The following shall be added to the by-laws of the Municipal Council of Colombo, proclaimed in Government Gazette No. 6,080 of October 20, 1905, as by-law 4A of Chapter VI., viz.:—

4A. The driver of every motor omnibus or motor lorry shall while driving keep the omnibus or lorry as near as possible to the left hand edge of the road in the direction in which the omnibus or lorry is proceeding. No driver of a motor omnibus or motor lorry shall pass or attempt to pass in the case of an omnibus, any omnibus, and, in the case of a lorry, any lorry, proceeding in the same direction as his own vehicle, unless that other vehicle is halted or travelling at less than 8 miles an hour.

Regimental Rules of the Ceylon Engineers.

PART I.

- 1. The Corps.—The Corps is serving under Ordinance No. 8 of 1910. The members are consequently subject to the provisions of that Ordinance and of amendments thereto, to the Ceylon Defence Force Regulations, and to any order which may be issued by competent authority.
- 2. Composition of Corps.—The Corps shall be composed of European and Dutch-Burgher British subjects of good character and respectability, and shall consist of enrolled soldiers.
- 3. Duties of Corps.—The Corps is maintained for the following purposes:—
 (i.) To operate, during a state of war, or the precautionary period prior to a state of war, the Defence Electric Light installations of Colombo, and such other places in Ceylon as may hereafter be provided with such installations.

(ii.) To provide the Signal Services of the Ceylon Defence Force, when called out

for active operations in Ceylon.

- (iii.) To assist, when not engaged in the duties defined in (i.) and (ii.) above, to protect the lives and property of all loyal citizens in Ceylon, in times of war, riots, or disturbances.
- 4. Commissions.—(i.) The Commanding Officer shall submit the names of members of the Corps or others for the approval of His Excellency the Governor for Commissions, in accordance with the regulations in force for the time being.

(ii.) Promotions shall ordinarily go according to seniority, but an officer shall be

liable to be superseded for cause.

- (iii.) Upon being gazetted, every officer will receive a uniform allowance of Rs. 450, and shall forthwith provide himself with all necessary uniform, accourrements, and arms, viz., Sam Browne belt, revolver with holster, prismatic compass, sword, haversack, water bottle, field glasses, and uniform as detailed in paragraph 36. On completion of his kit, a certificate shall be signed by his Commanding Officer, that the officer is in possession of the uniform, accourrements, and arms specified
- (iv.) Every officer shall also provide himself with such official books and publications as may be laid down from time to time by the Commanding Officer and published in unit orders.
- 5. Officers' Donations.—Officers on appointment or promotion, will pay the following contributions to Corps Funds:—
 - (a) Donation on appointment-

- (b) Donation on promotion.—The rate of donation, as given in (a) above, for his new rank.
- 6. Appointment of Non-Commissioned Officers.—(i.) All names of men put forward for appointments as non-commissioned officers must be forwarded by Officers Commanding Sections to the Adjutant for the approval and sanction of the Commanding Officer.
- (ii.) Any non-commissioned officer may, with the Commanding Officer's consent revert to the rank or position he may have previously held. Upon his resignation being accepted he shall return his chevron to store.

(iii.) Promotions will not necessarily be by seniority.

- (iv.) Non-commissioned officers and men wishing to qualify for promotion must pass an examination as laid down in paragraph No. 44 (ii.) Part II.
- 7. Standard of Enrolment.—The standard of enrolment shall be: height, five feet three inches; chest measurement, thirty-two inches; and physical fitness for the work. The Commanding Officer has power to accept men under standard.
- 8. Enrolment.—(i.) A candidate for enrolment must be proposed and seconded by two members of the Corps, one of whom will forward the application on prescribed official forms, duly signed by the candidate, proposer, and seconder, to the Officer Commanding a Section.

(ii.) If such candidate was at any time a soldier of another Corps, the date and cause of his leaving such other Corps must be recorded in the application and a certificate of discharge must be produced, except in the case of a transfer.

(iii.) The Officer Commanding the Corps shall have the power to refuse any application without assigning a reason.

(iv.) The Officer Commanding a Section having obtained the necessary particulars, will forward them with the application to the Adjutant for the sanction of the Commanding Officer. Applications will then be posted at Headquarters for fourteen days, and after the expiry of this period will be voted on by the members of the Corps, a 75 per cent. majority of those present at the meeting at which application is considered being necessary for election. Enrolment form will be filled up, medical certificate obtained, and the applicant will parade before the Officer Commanding and then sign the oath of allegiance before a Justice of the Peace, or before an officer of his Corps who has taken such oath of affirmation.

(v.) In the case of a candidate having previously served in the Regular or Territorial forces, his "Discharge Certificate" must be attached to his application. The certificate will be returned after inspection by the Commanding Officer.

- (vi.) If the Commanding Officer sanctions the enrolment, he shall sign the said application and the certificate of enrolment, and the applicant, after taking the oath of allegiance will be classed as a recruit.
- Agreement.—Every officer on appointment and every soldier on enrolment shall, in addition to the oath of allegiance, sign the following, viz :-
- "I hereby agree to be bound by the Regimental Rules of the Corps, of which I have received a copy, and further agree to make myself efficient for the three years following from the date of agreement.'
- 10. Responsibility of Commanding Officer .-- (i.) The Commanding Officer is, by the general provisions of the Ordinance, solely responsible for the discipline of the
- (ii.) He is empowered at any time to assemble a court of inquiry consisting usually of three officers of the Corps, for the purpose of investigating any irregularity, and assisting him in coming to a conclusion regarding the same, except in the case of a commissioned officer, or to inquire into any matter relative to the Corps.

(iii.) Any inquiry in the case of a commissioned officer will be conducted by a court convened by the Colonel Commandant Troops with the approval of His Excellency the Governor.

- 11. Issue of Uniform.—All enrolled soldiers shall be supplied with uniform of the prescribed pattern at the expense of the Corps. This uniform shall remain the property of the Corps, and if a soldier shall fail to make himself efficient and earn the capitation grant in any year, he shall be subject to the penalties set forth in Rule No. 19 (ii.).
- Arms and Accoutrements.—Arms, accoutrements, &c., shall be kept at the Headquarters of the Corps and issued when required.
- Care and Return of Government and Corps Property.-(i.) The arms and accourrements are the property of Government, and all loss or damage other than fairwear and tear must be made good at the expense of the individual who, after due inquiry, is, in the opinion of the Commanding Officer, responsible.
- (ii.) Reasonable care is required from every soldier in the custody and handling of his arms and accourrements, and it must be distinctly understood that he will be called upon to pay for any loss or damage caused by unfair usage or neglect of Government or Corps property entrusted to him. The loss or damage will be assessed by the Commanding Officer, and the amount recovered as a fine.

(iii.) In the event of the death of a soldier his accoutrements and clothing must be returned to the Corps store as soon as possible by his legal representatives

- Sanction required to take away Rifle, &c .-- No soldier shall take the Government rifle or accoutrements issued to him away from Colombo without the special written authority of the Commanding Officer. In no case must arms or accoutrements be taken out of the Colony.
- 15. Officer Commanding to arrange Return of Arms, &c.-(i.) On an enrolled soldier ceasing to belong to the Corps, the Officer Commanding, or any one whom he may depute, will see that the arms, accoutrements, uniform, &c., along with any other Government or Corps property, issued to such soldier, or for which he is responsible, are returned to the store and receipt in detail given therefor.

(ii.) In the event of uniform, &c., not being returned as directed, the Commanding Officer will summarily assess the value of such uniform and recover such value as

a fine.

- (iii.) The property of the Corps is legally vested in the Commanding Officer.
- Finance Committee.—(i.) The Commanding Officer shall appoint a Finance Committee consisting of three officers to assist him in the management of finances of the Corps, which Committee shall have power to add to its number, if required, and subject to the sanction of the Officer Commanding, three members, including the Commanding Officer, to form a quorum.

 (ii.) The abstract of the accounts, signed by two members of the Committee,

shall be prepared half-yearly, and after being duly audited shall be posted in the

Orderly Room for the information of members of the Corps.

Efficiency: (1) Efficient, and (2) Extra Efficient.—(i) The number of drills, &c., which it is compulsory for all ranks to attend, to qualify for the capitation grant, is shown in the following statements:-

First Year—Recruits.

(a) Squad or Company drills 8.

(b) Attendances for E. L. or Signal Instruction or running of Defence Electric Lights 16. (Attendances for one relief of a whole night run shall count as two parades.)

(c) Musketry. As laid down by the C. D. F. Small Arms Course annually.

The fact that a recruit has put in the above number of attendances will not necessarily qualify him as efficient. All recruits to become efficient must be passed as such by the Officer Commanding during their first year.

Second and following Years-Trained Men.

(a) Squad or Company drills 6.

- (b) Attendances for E. L. or Signal Instruction or running of Defence Electric Lights 14. (Attendances for one relief of a whole night run shall count as two parades.)
- (c) Musketry. As laid down by the C. D. F. Small Arms Course annually.

(d) Mobilization or Examination Service Practice.

- (ii.) An extra proficiency grant of Rs. 5 is allowed by Government to each soldier, provided he attends the following additional parades:
 - Two Squad or Company drills, six attendance for Electric Light Instruction or running of Defence Lights (attendances for one relief of a whole night run shall count as two parades), and King's Birthday Parade; or has qualified as Engine Driver, or Electrician, or Telephonist, or Wireless Operator, or as a Machine Gunner; or as an Officer or Non-Commissioned Officer has qualified for the next higher rank.

A soldier who has obtained leave of absence, owing to illness or other unavoidable cause, from the King's Birthday Parade, Annual Inspection, or Camp (if any) may, at the discretion of the Officer Commanding, qualify as extra proficient by attending extra drills, lectures, or practical instruction.

(iii.) An additional personal grant of Rs. 10 is allowed by Government to be made to any officer or man, who in addition to fulfilling the qualifications necessary for the extra-efficiency grant-

(a) Attends 4 Squad or Company drills, the annual camp at Diyatalawa, and King's Birthday Parade; or

(b) Has qualified as both engine driver and electrician; or

(c) Has qualified as both W/T and R/T operator, or as W/T operator and

- Lewis gunner, or as R/T operator and Lewis gunner.
- Continuous Runs.—(i.) Continuous runs with the Defence Electric Lights will take place for four nights each twice in the year. Soldiers are required to attend one of these runs or part of two runs, totalling four nights in all.

(ii.) Payment for attendance at consecutive runs will be made on the following

- (iii.) Application for leave from consecutive runs must be sent through a Section Officer to the Officer Commanding a clear week before the run takes place. Such applications must be supported by a certificate from the applicant's employer stating that he cannot be spared, or a medical certificate to the effect that the man is not fit for duty.
- 19. Penalties for Non-Efficients: Officers.—(i.) Any officer who in the annual returns of the Corps shall have been included in the list of non-efficients shall, on or before the first day of the following February, pay to the funds of the Corps a sum equal to twice the amount of the Government capitation grant which he has failed to earn. The Commanding Officer shall, however, in his discretion, have power to remit such payment in special cases.
- (ii.) Non-Commissioned Officers and Men .- A non-commissioned officer, if nonefficient, is liable, at the discretion of the Commanding Officer, to be reduced to the ranks, and further to have his name struck off the strength. An enrolled soldier who fails to earn the capitation grant for the year in which he has been enrolled or any subsequent year of his period of agreement shall pay to the Corps the amount of such capitation grant or the cost of the uniform supplied to him at the expense of the Corps, whichever is greater. The Commanding Officer shall however in his discretion have power to remit payment in special cases.

Above rules (i.) and (ii.) are subject to such special arrangements for leave out of the Colony or from prolonged illness, as may be approved by the Officer Commanding.

- 20. Penalties for Officers and Non-Commissioned Officers failing to obtain Proficiency Grant.—(i.) Officers.—Any Officer failing to qualify for extra grant for "proficiency" shall pay double the amount of that grant to the Corps Funds each
- year he fails to qualify, subject to the power of remission by the Commanding Officer.

 (ii.) Non-Commissioned Officers.—Any non-commissioned officer failing to qualify for the extra grant for "proficiency" shall pay to the Corps Funds a sum equal to the amount of that grant, subject to the power of remission by the Commanding Officer, under special circumstances
- 21. Leave.—(i.) Any enrolled soldier leaving his station for more than 7 days shall apply through the Section Commander for the necessary leave in writing for sanction of the Commanding Officer, and any further extension of leave must be applied for in a similar way, except in the case of special leave out of the Colony.

 (ii.) A soldier absent from his station for more than 7 days without leave is liable

to have his name struck off the roll of the Corps.

- 22. Resignation.—(i.) Any soldier having made himself efficient for three years and wishing to resign may do so, except when on Active Service, on complying with the following conditions:—
 - (a) Giving to the Officer Commanding fourteen days' notice in writing of his intention to claim his discharge or proceed on leave.(b) Returning to store in good order all Government and Corps property
 - b) Returning to store in good order all Government and Corps property assigned to him.
 - (c) Payment of all money due by him to the Corps.
- (ii.) A soldier resigning must obtain a receipt from the Adjutant or Company Sergeant-Major for all Government and Corps property returned by him, or he shall remain liable for the said articles or their value. The term "Corps property" shall include all articles which have been purchased out of Corps Funds, or presented to the Corps.
- 23. Reservists.—Reservists shall constitute those who have been transferred from the Active List to the Reserve by the Commanding Officer.
- 24. Change of Residence.—Any soldier changing his residental or business address shall within one week send his new address to the Officer Commanding his Section, who will inform the Adjutant, so that the necessary alterations in the nominal roll may be made.
- 25. Change of Station.—(i.) Any soldier who changes his place of residence from Colombo or its immediate vicinity shall, unless such change is only temporary and specially sanctioned by the Officer Commanding, ipso facto, cease to be a member of the Corps, and shall in all respects comply with the conditions of Regulation 22.
- (ii.) Should he, however, subsequently return to and reside in Colombo, he will be eligible for re-enrolment, and, subject to the decision of the Commanding Officer, to appointment to the rank previously held by him on vacancies occurring.
- 26. Dismissal.—When a soldier has been dismissed from the Corps, a notification showing the cause will be published in Regimental Orders. In the copy sent to the press for publication reference to the cause of dismissal should be omitted.
- 27. Correspondence, Channel of.—The proper channel of correspondence, application for leave, complaints, &c., is through the Senior Non-Commissioned Officer to the Officer Commanding the Section, to be forwarded if necessary, through the Adjutant to the Commanding Officer. Letters must not be addressed to the Commanding-Officer direct.
- 28. Books.—All warrant officers, non-commissioned officers, and men will be required to study such official books and publications as may be laid down from time to time by the Commanding Officer and published in unit orders. These books, &c., may be obtained on application to the Officer Commanding.

- 30. Section Officers.—Subalterns and sergeants appointed to the charge of a Section will be responsible for all orders and notices being duly and rapidly circulated among the men of their Section. Franked envelopes will be issued for circulation for such notices.
- 31. Orderly Officer.—(i.) An orderly officer of the week will be detailed and he will consider himself on special duty. He will attend all drills; he will see that Corps orders are carried out, and check irregularities of every description by whomsoever committed, and if necessary report them to the Adjutant.

(ii.) An orderly sergeant will be detailed weekly. He will attend all parades during his term of duty, and assist the orderly officer in the execution of his duties. He will also call the roll on every parade, and hand the same correctly filled in to the Company Sergeant-Major to be verified.

32. Corps Orders.—Corps orders will be posted at Headquarters and published when necessary in the daily papers. Soldiers must be careful to make themselves acquainted with these orders, which will usually appear in Saturday's newspaper. Any special instructions will be circulated to all the men concerned.

Section Commanders will be furnished weekly with the details of drills for the ensuing week, and it is their duty to warn each man in their Section by post card

if necessary. Such communications can be franked.

33. Discipline.—(i.) Meetings of soldiers are not to be convened for any purpose without the authority of the Commanding Officer.

(ii.) The acts of the Commanding Officer are not to be commented on, nor are particular courses of action to be recommended for his adoption, either by memorials or meetings, unless such meetings are assembled by the Commanding Officer.

(iii.) Soldiers are not, individually or collectively, to attend in uniform political meetings or demonstrations whatever, other than those officially arranged or

approved.

- 34. Newspaper Correspondence.—Unless by special permission of His Excellency the Governor, officers, non-commissioned officers, and men are forbidden to act as press correspondents, or to publish or communicate either directly or indirectly to the press any military information. If permitted to act as press correspondents, they will not use their military rank, or describe themselves as military correspondents in their published communications.
- 35. Uniform.—The strictest attention must be paid to orders directing the dress to be worn, so as to ensure uniformity.

The Ceylon Engineers will follow the dress regulations of the Royal Engineers, except as noted below.

36. The following are the orders of dress that may be ordered to be worn:—

(i.)—Officers.

(a) Review order, white:

White helmet (Wolseley pattern) with spike, chain, and badge. White jacket and overalls, black parade boots. Cross belt with black pouch, sword, belt under tunic, slings, and sword knot.

(b) Review order, khaki:

Khaki helmet with leather strap, khaki frock, service pattern, breeches, leggings, brown boots with plain toe caps. Sam Browne belt, sword in brown leather scabbard with one brace over right shoulder, and leather sword knot, lanyard and whistle.

Medals will be sworn on ceremonial occasions and at levees, otherwise medal ribbons only.

N.B.—Officers proceeding on board His Majesty's ships or foreign men-of-war to pay formal visits will do so in review order, khaki.

(c) Field service marching order:

Khaki helmet with leather strap, khaki frock, service pattern, shorts, putties and hosetops, brown boots with plain toe caps. Sam Browne belt with braces, sword in brown leather scabbard, lanyard and whistle, water bottle, khaki haversack, field glasses in brown leather case, revolver in holster, haversack over right shoulder, under belt and over sword. Water bottle over right shoulder, over everything, except rear strap under belt. Whistle lanyard round left arm under shoulder strap, into left upper pocket. Field glasses on belt, the belt passing through a strap on back of the case. Revolver on right front. Raincoat.

(d) Drill order:

Helmet, shirts, shorts, putties, hosetops, brown boots, Sam Browne belt, sword, and whistle. (Belt and sword omitted for E. L. drill.)

(e) Mess dress:

White jacket rolled collar and shoulder straps with badges of rank, blue overalls with red stripe 2 inches wide, scarlet cummerbund or white waistcoat with four regimental buttons, black tie, Wellington boots, field service cap with badge, black peak, white cover.

(ii.)—Non-Commissioned Officers and Men.

(a) Review order:

Khaki helmet, khaki frock with side pockets, shorts, putties, hosetops, brown boots without toe caps, rifle with sling, waist belt, and frog with bayonet.

(b) Field service marching order:

Khaki frock, shorts, putties, hosetops, helmet, brown boots, rifle with sling, belt, haversack, canteen, water bottle, carriers right and left, straps right and left, frog, and bayonet.

(c) Drill order:

Khaki shirts, shorts, putties, helmet, hosetops, brown boots, rifle with sling, belt, carriers right and left, straps right and left, frog, and bayonet.

(d) Working dress:

Khaki shorts and putties without hosetops, khaki shirt, brown boots, field service cap. Boiler suits can be obtained at the engine rooms.

- (e) All non-commissioned officers shall be supplied with and carry whistles. .
- (f) Mess dress (optional):

White drill shell jacket fastened by cord at collar, white trousers, black boots, black neck tie, scarlet cummerbund, Corps shoulder badges, &c.

For balls and dances only; blue trousers with red stripe 2 inches wide, pumps. The above mess dress may be obtained from the Regimental tailor by non-commissioned officers and men at their own cost.

37. Duration of Clothing—The various items of uniform issued to soldiers should be made to last for the periods noted below, otherwise they will be charged for—

Re-issue of uniform will be made to a soldier when certified by his Company Commander as having attended the number of drills and parades prescribed as the minimum to entitle him to be classed as efficient for the year.

- 38. Care of Uniform.—Soldiers are expected to take care of their uniform, and to appear in it clean and smart on parade. All old uniform (working dress excepted) must be returned into store before new uniform is issued.
- 39. Appearing in Uniform.—Soldiers appearing in uniform shall be deemed on duty. Wearing of uniform by non-commissioned officers and men, except on parade or military duty, when specially ordered or permitted, or when going to and from military duty, is prohibited. Uniform is issued for military duties only, and the practice of wearing any article of prescribed uniform on any other occasions without special sanction, or appearing partly in uniform and partly in mufti, is strictly prohibited. Soldiers infringing this order render themselves liable to a fine not exceeding Rs. 5, subject to amendment at the discretion of the Commanding Officer. Reservists are entitled to wear the uniform of the Corps.
- 40. Issue of Uniform to Non-Efficients.—Uniform may be issued to a non-efficient, if recommended by his Company Commander, on the following agreement, being signed and submitted:—
- "In now applying for my uniform, I ———, agree to make myself efficient within nine months from this date, or to pay to the Ceylon Engineers a fine of Rs. 40."

41. Saluting Officers.—(i.) Soldiers when in uniform will salute all commissioned officers whom they know to be such, whether in uniform or not, including officers of the Royal Navy, Royal Marines, and Royal Air Force.

(ii.) When a soldier in uniform passes an officer he will salute on the third pace before reaching him, and will lower the hand on the third pace after passing him. If carrying a cane, he will place it smartly under the disengaged arm, cutting away the hand before saluting.

(iii.) A soldier, if sitting when an officer approaches will rise, stand at attention, and salute; if two or more men are sitting or standing about, the Senior Non-Commissioned Officer or oldest soldier will call the whole to attention and alone will salute.

(iv.) When a soldier addresses an officer he will halt two paces from him and salute. He will also salute before withdrawing.

(v.) When appearing before an officer in a room, he will salute without removing his head dress.

- (vi.) A soldier without head dress, or when carrying anything that prevents him from saluting, will, if standing still, come to attention as an officer passes; if walking he will turn his head smartly towards the officer in passing him. A soldier when riding a bicycle will turn his head smartly towards an officer in passing him, when sitting in a rickshaw he will salute in the ordinary manner.
- 42. Recovering of Fines.—All fines and other sums of money for lost or damaged arms, accourrements, clothing, otherwise levied under these rules will be recovered summarily in the manner provided in Ordinance No. 8 of 1910, sections 21 to 25.
- 43. Infringement of these Rules.—Each member of the Corps will be provided with a copy of these rules, and ignorance of them will not be accepted as an excuse for their infringement.

44. Promotion.—(i.) Officers.—Officers will be required to pass an examination for promotion as laid down in Appendix C, Ceylon Defence Force Regulations.

- (ii.) Soldiers.—Before promotion to corporal and sergeant, soldiers will be required to undergo an oral practical examination in drill, and in the operation of the technical equipment of the Corps, the syllabus for which will be announced in Corps orders as required.
- 45. Prizes and Badges.—An examination will be held for non-commissioned officers and men in special subjects, and badges and prizes will be awarded annually.
- 46. Musketry and Rifle Practice.—(i.) All ranks will be required to qualify in such modified form of the general musketry course as may from time to time be prescribed for the Corps.

(ii.) Rifle practice will be carried out monthly at local Ceylon Defence Force Rifle Ranges on days named in Regimental orders, and all ranks are directed to make a point of attending on as many occasions as possible.

(iii.) Members of the Reserve List will fire an annual course of musketry as laid

down by the Commandant, Ceylon Defence Force.

Government Scholarship in Printing and Allied Trades.

A Government Scholarship of the annual value of £240, tenable for three years, together with an outfit allowance of £50 and a free second class passage to proceed to England, will be awarded from time to time as necessity arises for the purpose of studying Printing and Allied Trades at a London School of Printing.

A candidate to be eligible for this Scholarship—

(1) Must be of Ceylonese parentage

(2) Must have been resident in the Island for the last five years.

(3) Must have passed the Matriculation Examination of the London University or a higher examination.
(4) Must not have completed his 25th year on the date of commencement of the preliminary training referred to in paragraph 2 below.

(5) Must undergo a strict medical examination by a Government Medical Officer as to physical fitness to pursue a course in Printing, Binding, and Allied Trades in England.

- 2. The selected candidate will be required to enter the Government Printing Works, Colombo, and undergo a preliminary training for at least two years, during which period he will receive a monthly allowance of Rs. 50. If during this preliminary training the candidate has shown aptitude for the work and his general conduct has been satisfactory he will then be sent to England for a period of three years for training at one of the London Schools of Printing subject to the further conditions prescribed below.
 - 3. Rules applicable to the holder of a Government Scholarship in Printing and Allied Trades:—

(a) The holder will be provided with a free second class passage to England.

- (b) The holder on arrival in England shall report himself immediately to the Director of Colonial Scholars, 4, Millbank, Westminster, London S.W.1, and shall carry out all instructions which he may receive from time to time, through the Director in regard to his work.
- (c) The holder shall transmit quarterly to the Director of Colonial Scholars a certificate signed by the Principal of the School of Printing or other authority under whom he is working, showing that his conduct and progress have been satisfactory. He will further be required to keep a concise diary of his work to be submitted to the Director as the latter may require.
- (d) The holder shall give a written undertaking that he will devote himself exclusively to the course of training laid down for him, that he will do whatever work it may involve, and that he will comply with whatever instructions he may receive.
- (e) A holder will forfeit his Scholarship who, not being disabled by illness or prevented by any other cause which the Director of Colonial Scholars may consider sufficient, fails to comply with the rules herein set forth. A Scholarship may be terminated at any time if a scholar fails in health or conduct or if he neglects his studies.
- (f) On the expiration of the Scholarship or in the event of the Scholarship being terminated owing to ill-health, the holder will be provided with a free second class passage to Ceylon. If a Scholarship is forfeited, or if it be resigned before completion of its term, or if the holder of it, on completion of its term, declines to return to Ceylon, when instructed to do so, he will lose his claim to a free passage back to Ceylon.
- (g) The medical expenses of the holder will be paid by Government in cases recommended by the Director of Colonial Scholars, but the total sum which will be paid on this account is limited to £50.
- (h) The parent or guardian of the holder will be required to execute a bond for an amount of not less than Rs. 1,000 to be utilized to meet medical expenses in excess of £50 which are considered to be necessary by the Director of Colonial Scholars. The Secretary of State may at any time order the return to Ceylon of the holder on the recommendation of the Medical Advisers to the Colonial Office.
- (i) The grant of the Scholarship will not entitle the holder, on completion of his course to an appointment in Government service. He will, however, be required to give an undertaking that after completion of his training in England, he will return to Ceylon, as and when required by the Director of Colonial Scholars, and will report himself to the Government Printer, Colombo, and, if so required, will serve the Government of Ceylon for a term of seven years in any post in the Ceylon Government Printing Works, provided that nothing in this rule shall require the holder to accept a post carrying an initial salary of less than Rs. 250 per mensem.

To ensure the observance of this condition the scholar's father or guardian must execute a bond providing for a refund to the Ceylon Government of the cost of training in England, including

the cost of passages.

By-LAWS REFERRED TO.

- No vehicle licensed for hire shall ply for hire except from an appointed stand. The owner or driver of such a vehicle, who permits the same to ply for hire, except from an appointed stand, shall be guilty of an offence.
- 2. No vehicle used for transporting by land passengers for hire, or reward, shall be driven about in the streets and roads within the limits of the Local Board town of Gampola, for the purpose of collecting passengers or goods, or left or permitted to remain in any public road, except for such time as shall be necessary only for loading and unloading goods and the taking up and setting down of passengers.
- 3. The Board may by Notification in at least one local newspaper and in the Ceylon Government Gazette, by beat of tom-tom, and by erection of notice boards, appoint places as public stands for licensed vehicles, and may at any time, by resolution, abolish or alter the situation of any such public stand.

Registrar-General's Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended May 14, 1927.

Births.—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 120 (2 Europeans, 10 Burghers, 55 Sinhalese, 19 Tamils, 22 Moors, 7 Malays, and 5 Others). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on January 1, 1927, viz., 260,345) was 24 °0, as against 29 °4 in the preceding week, 20 °9 in the corresponding week of last year, and 31 °1 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 148 (7 Burghers, 78 Sinhalese, 26 Tamils, 20 Moors, 5 Malays, and 12 Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per approx was 20 °6 as against 29 °9 in the province mach 26 °1 in the

Others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 29.6, as against 22.2 in the previous week, 24.1 in the corresponding week of last year, and 28.7 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 148 total deaths, 33 were of infants under one year of age, as against 22 in the preceding week, 23 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 32 the average for last year.

Stillbirths.—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 7.

Principal Causes of Death.—I (a). Twenty deaths from Pneumonia were registered, 8 in Maradana hospitals (including 2 deaths of non-residents), 3 in New Bazaar, 2 each in Kotahena North, Maradana North, and Wellawatta South, and 1 each in Kotahena South, Maradana South, and Wellawatta North, as against 14 in the previous week, and 18 the weekly average for last year.

(b) Four deaths from Influenza were registered, 1 each in St. Paul's, New Bazaar, Slave Island, and Kollupitiya,

as against 8 in the previous week, and 6 the weekly average for last year.

The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 26.4, as against 29.6 in the previous week, 21.9 in the corresponding week of last year, and 28.7 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 132 total deaths, 27 were of infants under one year of age, as against 33 in the preceding week, 27 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 32 the average for last year.

Stillbirths.—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 13.

(a) Thirty-two deaths from Pneumonia were registered, 17 in Maradana hospitals (including 6 deaths of non-residents), 4 in St. Paul's, 3 in Kotahena South, 2 in Maradana North, and 1 each in San Sebastian, Kotahena North, New Bazaar, Maradana South, Slave Island, and Wellawatta South, as against 20 in the previous week, and 18 the weekly average for last year.

(b) Seven deaths from Influenza were registered, 2 in Slave Island, and 1 each in St. Paul's, San Sebastian, New Bazaar, Maradana hospital, and Maradana South, as against 4 in the previous week, and 6 the weekly average for last year.

If any difference is found between the depôt weight and the weight ascertained after reweighing, a certificate will be issued by this department showing the actual weight at the time of reweighing, provided the buyers require such certificate for export purposes. But no allowance will be made for any shortage when making payment; the logs being sold by auction at a rate per lot and not per ton.
- 5. No timber shall be removed before payment of the full price bid, and all timber sold must be removed from the depôt within ten days of date of notification of acceptance by the Conservator of Forests of such bid, and will be at the risk of the purchasers until removed.
- 6. OTICE is hereby given that the privilege of selling fermented toddy by retail in the areas specified in the schedule hereof for the period of twelve months from October 1, 1927, to September 30, 1928, will be put up for sale by public auction on the following conditions:-

(ii.) The renter must maintain an Account Book in form Excise "D 20" at each collecting station showing the amount received from each tapper.

(iii.) The renter must show in T 22 register kept in the tavern the amount received from each collecting station designated by number and name.

(iv.) The renter must cause the morning yield of all trees to be lowered before 7.30 a.m., and removed to the proper collecting station at once. He must not allow toddy to be kept in any place except the collecting station after 0 a.m.

(v.) The renter must remove all the morning toddy at the collecting stations before 11 a.m. to the tavern and all the afternoon

toddy before 6 p.m.

- 7. No tree shall be tapped or toddy drawn therefrom for the supply of fermented toddy for sale at a tavern unless such tree shall first have been marked for this purpose in a manner prescribed by the Excise Commissioner; nor shall toddy be transported to the tavern except under cover of a pass granted by the Superintendent of Excise or the Assistant toddy be transported to the tavern except under cover of a pass granted by the Superintendent of Excise. Such pass shall set forth the name of the person who transports the toddy, and shall be issued to the grantee, who shall hand it to the person who transports the toddy. Separate passes must be issued for transport by pingo carriers from the tree topes to the collecting station, and by cart, lorry, or other vehicle from the collecting station to the
- (a) Any renter wishing to make vinegar from toddy shall obtain a vinegar licence from the Government Agent.

 Provided that the Government Agent may issue licences to non-renters on terms and subject to conditions duly approved by Government.
- (b) The holder of a vinegar licence shall store such vinegar in premises approved by the Government Agent and shall keep a true account of all toddy converted into vinegar and of all sales of vinegar in the form prescribed by the Excise

(c). Such vinegar store shall be opened at the request of any Excise Officer not below the rank of Inspector and the renter

must produce the accounts therein maintained whenever called upon.

8... The grantee, if he taps the trees and draws the toddy himself, or if he delegates the work to another person, such person shall, at the time of tapping the trees or drawing the toddy, invariably carry the licence on his person, and shall produce it forthwith on the demand of any Excise Officer or Village Headman.

9. The grantee shall have no concern or interest, direct or indirect, in the sale of arrack, or in the purchase of any

ANNEXURE A Cattle Mart Dairy.

Buttes.

Definitions.—The term "Municipal Dairy" shall mean and include the Cattle Quarantine Station and the Cattle The term "Superintendent of the Municipal Dairy" shall mean the officer appointed by the Chairman, Municipal Council, for the purposes of these rules.

1. No person, other than a dairyman or a milk vendor registered under Ordinance No. 1 of 1896, shall remove

milk from the Municipal Dairy. (Vide Gazette No. 7,490 of October 9, 1925).

2. No person, other than a registered dairyman or milk vendor, shall engage in the milking of cattle or the handling of milk vessels within the Municipal Dairy.

3. No person shall be registered as a dairyman or milk vendor unless he has been passed by the City Microbiologist as free from infectious, contagious, or loathsome disease.

4. No person shall engage in the milking of cattle or the handling of milk vessels unless his person and clothing are clean.

5. No milking of cattle within the Municipal Dairy shall be done except at such times and in such places as shall be directed by the Superintendent of the dairy.

6. No milk vessels, except such as are approved by the Superintendent of the Dairy, shall be kept or used within the dairy.

All milk drawn within the Municipal Dairy shall be taken direct from the milking place to the milk room within the Dairy, and shall be there strained in the presence of the Superintendent or some officer under the Superintendent. No cream shall be removed from, nor shall any water or other adulterant be added to any milk within the dairy,

No vessel which is not scrupulously clean shall be used for the reception or storage or transport of milk within or from the Municipal Dairy.

10. All milk vessels which have been used for the reception, storage, or transport of milk, shall immediately there-

after be thoroughly cleansed in the place provided for that purpose.

11. All milk vessels, while not in use for the reception, storage, or transport of milk, shall be kept in the room provided for that purpose.

Every registered dairyman and milk vendor within the Municipal Dairy shall be provided with a card, on 12 which shall be recorded the address of the Dairy, the date of registration, and the name of the dairyman or milk vendor.

No person other than the person named in such card shall make use of, or have in his possession, any such

All lawful orders of the Superintendent of the Dairy shall be obeyed by every registered dairyman or milk vendor within the dairy.

15. Every person who commits a breach of any of these rules shall be guilty of an offence, and shall be liable to a fine not exceeding Rs. 50 for each offence. Subject to the approval of the Chairman, he shall also be liable to cancellation of his registration and expulsion from the Dairy.

ANNEXURE B.

Report of the Works and Finance Committees on the charges brought by Mr. V. L. de Zoysa, Assessing Inspector, against Mr. C. Stewart Orr, Assessor.

The Committees sat on March 31 and April 1, for 53 hours. Messrs. Orr and de Zoysa were present and were both examined.

The Committees went fully into each issue in the memorandum of Mr. V. L. de Zoysa, dated March 2, 1927, and Mr. de Zoysa was given every opportunity to prove his disclosures. He specifically stated that they were not intended as charges against the Assessor, but were intended to indicate to the Council a more profitable method of assessment.

3. Issue 1.—Mr. Orr produced a resolution of the Council of May, 1921, in support of his action, and Mr. de Zoysa

thereon withdrew his allegations.

Issue 2 G. O. H. Buildings.—The remission was not given by the Assessor and, in fact, when consulted, he had

advised against the remission. The remission was given by the Chairman.

Spinning and Weaving Mills.-Mr. Orr explained to the Committees that his valuation was a compromise arrived at on hearing the objection by the Company's Lawyers to the previous assessment. He stated to the Committee that the area given in his report of March 22, 1927, was not, in fact, correct, but that this did not affect the compromise he had arrived at.

Miller & Co.'s Buildings.—The Committees considered in detail the comparisons put forward by Mr. de Zoysa and came to the conclusion that the assessment made by Mr. Orr was fair and reasonable in comparison with other similar

Issue 3: Parsee Burial Ground Premises.—The Committees were of the opinion that the burial ground including the residence of the caretaker, &c., were rightly exempted from the payment of rates.

Issues 4, 5, and 6.—The Committees considered that Mr. Orr's replies were satisfactory.

Issue 7.—This refers to the efficiency of Mr. de Zoysa's work. The Committees considered that this should be dealt with when Mr. de Zoysa's future was under consideration.

C. W. Mackie & Co.'s Tenancy at McCallum Road; Delmege, Forsyth & Co.'s Oil Tanks at Wall's Lane; and Bristol Buildings.—The Committees considered Mr. Orr's replies satisfactory.

Elphinstone and Empire Theatres.—The Committees investigated these questions in considerable detail and came

to the conclusion that Mr. Orr had justified his assessment. 4. The Committees were of opinion that Mr. de Zoysahad failed to disclose any irregularities in the assessment of

properties, or in the working of the Assessment Department, or any loss in the Council's legitimate revenue.

5. The Committees reserve their further comments on the propriety of Mr. de Zoysa's conduct until the question

of his retirement is being dealt with.

6. The Committees consider that the detailed examination of Mr. Orr's work, which they conducted, disclosed the very thorough and efficient manner in which that work had been performed, and that in the best interests of the Council and the ratepayers his services should be retained.

MUNICIPALITY OF KANDY.

The Minutes of Proceedings of a Meeting of the Municipal Council of Kandy held in the Town Hall, Kandy, on April 23, 1927, at 8.30 a.m., in accordance with notice dated April 20, 1927.

Present:—Mr. W. L. Kindersley, Chairman; Mr. J. C. Ratwatte; Mr. G. E. de Silva; Dr. G. P. Hay; Mr. Haji M. S. Usoof Ismail; Dr. F. Keyt; Mr. E. H. van der Straaten; Mr. A. V. Perera.

- 1. The minutes of proceedings of the meeting held on March 26, 1927, having been previously submitted to the Chairman for his approval, and a copy thereof furnished to each member, were taken as read and confirmed by the Chairman.
 - 2. The following documents were submitted:
 - (a) Statement of receipts and disbursements from close of 1926 to March 31, 1927, on account of the Municipal Fund.
 - (b) Progress report of works brought up to the same date.
 - (c) Health Officer's report for March, 1927.
 - (d) Statement of cases instituted by the several Inspectors and of work done by the Municipal Magistrate during the month of March, 1927.
 - (e) The reservoir readings for March, 1927.

Resolved that the statement (a), together with the minutes of proceedings of this meeting, as required by section 83 of the Municipal Council's Ordinance, No. 6 of 1910, be forwarded to the Colonial Secretary for publication in the Government Gazette.

- 3. The following papers were laid on the table :—Reports by the several Inspectors on laundries, bakeries, dairies, standpipes, and house service taps inspected during March, 1927.
- 3a. Mr. de Silva presents petition from M. Ahamado Lebbe asking for water service to premises No. 184, Trincomalee street.—Resolved that the petition be referred to the Standing Committee on Municipal Works.
- 3b. Mr. de Silva presents petition from T. Abdul Rahiman asking for water service to premises No. 249, Colombo street.—Resolved that the petition be referred to the Standing Committee on Law.
- 3c. Mr. Ratwatte presents petition from tenants of model tenements asking for a policeman and a street light.—Resolved that the potition be referred to the Medical Officer of Health for report.
- 3d. Mr. de Silva gave notice that he would move the following resolution at the next meeting of Council:—
 "That this Council do recommend to Government that the Board of Improvement Commissioners appointed in terms of section 30 of Ordinance No. 19 of 1915 be discontinued, and all the powers so vested in the said Board of Improvement Commissioners be conferred on the Municipal Council of Kandy."
- 4. To rescind resolution No. 9 passed at the meeting of Council held on January 16, 1926, and to adopt the street lines for Kandy-Haragama road from the Queen's Hotel to 2½ milepost, Kandy-Haragama road, as shown in plan dated January 21, 1927, prepared by the Provincial Engineer, Central Province (North).—Resolved that resolution No. 9 be accordingly rescinded and new street lines adopted as shown in plan dated January 21, 1927.
 - 5. Recommendations of Standing Committees:

- (1) That the offer of Rs. 650 from the market daily rents contractor for the lease of the portion of the market grounds set apart for perahera booths be accepted.—Resolved that tenders be called for.
- (2) That the Distraining Officers (W. D. C. Appuhamy, E. R. B. Kahawatte, and T. G. J. de Silva) be discontinued and two Inspectors be appointed for the work on the following salary as previously recommended:—Rs. 780 per annum rising to Rs. 1,200 per annum by annual increments of Rs. 60, with uniform and commuted travelling allowance of Rs. 300 per annum.
- (3) That Municipal Officers of Grade III., of not less than 15 years' service, who have been 5 years on the maximum of Rs. 1,200 be allowed, if their work is reported to be satisfactory, to pass the efficiency bar.—Resolved that the recommendations be referred to the Special Committee on reorganization of office.
 - (4) That the granary at Katugastota be let to V. Saverimuttu for storing estate produce at Rs. 20 per mensem.
 - (5) That a vote of Rs. 65 be obtained for fire extinguishing appliances.
 - (6) That the following estimates be sanctioned:-
 - (i.) Repairs to Roseneath bungalow, Rs. 550.
 - (ii.) Building side drains, Halloluwa road, Rs. 750.
 - (iii.) Maligawa latrine drainage, Rs. 950.
- (7) That the application for water service to premises 6c, Lady Gordon's road, be allowed.—Resolved that the recommendations be adopted.
 - 6. Report of the Colonial Auditor for the year 1926.—Tabled.

'Improved mechanical plucker for tea or the like."

Abstract.—A mechanical plucker has a platform supported on a framework and wheels so that the platform travels over the bushes and the wheels between them. One set of fixed knives and a second set which are movable transversely by suitable mechanism serve to cut the leaves, which are removed by wipers to a conveyor belt which carries them to a hopper. The mechanism can be operated electrically or by gearing to the wheels. The knives are adjustable in height.

1. A mechanical plucker for tea adapted for severing the leaf or the like from the tops of flat-topped tea bushes without damage to the same having elevated cutting or plucking means, for example, blades or sets of blades with means to operate the said cutting means or to reciprocate the blades or move the blades relatively to each other or relatively to co-operating fixed blades. To pluck or cut the leaf from the bushes, in combination with means for removing or conveying the cut or plucked leaf to a hopper, said cutting or plucking means being mounted upon a working platform or equivalent carried by a truck, carriage, or frame adapted to bridge one or more rows of tea bushes, the width between the side supports thereof and the height of the supports being sufficient to span one or more rows of tea bushes without damaging the latter, said carriage, truck, or frame being adapted to be drawn, wheeled, or propelled between and over the rows of tea bushes, and said platform being capable of ready adjustment in the vertical plane in an elevated position above the bushes, whereby the said platform and its cutting or plucking means may be moved simultaneously with its truck, carriage, or frame to travel continuously lengthwise along a row (or rows) of bushes removing the leaf or flush therefrom in said movement.

2. A mechanical plucker for tea according to claim 1, mounted on a platform, truck, or on wheels, the cutting means or blades (or sets of blades) being either geared to, or operated in conjunction with, the truck wheels, or operated by a tractor adapted to move said platform, truck, or wheels, or being manually, motor, or electrically driven, and thereby

adapted to be operated to sever the leaf from the bush.

3. A mechanical plucker for tea according to claims 1 and 2, comprising a framework mounted on wheels or skids, elevated plucking means, knives, or sets of knives, operated by gearing upon the rotation of the said wheels, or as may be desired from a tractor, or otherwise driven, and conveyor means, such as a belt, to receive the plucked leaf and deposit it in a hopper.

4. In a mechanical plucker for tea according to any of the preceding claims, the addition of a flicker, such as a rotating series of rubber-tipped sails, slats carried on revolving arms or the equivalent, to wipe the severed leaf off the

cutting means or knives on to the conveying belt.

5. In a mechanical plucker according to any of the preceding claims, elevating means whereby the level of the

cutting knives and, if desired, of the leaf hopper may be raised or lowered.

6. A mechanical plucker for tea according to claim 1, comprising a body consisting of one or more vertical side frames or pillars having bottom parts adapted to act as skids for crossing drains or uneven ground, with or without wheels, said frames or pillars being adapted to pass between the lines of bushes, or if two are used being spaced to pass on either side of a row (or rows) of tea bushes being braced together at a height above the top of said bushes, said frames or pillars being arranged to carry a working platform to overhang or straddle the line of bushes with the cutting or plucking mechanism thereon suspended therefrom at an adjustable height above the bushes.

A mechanical plucker according to any of the preceding claims but more particularly according to claim 6, the working platform being suspended centrally by flexible suspension means and the height being adjustable by means of a winch, or equivalent, whereby the cutting knives may automatically be maintained in an adjustable horizontal position independent of any tilting or canting of the remainder of the machine.

8. A mechanical plucker according to claim 7, the weight of the working platform being more or less completely

counter-ba anced for the purpose explained.

9. A mechanical plucker according to claims 6, 7, or 8, the plucking mechanism being driven electrically, for example, from a tractor unit adapted to draw the plucker.

10. A mechanical plucker according to claims 6, 7, and 8, the leaf reception hopper being also suspended from the

frame or the like, preferably in guides, and capable of adjustment as to height. 11. In a mechanical plucker according to any of the preceding claims wherein the cutting mechanism is operated from ground wheels or from other fixed driving shalt, the addition of a jockey pulley mounted on a spring actuated arm adapted to tension the main driving chain or belt from the road wheels or main driving gear wheel, or pulley, or the like to the gear wheel or pulley operating the main shaft and thereby to take up the slack in said driving chain or belt due to

variations in the elevation of the cutting knives.

variations in the elevation of the cutting knives.

12. A mechanical plucker for tea according to claim 1, comprising a working platform, truck, or frame mounted upon road or track wheels or skids, a gear wheel or equivalent fixed to one set of said wheels, or driven from a tractor, or by an electric motor on the platform, adapted to actuate through suitable gearing the remainder of the mechanism for cutting the leaf, removing it from the cutting blades to a conveyor or the like, and conveying it into a hopper, preferably combined with means for adjusting the height of the cutter blades, and, also preferably, with means for adjusting the tension in the chain or belt drive from said road wheels or fixed driving shaft if such as used.

13. A mechanical plucker for tea or the like, constructed arranged, or adapted to function, substantially as

described or substantially as described and illustrated.

Abstract.—A mineral oil consisting mainly of paraffin hydrocarbons is shaken at a temperature below 60° C. with phenol containing 5 to 10 per cent. of water. The phenol layer will have dissolved out nearly all the aromatic and unsaturated hydrocarbons and also a certain amount of paraffins and naphthenes: when the phenol layer is separated and 10 to 20 per cent. of water is added the last two separate out. Next the phenol is treated above 70° C. with 2 to 20 volumes of water, in which it dissolves leaving the aromatic and unsaturated hydrocarbons floating above. On cooling the aqueous solution of phenol below 40° C an emulsion of phenol separates, which can be purified and used again, as can also the phenolic water. The small amount of phenol remaining in the oil is separated by means of 10 per cent. caustic soda solution and from this it can be recovered.

The claims are:

A process of refining mineral oils and/or their distillates, which consists in treating the oil with pure phenol, that is carbolic acid or cresylic acid, or a mixture of these, containing 5 to 10 per cent. water, and thereafter separating and washing the mineral oil.

2. A process of refining mineal oils and/or thier distillates, as claimed in claim 1, which consists in agitating the mineral oil with phenol at a temperature below approximately 60 degrees centigrade.

3. A process of refining mineral oils and/or their distillates, as claimed in claim 1, which consists in washing the oil (after treatment) with an aqueous solution of caustic alkali, thereafter washing with water, and recovering the phenol from the alkali wash by acidification.

4. In the process of refining mineral oils and/or their distillates according to any of the preceding claims, the recovery of a portion of the mineral oil dissolved in the used phenol, which consists in adding to the used phenol water up to about a fifth of its volume with a gentle stirring at a temperature below approximately 60 degrees centigrade, and

allowing the liquid to rest a while, and then separating the upper oily layer.

5. In the process of refining mineral oils and/or their distillates according to any of the preceding claims, the recovery of the used phenol from its dissolved substances, which consists in agitating the mixture of phenol and dissolved substances, at a temperature above 70 degrees centigrade, preferably between 90 and 100 degrees centigrade, with pure or phenolic water, in such a quantity that by dissolving the phenol under treatment it will produce a solution of 15 to 20 per cent. Phenol content allowing the liquids to rest a while at the same temperature, and then separating the upper hydrocarbon layer from the lower aqueous solution of phenol—the water used being free from dissolved substances (except phenol), and particularly alcohol and alkalies or alkali phenates—thereafter cooling the aqueous solution of phenol to a temperature below approximately 40 degrees centigrade, so as to precipitate the phenol as an emulsion, and first recovering the phenol from the emulsion by centrifugal separation or filtration, and then concentrating the phenol to the original strength by distilling off the excess water; and using the phenolic water left after separation of phenol, for recovering a further quantity of the used phenol as described in this claim.

In a process of refining mineral oils and/or their distillates according to any of the preceding claims, the removal 6. In a process of renning mineral one and/or their distinates according to any of the preceding craims, the removal of adhering phenol from the hydrocarbon layer separated during recovery of the used phenol with water, as claimed and described in claim 5, by washing the same at a temperature above 70 degrees centigrade, preferably between 90 and 100 degrees centigrade, with a large volume of phenolic water, obtained after breaking the emulsion, and separation of phenol therefrom, as claimed and described in claim 5, and subsequently using the same phenolic water for recovering the used

phenol, as claimed and described in claim 5.

7. In a process of refining low-boiling fractions of mineral oil, according to claims 1, 2, 3, or 4, the recovery of the used phenol, after separation of the mineral oil, by heating the phenol to a temperature of approximately 120 degrees centigrade in a suitable still, so as to recover the dissolved substances by distillation.

8. In the recovery of phenol from the treatment of low-boiling fractions as claimed in claim 7, the subsequent treatment of the heated phenol by the process claimed in claims 4 and 5.

9. A process for refining mineral oils and/or their distillates, which consists in treating the oil according to the process claimed in claims 1 and 2, with phenol which has been recovered and concentrated according to the process claimed

"Improvements in metal rim wheels."

Abstract.—The base of the recessed channel forms an eccentric circle to the circle forming the seating for the beads of the tyre. The two circles may be tangential or may cut or not cut. The eccentricity of the channel may be hidden by an extension of the edge of the disc or by other means.

The claims are :-

1. In a wheel having a rim provided with a central recess or well for a portion of its circumference, constructing the recess and the remaining central portion of the rim so as to form a circle.

2. A wheel such as claimed in claim 1 in which the circle formed by the central portion of the rim including the recessed portion is eccentric to the circle forming the flat or seating for the beads of the tyre.

3. A wheel such as claimed in claim 2 in which the two circles are tangential to one another.

4. The combination with a wheel such as claimed in any of the preceding claims of a disc whose outer periphery is secured to the inner periphery of the central recess to form a disc wheel.

5. A disc wheel as claimed in claim 4 with the modification that the disc is extended past the contour formed by the recess of the rim so as to conform with the contour of the flat or seating for the beads.

6. A disc wheel such as claimed in claim 4 or 5 formed partially or entirely in one piece, substantially as described.

7. Metal wheels substantially as described with reference to the accompanying drawings.




