In pursuance of Land Sale Regulation 59, notice is hereby given that application has been made by Walawe Sumanasara Thero, Incumbent of Swetha Bimbarama Vihare at Talgampola, and the residents of the said village, for the sale to the vihare without competition of an allotment of land called Kirinaudagodabedda alias Dehigahaudumullegoda, situated at Talgampola village, in the Talpe pattu of the Galle District, more particularly described as lot 1 in preliminary plan No. 13,247, containing in extent 1 acre 3 roods and 34 perches for the purpose of extending the temple premises by building a bana preaching hall and a library.

'ALBANIA (EXTRADITION) ORDER IN COUNCIL, 1927.

At the Court at Buckingham Palace, the 27th day of June, 1927.

THE KING'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY.

Lord President. Lord Chamberlain. Lord Colebrooke.

WHEREAS by the Extradition Acts, 1870* to 1906†, it was amongst other things enacted that, where an arrangement has been made with any foreign State with respect to the surrender to such State of any fugitive criminals, to the surrender to such State of any fugitive criminals, His Majesty may, by Order in Council, direct that the said Acts shall apply in the case of such foreign State; and that His Majesty may, by the same or any subsequent Order, limit the operation of the Order, and restrict the same to fugitive criminals who are in or suspected of being in the part of His Majesty's dominions specified in the Order, and render the operation thereof subject to such conditions, exceptions, and qualifications as may be deemed expedient:

And whereas a Treaty was concluded on the 22nd day of July, 1926, between His Majesty and the President of the Albanian Republic for the mutual extradition of fugitive criminals, which Treaty is in the terms following:

His Majesty the King of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, Emperor of India;

And His Excellency the President of the Albanian

Republic;

having determined, by common consent, to conclude a treaty for the extradition of criminals, have accordingly

named as their plenipotentiaries:
His Majesty the King of the United Kingdom of Great
Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond

the Seas, Emperor of India:

William Edmund O'Reilly, Esq., His Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary to the Albanian Republic;

And His Excellency the President of the Albanian Republic:

Monsieur Hussein Vrioni, Minister for Foreign Affairs and Minister of Justice ad interim;

Who, after having exhibited to each other their respective full powers, and found them in good and due form, have agreed upon the following articles:

ARTICLE 1.

The High Contracting Parties engaged to deliver up to each other, under certain circumstances and conditions stated in the present treaty, those persons, who being accused or convicted of any of the crimes or offence

enumerated in Article 2, committed within the jurisdiction of the one Party, shall be found within the territory of the other Party.

ARTICLE 2.

Extradition shall be reciprocally granted for the following crimes or offences:

(1) Murder (including assassination, parricide, infanticide, poisoning), or attempt or conspiracy to murder.

(2) Manslaughter,

(3) Administering drugs or using instruments with intent to procure the miscarriage of women.

Rape.

(5) Carnal knowledge, or any attempt to have carnal knowledge, of a girl under 14 years of age.

(6) Indecent assault.

(7) Kidnapping and false imprisonment.

, (8) Child stealing, including abandoning, exposing, or unlawfully detaining.

(9) Abduction.

(10) Procuration.

(11) Bigamy.

(12) Maliciously wounding or inflicting grievous bodily harm.

Assault occasioning actual bodily harm.

- (14) Threats by letter or otherwise, with intent to extort money or other things of value.
- (15) Perjury, or subornation of perjury.

(16) Arson.

- (17) Burglary or housebreaking, robbery with violence, larceny, or embezzlement.
- (18) Fraud by a bailee, banker, agent, factor, trustee, director, member, or public officer of any company, or fraudulent conversion.
- (19) Obtaining money, valuable security, or goods by false pretences; receiving any money, valuable security, or other property, knowing the same to have been stolen or feloniously obtained.

(20) (a) Counterfeiting or altering money, or bringing into circulation counterfeited or altered money.

(b) Knowingly making without lawful authority any instrument, tool, or engine adapted and intended for the counterfeiting of the coin of the realm. (21) Forgery, or uttering what is forged.

(22) Crimes against bankruptcy law.

(23) Any malicious act done with intent to endanger the safety of any persons travelling or being upon a railway.

(24) Malicious injury to property, if such offence be indictable.

(25) Piracy and other crimes or offences committed at sea against persons or things which, according to the laws of the High Contracting Parties, are extradition crimes or offences.

(26) Dealing in slaves in such manner as to constitute a crime or offence against the laws of both States.

The extradition is also to be granted for participation in any of the aforesaid crimes or offences, providing such participation be punishable by the laws of both High Contracting Parties.

Extradition may also be granted at the discretion of the State applied to in respect of any other crime or offence for which according to the law of both the High Contracting Parties for the time being in force the grant can be made.

ARTICLE 3.

Each Party reserves the right to refuse or grant the surrender of its own subjects or citizens to the other Party.

ARTICLE 4.

The extradition shall not take place if the person claimed has already been tried and discharged or punished, or is still under trial in the State applied to, for the crime or effence for which his extradition is demanded.

If the person claimed should be under examination or

If the person claimed should be under examination or under punishment in the State applied to for any other crime or offence, his extradition shall be deferred until the conclusion of the trial and the full execution of any punishment awarded to him.

ARTICLE 5.

The extradition shall not take place if, subsequently to the commission of the crime or offence or the institution of the penal prosecution or the conviction thereon, exemption from prosecution or punishment has been acquired by lapse of time, according to the laws of the State applying or applied to.

ARTICLE 6.

A fugitive criminal shall not be surrendered if the crime or offence in respect of which his surrender is demanded is one of a political character, or if he proves that the requisition for his surrender has, in fact, been made with a view to try or punish him for a crime or offence of a political character.

ARTICLE 7.

A person surrendered can in no case be kept in custody or be brought to trial in the State to which the surrender has been made for any other crime or offence, or on account of any other matters, than those for which the extradition shall have taken place, until he has been restored, or has had an opportunity of returning, to the State by which he has been surrendered.

This stipulation does not apply to crimes or offences committed after the extradition.

ARTICLE 8.

The requisition for extradition shall be made through the diplomatic agents of the High Contracting Parties respectively.

The requisition for the extradition of an accused person must be accompanied by a warrant of arrest issued by the competent authority of the State requiring the extradition, and by such evidence as, according to the laws of the place where the accused is found, would justify his arrest if the crime or offence had been committed there.

If the requisition relates to a person already convicted, it must be accompanied by the sentence of condemnation passed against the convicted person by the competent court of the State that makes the requisition for extradition.

A sentence passed in contumaciam is not to be deemed a conviction, but a person so sentenced may be dealt with as an accused person.

ARTICLE 9.

If the requisition for extradition be in accordance with the foregoing stipulations, the competent authorities of the State applied to shall proceed to the arrest of the fugitive.

ARTICLE 10.

A criminal fugitive may be apprehended under a warrant issued by any police magistrate, justice of the peace, or other competent authority in either State, on such information or complaint and such evidence, or after such proceedings, as would, in the cpinion of the authority issuing the warrant, justify the issue of a warrant if the crime or offence had been committed or the person convicted in that part of the domin ons of the two Contracting Parties in which the

magistrate, justice of the peace, or other competent authority, exercises jurisdiction. He shall, in accordance with this article, be discharged if within the term of thirty days a requisition for extradition shall not have been made by the diplomatic agent of the State claiming his extradition in accordance with the stipulations of this treaty. The same rule shall apply to the cases of persons accused or convicted of any of the crimes or offences specified in this treaty, and committed on the high seas on board any vessel of either State which may come into a port of the other.

ARTICLE 11.

The extradition shall take place only if the evidence be found sufficient, according to the laws of the State-applied to, either to justify the committal of the prisoner for trial, in case of the crime or offence had been committed in the territory of the same State, or to prove that the prisoner is the identical person convicted by the courts of the State which makes the requisition, and that the crime or offence of which he has been convicted is one in respect of which extradition could, at the time of such conviction, have been granted by the State applied to; and no criminal shall be surrendered until after the expiration of fifteen days from the date of his committal to prison to await the warrant for his surrender.

ARTICLE 12.

In the examinations which they have to make in accordance with the foregoing stipulations, the authorities of the State applied to shall admit as valid evidence the sworn depositions or the affirmations of witnesses taken in the other State, or copies thereof, and likewise the warrants and sentences issued therein, or copies thereof, and certificates of, or judicial documents stating the fact of a conviction, provided the same are authenticated as follows:—

- (1) A warrant, or copy thereof, must purport to be signed by a judge, magistrate, or officer of the other State, or purport to be certified under the hand of a judge, magistrate, or officer of the other State to be a true copy thereof, as the case may require.
- (2) Depositions or affirmations, or the copies thereof, must purport to be certified, under the hand of a judge, magistrate, or officer of the other State, to be the original depositions or affirmations, or to be true copies thereof, as the case may require.
- (3) A certificate of, or judicial document stating the fact of a conviction must purport to be certified by a judge, magistrate, or officer of the other State.
 - In every case such warrant, deposition, affirmation, copy, certificate, or judicial document must be authenticated, either by the oath of some witness, or by being sealed with the official seal of the Minister of Justice, or some other minister of the other State, or by any other mode of authentication for the time being permitted by the law of the State to which the application for extradition is made.

ARTICLE 13.

If the individual claimed by one of the High Contracting Parties in pursuance of the present treaty should be also claimed by one or several other Powers on account of other crimes or offences committed within their respective jurisdictions, his extradition shall be granted to the State whose claim is earliest in date, unless such claim is waived.

ARTICLE 14.

If sufficient evidence for the extradition be not produced within two months from the date of the apprehension of the fugitive, or within such further time as the State applied to, or the proper tribunal thereof, shall direct, the fugitive shall be set at liberty.

ARTICLE 15.

All articles seized which were in the possession of the person to be surrendered at the time of his apprehension, and any articles that may as a proof of the crime or offence shall be given up when the extradition takes place, in so far as this may be permitted by the law of the State granting the extradition.

ARTICLE 16.

Each of the High Contracting Parties shall defray the expenses occasioned by the arrest within its territories, the detention, and the conveyance to its frontier, of the persons whom it may have consented to surrender in pursuance of the present treaty.

ARTICLE 17.

The stipulations of the present traty shall be applicable, so far as the laws permit, to all His Britannic Majesty's Dominions, except to the self-governing Dominions hereinafter named—that is to say, the Dominion of Canada, the Commonwealth of Australia (including for this purpose Papua and Norfolk Island), the Dominion of New Zealand, the Union of South Africa, the Irish Free State, and Newfoundland—and India, provided always that the said stipulations shall be applicable to any cf the above-named Dominions or India in respect of which notice to that effect shall have been given on behalf of the Government of such Dominion or India by His Britannic Majesty's Representative at Durazzo, and provided also that it shall be competent for either of the High Contracting Parties to terminate separately the application of this treaty to any of the above-named Dominions or India by a notice to that effect not exceeding one year and not less than six months.

ARTICLE 18.

The requisition for the surrender of a fugitive criminal, who has taken refuge in any of His Britannic Majesty's self-governing Dominions, Colonies, or Possessions to which this treaty applies, shall be made to the Governor-General, Governor, or chief authority, of such self-governing, Dominion, Colony, or Possession by the appropriate consular officer of Albania.

Such requisition may be dealt with, subject always, as nearly as may be, and so far as the law of such self-governing Dominion, Colony, or Possession will allow, to the provisions of this treaty, by the competent authorities of such selfgoverning Dominion, Colony, or Possession, provided, nevertheless, that if an order for the committal of the fugitive criminal to prison to await surrender shall be made, the said Governor-General, Governor, or chief authority may instead of issuing a warrant for the surrender of such fugitive refer the matter to His Britannic Majesty's

Requisitions for the surrender of a fugitive criminal emanating from any self-governing Dominion, Colony, or Possession of His Britannic Majesty shall be governed, as far as possible, by the rules laid down in the preceding articles of the present treaty.

ARTICLE 19.

It is understood that the stipulations of the two preceding articles apply in the same manner as if they were Possessions of His Britannic Majesty, to the following British Protectorates, that is to say, the Bechuanaland Protectorate, Gambia Protectorate, Kenya Protectorate, Nigeria Protectorate, Northern Rhodesia, Northern Territories of the Gold Coast, Nyasaland, Sierra Leone Protectorate, Solomon Islands Protectorate, Somaliland Protectorate, Swaziland, Uganda Protectorate, and Zanzibar, and to the following territories in respect of which a mandate on behalf of the League of Nations has been accepted by His Britannic Majesty, that is to say, British Cameroons, British Togoland, the Tanganyika Territory, and Palestine.

It is also understood that if, after the signature of the present treaty, it is considered advisable to extend its provisions to any British protectorates other than those

mentioned above, or to any British-protected State, or to any territory in respect of which a mandate on behalf of the League of Nations has been accepted by His Britannic Majesty other than those mentioned above including the territories in respect of which mandates are being exercised on behalf of His Britannic Majesty by the Government of the Commonwealth of Australia, the Government of the Dominion of New Zealand, and the Government of the Union of South Africa, the stipulations of the two preceding articles shall be deemed to apply to such protectorates or States or mandated territories from the date and in the manner prescribed in the notes to be exchanged for the purpose of effecting such extension.

It is further understood that the provisions of the present treaty which apply to British subjects shall be deemed also to apply to natives of any British protectorate or protected State or mandated territory to which the stipulations of the two preceding articles apply or shall hereafter apply.

ARTICLE 20.

The present treaty shall come into force ten days after its publication, in conformity with the forms prescribed by the laws of the High Contracting Parties. It may be terminated by either of the High Contracting Parties by a notice not exceeding one year and not less than six months.

It shall be ratified, and the ratifications shall be exchanged

at Tirana as soon as possible.

In witness whereof the respective plenipotentiaries have signed the treaty and have affixed thereto their respective

Done at Tirana in duplicate in the English and Albanian texts, of which the former is considered authoritative, this twenty-second day of July, in the year 1926.

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, and in virtue of the authority committed to him by the said recited Acts, doth order, and it is hereby ordered, that from and after the 11th day of July, 1927, the said Acts shall apply in the case of the Albanian Republic under and in accordance with the said Treaty of the 22nd July, 1926.

Provided always that the operation of the said Acts shall be and remain suspended within the Dominion of Canada so long as an Act of the Parliament of Canada being Part I. of Chapter 155 of the Revised Statutes of Canada, 1906, and entitled "An Act respecting the Extradition of Fugitive Criminals," shall continue in force there,

and no longer.

Provided further that the operation of the said Acts shall be and remain suspended within the self-governing Dominions hereinafter named, that is to say, the Commonwealth of Australia (including for this purpose Papua and Norfolk Island), the Dominion of New Zealand, the Union of South Africa, the Irish Free State, and Newfoundland, and India, until notification shall have been made in the London Gazette that the Treaty has been made applicable thereto, and that on such notification being made in respect of any such Dominion or India the said Acts shall apply in such Dominion or India in the case of the Albanian Republic under and in accordance with the said Treaty as rom the date of the said notification.

This Order may be cited as the "Albania (Extradition) Order in Council, 1927."

in them by sections 18 and 23 of the Cemeteries and Burials Ordinance, No. 9 of 1899, in respect of the General Cemetery, Ratnapura, are hereby published for general information.

REGULATIONS.

- 1. All applications for graves are to be made to the keeper of the cemetery at least six hours before the time fixed for the burial of the body for which the grave is required, provided, however, that the Chairman shall have the power to entertain any application for a grave at any time.
- The keeper must intimate the line to be followed by a funeral party on arriving at the cemetery, and, if more than one come at the same time, the order in which they are respectively to move to the graves.
- Should it be necessary, for the purpose of preventing the disturbance of one funeral party by another, and not otherwise, the keeper of the cemetery may require that one burial service should be concluded before another can be commenced.
 - No grave shall be less than 5 feet in depth or at a distance of less than 3 feet from any other grave.
 - No grave or vault shall be reopened for an interment within the periods specified hereunder:-
 - (i.) No grave in which the body of a person has been buried without a coffin shall be reopened within 12 months.
 - (ii.) No grave in which the body of a person has been buried in an unlined coffin of wood other than teak or oak shall be reopened within 2 years.
 - (iii.) No grave in which the body of a person has been buried in a coffin of teak or oak or of other wood lined with tin or other metal shall be reopened within 7 years.
 - (iv.) In the case of a family vault, intended to be reopened for further burials, the body shall be enclosed in an hermetically sealed metal coffin. Such a vault may be opened at any time for further burials.

 (v.) In the case of all other vaults the Chairman of the District Council shall exercise his discretion regarding
 - reopening, due consideration being given to the structure of the vault, the nature of the coffin, and the time that has elapsed since the last burial.
- No dead body shall be buried without the permission of the cemetery-keeper; such permission shall not be granted till all fees due have been paid.

- On the production of a certificate signed either by a Minister of the Christian religion, a Member of the Urban District Council, a senior officer of Police, or the Urban District Council Secretary, that the relatives and friends of any deceased person are not able to pay the fees herein prescribed for the digging of a grave, the keeper of the cemetery shall cause a grave to be dug and the corpse to be buried therein free of charge.
- 9. All burial and cremation grounds not proclaimed as general cemeteries under Ordinance No. 9 of 1899, now in use, or which it may be hereafter desired to use, must be registered in the Office of the Urban District Council.
- The regulations dated December 17, 1915, and published in Government Gazette No. 6,765 dated December 23, 1915, are hereby revoked.

Deaths.—The total deaths registered were 125 (5 Burghers, 69 Sinhalese, 18 Tamils, 25 Moors, 6 Malays, and 2 Others). The death rate per 1,000 per annum was 24 9, as against 27 3 in the previous week, 25 6 in the corresponding week of last year, and 28 7 the weekly average for last year.

Infantile Deaths.—Of the 125 total deaths, 28 were of infants under one year of age, as against 29 in the preceding week, 28 in the corresponding week of the previous year, and 32 the average for last year.

Stillbirths.—The number of stillbirths registered during the week was 12.

Principal Causes of Death.—1. (a) Fifteen deaths from Phthisis were registered, 7 in Maradana hospitals (including 4 deaths of non-residents), 2 each in St. Paul's, Kotahena North, Kotahena South, and New Bazaar, as against 14 in the previous week and 11 the weekly average for last year.

- 4. One death from *Bubonic Plague* of a resident of Colombo town occurred at the Infectious Diseases Hospital, Angoda, during the week.
- 5. Thirteen deaths were registered from Debility, 10 from Infantile Convulsions, 5 from Puerperal Septicaemia, 4 from Worms, 3 each from Enteritis and Tetanus, 1 from Dysentery, and 54 from Other Causes.
- 6. Fourteen cases of *Enteric Fever*, 13 of *Chickenpox*, 4 of *Measles*, and 2 of *Plague* were reported during the week, as against 2, 4, 4, and 1, respectively, of the preceding week.

State of the Weather.—The mean temperature of air was 81.6° , against 79.8° in the preceding week and 82.8° in the corresponding week of the previous year. The mean atmospheric pressure was 29.905 in., against 29.832 in. in the preceding week and 29.796 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year. The total rainfall in the week was 1.41 in., against 4.72 in. in the preceding week, and 0.81 in. in the corresponding week of the previous year.

Candidates must bring to the Practical Examination their Notebooks certified by their teachers as being the record of their work carried out by the candidate in the laboratory, so that the Examiners may inspect them if they so desire. These Notebooks must be taken away by the candidates at the close of

Chemistry (Two Papers and a Practical Examination). The following outline is given for the general guidance of candidates as indicating the range of the Written Part (I.) and Experimental Part (II.) of the Examination in Chemistry:—

The methods which lead to the discovery of the composition of common materials occurring in nature.

The determination of molecular weights, equivalents, and of atomic weights. Valency and structural formulæ.

Classification of the elements, including the Periodic Scheme. General characters of the chief types of compounds, including acids, bases, and salts.

History, production, and properties of the more important and typical elements and their most familiar compounds.

The character of chemical changes, including combustion, thermal dissociation, and electrolysis: the conditions which determine and influence them, and the attendant phenomena.

The whole of the above to be treated in an elementary manner.
Candidates will be required to show that they have seen and practised a great variety of experiments, and are familiar with the appearance of common laboratory materials.

II.—Practical Examination.

(Candidates will be allowed to bring into the Examination Laboratory any one book on Quantitative Analysis, provided that it do not contain any reference to Qualitative Analysis.)

Candidates will be required to show that they are familiar with Candidates will be required to show that they are taminar with easy quantitative operations, gravimetric and volumetric, with the rudiments of qualitative analysis, and that they have prepared a number of elements or compounds by processes involving the manipulation of gases and the purification of substances by crystallisation, distillation, &c. Candidates are required to bring to the Practical Examination their original Laboratory Notabooks for inspection, should the Framiners as desire. These Notebooks for inspection, should the Examiners so desire. Notebooks must be taken away by the candidates at the close of the examination. Specimens made by the candidate, duly attested by the teacher, if any, may also be submitted to the Examiners.

Botany (Two Papers and a Practical Examination).

Morphology.—The structure and properties of the cell and of the various kinds of tissues; cell formation and the develop-ment of the tissues. The plant body; its structure, develop-ment, and various modifications.

Special Morphology, Reproduction, and Taxonomy.

The morphological and physiological characteristics of Cymnosperms, as exemplified by Cycas.

The morphological and physiological characteristics of Pteridophyta, as exemplified by Selaginella, Aspidium, Asplenium,

Candidates are required to bring to the Practical Examination their original Laboratory Notebooks for inspection, should the Examiners so desire. These Notebooks must be taken away by the candidates at the close of the examination.

 III.—Historical Geology.—The disposition of rocks and its representation on maps; evidence of relative ages of rocks fossils their responsation and distribution. rocks; fossils, their preservation and distribution in rocks of different ages; the geological systems, their broad characters and distribution in Great Britain.

Interpretation of simple geological maps in terms of rockstructure and its relation to topography; expression of this interpretation by means of sections; Graphic methods of finding thickness, dip and strike of beds, of completing outcrops, and of tracing the underground extension of strata.

Identification and description of common minerals and typical rocks, with and without the microscope; exercises in projection of crystals; identification and description of crystal forms of common minerals, both on models and on actual

crystals.

- (1) Greek and Roman Architecture (one paper).
- (2) History of Greek and Roman Art (one paper).

The characteristics of various periods and their course of development in Egypt, Assyria, Greece, and Rome.

(3) Drawings of Greek and Roman Orders done during the session to be submitted and marked.

Two Imperial size sheets* of drawings will be required, giving examples—one on each sheet—of either the Doric, Ionic, or Corinthian Orders; one must be Greek, the other Roman. Each sheet must contain at least two columns of one order with entablature complete drawn to scale, the of one order with entableture complete drawn to scale, the columns being not less than ten inches high on the paper, together with details drawn to at least three times the scale of the columns. These drawings are to be sent to the University one week before the date of the examination. Candidates who submit these drawings will be required to sit for the paper in section (1) only, viz., "Greek and Roman Architecture."

Candidates must take section (1) and either section (2) or (3).

English History (Two Papers).

English History treated generally so as to include the growth of the British Empire, with a special study of a standard work to be prescribed two years previously.

Due attention to be paid to changes in foreign policy, society, government, and customs, and to the development of the material and intellectual life of the nation.

Modern European History (Two Papers).

Modern European History from about 1400 to the present day. One paper will deal with the general History, the other with a prescribed text.

Ancient History (Two Papers).

Either (a) The History of Egypt, Western Asia, Greece, and Rome from the Earliest Dynasties to 30 B.C.

Or (b) Greek and Roman History from 776 B.C. to 330 A.D.

A selected portion of an historical author will be prescribed from time to time.

Candidates will not be required to show more than a general acquaintance with the book prescribed. Knowledge of the Text in the original will not be required.

Geography (Two Papers).

I.-General Geography.-The distribution of land and water. The leading facts of wind and water circulation.

The broad structural features of the continents, and the chief processes by which surface features are produced.

II.—Regional Geography.—The great divisions of the world considered under the following heads:—

Superficial configuration together with the leading facts of the distribution of soils and rocks and minerals of economic

The reaction of configuration upon air and water circulation and the resulting local climates.

The river systems as related to configuration and climate.

The influence of the foregoing physical factors on agricultural production and the supply of animal and vegetable products independently of agriculture.

The sources of mechanical power.

The distribution of population as related to the foregoing physical factors and as influencing labour supply and the value of land.

The localization of industries as determined by all the foregoing factors.

Transport. Trade centres and trade routes.

States as conditioned by geographical circumstances—physical, economic, and strategic.

Economics (Two Papers).

I.—Industrial and Commercial History.—The outlines of the industrial and commercial development of England, the questions being mainly chosen so as to deal with the period subsequent to 1760.

to 1760.

To include:—The effects of the introduction of machine industry. The developments of transport. Changes in industrial organization. The Great War (1793-1815) and its economic effects. Tariff policy. Movements of foreign trade. The growth of Banking, the adoption of the gold standard, the history of general prices. Poor Law. Trade Unionism.

II.—Principles of Economics.—Economics, analytical and descriptive, with special reference to the United Kingdom.

To include:—The scope of economics; meaning of the principal economic terms; causes of differences in productive power; analysis of various forms of organization for production; value in relation to production, exchange, distribution, and consumption; the distribution of income between individuals and classes; causes of variations in wages, profits, interest, and rent; economic effect of the ordinary actions of government. The whole to be effect of the ordinary actions of government. The whole to be illustrated as far as possible by reference to past and present conditions of the United Kingdom.

Zoology (Two Papers and a Practical Examination).

(1) The fundamental facts and laws of Zoology, as exhibited in the following types:—Ameba, Euglena, Paramecium, Monocystis, Hydra, Obelia, Lumbricus, Distomum, Astacus, Amphioxus, Scyllium, Rana, Lepus.

(2) The student will be expected to acquire a practical know-

ledge of the general organization of each of the types above specified, and an elementary knowledge of :—

(a) The chief biological laws which the structural phenomena illustrate, including an elementary knowledge of heredity, variation, and evolution.

(b) The structure and properties of the Cell, and the general characters of the Tissues, including Epithelia, Blood, Lymph; Nervous, Muscular, Connective, and Skeletal Tissues; and the microscopic structure of the more important organs. of the body.

(c) The phenomena of Sexual and Asexual Reproduction, including the general history and characters of the Germ Cells, the chief types of Segmentation of the fertilized Ovum, the Metamorphosis of the Frog, and an elementary knowledge of the Development of the Chick up to the third day of incubation, and the formation of the Feetal Membranes in the Bird and Mammal.

(3) A knowledge of the diagnostic characters of the following groups :-

Protozoa:—Lobosa, Foraminifera, Radiolaria Flagellata, Ciliata. Cœlenterata:—Hydrozoa, Anthozoa. Platyhelmia:—Turbellaria, Trematoda, Cestoda. Foraminifera, Radiolaria, Sporozoa,

Annelida:—Oligochæta, Polychæta.
Articulata:—Crustacea, Insecta, Arachnida.
Chordata:—Urochorda, Cephalochorda.
Craniata:—Pisces, Reptilia, Amphibia, Aves, Mammalia.

Practical Examination.

The candidate must be prepared to examine microscopically, to dissect, and to describe specimens or parts of the animals† comprised in paragraphs 1 and 2 in the foregoing Syllabus (with the exception that for the skull of Lepus will be substituted that of Mus), and to determine the zoological position of specimens

in accordance with paragraph 3 above.

Candidates are required to bring to the Practical Examination their original Laboratory Notebooks, for inspection should the Examiners so desire. These Notebooks must be taken away by the candidates at the close of the examination.

Law (Two Papers).

- (i.) The general conception of law, including various legal duties and rights treated in an elementary manner.(ii.) English Constitutional Law and its History, including—
 - - (a) The nature of Constitutional Law.
 - (b) The Liberty of the Subject (c) Parliament.

 - (d) The Crown. (e) The Courts of Law.

(iii.) The Law of Crimes, being the general nature of criminal liability, together with an outline of the more common crimes. (iv.) The general Principles of Tort and Civil Wrong.

(v.) The main features of a Contract.

(vi.) A general outline of the Law of Property with particular reference to the duties of Trustees towards their beneficiaries.

† The list of Animals may be changed from time to time, but two years' notice of any change will always be given.

Music (Two Papers and a Viva Voce Test).

Candidates may offer either A or B below:-

A.—Harmony and Counterpoint in not more than four parts, for voices or strings (two papers). The candidate may be required to write a Pianoforte accompaniment to a melody for a voice or a stringed instrument.

Candidates will be required to work exercises in either Strict or Free Counterpoint, at the discretion of the Examiner.

There will also be a viva voce examination in general musical

knowledge and in these subjects.

B.—General History of Music (one paper, consisting of not less than ten questions of which the candidate will be expected to answer five).

Form an analysis of unprepared works (one paper). There will also be a *vivă voce* examination in general musical knowledge and in certain prescribed works.

INTERMEDIATE EXAMINATION IN SCIENCE. Scheme of Examination.

Candidates shall be examined in any four subjects selected by themselves out of the following subjects of examination, viz., (1) Pure Mathematics, (2) Applied Mathematics, (3) Experimental Physics, (4) Chemistry, (5) Botany. (6) Zoology, (7) Geology, (8) General Principles of Biology, and (9) Geography (one at least of the four subjects selected from the foregoing list must be taken from amongst the first three). In all subjects there will be two papers of three hours each, and, except in Pure Mathematics, Applied Mathematics, and in Geography, there will also be a three hours practical test.

Geography, there will also be a three hours practical test.
In each subject questions will be set involving (1) the translation of passages in French or in German, and (2) answers with regard to the subject-matter thereof. Candidates are recommended to read some books or papers in French or in German on the subjects

which they select for the examination.

The questions in French or in German, which, by the regulations are set for the home candidates, will be made optional in the examinations as held in the Colonies.

The Examiners shall be at liberty to test any candidate by

means of viva voce questions.

N.B.—No candidate offering an Experimental Science subject will be allowed to pass who fails to satisfy the Examiners in the practical parts as well as the written part of the examination in the subject chosen.

Candidates shall not be approved by the Examiners unless they have shown a competent knowledge in all of the four subjects taken.

Réference.

A candidate at the Intermediate Examination who takes all the prescribed subjects on one and the same occasion, but who be "referred," i.e., he may be permitted, on the recommendation of the Examiners, to present himself in that subject alone on one occasion only at one of the next two Intermediate Examinations in Science.

Referred* candidates who do not pass in their referred subjects according to these conditions will be required when re-entering to offer all four subjects again. The Examiners will recommend that a candidate be referred only if his failure in one subject is not serious, and if his performance in the remaining subjects is reasonably good.

A student who has completed the Intermediate Examination after having been referred in one subject will be deemed for all purposes to have passed the examination in question on the date

of completion.

Supplementary Subjects.

Candidates who have passed the Intermediate Examination in Science may enter for examination in one or more supplementary subjects.

EXEMPTIONS.

Candidates who have passed the Internal Intermediate Examination in Science in accordance with the conditions then in force for External Students are entitled to exemption from the External Intermediate Examination in Science; and if the combination of subjects did not comply with the requirements for External Students such candidates may be exempted on passing in the

necessary Supplementary Subjects.

Bachelors of Arts of this University who become candidates for the Degree of Bachelor of Science in the Faculty of Science are allowed to present themselves at the B.Sc. Examination immediately following their passing the Intermediate Examination.

Candidates who have passed the Intermediate Arts Examination with Pure Mathematics will be excused that subject at the Intermediate Science Examination. Candidates who have passed the B.A. Examination with Pure Mathematics or Applied Mathematics or Geography may claim exemption, when entering for the Intermediate.

Mathematics or Geography may claim exemption, when entering for the Intermediate Examination in Science, from examination in such of the foregoing subjects as they may have taken.

Candidates who have passed the Intermediate Examination in Arts for External Students in or after 1920, or who have passed the corresponding examination for Internal Students, under the conditions applicable to External Students in force since that date, with any of the following subjects:—Pure Mathematics, Applied Mathematics, Physics, Chemistry, Botany, Geology, Military Science, Geography, may claim exemption, when entering for the Intermediate Examination in Science, from examination in such of the foregoing subjects as they may have taken.

Candidates who have passed the Intermediate Examination in Agriculture prior to 1927 are entitled to exemption at the Intermediate Examination in Science from subjects which may

Graduates in Engineering Science of this University, whether Internal or External, will be permitted to proceed without passing the Intermediate Examination in Science, to the B.Sc. General or Special Examination for External Students, after a lapse of two academic years from the passing of the B.Sc. examination in Engineering.

Candidates who enter for or have passed the Intermediate Examination in Engineering as External or as Internal Students may, in order to obtain exemption from the whole of the Inter-mediate Examination in Science, complete that Examination by taking an additional subject at the Intermediate Examination in Engineering. Such additional subject may be taken either at an entry for the Intermediate Examination in Engineering or at any Intermediate Examination in Engineering subsequent

to that at which the candidate has passed.

Minutes of Proceedings of a General Meeting of the Municipal Council of Galle, held in the Municipal Office on Saturday, August 20, 1927, at 1.15 p.m., pursuant to Notice dated August 15, 1927.

Present: -Mr. L. W. C. Schrader, Chairman; Mr. C. E. de Vos; Mr. D. I. Durham; Mr. C. L. Wickramasinghe; and Mr. F. W. Sproule.

Before proceeding with the business for the day, the Chairman, with the leave of Council, referred to the retirement of Mr. W. W. Morgan, and to the appointment of his successor in office, Mr. F. W. Sproule, as a member of the Council; and moved that the Council do place on record its appreciation of Mr. Morgan's services as a member of this Council. Mr. C. E. de Vos seconded.—Carried.

- The Minutes of the General Meeting of July 9, 1927, a copy thereof having been furnished to each member, were taken as read and confirmed.
- 2. Pursuant to notice, Mr. C. L. Wickramasinghe asked—What is the cause of delay in obtaining a report from a qualified Electrical Engineer on the Electric Installation?
 - The Chairman replied as follows:—On April 9, 1927, the Council passed the following resolution:—That the services of a qualified Electrical Engineer be engaged to report of the Electric Scheme before the installation is taken over by the Municipal Council.

In terms of the resolution, I inquired whether Messrs. Boustead Brothers would undertake to make a report, and

at what fee. They replied on April 28 that they were prepared to make the report for a fee of about Rs. 1,000.

On May 7 the Council adopted a motion "That the Special Committee on Electric Lighting be authorized to take steps to put into effect the resolution adopted at the last Meeting of the Council to secure the services of a qualified Electrical Expert to report on our Electric Scheme."

At a Meeting of the Special Committee, on May 18, it was decided to ask Messrs. Boustead Brothers for an exhaustive report on the installation. Messrs. Boustead Brothers replied on June 14 that they were prepared to make a report for a fee of Rs. 1,200, and required that copies of specifications and details of the engines and dynamos and plans of the wiring system, &c., should be supplied to them.

On June 16, I requested the Director of Public Works to be so good as to furnish the required information as soon as possible. Attention was invited on July 4 and July 14. The Director of Public Works replied on July 18, inquiring the name and professional qualifications of the gentleman who was proposed by Messrs. Boustead Brothers to draw up

Messrs. Boustead Brothers were then asked, on July 19, to furnish this information. They have not done so yet, but have stated that the matter is receiving their attention.

I am now informed, by letter dated August 18, that the Colombo Electric Tramways and Lighting Co., Ltd., are not prepared to furnish an official report upon the installation.

It now rests with the Special Committee to deal with the matter.

The following motion stood in the name of Mr. C. L. Wickramasinghe-"That steps be taken, without further delay, to obtain a report from an Electrical Engineer as resolved by this Council on April 9, 1927."

Mr. C. L. Wickramasinghe asked leave of Council to defer the motion as there were so few members present. Leave

of Council having been given the motion was deferred.

- 4. The following motions stood in the name of Mr. J. E. Perera:—(1) That the Superintendent of Works be asked to report whether drains could be built with success on either side of Dangedera road, Talopitiya road, Hall road, Kongtree road, and Circular road, and to draw up an estimate for cement drains on such roads as it is possible to build them.
- (2) That the Medical Officer of Health be directed to keep the Talapitiya road side drains in good order, and that extra coolies be given him to enable an efficient service to be kept up. Mr. Perera telegraphed that he was unable to be present at the Meeting, and requested the leave of Council to defer the motions. Leave of Council having been granted the motions were deferred.
- 5. To sanction, under by-law 7 (vi.) of the Municipal Council by-laws relating to leave, excess leave of 31 days over 36 days granted to Mr. W. W. Ranasinghe in 1927, out of the available lapsed vacation leave in respect of 1923/1924.—Resolved that the excess leave be sanctioned.
- 6. Application from Inspector Wijesekera for six months' vacation leave to attend Training Classes for Sanitary Inspectors.—Resolved that as the time for forwarding applications has lapsed, the application be not considered. If the application is to be renewed it should be made in good time.
- 7. Assessment rates for 1928.—Resolved (1) To make and assess for the calendar year 1928 a rate of 17\frac{3}{4} per cent. of the annual value of all houses and buildings of every description, and of all lands and tenements whatsoever within the Police limits, and a rate of 7 per cent. of the annual value of all houses and buildings of every description, and of all lands and tenements whatsoever outside the Police limits, but within the Municipal limits of Galle, as required by section 115 of Ordinance No. 6 of 1910; payable by four instalments on or before the following dates:—First instalment on or before March 31, 1928; second instalment on or before June 30, 1928; third instalment on or before September 30, 1928; fourth instalment on or before Deember 31, 1928.
- (2) To adopt the valuation of properties for the current year, subject to such alterations as the Chairman may, from time to time, find necessary to make for the purpose of rating for the calendar year 1928.
- 8. To fill a vacancy on the Standing Committee on Municipal Works.—Mr. F. W. Sproule was elected by ballot to fill the vacancy.
- 9. To fill a vancancy on the Special Committees (a) on Electric Lighting; (b) on Drainage:—Mr. C. E. de Vos moved that Mr. F. W. Sproule be elected on both Special Committees. Mr. C. L. Wickramasinghe seconded.—Carried.

 The following extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Municipal Works, and the Special Committee on Electric Lighting were laid before the Council:—
 - 10. Extracts from the Minutes of the Standing Committee on Municipal Works of July 9, 1927.
- (2) Application from Mr. P. H. de La Harpe of No. 25, Kaluwells, for two additional taps to his water service.—Recommended.
- (3) Application from the Provincial Engineer for a temporary connexion without charge for the Supreme Court building operations.—Resolved that the Provincial Engineer be informed that, in terms of regulation 32 (4) framed under the Waterworks by-laws, the Council had no option, but to make a charge for water supplied to premises where building operations are in progress.
 - (4) To consider the following estimates:—(a) Rs. 1,000 for the improvement of Hume road—Recommended;
- (b) Rs. 1,000 for repairs of bridges—Recommended. (a) and (b) to be carried out departmentally.
- (5) Application from the Superintendent of Police to trim the overhanging branches of shade trees standing around the Fort explanade.—Recommended that the ends of the branches be trimmed under the immediate supervision of the Superintendent of Works in consultation with the Superintendent of Police in such a way as not to interfere with the shade afforded by the trees.

Resolution.

Resolved that the recommendations of the Standing Committee be adopted.

11. Extracts from the Minutes of the Special Committee on Electric Lighting of July 13, 1927.

- (3) Requisitions from the Superintendent, Electricity Department:—(a) 25 meters of $2\frac{1}{2}$ amps, 6 meters of 2 amps, 3 meters of 10 amps, and 2 meters of 20 amps, at an approximate cost of Rs. 750.—Recommended that meters be ordered direct from Messrs. Ferranti, England. (b) One recording volt meter, 0-300 volts; one watt meter, 0-500 watts; one stop watch; ten charts for recording volt meter; twelve charts for recording ammeter, 0-5 amps; one bench drill, with drills; one set whitworth stool and dies, 3/16 in. to $\frac{1}{2}$ in.; one anvil; one dozen hack saw blades; one dozen assorted files; one speed counter; ten pairs rubber gloves at an approximate cost of Rs. 1,500.—Recommended that the instruments, &c., be purchased. (c) Office furniture:—One pedestal office table; one writing table; four arm chairs; one washhand stand; one enamelled jug and basin; one almirah; one book shelf at an approximate cost of Rs. 230.—Recommended that the furniture be purchased.
- (4) Payment for street lighting.—Recommended that from July 1 the payment for lighting 250 street lamps be increased from Rs. 800 to Rs. 1,000 per mensem.
- (5) Storekeeper's security.—Recommended that cash security in Rs. 250 be required from the Storekeeper, Electricity Department.
- (7) Overhanging coconut trees.—Recommended (a) that compensation for coconut trees overhanging the overhead mains shall cease to be paid hereafter; (b) that the resolution of Council of September 11, 1926, regarding compensation, be rescinded.

Resolution.

With regard to item 7 (a) and (b) it was resolved to refer back to the Special Committee for reconsideration of compensation and the rights of the Council.

The ecommendations of the Special Committee with regard to the remaining items were adopted.

 - (2) Progress report of works done on estimates during July, 1927.
