VITAL STATISTICS.

Registrar-General's Health Report of the City of Colombo for the Week ended April 10, 1926.

Births.—The total births registered in the city of Colombo in the week were 122 (1 European, 16 Burghers, 74 Sinhalese, 12 Tamils, 11 Moors, 6 Malays, and 2 others). The birth-rate per 1,000 per annum (calculated on the estimated population on January 1, 1926, viz., 257,473) was 24.7, as against 27.3 in the preceding week, 21.7 in the corresponding week of last year, and 29.9 the weekly average for last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 132 (2 Europeans, 6 Burghers, 65 Sinhalese, 24 Tamils, 23 Moors, 5 Malays, and 7 others). The death-rate per 1,000 per annum was 26.7, as against 22.9 in the previous week, 28.4 in the corresponding week of last year, and 30.3 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 132 total deaths, 28 were of infants under one year of age, as against 23 in the preceding week, 26 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 33 the average for last year.

Still Births.—The number of still births registered during the week was 8.

Principal Causes of Death.—1. (a) Twenty-five deaths from *Pneumonia* were registered, 9 in Maradana hospitals (including 4 deaths of non-residents), 7 in Slave Island, 2 each in Kotahena South and Maradana North, and 1 each in Pettah, St. Paul's, New Bazaar, Maradana South, and Kollupitiya, as against 21 in the previous week, and 18 the weekly average for last year.

(b) Five deaths from *Bronchitis* were registered, 2 in Slave Island, and 1 each in St. Paul's, Kotahena South, and New Bazaar, as against 4 in the previous week, and 5 the weekly average for last year.

(c) Four deaths from *Influenza* were registered, 1 each in St. Paul's, San Sebastian, New Bazaar, and Slave Island, as against 2 in the previous week, and 5 the weekly average for last year.

2. Sixteen deaths from *Phthisis* were registered, 7 in Maradana hospitals (including 3 deaths of non-residents), 3 in Maradana North, 2 in St. Paul's, and 1 each in Kotahena North, Kotahena South, Maradana East, and Wellawatta South, as against 6 in the previous week, and 14 the weekly average for last year.

3. Eight deaths from *Enteric Fever* were registered, 6 in Maradana hospitals (including 3 deaths of non-residents), and 1 each in St. Paul's and Wellawatta South, as against 3 in the previous week, and 6 the weekly average for last year.

4. Twelve deaths were registered from *Debility*, 11 from *Infantile Convulsions*, 3 from *Tetanus*, 2 each from *Enteritis* and *Puerperal Septicaemia*, 1 each from *Diarrhoea* and *Dysentery*, and 42 from *Other Causes*.

5. Forty-five cases of *Chickenpox* (1 in Port), 19 of *Measles*, and 9 of *Enteric Fever* were registered during the week, as against 24, 21, and 1 respectively, of the preceding week. No case of *Plague* was reported either this week or in the previous 2 weeks.

MUNICIPALITY OF COLOMBO.

Minutes of Proceedings of a General Meeting of the Municipal Council of Colombo held in the Town Hall on Wednesday, March 3, 1926, at 3 p.m.

THE Council met this day at 3 p.m., pursuant to notice dated February 24, 1926.

Present:—Mr. H. E. Newham, C.C.S., Chairman; Mr. C. P. Dias, J.P.; the Hon. Mr. N. H. M. Abdul Cader, M.L.C.; Mr. H. L. de Mel, C.B.E.; Dr. E. V. Ratnam; Mr. A. E. de Silva; Mr. G. Adamjee Lukmanjee; Mr. W. E. V. de Rooy; Mr. A. H. F. Clarke; the Hon. Mr. L. Macrae, M.L.C.; Dr. E. A. Coorey; Mr. G. W. Dodds; Dr. G. Thornton; Mr. J. S. Collett; Mr. T. G. Jayewardene, V.D., J.P.; Mr. N. R. Blande; and Mr. A. H. G. Dawson.

1. The Minutes of the General Meeting of February 3, 1926, having been previously printed, and copies thereof having been sent to each Member of Council, were taken as read.

Resolved that the Minutes of the General Meeting of February 3, 1926, be confirmed.

Before beginning the business of the Meeting, the Chairman stated that Mr. W. Philips was resigning his seat in the Council in view of his departure from the Island, and, with the permission of the Council, moved that the Council should place on record its appreciation of the services rendered to this Council and to the ratepayers of the city by Mr. W. Philips. Mr. C. P. Dias seconded.—Carried unanimously.

2. Pursuant to notice, the Hon. Mr. N. H. M. Abdul Cader, M.L.C., asked the Chairman the following questions:—

(1) What is the total amount received during the last ten years as rent for the Ferry at Mutwal? (2) Whether any licences are issued for the boat repairing yards on the Kelani river? If so, what amount has been received during the last ten years as licensing fees for the same, and as rent for storing sand, &c., on Municipal lands? (3) What amount has been expended by the Municipality for the maintenance of, and repairs to, the Mutwal Jetty during the last ten years? (4) Whether the attention of the Chairman has been drawn to the serious danger to life and limb to those crossing the river from and to Mutwal, especially during nights, (a) owing to the dilapidated condition of the Jetty, (b) owing to the necessity of their having to walk, after leaving the Jetty, through deep mud, dirt, and slush occasionally for a long distance, to reach the ferry boats, (c) for want of an adequate number of boats for the passenger traffic, both during day and night? (5) What supervision or control, if any, is exercised by the Council's officers over the renter, the boats, and the men employed by him? Is it the duty of any officer to make regular visits of inspection to the Jetty and, if so, how many times a month or year does he make such visits, and is there a record of the results of his visits? (6) Has any, and if so what, provision has been made in respect of the road now being opened by the Municipality from Vuystwyke road to the river, to continue it by the construction of a substantial Jetty long enough to reach a part of the river where there will at all times be a sufficient depth of water to admit of canoes, padda boats, and other similar crafts to embark and disembark passengers and to load and unload goods? (7) In view of the rapid silting of the southern bank of the river, and the recommendation of Mr. Harward, as part of the Colombo Flood Scheme, to gradually reclaim the land between the southern end of the sand bar and Crow Island, and Crow Island and the left bank of the river, whether the time has not come for the Council, in consultation with the Central Government and with their assistance, when necessary, to frame a large and comprehensive scheme to develop the passenger and goods traffic over, and generally to commercialize the river in and about the Mutwal Jetty and Crow Island, thus providing a calling place for padda boats alternative to Grandpass, and furnishing an easy outlet for residents in the congested areas in Mutwal to move out into cheap and healthy quarters and surroundings on the northern bank of the river?

The Chairman replied as follows:—(1) Rs. 16,150. (2) (a) No licences have been issued by the Council for keeping boat repairing yards on the Kelani river. (b) Rents received during the last ten years for all Municipal lands bordering the Kelani river amounted to Rs. 17,474.45. (3) So far as can be ascertained Rs. 2,042.78 has been spent by the Council on the Mutwal Jetty during the last ten years. (4) The Chairman is aware of complaints made in 1922, which were dealt with by Council on October 4, 1922. (5) The Council officers exercise no control over the renter, who is the lessee of the Government Agent, Western Province, who sells the rent. The Jetty is in the charge of the Works Department, and is visited by the officers of that Department from time to time. No specific record is kept of such inspections. (6) The project of reconstructing the road between Vuystwyke road and the river was undertaken only at the request of the owners of the land through which traffic had created a track in lieu of the old public track, which had been gradually abandoned. Opportunity was taken to widen the old track by adding thereto certain land surrendered free of cost for the purpose. No provision was made for building a Jetty. (7) I have consulted Mr. Harward in regard to this matter, which is mentioned in his report published as Sessional Paper XXXIII. of 1923. He informs me that as a result of the present conditions at the mouth of the Kelani river, the work of reclaiming the area referred to is being carried out by the river itself without any cost to any one. He states that the result should be and is being carefully watched, until conditions are stabilized. When this occurs it will be possible to decide how it will be desirable to develop this area.

With regard to the answer given to question No. 6, the Hon. Mr. N. H. M. Abdul Cader put the following supplementary question:—Whether any money had been voted in the last year's Budget for the improvement of this road?

The Chairman stated that he was unable to give the information then, but would inquire and inform the Hon. Mr. N. H. M. Abdul Cader.

3. Pursuant to notice, Mr. T. G. Jayewardene asked the Chairman:—As the Secretary of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals has failed to supply the information to the question asked by me at the last meeting of this Council, will the Chairman be pleased to request Government, at whose instance this Council is subsidizing the Society to the extent it is doing at present, to direct the Secretary to comply with the request?

The Chairman replied as follows:—The Government has been asked to obtain the information required.

4. Pursuant to notice, Mr. T. G. Jayewardene moved, that this Council invites the attention of Government to paragraph 63 of the report of the Commission appointed by the Governor in 1914, to inquire into the affairs of the Municipality of Colombo, and respectfully requests that the recommendation contained therein, viz., to render financial assistance to this Council, to acquire property for street improvement purposes, with which this Council expressed its concurrence at its meeting held on July 30, 1915, be given effect to. Dr. E. V. Ratnam seconded.—Carried.

5. The following motion stood in the name of Mr. N. R. Blande—That the Inspector-General of Police be invited to nominate one or two representatives of the Police Department to meet the Chairman and two Members of this Council each month in order to exchange views and discuss matters pertaining to the welfare of this city.

Mr. Blande asked for the permission of the Council to withdraw this motion.

The permission having been granted the motion was withdrawn.

Mr. C. P. Dias moved that the Council do go into Committee to consider items Nos. 6 to 12 (inclusive) on the Agenda. Mr. H. L. de Mel seconded.—Carried.

The lane being a private lane, the application will have to be dealt with under Ordinance No. 9 of 1916. The applicants and Mr. T. Leo Fernando are willing to contribute their respective shares, which amount to Rs. 595·53.

Note.—The Waterworks Engineer recommends the application in view of the past policy of the Council.—(b) Recommended.

(23) To consider :—(a) The quotations received through the Council's Agents for the supply of Fire Brigade Stores.—(a) Considered ; (b) The recommendation of the Superintendent of Fire Brigade that the following quotations be accepted—(1) Messrs. Reddaway & Co.'s quotations for item No. 1 of the schedule, (2) Messrs. Merryweather & Sons' quotations for item Nos. 2, 3, 4 and 5 of the schedule.

Note.—The total approximate cost will be £581 7s. 6d. which will at first be charged to Advance Account, Purchase of Stores, and debited to sanctioned votes when the materials are drawn from the stores.—(b) Recommended.

(24) To consider a report, dated February 5, 1926, of the Waterworks Engineer, with regard to an application for water service for No. 123/31, Skinner's Road South, recommending that the estimate of Rs. 1,280 for laying a 4-inch diameter water main for a distance of 145 yards be sanctioned.

(30) To consider a detailed estimate of Rs. 3,845·60 from the Municipal Engineer for the construction of a proposed rain water channel from railway culvert, Wellawatta, to end of built drain.

Note.—A sum of Rs. 100,000 is provided under Estimate I-89 of the 1926 Budget.—Recommended.

MUNICIPALITY OF KANDY.

Minutes of Proceedings of a Meeting of the Municipal Council of Kandy, held in the Town Hall, Kandy, on February 27, 1926, at 8.30 a.m., in accordance with Notice, dated February 23, 1926.

Present.—Hon. Mr. W. L. Kindersley, Chairman; Mr. J. C. Ratwatte; Mr. L. H. S. Pieris; Mr. G. E. de Silva; Dr. G. P. Hay; and Mr. Haji M. S. Usoof Ismail.

1. The Minutes of Proceedings of the Meeting held on January 16, 1926, having been previously submitted to the Chairman for his approval and a copy thereof furnished to each Member, were taken as read and confirmed by the Chairman.

2. The following documents were submitted :—

- Statement of receipts and disbursements from close of 1925, to January 31, 1926, on account of the Municipal Fund.
- Progress report of works brought up to the same date.
- Health Officer's report for January, 1926.
- Statements of cases instituted by the several Inspectors and of work done by the Municipal Magistrate during the month of January, 1926.
- The reservoir readings for January, 1926.

Resolved that the statement (a), together with the Minutes of Proceedings of this Meeting, as required by section 83 of the Municipal Councils Ordinance, No. 6 of 1910, be forwarded to the Colonial Secretary for publication in the *Government Gazette*.

3. The following papers were laid on the table :—Reports by the several Inspectors on laundries, bakeries, dairies, standpipes, and house-service taps inspected during January, 1926.

(a) Mr. Pieris presented petition from residents of Mapanawatura, stating that the owners are willing to give their land free for opening the Asgiriya road through Mapanawatura.

Resolved that the petition be referred to the Superintendent of Municipal Works for report.

(b) Mr. Ismail presented petition from A. S. Raja, late Supervisor of Conservancy, praying that he may be re-employed under the Council.

Resolved that the petition be circulated.

4. Correspondence :—(1) Letter No. 3 of January 22, 1926, from the Hon. the Colonial Secretary, sanctioning payment of Rs. 500 to the Kandy District Nurses' Association for the year 1926.—Read

(2) Letter No. 4 of January 23, 1926, from the Hon. the Colonial Secretary, approving the proposed amendments to the Pension Minute of the Kandy Municipality.—Read.

(3) Letter No. 5 of January 27, 1926, from the Hon. the Colonial Secretary, authorizing the Municipal Council to borrow a sum of Rs. 75,000 from the Local Loans and Development Commissioners for the purpose of building model tenements for housing the poor.—Read.

(4) Letter No. 6 of January 27, 1926, from the Hon. the Colonial Secretary, sanctioning the payment of Rs. 250 to the Lady Blake's Institution for the year 1926, for providing meals to poor children.—Read.

(5) Letter No. 7 of February 6, 1926, from the Hon. the Colonial Secretary, *re* the proposed Infectious Diseases Hospital for Kandy.—Read.

(6) Letter No. 8 of February 19, 1926, from the Hon. the Colonial Secretary, intimating that His Majesty the King has commanded that an expression of his thanks be conveyed to the Municipal Council, Kandy, for its message of sympathy with him and the Royal Family in their recent bereavement.—Read.

(7) Letter of February 10, 1926, from Mrs. F. R. Senanayake, thanking the Members of the Kandy Municipal Council for their message of sympathy with her in her recent bereavement.—Read.

(8) Letter No. 414 of February 15, 1926, from the Government Agent, Central Province, forwarding for the information of the Municipal Council a copy of letter No. 18 of January 15, 1926, from the Hon. the Colonial Secretary *re* the proposed bridge at Lewella.—Read.

(9) Letter No. 508 of February 2, 1926, from the Government Agent, Central Province, *re* acquisition of land on Hantane estate for the Kandy water supply.

Resolved that the Government Agent be asked to complete the acquisition of the 45 acres.

(10) Letter No. 854 of February 13, 1926, from the Director of Public Works asking for a remittance of Rs. 8,458·75, the Council's contribution for tarring the road surfaces of the Peradeniya-Kandy and Kandy-Katugastota roads.

Resolved that a sum of Rs. 83·75 be voted in addition to the sum of Rs. 8,375 provided in the Budget for 1926, and that the Provincial Engineer be asked to expedite the work.

(11) Letter of January 7, 1926, from the General Manager, Ceylon Government Railway, *re* the lease of land for bus stand near Kandy Railway station.

Resolved that the terms be accepted and the sum of Rs. 120 be voted as rent for the first year.

(12) Letter of January 29, 1926, from the Chairman, Education District Committee, Kandy Municipal area, requesting that the cost of maintenance of the Mahaiyawa Tamil School building be borne by the Municipal Council.

Resolved that the school building be maintained at the expense of the Council.

5. Pursuant to notice Mr. Ismail asked—In view of the present congested state of the Municipal Public Market, will the Chairman be pleased to call for a report from the Superintendent of Works on (a) the present state of the market; (b) Whether it requires immediate additional accommodation; (c) If so what accommodation could be provided, and cost of same with plans?

The Chairman stated he would call upon the Superintendent of Works to submit report and estimate as desired.

6. The following questions which stood in the name of Mr. Wijayatilleke were deferred owing to his absence from the Meeting:—

(1) Will the Chairman be pleased to table the report of the Superintendent of Works on the following motions passed by this Council several months ago:—

(a) The improvement of the road leading from Peradeniya road to the Mulgampola cemetery.

(b) The selection of a site for a public market between Mulgampola and Peradeniya, and an estimate therefor?

(2) Will the Chairman be pleased to state why certain important streets like Castle Hill street, Pavilion street, upper sections of Colombo street, and Malabar street, Colombo road, parts of Peradeniya road, and Trincomalee street, are never watered?

(3) What amount has been spent in watering the streets during January and February, 1926, and how many watering carts have been in use daily during the said period?

(4) Will the Chairman be pleased to supply the Superintendent of Works with a copy of the opinion of the Medical Officer of Health that "with a lower rainfall and the enormous increase of motor traffic during the year the streets were deep in dust which caused much public complaint. Not only is dust a nuisance, but a serious and daily increasing menace to public health. The adoption of remedial measures to this end is therefore very essential" and order him (the Superintendent of Works) to see that every important street is watered at least once a day and give up the present arrangement of attending to certain streets and sections of streets only?

7. The following motion which stood in the name of Mr. Peiris, was with the leave of Council, withdrawn:—

That in view of the reforms proposed by this Council, a Committee of this Council (in consultation with the Superintendent of Works) be appointed to divide the town into ten Electoral Districts and submit same to Government with a request to give effect to the following unanimous resolution of this Council of July 16, 1921:—

"As it is the intention of Government to defer the long expected reforms of the Constitution of the Municipal Council, until experience is gained in the working of the Local Government Ordinance, in spite of the fact that the Municipal Councils have been in existence for over half a century, that this Council do inform the Government that in their opinion, the interests of the citizens demand the immediate amending of the Municipal Councils Ordinance, giving them fuller control of their local affairs such as providing *inter alia* for an elected Chairman and substantial elected majorities, and that Government be respectfully requested to introduce legislation accordingly during the present sessions of the Legislative Council."

8. The following motion which stood in the name of Mr. Wijayatilleke was deferred owing to his absence from the Meeting:—

That this Council do request the Postmaster-General to grant a Sub-Post and Telegraph Office for Mulgampola to be located in the neighbourhood of the new Kingswood College.

9. Estimate of Rs. 26,500 for building the water-courses in Peradeniya road.—Resolved that the matter be deferred.

10. Estimate of Rs. 3,000 for extending Lady Manning's Drive.—Resolved that the estimate be passed.

11. To confirm Miss R. M. Paterina in her appointment as Municipal Midwife.—Resolved that the appointment be confirmed. The appointment to be considered non-pensionable.

12. Supplemental Budget No. 1 of 1925.—Resolved that the Budget be circulated.

13. Estimate for paving Meda-ela.—Resolved that tenders be called for, for the work.

14. Letter of February 10, 1926, from the Municipal Electrical Engineer *re* security to be furnished by him.—Resolved that the terms of the Municipal Electrical Engineer as regards security to be furnished by him be approved.

15. Draft conditions for leasing the collection of rents for Model Dwellings.—Resolved that tenders be called for as from April 1, 1926.
