidates who at the ordinary session satisfy the Commissioners that they are sufficiently at home in the saddle for the efficient performance of all duties required o members of the Indian Civil Service will be awarded marks ranging

between 101 and 200 according to the degree of proficiency displayed.

Candidates who at the ordinary session fall short of this adequate proficiency, but show such minimum proficiency as is evidence that with a moderate amount of practice they can attain full proficiency, will receive marks ranging between 1 and 100; they will be allowed to proceed to India and will on their arrival there be subjected to such further tests in riding as may be prescribed by their Local Government, and shall receive no increase to their initial salary until they have

passed such tests to the satisfaction of that Government.

Any candidate who at the ordinary session fails to show a minimum proficiency will be examined again at a special session. If he then attains adequate proficiency he will not be subjected to further tests in India. If he attains minimum proficiency he will be allowed to proceed to India under the same condition as if he had attained minimum proficiency at the ordinary session. No credit in marks will be given for any performance at a special session.

Probationers may also be examined in riding at such time or times as the Commissioners may appoint during the

course of the probationary period.

A candidate who fails at the end of the period of probation to satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners that he has reached the minimum standard of proficiency in riding will be liable to have his name removed from the list of selected candidates.

(10) Such deductions as the Civil Service Commissioners may consider necessary will be made from the marks assigned to candidates at the Intermediate and Final Examinations in order to secure that no credit is allowed for merely

superficial knowledge.

(11) The Civil Service Commissioners will prepare lists of the candidates in order of merit; the order for the oneyear probationers being based on the sum of the marks obtained by the candidates at the Open Competitive and Final Examinations, the order for the two-year probationers being based on the sum of the marks obtained by the candidates at the Intermediate and Final Examinations.

(12) The selected candidates whose performance in the compulsory subjects of the Final Examination is such as to satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners, and who have also satisfied the Commissioners of their eligibility in respect of nationality, age, health, character, and conduct during the period of probation, shall be certified by the Commissioners to be entitled to be appointed to the Indian Civil Service, provided that they shall comply with the regulations in force,

at the time, for that Service.

(13) If any candidate is prevented by sickness or any other adequate cause from attending the Final Examination, the Commissioners may, with the concurrence of the Secretary of State for India in Council, allow him to appear at the Final Examination to be held in the following year, or at a special examination. A selected candidate absent for such adequate cause from the Intermediate Examination may, under similar conditions, be allowed to appear at the Intermediate Examination a year later or at a special examination, or, may be excused the Intermediate Examination and allowed to appear for the Final Examination in regular course.

Any candidate who at the Intermediate Examination shall appear to have wilfully neglected his studies, or to be physically incapacitated for pursuing the prescribed course of training, will be liable to have his name removed from the

list of selected candidates.

Announcements made by the Civil Service Commissioners with the authority of the Secretary of State for India in Council:

(i.) Selected candidates will be allotted to the various provinces upon a consideration of all the circumstances including their own wishes; but the requirements of the Public Service will rank before every other consideration.

(ii.) An allowance of £300 a year, or, in the case of selected candidates possessing an Indian domicile, an allowance of £350 a year will be given to any candidate who passes his probation at one of the Universities or other Institutions that have been approved for the purpose by the Secretary of State for India in Council.

In the case of selected candidates on probation for one year the allowance will be payable in four equal instalments on the following dates respectively: December 24 after his selection, March 25, June 25, and after signature of covenant

on appointment to the Service.

In the case of selected candidates on probation for two years the allowance will be payable in eight equal instalments, the first on December 24 after selection, the second to the seventh on the six following quarter days, and the eighth

after signature of covenant on appointment to the Service.

The payment of the various instalments of the allowance except the final instalment, and, in the case of the twoyear probationers, the instalment payable at the end of the first year of probation, will be conditional on the receipt by the Secretary of State through the Civil Service Commissioners of a certificate that the candidate has fulfilled up to date the requirements of the authorities and shown satisfactory conduct at the approved institution

If an Indian Government scholar becomes a selected candidate for the Indian Civil Service, his scholarship stipend shall cease to be paid with effect from October 1 of the year in which he becomes a selected candidate. however, provided he has executed the agreement referred to in (iv.) below, be granted on, or at any time after October 1,

an advance on account of the instalment of the allowance payable on December 24.

The whole probation must ordinarily be passed at the same institution. Migration will not be permitted except for special reasons approved by the Secretary of State.

N.B.—The Secretary of State for India gives notice that the amount of the allowances will be reconsidered in 1927, with

a view to a possible reduction with effect from the instalment payable in December, 1927.

(iii.) A First Class passage to India will be engaged for selected candidates with a view to their proceeding to

India during November following their Final Examination.

- (iv.) Each candidate will be required before receiving the first instalment of his allowance to execute an agreement binding himself and one surety jointly and severally to refund all moneys he may have received from the Secretary of State for India in the event of
 - (1) His failure to pass the Final Examination within the time prescribed by the Regulations, and to satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners of his fitness for admission to the Indian Civil Service; or
 - (2) His subsequent failure to execute the usual covenant, and to proceed to India as and when he shall be directed by the Secretary of State for India.

(v.) All candidates obtaining certificates will be also required to enter into covenants, by which, amongst other things, they will bind themselves to make such payments as under the rules and regulations for the time being in force they may be required to make for the pensions of their families. The stamps payable on these covenants amount to £1.

(vi.) Candidates appointed to the Indian Civil Service after undergoing one year's probation will be senior to these

appointed in the same year after undergoing two years' probation. The seniority of candidates of each class *inter se* will be determined by the order in which their names appear on the lists referred to in clause (ii.) of the regulations.

(vii.) Candidates who fail to satisfy the Civil Service Comissioners at the Final Examination held in any year will be definitely rejected, and will not be allowed to present themselves for re-examination, unless it shall appear to the Secretary of State in Council, after reference to the Civil Service Commissioners, that such failure is due to circumstances wholly exceptional and beyond the control of the candidate.

(viii.) "Overseas pay" will not be admissible to Indian members of the Indian Civil Service selected at Open Competitive Examinations held in London in 1925 and subsequent years.

BY-LAWS REFERRED TO.

Definitions.—In these by-laws the terms "boy," "girl," and "child" shall mean a boy or a girl or a child residing within the administrative limits of the Jaffna Urban District Council.

The term "parent" includes a guardian and any person who has the actual custody of a child.

The term "Chairman" means the Chairman of the Jaffna Urban Education District Committee elected under section 19 of Ordinance No. 1 of 1920.

The term "Code" means the Code for assisted schools for the time being sanctioned by His Excellency the Governor in Executive Council.

The term "attendance" means an attendance for the period defined by the Code as constituting a full attendance recorded in an attendance register in the manner prescribed by the Code.

The term "school" means an elementary school recognized as such by the Director of Education and shall include

the schools specified in Schedule A hereto.

The terms "adequate and suitable provision for the education of a child" and "reasonable excuse" shall bear the same meaning given to them in sub-sections (2) and (3) of section 25 of Ordinance No. 1 of 1920.

2. Parents' Obligation. - The parent of any child between the ages of 6 and 14, or in the case of Muslim and Tamil girls between the ages of 6 and 10, residing within the administrative limits of the Jaffna Urban District Council, shall cause such boy or girl to attend school unless other adequate and suitable provision has been made for the education of such boy or girl or unless there is reasonable excuse for his or her non-attendance.

Provided that (a) no boy over 8 years of age shall be compelled to attend school from any distance exceeding 2 miles from his residence; (b) no boy of less than 8 years of age shall be compelled to attend a school more than 3 mile distant from his residence; (c) no girl shall be compelled to attend a school more than 3 mile distant from her residence, or a school in which no female teacher is employed; and (e) provided always that when a child between 10 or 14 years of age, being beneficially employed to the satisfaction of the Chairman of the Urban Education District Committee has received a certificate from an Inspector of Schools that he or she has passed in Reading, Writing, and Arithmetic the 4th Standard prescribed by the Code for the time being he or she shall not be required to attend school.

- 3. Householders' Obligation.—The Chairman shall cause to be served on each householder before December 31 in every year a copy of schedule in form A showing date of birth, parents' name and residence, and name of school of all children of school-going age. It shall be the duty of every householder to fill up the same and return it within 14 days.
- No lementary school shall be kept open for the purpose of giving instruction to pupils for more than 6 hours a day including intervals for meals, &c. The hour at which school work should commence may be left to the discretion of the Manager or the Headmaster, but no school should open earlier than 8 A.M. or later than 10 A.M. The school Time Table should be approved by the Inspector of Schools.
- 5. No elementary school, shall, except with the permission of the Divisional or District Inspector of Schools, be kept open for school work on more than 6 days in a week or 22 days in the month, or on less than 200 days a year.
- 6. Penalties for Offences.—Every parent or householder who shall not observe or shall neglect or violate these by-laws or any of them shall, upon conviction, be sentenced to pay a fine not exceeding Rs. 5, and in the case of a continuing offence an additional fine not exceeding Re. 1 per day.

VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended January 22, 1927.

Births.—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 185 (1 European, 11 Burghers, 103 Sinhalese, 27 Tamils, 36 Moors, 2 Malays, and 5 Others). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on January 1, 1927, viz., 260,345) was 37·1, as against 44·5 in the preceding week, 39·3 in the corresponding week of last year, and 31·1 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 149 (1 European, 10 Burghers, 80 Sinhalese, 27 Tamils, 23 Moors, 2 Malays, and 6 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 29 8, as against 34 2 in the previous week, 35 6 in the corresponding week of last year, and 28 7 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 149 total deaths, 36 were of infants under one year of age, as against 30 in the preceding week, 46 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 32 the average for last year.

Stillbirths.—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 11.

Principal Causes of Death.—1. (a) Seventeen deaths from Pneumonia were registered, 10 in Maradana hospitals (including 2 deaths of non-residents), 2 in Kotahena North, and 1 each in St. Paul's, Maradana North, Maradana South, Slave Island, and Kollupitiya. The same number was registered in the previous week, against 18 the weekly average for last year.

- (b) Seven deaths from Bronchitis were registered, 2 in Maradana North, and 1 each in Kotahena North, Kotahena South, New Bazaar, Maradana hospital (of a non-resident), and Slave Island, as against 5 in the previous week, and 5 the weekly average for last year.
- (c) Five deaths from *Influenza* were registered, 3 in San Sebastian, and 1 each in St. Paul's and Maradana East, as against 6 in the previous week, and 6 the weekly average for last year.
- 2. Twelve deaths from *Phthisis* were registered, 9 in Maradana hospitals (including 6 deaths of non-residents), 2 in New Bazaar, and 1 in Maradana East, as against 20 in the previous week, and 11 the weekly average for last year.
- 3. (a) Six deaths from *Plague* were registered, 3 in Maradana hospitals, and 1 each in Pettah, San Sebastian, and Slave Island, as against 2 in the previous week, and nil the weekly average for last year.
- (b) Two deaths of Colombo town residents from Bubonic Plague occurred at the Infectious Diseases Hospital, Angoda, during the week.
- 4. Four deaths from *Enteric Fevel* were registered, 3 in Maradana hospitals (including 2 deaths of non-residents), and 1 in New Bazaar, as against 1 in the previous week, and 3 the weekly average for last year.
- 5. Twelve deaths were registered from Debility, 8 from Infantile Convulsions, 7 from Enteritis, 3 each from Diarrhau and Dysentery, 2 from Worms, 1 from Tetanus, and 62 from Other Causes.
- 6. Thirty nine cases of Chickenpox, 10 of Plague, 4 of Measles, and 1 of Enteric Fever were reported during the week, as against 31, 1, nil, and 1, respectively, of the preceding week.

 No case of Smallpox was reported this week, but 1 case in Fort was reported in the previous week.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 79·7°, against 79·0° in the preceding week, and 78·4° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29·895 in., against 29·868 in. in the preceding week, and 29·914 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was nil against 1·54 in. in the preceding week, and nil in the corresponding week of the previous year.

MUNICIPALITY OF KANDY.

Minutes of Proceedings of a Meeting of the Municipal Council of Kandy, held in the Town Hall, Kandy, on November 20, 1926, at 8.30 a.m., in accordance with Notice dated November 16, 1926.

Present:—Mr. R. A. G. Festing, Chairman; Mr. J. C. Ratwatte; Mr. L. H. S. Pieris; Mr. G. E. de Silva Dr. G. P. Hay; Mr. Haji M. S. Usoof Ismail; Mr. S. A. Wijayatilake; Dr. F. Keyt; and Mr. E. H. Vander Straaten.

- 1. The Minutes of Proceedings of the Meeting held on October 16, 1926, having been previously submitted to the Chairman for his approval, and a copy thereof furnished to each Member were taken as read and confirmed by the Chairman, with the addition of the words "for vegetables" after the word "water" in paragraph 5, page 3.
 - 2. The following documents were submitted:-
 - (a) Statement of receipts and disbursements from close of 1925, to October 31, 1926, on account of the Municipal Fund.

(b) Progress report of works brought up to the same date.

(c) Health Officer's report for October, 1926.

- (d) Statements of cases instituted by the several Inspectors and of work done by the Municipal Magistrate, during the month of October, 1926.
- (e) The reservoir readings for October, 1926.

Resolved that the statement (a), together with the Minutes of Proceedings of this Meeting, as required by section 83 of the Municipal Councils Ordinance, No. 6 of 1910, be forwarded to the Colonial Secretary for publication in the Government Gazette.

- 3. The following papers were laid on the table:—Reports by the several Inspectors on laundries, bakeries, dairies, standpipes, and house-service taps inspected during October, 1926.
- 4. Correspondence:—(1) Letter No. U 198 of October 22, 1926, from the Hon. the Colonial Secretary re amendment of the Municipal Councils Ordinance.

Resolved that reply be forwarded as suggested by the Chairman, urging upon Government the necessity for very early action.

(2) Letter No. U 101 of October 28, 1926, from the Hon. the Colonial Secretary, conveying decisions reached by Government on recommendations contained in the report of the Financial Relations Commission.

Resolved that the letter be referred to the Accountant for his observations.

(3) Letter No. M 78/1926 of October 29, 1926, from the Hon. the Colonial Secretary, forwarding report dated October 11, 1926, from the Assistant Director of Sanitary Services, on the sources of pollution of the Kandy lake.

Resolved that a Special Meeting of the Municipal Council be held on November 27; at 9 A.M., to consider the report.

- (4) Letter No. U 293 of November 3, 1926, from the Hon. the Colonial Secretary, nominating Mr. E. H. Vander Straaten to be a member of the Municipal Council, Kandy, for the period ending December 31, 1926, vice Mr. H. L. Groocock.—Read.
- (5) Letter No. F 394 of November, 1926, from the Hon. the Colonial Secretary, sanctioning the following payments to the widow, and two minor children of the late Pusumba, Wace Park watcher: to the widow, Rs. 50·19; to the 2 minor children, Rs. 33·46.—Read.
- (6) Letter of October 19, 1926, from the Chairman, Board of Improvement Commissioners, Kandy, requesting the Municipal Council to take over in terms of sections 49 and 59 of the Housing and Town Improvement Ordinance, No. 19 of 1915, the back lanes in Block D.

Resolved that the back lanes be taken over.

(7) Letter of October 29, 1926, from the Municipal Electrical Engineer, re testing meters and levying a fee therefor.

Resolved that the Municipal Electrical Engineer be requested to submit monthly reports, showing the number of meters tested upon complaints, and the number found to be wrong.

(8) Letter of November 1, 1916, from Messrs. Ismail & Co., asking for an extension of time, till November 30, 1926, to commence payment of the rent, for the site opposite the Victoria Commemoration buildings.

Resolved that the concession asked for be allowed. The resolution was carried by 5 to 4.

Ayes: Mr. Ratwatte, Mr. Pieris, Mr. de Silva, Mr. Ismail, and Mr. Wijayatilake.

Noes: The Chairman, Dr. Hay, Dr. Keyt, and Mr. Vander Straaten.

(9) Letter of November 6, 1926, from the Hony. Secretary, Toc H, stating that they would require the lights at the Boys' Club from 6 p.m. to 10 p.m.

Resolved that the matter lie over for the next Meeting.

- (10) Letter No. 570 of November 17, 1926, from the Chairman, Local Loans and Development Fund re loan for improvement of the Kandy water supply.—Read.
- (11) Letter of November 17, 1926, from Dr. G. W. Karunaratne, stating that he is willing to act as Medical Officer of Health on the terms offered.—Read.
- It was also resolved to reply in the affirmative to inquiry whether he will be allowed to continue his practice as at present.
- (12) Letter from the Municipal Electrical Engineer re installation of electric lights to Mr. L. de Silva's new motor garage.

Resolved that the proposal of the Municipal Electrical Engineer to run an overhead cable be sanctioned subject to approval of the Public Works Department.

5. Pursuant to notice, Mr. Wijayatilake moved—In view of the considered opinion of the Superintendent of Police, Central Province, "that the strength of the Police Force to-day is the same as that which was considered necessary, in order adequately and efficiently to cope with the Police work in Kandy town in 1920, the Force in Kandy is now dealing with twice the volume of work in minor offences alone, apart from other new and frequently recurring duties which did not

exist or existed only to a slight degree in 1920," that this Council do respectfully request His Excellency the Governor to treat Kandy as a special case, and order that steps be taken to so strengthen the Police Force in Kandy, as to enable at least a sufficient number of constables to be placed on point duty at all important junctions for the control of motor and other traffic.

The Chairman supported the resolution and suggested that the resolution be forwarded to Government with a copy of the report, on the subject from the Superintendent of Police.—This was unanimously agreed to.

- The following resolution which stood in the name of Mr. Wijayatilake was, with the leave of Council, withdrawn as the estimate asked for had been already submitted by the Superintendent of Works, for consideration with the Budget for 1927 :-
 - "That the Superintendent of Works be asked to submit an estimate for widening the dangerous curve opposite Mr. Wijenaike's house on Halloluwa road.
- (6A and 6B) The following resolutions which stood in the names of Mr. Wijayatilake and Mr. de Silva, respectively wore, with the leave of Council, withdrawn in view of the Special Meeting to be held on November 27, to consider the report of the Assistant Director of Sanitary Services on the pollution of the lake water :-
- (a) In view of the report by the Assistant Director of Sanitary Services that lake water is unfit for washing fish, &c., that the supply of lake water to the fish stalls be discontinued, and that they be supplied with reservoir water.
 - (b) That this Council do take steps to prevent the use of lake water for purposes of bathing or washing clothes.
 - 7. Papers re the sale of privilege to trade in the rice boutique and the sundry goods boutique at Mahaiyawa.

Resolved that the present tenant be allowed to continue for a further term of three years, at a rent of Rs. 65 per mensem for both boutiques.

8. Draft lease bond relating to the Municipal land to be leased to Messrs. M. Ismail & Co. Resolved that the draft be approved.

9. Draft Budget for 1927.

On the Chairman's motion the Council went into Committee.

Mr. de Silva moved, that the proposed house allowance for the Superintendent of Municipal Works, Medical Officer of Health, the Assistant Superintenendent of Municipal Works, the Accountant, and the Assistant to the Shroff, amounting to Rs. 1,947.78 be deleted. Mr. Pieris seconded.—Carried by 5 to 4.

Ayes: Mr. de Silva, Mr. Pieris, Mr. Ratwatte, Mr. Ismail, and Mr. Wijayatilake.

Noes: The Chairman, Dr. Hay, Dr. Keyt, and Mr. Vander Straaten.

On the Chairman's suggestion it was agreed to delete the item of Rs. 12,500 for the Free Library, and to ask for a loan for the erection of such a building.

It was also agreed to delete the item of Rs. 4,000 for a new barge for the lake, and to include the following estimates :-

- (1) Constructing pavements along Mosque road, opposite the market, Rs. 5,870.
- (2) Drains along Katugastota road, Rs. 4,700.
 (3) Set of cooly lines, Rs. 4,010.

As regards the estimates for the Electricity Department, it was resolved to include the following:-

- (1) Estimate for additional building at the Power Station, Rs. 3,500.
- (2) Extension of main to Katugastota, Rs. 8,000.

The Council resumed and the resolutions passed in Committee were adopted

10. Recommendations of Standing Committees:

- (1) That the eldest son and widow of the late licensee of stall No. 79/79A, be offered the licence at a premium of Rs. 100, to be paid in monthly instalments of Rs. 10.
 - (2) That the Scavenging Contractor, Katugastota, be allowed to continue for another year on the same terms.

- (3) That the premium on the security bond to be furnished by the Storekeeper, Electricity Department, be paid by the Council.
 - (4) That the sanitary service at the Toc H Boys' Club at Bogambra, be allowed free.
 - (5) That the following tenders for ferry tolls for 1927 be accepted:-

Lewella, Rs. 3,657; Halloluwa, Rs. 1,585; Gonawatta, Rs. 50; Illukmodera and Kundasale, Rs. 100 for the five years 1927-1931.

- (6) That the application from the Medical Officer of Health for an extra back lane cooly be allowed.
- (7) That the salary of the Market-keeper be raised from Rs. 960 to Rs. 1,200, by biennial increments of Rs. 60.

- (8) That the labour rates as recommended by the Superintendent of Works in his letter No. 5 of July 27, 1926,
 - (9) That the estimate of Rs. 420 · 75 for building 153 feet of drain on Katugastota-Halloluwa road be sanctioned.

- (10) That the estimate of Rs. 3,500 for an additional building at the Electric Power Station be sanctioned. Resolved that the recommendations be adopted.
- 11. To elect a member to serve on the Standing Committee on Municipal Works, vice Mr. H. L. Groocock. Mr. E. H. Vander Straaten was elected to serve on the Standing Committee on Municipal Works.
 - 12. Papers re amendment of rice regulations.

Resolved that the amendment as drafted by Mr. Vanderwall, the Council's lawyer, be adopted.

13. Mr. Ismail presented a petition from the market space and stall-holders complaining of the sales carried on by other than licensed space and stall-holders.

It was agreed to refer this to the Standing Committee on "Markets."

14. Mr. Wijayatilake presented a petition from Miss Jansz, complaining of the neglected condition of the drain between premises Nos. 112 and 113, Peradeniya road.

It was agreed to refer the petition to the Medical Officer of Health for report.

Minutes of Proceedings of a Special Meeting of the Municipal Council of Kandy, held in the Town Hall, Kandy, on November 27, 1926, at 9 a.m., to consider the report of the Assistant Director of Sanitary Services on the sources of Pollution of the Kandy Lake.

Present:—Mr. R. A. G. Festing, Chairman; Mr. J. C. Ratwatte; Mr. L. H. S. Pieris; Mr. G. E. de Silva; Dr. G. P. Hay; Mr. Haji M. S. Usoof Ismail; Mr. S. A. Wijayatilake; Dr. F. Keyt; and Mr. E. H. Vander Straaten.

The Chairman laid before the Meeting the report of the Assistant Director of Sanitary Services on the sources of pollution of the Kandy lake, which had been previously circulated to the Members.

On the motion of the Chairman, the Council went into Committee. The following resolutions were passed in Committee:—

1. Resolved that the Council is of opinion that as the lake can never be made sterile and must continue to be a source of potential danger (notwithstanding the valuable suggestions made by the Assistant Director of Sanitary Services) to any person using the water for bathing or washing purposes, the only remedy appears to be to secure an increased water supply to take the place of the lake water now being made use of, and that a scheme be considered for building a dem in the neighbourhood of Roseneath or some other suitable locality which will supply sufficient water for this purpose. Dr. Hay, with the assistance of the Provincial Surgeon, Provincial Engineer, Medical Officer of Health, and Superintendent of Municipal Works, undertook to present a report to the Municipal Council on the question. In the meantime, the Municipal Council will take such steps as it can to prevent casual pollution of the lake.

The Municipal Council desires to point out to Government that as the lake is the property of Government, the Council feels that it has a fair claim on Government for financial or other assistance in dealing with the problems connected with the lake.

2. The Superintendent of Municipal Works to give an estimate for day conservancy of the bungalows round the lake.

The Superintendent of Municipal Works to make special arrangements for the conservancy of the Garden Club premises.

3. Notices to be served for the provision of latrine accommodation for the small tenements, near the head of the lake, and along the banks of the Ampitiya stream.

Latrines for the Dorwin Estate are now being built.

- 4. The Medical Officer of Health to furnish report on the necessity for an additional latrine to take the place of the one removed from Malabar street, which was taken down, as it proved to be a nuisance.
- 5. That it be pointed out that it is not possible to close the bathing place at the Malwatte Vihare. Bathing is now restricted to the priests, and the bathing place is now kept locked.
 - 6. Market.—That the fish counters be supplied with reservoir water.

The fountain supplying reservoir water to be stopped. The Superintendent of Municipal Works to report as to how many additional taps will be required when the fountain is closed.

Reservoir water to be provided for washing tripe.

The taps as suggested to be lowered, and hose provided for washing the floors.

7. It was also resolved to thank the Assistant Director of Sanitary Services for his very valuable report. The Council resumed, and the resolutions passed in Committee were adopted.

NOW Ye that We, the Governor, in exercise of the powers vested in Us by section 6 of "The Masters Attendant's Ordinance, 1865," with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, do hereby frame and establish as from and after the 1st day of March, 1927, the port rules set forth in the schedule hereto for the Port of Galle, and do hereby cancel and revoke the port rules made from time to time for the said port and published previous to this Proclamation.

SCHEDULE.

REGULATIONS FOR THE PORT OF GALLE, CEYLON.

Masters Attendant's Ordinance, No. 6 of 1865.

Definition.—In these rules the term Master Attendant includes a Deputy or Assistant Master Attendant.

- 1. No vessel of above 100 tons shall enter the port of Galle or leave it, or move from one place to another within it, between sunset and sunrise, without the special permission of the Master Attendant.
- 2. Mail steamships or other vessels may on occasions leave the port between sunset and sunrise by permission of the Master Attendant who may give the necessary orders.

- 3. All vessels are to be berthed by the Pilot bringing them into the port, and after mooring, are required to be ready to veer each bower cable, should they be called on suddenly to do so by the Master Attendant or his deputies.
- 4. All vessels shall anchor, moor, and unmoor when and where required by the Master Attendant; all vessels in the way of others proceeding to sea shall move when required to clean a passage or channel; and all vessels shall be moved or warped from place to place as required by the Master Attendant.
- 5. Masters of vessels within the port of Galle are to give orders that main boilers are not to be blown down without previous notification to and permission from the Master Attendant.
- 6. All vessels are to ring in their jib and driver booms, and to turn in board boats' davits; vessels lying with their yards square, or with spars, or other things projecting from their sides which may occasion fouling with another vessel, will do so at their own risk, and shall remove such spars, or other things, when required by the Master Attendant.
- 7. All vessels shall, at the setting in of the south-west monsoon, about the months of May and June, send down top-gallant yards and masts, and otherwise be kept as snug as possible aloft and be prepared to slack away their stern moorings during heavy squalls, in preference to holding on until they part.
- 8. In the event of a vessel parting or bringing home her stern moorings, and there being a vessel moored to leeward of her, the slacking away of whose stern moorings would enable the weather vessels to swing clear to her bower anchors, the vessel to leeward must immediately slack away her stern moorings, and should it be necessary, and she has room, also veer away sufficient bower cable to allow the weather vessel to clear her.
- 9. Masters of vessels shall give the Master Attendant immediate notice of the loss of an anchor, but are expected to recover their own anchors.
 - 10. Vessels shall moor head and stern as soon as possible after arrival.

Stern moorings are supplied by Government at the following rates:— Rs. c.

- 11. Commanders of all vessels within the port of Galle are required to permit warps to be made fast for the purpose of assisting vessels in mooring or shifting their berths, and are to keep them fast until requested to let them go by the Pilot or efficer in charge of the vessel mooring.
- 12. All persons are prohibited from making fast any vessel, raft, timber, or other articles to any buoy, beacon, or sea mark.
- 13. No vessel not carrying a properly qualified Medical Officer shall permit any person to land, or permit any persons, except a Pilot, to board her until permission has been obtained from the Health Officer.
- 14. Vessels provided with a properly qualified Medical Officer shall not land cases of infectious disease without the knowledge and consent of the local Medical Officer of Government.
- 15. Masters of vessels shall furnish the Master Attendant and Collector of Customs with a list of all passengers arriving at, or about to embark from, the port on board their vessel.
- 16. Masters of vessels are required by law to attend the Custom House within 24 hours after their arrival and report their ships, whether bound for the port or only seeking shelter, by neglect of which they subject themselves to a penalty of Rs. 1.000.
- 17. Complaints against any of the subordinates of the Master Attendant's. Department should be made to the Master Attendant as soon as possible, in order that the complaint may be at once inquired into.
- 18. All vessels entering the port of Galle shall pay pilotage at the following rates which shall cover them both inwards and outwards:—

and so on, adding an extra charge of Rs. 7.50 for every additional 500 tons or portion thereof. A further charge of half the sanctioned rate will be levied in addition to the sanctioned rate in respect of any vessel seeking to proceed outwards, which calls a Pilot before she is ready to leave and thereby causes any delay whatsoever to-to the Pilot.

In the daytime: The following signals, numbered (1), and (2), when used or displayed together or separately, shall be deemed to be signals for a Pilot in the daytime, viz. :-

- (1) To be hoisted at the fore, the jack or other national colour usually worn by merchant ships, having round it a white border one-fifth of the breadth of the flag; or
- (2) The international code pilotage signal, indicated by P. T., or flag S.

At night: The following signals numbered (1) and (2), when used or displayed together or separately, shall be deemed to be signals for a Pilot at night, viz.

- (1) The pyrotechnic light, commonly known as a blue light, every fifteen minutes; or
- (2) A bright white light flashed or shown at short or frequent intervals just above the bulwarks for about a minute at a time.
- 19. The firing of guns or rockets or burning blue lights between the hours of sunset and sunrise are prohibited. In case of distress the following signals should

In the daytime: The following signals numbered (1), (2), and (3), when used or displayed together or separately, shall be deemed to be signals of distress in the daytime, viz. :-

1) A gun fired at intervals of about a minute.

(2) The international code signal of distress, indicated by N. C.(3) The distant signal, consisting of a square flag having either above or below it a ball or anything resembling a ball.

At night: The following signals numbered (1), (2), and (3), when used or displayed together or separately, shall be deemed to be signals of distress at night:

(1) A gun fired at intervals of about a minute.

Flames on the ship (as from a burning tar barrel, oil barrel, &c.).

- (3) Rockets or shells of any colour or description fired one at a time at short intervals.
- All vessels at anchor within the port of Galle, shall exhibit between sunset 20. and sunrise, where it can be best seen, but at a height not exceeding 20 feet above the hull, a white light in globular lantern of 8 inches in diameter, and so constructed as to show a clear, uniform, and unbroken light visible all round the horizon at a distance of at least one mile.
- 21. No boat, caree, or steam launch shall go alongside or within 50 fathoms of any vessel arriving within the harbour, until such vessel has been moored in her berth: nor, in the event of the quarantine flag flying, until such flag has been hauled down.
- No vessel, whether sailing or steam, except a native craft, shall come into or leave the harbour without a Pilot in the service of Government being on board.
- 23. No vessel within the harbour shall display at night any electric arc light, unless such light be so shaded as to throw the light on the vessel's deck only
- 24. No hawkers, touts, money changers, dhobies, bomboatmen, or dubashes, shall be allowed on board of any vessel within the port, without a permit signed by the Agent or Commander of the vessel.
- No person shall sell, supply, or convey any wine or spirituous liquors to any of the crew or to any other person on board of any vessel within the port, without the consent of the Commander of such vessel in writing.
- All boats, canoes, and kattamarams shall keep out of the course of steamers and sailing vessels entering or leaving the harbour and of the mooring boats employed in passing lines, so as not to impede or obstruct their movements.
- 27. Cargo boats shall not be contiguously alongside of any vessel in the harbour in tiers of more than four boats abreast. The tindal or person in charge of any boat or boats found lying continguously outside of the fourth boat from the vessel's side shall be liable to prosecution for breach of this rule. Provided if only one steamer is in harbour any number of boats can lie abreast.
- No cargo boat or coal boat, whether laden or empty shall be alongside of vessels in the port in such a way as to obstruct or block the approaches to or from any of the gang-way ladders, unless with the permission of the Commander.

Quarantine Regulations (Ordinance No. 3 of 1897).

29. The master of every vessel bound to any port in Ceylon and infected with cholera, yellow fever, or plague shall, when the vessel is within 3 miles of the coast of any part of Ceylon, or is within the limits of the part of Galle, cause to be hoisted

(1) At the masthead or where it can be best seen, during the whole of the time, between sunrise and sunset, a day signal consisting of a large flag of yellow and black borne quarterly; and

(2) At the peak or other conspicuous place where it can be best seen, and at a height of not less than 20 feet above the hull of the ship, during the whole of the time, between sunset and sunrise, a night signal consisting of three lights which shall be arranged at a distance of not less than 6 feet apart, in the form of an equilateral triangle, and of which the light at the apex of the triangle shall be white, and the other lights at the ends of the base of the triangle shall be red in colour.

30. No person shall leave, and no person except a Government Pilot shall go on board of any such vessel, until permission to do so is granted by the proper authority appointed under the provisions of Ordinance No. 3 of 1897, or any officer acting on his behalf.

Miscellaneous.

- * 31. No person or persons shall pick up, dive for, collect, or remove any coal which may be washed ashore or found within the limits of the port of Galle; except such person or persons as shall be duly licensed in that behalf by the Master Attendant. The Master Attendant of the port of Galle is hereby authorized and empowered to grant such licence or licences to such person or persons as he may deem fit.
- 32. No boats shall be moored to the jetties, except when actually engaged in loading or discharging cargo. No boats shall be moored between the jetties, or in the fairway leading to or from the jetties except during the period of a steamer's stay in harbour, and when such boats are actually engaged for the loading or discharge of cargo for such steamer.

No boat shall make fast their ropes to the stanchions, wooden fenders, or to any part of the jetties, except the rings and bollards provided for the purpose, and no boats shall be bound tight against or hung by the ropes to the jetties, but they shall be moored in such a manner as to allow the boats to have free play to range fore and aft on the swell.

33. No ballast, ashes, or rubbish shall be thrown overboard from any vessel or boat within the port under depth of 12 fathoms water.

The Commander of any vessel within the harbour from which any cargo shall have been dropped overboard and sunk shall report the same immediately to the Master Attendant, who will take steps to recover it. The cost of which shall be borne by the vessel from which the article was dropped overboard.

The tindal or person in charge of any boat receiving or discharging cargo alongside of any vessel shall also report to the Master Attendant all cases of cargo dropping overboard from the vessel's slings in the act of being lowered into or hoisted out of his boat as soon as possible after the occurrence.

- 34. No water for shipping purposes shall be supplied by any person to any vessel or boat within the port of Galle other than that taken from the Municipal water main at the head of the passenger jetty of the port.
- 35. It shall not be lawful for any person to use the water from the tank at watering point for any of the above purposes.
- 36. No boat, canoe, or kattamaram, except those licensed by the Master Attendant is allowed within the following limits:—
 - Line from Galle rock to Welikukka buoy, thence to Capera buoy, Matte Mada buoy, and Katta buoy, line from Gull rock to western point of Gilbert Island, but only as far as the line Matte Mada buoy-Katta buoy produced to meet it.
